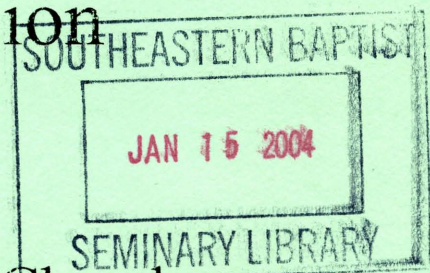


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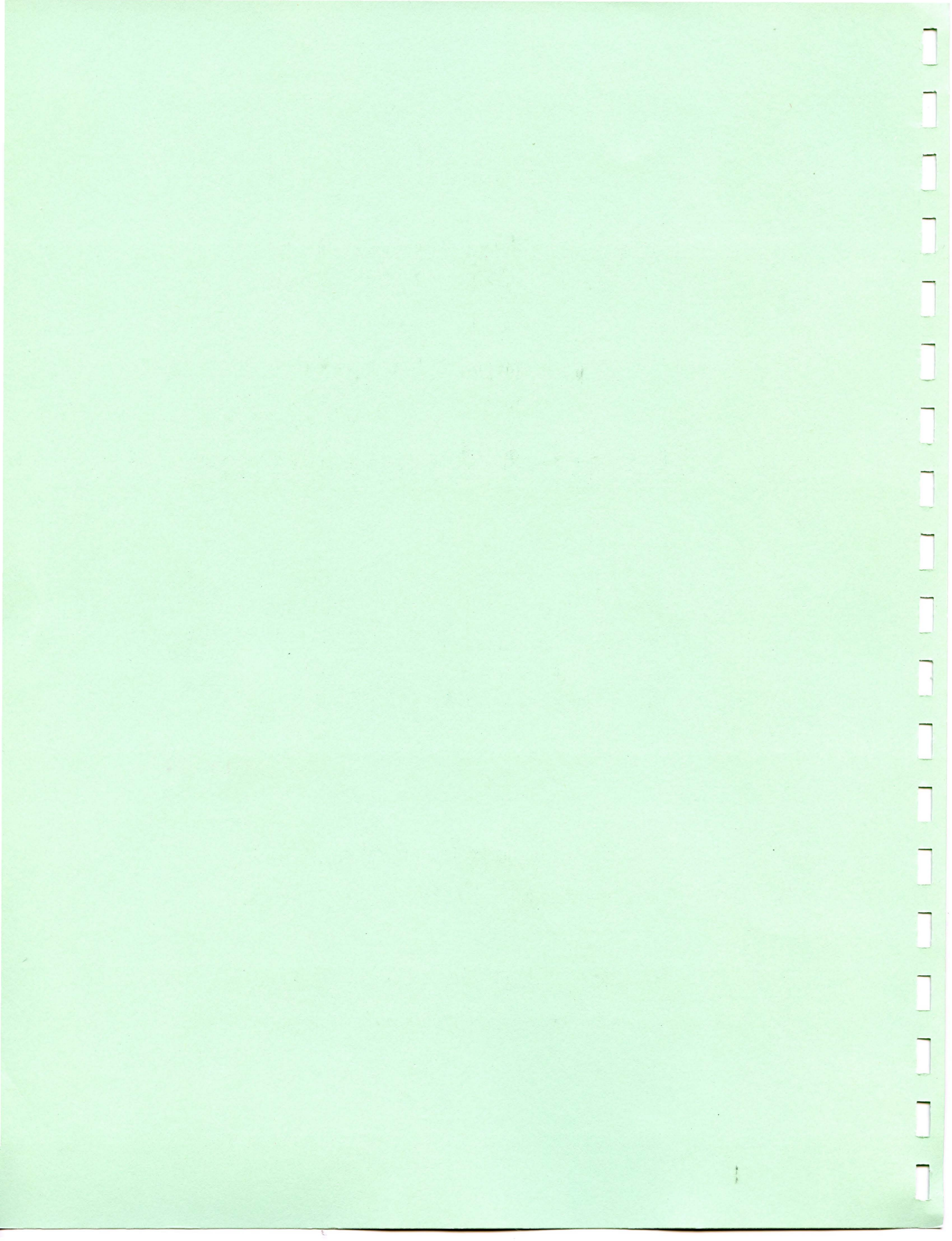

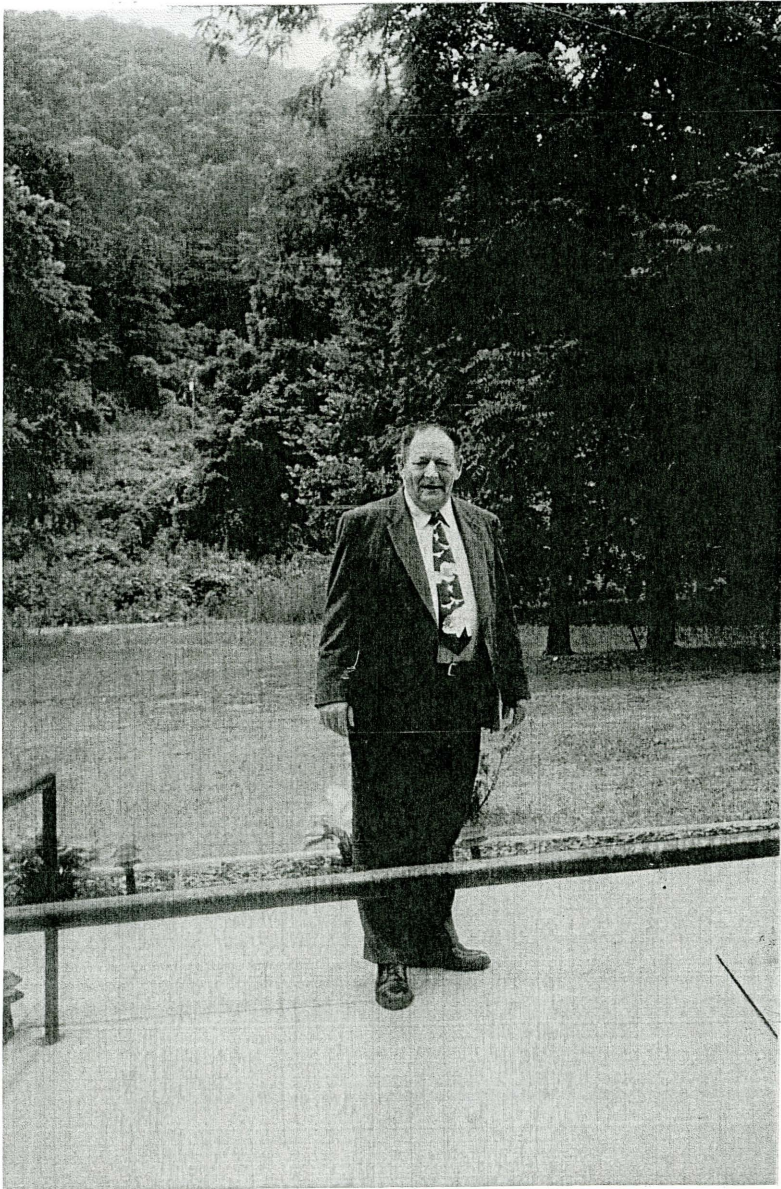

**Dedicated to the Memory of
Rev. Dillard Moore
1937-2003**

Dillard Moore was born to Ernest and Pauline Moore on August 23, 1937. As evidenced by his testimony, he survived the first 35 years of his life living for the devil, and just began to really live in 1972 when he accepted Jesus Christ as his savior. For the next 30 years he lived and served his Lord for the most joyous times of his life.

In 1972 he was ordained as a deacon of Fall Cliff Baptist Church, the church in which he was saved. One year later in 1973, Dillard answered the Lord's call to preach. In June of 1974, Fall Cliff Church ordained Dillard as a minister and elected him as pastor. He served as pastor of Fall Cliff Church for 3 years. In 1977 the Lord led him to Rockdale Baptist Church where he was pastor for another 3 years. The last church to which the Lord called Dillard was the Moses Creek Baptist Church in 1981. He was pastor of Moses Creek for 22 years until the Lord called him Home on April 1, 2003.

The Rev. Dillard Moore was not only a great preacher but also a great pastor. He believed and always preached the Bible as the inerrant, infallible and holy word of God. He spent much time in prayer and preparation seeking the sermon that God had for the congregation to whom he was preaching; therefore, he showed no favor to man only God in his sermons. You always knew where he stood because he stood on the Bible.

Not only was he faithful to God in his preaching, but he was faithful to God in his service to his church and the lost. He was always there to spiritually uplift each church member or individual and their families during times of need, tragedy or sorrow. Dillard was always willing to give of whatever he had to help someone in need. He took every opportunity the Lord gave him to witness to the lost no matter what their status in life was. His greatest desire in life was to see people saved.

Our loss is Heaven's gain for truly one of God's great men has been called home to glory.

