
MRS. NORMAN F. WILLIAMSON **JAPAN**

A Slow Burn Over City's Incinerator

Newport News officials appear determined to ignore protests over construction of a new incinerator plant in the approach zone to Patrick Henry Airport.

Eugene C. Marlin, Patrick Henry Airport executive director, Thursday told airport commissioners that he has been unable to get any response to his repeated objections.

The last blast at the controversial chimney was fired Tuesday when Marlin told City Manager W. E. Lawson Jr., that work in progress violates federal law governing obstruction warnings.

Improper lighting atop the 175 - foot shaft has resulted in several near misses, including one formation of three helicopters which veered away from a collision course only after a warning from the airport control tower.

The controversial incinerator is located within the approach pattern to the runway Regional airports may cooperate in securing an experienced consultant in negotiating new lease terms with airlines and other users.

A consultant —his name was not released but he reportedly comes with such credentials as recently raising landing fees from 14 cents to 38 cents per ton for another airport —will meet representatives of the two area fields

Let the Prince of Peace Rule

Exploring the Text

In the top of the mountains (Isa. 2: 2). The Lord and the ideals of the new age were often associated with the mountains.

Their spears into pruninghooks (Isa. 2: 4) (Micah 4: 3). This was a Jewish wisdom saying.

Unto us a son is given (Isa. 9: 6). Here are the qualifications of the Ideal King, who will become God's "anointed one" on earth.

The everlasting Father (v. 6). While ordinary kings die or lose interest in their

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subjects, the Ideal King will have a con-

tinuous concern for his people.

Upon the throne of David (v. 7). David's reign was called the golden age of Israel. So a future ideal age would have an ideal king coming from David's lineage.

Shepherds abiding in the field (Luke 2: 8). The birth of Jesus was about 4 B.C., since Dionysius Exiguas, about 540 A.D., made a slight error in making the Christian calendar.

Heavenly host praising God (v. 13). God's assembly of angels (1 Kings 22: 19).

On earth peace (v. 14). According to the Hebrews, peace means salvation.

On earth peace, good will toward men. The Revised Standard Version reads: "On earth peace among men with whom he is well pleased."

The Bible Story

Before December 7, 1941, while people in the United States were discussing whether the United States should remain neutral, or ally herself with Great Britain, one of our religious journalists wrote an article, "Isaiah Speaks to America." This article showed how Isaiah wanted to keep Judah neutral, wanted her not to make alliances with other nations to protect Judah from their foes. Isaiah felt that it was better to put faith in God than in

horses and chariots (Isa. 31: 3).

Similarly, Jesus was not in sympathy with the Zealots who wanted to use the sword against Rome. Knowing the strength of the Roman Empire, and the futility of the Jews warring against Rome, Jesus said, "All they that take the sword shall perish with the sword." However, the Zealots did not heed Jesus' words; in A.D. 66 they took the sword against Rome, and by A.D. 70 both the Temple and Jerusalem were destroyed.

The hope of an ideal king (the Anointed One) depicted by Isaiah, is the basis for world peace. How greatly we need leaders—not armed with warriors' swords, but with "wisdom and understanding, the spirit of counsel and might, the spirit of knowledge and of fear of the Lord" (Isa. 11: 2). How secure we would feel if atomic energy were under the control of such leaders, who would use this storehouse of energy only for righteousness. It is estimated that fifteen pounds of a atomic material could run all the machines and lights of the United States for one year; and that a freight car filled with atomic material could run all machinery and give light to all civilization for 1,000 years.

Jesus' insights into peace stress the necessity of peace in individual lives, where with God's aid we must conquer selfishness, resentment, fear, and guilt. Then peace can become a reality in the world.

Let's Talk It Over

1. How were the prophecies about peace and the Messiah fulfilled in the coming of Christ?

Through the work of a missionary, Christ came to an African headhunter. After his conversion, his old life became repulsive for he realized that others were important to God and should not be killed. He disposed of his collection of heads, and now is trying to improve the life of his enemies.

What other examples can you give of people seeing a great light when Christ came into their lives? What about the people in your own church and community?

