PROCEEDINGS.

The Brunswick Association met in its eighth annual session with the Baptist Church at Long Branch, Brunswick County, N. C., November 2, 1894. The Introductory Sermon was preached by Rev. N. Milliken. Text: "By faith Moses, when he come to years, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter. Choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season; esteeming the reproach of Christ greater riches than the treasures of Egypt, for he had respect unto the recompense of the reward."

Recess for thirty minutes, after which the delegates assembled in the house. The Moderator not being present, Rev. J. A. Mints was elected Moderator *pro tem.* and called the Association to order by the reading of the 24th division of the Psalms. Hymn, "Teach me my God and King." Prayer, Bro. J. M. Long leading. List of churches called. A majority being present, the Moderator announced the Association ready for business. Bros. H. M. Hewett, L. M. Todd and John Jenrette were appointed Finance Committee; Bros. J. M. Long and I. Milliken, Reading Clerks.

On motion, letters were called for, read and received, and names of delegates enrolled as follows:

The Association then proceeded to organize with the following results: Rev. J. A. Mints, Moderator; Isaac Jenrette, Jr., Secretary and Treasurer.

Invitation was extended to corresponding messengers and visiting brethren, when Rev. A. W. Carter was announced from the Waccamaw Association and made welcome.

Elder E. W. Wooten and Bro. J. L. Wescott presented themselves as a committee from the Cape Fear Association, asking for an opportunity to present to this body a memorial letter from said Association. Committee was received and 11 o'clock A. M. to-morrow was set for the reading of said memorial.

The committee that was appointed at last session to visit Camp Branch was called upon to report. Reported as follows: "We visited said church and found it a little out of order, and by our advice she agreed to set herself right.

Respectfully submitted, COMMITTEE."

On motion, the report was received and the committee discharged, and the church received in full fellowship of the Association and names of delegates enrolled as follows: S. K. Little and N. Little.

Invitation to newly constituted churches was extended, when the church at Lovely Springs presented a petitionary letter asking for admission. Elder E. W. Wooten, Bros. J. M. Long and Isaac Milliken were appointed as a committee to investigate her orthodoxy. Committee reported as follows:

"Your committee beg to submit that unless the Association affords us some source from which to obtain information, we are unable to report either favorably or unfavorably.

On motion, adjourned to meet at 9:30 A. M. to-morrow. Prayer, Elder E. W. Wooten leading. "Praise God from whom all blessings flow."

SECOND DAY. November 3, 1894.

Devotional exercises conducted by Elder E. W. Wooten, who read the 23d division of Psalms. Hymn, "Must Jesus bear the cross alone." Prayer, Bro. J. L. Wescott leading. List of churches called, majority present. The Moderator announced the Association ready for business. The Committee on Arrangements announced that Rev. A. W. Carter would preach at the stand at 10 o'clock A. M. Minutes of yesterday read and received. Invitation renewed to visiting brethren and newly constituted churches; none present.

The Moderator announced that reports were in order. Bro. J. M. Long read the report on Sunday Schools:

"Dear Brethren: We believe that next to the preaching of the gospel the Sunday School is the most important Christian work, being a work in which all Christians can engage, thus helping the ministers in framing and moulding the minds of the young, causing them to become fit material for the church. It is claimed by our most experienced ministers that members coming from the Sunday School to the church seldom, if ever, dishonor the profession they have made. With these well established facts your committee would urge the necessity of our Baptist churches becoming fully interested in this great and important Christian work.

Respectfully, COMMITTEE."

After remarks by Rev. D. L. Hewett and Bro. J. L. Wescott, was received.

Rev. J. W. Tharp read the report on Periodicals:

"Your committee beg to submit the following: We find that a great many of the members of our churches are not reading our religious papers, but are giving too much of their time and money to the purchase and reading of political papers. We advise the members to devote more of their time and money to the purchase and reading of religious papers and less to politics. We believe that by so doing you will benefit our Baptist people. We recommend the *North Carolina Baptist* and other Baptist papers.

