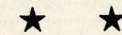

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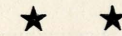

TUCKASEIGEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I. The name of this body shall be the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. The purpose of this Association shall be the extension of Christ's kingdom on earth, creation and promotion of harmony, intelligence and spiritual power of the church.

ARTICLE III. (1) The association shall have power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient. (2) It shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline. (3) The association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of the local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV. (1) The association shall be composed of ministers and messengers selected by missionary Baptist churches which have been previously received into the association. (2) The pastor and four members from each one hundred or fraction thereof shall compose the representation of each church. (3) The association shall be the sole judge of its members. (4) Any church applying to the association for membership by letter and messenger shall come under the watchcare of the association for one year for observation. At the expiration of that time if it is still their will they may be voted in by majority vote of the association provided they have an acceptable letter and at least one messenger present at the time.

ARTICLE V. (1) The association shall hold its regular session on Thursday and Friday preceding the 3rd Sunday in August. (2) The moderator may call a mid-year session at his pleasure.

ARTICLE VI. The officers of the association shall be a moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, assistant clerk, treasurer, historian, Sunday school superintendent, Baptist Training Union leader, Woman's Missionary Union leader, superintendent of evangelism, and president of the Deacons organization.

ARTICLE VII. The moderator shall preside and maintain the order of business of all meetings unless he otherwise provides for the moderation. (2) He shall appoint all committees pertinent to the operation of the body. (3) The vice-moderator shall assist the moderator and in case of the absence or incapacitation of the moderator he shall act in his stead until otherwise provided for. (4) The clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all the transactions and reports given in the association in regular or called meetings and cause to be printed a minute containing the records made. (5) The clerk shall mail to the clerk of each church in the association blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the board. (6) The treasurer shall receive and disburse by order of the executive committee the money of the treasury and make a complete report to the association at each session. (7) It shall be the duty of the historian to keep the record of the association up to date. (8) It shall be the duty of all other officers to execute the function of their office pertinent to a well directed association.

ARTICLE VIII. All officers shall be elected annually at the discretion of the body.

ARTICLE IX. The business of the association shall be conducted according to Roberts Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE X. The executive committee shall be composed of the moderator, vice-moderator, clerk, treasurer and nine other members appointed by the moderator. Seven of these members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE XI. It shall be the duty of the executive committee to act for the association on matters arising when the association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the association.

ARTICLE XII. The associational quorum shall be the number present if the number satisfies the will of the moderator.

ARTICLE XIII. The association shall have the right to withdraw from any church which does not comply with the rules and practices governing a Baptist church.

ARTICLE XIV. Each church clerk shall mail to the clerk of the association a letter properly filled on the blank furnished him at least two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

ARTICLE XV. This constitution shall be amended by a majority vote, providing the amendment was read in the previous session of the association. Otherwise two-thirds majority of the votes cast must be in favor of the amendment.

The one hundred twenty-second annual session of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association was held with the Sylva Baptist Church, August 16, 1951

Meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Rev. J. E. Brown.

Devotion was given by Mr. Charles Ginn.

Hymn, "Onward Christian Soldiers".

Motion was made and seconded to accept those registered as the official body of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association of the one hundred twenty-second session.

Rev. J. E. Brown, Moderator, recognized J. M. Hayes, Superintendent of the N. C. Baptist Homes Inc., Home for the Aged. Rev. Mr. Hayes made several remarks on the Home. A report was read and adopted.

A welcome was extended to several visitors by the Moderator.

Business: elect a clerk. Motion to elect Miss Euva Sentelle as clerk. Motion was seconded and carried.

Report on Woman's Missionary Union Work by Mrs. John R. Jones. Mrs. Jones requested that a committee be appointed to secure a camp for this county. Report adopted.

Mr. C. L. Allen, pastor of Dodging Ridge Baptist Church, appealed to the other churches for help on their building.

Report on Christian Literature. Miss Cowan was absent, therefore the motion was made to have the report sent in later.

Discussion on Christian Literature was led by Rev. C. W. Bazemore, assistant editor of the **Biblical Recorder**.

The proceedings of the Executive Committee and the proceedings of the Association were read and approved.

Warren made a motion that the Executive Committee make an immediate study of the orphanage report and point out and make an itemized protest regarding matters such as taking the Orphanage into the Cooperative Program. Also send a copy of the protest to the Chairman of the Committee of 19 and a copy to the **Biblical Recorder**. Motion carried.

