




DEDICATION Dr. John Thomas Bunn

John Thomas Bunn was born on February 10, 1927 in Mt. Gilead, North Carolina. He is the son of Rev. John Henry and Fannie Bunn. He has one sister, Elizabeth, that is deceased.

Since John's father and grandfather were Baptist ministers, John was reared in church. He became a Christian at an early age and experienced God's call to preach the gospel during his college years at Wake Forest University.

He met Lois Webb as a seventh grader when his family moved to Morehead City, NC where John's father served as pastor of the First Baptist Church. They were married in 1951. They have three children; David of High Point, NC; Steve of Morehead City, Raymond of Sylva; and two granddaughters.

After graduation from college at Wake Forest University, John earned his Masters of Divinity and a Masters of Arts degree at Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky in 1951. After graduation from Seminary, he served as pastor of First Baptist Church, Midway, Kentucky and worked on a Ph. D. in Old Testament at Southern Seminary. He was awarded his doctorate in 1956 from Southern Baptist Seminary.

Dr. Bunn became a world class scholar having completed further studies and travels in Israel, Jordan, England, Germany, Greece, Cyprus, Syria, Lebanon, and Egypt. He also did post-doctoral studies at the British Museum and Near Eastern Museum Studies, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, and Union Theological Seminary, in Richmond, Virginia. He was engaged in archaeological field work in Dibon, Tell Arad, and Machaerus in the Middle East and has written numerous archaeological articles.

For fifteen years, Dr. Bunn was Chairman of the Department of Religion and Philosophy and Professor of Religion at Campbell University, Buies Creek, North Carolina. While there, he served on various major faculty committies, and served for two years as Assistant to the President of the University with various responsibilities.

Dr. Bunn also served as Assistant to the Educational Director, Institute for Mediterranean Studies in Berkeley, California, and Hebrew University, Jerusalem, Israel.

He is a prolific writer having published numerous articles, books, and papers. He wrote three Commentaries for the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention: the <u>Book of Ezekiel, Song of Solomon, and Books of Proverbs,</u> <u>Ecclesiastes, Song of Solomon.</u> He has also written numerous Sunday School lessons and other Bible studies for the SBC. He has been widely used as a lecturer by Universities, Baptist Assemblies, and various Baptist groups in both Old and New Testament studies. He has also been used as a Television Lecture Series and Video-Taped by the North Carolina Educational Network.

Not only was he a leader in the field of education with an international reputation, but also he has served as Senior Pastor of Braggtown Baptist Church in Durham, North Carolina, and Senior Minister, First Baptist Church in Sylva from 1975 to 1988 when he retired. He is Pastor Emeritus of First Baptist, Sylva.


Dr. Bunn was well respected in state and national Baptist circles. He is a past president of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina; served as Chairman of the Executive Committee for the state convention, served on various committees in the state convention; and on the Board of Trustees for the Baptist Hospital of North Carolina.

He was active in the Tuckaseigee Association having served on several committees while serving as Pastor of First Baptist. He was one of the founders of United Christian Ministries of Jackson County.

He is a former board member on the Jackson County Council on Alcoholism, past President of the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, was on the Board of Directors for Western North Carolina Tomorrow, served as Chairman of the Capital Fund Drive for Harris Regional Hospital, and served as Vice Chairman for the Southwestern Community College Foundation. He is a former mayor of Sylva.

Dr. Bunn is a great friend of pastors and has assisted many pastors in quiet but significant ways. He has a deep love for the Lord and for His Word and has studied it and taught it around the world. He has given of himself in his commitment and service to the local church, the Association, the denomination and the community.

He has traded knives with King of Jordan and drank coffee at the local coffee shop and shared humorous stories with his friends. He is a gifted preacher and Bible teacher who is at home in any setting. His influence reaches far beyond Sylva and he has blessed thousands through his teaching and writings. It is with deep appreciation and great respect for almost fifty years of ministry that the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association dedicates the 1994 Annual Minutes to Dr. John T. Bunn.



CHARLES THOMAS CROWDER 1935 - 1994

Charles Thomas Crowder was born on August 25, 1935 to O.C. and Aretta Owenby Crowder. He went to be with the Lord on March 18, 1994.

He was born and reared in Buncombe County, North Carolina. He was converted at a young age in the Biltmore Methodist Church.

After high school he joined the United States Marine Corps and enjoyed a distinguished career of thirty years, the last ten being spent in the reserve unit. He retired as a Gunnery Sergeant. He served in both the Korean War and two tours of duty in the Viet Nam War.

He married Joyce Bryson on October 29, 1976. She is the daughter of Fred H. and Hazel Greene Bryson of Jackson County. They were married for seventeen years.

They were members of Scotts Creek Baptist Church and later moved to Little Savannah and joined the Little Savannah Baptist Church.

Tom was very active at his church. He served at various times as: Sunday School Director, Yokefellow, sang in the choir, served on various committees, and taught the mission Sunday School Class at Mountain Trace Nursing Home.

Active in the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, he served on the Executive Committee, was Assistant Associational Treasurer, and Vacation Bible School Director for three years.

