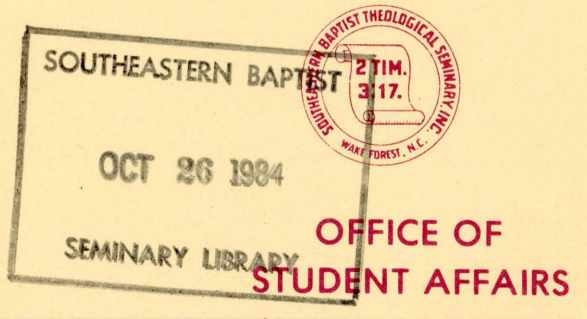

Members of the Ethics Committee are planning to meet on the brick patio of the library at 4:00 PM, Friday to go to the Capitol for a 2-hour demonstration against the death penalty. Concerned students and staff are invited to participate. Bring a bag supper for a meal at Sacred Heart Cathedral. A worship service will be held at 8:30 PM, to be followed by a candlelight vigil at Central Prison until the execution.