PROCEEDINGS
174th ANNUAL MEETING
FIRST SESSION, THURSDAY, OCTOBER 16, 2003

1. New Hope Baptist Church hosted the first session of the 174th Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association. A delicious meal was served at 4:30 p.m. A total of 112 present: 70 Messengers and 42 visitors representing 20 churches (includes hostess committee members who prepared and served the meal).
2. Rev. Art Fowler, Moderator, welcomed everyone.
3. Emory Brooks led the congregation in singing "Tis So Sweet To Trust in Jesus".
4. Rev. Mike Moore welcomed everyone to New Hope Baptist Church and read scripture from I Peter 22. The New Hope Baptist Choir sang special music.
5. Rev. Art Fowler, pastor of Cashiers Baptist Church, brought scripture and sermon from Acts 2:36-47. He talked about the six signs of a healthy church.
6. The 174th Annual Meeting was called to order by Moderator Art Fowler.
7. David Monteith, Order of Business Committee Chairman, asked for changes to the Agenda: Rev. Lindon Hall replaced Joe Durham as the speaker for the Hazelwood Correctional Center . Motion was made and approved to adopt Order of Business with this Change.
8. Vice-Moderator, Rev. Mike Moore, recognized new pastors at the Associational Meeting. Rev. Ray Knowles is serving at New Savannah, Rev. Dexter Tolbert is serving at Cullowhee Valley and Rev. Robert Fernandez is serving at Moses Creek.
9. The Moderator announced appointment of Committee on Committees on page four and it was approved.
10. Emory Brooks led the congregation in singing, "Are You Washed in the Blood".

REPORTS

11. **Senior Adult** - Eloise Shuler gave the Senior Adult report listed on page 5.
12. **Music** - Emory Brooks gave the Music report listed on page 5. He said 15 churches were represented at the association's annual singing. Hopefully more will participate next year. Prayers were desired as he held the music leadership role. He also showed appreciation for the many years that Rev. Harry Vance had held this role.
13. **Youth** - Jessie Myers gave the youth report listed on page 6. She desires that the churches will unite together for more evangelistic youth opportunities.
14. **WMU** - Sarah Davis gave the WMU Report. She highlighted activities of WMU on pages 7-8.
15. **Sunday School**: Arnold Brooks gave the Sunday School Report on page 9. He wants everyone to fall in love with Jesus Christ and encourages everyone to go to the Equipping Today's Church training at Ridgecrest in September 2004.
16. **VBS** - Betty Greene was unable to give the Vacation Bible School Report due to sickness. We held a special time of prayer for her at this time. The moderator said that more people are saved as a result of VBS than anything else. It is vitally important.
17. Rev. Art Fowler led the congregation in singing "Sunshine in The Soul".

COMMITTEES

18. **Stewardship** - Rev. Mike Moore presented the proposed 2004 budget to be voted on during the second session. The budget is on page 16. Many are going to have to step up. Our Lord will provide a good work.
19. **Committee on Committees** - C.L. Proffitt presented the motion that the list on page 4 be approved. No further nominations were made and the motion carried.
20. **Nominating Committee** - Brad Stillwell presented the motion that the list on page 3 be accepted for 2003-2004. No further nominations were made and the motion carried.
21. **Memorials** - Hazel Monteith and Janice Burnette gave the report. Janice read a poem entitled *Death Opens to Life Evermore*. As each church's deceased members' names were read, their members present stood in reverent honor of their memory. The 2002 Annual will be dedicated in memory of Rev. Dillard Moore a Former Pastor of Moses Creek Baptist Church.

22. **Miscellaneous** - Gracella Morris reported that 69 messengers and 37 visitors signed in at registration time. Additional people came in after the service started.

MISSIONS

23. **Cashiers Baptist** - Rev. Art Fowler reported they went on a puppet tour in Florida and Georgia. They had contact with at least 300 children this past summer.

24. **Webster** - Rev. Bill Sutton reported that several youth went to West Virginia. The youth workers are very dedicated and are teaching them how to share Christ with their peers.

25. **Hamburg Baptist** - Rev. Matt Ledbetter reported their church had purchased and set up a mobile home for a lady in their church. The association had also helped with this.

26. **Jackson Co. Jesus Video Project**- Bill Sutton reported that just about \$7,000 was needed to reach their Thanksgiving goal. This will then get 18,500 videos delivered by mail to every Jackson County residence.

27. The Lovedale Baptist Church Men's Quartet sang several songs for special music.

28. Rev. Lyndon Hall of Asheville spoke about the chaplaincy program at the Hazelwood Correctional Center.

29. Rev. Mike Farmer of Lovedale Baptist Church led in the Benediction.

SECOND SESSION, FRIDAY, OCTOBER 17, 2003

1. Rockdale Baptist Church hosted the second session of the 174th Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association. A delicious meal was served at 4:30 p.m. A total of 107 present: 64 Messengers and 43 visitors representing 22 churches.

2. Rev. Art Fowler, Moderator, welcomed everyone and called the meeting to order.

3. The Rockdale Baptist choir sang and Rev. Bill Sutton had scripture and prayer.

4. Emery Brooks led the congregation in singing, "The Old Gospel Ship".

5. The moderator recognized Rev. Josh Hyde as the new associate pastor at Webster Baptist Church.

REPORTS

6. **Baptist Hospitals** - Paul Mullen gave the report on page 23. He said that the hospital was ranked among the best in the world. He gave a word of thanks for being a partner in making their mission statement become reality: To provide ministries of growth, hope and healing in the Spirit of Christ.

7. **SWARM** - Bob Tucker said the Southwest Area Resort Ministries touched 25,415 people and 207 salvation decisions were made for Christ during June through September. His report is on page 25 & 26.

8. **West Care Health System Chaplaincy** - Ron Allen gave his report on page 27. He also said that WestCare is expanding in Bryson City and Franklin.

9. **Truett Baptist Camp** - Richard Robinson reported that 25 had been saved this past year. They are now open 7 days a week from May until October. Annual report on page 28.

10. **United Christian Ministries** - Kathy Cross reported they gave out 250 holiday boxes this past 2002 holiday season, (up from 215 in 2001). They continue to assist with food, heating oil and gas, utilities, transportation, overnight lodging, past due rent, and medical/prescriptions. She said they had been blessed to have the resources to take care of the requests without having to dip into their savings. Thank you.

11. **Baptist Children's Homes** - Rev. Lloyd Fish gave the report on page 29. He announced that three churches from the association had been listed in the top 25 churches in NC who had given directly to the Baptist Children's Homes: Cashiers, New Hope and Moses Creek. He thanked everyone for the multitude of towels and washcloths. He also reported that Tuckaseegee and Truett Associations collected the most food and supplies for the Food Roundup in July 2003. Rev. Fish spoke about how God will directly use businesses to support them. Tyson's Chicken is going to contribute 30,000 pounds of chicken. He spoke about the projected 4 million deficit for fiscal 2003-2004 and the cuts that already had been made. He made special mention of Josh Willis, a boy who had been living in the Mills Home Cottage for two years. He was saved about 2 weeks ago and baptized. Just a few nights ago, he was killed at a railroad crossing. Rev. Fish wanted to say thank you for allowing them to take care of 2100 children in the past year.

12. **Jackson County Bible Club** - Rev. Steve Alexander gave his report on page 31. He reported that 82-83 youth were saved in the past two years. Please support the youth through time, talents and money. It is so important to reach these youth.
13. Emery Brooks led the congregation in singing "Standing On the Promises."
14. Gracella Morris reported that on Friday 63 messengers and 42 visitors were present. Additional people came in after the service started.
15. **Executive Committee** The moderator pointed out the executive committee report on pages 12, 13, 14. It is a summary of the executive meetings held throughout the year.
16. **Personnel Committee** - Rev. Art Fowler said they were looking for a part-time interim director of missions. A church profile will be sent out in the future to determine what churches want.
17. **Place & Preacher Committee** - Brad Stillwell moved that next year's annual meeting be held at Hyatts Chapel Baptist Church with Rev. Larry Bryson speaking the first night. The second night's meeting would be at Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church with Rev. Rev. Mike Moore speaking. The report was on page 5. It was approved.
18. **Evangelism Committee** - No evangelism committee report was presented.
19. **Resolutions Committee** - Rev. Clemmey Queen moved that a resolution of appreciation be adopted. Whereas New Hope Baptist Church and Rockdale Baptist Church have hosted sessions of the Tuckasegee Baptist Association and have provided wonderful meals and gracious hospitality to the messengers of the Tuckasegee Baptist Association, and Whereas Rev. Art Fowler, Rev. Lyndon Hall have brought, and we trust Rev. Matthew Ledbetter will bring, motivating and inspirational messages, and Whereas many individuals have presented fine reports of Christian ministry, and Whereas Rev. Art Fowler has presided capably over these sessions, and Whereas our recently retired Director of Missions, Claude Conard, has served this association well, and Whereas our Associational Clerk, Gracella Morris, also served well, and Whereas our elected officers and members of various committees have served this association well, Be it therefore resolved that we deeply express our appreciation to all of those who have made these sessions of the Tuckasegee Baptist Association a success, with all glory, honor and praise being given to the Lord Jesus Christ.
It was seconded and none were opposed.
20. **Historical Events** - Mildred Wilson presented a report of special church happenings for the year. The detailed report will be in the annual minutes.
21. **Stewardship** - Rev. Mike Moore moved that the 2004 budget presented the previous session be approved. Page 16. No discussion followed and it passed.
22. Emery Brooks then led the congregation in singing "More About Jesus".
23. The Senior Adult Choir then sang.
24. Rev. Matt Ledbetter, pastor from Cashiers Baptist, gave the Scripture and sermon. He spoke from Joshua 10:1-14 and entitled it "the day the sun stood still." He emphasized that Christians must keep on going and not give up.
25. Emery Brooks then led the congregation in singing Amazing Grace without music.
26. David Monteith closed with the benediction.

