

Jonathan Edwards Brown

Jonathan Edwards Brown, born on John's Creek in 1898, was named for the Puritan preacher of the 19 Century. Following the pattern set by his name sake, he too became a minister, but in the Baptist Faith.

Mr. Brown was educated at Mars Hill College, Wake Forest University, and Western Carolina University. For a period of 52 years, he was a minister, teacher, and school principal in Western North Carolina.

His welcome smile, firm handshake, and accommodating nature will not be forgotten by those who he inspired to seek a better way of life.



Bill Crawford served as a Baptist Minister for 31 years. He went into the ministry while working for the Southern Railway Company and continued to spread the gospel message after his retirement. He pastored 12 churches in the Tuckaseigee Association during his ministry: namely, Dicks Creek, Old Savannah, Unity, Laurel Branch, Balsam Grove, Balsam, Speedwell, Fall Cliff, Buff Creek, New Hope, Laurel Branch and Fairview.

He was held in high esteem by all who knew him.

J. C. Millsaps

J. C. Millsaps, born in 1884, pastored churches in Graham, Swain, and Jackson Counties over a fifty year period. His last pastorate was with the Black Mountain Baptist Church in Jackson County.

Mr. Millsaps was beloved by all who knew him. He touched many lives in his fifty years of dedicated ministry.

C. C. Welch

C. C. Welch was ordained to the Gospel Ministry in 1936 by the Tellico Baptist Church. His first pastorate was Dans Springs Baptist Church in Swain County. He served as pastor of the following churches: Tellico, Burningtown, Briartown, Oak Grove, Ridgecrest and Cowee in the Macon Association; Barker's Creek, Locust Field, New Savannah, Hamburg, Big Ridge, Greens Creek and Tuckasegee in the Tuckaseigee Association. His last pastorate was as interim at the Lovedale Baptist Church.

In addition to the above churches he was pastor of Clear Lake Baptist Church in Sedro Woolley, Washington at one time.

His faithful ministry serves as a tribute to his life.

Constitution

(Revisions: August 16, 1957: August 14, 1975)

ARTICLE I

The Name of this body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II

The purpose of the Association shall be the extension of Christ's kingdom on earth, creation and promotion of harmony, intelligence and spiritual power of the churches.

ARTICLE III

(1) The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient. (2) It shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organizations, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline. (3) The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right to the local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV

(1) The Association shall be composed of ministers and messengers selected by missionary Baptist churches which have been previously received into the association. (2) The pastor and

four members from each one hundred members or fraction thereof shall compose the representation of each church. (3) The Association shall be the sole judge of its members; (4) Any church applying to the Association for membership by letter and messenger shall come under the watchcare of the Association for one year for observation. It is suggested that any church under watchcare shall make regular financial contributions for missions to the Association as an act of good faith, and that such financial contributions for missions shall continue after the church has been received into the fellowship of the Association. At the expiration of that time, if it is still the will of the church, it may be voted in by majority vote of the Association, provided they have an acceptable letter and at least one messenger present at the time.

ARTICLE V

(1) The Association shall hold its regular session on Thursday and Friday preceding the 3rd Sunday in August. (2) The Association year begins on July 1 and continues through June 30 of the proceeding year. The Associational reports and church letters will be within this period. (3) The Moderator may call a mid-year session at his pleasure. (4) The Association Budget approved in each Annual Meeting will begin October the first of that year and expire September thirty of the following year.

ARTICLE VI

- (a) The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Director of Evangelism, Director of Deacons, Brotherhood Director, Director of Education, and a Parliamentarian, and such other officers as the Association may desire to elect.
- (b) The term of office for the general officers of the Association shall not exceed two years in succession, with the exception of the Clerk and Treasurer of the Association, who may be re-elected to succeed themselves in office at the pleasure of the Association. The term of office for all members of committees of the Association shall be for not more than two years. No committee member may succeed himself until at least one year has elapsed after his official term has expired. No member of the Association may be permitted to hold membership in more than one committee during one year, except in the case of the members of the Executive Committee.
- (c) The term general officers shall apply to the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk and Treasurer.