He was active in civic affairs. He served as Military Service Director for the Jackson County chapter of the American Red Cross. He served as President of the American Heart Association for Jackson County. He served as past Commander of the American Legion Post 104 in Sylva and was the chaplain at his death. He was also a member of the Jimmy Dillard VFW Post of Cashiers.

He was an active Gideon, a past President, and was in demand as a speaker for their organization. At his death, he was chaplain of the Dillsboro Masonic Lodge 459. He and Joyce were honored in 1989 as Jackson County Citizens of the year by the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce.

Tom's Christian influence was felt far and wide. One of his favorite activities was to distribute Bibles to school age children and through the years he distributed thousands of them. In all his activities and achievements he was very dependable and capable. The byword was, "If you want it done and done right, get Tom Crowder."

It is with deep gratitude, great joy and profound respect that the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association dedicates the 1994 Annual Minutes in loving memory of Tom Crowder.

PROCEEDINGS

The One Hundred Sixty-Fifth Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association was held Thursday, October 13, at Cullowhee Baptist Church with 153 messengers from 37 Churches present. Twenty-two visitors were present.

93 messengers from 27 churches met at Hamburg on Friday evening, October 14 for the concluding session. Eighteen visitors were present at that session.

Each session was moderated by Rev. Wayne Sorrells, pastor of Buff Creek Baptist Church.

On Thursday evening the Senior Adult choir of the Association brought the special music just before the sermon by Rev. Mike Moore. The Rev. Moore preached from Judges 7 a message entitled "10 pieces of silver and a new suit of clothes."

Various Associational reports were given. During the Sunday School report, Mr. Jack Buchanan, a member of New Hope Church, was given a perfect attendance pin for 47 years of Sunday School attendance. Mrs. Kathleen Buchanan has secured the pin from the Sunday School Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and presented the pin to him.

Mr. Norman Parris gave the discipleship report and was recognized with a plaque honoring him for ten years service.

Ms. Jody Pressley gave the United Christian Ministry report. An offering of \$381 was received for UCM.

Rev. Jack Hinson gave the chaplaincy report for Harris Regional Hospital.

Rev. John Reid, Director of Missions, gave his annual report to the Association. Reports of mission trips to Albany, Georgia; Lexington, South Carolina; and local mission projects highlighted his report. The Rev. Reid showed a video tape of a recent news article done by WLOS-TV on a group of mission volunteers for Mrs. Martha Bryson on Cullowhee Mountain.

Rev. Aubrey Folk, Director of the Maternity Home in Asheville gave the Baptist Children's Home report.

Ms. Sue Fitzgearld gave the Mars Hill College report. She noted that scholarship money is available to go to Baptist Colleges.

Rev. Harry Vance, pastor of Rockdale and Associational Music Director, led the congregation singing each evening. Rev. Vance was recognized for 12 years service to the Association with a plaque expressing appreciation for his leadership on Friday evening.

Rev. Tom Lolley, area Missionary for the Baptist State Convention, gave a report on behalf of the state convention. There are better than 3400 Baptist Churches in North Carolina.

Rev. John Reid, a trustee of Truett Camp and Conference Center, brought a report on their behalf.

Ms. Wanda Kidd, the new Baptist Student Union Director, gave a report for the BSU. Over 100 students gather weekly at the BSU building and many are available to sing and do drama in local Churches.

Rev. Scott Courtney, pastor of Webster Baptist Church led the Association through Constitutional changes on both nights.

Mrs. Irene Hooper, Mrs. Kathleen Buchanan, and Mrs. Elosie Shuler helped the Association remember and honor deceased members.

Both the Cullowhee and Hamburg Churches served delicious meals prior to the meetings.

On Friday evening, the Hamburg Church Choir provided the special music.

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Dr. Robert Odom, pastor of Hamburg, sang a special number.

Dr. Randell Sherron, pastor of Scotts Creek, gave the finance committee report and the treasurer's report. The Association adopted a \$47,000 budget.

The place and preacher committee recommended that the Association meet next year, October 12, 1995 at Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church and October 13, 1995 at Black Mountain Baptist Church. Rev. Roy Burnette and Rev. Mike Farmer will bring the messages.

The Resolution Committee brought resolutions of appreciation to the Host churches, a resolution of commendation to Moses Creek Baptist Church on its 75th anniversary, a resolution opposing gambling and a resolution of Incorporation.

Rev. Edward A. Beddengfield, Jr., pastor of First Baptist Sylva, gave the personnel committee report.

Mr. Ken Bishop gave the Committee on Committee report. Mrs. Louise Edwards presented the Nominating Committee report. Rev. Wayne Sorrells was re-elected Moderator.

Rev. Roy Burnette, pastor of Jarrett Memorial Baptist Church, gave the Missions Development Committee report. He introduced Rev. Lee Graham, mission pastor for the Sapphire Valley Resort Mission, who reported on the new mission established by the Tuckaseigee and Transylvania Associations and the Extension Department of the State Convention.

Mrs. Eloise Shuler gave the Senior Adult report. A Senior Adult Choir was started this past year and is available to churches on request.

Mrs. Nelda Reid, gave the WMU report. The Associational WMU has been involved in various mission projects. Mrs. Reid recognized Mrs. Janice Burnette, past WMU Director, for her outstanding leadership during the past four years.