October 8, 2002 - The Association met at the Baptist Center for the regular quarterly meeting. 38 members represented 19 churches. Moderator Clemmey Queen presided. Emory Brooks led in singing of hymns. Rev. Rich Peoples, pastor at Scotts Creek Baptist Church, gave the devotional. The following reports were given: Clerk, Treasurer, Interim Director of Missions and VBS. Arnold Buchanan presented the Nominating Committee Report. The following replacements were approved: Jenny Miller as Treasurer; Dean Coward as Assistant Treasurer, Bob Parker as 03 Trustee; Don Shuler as 05 Trustee; Clemmey Queen as Moderator; Rich Peoples as Parliamentarian; Emory Brooks as Music Director; and Gracella Morris as Clerk. Rev. Matt Ledbetter presented the Committee on Committees Report. The following replacements were approved: (Finance) Rev. Rich Peoples for Jo Medford and Roy Haskett for Betty Blanton; (Credentials) Rev. Matt Ledbetter for Rev. Steve Bialy, Arthur Stephens for Bill Ansley, and Betty Dean for Wilma Cosper; (Missions Development) Jean Keener for Shirley Kool, Betty Greene for Norma Lovedahl, Brenda Buchanan for Dean Stephens; (Personnel) Rev. Gerald Morris for Rev. Steve Jamison; (Ordination) Rev. Kent Lowdermilk for Rev. Roger Stewman, Rev. Frank Brooks for Rev. Randy Hyatt; (Article of By-Laws) Arthur Keener for Robert Blanton; (Evangelism) Don Coggins for Larry Perry; (Nominating) Avery Brown for Clyde Vance, Keith Dean for Velma Plemmons, Tim Mathis for Debbie McDonald, Jason Watson for Ann Cabe. Rev. Art Fowler presented the Personnel Committee's Report. Gracella Morris replaced Amanda Bialy as secretary. Moderator Queen appointed Rev. Rich Peoples, Max Cook and Laura Brown to the Resolutions Committee. He also appointed Tom McClure and Roy Dalton to the Committee on Committees. 3 people were still needed. Arthur Stephens presented the "Guidelines for Use of the Associational Baptist Building with only one change made. Rev. Dillard Moore wanted to withdraw his church, Moses Creek Baptist, from having the annual meeting there next year due to his uncertain health. It was approved to dedicate the annual minutes to Rev. Billy Stiles and Rev. Carl Smith. It was approved to send \$5,000 to REACH of Jackson County, \$5,000 to United Christian Ministries, \$4,000 to Harris Regional Hospital Chaplaincy Program, \$1,000 to the Highlands-Cashiers Hospital Chaplaincy Program, \$5,000 to Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute's Library Fund, \$5,000 to Western Carolina University's Baptist Student Union and designated \$6,000 be used for churches of the association which commit to joint mission projects. It was felt that this would move the association in a positive direction. It was approved to send \$2,000 as a mission project to Matt's church for a lady in his church to have her house replaced. After announcements and prayer the meeting was adjourned.

December 9, 2002 - The Association met at the Baptist Center for a Special Called Meeting. 31 members present and one visitor from a member church represented 16 churches. Moderator Art Fowler presided. Emory Brooks led in singing a hymn. Rev. Fowler said that there would be no vote for the vacancies that exist in the association right now. Rev. Fowler presented a resolution that he felt was positive, affirmative, and in harmony with the guidelines on the use of the building that already existed. He read it aloud and moved that it be accepted. It was seconded. Several people spoke against the motion. They felt that the WMU was an auxiliary organization for the association and should be allowed to choose their own officers. It should not be governed by the association. Everyone should be able to be part of the association and welcome at the Baptist Center. They have always done missions and were very much needed. Some felt that God was not in what had been happening in the decision making. Many people were unhappy about the witness the disagreement has created in the community. Some spoke in favor of the resolution and expressed concern about the leadership of the WMU being from churches that were not in the association. There was concern about whether or not they are still affiliated with the Southern Baptist Convention and would support the mission offerings such as Lottie Moon

Christmas Offering. The resolution was approved after the last paragraph was amended to read: "Be it finally resolved that the WMU is most welcome to use Associational Building for future meetings, as well as the Associational newsletter *The Baptist Herald* to promote the work of the WMU." Any other discussion was out of order. The meeting was adjourned after prayer.

January 6, 2003 - The Association met at the Baptist Center for the regular quarterly meeting. 23 members and 4 visitors represented 12 churches. Moderator Art Fowler presided. Emory Brooks led in singing of hymns. Rev. Gerald Conner, pastor at Unity Baptist Church, gave the devotional. The following reports were given: Clerk, Treasurer, WMU, Interim Director of Missions, Senior Adult and VBS. Rev. Keith Dean presented the Nominating Committee report and it was approved. Art Keener as Deacon Chairman; Bud Norman as Assistant Deacon Chairman; Jean Norman as Secretary; Roy Haskett as Treasurer; and Jason Watson as Program Leader. Matt Ledbetter; (Missions Development) Margaret Gunter for Jean Keener; (Article of By-Laws) Russ Bauer for Tom McClure; (Evangelism) Rev. Larry Bryson for Rev. Dan Ward and Rev. Gerald Conner for Rev. Matt Ledbetter; (Nominating) Carlos Gunter for Grover Cabe; (Place and Preacher) Rev. Charles Carnes for Rev. Keith Ashe and Brad Stillwell for Jim Ashe. Rev. Keith Dean presented the Nominating Committee Report. The following replacements were approved: Rev. Mike Moore as Vice Moderator; Rev. Johnny Swanger as Parliamentarian; Roy Dalton as Assistant Parliamentarian; Arnold Brooks as Sunday School Director; and Brad Stillwell as Singles Ministry Director. It was approved to purchase a new Minolta Digital Copy System for \$6,687.50. Rev. Harry Vance asked why the newsletter was supporting Pizza Hut who served alcohol. Gracella and Claude were unaware that alcohol was sold and a disclaimer was printed in the May newsletter. (Pizza Hut had offered free certificates for pizza to children who memorized Bible verse.) After announcements and prayer the meeting was adjourned.

July 14, 2003 - The Association met at the Baptist Center for the regular quarterly meeting. 19 executive committee members, one member church visitor, and two associational WMU visitors represented 12 churches. Vice-Moderator Rev. Mike Moore presided. Emory Brooks led in singing of hymns. Rev. Johnny Norris, Pastor of the Ochre Hill Baptist Church gave the devotion. The Clerk's and Treasurer's reports were given. The WMU reported on the annual meeting, the Missions Extravaganza at Ridgecrest, more than 900 towels collected for the Baptist Children's Homes, the Food Roundup for the Baptist Children's Homes, and their continuing collections of Campbell Soup Labels, bandages and offering envelopes. GUIDELINES FOR USE OF ASSOCIATIONAL BAPTIST BUILDING

1. The Associational Building shall be used by the **Tuckasegee Baptist Association** and its **related organizations** for meetings pertinent to the work of the Association, North Carolina Baptists and Southern Baptist purposes.
2. **Member churches** shall be able to use this building for meetings pertinent to the work of the church upon request as schedule allows and as meets the approval of the **Building and Grounds Committee**. This request must come from the **Pastor** or the **Chairman of Deacons**.
3. The church shall accept all **responsibility** of building and contents when using. It is for the use of the church and **NOT** individuals.
4. Any other group making request for the use of this building will have to make written request to the **Building and Grounds Committee**. If request is granted the cost of utilities and use of buildings is expected (\$50.00).
5. **NO SMOKING** shall be allowed in any part of the building.
6. **NO FOOD** or **DRINKS** shall be allowed in any part of the building except conference room and kitchen.
7. Any group or persons using **kitchen facilities** must leave in same condition as found. This **includes**: washing dishes, cleaning sinks and counters, and bagging/tying all trash. If extra cleaning is required by custodian, then an extras charge will be made.
8. A **key** will be issued from the office on a check-out basis. The key will be checked out no **earlier** than 24 hours before use and must be returned **no later** than 24 hours after use.
9. **NO CIVIC OR NON-CHURCH RELATED ACTIVITIES** will be permitted use of the building.

Ongoing Missions Projects:

Campbell Soup Labels: Throughout the year, Campbell soup labels have been collected for Oneida Baptist Institute in Kentucky to purchase a van.