ARTICLE VII

- (a) The Moderator shall preside and maintain the order of business of all meetings unless he otherwise provides for the Vice Moderator. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association.
- (b) He shall appoint the committee on committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the committee on committees in its regular report.
- (c) The Vice Moderator shall assist the Moderator and in case of absence or incapacitation of the Moderator, he shall act in his stead until another Moderator is elected.
- (d) The Clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; he shall prepare a book of reports to be distributed to messengers and pastors at the beginning of eacy day's session of the annual meeting; and he shall cause to be printed a minute concerning the records made.
- (e) The Clerk shall mail to the Clerk of each church in the Association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the state convention office.
- (f) The Treasurer shall receive and disburse by the order of the Executive Committee or the Association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report to the Association at each session.
- (g) It shall be the duty of the Historian to keep the records of the Association up to date.
- (h) The Director of Missions shall be sought and recommended by the Executive Commit-

tee in a manner of its own choosing.

Within 30 days after locating such a person the Executive Committee shall present the name of the Director nominee to a called meeting of the Association. If the Annual meeting of the Association is scheduled within 60 days, the presentation shall wait until that time.

His call shall be indefinite. His salary, allowances, etc., shall be as provided by the current budget or adjustments recommended in consultation with the Finance Committee.

Two-week vacation may be taken at his discretion.

Concerning termination of employment, his resignations shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least thirty days before it is to take effect. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving thirty days notice in advance.

The Missions Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the Director of Mis-

sions in planning, promoting and financing his work.

The Director of Missions shall work closely with the Associational Committees and Associational Officers in such a way as to help each group determine its opportunities, and objectives based on the need in the churches and procedures, and means of fulfilling these.

Therefore, he shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association. It shall be his duty to administer the policies and instructions of the Executive Committee. He shall communicate with the State and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

ARTICLE VIII

All officers shall be elected annually at the discretion of the body. All officers and committee members will hold office until the next annual Association meeting.

ARTICLE IX

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Roberts Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE X

The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Director of Sunday School, Director of Evangelism, Director of Deacons. Director of Brotherhood, Director of Education, Director of Missions, Parliamentarian and the pastor and one member from each church in the Association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational officer, shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE XI

It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the Association on matters arising when the Association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the Association.

ARTICLE XII

The Associational quorum shall be the number present if the number satisfies the will of the

ARTICLE XIII

The Association shall have the right to withdraw by a majority vote fellowship from any church which becomes unorthodox in doctrine especially with reference to Baptism by Immersion by authority of the local church as a prerequisite to membership in that Association, or disorderly in practice, or that fails to present itself either by messenger of letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body. Any church, at its pleasure, may withdraw from the Association.

ARTICLE XIV

The Association shall have such standing committees as may be considered necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The members of these committees are to be nominated annually by the Committee on Committees unless otherwise determined by the Association.

ARTICLE XV

The Constitution shall be amended through the recommendation of a standing Constitution Committee. Such Committee shall accept all suggested amendments, not later than thirty days prior to the annual session of the Association, which are presented to the Committee in writing. Such amendments shall be printed and then read at the first day of the Annual meeting, and voted on at the session on the second day. The Constitution shall be amended by a majority vote.

By-Laws

1. All vacancies occurring among the elective officers and in the Executive Committee shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

2. The Executive Committee shall meet at a time and place designated by the Moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter. The Executive Committee shall elect its own chairman.

3. Each church Clerk shall mail to the Clerk of the Association a letter properly filled out on the blank furnished him at least two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

4. No church shall be received into the Association who does not present a certificate of examination properly endorsed by the committee on organization and reception of new churches.

5. Duties of the committees of the Association.

A. ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE: This committee shall plan the annual program for the Association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July Meeting.

B. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES: The duty of this committee is to bring to the annual associational meeting a nomination of the personnel of the standing committee.

C. FINANCE COMMITTEE: This committee shall devise plans for raising the funds for the association budget and prepare for recommendations to the annual session of the association the budget for the disbursement of funds for the coming year. It shall also be the duty of this committee to audit the finances and financial records of this Association twice annually and anytime that there is a change of Treasurer or Financial Secretary, or at the direction of this body or the Executive Committee, and to report all audits to the Annual Association Meeting.

D. RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE: This committee is to report suitable resolutions at the

annual associational meeting.

E. CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE: This committee serves in an advisory capacity only. This committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the Gospel Ministry and make recommendations as they feel led to the church of which one is a member about his being organize and help plan and arrange the proper services of ordination when such assistance is needed. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee.