Mr. Randy Davenport gave the Interfaith Witness report. Rev. John Reid gave the Brotherhood report and the Christian Action League Report. Rev. Reid reported on the recent victory against Liquor-by-the-drink vote in Sylva.

Rev. Ray Houston, Clerk for the Association, gave the Digest of letters report. Baptisms were up from last year as well as mission giving.

Lyman Fisher, Disaster Coordinator for Region 10, gave a report on disaster relief efforts. A new van has been purchased and is being equipped to serve this region. It can feed up to 10,000 meals per day. Two trips to Georgia and South Carolina were made this past year.

Rev. Eddie Stillwell, pastor of Yellow Mountain Baptist Church, preached the concluding message from Matt 18, "What is right with the Church." After a good time of fellowship the meeting was adjourned. A good Spirit was evident in both meetings and one long time observer of Annual Meetings remarked that it was one of the best meetings in recent years.

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DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT

As I celebrate my twelfth anniversary as Director of Missions, I am grateful to God and to you, the people of the churches, for the prayers, support, cooperation and encouragement you have given me during these years. I am grateful for the many opportunities to preach, to teach and to serve in other ways in the life of the local church.

Churches and Associations are called to be on Mission and do Missions. We are in the third year of our New York-North Carolina partnership. This year Rev. Wayne Dyer, Director of Missions, of the Davis Association visited us after Home Missions week at Ridgecrest. This was his second trip down here. Next year I hope that another group from our Association can go up there.

We are in our second year of our Ukraine Partnership. Thus far three men have gone to the Ukraine. I have been invited to represent the state convention to go to the Ukraine within the next three months. I will be leading a team to do survey work in five different areas of the country.

The Cashier's Church is to congratulated in beginning a migrant Hispanic ministry in their church this year. Later it moved over to Flat Branch in the Norton community. Yes, there are now people who speak other languages living and working in Jackson County and our ministry is to them as well.

Along with the Baptist State Convention Extension Department and the Transylvania Baptist Association, our Executive Committee voted to help finance a resort type ministry at Sapphire Valley. The management at the resort complex donated their Ski Lodge as the place to worship. A dynamic retired couple, Rev. Lee and Doris Graham, from Florida are leading the services. Lee preaches and Doris plays the keyboard and sings. Other churches have been invited in to sing. The Sunday morning (at 9:00) that I attended almost 30 people from six different states were represented.

We have had limited success with the Handyman project. We have assisted three very needy families who were extremely grateful. BT Greene, Art Keener, Raymond Deitz, Charlie Daves are to be thanked for their work. We are in need of finances and volunteers to make the program effective.

Lyman Fisher deserves the Layman of the Year award. He has answered God's call to ministry. His ministry is Disaster Relief and he is making a difference in the lives of people. As Region 10 Brotherhood Disaster Coordinator, he has led teams to Florida, the Midwest in flood relief, and this year, he was responsible for trips to Albany, Georgia and Lexington, South Carolina. Several of you have volunteered for these mission trips and know what a blessing it is. So many have gone that it is not possible to mention all of them.

It was my privilege to accompany him to Lexington to help in the removal of debris caused by the devastating tornado. We helped some disabled elderly couple.

Lyman and his father-in-law, Rev. Cecil Frady, are included in the Baptist Men's Owner's Manual for their outstanding work in volunteer missions. Rev. Frady, former pastor at Tuckasegee Baptist Church, grows vegetables for the Children's Homes and the Retirement Homes. This is what missions is all

about!

Each year there are certain meetings that I attend that have to do with our larger Baptist family. I attended the regional Vacation Bible School Clinic, the Key Leadership Conference, and the Annual meeting of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

Also there are numerous Associational meetings that I attend here in the county. I serve on the Board of Trustees of Truett Baptist Camp and for the Southwestern Area Resort Ministry. I served a week as camp pastor at Truett camp. There were 10 professions of faith and more than 25 rededications that week.

I also serve as an Associate Chaplain for Harris Regional Hospital and on the board of United Christian Ministries. It is my privilege to be called upon from time to time by various groups because of my office as Director of Missions. Baptist are strong and influential in this area.

The Far Out Four and the Hanging Dog String Band sang twice this year. We preformed for the national meeting of the Stewardship Directors of the Southern Baptist Convention in Boone. We also sang for First Baptist Church in Asheville.

Brian Stephens and Norman Parris have stepped down this year as Youth and Discipleship Director. Norman has served well for a number of years. Brian led a group to New York and did many important things here with our youth. The Association owes them both a debt of gratitude and I hope many of you will speak a word of thanks to them.

Jesse Flake and Ray Houston are to be commended for their work as Treasurer and Clerk. Jesse contributes many volunteer hours in bookkeeping, check writing and delivering. We are blessed to have a man of his experience and caliber to serve us.

Betty Grant observed her third anniversary this past May 1. She has grown with the job and now is a first rate secretary. The finance committee has recognized her professionalism with a much needed raise being recommended that will bring her salary closer to the level of skills she possess and closer in line to what others make in similar positions.

Rev. Fred Lunsford led in a deacon's retreat here in the association. My thanks to Amy Hoyle and the ladies at East Sylva Baptist Church for preparing a delicious meal for us. The retreat was a spiritual high and God blessed it.