Report on Foreign Missions: Rev. T. F. Deitz. Report to be furnished the clerk after the adjournment of the Association.

Report on State Missions: Rev. H. D. Vance reported that he is waiting for a report from Raleigh on what State Missions has done.

Several remarks on Christian Education were made by Mr. W. B. Harrill.

Report about missionary's car: Rev. B. S. Hensley. Mr. Harrill made a motion that the Association authorize the chairman of the committee to proceed with purchasing the car found or its equivalent. Motion was seconded and carried.

Mr. B. S. Hensley made a motion that the group stand in order to show their appreciation of the hospitality of Sylva and Scotts Creek Churches.

Mr. J. E. Brown, Moderator, thanked all the organizations of the State for all the information and representatives they furnished.

REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOMES FOR AGING

The North Carolina Baptist State Convention in its November, 1950, session authorized the Committee on the Home for the Aging to make plans for the opening and operation of our Home for the Aging as soon as the committee might find a way to meet the cost of equipping and operating. Because of the drive to raise money for the construction of the new wing to the Baptist Hospital, the Convention instructed the committee for the Home not to expect direct help from the Baptist State Convention during the year 1951.

On January 9, the committee on the Home elected Rev. James M. Hayes, pastor of North Winston Baptist Church, Winston-Salem, superintendent of the Home, and Miss Edna Heinzerling, director of Nurses of the Baptist Hospital, to serve as supervisor of our Home. The committee decided to open the Home for residents when sufficient funds became available to begin.

There are many evidences of the Lord's favor upon the Home thus far. In the first place, He led in making a home immediately available. Ten years ago the trustees of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest College leased a three-story, brick-constructed, fireproof building, with an elevator, for a period of 25 years for \$1.00 a year. The committee on the Home was able to secure this building for 15 years at the same rental price. The building accommodates 20 residents at present. The top floor, if completed, would give space for 16 additional residents. The completion of this floor would cost approximately \$23,000. With more than 100 applications for admission already received, and inquiries coming almost daily, one can easily see the pressing need of more space.

The Home has been greatly helped by the gifts received—furniture, office equipment, heating system, blankets, linens, towels, and many other items, as well as discounts on supplies necessary to be purchased. Although the Home has been operating only since March 16, yet it now has assets approximating \$50,000, and is not operating in the red.

Our residents range in age from 67 to 91 years, and come from widely scattered sections of North Carolina—from Franklin to Elizabeth City—the mountains to the sea. Regardless of the sections from which they come, they are a happy, congenial family, all rejoicing in the opportunity to live in the Home. The attitude of all the residents is well expressed in the brief statements of Miss Bertha Callaway, former matron of Mills Home Orphanage: "I like this good Christian home"; and of Mrs. Carroll: "I wouldn't exchange it for any other."

The Home offers four things to those who come to live there: security, comfort, congeniality, and a Christian ministry. With this sort of program, North Carolina Baptists can add years to life, and life to years for those who reside in our Baptist Home for the Aging.

One donor said when he sent his check to the Home: "I believe in this practical kind of Christianity. North Carolina Baptists have waited too long to begin it." Surely it is practical, for Jesus said: "Inasmuch as ye have done it unto one of the least of these my brethren, ye have done it unto me."

The committee on the Home has challenged North Carolina Baptists to build a home adequate to meet the need of the increasing number of old people from 65 years up. Their program calls for a million dollar plant, which would accommodate 270 residents. With the Lord leading and North Carolina Baptists cooperating, such a plant should be built and in operation within a few years.

"Now also when I am old and grayheaded, O God, forsake me not" (Psalm 71:18).

REPORT ON EVANGELISM

The leaders in the department of evangelism in our state and south have a right to rejoice in the work that is being done through this agency.

Since the department of Evangelism was launched in 1947, there has been a continued increase in the number of additions to our churches by baptism. In 1950 we had an all time record of baptisms in the South, with 376,085. The largest number ever baptized by any denomination.

In our own beloved state we baptized more than 35,000 last year. We are looking forward to this year as being the greatest year in the history of our denomination. We ought to baptize over a half million people this year. Our goal in North Carolina is 60,000. If all our churches had carried through we would have easily surpassed. Unfortunately, here in our own association, we were able to baptize only 197. However, there have been many conversions that have not been reported, and others have been saved since our year closed in July.