F. NOMINATING COMMITTEE: It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the of-

ficers of the Association and have this report ready for the annual associational meeting

G. MISSIONS COMMITTEE: (1) This committee shall be composed of the following Association officers: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Director of Woman's Missionary Union, Director of Brotherhood, Director of Evangelism, Director of Deacons, Treasurer, Moderator, Chairman of Executive Committee, and four members at large from member churches to be elected by the Association at its annual meeting for 1, 2, 3, and 4 years respectively on a rotating system. After the election one new member shall be elected each year to serve for a period of four years. (2) The Missions Committee shall advise and work with the Director of Missions in promoting the work in the Association, and also lead and assist in organizing new churches, and also shall be responsible for encouraging and guiding the churches in the Association to faithfully cooperate with the Association program emphases. (3) The committee shall meet once a quarter to receive a written report from the Associational Missionary and make helpful suggestions to him concerning his work. (4) If such advice is sought, it shall advise any group seeking to organize a new church, or seek to help any member Church desiring assistance in its problems. (5) The Missions Committee shall perform the duties prescribed in the By-Laws on New Churches, and the By-Laws prescribing the job Description on the Director of Missions.

JOB DESCRIPTION

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS TUCKASEIGEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

This Job Description is prepared for the information of the Director of Missions, with the objective of presenting the Director Committees' viewpoints on the major needs of the Association. The Job Description also stipulates the responsibilities of the Association to the Director of Missions.

- FUNCTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS. He is to be the chief administrative officer of the Association. He is to confine extra employment in a manner agreed upon with the Executive Committee.
- II. Relationship of the Director of Missions
 - He is employed by the Executive Committee of the Association. "Concerning termination of employment, his resignation shall be in writing and be presented to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to its effectiveness. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving thirty days notice in advance." (Tuckaseigee Association Constitution Article VII, paragraph h-5)
 - General supervision of the personnel and program of the Association as they function through the Associational Office.
 - 3. Work primarily with Associational General Officers, Committees, and Organizations.
 - 4. Work closely with auxiliary organizations.
 - 5. Lead in maintaining relationships with State and SBC Agencies.
- III. Duties of the Director of Missions
 - 1. Administrative
 - a. Administer policies and instructions committed to him by the Association, its Executive Committee or Board.
 - b. Work closely with the Associational Officers, Committees, and Organizations to help each group determine (1) its opportunities and objectives based on needs in the churches, and (2) its procedures and programs for achieving these objectives.
 - c. Help the Association to develop annual and long-range objectives; set goals, and make plans for their attainment.
 - d. Correlate the work of all organizations and Committees in the Association, and publish a Calendar of Activities.
 - e. All staff to be responsible to the Director's selection and supervision under his

- responsibilities until informed otherwise by the Executive Committee.
- f. Serve as ex officio member of all committees.
- g. Have general oversight of purchasing equipment and supplies within the approved budget.
- Inform State and Southern Convention agencies of needs, problems, and potentialities within the Association.
- i. Interpret to the churches the program resources and other assistance available from the State and Southern Baptist agencies.
- 2. As Counselor-Shepherd

To counsel with church leaders as requested with reference to (1) Programs and procedures in their churches; (2) Calling a pastor or other staff member; (3) Actual or threatened breach of fellowship: (4) Church objectives; (5) Church policies; (6) Assist pastorless churches; (7) Assist pastors and others in counseling those who are called into church-related vocations.

- 3. In the Churches, extending the local ministries:
 - a. To visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders in the pastorless churches to provide assistance in the church program and ministry, such as: (1) Pulpit supply; (2) Study course; (3) Missionary address; (4) Deacons' Meetings; (5) Assembly programs; (6) Special day addresses; (7) Ordination services; (8) V.B.S. Planning and Promotion; (9) To interpret phases of Associational work; (10) Budget planning; (11) Building planning; (12) Revival meetings; (13) Stewardship emphasis; (14) Study objectives and long-range planning; (15) Studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, Constitution and By-Laws, etc.; (16) Church-Community Surveys, etc.; (17) Promoting a world missions concept; and (18) publishing of a regular news medium.
- 4. In the Associational Office
 - a. Personal correspondence, promotional mail, and telephoning pertinent to his work.
 - b. Office conferences, answer to inquiries, etc.
 - c. Assist Associational Officers, Committees, and heads of Organizations to get out promotional mail pertinent to their work.
- IV. The Schedule of Benefits provided by the Association for the Director.
 - 1. His salary shall be____
 - 2. His fringe benefits shall include ___
 - 3. His schedule shall include:
 - a. One day each week, chosen at his discretion, shall be reserved for rest that excludes normal Associational activities.
 - b. A maximum of six weeks each year outside of the Association for special work with local churches or with State and SBC agencies.
 - c. An annual sick leave of 24 days maximum, with a maximum of 42 days to be accumulated. Sick leave may be advanced by the Association for one year, without Executive Committee action. Sick leave is to be recorded with the Financial Secretary of the Association.
 - 4. All honoraria from churches inside or outside the Association and all honoraria from other religious work shall be his personal fair, and shall not be submitted to the Association.
 - 5. New Churches in the Association: (1) Any church seeking admission to the membership of the Association shall petition in writing the Executive Committee at least three months before the annual meeting of the Association, which petition shall be referred to the Missions Committee for its study on the petitioning church's covenant, articles of faith, history, practices, cooperative spirit, its relations to other churches of the Association and its willingness to abide by the Constitution and By-Laws of the Association. The Missions Committee shall then report to the Associational Meeting with a copy thereof submitted to the Associational Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association. The Missions Committee shall then report to the Associational Meeting with a copy thereof submitted to the Associational Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association, its findings and recommendations for Associational action at the next annual meeting. (2)