The annual Gardner-Webb ministry day went well here this year. Nine churches participated by giving young men of God who are called and are spending time studying in preparation for a life of service to have the opportunity to preach in our churches.

The Baptist State Convention Staff, led by Dr. Roy J. Smith, Jr. have been

to our Association and Region 10 three times to conduct "listening sessions" on how they can better serve Baptist Churches. We invited over 30 people here to talk with leaders from our convention during a three day period. Various follow up meetings, planning and strategy sessions, and times of prayer and inspiration have been held. We were one of three places in North Carolina that they came to do these type of meetings.

The Association did have one major setback this past year. The Wolf Creek Church voted to discontinue its relationship with the Association that had existed since before the turn of the century. Several volunteers from various churches went up on a local missions project to help them brick an addition to their church this summer. In both talking with church leaders and in official correspondence I was unable to learn of any problems. We grieve the loss of a valued member; but we wish them God speed as an Independent Church.

I am grateful for the prayers and financial support of the many listeners of the radio program. Although the Tuckaseigee baptist half-Hour is not officially linked with the Association, I do believe it is an excellent means of Bible teaching and promotion of events in the Association.

I am grateful to the WMU for their provision for the meal to celebrate the ministry of the pastor and his family during Pastor Appreciation Sunday. I am coordinating that event with Associational Emphasis Week with the hope that each church will recognize both their pastor and his importance as a key leader in the church and the Association.

Some of my most important work is done in confidential relationships with churches that are having problems. I have counseled with leaders and pastors and attended meetings by invitation of the leadership to assist in delicate situations.

I am very grateful and commend to you the officers, program leaders, committee members and others who volunteer your services and talents. I have high praise and great respect for your work. The Association, like the local church, is totally dependent upon volunteers to accomplish its tasks. Volunteers have contributed many hours and all of us owe them a debt of gratitude.

Our finances have been strong this year. After eight months into the budget year, we are exceeding our budget. It was this rationale that helped influenced the finance committee to recommend a budget increase. As you hope each member in your church will financially support your church, it is my prayer that each church in the association will financially support the Association.

Two important aspects of Associational life are strong. Our fellowship and cooperation among our churches is good. Churches are having joint services, attendance is good at meetings, and there is a good spirit in the churches. May God continue to bless us as we work together.

Our Senior Adult Program has been pretty busy this year. Our goal was to get a Senior Adult Choir started, which we did. We usually have 15 - 20 people present when we practice or go places to sing. We meet every fourth Sunday at 2:30 pm at the Baptist Center for practice.

We usually have 12 - 15 churches represented. My prayer is to get more churches involved in our singing. I would like to have every church in our Association represented if possible.

We have been to Skyland Rest Home several times to sing. We sang at East Fork Church on April 30. We had 21 present that night to sing. I was really thankful for that. East Fork Baptist Church gave us a donation that night to help pay for song books. We now have our new books. I am thankful for each one that sings with us, but I am especially thankful for Jean Jamison who plays the piano for us and Betty Fisher and Catherine Minear who are our song leaders.

We will be singing at Buff Creek Baptist Church the 5th Sunday night in October.

In November of 1993, we made a second trip to the Billy Graham Training Center (The Cove). We had 32 present for this trip.

In December of 1993 we had a Christmas party at the Baptist Center.

In February of 1994 we had a Valentine get together. We had 24 present for this meeting.

In May we had a Mother's Day fellowship and a salad luncheon.

On August 28, 1994, we had a covered dish dinner at 1:00 pm at the Baptist Center followed by the Senior Adult Choir practice.

We have a trip planned on October 17-20 to go to the Caswell Baptist Assembly. We will be leaving on Monday and coming back on Thursday.

I would like to thank the committee for all the help they have given me this year, John Reid, Betty Fisher, Kathleen Buchanan, but first and foremost the Lord for giving me health and strength to carry on. We are praying for a good year in 1994-1995.

STEWARDSHIP REPORT

WMU ANNUAL REPORT 1993 - 1994

Missions is the lifeblood of the Southern Baptist denomination and WMU helps to teach missions and helps to get churches involved in missions. This year's theme or emphasis "Serve in Christ's Name" challenged us to reach out and serve others and try to meet the needs of others in Christ's name.

Several activities were held throughout the year with this emphasis in mind. The Girls in Action had Mission Fun Day in October of 1993. A new GA organization was formed at the Speedwell Baptist Church. Three Baptist Young Women groups have organized in the past two years. The ladies in two of the groups graduated into Baptist Women and younger groups did not replace them. Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina

• o matter how much adults try to convince themselves otherwise, children suffer when parents divorce.

Amber suffered. Because she blamed her mother for

household turmoil, and because she was young and confused, Amber told her mother she hated her. She stopped communicating and became withdrawn. She chose wrong friends and attempted to take her own life.

In today's atmosphere, when divorce rocks as many marriages as it misses, thousands of children like Amber look for anchors. And in today's atmosphere, just as in the atmosphere of the 1880s, and every year since, Baptist Children's Homes provides that anchor for hundreds of children.

In 1992-93 BCH served 1,469 young people and their families. probably an alltime high.

Through services provided at 13 facilities statewide, BCH offered residential care, maternity care, a home for teenage mothers and their babies, therapeutic "I'm glad people support this place because there's a lot of kids who need it." – Amber

camping, model day care, emergency care and behavioral change.