2. Why have the prophecies about the Messiah and a peaceful world not yet been fulfilled?

An incident occurred in the halls of the United Nations building which points up the enmity which sometimes exists even between members of groups whose purpose is to further world peace. A new representative to the United Nations refused to shake hands with a Russian representative.

Is the cause of peace advanced when we refuse to be courteous to people with whom we differ? Why? or Why not?

What illustrations can you give to indicate that we have neither achieved the world of peace nor the rule of righteousness foretold by the prophets?





- The Gheens lectures in Religious Education were given Oct. 2-3 by Howard J. Clinebell, Jr., professor of pastoral counseling at the Claremont School of Theology in California.

Herren named director Williams . . . eclectic educator

A visit to the campus office of Old Testament prof Donald Leigh Williams is a short course in civilization: The head of an ancient Pharaoh cast for him by a museum ... a reproduction of Michaelangelo's David . . . an antique cruciform . . . and a desk-top volume of technical Hebrew syntax all testify to the wide-ranging interests of Southern Seminary's only bachelor professor, a member of the faculty since 1961.

The whole realm of human cultural activity — art, literature, music and drama — occupy Don's extra-curricular moments, and filter relentlessly into his lecture notes

He's admirably prepared to relate the Old Testament to the trappings of secular society: He holds a degree in English from Baylor University and a master's in English from Southern Methodist University (his thesis was on Wordsworth's doctrine of God).

But from high school days in Fort Smith, Arkansas, Williams was always oriented to Christian ministry. He planned to be a pastor when he enrolled in Southern Seminary in the mid-1950's. Ironically, he then saw no relevance in the Old Testament for modern man . . . until he took a first-year "Baby Hebrew" course and was struck by the vitality of the language and its literature. By the second year he was taking every course offered in Old Testament, and went on to Duke University to complete a Ph.D. in the field of 1961. He taught fifteen hours of Old and New Testament at Duke while writing his dissertation, a volume "that thick" on the prophet Zephaniah.

During the past academic year, Don engaged in post-doctoral study at Cincinnati's famed Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion, exploring the growing riches of Jewish-Christian dialogue, and reinforcing his conviction that "unless we modern Christians know how Jesus saw life, through Jewish eyes, we cannot fully grasp his illumination of the faith of Israel."

In what spare time is left after he's "done his homework" for his highly praised classroom lectures, Don's pleasures revolve about a semi-formal garden and its three

dozen rosebushes, an eight-year-old poodle named Napoleon, a collection of English antiques, and a continuing interest in history and the arts.

Don is widely regarded as one of the "best-dressed men" on the seminary faculty, and often sets fashion trends among his colleagues.

All the hobbies and interests pale, however, beside his firm and vigorous commitment to the central task of teaching seminary students to grasp the totality of the Bible.

It's his contribution to the expansion of an educated ministry, the key to the effectiveness of the church as it grapples with the problems of society — ecological, personal and political — and 'participates with God in a continuing creative process centered on changing men's lives."

Teaching isn't a job with Don Williams. It's a calling. And he brings to it the eclectic interests, the intelligent awareness, and the compassionate convictions of a churchman who has found a unique place of service among the descendants of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob.

CANAANITES [ea/naan-ītes]. Canaan("the lowlands") denoted first the sea-coast, afterwards the whole of Palestine. The Canaanites were Semites, and Phoenician inscriptions and Tel el-Amarna tablets show that "the language of Canaan" (Isa. 19.18) was nearly identical with Hebrew.

In Genesis 10, Canaan is the brother of Mizraim, or Egypt, and belongs to the family of Ham, Canaan having been, from the eighteenth Egyptian dynasty to the period of the Exodus, an Egyptian

province.

The Canaanites were famous as merchants and seamen, as well as for their artistic skill. The chief objects of their worship were Baal (q.v.), and Ashtart, or Ashtoreth (q.v.). [See PHENICIA.]

LOCUST CANON [eăn'on]. The whole collection of books contained in the Bible is usually spoken of as the Canon, or Canonical Scripture, any single book being said to be in the Canon or Canonical. We speak also of the Canonical Books, or the Canon,

of the Old and New Testaments respectively. is not, however, till the time of Origen, in the third century of the Christian era, that we find

Scripture spoken of in such terms.

