The Ninety-second Annual Session of the Beulah Baptist Association was held with Yanceyville Church, beginning Tuesday morning, July 27, 1926. Devotional exercises conducted by Bro. Canipe. Report of Bro. N. J. Todd on Periodicals presented and on motion adopted. Rev. W. F. West preached the introductory sermon. Bro. A. C. Convened at 1:30, sang "Onward Christian Soldiers" and "Blessed Assurance." After prayers by Bro. McGregor, sang "Jesus Saves."

Report on State Missions Called for, and Bro. Coggins presented and read the same:

#### REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS

It will not be within the scope of this report to discuss in detail the work of our State Missions Board, but the different departments of the Boards' activities will be briefly mentioned.

We wonder if our people realize the magnitude of our State Mission and the rapidity with which it has grown in the last few years? State Mission now comprehend far more than it did ten years ago even. The old idea of State Missions comprehended only the work of assisting weak struggling churches and Mission points in having preaching. First came the Sunday School Department, then the work of assisting in the erection of mission church houses was begun in a small way; then came the B. Y. P. U. Department, the W. M. U., the Student Activities, Evangelist, Negro work, and the Department of Stewardship.

In addition to all of these growing and enlarging activities, the Seventy-five Million brought all the financial and administrative burden of our whole denominational program upon the Corresponding Secretary of the Convention, Dr. Chas. E. Maddry.

Our achievements in the past have been great. We have wrought well as a denomination, but as we look into the past we are made to feel that the present is greater than the past, and the future must be immeasurably greater than present. The un-



finished task constitutes a challenge to all the consecration possessed by the members of our churches. There are 2,291 churches in the convention, and 21 churches in this association. The great task before us is the enlistment of the people already gathered in our churches who are with us in name only. As long as 6,290 of the Baptists of North Carolina are wholly unenlisted in our great enterprises we will never convince the world at large that our forces of church policy are efficient and worthy of emulation. We believe we have reached the bottom of the trough and that from this time we will see a gradual rise in mission offering.

May our people tarry and be endowed with power of the Holy Spirit. May there be a deeper consecration and a more heroic and sacrificial giving of our means for the support and enlargement of the work the board is undertaking.

Report on Home Missions presented and read by Bro. McGregor:

#### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS

Notwithstanding the receipts were more than \$100,000 short of those of the previous year, the year's work was most gratifying. Conversions and baptisms were numerous. The Home Board for years has been recognized as probably the greatest single evangelizing agency in America. Also the report of the Board shows a most gratifying tendency towards self-support. Mission stations and weak churches helped by the Board are in turn giving liberally to our denominational work—beneficiaries thus becoming benefactors.

This is the greatest hour for Home Missions in the history of our country. The problems were never so acute, the demands so urgent, the opportunities so great and the obligations so overwhelming. This conviction is growing with thoughtful persons who realize the significance of America for the salvation of the world. America constitutes at once the greatest field and force in all the world for Christian civilization. Christian statesmen everywhere are beginning to realize this. Problems at home are as serious and complicated as those beyond the seas.

Our country has become notorious for its disrespect for law, for its numerous murders, for its commercialism and materialism. Nothing but the mighty power of the Gospel of Christ will save us from this deluge of worldly diversion and material prosperity. These things constitute a most serious problem which deserves the thoughtful consideration of our Convention. Our work abroad will advance apace as we lay the foundations at home.

The Board furnishes free of cost excellent tracts and leaflets on



all phases of its work at headquarters, 804 Wynne-Claughton Building, Atlanta, Georgia.

Your Committee most cordially recommends that every church and individual in our bounds study this great department of our work and pray earnestly and give liberally for its success.

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Report on Foreign Missions presented and read by  
Bro. C. W. Hood:

On motion, the reports on Missions that were just read were adopted.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

In the minutes of the Southern Baptist Convention of 1926 we find some statements and figures which will bring before us the situation of the Foreign Mission work. There has come to the Board and to the denomination such a shock from the accumulation of a debt on the Foreign Board of more than \$1,800,000 that, notwithstanding the relief which the Christmas love offering gave the Board, it was the conviction of the Board members, which they met on January 13, 1926, that the Board should without delay proceed, at whatever expense to the work, further to reduce this debt and continue such reduction until the debt is fully paid, if the denomination does not provide a more adequate income.