Through the Cooperative Program, church budgets and the Thanksgiving Offering, Baptist churches provided about one-third of the \$11 million necessary to care for those children . Other revenue comes from payment for services on a sliding scale, foundations and corporations and individual gifts. A significant source of help comes from individuals who remember Baptist Children's Homes, and the children it serves, in their estate planning.

"I couldn't handle what was going on at home," Amber said, after a year in the intensive group process at Kennedy



Home. "I wanted a way out. I saw (suicide) as the only way. I had totally turned my back on God."

Under the tutelage of Kennedy Home Baptist Church's pastor, Amber has rededicated her life to the Lord and was baptized. She is now memorizing Scripture and doing devotions.

Between her renewed faith and the peer group process, Amber has begun to resolve the differences with her mother. When she graduates from Kennedy Home, she plans to live with her mother and sister.

"Just being able to talk through it with group and with staff helped make it better," Amber said. "They helped me understand mom may have moved out, but she never left me. She's always been supportive."

Working through problems at BCH involves identifying your problems, putting a name to them. That helps a child realize he/she is not a "problem child" but is a "child with problems."

"If I was alive without this place, I wouldn't be in a happy life," Amber said. "I'm really thankful there are places like this.

Amber's gratitude expresses the feelings of hundreds of children each year, and the staff who serves them. Many young people need BCH. Thankfully, many Baptist adults are committed to providing their needs, for Jesus' sake.

UR BAPTIST COLLEGE FAMILY



GARDNER-WEBB UNIVERSITY, founded as Boiling Springs High School in 1905 by the Kings Mountain and Sandy Run Associations, became a junior college in 1928. Officially recognized as an institution of the Baptist State Convention in 1946, Gardner-Webb moved to senior college status in 1971, and began to offer the Master of Arts degree in 1980. A School of Divinity was opened in 1993, and a Master of Business Administration program was begun the same year. Dr. M. Christopher White is president. The college is located in Boiling Springs.



WINGATE COLLEGE, begun as Wingate School of the Union Baptist Association in 1896, was transformed into a junior college in 1923. Support from the Baptist State Convention was first given in 1925. The present Convention institution status has continued since 1949. Wingate became a senior college in 1977 and began offering graduate work in 1985. A Master of Business Administration program was begun in 1993. Dr. Jerry E. McGee is president. The college is located in Wingate.



CAMPBELL UNIVERSITY, opened as Buies Creek Academy in 1887, was named Campbell College in 1926. Senior college work was begun in 1961, and in 1976 the School of Law was established. Graduate programs in education and business were added in 1977-78, and the name was changed to Campbell University in 1979. The university operates graduate Schools of Business, Pharmacy and Education. Dr. Norman A. Wiggins is president. The university is located in Buies Creek.

MEREDITH COLLEGE is named in honor of a North Carolina Baptist pioneer, Thomas Meredith. Founded in 1891 as Baptist Female University of Raleigh, the name was changed to Baptist University for Women in 1905. The present name was approved by legislative enactment in 1911. Offering degree programs exclusively for women, the college added the Master of Arts degree in education, business and music, and the Master of Business Administration degree in 1983. Dr. John E. Weems is president. The college is located in Raleigh.



MARS HILL COLLEGE, known first in 1856 as the French Broad Baptist Institute, changed its name to Mars Hill College in 1859 and to Mars Hill Junior College in 1922. With the beginning of its senior college programs in 1962, the name Mars Hill College once again became the official name. Located in the town of Mars Hill, near Asheville, its educational programs are offered in the setting of the Blue Ridge Mountains. Dr. Fred B. Bentley is president.



CHOWAN COLLEGE was the result of the dreams and labors of the Chowan Baptist Association and the education-conscious community of Murfreesboro. Begun as Chowan Female Institute in 1848, three other names were to follow: Chowan Female Collegiate Institute in 1851; Chowan Baptist Female Institute in 1868; and Chowan College in 1910. Long known for its strong preparation of students for senior college, Chowan became a four-year college in 1992 with the admission of juniors, class of 1994. Dr. Jerry F. Jackson is president.



WAKE FOREST UNIVERSITY, begun by the Baptist State Convention in 1834, was first known as Wake Forest Institute. Chartered as Wake Forest College in1838, the college was located in the town of Wake Forest until its move in 1956 to Winston-Salem. The Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, the School of Law, Bowman Gray School of Medicine, the Babcock School of Management, the School of Business and Accountancy, and Wake Forest College combine to form the University. The name was changed from college to university in 1967. Dr. Thomas K. Hearn, Jr. is the president.



The Council on Christian Higher Education, organized in 1943, is an integral part of the Convention's approved program of Christian higher education. The Council, which promotes understanding between the colleges and the churches and encourages cooperation and fellowship among the colleges, is one of the oldest educational cooperatives in America. Four executive directors have headed the Council's operations: Claude F. Gaddy, Harold Cole, Ben C. Fisher and T. Robert Mullinax.

Report to the Baptist Associations



Thank you for the interest, prayer and support as we have begun the Gardner-Webb University School of Divinity. Let me report our progress to this point by answering the questions we are most often asked.