Each church applying for membership in the Association, upon approval, shall be received under the watchcare of the Association for a period of one year. Each church shall give a written report to the Missions Committee and the Executive Committee each quarter of their work and giving toward associational program and state and southwide participation.

6. The Clerk shall prepare a Book of Reports for distribution at the annual sessions containing the reports of those on the Committee on Reports. The Clerk shall notify each person to give a report and these reports should be in the hands of the Clerk no later

than two weeks before the Association meets.

Proceedings

Thursday, August 14, 1975 Liberty Baptist Church

Liberty Baptist Church, the most recent addition to the Association, was host to the onehundred forty-sixth Annual Session of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. A delicious meal was very efficiently served by the ladies of the church. At 7:00 P.M. the Moderator, Robert Blanton, called the group into session. The congregational singing of the hymn "Faith of Our Fathers" was followed by a welcome and devotion given by Rev. Joe Smith, Pastor of the Church. John Hyatt requested that the ladies of the church come to the sanctuary, he then expressed appreciation for the Association for the delicious meal and for their hospitality.

1. Robert Blanton asked for and received the approval for the organization of the session.

2. A quartet from the Scotts Creek Baptist Church sang a special number.

3. A motion made by Walter Middleton, seconded by John Hyatt, that the BOOK OF RE-PORTS with the exclusion of the Addenda be adopted was passed.

4. The Superintendent of Missions, Walter Middleton, recognized Delos Blanton, Jr. as a new preacher in the Association, Rev. Joe Bishop was recognized for his 54 years of preaching and pastoring of churches.

5. Woodrow Hill spoke on Christian Literature, emphasizing the importance of the BIBLI-CAL RECORDER. He stated that it should be a part of the church budget with a copy sent to every church family. "An informed people is the bulwark of Baptist Democracy," he said.

6. Walter Middleton introduced Dr. Lowel Spivey who spoke on the "Importance of the Local Association." Dr. Spivey used Acts 2:1-14 as scripture to support his dynamic and informative message. He said that in order for the Association to remain vital it must be able to adjust to the changes that come.

7. Lewis Keener, Financial Chairman, spoke to the proposed budget. He encouraged the churches to give monthly in order that bills and salaries might be paid on time. Keener made the motion, that if sufficient funds are made available from the churches, the Finance Committee with your approval, will make recommendations to the Executive Committee that our Missionary be granted an 8% cost of living increase and that the items in parenthesis be added-\$456.00 per year. The motion was passed.

8. The Moderator announced that 171 messengers were present, representing 31 churches

of the Association, and 3 visitors.

9. Rev. Alvin Loiry, Chairman of the Constitution Committee, presented the proposed changes in the constitution as suggested by the Constitution Committee. According to the Constitution changes to be made must be presented to the Association at its first session and voted on at the business session on the following day unless two-thirds of the majority of the members in session were in favor of action at the first session.

Rev. C. H. Greene moved, seconded by Rev. Lester Sutton, that the Constitution changes as

proposed be voted on in this session. The motion passed.

A motion to extend the time ten minutes was made and passed in order that this item of business which was not included in the original "Order of Business" schedule might be

The proposed items for change were presented—see "Book of Reports" for proposed changes. All proposed changes in the Constitution were passed by more than the 2/3 majority vote required. All changes will be made in the Constitution for the Minutes of the Association.

10. Rev. Delos Parris gave a prayer followed by the song "Love Lifted Me." An offering was taken, Rev. Tommy Owen used scripture from Matthew 16. The quartet from the Scotts Creek Church sang a number. The Rev. C. H. Greene delivered the sermon, after which the first session of the Annual meeting adjourned.