Ghana Project: Old, clean sheets have been torn into bandage-size strips and rolled. Offering envelopes are collected for the dispensing of medicines at the Ghana Baptist Center in Africa.

Jackson County Bible Clubs: Volunteers and refreshments have been provided to the After School Bible Clubs.

Operation Christmas Child: Franklin Graham's Samaritan's Purse ministry of providing Christmas shoeboxes to children around the world is always generously supported in Jackson County churches. Local volunteers delivered our boxes to the pickup center in Waynesville. Several of our people worked in the Charlotte processing center.

Other ministries: During the year, men, women, and children are involved in home-delivered meals, nursing home ministries, United Christian Ministries, Community Table, REACH, AWAKE, Habitat for Humanity, the Spanish mission in Cullowhee, prayer walks, homeless shelters, WRGC radio ministry, puppet ministries, SWARM and a many more projects both at home and around the world.

WMU supports and promotes the Weeks of Prayer and special offerings for the North Carolina Missions Offering, Baptist Children's Homes, Lottie Moon Christmas Offering, North Carolina Baptist Retirement Homes, Annie Armstrong Easter Offering, and the Mother's Day Offering for the North Carolina Baptist Hospital.

EQUIPPING TODAY'S CHURCH

Tools for Vital Ministry: A Multi-Ministry Training Event
Lifeway Ridgecrest Conference Center - September 5-6, 2003

The Commission of Christ

Thank you for your wonderful support and work that you do in our Sunday School. We say "Our" because Jesus said in Matthew 28:29-20, "Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world. Amen." The first occurrence of the word ("teach," v. 19) is a broad word that means "make disciples of." This word involves the whole process described in these verses. The second occurrence of the word "teach" ("teaching," v. 20) more directly relates to Bible teaching today. One of the ways we carry out Christ's commission to make disciples of all nations is by teaching people.

The Example of the Early Church

The early church carried on an active teaching ministry. Acts 5:42 records that "daily in the temple, and in every house, they ceased not to teach and preach Jesus Christ." (Read also Acts 11:26, 14:21, 15:35, 18:11 and 26 to learn how the church put a priority on teaching.) "The life and work of the early church, as revealed in Scripture, revolved in large measure around teaching" (Edward Hayes, "Establishing Biblical Foundations" in Christian Education: Foundations for the Future, p. 38).

Training Teachers

TRAINING is essential. The business and professional world recognizes the importance of training. In many professions people must meet certain requirements to practice in the field, and the professional must then get a certain number of hours of training each year or two to keep a license to practice.

Should not we, who deal with the eternal matters of the soul, attach the same importance to training?

Think of it This Way

Think of teacher training not so much as training a teacher how to teach a lesson but rather as equipping that person for effective ministry in the church. Teacher training is one way of carrying out Ephesians 4:11 and 12: "And he gave some,....pastors and teachers for the perfecting (equipping) of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ." When viewed in this light, teacher training takes on new significance. ("Improving Your Sunday School...A Guide for Sunday School Superintendents", p. 43, Don Anderson)

I attended the teacher training at Ridgecrest, September 5 and 6, expecting a blessing and that is what I received.

Phil Stone, Team Leader/Consultant, Baptist State Convention of N.C., taught "Associational Sunday School/Bible Study Directors" in our first two sessions:

Is Bible Study A Core Value of Your Church?

A Core Value is...things we value above all others. The preferences or choices, which are consistently prioritized. (Read Acts 2:42-47) We find in this reading (1) Prayer, (2) Power, (3) Leadership, (4) Worship, (5) Teaching, (6) Fellowship, (7) Ministry, (8) Evangelism, (9) Growth.

Steve Zimmerman, Minister of Education, First Baptist Mebane, Mebane, NC... taught our third session: Get Your Sunday School off With a BANG! What Teachers 'N Training (TNT) can do for you!

Linda Thompson, Senior Network Partnership Specialist, Lifeway Christian Resources, Nashville, TN, taught four sessions: Teaching Adults on Sunday Morning Using Family Bible Study, Explore the Bible, New Connections and New Masterwork Curriculum from Lifeway Christian Resources.

At the end of Ms. Thompson's session, with tear filled eyes, she thanked God for the vision a team of workers had in preparing the "New Masterwork Curriculum" with God's help.

The Jackson County Bible Club (JCBC) has been in operation since 1997. The credit goes to Mrs. Nora Peters for founding this non-profit organization. She labored in 1996 to make sure that all the red tape was cleared. We commend her and her husband Howard for their faithfulness and sacrificial work in this wonderful effort to reach children with the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Six years later this effort has in fact grown. The desire to win souls to Christ is still alive. There are about 20 or so teachers and or helpers involved. We are privileged to have the opportunity to teach these children who Jesus is and what He did for us all. Last year alone over 40 children came to know Christ, and in the last two years over 80. There are also three other counties that have started Bible clubs because of JCBC : Haywood, Madison, and Swain, so many more children are being reached. We would love to spread all over Western NC and eventually beyond.

We have a Bible club in all seven Jackson County Schools with a weekly attendance of over 140 students, with about a third of them new, many without Christ. Through them the Word of God is being spread in the households and schools and it started in the Bible club because many of them are not churched. Romans 10: 14 " How then shall they call on Him whom they have not believed? and how shall they believe in Him of whom they have not heard? and how shall they hear without a preacher? " We need to be that proclaimer of the Gospel to them!!

Nantahala Counseling Center Newsletter update...

There are many Christians who are reluctant to seek counseling because they believe all problems should be solved by a faithful believing in God. Spirit led Bible study and prayers are the only counsel that seems Christian to these people. To seek counseling from a professional counselor, especially a counselor who is secular, is dangerous and a sign of a lack of faith.

Yet, these same Christians when seriously ill or in need of complicated surgery will seek the best doctor or surgeon in the field without regard to the doctor's religious beliefs. Likewise, they will take their car to the most expert mechanic. They may wish these experts were Christians and take some comfort in knowing that they are, but given the choice of an expert who is not a Christian or a Christian who is not an expert, they will most often choose the expert.

A certified pastoral counselor is both a Christian and someone with expertise in counseling. He believes in the power of prayer and the holiness of scripture, but he also knows that God works for healing through the wise use of man's intelligence and skills. It takes laborers to build a house, a bridge, or a garden. In the same way, it takes laborers with knowledge and understanding of the human mind and emotions to build or repair the mind or emotions that are troubled in spirit. Just as a surgeon may operate in a secular hospital and use instruments made by a secular company to repair a damaged heart, so may the pastoral counselor employ techniques and understandings gained from scientific research when repairing a broken heart.

If there is a difference, it is that the pastoral counselor knows that all good gifts are from God and gives God the glory.

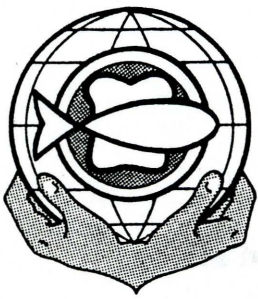
There has been 25 saved during the different church camps and retreats also.

Baptist State Convention of North Carolina Annual Missions Report – 2003

The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina provides on-going leadership development and direct mission ministries through its General Board programs of work, primarily conducted by staff located at the Baptist Building in Cary.

The majority of the General Board-supported ministries are in the Mission Growth Evangelism and Congregational Services groups. In addition, many of the direct mission projects (partnership missions, etc.) are administered through the two convention auxiliaries---Baptist Men and Woman's Missionary Union. Many of these mission and ministries are conducted cooperatively with the various associations across the state.

Partnership mission projects (with the approximate number of volunteers) for 2003 include Honduras (700 volunteers), Alaska (1,000 volunteers) and Southeast Asia (75 volunteers). To date, almost 1,300 volunteers have served with the Baptist Men's Medical/Dental Bus in 42 associations across the state. In addition, 1,400 people were trained for disaster relief ministries.

The annual Baptist Men's Convention registered approximately 2,000 participants with 880 boys attending the Royal Ambassador Congress. The Co-ed Student Missions conference registered 45 participants with 500 people scheduled to attend the Camporee Project.

The estimated number of participants in Deep Impact and World Changers include Deep Impact Honduras (130), Deep Impact Spring Weekend at Caswell (300), Deep Impact Charlotte set for November (300) and Mission Connect (1,050).

Woman's Missionary Union of North Carolina provided training for over 2,000 people at the two weekend Missions Extravaganza meetings at Ridgecrest this year. During two weekend meetings, \$13,454 was received to help with the Project HELP: Restorative Justice program.

WMU-sponsored events in 2003, and number of participants, include Baptist Nursing Fellowship (190), Girls in Action Days (645), Children in Action Days (175), Camp Mundo Vista summer program (1,069), GA Mother/Daughter Camp (354) and Young Women on Mission Retreat (225)...

Other WMU-related ministries for the year included training 566 ladies in associational leadership meeting, providing a woman's prison retreat at Camp Mundo Vista for 60 inmates, send 2,300 Red Christmas Boxes, 134 gifts to missionaries and conducting a ministers' wives retreat.