What is a School of Divinity? Is it purely academic in contrast to the professional education offered by seminaries?

Our purpose is to provide professional education for Christian ministry in a local church. We also help student ministers shape their ministry through courses such as models for ministry, Christian spirituality and religion and personality. Each student meets regularly with a mentor/teacher. We also offer courses in professional areas such as preaching, teaching, worship leadership, church administration, organizational leadership, counseling, evangelism and pastoral care. You can see that we balance classical disciplines with knowledge of practical church leadership and continued personal spiritual growth.

The name "School of Divinity" is usually used when ministerial education is offered by a university. The word "seminary" usually describes a free-standing institution.

Why offer ministerial education in a university?

As a university affiliated with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention, we can provide an excellent ministerial education based on historic Baptist principles. From the beginning we can enjoy the resources of the university such as the programs for the deaf and/or blind students, and masters level studies in other areas such as psychology and business.

How many students do you have?

The School of Divinity is off to a good start. The first semester (Spring 1993) we enrolled 23 students. The fall and spring semesters of our first full year we had 51 students. Projections for enrollment for the fall indicate that we will continue to grow.

Who are your teachers?

Faculty members with long experience such as Dr. Donald E. Cook in New Testament, Dr. Roy B. Wyatt in Old Testament, and Dr. Robert Lamb in church administration form a core full-time faculty. Dr. Albert Meiburg directs Clinical Pastoral Education. Other faculty from the university and from churches and agencies along with missionaries in residence also teach.

How are you doing financially?


The strength of the university has helped us launch the School of Divinity. We are grateful for the Theological Education Grants the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina has made available. Many churches and individuals have helped us. The Christian Service Organization is engaged in a drive to secure additional scholarships.

Where do you stand theologically?

NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC. ANNUAL REPORT TO BAPTIST ASSOCIATIONS OF NORTH CAROLINA June, 1994




With the 75th anniversary of the chartering of the N. C. Baptist Foundation approaching, it is exciting to reflect on the fulfillment of dreams of the founding fathers. The prayerful deliberation that led to the vote in the 1919 Baptist State Convention meeting for the beginning of "a trust agency" envisioned a viable entity which would promote and manage funds given by individuals for perpetual support of several struggling institutions and the mission programs at the heart of this missionary minded denomination.

As of December 31, 1993, the Foundation held \$45,878,748 under management. In 1993, \$1,243,217 was distributed to Baptist work and \$1,196,748 was distributed to individuals for a total income distribution of \$2,439,965.

The income distributions for the entire 74 year history of the N. C. Baptist Foundation totals: \$7,009,154 income paid to individuals and \$10,011,893 to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$17,021,047.

In 1993, the staff of the Foundation consisted of seven full time employees and two persons who provided part-time service in accounting and legal services. In May of 1994, Rev. Coy H. Jeans, Jr. was employed by the Foundation Board as Western Area Manager of Trust and Endowment Development. Rev. Jeans will serve individuals in western North Carolina through estate stewardship planning to better provide for families and Christian endeavors. He will also work very closely with Associations and churches in We encourage western North Carolina the area. Baptists to contact Rev. Jeans at his office in Marion at 704-652-9548. Founded in 1922, Baptist Hospital is a missionary enterprise of the Baptist churches of North Carolina. The essence of our purpose is to carry out a ministry of healing as taught by Jesus Christ. We remain as fully committed to this mission as were our founding fathers. In the midst of changing health-care norms, we have not, nor will we, deviate from this mission. The following paragraphs report, not only basic facts, but various results of how we have sought in the last year to remain true to our heritage while providing quality health care at affordable prices.

PROVIDERS AND RECIPIENTS OF HEALING

Our Hospital healing team now consists of 5,777 employees. The Medical Center (North Carolina Baptist Hospital and Bowman Gray School of Medicine) personnel total employment is fast approaching 9,000 people making us the second largest employer in Forsyth County. In our 806-bed facility, we had 23,545 inpatient admissions during our fiscal year 1993-94. Our Outpatient Department, physicians' clinics, and other related departments received 523,672 patient visits.

DEPARTMENT OF PASTORAL CARE

Our chaplaincy division joins with our health-care professionals to provide spiritual and emotional healing. With 15 to 35 chaplains present at various times, 58,747 ministries were provided to patients, families, staff and groups. Mission dollars from the Cooperative Program enabled this ministry to be carried out.

The Center for Congregational Health, in its second year of ministry as a part of our Department of Pastoral Care, continues to expand and strengthen. To date thru 1993, 40 ministers have completed intentional interim training and 29 are in training. The number of churches calling intentional interim pastors continues to increase. The training of consultants for conflicted churches and leadership training for young ministers were both begun.

The Pastoral Counseling Division now operates 12 counseling centers across the state. These centers provided 26,716 hours, a five percent increase over the previous year.

In December 1994, Dr. Dewey Hobbs will retire as Director of the Department of Pastoral Care. His eleven years of leadership and ministry have brought quality and expansion in every facet of the department.

- We are one of only 17 hospitals nationally with a "AA" bond credit rating.
- Averaging the last two years and the projection for 1994, the Consumer Price Index will average 2.8% and the Medical CPI for hospitals will average 8.9%. Baptist Hospital rate increases for the same period will average 1.8%, under both the above-mentioned indexes.

