CHURCH COVENANT.

Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God, to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith, havingbeen babtized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost. we do now in the presence of God angels, and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into covenant with one another as one body in Christ. We engage, therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love, to strive for the advancement of this church in knowledge, holiness, and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the church, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the Gospel through all nations. We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion, to religiously educate our children, to. seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances, to walk circumspectly in the world, to be just in our dealings. faithful, in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment: to avoid all talking, backbiting, and excessive anger, to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage: and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of our Saviour.

We further engage to watch over one another in Frotherly love. to remember each other in prayer, to aid each other in sickness or distress, to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling snd courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offence, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of these rules of our Saviour to secure it without delay.

We moreover engage that when we remove from this place, we will, as soon as possible, unite with some other church, where we can carry out the spirit of our Covenant and principles of God's Word.

CONSTITUTION.

ARTICLE 1.—This Association shall be donominated and known as the EASTERN ASSOCIATION.

ART. 2.—The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's kingdom among men; and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.

ART. 3.—This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers who are members or pastors of churches of this body, and three delegates from each church chosen from her membership, assembled in conference.

ART. 4.— The delegates from each church shall bear a Letter certifying their appointment and communicating information relativo to the state of the church: Provided, however, that when any church has prepared a Letter, and through inadvertence the Letter fails to be presented, her delegates may be received without its presentation.

ART. 5.—The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk, and Treasurer, who shall be chosen annually from among its members, by ballot, by majority of its members voting, and continue in office until their successors are elected.

ART. 6.—It shall be the duty of the Moderator to enforce an observance of the Constitution, preserve order, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion on any question under discussion after others have spoken, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

ART. 7.—It shall be the business of the Clerk to record the proceedings of each annual session, and superintend their printing and distribution among the churches.

ART. 8.—It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches, or collected during the session of this body, and distribute the same as ordered by the Association. He shall also make to the Association an annual report of the condition of the treasury.

ART. 9.—The Association shall appoint an Executive Committee of five members, who shall co-operate with the State Board so far as practicable in the mission work within our bounds, and during the interval between the sessions of this body, take such steps as they may deem advisable for the advancement of the same, making annual reports of their work to the Association, which report, together with that on State Missions, shall be the first business of the second day of the session. Further, that our missionaries shall report their work quarterly to the Executive Committee in order that said Committee shall be prepared to make full report of their work to this body.

ART. 10.—The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of the churches which neglect to observe Gospel order.

ART. 11.—The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats, and extend to them the privilege of the body, except that of voting.

ART. 12. —The Annual session of this Association shall commence on Tuesday after the first Lord's Day in October, at such place as may be chosen.

ART. 13. -By appointment of the Association, there shall be an Introductory Sermon of a denominational character, and a Missionary Sermon.

ART. 14.—This Constitution may be amended at any annual session, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

RULES OF ORDER.

1.-On the meeting of the Association, the Moderator of the preceeding session shall preside until his successor is known. In case of his absence a Chairman pro te:n shall be elected.

2.-Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercises to be opened by whomsoever the presiding officer may name.

3.-At each daily session, and previous to proceeding to business, the names of the delegates shall be called, and the proceedings of the

previous daily session read. 4.-The members shall observe towards the officers and each other

that courtesy which becomes Christians. 5 - Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the presid-

ing officer. He shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid personalities.

6.-No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without permission.

7. - All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer, before discussion.

8.-No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion.

9.-When a question is under discussion no motion or proposition

shall be received, except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time; which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they are stated.

10.-After a motion has been decided any member having voted in

the majority may move a reconsideration. 11.—No member shall absent himself during the session of the

Association without permission of the presiding officer, and no one shall take final leave of absence without the permission of the Association. and if any shall do so, their absence shall be noted in the Minutes.

12.-All questions except such as relate to the Constitution shall be decided by a majority of votes. .