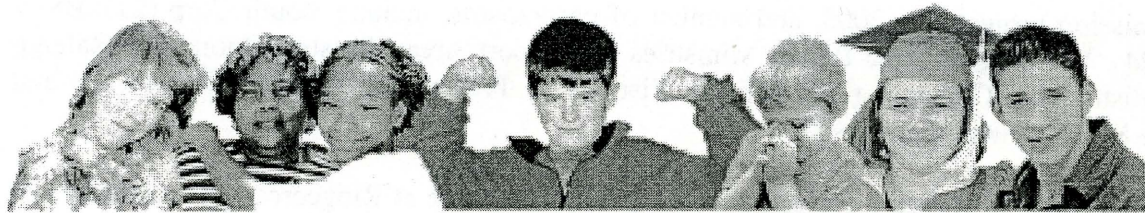
Christian Women's Job Corp (CWJC), a national WMU program designed to help women who need to enter the job market, includes 16 sites across the state, involving more than 95 volunteers. Since 1999, CWJC has served approximately 100 participants per year.

Student mission projects for 2003, and number of participants, include Youth Corp (21), BSU-funded (24), Wilmington Area Resort Ministries (4), Resort Area Ministry, Boone (2), Raleigh Area Ministry (2), Caraway (23), Mundo Vista (43), Praise and Worship Team (15) and Language Ministry with migrants (1).

International Student Ministry projects involve a fall conference at Ridgecrest (90 students) and a spring conference at Caswell (300 students). The BSC annual convention at Ridgecrest registered almost 400 students with 220 students attending the spring student leadership conference at Caraway.

Baptist State Convention congregational leadership projects are held across the state throughout the year, including the ETC (Equipping Today's Church) meetings at Ridgecrest and Caswell, Children's Bible Drills and Youth Speakers' Tournaments, youth weeks at Caswell, and program-related training events on a statewide, regional and associational levels.

In addition, the Baptist State Convention includes three social service agencies (Baptist Children's Homes, Baptist Retirement Homes and Baptist Hospital) and five college and universities (Chowan, Campbell, Wingate, Gardner-Webb and Mars Hill). The convention also supports two agencies--the Biblical Recorder and Baptist Foundation.

Baptists make a difference... This summer Baptist Children's Homes had a very special guest on the Mills Home campus in Thomasville. Many Baptists will remember Patricia Sutherland. She has shared her story at multiple state conventions, and her life has been shared in *Charity & Children* on a couple of occasions. Patricia is a beautiful young woman and a rising senior at Toccoa Falls College in northern Georgia. Looking at Patricia today, you would not recognize her as the same little girl who came to Baptist Children's Homes 11 years ago.

As a young child she lived with abusive, alcoholic and drug-addicted parents who forced her to lie about their abuse. The little girl was threatened with a pistol held to her head and made to sleep on cold hardwood floors. Her abuse and neglect were compounded by a severe medical condition. Because her parents were unable to properly care for Patricia, she went months at a time without the daily medication she so desperately needed.

Then one day, Patricia found the security she had longed for at our Broyhill Home in Clyde. But even at Broyhill Home her life wasn't easy. Patricia has Turner's syndrome, a condition affecting her balance and coordination and stunting her growth. Because she was awkward and clumsy, other children made fun of her at school. But her physical problems only seemed to make her stronger.

While at Mills Home this summer, Patricia was asked to share her story with the girls on campus. She boldly assured them that God has a plan for their life. But then she challenged the girls by telling them it is their choice. They can put their past behind them and trust God and follow His lead, or they can wander through life lost.

Because of your help, children like Patricia are rescued from the jaws of hopelessness and despair, set on solid ground, supported by loving Christian men and women, and are given hope so they can realize their dreams – dreams that at one time in their lives, they could never imagine were possible.

Baptists Respond to Needs Donating Towels, Bedding and Food. If you ask North Carolina Baptists for help, expect them to provide in a big way. When the word went out to North Carolina's WMU that Baptist Children's Homes needed towels and washcloths, hundreds of women in churches across the state provided them. Towels and washcloths flooded in to all BCH locations. When Baptists learned that pillows and sheets were needed in BCH cottages, an avalanche of bedding poured in. And BCH's first statewide food roundup is bringing great enthusiasm and response.

14,640 Baptists Pray for North Carolina Children. More than one hundred BCH children and staff presented the Chain of Prayer at the 172nd Baptist State Convention in Winston-Salem. The chain consisted of 14,640 strips of brightly colored paper inscribed with the written prayers of North Carolina Baptist men, women, and children. Each prayer made up an individual link in the Chain of Prayer. The effort was a BCH initiative and was promoted in North Carolina Baptist churches. The Chain of Prayer united thousands of people and represented their belief in the power of God to meet the needs voiced in the prayers.

BCH Hosts National Child Care Executive Meeting. BCH president Michael C. Blackwell and Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina hosted the fifty-fifth annual meeting of the Baptist Child Care Executives April 22-24 in Greensboro. Directors and other top management of Baptist child care agencies representing as many as 19 states attended the annual meeting. The conference serves as a time of fellowship and continuing education for participants. A highlight took place Wednesday evening with "pig-pickin' in Mayberry" at Mills Home in Thomasville. Children and staff recreated the sights and sounds of the popular sixties television program *The Andy Griffith Show*.

Historic Ice Storm Wreaks Havoc. Mills Home in Thomasville, BCH's oldest facility and flagship campus, suffered major damage due to one of the worse ice storms to ever hit the Piedmont. The cost due to the loss, cleanup and repairs reached tens of thousands of dollars. No injury or harm came to the children and staff. Duke Power called the ice storm the worst in its 100-year history. Parts of the campus remained without electricity for as long as five days. Baptists from across the state sent funds and relief groups to aid in the clean-up efforts reducing the storm's economic effects.

North Carolina Baptist Church Donates Property and \$100,000 to Help Build a New Group Home for Developmentally Disabled Adults. Asheville's Calvary Baptist Church dedicated property they donated to Baptist Children's Homes and presented \$100,000 to help construct the Alverta Bolick Home for developmentally disabled adults on June 8, 2003. The financial gift was made possible through the generosity of the late Alverta Bolick. The group home will be built adjacent to the church and provide a home for six residents.

Baptist Children's Homes Faces Serious Financial Challenges. This year, Baptist Children's Homes took necessary actions to offset further economic hardships. With an overwhelming decline in income and a projected budget deficit of \$4 million for fiscal 2003-2004, BCH cut the 2003-2004 budget (effective October 1, 2003). The cuts resulted in the closing of one or more cottages in four of BCH's Family Service Areas, the closing of Baptist Maternity Home in Asheville, the elimination of the agency's Intensive Family Preservation Services, and a reduction of 68 and one half budgeted positions. (Due to positions currently vacant and the reassignment of some staff, the actual net loss of people was 31.)

BCH...Focused on the Future. Despite the trying times, Baptist Children's Homes continues to be committed to providing only the highest quality of service. Children who come through BCH's doors continue to receive an abundance of love, care and healing. A dedicated staff serves and gives of themselves sacrificially. The lives of children and families are worth every effort. Although facing critical financial times, BCH holds true to its mission of *"helping hurting children... healing broken families."*

The support of North Carolina Baptists through the Thanksgiving Offering, Cooperative Missions giving, church and individual gifts, memorials, honors, and estate gifts enables BCH to provide care for more than 2000 children through our locations across the state. *Thank you, North Carolina Baptists, for your continued prayers and support. We could not do what we do without you.*

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc.

Annual Report

The mission of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation since its inception in 1920 has been to assist the Convention and its institutions and agencies in increasing an awareness among North Carolina Baptists of Christian estate stewardship principles as a means of financially undergirding churches, institutions and mission endeavors on a permanent basis. The uniqueness of the ministries and services provided by the institutions and General Board staff merits increased financial support. The Foundation accomplishes these objectives by offering assistance in estate-planning counsel, Will preparation, planned giving, charitable remainder trusts, endowment funds and church fund management.