1EETING THE CHALLENGES OF THE FUTURE

The health care environment is and will continued to be hanging. Baptist Hospital is proactively facing these changes n a daily basis. Below are listed several visions which have recently been or will soon be realized.

ursing Center at Oak Summit

Opened in July 1993 this 170-bed facility offers four levels f care. It is also one of only a few nursing centers in North arolina that provides care for ventilator-dependent patients.

mergency Department/Dietary Building

Progressing toward a late 1995 opening, this facility will exnand our ED capacity to 70,000 visits annually. It will also house iree floors of patient private rooms, our Pharmacy Department, a new kitchen and 900-seat cafeteria, and a 35-bed Day Hospital.

. Paul Sticht Center on Aging and Rehabilitation

This building will usher in a new era in rehabilitation at our fedical Center. Housing a total of 128 beds, it will contain a geriatric day hospital which will aid the transition from hospital to home, inpatient rehabilitation nursing units, a psychiatric loor, geriatric research and education. Completion is targeted for 1996.

It home health care

Our Home Health Solutions provides our local region with marenteral nutrition and intravenous antibiotic therapy, chemotherapy and pain management. Home Health Specialists provides nursing care, personal care and physical and occupational therapy.

Center for Research on Human Nutrition and Chronic Disease Prevention

Our continued partnership with Bowman Gray School of Medicine enables our Medical Center to provide the highest quality of research, education, and patient care. Quoting Dean Richard Janeway, "We are trying to prevent the major killers such as cancer, strokes, and heart attacks. With this facility we'll be able to transfer the information straight to the patient's bedside."

COMMUNITY HOSPITAL ASSISTANCE

Developing relationships with community hospitals such as Stokes Reynolds in Danbury and Hoots Hospital in Yadkinville enables us to assist them in lowering costs as well as providing quality hospital and outpatient care. We anticipate expanding this endeavor to include other smaller, outlying hospitals. We also have significant affiliate relationships with hospitals in Wilkesboro, Lexington, and Mt. Airy and are in the process of developing other affiliate relationships.

QUALCHOICE OF NORTH CAROLINA

Joining with BGSM and Wake Forest University, Baptist Hospital has developed a managed care plan. Our design is one which offers affordable quality health care while providing the insured freedom of choice. This plan will be opened for public enrollment beginning January 1, 1995.

A CLOSING WORD

We continue to esteem our heritage, celebrate our current capabilities, and strive to position ourselves for the future. Your partnership, prayers, and utilization of our services inspires our dedication to our mission. We are grateful to God and to the North Carolina Baptist family.

Making Life for Older Adults... **The Best of Times**

As a result of the wonderful support given by North Carolina Baptists, 1994 will be remembered as one of the finest years in the 43 year history of Baptist Retirement Homes. The following are some highlights from the year:

> In recognition of its commitment to the spiritual well-being of the residents that it serves, Baptist Retirement Homes hired W. Paul Riggs to serve as Chaplain to the residents of the Prince Nursing Care Center in Winston-Salem and the Rickman Nursing Care Center in Asheville.

Reaffirming its commitment to the idea that retirement should be a. "step-up" for Older Adults, the renovation of the Taylor House in Albemarle was completed and renovation of the Hamilton Baptist Home in Martin County was begun. When the renovation of the Hamilton Baptist Home is completed in mid-1995, all of the facilities operated by the Baptist Retirement Homes will be "State-ofthe-Art."

In recognition of the changing profile of institutionalized Older Adults (47% of the "oldest old" in North Carolina suffer from some form of dementia), a special small group approach to the care for institutionalized Older Adults suffering from dementia was instituted at the Prince Nursing Care Center in Winston-Salem. Through the implementation of this program, Baptist Retirement Homes once again demonstrated its commitment to the principle that everyone has the right to age with dignity and to enjoy a certain quality of life throughout the aging process.

In an effort to provide Older Adults with affordable care, a sub-acute unit was developed at the Prince Nursing Care Center in Winston-Salem . . . a unit where frail Older Adults can receive such treatments as IV therapy, infusion, wound care, and stroke and bone fracture rehabilitation outside of a hospital setting.

In response to the need to provide quality long-term care services to the ever growing number of frail Baptist Older Adults, Baptist Retirement Homes expanded its nursing services in 1994 to include an additional 100 Older Adults (80% of that group being classified as the poor elderly . . . men and women who lack sufficient financial resources to pay for the institutional services they receive).

Thank you North Carolina Baptists for helping us make life for Older Adults . . . The Best of Times!

In order to save churches large amounts of money and to increase the readership of the <u>Recorder</u>, Church News Service (CNS) was launched in 1990. Usually, for less than what it costs to produce the church newsletter, CNS gives the entire Baptist communication package to each family in the congregation. Anticipated increases in mailing costs makes CNS a greater value in 1995 than even when it was started in 1990.