13.-The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects

shall be admitted to consideration. 14.-The Rules of Order may be altered and amended at any session of the Association, by a majority vote,

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Since the last meeting of this body, 19 of our churches, located in New Hanover, Pender and Onslow Counties, were dimissed by letter and formed the Wilmington Association. So our former "Onslow Field" is no longer a part of our territory. The only Missionary we have had employed this year, is Rev. N. A. Shelly, who has labored principally in the Eastern part of Duplin, Co. He reports his work for the past year as follows: Traveled 1.500 miles preached 175 times. babtized 9, organized one church Alum Springs." He also obtained a deed for church lot near old "Muddy Creek," and will in a short while begin to build a house of worship at that point. He reports having collected on field abont one hundred dollars. In addition to maintaining the work at the points already occupied, there are other new points of great importance opening up, that we should help, at once. During the past year. we had only \$75 appropriated by State Board of Missions available for the Missionary work within our bounds, we recommend that in addi tion to pledges and contributions we make to State Missions, we restore the old order of pledging for Associational Missions at this session, and annually hereafter.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES OF WARSAW HIGH SCHOOL.

We have been fortunate in securing the services of Mr. M. A. Wooten, an experienced Educator, to take charge of our school and he, with three lady assistants, is giving us a good school. Up to the present 84 pupils have been enrolled and we confidently expect an hundred pupils before Christmas.

During the past year we have collected \$20.00 for rent of vacant lot, and used the same in repairing the building.

Our "Ladies Aid Society" headed by Miss Etty Murray, is raisingan educational fund, to buy other property for school purposes that will supply the want, so much felt, of providing a home for teacher and boarding pupils. When we have added this building to our present school building, we can compete with other schools of like grade, in cheapness of board and incidental expenses.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Ever since the battle of Alamance, North Carolina has been known as the plant bed of the South. There has been a continuous stream of imigration from every county in our borders ever since the defeat of the Regulators, until now there is scarcely any family in any section that is not represented by one or more of its members in every State of the Union and very largely represented in every section of the South, Southwest and Northwest.

Home Missions therefore appeals to us peculiarly as missions to our own children and kindred at home and abroad, and ought to be as dear to our hearts as State Missions, for it is only an enlargement of our own State Mission work.

The Home Board is now co-operating with the State Boards of Alabama, Arkansas. Florida. Georgia, Indian Territory, Oklahoma, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland. Missouri, Mississippi, North Carolina, Texas and Virginia, in part or the whole of their work.

Last year its increase in contributions for its regular work amounted to over \$12,000. It expended in this State \$5,300, and employed 40 missionaries who reported 2.080 weeks of labor and supplied 45 churches and stations. We are glad to note the increasing interest among us in the work of this Board.

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REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

Our Orphanage located at Thomasville is one of if not the most important institutions owned by the Baptists of North Carolina because its existence growth and development, depends upon, nay even lives, amidst and upon the prayers and tears of God's people, which makes the orphanage and orphanage supporter so interdependent one upon the other that we are constrained to believe that the orphanage is indespensible in a measure to the spirit development of our churches. While we rejoice and praise God for the wisdom and economy of its managers, which has enabled them to take care of so many little ones bereft of parental care and protection, yet we regret to know that there are so many more asking for admittance and are compelled to be refused on account of the small contributions of our churches. We believe there 1000 churches in the State which could support an orphan without any sacrifice of rare self de-

Larkins a cash collection was taken for the Orphanage, amounting to \$7.40. The report was then adopted. The Committee on Digest report. N. B. Cobb read the report.

REPORT ON DIGEST OF CHURCH LETTERS.

