## CORRESPONDING CIRCULAR LETTER

The Virginia Corresponding Meeting, in session with the New Valley Old School Baptist Church, Loudoun County, Virginia, to the churches composing this meeting and to the associations, churches and meetings with which we correspond, convening October 15th, 16th and 17th, 1947, sends christian greeting:

DEARLY BELOVED IN THE LORD:—Our brethren, ministers and friends who come to be with us at this meeting will note an absence of a large congregation such as attend such meetings as this in some parts of this country; but though we are few in number both as to preachers and members, we bid you welcome. We shall endeavor to make you as comfortable as we can in our homes and we bid you welcome to partake with us of such as the Lord has blessed us with. both in material and spiritual things. The object of this meeting is, we hope, spiritual and not material. While we trust there may be no lack of hospitality and kindliness in a natural way on our part, let us not lose sight of the main purpose for which we are met together which is to honor and glorify the God of our salvation and to enjoy what He may be pleased to set before us in the gospel for the nourishment of our souls.
