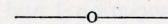

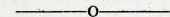

### On W. M. U.

It is with joy and gratitude that the report of the year's work of the W. M. U. is submitted and each woman gives thankful praises to our heavenly Father and Jesus our Saviour with humble hearts for the accomplishments. As we glance over the figures that show in a measure what has been accomplished we are grateful for the opportunities of serving God and unto him render thanks for any attainments. Our stewardship report was very encouraging, having reported a ten per cent increase in tithers and contributions to the Cooperative Program which was meeting the standard of excellence. We have had a successful mission study year, in each organization one book was had while five churches met the requirements for the standard and in one every member took an extra mission book. In these studies we endeavored to give our women and young people a vision of our world, its lands and its people with their needs spiritual. Our community missions report was very gratifying. We feel that this work is one of the best fields of service for Christ at our very doors. During the year there was a noticeable increase in the number of subscriptions to our periodicals and a large percentage of Seasons of Prayer.

We reached our goals for the Cooperative Program of \$1,293.63 and our special offerings of \$819.30 of the organizations. While our secretary reports contributions for divisional expenses, Burney gifts, missionary expenses and program material.

Two outstanding meetings were held. Sylva Church was hostess to planning meeting in January. Attendance was poor due to deplorable weather conditions. Yet this was a glorious day. Cullowhee was hostess to our annual meeting in June. Our guest speakers were our beloved field worker, Mrs. John Waycaster, and Miss Willie K. Baldwin who inspired us to want to serve the Lord Christ more efficiently through our W. M. U. Mission program.

The superintendent attended the executive council meeting in Raleigh and the W.M.U. convention in Greensboro which was a blessed privilege to represent the women of this Association. I thank you.

We are very thankful for the efficient services rendered by Mrs.

D. G. Bryson for more than ten years in the capacity of stewardship chairman. She has been faithful in her reports.

Our Association bow our heads in grateful memory of the home-going of Mrs. W. N. Cook who served faithfully as superintendent of our Association for eight years. She carried on this great work nobly and we shall cherish the memory of it until we too shall go beyond.

We welcome Mrs. John N. Crawford as the new superintendent of our Association.

Another year has come to a close. Another year in which we have been blest as "Laborers together with God" for the "Furtherance of the Gospel." We are grateful to Him for His manifold blessings and look forward to even greater service.

### On Sunday School

In the Tuckaseigee Association we have about 43 Sunday schools that run the full year. That would require 43 general superintendents and an average of 10 teachers to the school, which would mean 473 officers.

We have around 7,075 church memberships. Each officer and teacher would have the responsibility of 140 pupils. Either our number of officers and teachers is not enough or our church membership is not going to Sunday school. More than half of our church membership does not attend Sunday school. These figures are startling.

Our Associational Sunday school convention has been meeting every month with an average of seven churches represented. The meeting of our associational convention has been held in the communities where it was most convenient to most churches.

The above statements well show that we need more interest in this work. We recommend that each church enlist its membership and unenlisted people and secure a teacher force adequate for their needs. I further recommend that all of us take more interest in our Associational meetings and equip our churches for better service.

### On Christian Education

Christian education is an education obtained in schools and colleges that are financed and controlled by the church, however, much of the finance may come from tuitions and sources outside the church.

The church schools and colleges are older than the public school system. It has been necessary to charge tuitions in our Christian schools and for this reason the public school system supported by taxation has largely taken the place of the denominational schools.

The church schools are free to teach the Bible and religious doctrine while state schools are not allowed to teach the religious belief of any denomination. therefore, our boys and girls who attend the public schools are missing the blessings that come with a Christian education.

The world would not be in the uneasy condition that it is today had the leaders of all the different countries been educated in Christian institutions.

The fear and anxiety that exist in the world today can be relieved only by Christ through leaders who have been taught to love their fellowmen. This must be done through Christian training.

Let us go back to the church schools as the greatest assurance that we shall have more men and women trained for leaders in carrying on Christ's work in a time when there is so much to be done.

North Carolina Baptist have several Christian institutions including Gardner-Webb, Campbell, Meredith, Mars Hill, Wingate and Wake Forest.

We as Baptist should do all possible to support these institutions that we may be better prepared to give our boys and girls the kind of education that will enable them to serve God and man in a more perfect manner.