The word Canon means a "reed" or "rod," a measuring rod, hence an established rule. Before Origen's time, the truth recognized by the church had come to be spoken of as the canon or test of doctrine, and the books that were in accordance with the traditional rule of faith, and embodied it, were therefore said by Origen to be canonized or canonical. But, since the Scriptures themselves contain in written form this standard of faith, they themselves came to be spoken of, in an active sense, as the Canon, or rule by which other books or statements might be tested.

This twofold use of the terms canon and canonical thus implies on the one hand (1) that each

individual book of Scripture comes up to or agrees with a certain standard, and on the other (2) that the whole collectively form a standard or measure of truth.

CAPTIVITY. [See BABYLONIAN CAPTIVITY.] CARBUNCLE [ear'bun-ele]. This word occurs thrice in the Old Testament (A.V.) as a translation of different Hebrew words. What these mean is uncertain, but the carbuncle properly is a rich red variety of the garnet; the term, however, in early times included the ruby. In Ex. 28. 17. the words "carbuncle" and "emerald" should be transposed.

CARCHEMISH [ear'che-mish]—"fort of Cheosh"—(2 Chr. 35. 20; Isa. 10. 9), a celebrated mosh ' town of the Hittites (q.v.), at the chief ferry from Haran to Syria. It is mentioned on monuments in 1600 B.C., and down to 717 B.C. Now the ruin Jerablus (Hierapolis). Important Hittite

riin Jeratus (Hierapous). Important Hittie remains have here been discovered. CARMEL [car'mel] ("garden" or "park"), a ridge running fifteen miles northwest from the plain of Esdraelon, and ending in the promon-tory that forms the bay of Acre; greatest height, 1,728 feet.

CAROB-TREE [ear'ob-tree] (Luke 15, 16, R.V. The "husks" were its pods, which some take to have been also the "locusts" of Mat. 3. 4, whence they have been named locust pods and St. John's bread.

CART [cart]. Goods were transported for the most part on the backs of men or of animals; but a cart, probably with two solid wheels, was also in use for carrying corn or other produce (Amos 2, 13).

CASSIA [eăsh'â] (Ex. 30, 24; Ezek, 27, 19), a coarser kind of cinnamon (q.v.). Here the R.V.(margin) suggests costus, an Indian plant with an aromatic root. The cassia of Ps. 45, 8 represents another Hebrew word, but probably refers to the same plant.

CAT [eat]. The cat is mentioned only in the Apocryphal Book of Baruch (ch. 6, 22), in connection with the idols of Babylon. The cat was domesticated in Egypt thirteen centuries before Christ. It was there a sacred animal, and thousands of mummied cats have been found.

CATERPILLAR [eat'elp. Horned cattle were early domesticated (Gen. 4, 20). History gives no glimpse of a time when the ox was not the ser, vant of man, while everywhere in the Old World feral horned cattle exist, or have existed, we recent times. [See Unicorn.]

The ox was used by the Jews for ploughing, treading out the corn in threshing, and for draught, and was only killed for sacrifices and for great feasts. Cows' milk was used, both fresh and slightly curdled, and also churned into butter, or in the form of curds, often called "butter" in Scripture. In the Jordan valley the Indian buffalo has been introduced, probably from Persia, in post-Exilian times.

CEDAR [ce'dar] of Lebanon grows also on the Taurus and Atlas Mountains. It was the king of trees (1 Kings 4. 33), the symbol of grandeur, might, loftiness, and ever-increasing expansion. Its wood was used in the successive temples at Jerusalem and in the palace of Nebuchadrezzar. The cedar of Lev. 14. 4 and Num. 19. 6 is proba-

bly an aromatic juniper.

Two cherubim were placed on the mercy-seat or covering of the ark of the covenant in the Tabernacle and in the Temple, and figures representing cherubim were wrought into the hangings of the Holy of Holies. wrought into the hangings of the Holy of Holles. In Ezekiel's description (ch. 1 and 10; 41. 18, 19) they have a human body, with a head presenting the faces of a man, a lion, an ox, and an eagle, four hands, and four wings; the whole body of the cherubim and the wheels of the chariot being furnished with innumerable eyes. In Revelation the four faces of the cherubim are distributed among the four "living creatures" that sur-round the throne of God. [See Gospels.]




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