For four years the Board has been cutting out building operations and equipment and for two years, denying missionary appointments, but in order to further reduce the debt, it becomes necessary for the Board to invade operations and deal with its working staff on the fields. Consequently appropriations for great numbers of our missions schools were denied and instructions given to close them. Large numbers of native evangelists had to be discontinued, including men whom we have patiently trained in our schools; and items like traveling expenses necessary to large and effective evangelistic work by the missionaries on the field, had to be reduced to the cruel minimum. And yet, the receipts of the Board from the cooperative program was not sufficient to maintain the work on this disastrous reduced budget.

Building operations discontinued, mission schools closed, native evangelist dismissed, remaining workers hampered, waiting missionaries denied. (this is the summary of the situation)

This gives the financial status of the Board, in face of the urgent calls and the blessings of God upon the work done on foreign fields.

Our total gifts for the last seven years have increased 80 per cent. Our gifts to local church work have increased over 119



per cent, while our gifts to Missions, Education and Benevolence, have increased only 12 per cent. In 1920 the Home and Foreign Boards received 43 cents out of every dollar for missions and benevolence, while in 1925 they received only 21.2 per cent. about about one half. If the mission Board had been allowed in 1925 43 cents out of every dollar as in 1920 they would today be free from all debt.

The tragedy of today is that the people are violating the direct commands of Jesus Christ, living in extravagance and failing to give the gospel to a perishing world.

Bro. E. F. Upchurch presented his report on Sunday Schools. On motion the report adopted. Speeches were made on the report by Bren. Upchurch, Beam, Hood, West, Canipe and Arnette.

Mr. Upchurch read the report on Sunday School, showing the benefits of the Sunday School and urging whole-hearted cooperation of the Pastors and adult membership of the churches.

**REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOL**

The Baptist Sunday Schools within the Southern Baptist Convention have made wonderful progress in the last 12 months and North Carolina next to Texas has the greatest number of Baptist Sunday School which have reached the standard of excellence of any state in the Convention. We are sure the Sunday Schools in this Association have made progress, but we have no statistics to give us the facts at this writing; but we wish to say in our opinion that there is no organization in existence established solely by man which means so much to the church and Christianity as the Sunday School. We wish to recommend its wholehearted support by the pastors of our churches and the adult membership of our churches; for less than one person in three covered by our association is even on the Sunday School roll and there is a great work here to be done.

Wednesday morning—Association convened at 10 o'clock, singing "Love Lifted Me," "Will there be any



stars in my crown."

Bro. Curren conducted the devotional exercises. Moderator called the session to order and called for the reading of the minutes, which were read and approved.

On motion, Bro. Noell's Report on Orphanage is to be handed in later, and the Orphanage work to be discussed at present. The Moderator presented some interesting facts on the work of the Orphanage.

Bro. Gardner, representing the Orphanage was introduced and gave an interesting talk on his work there as pastor. Miss Edwards, representing the Orphanage spoke on the services they were rendering there. Bro. Beam made a short talk regarding the work. Bro. Canipe emphasized the importance of contributing to the cause.

Bro. Clyde Allen presented and read his report on Hospitals. On motion, report adopted. Report discussed by Bro. Allen. Bro. Canipe discussed the report, and gave some interesting facts regarding the work. Bro. West also spoke of the importance of the work of a Christian Hospital. Bro. Beach aided in the discussion, and on motion the report on Hospitals was adopted.

#### REPORT ON HOSPITAL

During the last year there were about 1800 patients, over 400 of these were charity. These came from every part of the state. While this report is before me there are patients from Sylva, Mount Airy, Furches, Weldon, Norwood, Durham, Henderson, Sanford, Macon, Granite Falls, Marshall, Burlington and other points closer to our city. These cases cost the Hospital around \$20,000.00. The number of charity cases grow every year. It looks as if we will have to care for 500 this year, or turn many worthy ones away to die. The question is, which one must we send back.

To pay for this \$20,000.00 of charity we have received up to July 1st about \$12,000.00 from all Mother's Day offerings. We start this year with no funds for the needs of charity and a debt on hand for what we have been doing. It is a pity to turn these good Baptist people away just because they are poor and our Baptist churches will not hear their cry.

The budget funds are far too small to meet the debts on the building which come due this year. No hope can we have from that source. It is Mother's Day offering, or some other day's offering in the Sunday School or they die.