There is possibly more literature published on our Sunday School work than any other phase of our church work. This is as it should be, because our Sunday School is the teaching agency of Christ. Aside from our regular quarterlies, there is literature available for every department or class, for every officer or teacher and for the superintendent. Any Sunday school officer or teacher will be a better officer or teacher if supplied with the proper literature to help them in their studies.

There are also helps available for every other department of our church work. The B.T.U., the W. M. S., Young People's organizations, church libraries and the extension department.

To keep us informed on the happenings in our State organization and orphanages, we have the Biblical Recorder and Charity and Children. Every Baptist in North Carolina should receive these papers.

### On North Carolina Baptist Hospital

Our North Carolina Baptist Hospital at Winston-Salem ministers to the sick from all parts of North Carolina. It is our Good Samaritan in the name of the Great Physician, to those who suffer and do not have sufficient money to pay the large cost of the best medical care.

From among those of limited means 26,000 visits were made to the Out-Patient Department for examination, diagnosis and treatment last year. There will be 35,000 visits this year. This is one of the most important services of our Hospital and it is being enlarged as rapidly as possible.

Of this large number coming to the Out-Patient Department this year, there is room for only about one-fourth of them to be treated



in the Hospital as bed patients. Plans are being made to build a new enlarged hospital. This will be located on a beautiful 100-acre tract in Winston-Salem which has been given for this purpose. It is hoped that the money needed for the enlargement will come speedily so that space may be provided for many sick people for whom there is not room now.

As the services of our Hospital have grown, the Mother's Day offerings from our churches likewise have grown. These offerings are used wholly to help pay the cost of caring for those who receive this ministry and do not have the money to pay the total cost themselves. In order to provide such help for as many as possible, our Hospital adds to the Mother's Day offerings all the funds it can get for this purpose from the welfare agencies of the state and counties, the Duke Endowment, contributions from individuals, and from any other available source. The needs and the calls for help are still far beyond the means of our Hospital to supply, however. We hope the Mother's Day offerings will continue to grow in our Association in order that our Baptist Hospital may provide more service for more people who are sick and have little in worldly goods.

Our Baptist Hospital and Bowman Gray School of Wake Forest College provide training for young women and young men who are called into the fields of nursing and medicine. With all the facilities available in a great hospital and medical school such as we have, there is provided a quality of training which is not available in the average institution. A number of those now in training there are preparing for medical mission work. We urge fine young men and women from our Baptist churches who are interested in these important fields of service to consider going there for their training.

The Department of Religion in our Baptist Hospital ministers to the spiritual life of the institution. It provides a chaplain service which seeks to carry a Christian ministry to the patients, especially to those with particular spiritual needs. It provides a religious program among the students, seeking to throw about them influences and encouragements which will help establish Christian faith and promote spiritual growth. It offers courses in pastoral counselling for pastors and ministerial students, designed to prepare the pastor better to minister to his people in their personal needs and problems. This department serves as a link between our hospital and our churches and people when we have needs and problems in relation to the hospital.

North Carolina Baptists have developed in their hospital an outstanding center. It is for His ministry to those with little money that

we appeal to the churches of our Association to give generously on Mother's Day.

Christian Missions is the christian going forth, sent by Christ, as He was sent by the Father, to carry on the great wide world task of God's redeeming purpose in salvation through Christ. The key position for all this effort must be at home. We must not only enlist recruits to carry on this great work of the conquest of the world for Christ, but we must train our people in the great need for support of our work for missions.

Home missions, in former years, largely meant expansion. The churches on the frontiers were helped. The frontiers change but the tasks grow and remain. In the past few years the current of life in our southland has given us new frontiers and new mission tasks. All over the south, new industrial centers are springing up; along the gulf coasts the trucking industries, where one may find all nationalities who do not know our Christ; the oil fields of Louisiana, Oklahoma and Texas, where vice rules unashamed, where little children grow up without church or school, where a minister is so much needed; in the mining camps where the gospel is never preached. All of these developments create a new mission problem and, shall I add, a new opportunity and a new task. With this industrial growth has come and will continue to come multitudes of people of every sort, thought and character, to live in our midst. They know not our Savior. What is our mission? Our religious development has not kept pace with our material growth. In 1947 we had 1006 workers to minister to these people in all our southland—286 of these were only summer workers. This is a number far too small for so great an opportunity. Home missions is the key to the task. "As my Father has sent me, even so send I you."