Friday, August 15, 1975 New Hope Baptist Church

1. The second session of the Association meeting was called to order by the Moderator, Robert Blanton, with the singing of the song, "More About Jesus" at 9:30 A.M. in the New Hope Baptist Church. The devotional and welcome were given by the Pastor, Rev. Hardin Nicholson.

The following reports were given:

2. Truett Camp: Rev. Kenneth Crawford, Camp Director stated that so far this summer 566 people had used the camp. He extended a hearty welcome to all interested persons to visit the camp and see the improvements made. He pointed out that the next year he wanted to use mature women to serve as counselors to the girls. He will be needing two counselors for each of the girls' weeks. An urgent need at present is a new dormitory with space for 100 additional campers.

3. Christian Education: Rev. Robert Abrams from Gardner Webb College expressed appreciation for the support being given to the Baptist institutions by the Association through its gifts through the Cooperative Program and the Fathers' Day offering, prayers and the sending of young people as students. He mentioned some of the ways in which many of these young

people are serving their state in the several different vocations.

4. Children's Homes. Hugh Starnes brought the report from the Childrens' Homes in North Carolina. He told of the emergency Care Center opening and how it has been able to serve 17 children since its opening date. A new office has been opened. He left literature on the Homes for those persons interested. He also announced the area meeting at Broyhill Home on September 4, 1975.

5. Baptist Hospital: Calvin Knight spoke of the work of the Baptist Hospital. He asked J. D. Parker, Associational Hospital representative, to speak on the work done in the Association on this. Mr. Parker pointed out that the Tuckaseigee Association had increased its giving \$1000 over the previous year. Mr. Knight then read a list of the churches giving the percent of increase in giving in each church. He shared with the assembly the information on how the Mothers' Day offering was used.

6. Home for Aging: Kenneth Mullins spoke to this report emphasizing the need for more facilities and telling of the plans for the proposed home in Asheville. He left literature on this project. He stated that at least 80% of the inmates of these homes are unable to pay for their

7. Cooperative Program: Harry Clarke pointed out how the Cooperative Program was a part of many things. He complimented the association on its increase in giving and told how the Baptist could do so many things together that they could not possibly do separately.

8. Treasurer's Report: Lewis Keener, Financial Chairman, referred to the treasurer's report in the "Book of Reports" and stated that it had been accepted with the other reports in the "Book of Reports."

The attendance report showed 66 messengers present, representing 25 churches with 7 visi-

Rev. Hardin Nicholson brought the message using Joshua 3:5 as the scripture. Robert Abram led in prayer.

9. Rev. Ben Cook returned "Thanks" for the bountiful and delicious meal served by the ladies of the church.

10. The afternoon session was called to order by Rev. Alvin Loiry, vice moderator. Rev. Glen Blanton gave the Devotional using as scripture Luke 5:4.

11. The Credential Committee report was presented by Rev. Alvin Loiry. He also spoke to the Annuity Report and encouraged all churches to consider action to supply Annuity for their pastors.

12. Tommy Owens presented the Time, Place and Preacher's Report and suggested that the Executive Committee present some definite order of selection in order that the Committee

would have some guide in its planning.

13. Walter Middleton made a motion that the minutes for the year 1975-1976 be dedicated to the late Rev. J. E. Brown and that his picture and a short history of his life be published in these minutes. This motion was amended by Lester Sutton to include pictures of Rev. Millsaps, Rev. Crawford and Rev. Welch, all of whom had passed away during this same period, with a short statement and dedication along with that of the Rev. Brown. The motion and amendment were passed. Rev. Sutton assumed the responsibility of collecting the pictures and writing the dedicatory statements for publication.

14. Rev. Ted Reeves spoke on the urgent need for a chaplain for the C. J. Harris Hospital. He stated that approximately 20% of the afflicted people in the hospital were without any church. Only 11 of the churches in the Association had supported the project in the past. If each church would pay \$5.00 per month the program could be carried on successfully.

15. James Ridgeway presented the Nominating Committee report. The report had previously been approved. He requested that the clerk make a survey of all the churches and request the pastors to submit names of their congregation that would be interested and willing to serve on Associational committees. He requested prayer and support for the association work.

16. The Calendar of Activities was presented by Walter Middleton.

17. Rev. Ray McCall moved that Rev. James Blevins be invited to conduct a five night Bible Conference beginning March 22 at the Webster Church. The motion was passed.

Rev. Dan Ward suggested that the Missions Committee assume the responsibility of publicity and promotion.

18. Rev. Lester Sutton read a list of members deceased during the year and rendered a beautiful and most appropriate tribute using scripture from the 116 Psalms.