Our four new mission fields are Ecuador, Peru, Southern Rhodesia, and Malaya—placing our missionaries in a total of twenty-eight countries. The other countries are Arabia, Argentine, Brazil, Chile, China, Colombia, Costa Rica, Gold Coast, Guatemala-Honduras, Hawaii, Israel, Italy, Japan, Jordan, Lebanon, Mexico, Nigeria, Paraguay, Philippine Islands, Spain, Thailand, Uruguay, Venezuela, and Switzerland. Korea, also, was entered by our missionaries in February, 1950; one of the missionaries forced out by the outbreak of the war the following June expects to re-enter in 1951 to administer relief.)

A total of 15,620 baptisms reported on the foreign field, exclusive of China from which no report came in 1950, lengthen and strengthen the Baptist influence in those lands.

Strengthening

Two hospitals are under construction in South America where we have never had a hospital before. One of them is being opened in Asuncion, Paraguay, the latter part of 1951; construction began on the other in Barranquilla, Colombia, late in 1950. Our first hospital for medical service among Moslems is located at Ajloun, Jordan. A gift from Anglican missionaries, the hospital will be manned by Baptist personnel in 1951. Medical work has been strengthened all over Nigeria with four hospitals now where only one was maintained for many years.

Strong international theological schools which have been located at strategic points will strengthen our work for years to come. Dr. Josef Nordenhaug's inauguration as first president of the seminary in Switzerland in the fall of 1950 launches that institution into the full stream of European education. Advancing the Argentina seminary to international status assures strong theological leadership for the southern section of Spanish America. Plans for opening a similar institution in Colombia promise the same service for the northern section.

Inauguration of agricultural missionary leadership in two mission fields launches a new service which will deepen Baptist influence among people in farming areas. One of the agricultural missionaries is stationed in interior Brazil; the other at a co-operative Hebrew settlement in Israel.

Division of the North Brazil Mission strengthens missionary effort in the equatorial area. The new Equatorial Mission includes the Amazon Valley, far away from Recife, the center for North Brazil Mission work.

The Future of Advance

Every new missionary, every new station, every new institution established requires much more than the initial financial outlay which inaugurates their services. Dr. M. Theron Rankin, executive secretary of the Board, estimates that \$3,000 is the minimum yearly requirement for every new missionary added to the foreign mission staff.

The Foreign Mission Board's total receipts for 1950 were \$6,014,909.49, an advance of \$695,644.45 over the preceding year. Virtually all of the increase came as a result of the allocation to the Foreign Mission Board of all Co-operative Program receipts in excess of \$6,500,000. But in 1951, other commitments of the Co-operative Program budget figures to \$7,000,000 before the excess can go wholly for foreign missions. That means Foreign Mission Advance is stopped unless Co-operative Program receipts are higher in 1951 than in 1950.

Advance is definitely related to how well-informed Southern Baptists are about the needs of the world. **The Commission**, your world journal, should be received and read in every Southern Baptist home.

REPORT OF ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY

Thanks to the Heavenly Father for leading me back into the heart of the mountains to serve as your associational missionary. First, let me thank you for your support and cooperation, and most of all for your prayers and words of encouragement.

Since I have been here only ten weeks, I am not qualified to give a report on the year's work. However, the following is a brief summary of the past ten weeks.

Traveled 922 miles.

Issued 160 Associational Bulletins.

Wrote and mailed 371 cards and 103 letters.

Taught 8 Sunday school lessons.

Attended 3 W. M. U. meetings.

Attended 4 Associational meetings.

Visited 14 churches.

Had approximately 30 individual conferences.

Attended 5 group conferences.

Attended 5 committee meetings

Attended meeting of associational missionaries at Fruitland.

Vacation Bible Schools have been held in twenty-one churches this summer with an enrollment of 1,408. Miss Jean Parrish, the student summer worker, helped in four of these schools. REPORT ON NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The N. C. Baptist Hospital was incorporated in 1922 and received its first patient on May 28, 1923. The present site of eleven acres is located in the Ardmore section of Winston-Salem.

Originally planned as a 100-bed institution, the hospital was enlarged in 1942 to a capacity of 260 beds and 55 bassinets. A Nurses' Home, Outpatient Building, New West Wing and laundry building have been added to the original plant. The medical school was built adjoining the hospital in 1941.