### On Foreign Mission

When our Southern Baptist Convention, in session in Memphis in May of this year, came to consider Foreign Missions—the question was “Mark Time, Retreat or Advance.” Some of the disturbed areas of the world seemed to call for retreat. Our Missionaries staying on the fields in many places in the Near East, China and Japan, are in serious danger. The ever-increasing need for capital for our agencies at home, seem to call that we stand still. The question with many is, “How can we provide these millions for home expenses, and at the same time provide for an Advance Program of world Missions?” But our Savior’s Command, “Go ye into all the world”; into a broken, lost and needy world, calls loudly and clearly that we advance and for this our Southern Baptist Board is planning. Can we fail to answer that call? We have provided funds for partial restoration of destroyed properties and equipment. We have enlarged the borders of our efforts. Where in 1945 we had work in seventeen (17) countries, in 1947 we are aiding Baptist Churches in twenty-five (25) separate nations in different areas around the world. We have increased our staff of missionaries from 462 in 1943 to 625 at the end of 1947. Seventy-six (76) of these were appointed in 1947, but this gain in our number of workers is all too small when we remember the great needs of our world today.

The Board has in preparation a world-wide program for Advance in 1949 and the years immediately following. “Six million Southern Baptist cannot continue to answer the worlds call, with 600 missionaries and an average per capita gift of seventy cents (.70) a year.” “Bring ye all the tithes into the storehouse.” The God in whom we believe, the faith which we proclaim, and the needy world, all call for “Advance”. May we say with Livingstone, “Anywhere provided it is forward.”

### On State Mission

North Carolina is indeed a mission field white unto harvest, as are all the other eighteen states and the District of Columbia in our Southern Baptist Convention. State Missions is a part of the world program of MISSIONS. Just as the great Atlantic and Pacific oceans are kept flowing by the contribution the little spring or stream at the head of the mountain makes so are state, home, and foreign missions kept by the local churches of the state.

In 1947 there were 2,781 Baptist churches with a total membership of 622,426 reported in North Carolina. If one were to visit two churches each Sunday it would take almost 30 years to get around. This same year \$14,000,000 were brought into the treasuries of these churches but \$11,000,000 of this was spent in its own churches. Less than one-fifth was spent for missions. ARE WE MISSIONARY-MINDED?

Our state missions program seeks to render service to all types of work that the Master taught us to carry on, such as teaching, preaching, and healing. In each of the nineteen states and District of Columbia included in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention through the State Mission Board, churches are aided in securing proper pastoral leadership, building facilities, trained Sunday School, Baptist Training Union, Baptist Student Union, and Woman's Mission-

ary Union Workers. These state mission boards have been tremendous factors in making our Southland the greatest Baptist stronghold in the world.

May each church make special efforts to give to the state mission offering the fourth Sunday in October that you may help our Baptist Mission Program to expand for the glory of God.

### On Associational Missions

The program of associational missions is indeed a step made toward progress in the work of the local churches. With the cooperating efforts of the associations and the Baptist State convention there are at this time 47 associational missionaries in 45 of the 70 associations of Carolina. These missionaries are working in cooperation with the pastors and leaders of the local churches as well as with our very capable State Superintendent of Associational Missions, Mr. B. W. Bullard.

The Tuckaseigee Associational Missionary took up her work June 1, 1948. Since that time the following report is given of work done:

Two Daily Vacation Bible School clinics were held at central points.  
31 Daily Vacation Bible Schools have been held with total enrollment of 1528 and average attendance of 1270. (Five of these churches conducted theirs without help outside, 26 of these churches were assisted by either your missionary or Miss Isabel Hunt who has done a commendable work this summer.)

Three Baptist Training Union Study courses were taught and new Unions organized.

One Sunday School course was taught.

27 churches have been visited one or more times by your missionary.

16 other churches have been contacted by personal visits in the church community with either pastor or some other leader of the church.

More than 2,500 miles have been traveled by your missionary in connection with her work.