19. Rev. Walter Middleton thanked the church and the ladies who prepared the meal for their service and for their hospitality.

20. Richard Bowen dismissed the 146 Tuckaseigee Baptist Association with a prayer.

AMERICAN BIBLE SOCIETY REPORT 1975

The world's population reached an estimated total of four billion people in 1974—most of them without ready access to the Word of God. The single most ambitious program the Bible Societies have ever undertaken, "Good News for New Readers" was launched in September, 1973 to provide special Scripture Literacy Selections on graded reading levels, for people just learning how to read. To date this program has already reached people in 70 countries.

As a primary supplier of Scriptures, the American Bible Society has for years maintained a close and continuing relationship with the Southern Baptists and their state and local organizations. During 1974, 252,956,174 Scriptures were distributed throughout the world by the United Bible Societies.

A 13-minute color film was produced in 1974 telling the story of the Good News for New Readers program. Membership in the Bible-a-Month Club reached nearly 200,000 in 1974.

In addition to scores of other areas, the American Bible Society maintains a strong and effective program in countries where the Southern Baptist Convention has missionary activities. Last year in such countries as Nigeria, Indonesia, Japan and Brazil production of Scripture Selections and new common language translations of the New Testament highlighted Bible

The Bible cause in Eastern Europe embraces all aspects of Bible work: translation, production, and distribution. At the present time there are some twenty translation projects in progress with the printing of Scriptures being carried out in a number of Eastern European countries.

The American Bible Society gives special thanks to the Southern Baptist Convention for its close and continuing cooperation with the ABS in supporting the Bible cause.

ANNUITY BOARD

1975

The Southern Baptist Convention Annuity Board serves as a lifeline of support for 10,034 retired pastors and other church-related workers or their widows.

During 1974, the Board paid about \$15-1/2 million in retirement and other protection

benefits to these annuitants. In the Board's 57-year history, it has paid a total of over \$125 million in retirement and protection benefits.

The Annuity Board also holds in trust and invests retirement contributions from 38,000 pastors, other church staff and denominational employees—which will be converted into annuity benefits when they retire.

These funds held in trust amount to a record \$353,445,743. While this seems a large amount of money, it needs to be noted that this must be divided by the number of future annuitants it will serve for the remainder of their lifetimes after retirement.

In North Carolina 2134 churches and associations and 2616 staff members are currently participating in the Southern Baptist Protection Program.

Fifteen churches of the Tuckaseigee Association participate in the basic annuity retirement plan. Two of these churches are listed as "open field." This means that the dues are being paid; however, the pastor is not receiving the retirement credit to which he is entitled. Of the fifteen churches which participate in the program, one, Balsam Baptist Church, is new in the program this year. In addition to the basic retirement plan, three churches of the association participate in Plan B which is a supplemental retirement plan.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INCORPORATED REPORT 1975

Christian child care provided by the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina is a cooperative mission. It was through the life, teaching and ministry of Christ and under the leadership of the Holy Spirit that North Carolina Baptists launched their child care ministry 90 years ago. Today it is recognized as one of the outstanding ministries of its kind in the nation.

Without the cooperative support of our Baptist people, along with many other friends, the Homes could not have come into being. These relationships are vital to the future of the Homes and all who are served through them. The investments which we have made in the lives of hundreds of children are today paying rich dividends. These are some of our finest citizens for whom you provided a Christian home and way of life.

The lives of more than 3,700 people were affected in a significant way through the services of the Homes during the past year. Daily care and related services were provided 1,681 children. Of this number, 1,061 were in continuing programs while 463 received casework, counseling, and referral services. While we were caring for the children, a close working rela-

tionship was maintained with 2,178 adults in an effort to reestablish homes and strengthen family relationships.

New and exciting developments are in progress in Western North Carolina. The beautiful Broyhill Home campus will have a fifth cottage for children constructed during the next year. The Thermal Belt Youth Shelter, at Forest City, was opened last spring and is meeting a vital need for children needing immediate help. Several young girls are receiving care through the Maternity Home in Asheville.

Hugh Starnes, administrator of our work in Western North Carolina and other members of the staff are anxious to have you and members of your church visit Broyhill Home. Thank you for your dependable support in numerous ways. It shall be our purpose to keep this a dynamic ministry and to meet the needs of those for whom we accept responsibility.

As God continues to bless us, we will make every effort to expand our ministry and to reach out and help as many older persons as possible.

Gifts for 1974—1975 from our Baptist Churches, through the Cooperative Program and through the 3rd Sunday of February Offering for the Homes, reflect a very encouraging increase. Signs on the horizon indicate that we will need greater financial support for our Homes for the Aging from our Baptist people than ever before.