The hospital admits approximately 10,000 persons per year as bed patients and rendered a total of 91,299 days of patient care in 1950.

Plans are now going forward for building the new South Wing which will increase the capacity of the hospital by 50 per cent.

Teaching and healing, two of the principal precepts of Christ's ministry, are the main objectives of our Baptist Hospital.

The Hospital has established a full Department of Religion with a director, two chaplains and a student secretary. Their duties consist of pastoral care of the patients, the promotion of a religious program for nurses and medical students, including the teaching of Bible in the School of Nursing, the conducting of a program of Clinical Pastoral Training for pastors and theological students, and ministering to the patients and their families.

The Chaplains are on call 24 hours a day at the hospital.

The department of religion is a bridge between the hospital and the parent denomination and as such it helps to keep the hospital close to the motives of service on which it was founded and to interpret hospital policies and needs to the denomination.

Funds received each year in Mother's Day offerings are used to help pay the hospital expenses of those patients who can pay only a part of their hospitalization or nothing at all. Receipts from the churches in Mother's Day offerings in 1950 totaled \$140,639.81, and a goal of \$150,000 has been set for 1951. The total includes the value of linens and funds for linens contributed through Woman's Missionary Unions and estimated at \$3,964.57 last year. Approximately half of the 9,702 bed patients admitted to the hospital in 1950 and all those seen in the outpatient clinics (47,889 visits) paid no doctor's fee and were assisted by the Mother's Day offering.

The hospital provided more free service in 1950 than any other denominationally-controlled hospital in the South. Free service amounting to \$337,000 which was dispensed to patients in the hospital and the outpatient clinic was made possible by individual contributions, welfare agencies, the Duke Endowment and, mainly, through the Mother's Day offering.

And speaking of figures, you might be interested in knowing that—

An average of three babies per day are born at Baptist Hospital, which makes a total of well over a thousand new citizens each year.

About 9 X-ray treatments are given each day for a total of 3,332 in a single year, plus thousands of X-rays used for diagnostic purposes.

The mailman brings 135 pounds of mail to the hospital and medical school in a single day.

The medical school has graduated 322 doctors since it was opened in 1941.

The dietary department serves 1,949 meals per day or 603,240 per year. It prepares approximately 65 special diets and 35 baby formulas each day.

A daily food bill runs around \$605.77 for such items as 80 pounds of bacon, 90 dozen eggs, 575 quarts of milk, 130 loaves of bread.

An average of 13 operations are performed each day or 5,023 per year.

The bookmobile makes 312 trips per year and circulates 3,600 books and 12,000 magazines.

The pharmacy fills between 50 and 60 prescriptions each day.

The laundry finishes 2,202 pounds of laundry per day, including 207 nurses uniforms.

The emergency room receives 18 visits each day or 6,657 per year.

It takes 500 employees to keep the work of the hospital going each day.

It takes 5½ tons of coal per day.

May God help us always to do our part for our hospital.

REPORT ON COOPERATIVE PROGRAM

The Cooperative Program as a method for raising and distributing money in support of our agencies and institutions was adopted by the Southern Baptist Convention in 1925.

Dr. J. E. Dillard in his book, **We Southern Baptists**, says: "The Cooperative Program is the plan adopted by Southern Baptists in their effort to enlist all their people in the systematic support of all the general work of the denomination. It includes missions, education,

and benevolences in the several states, in the Southern states as a whole, and in twenty-two foreign countries. It seeks to provide a regular dependable income for all agencies engaged in this work. It distributes to all these agencies in proportion to their importance and budget needs."

During the year 1950-51 Tuckaseigee Association gave \$10,700.68 to Cooperative Program designated and undesignated. We gave the following designated gifts to causes included in Cooperative Program: State Missions, \$425.56; Home Missions, \$597.71; Foreign Missions, \$193.35; Christian Education, \$394.01; Hospital, \$1,865.83; and Relief and Annuity, \$413.68. We must help our people to understand the plan and to support it faithfully and generously.

If all are agreed as to the value of the plan and program and all work together in support of the program, we can solve the problems of adequate support for our agencies and institutions in a fair and reasonable way.

"The Cooperative Program is merely the distributing plan of Southern Baptists. We give **through** and not **to** the program."