Some objectives or goals for the associational year of 1948-49 are as follows:

1. Promote work of Sunday School, organizing new Sunday schools



in needy sections and help more of them we have to become standard. A goal of 40 Vacation Bible schools for next summer.

2. Promote work of Baptist Training Union, organizing new B. T. U.s in churches that don't have them and help more of them to become standard.

3. Promote work of W. M. U., organizing new W. M. U.s and help those we have to become standard.

4. Make complete survey of conditions and needs of the churches.

5. Plan in cooperation with officers and leaders, a well-balanced calendar of activities for year 1949.

6. Issue a regular monthly paper or bulletin.

7. Do some special work in each church during the year.

8. Secure at least 20 club subscriptions to the Biblical Recorder.

May we as Baptist in the Tuckaseigee Association never stop until we have an active Baptist Training Union in every church.

### On Cooperative Program

The Co-operative Program of Southern Baptists is a simple but highly successful plan whereby each individual giver and each church is able to share in the operation of all phases of our denominational work carrying out the great commission of our Lord. It is a system in which each and every agency of the Convention benefits proportionately from the gifts of all our people. The program is scriptural, equitable, and economical.

Here is how it works, the church treasurer sends to the state secretary contributions from the church intended for outside denominational work. The state secretary divides the amount between state and Southwide causes according to the ratio adopted by his state convention.

The funds for state causes are divided among the different agencies of the state convention according to the ratios fixed by co-operating

Baptists in their annual state meeting. The part belonging to South-wide agencies is sent by the state secretary to the Southern Baptist Convention Executive Committee at Nashville, Tennessee, where it is distributed, as received, to the different agencies of the convention according to the ratio fixed by Co-operating Baptists at the annual Southern Baptist convention sessions. The percentages for Southwide distribution are as follows:

## Tuckaseigee Baptist Association Constitution

ARTICLE I The name of this body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. The purpose of this Association shall be the extension of Christ's kingdom on earth, creation and promotion of harmony, intelligence and spiritual power of the church.

ARTICLE III. (1) The association shall have power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient. (2) It shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline. (3) The association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of the local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV. (1) The association shall be composed of ministers and messengers selected by missionary Baptist churches which have been previously received into the association. (2) The pastor and four members from each one hundred or fraction thereof shall compose the representation of each church. (3) The association shall be the sole judge of its members. (4) Any church applying to the association for membership by letter and messenger shall come under the watch-care of the association for one year for observation. At the expiration of that time if it is still their will they may be voted in by majority vote of the association provided they have an acceptable letter and at least one messenger present at the time.

ARTICLE V. (1) The association shall hold its regular session on Thursday and Friday preceding the 3rd Sunday in Aug. (2) The moderator may call a mid-year session at his pleasure.

ARTICLE VI. The officers of the association shall be a moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, assistant clerk, treasurer, historian, Sunday school superintendent, Baptist Training Union leader, Woman's Missionary Union leader, superintendent of evangelism, and president of the Deacons organization.

ARTICLE VII. The moderator shall preside and maintain the order of business of all meetings unless he otherwise provides for the moderation. (2) He shall appoint all committees pertinent to the operation of the body. (3) The vice-moderator shall assist the moderator and in case of the absence or incapacitation of the moderator he shall act in his stead till otherwise provided for. (4) The clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all the transactions and reports given in the association in regular or called meeting and cause



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to be printed a minute containing the records made. (5) The clerk shall mail to the clerk of each church in the association blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the board. (6) The treasurer shall receive and disburse by order of the executive committee the money of the treasury and make a complete report to the association at each session. (7) It shall be the duty of the historian to keep the record of the association up to date. (8) It shall be the duty of all other officers to execute the function of their office pertinent to a well directed association.

ARTICLE VIII. All officers shall be elected annually at the discretion of the body.

ARTICLE IX. The business of the association shall be conducted according to Roberts Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE X. The executive committee shall be composed of the moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer and nine other members appointed by the moderator. Seven of these members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE XI. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to act for the association on matters arising when the association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the association.

ARTICLE XII. The associational quorum shall be the number present if that number satisfies the will of the moderator.

ARTICLE XIII. The association shall have the right to withdraw from any church which does not comply with the rules and practices governing a Baptist church.