One sure way to conquer problems and overcome the barriers to effective witness and ministry is to have the facts, know the issues and be adequately informed. ANNUAL REPORT 1993-94 Jackson County Gideon Camp, for Inclusion in The Book of Reports

The Gideon Organization, known as the Gideons International, is composed of over 124,000 Christian professional and business men in 162 countries. The Auxiliary is numbers of over 70,000 women, (wives and widows of Gideons). With the help of the local churches here and throughout the 162 countries, The Gideons are placing an average of one million Scriptures every ten days. Funding to purchase the Scriptures comes from three main sources: 1) Local church love offerings; 2) Memorial Bible donations; 3) The Faith Fund, (donations by individual Gideon members). All monies donated to the Gideons go to purchase Scriptures; administrative costs of the organization are paid by the individual members in the form of annual dues.

The Jackson County Camp, one of **5,275 local camps**, was started in 1982. The present membership numbers **24 Gideons and 17 Auxiliary.** It has been the Camp's pleasure to share a Gideon report in numerous churches in Jackson County this past year. A total of **2,654 Scriptures** were distributed during the year and Jackson County Camp received **\$13,820** from Christians of Jackson County for the purchase of Scriptures.

John 15:16 tells us ". . .go and bring forth fruit".

In April 1989, Gideons from Jackson County, and other near by Camps, were on the campus of Western Carolina University distributing Testaments. One Gideon, Bob Dennis, was standing in the center of the street in a cross walk when a young lady approached. He asked her if she would like one of the Testaments as he offered her one. She readily accepted it and started away when Bob called after her, "are you acquainted with the author of that book?"

She returned to him and after a moment said, "No, and all my life I've wanted someone to introduce me to Him." They quickly stepped over to the sidewalk and in a few minutes, utilizing the helps in the Testament, she was praying a sinners prayer of repentence and accepting Christ as her Savior!

This "fruit of another soul" was made possible only because faithful church members gave to purchase the Testament. A faithful Gideon used the Testament and personally witnessed. The Holy Spirit worked through God's Holy Word. All had a part in one coming to Christ. God' Word tells us in *Isalah 55:11 "So shall my word be that goeth forth out of my mouth; It shall not return unto me vold, but it shall accomplish that which I please, and It shall prosper in the thing whereto I sent It"*.

Dear Tuckaseigee Baptists,

You hold in your hands a spiritual document. This is a plan to guide the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association in missions and ministry for 1995. What we do with the money entrusted to us by churches and individuals is spiritual, not financial. Ultimately, we will answer to the Lord as to whether our stewardship was acceptable or not. We must not be extravagant or excessive, but we must not fail to have vision or faith either. The Budget and Finance Committee has tried to keep all these principles in mind as we labored over this budget. Mainly, we have sought to remember that, behind each figure in these pages, are people; people who know the Lord, people who need to know the Lord, and people who need the Lord's help through Tuckaseigee Baptists. Remember these guiding principles as you and your church consider your support for this plan.

First, there are some items that may need explanation, in order for everyone to have a clear understanding of budgeted moneys. A new heading is being introduced this year, "Missions Outreach." This will include ministries where the Association is reaching out in some way to our larger community. In this section there are two new line items, Disaster Relief and Handyman Ministry. These forms of outreach have been supported by our churches and needed by our people. They will be funded from our savings this year and will then be incorporated as regular line items in 1996.

Next, section two, Organizational Ministries, with the exception of one or two categories, has no large increases or decreases. Conference and Convention was reduced at the request of our Director of Missions. Senior Adults was increased due to the great interest being shown in that area. All other items were budgeted according to the amount spent to date and/or anticipated need. These same guidelines were applied to section three, Property and Support Ministries and section four Equipping Ministries. One line item has been renamed and moved from section five, Personnel Ministries, to section three, Organizational Ministries. Director's Auto has been labeled "Ministry Expense Reimbursement." Instead of a designated amount paid to our Director of Missions for expenses incurred in the performance of his duties, he will now be reimbursed for actual money paid out by him. This will include travel, meals, literature, etc. needed by him as Director of Missions. This policy is followed by many churches.

Under section five, Personnel Ministries a salary increase was included for secretary. A random survey found that our Associational Secretary was woefully underpaid when compared to other church secretaries. Realizing that scripture teaches that laborers are worthy of their hire, a \$975 raise was put in as a first step. The secretary's work is a skilled position, and additional increases will be needed in the future to bring this salary in line. The Director's Package was adjusted by \$1016 or 4%. This represents a cost-of-living increase (roughly 3% for 1994) plus 1%.

In section six, Miscellaneous, the line for Associational Minutes had to be increased by \$750. This was necessary due to the high costs charged by printers for printing a relatively small number of books. This brings the total 1995 budget to \$47,148, from \$43,776 in 1994, for an increase of \$3372 or 7.7%. Considering that significant increases were made in one or two items where there was no choice (i.e. secretary's salary and Associational Minutes) the Budget and Finance Committee was well pleased with our final numbers. Consider this: if churches that currently contribute to our budget will increase their support by only \$10 per month, our 1995 budget will be met. What could we do in our county if more of our churches included Tuckaseigee Baptist Association in their budgets? What if our present contributors increased their giving by \$500 to \$1000 per year? What would happen if churches contributed a percentage of their receipts, say 3% to 5%, instead of a fixed dollar amount? (Most churches follow this pattern in regard to other mission programs, such as 10% for the Cooperative Program) Whatever our method or amount, let us all give and support the mission of Tuckaseigee Baptists.