During 2002, the Foundation assisted individuals in establishing 28 endowment funds and 17 charitable remainder trusts totaling \$1.5 million and received \$3.3 million in contributions to existing endowments all of which will ultimately benefit countless Baptist causes on a permanent basis. Programs were provided for churches and associations during the year to promote Make Your Will Month, Christian estate stewardship, and church fund management. Over \$1.5 million from churches and institutions came under management to enhance numerous ministries including scholarships, building

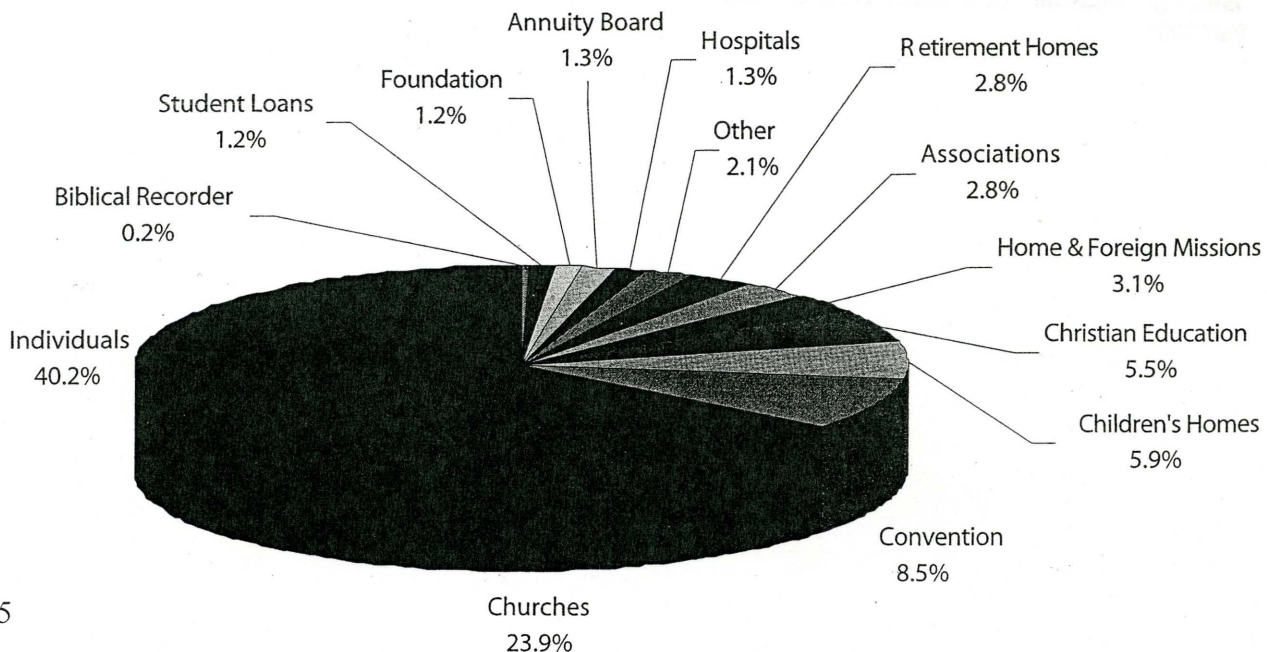
funds, cemetery funds, benevolence funds, general operating funds and other various mission causes. Overall, the Foundation received \$6.3 million in contributions during 2002 for Christian causes.

The Foundation employs professional money managers to invest these funds according to an investment policy adopted by its Board. Four investment pools are offered: a growth fund, a balanced fund, an income fund and a fixed income fund. The Foundation uses the services of Salomon Smith Barney Consulting Group to help select top money managers and evaluate performance. As of December 31, 2002, the Foundation held \$96.4 million under management.

During 2002, our distributions totaled \$5.8 million, with charity receiving \$3.5 million and individuals, through trusts, receiving \$2.3 million. During the 83-year history of The North Carolina Baptist Foundation, Inc., \$23.1 million has been distributed to individuals and \$40.3 million to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$63.4 million.†

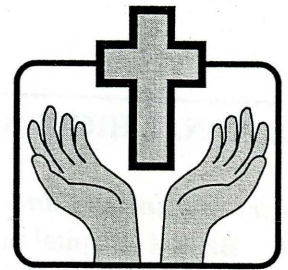

BAPTIST HOSPITAL AND NORTH CAROLINA BAPTISTS: EXTENDING THE HEALING TOUCH OF CHRIST

North Carolina Baptist Hospital admitted its first patient on May 30, 1923, culminating a vision of the Baptist State Convention to extend the healing ministry of Jesus Christ. Eighty years later, in 2003, we remain firmly committed to the original mission of providing the highest quality medical care marked by excellence, integrity, innovation, and compassion consistent with the teachings of Christ. This report highlights our partnership in missions with North Carolina Baptists.

BAPTIST BENEVOLENT CARE FUND

The Convention established the annual Mother's Day Offering in 1924 to help patients in financial need pay their hospital bills, to lift heavy burdens in the name of Jesus Christ and his love. Since that time every dollar of every gift has been used for that purpose—caring for children like Haleigh in her battle with cancer, and adults like Wade and Vickie. You have made a tremendous difference in their lives and many others just like them. Please read their inspiring stories of thankfulness in the new Mother's Day Offering web site (www.ncbhmothersday.org). *Thank you*, North Carolina Baptists, for giving \$600,372 to this ministry in 2002!

SCHOOL OF PASTORAL CARE

The fruits of Cooperative Giving by North Carolina Baptists are evidenced in life-changing ministries of the School of Pastoral Care. Our mission is *"to provide ministries of growth, hope, and healing in the Spirit of Christ."* *Thank you*, North Carolina Baptists, for extending the healing reach of Christ to thousands of hurting people through our ministries.

Baptist Hospital CareNet Counseling Centers, our Department of Pastoral Counseling, annually provides over 24,500 hours of counseling at 22 locations across our state. This ministry brings emotional and spiritual healing, consistent with the compassion of Christ, to those who have been broken. Our counselors are licensed professionals with deeply held personal faith. They extend the ministry of churches, receiving many referrals from Baptist pastors on behalf of church members who are hurting. Approximately 40% of our counseling hours are provided to Baptists.

The Center for Congregational Health has continued to develop vital ministries. Nearly 600 church leaders received training in the past year through the Center's programs of *leadership development*. "The Pastor as Spiritual Guide" and "Young Leaders" programs have proven to be highly beneficial for N.C. Baptist ministers, deepening their faith as spiritual leaders for their churches. Approximately 25 churches per month have benefited from the Center's *consulting ministry*. Initial, expert consultations are provided free to N.C. Baptist churches thanks to Cooperative Giving. *Intentional Interim ministers* trained by the Center continue to serve churches in our state, across the nation, and Australia. Mentoring programs for young ministers are also being provided.

The Department of Chaplaincy and Pastoral Education provides ministry to patients, families, and staff through more than 61,000 pastoral contacts each year, extending great compassion and hope in the name of Jesus Christ. Specialized training in hospital ministry was provided to 63 students in the past year, making our Clinical Pastoral Education program one of the largest in the nation.

The Department of Church and Community Relations receives no Cooperative Program funds, but serves as a vital liaison to N.C. Baptist churches. The department ministers to over 150 Baptists per year by facilitating physician appointments or helping others with concerns about medical bills. Many of those who are helped have no health insurance and are burdened by financial need.

ADDITIONAL HIGHLIGHTS AT NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

Ministry to Ministers and Their Families –

- Baptist Hospital provides a **subsidy of up to 25%** for the hospital bills of N.C. Baptist ministers and their families. This amounted to \$79,248 in FY 2003. The subsidy comes from the hospital's W.K. McGee Patient Service Fund, with assistance from the Mother's Day Offering as needed.
- The **Ministers Care Plan** provides a subsidy to full-time, ordained ministers serving North Carolina Baptist churches, and their immediate family members, who need the support of counseling to recover from emotional pain and stress. Clients pay \$20 per session at a CareNet Counseling Center. The Baptist State Convention and CareNet pay for the remainder of the cost. Please call Rev. Ranked Among the Nation's Best Hospitals

- North Carolina Baptist Hospital is ranked in the top 50 among "**America's Best Hospitals**" according to the July 2003 issue of *U.S. News and World Report*.
- Our hospital continues to be ranked in the **top 1 percent in patient satisfaction** among our peers in the United States, according to Press Ganey, the health care industry's top patient satisfaction measurement firm.
- We continue to be recognized as a **Magnet Hospital for Excellence in Nursing**, demonstrating outstanding nursing leadership and high quality patient care. Baptist Hospital was one of the first hospitals in the nation to earn this recognition from the American Nurses Credentialing Center, the nation's leading nursing credentialing organization.
- Our Medical Center's cancer treatment programs are ranked 21st in the nation by *U.S. News and World Report*. **A new facility for our Comprehensive Cancer Center** is under construction and due to open in June 2004. Patients will receive coordinated care, such as required tests, scans, and treatment, in a single visit.