The most exciting development in the family of your Baptist Homes for the past year has been the experience of obtaining one of the most beautiful locations in the Blue Ridge mountains of North Carolina for the proposed Western North Carolina Baptist Home. Plans are in the making now to raise \$1,000,000 for the construction of this new proposed Western North Carolina Baptist Home.

Pray for the ministry of your Baptist Homes for the Aging. Give as liberally as possible that the overwhelming needs of older people in our midst might be met more adequately. Visit the Homes and get first-hand personal joy that your gifts bring.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT 1975

There have been many significant developments, in different areas, at your Baptist Hospital during the past year.

By the time this report is read the new ambulatory care unit will be open, making possible enlarged and improved services for the Emergency Room, Outpatient Clinics, Physical Therapy and other departments. Renovation of the West Wing will be complete and renovation on

the South Wing will begin in early August. The third floor of the Progressive Care Unit has been remodeled to provide 26 beds, therapy room and other improved facilities for Psy-

The long-awaited EMI-scanner is now in use and is already proving beneficial in detecting

blood clots, tumors, strokes and other abnormalities of the brain.

A Family Practice Center opened July 1, 1975 to offer more primary medical care for patients and also to provide specialized training for physicians who choose to enter Family Practice.

During the year the hospital had its biennial review by the Joint Commission on Hospital Accreditation. All areas of operation received an excellent report, but physician service, nurs-

ing service and administration all received especially high commendation.

Despite the continued rise in costs for services and materials the hospital has been able to operate in the black. The administration and department heads confer frequently and make diligent effort to see that the hospital operates as efficiently and economically as possible.

Gifts from the Baptist churches have been very gratifying. During the calendar year of 1974 the hospital received \$258,898 through the Cooperative Program and \$392,000 through the Mother's Day Offering. Hospital staff members have participated in Cooperative Program promotion in cooperation with the State Convention Division of Stewardship and Cooperative

Program Promotion.

The Department of Pastoral Care has opened a counseling center in Raleigh, its second satellite center. Plans are developing for a third satellite in the western part of the state. The Department has established a scholarship fund as a memorial to Dr. Richard K. Young, the department's first director, who died December 31. Full re-accreditation was given the School of Pastoral Care in December by the Association of Clinical Pastoral Education.

THE CHRISTIAN ACTION LEAGUE REPORT 1975

The Director of The Christian Action League, and our new President, Bill Wallace, wish to express deepest appreciation to the many friends and supporters of the work of the League in The Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. Our program depends upon you for its success. You provide the money, you furnish the prayer support, and you furnish the "clout" which the league has in its efforts. With trustees and friends and supporters in every Association in the State, we have a broad base of support. As we do the work of God in North Carolina, we are so very conscious of our dependency upon Him and for the wonderful way in which you have supplied our needs.

The General Assembly has been in session this year. A bill was introduced by Representative Dan Lilley of Kinston to close every beer joint in North Carolina at midnight. The bill fail-

ed to receive enough support in the House ABC Committee to pass.

A bill was introduced by Representative Jimmy Love of Sanford to strengthen the state-wide statute regulating the flow of pornography. This proposed change would have given the District Solicitor disceretionary power in the matter of the adversary hearing, and would have defined hardcore pornography in the Public Nuisance Section of the Law. This bill also failed.

We continue to need your support. The most dependable thing to do is to place the Christian Action League in the budget of your church for a definite amount each month.

The League will be promoting Alcoholism Awareness Sunday in January and Highway Safety Sunday in August. Your support of these two efforts will help to save the lives of multitudes of innocent people in North Carolina. God created human life and thereby made it sacred.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION REPORT 1975

Baptist Colleges in North Carolina see themselves as active participants in the Christian mission to share the Gospel of lesus Christ with all people everywhere. In addition to the important role of preparing future lay leaders for local churches, the colleges continue a strong emphasis upon ministerial and church-related vocational training.

In April of 1975, our seven colleges reported a total of 715 persons who were preparing for careers in church leadership. Most of these persons will complete their preparation by attending a seminary. Southern Baptist seminaries listed an enrollment of 303 graduates of North Carolina Baptist Colleges in the spring of 1975. The Foreign Mission Board has under appointment 152 of our graduates at present, more than 6% of the total number of current missionary personnel. In addition, a significant number of Baptist college trained persons serve in strategic posts with the Home Mission Board, Baptist state conventions and associational missions throughout the Southern Baptist Convention. Baptist college students receive excellent experience and training for church and missionary service through Baptist Youth Corps.