ARTICLE XIV. Each church clerk shall mail to the clerk of the association a letter properly filled on the blank furnished him at least two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

ARTICLE XV. This constitution shall be amended by a majority vote, providing the amendment was read in the previous session of the association. Otherwise two-thirds majority of the votes cast must be in favor of the amendment.

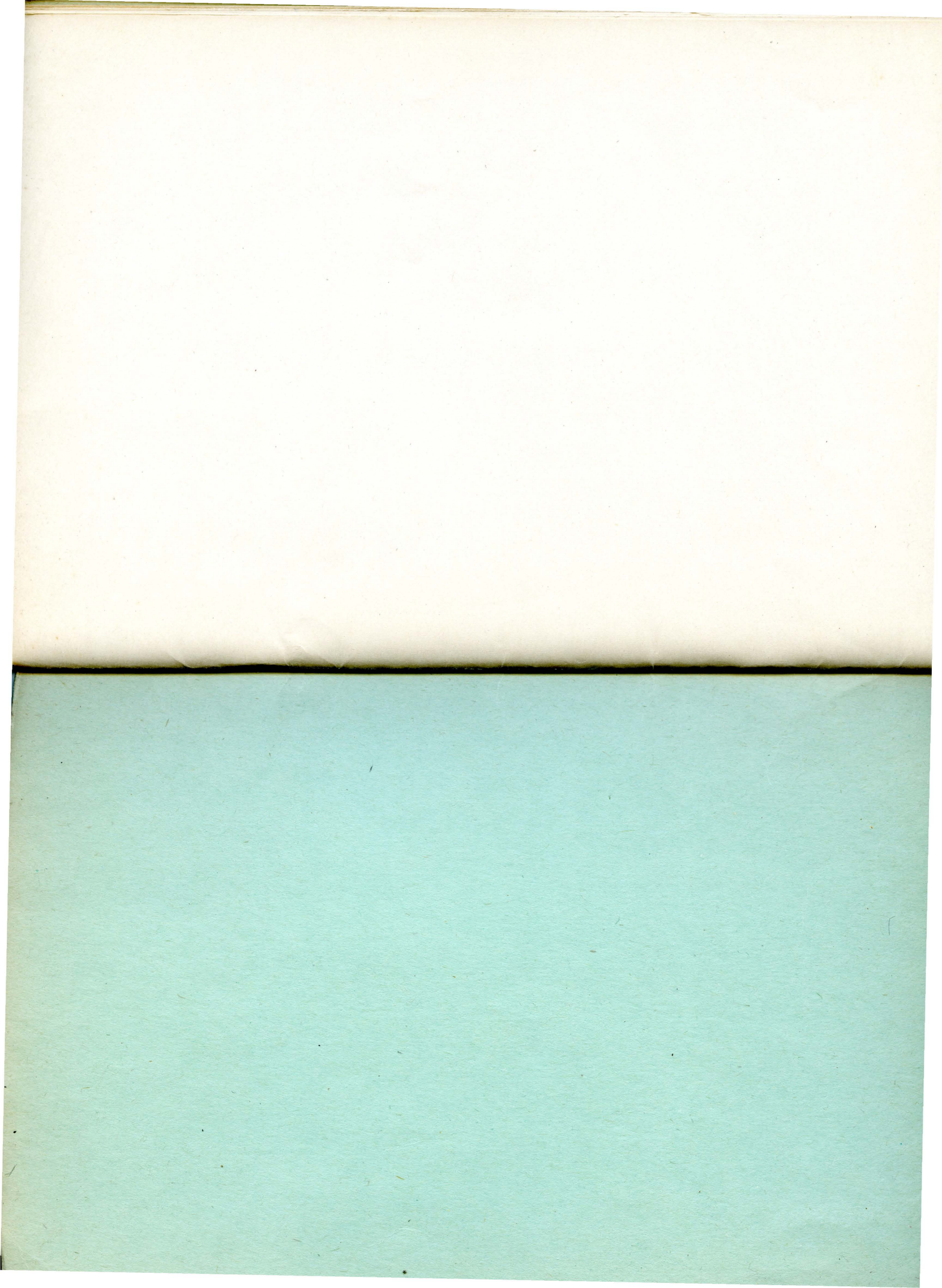