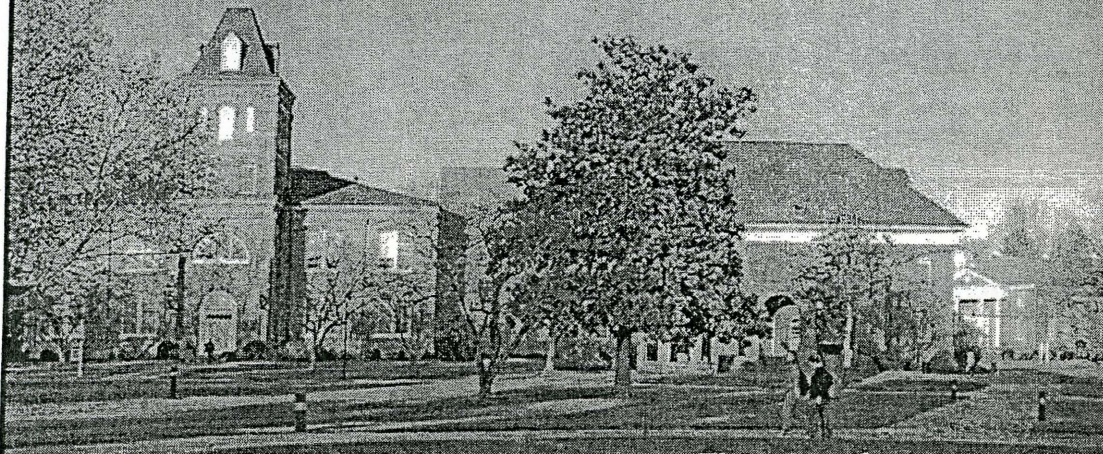

NONPROFIT CORPORATION

I, the undersigned person of the age of eighteen years or more, acting as incorporator for the purpose of creating a nonprofit corporation under the laws of the State of North Carolina, as contained in Chapter 55A of the General Statutes of North Carolina, entitled "Nonprofit Corporation Act", and the several amendments thereto, do hereby set forth:

1. The name of the corporation is:

2. The period of duration of the corporation shall be: perpetual.

3. The purpose for which the corporation is organized is to engage in any lawful act or activity for which corporations may be organized under Chapter 55A of the General Statutes of North Carolina.

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BY-LAWS OF THE TUCKASEIGEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION, INC.

ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Incorporated.

ARTICLE II. OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the Association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the Association are as follows:

1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.
2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.
3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.
4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.
5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the Association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III. AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The Association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline,

SECTION 3. The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the New Testament.

SECTION 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watchcare the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except those of voting.

Applications for membership shall be presented to the Credentials Committee of the Association. The applications will consist of a letter from a constituted church stating their desire to affiliate with the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. The Credentials Committee as a part of the review process may invite the requesting church to a conference to discuss its history, its mission strategy, and any other information that may be pertinent to the application. The Credentials Committee may then approve the application and recommend them to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee may by a simple majority vote accept the requesting church to come under the watchcare of the Association for one year. It is suggested that any church under watchcare participate in the missions program of the Association. At the end of the year, the church may be voted in as a member of the Association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting of the Association, provided that the church submits an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure and should notify the Association of this action in writing. Such action will be recognized by the Association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the Associational Clerk, before each annual session, an annual letter, the forms provided by the Associational Clerk, giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

SECTION 5. The Association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such vote is to be taken by written ballot.

ARTICLE V. MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Association shall hold its annual meeting on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in October. Special meetings of the Association may be called by the Executive Committee provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by the pastor and one additional messenger. Churches which give to the association more than .5% of their undesignated receipts shall be entitled to an additional 2 messengers for every .5% of giving up to a total of 10 messengers for churches which give 2% of their undesignated giving."

SECTION 3. Churches are requested to elect their messengers and alternatives in conference to attend the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the Association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the question is decided as to which party is in union with the Association. The decision is to be made by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

ARTICLE VI. OFFICERS

SECTION 1. General officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, and Assistant Parliamentarian. Program leaders shall be Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Chairman of Evangelism Committee, Seminary Extension Director, Chairman of Mission Committee, Director of Missions, Trustees, Pastor Conference President, Youth Director, Stewardship Director, Vacation Bible School Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Deacons Chairmen, Senior Adult Director, Singles Ministry Director, and such other officers as the Association may desire to elect.

Associational representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: (1) Truett Camp, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Baptist Hospital, (4) North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc. (Homes for the Aging), (5) Biblical Recorder, (6) Christian Education, (7) Annuity Board and other representatives as may be deemed appropriate and elected in the Association.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the Director of Missions and Trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the Association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The Moderator and Vice Moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of Trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of Trustees, the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service, the Trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session. The Associational financial year will run from January 1 through December 31.

ARTICLE VII. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The **Moderator** shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the Association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association.

He shall appoint the Committee on Committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the Committee on Committees in its regular report.

SECTION 2. The **Vice Moderator** shall assist the Moderator and preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the Moderator.

SECTION 3. The **Clerk** shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; shall prepare a "Book of Reports" to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

The Clerk shall distribute to the clerk of each church in the Association blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the State Convention. This form is to be returned to the Clerk of the Association not later than four weeks prior to the meeting of the body or by the deadline set by the Clerk and Director of Missions. All program reports should be returned by the same date.

An **Assistant Clerk** shall work with the Clerk in preparing the "Book of Reports," the annual minutes and the registration of messengers at the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. The **Treasurer** shall receive and dispense by order of the Executive Committee of the Association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report at the Annual meeting and a current report at each Executive Committee meeting.

An **Assistant Treasurer** shall be elected to assist the Treasurer by request and to serve in the event the Treasurer resigns or is ill or unable to function.

SECTION 5. The **Historian** shall keep the records of the Association up-to-date.

SECTION 6. The **Parliamentarian** shall upon the request of the presiding officer of the body, advise and assist the Association with respect to all matters involving Parliamentary Procedure.

An **Assistant Parliamentarian** shall be elected. The Parliamentarian and Assistant should always communicate with each other to ensure that this office is filled at each Associational Annual or Executive Committee meeting.

SECTION 7. The **Program Leaders** and the **Institutional Agency Representatives** shall perform all duties customary to their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the Association.

SECTION 8. **Trustees** have no authority except by direction of the Association and are not personally bound by signatures but are to be the legal signees for the Association. Trustees represent the Association in legal matters. Trustees act on behalf of the Association in acquisition and disposal of Associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the Association.

All persons dealing with the Trustees, as Associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the Association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the Trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the Association Moderator and Clerk.

ARTICLE VIII. RULES OF ORDER

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE IX. QUORUM

The quorum for the Annual Associational meeting or any special called meeting of the Association shall not be less than 25 percent of the member churches.

ARTICLE X. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the General Officers and Program Leaders elected by the Association and the Pastor and one member from each church in the Association. No Pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational Officer or Program Leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the Association on matters arising when the Association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the Association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the Moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the second Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the Moderator with a one week notice to the churches.

SECTION 3. All vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 4. In the event that a vacancy occurs with the Trustees, the Executive Committee should fill such vacancy for the remainder of the term.

ARTICLE XI. ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The Association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The terms of office for all committee members shall be for one year except where specifically stated otherwise.

SECTION 2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the general meeting all standing committees as set forth under Article XI.

SECTION 3. THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members. To this group the Directors of Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and Music Ministry will be added.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the Officers, Program Leaders and Institutional Agency Representatives. These nominees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior to presenting of their names at annual session.

SECTION 4. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall plan the annual program of the Association and present it to the Executive Committee at its October meeting.

SECTION 5. THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of churches seeking admission into the Association in keeping with Article IV and make recommendation to the Association. It shall counsel with churches that are out of harmony of fellowship with the Association. It shall be responsible for registering messengers at the Annual Meetings."

SECTION 6. THE PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It is appointed by the Moderator at the October Executive Committee meeting. It shall be the duty of this committee to present suitable resolutions at the annual Associational meeting.

SECTION 8. THE MEMORIAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the annual meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last annual meeting and shall lead a memorial service in their memory.

SECTION 9. THE Stewardship COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members including the Treasurer of the Association. This committee shall: (a) present a Budget to the Association for the following year; (b) devise plans for raising the funds for the Associational Budget; (c) audit the finances and financial records of the Association annually and anytime there is a change of Treasurer or at the direction of the Association or the Executive Committee; (d) report all audits to the Annual Association Meeting.

SECTION 10. THE CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and shall perform all duties specified in Article XV.

SECTION 11. THE ORDINATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five designated Pastors and all other Pastors who desire to sit with the committee.

A. The committee serves on an advisory capacity only and serves at the request of the church from which the member is seeking ordination.

B. The committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the church as they feel led.

C. The committee should assist in arranging the proper service of ordination when such assistance is requested.

D. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee.

E. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee, and shall give two weeks notice in which the committee is to do its work.

SECTION 12. THE EVANGELISM COMMITTEE. The duties of the committee shall be to direct and propose a perpetual program and spirit of evangelism in the Association. It shall arrange and direct all Associational-wide evangelistic activities.

SECTION 13. THE ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall be composed of eight (8) members, nominated by the Associational Committee on Committees and elected by the Association at the annual meeting. The committee shall be: Missions Development Director, Promotion Director, Survey Director, Associational WMU Mission Action Director, Associational Brotherhood Director, Sunday School Outreach Director, Church Training Director, and Associational Deacons President. The Missions Development Director, Promotion Director, and Survey Director shall be elected for a three-year term, with one member named each year. The other five positions shall be filled by the person who is elected to fill those five Associational offices.

The duties of the AMDC are to lead the associational missions development in the five mission performance tasks: (1) call churches to be on missions; (2) train, develop, and encourage church and Associational workers; (3) provide resources and services to churches and leaders; (4) provide opportunities for working together in missions, ministry and growth; (5) establish and maintain appropriate communications and relationships with the community and the denomination.

SECTION 14. THE BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE shall be comprised of three members. The committee shall be responsible for and in charge of the upkeep and repairs of the Associational building, grounds, and equipment.