After remarks by Bro. J. L. Wescott, was received.

Bro. Isaac Milliken read the report on Prayer Meetings:
 "We recommend that every church in the bounds of the
 Association have a prayer-meeting at least once a week.
 Respectfully submitted, COMMITTEE."

After remarks by Bro. I. Milliken and Rev. D. L. Hewett,
 was received.

Bro. John Jenrette read the report on Ministers' Relief
 Fund:

"Your committee beg to submit the following: We feel,
 from a sense of duty, that it is our Christian duty to take
 into consideration the destitute condition of our old and
 wornout ministers, who have become dependent upon the
 charity of the brotherhood, and by no means should we neg-
 lect those who have stood upon the outer walls of Zion warn-
 ing sinners to flee from the wrath to come, but let them be
 the object of our care as all others who are of the household
 of faith.
 COMMITTEE."

Report received.

Bro. John Jenrette read the report on Orphanage:

"We are happy to know that the time has come when the
 orphans are cared for and that the Baptists of this State have
 provided for their support and education. With this glorious
 privilege, as well as duty, let every Christian brother and
 sister contribute to their support.

Respectfully submitted, COMMITTEE."

After remarks by Rev. E. W. Wooten, was received.

Bro. A. K. McKeithan read the report on Special Changes:

"We find, by our church letters, that six of our loved ones
 have passed over Jordan, to-wit, Shallotte, 3; Mill Creek, 2;
 Long Branch, 1. While we mourn the loss of loved ones
 let us pray to meet again."

Recess for one hour.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

Elder E. W. Wooten read the Memorial from the Cape
 Fear Association as follows:

"The Cape Fear Association, in session at Western Prong
 Church, on Friday, 26th of October, 1894, adopted unani-
 mously the following resolution, to-wit:

WHEREAS, There seems to be a disposition in the minds of
 some of our brethren to multiply the number of Associations
 in the State, detrimental, as we believe, to our higher Chris-
 tian development, and whereas a large number of churches
 once belonging to the Cape Fear Association have followed

this course, leaving said Association with 24 churches, all in
 Columbus and Brunswick Counties, save one in Bladen;
 therefore, be it

Resolved, That this Association do most earnestly and
 prayerfully memorialize and request our sister churches, now
 composing the Brunswick Association, to unite with us in
 our Association; be it

Further resolved, That we do appoint our brethren, to-wit,
 Elders E. W. Wooten, J. H. Hildreth and Bros. J. L. Wescott
 and C. C. Gore a committee to visit the Brunswick Associa-
 tion at its next session and lay before that body this petition
 and present in the name of the Association the advantages
 and benefits of such a union.

After many remarks by the brethren it was resolved that
 this Association accept the proposition, and that we unite in
 one Association. The congregation sang, "Blest be the tie that
 binds," while the brethren partook of a hearty handshake.

Bro. L. M. Todd read the report on Intemperance:

"Your committee would earnestly urge and insist that all
 heads of families, and especially those who have professed
 religion, desist from the excessive use of intoxicating liquors,
 upon the ground that it is no harm to take a drink; and do
 not think it would be too strenuous to urge the actual neces-
 sity of a final abstinence from the use of intoxicating drinks,
 from the fact that the evil influence that such a habit may
 have upon the youthful part of mankind, when we look
 around and call to mind the many desolate homes, widows
 and orphans caused by the influence of intoxicating drinks,
 and again think of the number of the noble sons of our
 country that have become victims of our State prison by the
 evils thereof, we urge the necessity of being temperate in all
 things.
 Respectfully, COMMITTEE."

After remarks by Bro. J. L. Wescott and Rev. A. W. Car-
 ter, was received.

Rev. N. Milliken read the report on Ministerial Support:

"We believe this is one of the most neglected duties in our
 churches, and one of the great reasons why religion is at such
 a low ebb in our community. We, therefore, urge the neces-
 sity of all churches to give their ministers a liberal support."