Your Committee find that 30 Churches are represented by letter at this session, 6 of which, namely Bear Branch, Teachey's, Well's Chapel. Providence, Mt. Holly and Catherine Lake have just been dismissed to join the Wilmington Association. Faisons has been recognized and reported both by letter and delegate. A new Church has been organized at Alum Springs near the old Church known as Antioch with 6 members. The total amount of contributions of these 30 Churches, exclusive of Pastors salaries, is \$4,095.60. We find that 18 of these Churches report a total gain over last year of \$2,034.89, while 12 others report a total loss of \$163.21, resulting in a total gain for the whole of \$1871.69. Sixteen report 137 baptisms, the others none. Fifteen report a loss in membership of 203, while eight report a net gain of 120. The total membership of the 30 Churches is 3,384, a net loss from last year of 83 members.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We are able to report about 1,100 Sunday Schools out of 1,640 Baptist Churches in North Carolina. Of the entire population only about 40 per cent attend Sunday School of any kind. We are glad, however, to report 85 per cent of all the baptisms as coming from this 40 per cent of Sunday School attendants. As a people we have only one Book—the Bible. We should teach it to our children. We are proud of our Sunday School publications at Nashville and Philadelphia. There is no excuse for not using more of our Sunday School literature. We need more thoroughly trained teachers, hence your Committee would recommend that brother T. N. Johnson be invited to visit us this year with this in view. Your Committee would further recommend that we use the Convention Series published at Nashville, purchased at the Book Store, Raleigh, N. C. That our Churches take one collection a year for the support of our general Sunday School work; and that all of our Sunday Schools give one collection a month to the support of our Thomasville Orphanage.

Alderman offered a substitute to the effect that the Trustees make a deed of the property to the Warsaw Church on condition that the Church raise double the value of the present property to better repair and equip the school. J. L. Albritton moved to table both resolutions, which was ordered.

On motion of J. L. Albritton the Churches were called for pledges. See table.

Cash collection reported taken at the stand after the Missionary sermon \$2.02 for Foreign Missions.

J. L. Albritton moved a vote of thanks to the Hallsville Church and community for the splendid entertainment of the Association. Passed by a rising vote.

N. B. Cobb offered the following resolution, which passed :

Moved that the Treasurer be instructed to forward one fourth of the funds sent up for ministerial education to P. Smith, Treasurer of Students Aid Fund of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, at Louisville, Ky.

By motion of S. M. Carlton the Treasurer was instructed to pay out the money in his hands as indicated in report of Finance Committee.

J. N. Tolar submitted and read report on Woman's Work.

WOMAN'S WORK.

"The organized work of women and children is one of the greatest chapters in the new Acts of the Apostles," is the uttered conviction of a modern missionary enthusiast. No part of our work has had more seri-

man.

ous difficulties to overcome or disastrous dangers to avoid than our women's work. In none has the guiding and over ruling wisdom of the Master been more apparent. Fourteen years of patient self-sacrificing toil have now put it where it deserves our hearty thanks and hearty commendation. More and more does it deserve to be remembered, that the basis of the work, viz: carrying into effect the recommendations of the three Boards, has been rightly adhered to, and every wish of these at the Convention has been their immediate pleasure. No change has been made in their methods. Their Christmas offerings for Foreign Missions, the work of prayer and self-denial for Home Missions, Children's Day for the Bible Fund of the Sunday School Board have met with larger responses in the Churches and Sunday Schools. Their Home Department for the reaching of those who do not or cannot attend missionary meetings or have no meetings to attend, is increasing its influence and gives bright prospects of broader usefulness Their relations with the organized work of colored women, now two years old, have been made more cordial and helpful. Thus our sisters are looking forward and striving toward the day when all the women and children of our Convention shall be a part of the agency toward the fulfillment of the great commission. The cash receipts throughout the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention for the year closing last May have been \$54,776 23, an increase of \$1,803.25 over last year, divided as follows: To the Foreign Board \$34,787.17; to the Home Board \$19,510 48; to the Sunday School Board \$487.87; to the Church Building Loan Fund \$1,000. In addition 495 boxes, valued at \$33,350, have been sent to such missionaries of the Home Board and Colporters as have been suggested to them by the State Secretaries. All of this work has been done at the small cost of \$30,141, furnished proportionately by the three Boards. In their ardent desire to hasten the day when our Lord shall see of the travel of His soul and be satisfied, we offer to them hearty sympathy and bid for them a generous consideration.

The Women's Work of our State Convention is a part of the work of the Southern Convention and has headquarters at Raleigh under the supervision of Miss Fannie E. Heck. We commend this work to all of the sisters in the State and urge them to actively identify themselves with this great work at once. We urge upon the sisters of this Association more general and active sympathy in this movement blessed of God so much in recent years and filled with such bright promise for the future.