With the exception of what students pay, the Cooperative Program continues to be the largest single source of annual income for our colleges. In these days of financial uncertainty, the colleges are grateful for the level of support which North Carolina Baptists have maintained. During 1975, the anticipated Cooperative Program budget for the colleges will provide: Campbell College, \$416,066; Chowan College, \$263,333; Gardner-Webb College, \$329,166; Mars Hill College, \$360,776; Meredith College, \$360,776; Wake Forest University \$639,900; and Wingate College, \$263,333.

Another way the churches help to relieve the colleges' financial burden is through the annual offering on Father's Day. Designated for student aid, this offering gives much-needed assistance to many students from Baptists churches, making an education on a Christian college campus possible.

North Carolina Baptist colleges are committed to Christian values, and to an active partnership with their fellow-Baptists in evangleism, missions, education and social concern.

BIBLICAL RECORDER REPORT 1975

Baptist state papers claimed more attention than usual at the 1975 meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in Miami Beach this year. In the celebration of the 59th Anniversary of the Cooperative Program, it was revealed that they had played a tremendous part in the growth of our denomination. Louie D. Newton, denominational statesman and former editor of Georgia's CHRISTIAN INDEX, introduced all the 33 editors of state papers and made a comparison of circulation of each in 1975 with that of 1925 when the Cooperative Program was born. Many were not in existence at that time, however, but this in itself reveals something of Southern Baptist growth.

In giving a special committee report on state papers, H. Franklin Paschall, pastor of First Church, Nashville, Tenn., reported that present circulation is 1 3/4 million and recommended that the convention reaffirm its goal of getting a state paper into two million Baptist homes by 1980. The committee recommended a vigorous campaign in all states to help accomplish this, and also recommended that state papers be incorporated in all local church budgets.

The Biblical Recorder is one of those 33 state papers, and one of the oldest, and we hope, one of the best. In spite of continued problems for religious publications because of inflation, and sky-rocketing postage costs, the circulation of the RECORDER remains above 112,000. Congregations including it in their budgets for all their families are the ones which have an informed membership. It is our hope that North Carolina Churches will take seriously the

recommendation reaffirmed at the Southern Baptist Convention that state papers be incorporated in local church budgets for all their member families. Already more than 1,000 churches in North Carolina are doing this.

The BIBLICAL RECORDER has covered many sensitive issues this past year. It has continued to operate on a limited budget, and with an altogether too small staff. Local churches can help us by understanding these limitations, and by renewing their subscription plans promptly.

At present only a very few of the churches in the Tuckaseigee Association have the "Biblical Recorder" included in their budget. However, several churches do have clubs with many member subscribers. Many Baptist people have individual subscriptions. If we meet the challenge presented more churches will include this paper as a budget item this next year.

It was held for eight days, and the attendance and response were heart-warming. There were more than 150 baptisms resulting from the crusade in addition to some 300-400 other decisions.

This has been a record year for a number of our churches. We had approximately 2799 baptisms in our Association this year.

The prayer themes will be given to all pastors so they can emphasize them from the pulpits. In addition, the WMU has agreed to give these themes publicity. HOME MISSIONS REPORT

"But ye shall receive power after that the Holy Ghost is come upon you: and ye shall be witnesses unto Me both in Jersualem and in Judea and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." Acts 1:8

God's word tells us to begin. Yes, just where we are and to let Him take our whole being—our prayers and our money to the uttermost part of the earth as it is His will.

The number of new home missionary appointees dropped in the last four years from 92 to 73; however, Southern Baptist work is broadening. The Home Mission Board (1845) sponsors work in the 50 states and Puerto Rico. At the beginning of 1975 the missionary force totaled 2,171 with most of the personnel employed under cooperative agreement with state conventions. Work is done with language groups, evangelism, church extension, pioneer and rural-urban missions, National Baptists, chaplaincy, metropolitan missions and others. The Cooperative Program provided \$6,806,954 for work in home missions in 1974.

Today, the fellowship of Southern Baptist extends from Key West and Cape Cod to the Puget Sound and San Diego and on to the Hawaiian Islands and Alaska. There are now Southern Baptist churches and missions north of the Arctic Circle in Alaska.

The Annie Armstrong Easter offering reached \$6,884,357 for this we are grateful. This is an increase of 12% over the previous years. May God's Children continue to give as He blesses us. Together we can "Let Christ's Freedom Ring."

A small beginning has been made in the establishment of a "WMU KORNER" in the Associational Missions Office.