Our women are trying to build a Nurses' Home. We need this greatly. It would increase our revenue and much enlarge the



opportunities for caring for charity cases. You men help the women and let's give our girls a place to stay. You will open to the public 21 extra beds and no one can tell the far reaching good this may be to the suffering Baptists of the state who long to come.

We plead for your prayers, your support and your offerings, both in sending pay patients and in giving us contributions to help the poor.

And then above all let us as individuals be temperate in all things, thereby teaching those around about us its importance. Let us stand by, encourage and assist in every possible way our affairs in the enforcement of our laws.

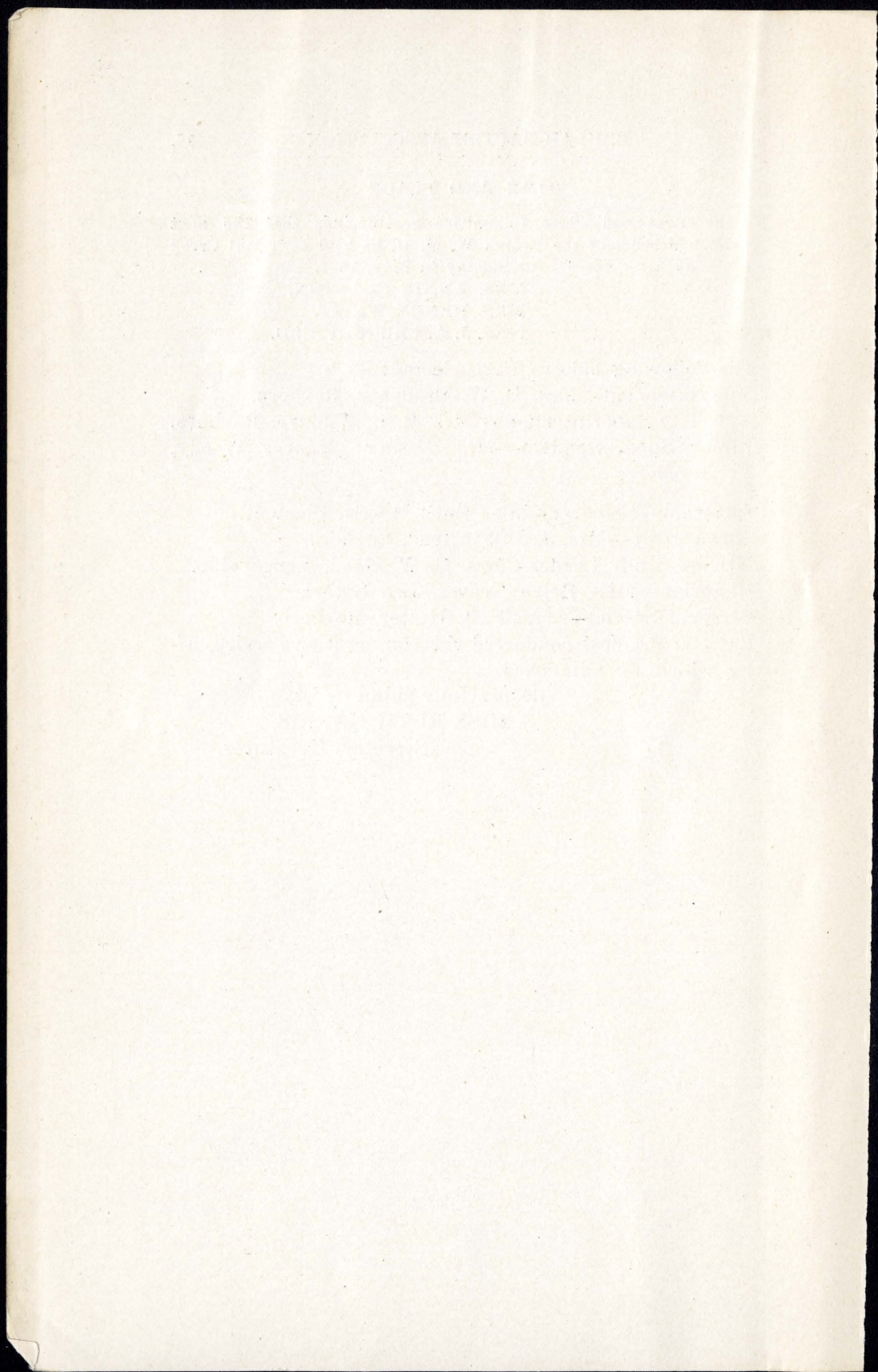