SECTION 15. THE PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

A. The Committee shall be composed of 7 members of which 3 are pastors.

B. They shall recommend policies and procedures for the selection, supervision and termination of Associational staff personnel. Those policies and procedures shall be approved by the Association.

C. Prepare and maintain an organizational manual relation to the Association's staff personnel.

D. Develop and recommend to the association policies and procedures for paid and volunteer staff personnel.

E. Develop policies and procedures regarding continuing education and development for the Director of Missions and other Associational staff.

F. When a staff vacancy occurs, other than the DOM, they shall serve as the search committee. When a DOM vacancy occurs, they shall nominate a search committee and present it to the Executive Committee.

G. The Personnel Committee shall handle grievances as outlined in the grievance policy.

ARTICLE XII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

The ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Director of Missions, the Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the Program Leaders: Sunday School, Discipleship Director, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood Director, Chairman of Deacons, Missions Development Director, Chairman of Evangelism, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Vacation Bible School Director, Youth Director, Director of the Singles, Director of the Senior Adults, and Music Director. The Director of Missions is to serve as Chairman and a secretary shall be elected from the group.

The purpose of the council is to coordinate the planning of the various programs of the Association, to develop an Associational calendar, and to give mutual support to the various organization and program units in carrying out their assignments.

The council shall meet quarterly.

ARTICLE XIII. THE ASSOCIATIONAL PASTORS' CONFERENCE

The Associational Pastors' Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist ministers of the Association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, Associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

ARTICLE XIV. JOB DESCRIPTION, DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

SECTION 1. Title and Functions.

A. Position Title. This position shall be known as the Director of Missions for the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association.

B. Basic Functions. The Director of Missions shall serve as minister to the churches and church leaders of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association, as mission strategist for the Association, as chief administrative officer for the Association, and as a general leader of the Association.

SECTION 2. Responsibilities.

A. Minister to Churches and Church Leaders.

1. The Director of Missions shall serve as pastor to the pastors of the Association. Upon request, the Director of Missions shall provide counseling and consultation for pastors regarding spiritual, vocational, congregational, personal or family concerns. The Director of Missions shall be available to assist pastors considering a move, shall orient new pastors to the Association, shall develop systems of pastoral support and fellowship, and shall provide growth opportunities for pastors.

2. Upon request, the Director of Missions shall assist and counsel pastors and church leaders regarding ministries, programs and procedures within the churches, including but not limited to building planning, budget procedures, long range or strategy planning, curriculum evaluation or review, issues of church policy and organization, church-community surveys, outreach, and spiritual growth.

3. Upon request, the Director of Missions shall assist and counsel churches regarding the calling of pastors or church staff, conflicts between a pastor and church, or conflicts within a church's fellowship. The Director of Missions shall assist churches without a pastor in their ministries and programs at their request and shall provide advice for persons considering a Christian vocation.

4. The Director of Missions shall be available upon request to preach or teach in and for churches on such occasions as revivals, pulpit supply, study courses, stewardship or missions emphasis, promotion or recognition assemblies and services, special day addresses, Vacation Bible School, and similar events.

5. The Director of Missions shall take the initiative to regularly visit churches for worship and fellowship, taking care to treat all churches as equal partners in the Association.

6. The Director of Missions shall develop opportunities to foster fellowship and mutual commitment between and among the churches.

B. Mission Strategist.

1. The Director of Missions shall encourage churches to develop and maintain a missions perspective and to extend their ministries and outreach beyond the local church field and community through broader involvement and cooperation with other churches in missions activities.

2. The Director of Missions shall interpret to the churches the needs of persons and groups within the Association's area and shall lead the Association to start new churches or ministry activities appropriate to the needs.

3. The Director of Missions shall encourage and lead volunteer involvement in mission activities beyond the Association's boundaries, such as home and foreign missions partnerships and disaster relief.

4. The Director of Missions shall interpret to the Association the mission work of the churches and conventions of the denomination at the state and national levels and shall encourage churches to support such work with their prayers, finances and personal commitment.

C. Chief Administrative Officer.

1. The Director of Missions shall administer all policies and instructions committed to that office by the Association in annual session or by the Executive Committee.

2. The Director of Missions shall work with the Executive Committee to plan, organize, coordinate, communicate and evaluate the total work of the Association.

3. The Director of Missions shall work with and assist Associational officers, committees and program leaders to implement the specific objectives of the Association and to communicate these activities to the churches and encourage their involvement.

4. The Director of Missions shall serve as an ex officio member of all committees and program departments of the Association.

5. The Director of Missions shall publish a regular Associational news medium to promote the work and fellowship of the Association among the churches and shall otherwise communicate with the churches as required.

6. The Director of Missions shall supervise the Associational office staff and any volunteers or other paid employees, full or part time, who are directly involved in ministries or activities sponsored by the Association.

7. The Director of Missions shall act as office and property manager and purchasing agent for the Association in all matters not assigned to the Trustees of the Association.

D. General Leader of the Association.

1. The Director of Missions shall interpret the work of the Association in the churches.

2. The Director of Missions shall maintain relationships with pertinent Baptist conventions and bodies, and especially with those denominational offices charged with Associational development and support, informing those bodies of the needs and potentialities in the Association and interpreting the overall work of the denomination to the churches.

3. The Director of Missions shall relate to other Christian and service organizations, such as local relief and assistance groups, hospital chaplaincy programs, groups that minister to the homebound or terminally ill, ministerial conferences or support groups, and similar organizations, as appropriate.

4. The Director of Missions shall relate to and represent the work of the Association to various business, social, educational, governmental and civic groups.

5. The Director of Missions shall act as chief public relations and information officer for the Association, promoting its work to the general public through the various communications media and responding to inquiries and requests for information as required.

SECTION 3. Terms of Employment.

A. Employment. The Director of Missions is employed by the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association.

B. Call, Termination and Interim.

1. A person shall be called to the office of Director of Missions according to the following procedures:

a. When a vacancy occurs in the office of Director of Missions, the Personnel Committee shall nominate a search committee to be elected by the Executive Committee. Election of the search committee shall take place within 30 days of the occurrence of the vacancy. If a regular meeting of the Executive Committee is not scheduled within 30 days, a special meeting shall be called by the Moderator. Executive Committee members shall be given two weeks' written notice of the names of the nominees to serve on the search committee and the date, time and place of the meeting.

b. Once elected, the search committee shall solicit and screen candidates according to qualifications and procedures which the committee shall determine. The search committee shall recommend and present one candidate for election by the Association.

c. Election of the candidate by the Association shall take place within 30 days of the search committee's decision to recommend. If the annual session of the Association is not scheduled within 30 days, a special session of the Association shall be called by the Moderator. The Association shall be given two weeks' written notice of the name of the candidate and the date, time, and place of the meeting.

d. Election of the candidate shall be by majority vote. If the candidate fails to receive a majority vote, the search committee shall be immediately dissolved and the Personnel Committee shall begin the process over again.

2. The term of service of the Director of Missions shall be indefinite. Employment of the Director of Missions may be terminated according to the following procedures:

a. The Director of Missions may resign by giving written notice 60 days in advance. The resignation may be accepted on behalf of the Association by the Executive Committee in regular or called session. By mutual agreement of the Director of Missions and the Executive Committee, the period of 60 days' notice may be waived.

b. The Director of Missions may be involuntarily terminated by the Association in annual or called session.

(1) No final action to terminate the Director of Missions shall occur unless both the Director of Missions and the Association have endeavored to resolve any existing conflict by lesser means. In addition, no final action to terminate the Director of Missions shall occur without prior investigation by the Personnel Committee according to established grievance procedures. The Personnel Committee shall then make a report of its findings to the Association. The Association shall consider, but shall not be bound by or required to follow, the recommendations of the Personnel Committee. If such an investigation and report has not occurred, any action to terminate the Director of Missions shall be referred to the Personnel Committee for investigation before final action is taken.

(2) Action by the Association to terminate the Director of Missions, whether in annual or called session, shall require 30 days' written notice to the Association following completion of the Personnel Committee's investigation. Action to terminate shall be by majority vote.

(3) If the Association in session votes to terminate, the Director of Missions shall receive full pay and benefits for a period of 60 days following the effective date of the termination.

3. When a vacancy occurs in the office of Director of Missions, the Executive Committee may elect an Interim Director of Missions according to the following procedure:

a. The Personnel Committee shall recommend a candidate, negotiate terms of employment, and present the recommendations to the Executive Committee for approval. Such election may take place at the same time and in the same manner as election of the search committee, or at any other appropriate time.

b. The Personnel Committee shall supervise the work of the Interim Director of Missions. Authority to extend, terminate, or otherwise change the terms of employment of the Interim Director of Missions shall be retained by the Executive Committee.

C. Accountability.

1. The Director of Missions shall be supervised by the Personnel Committee acting on behalf of the Association.

2. The Personnel Committee shall arrange for an annual evaluation of the Director of Missions.

3. The Personnel Committee shall establish a grievance policy to provide an orderly and appropriate process to hear grievances and complaints against the Director of Missions by members or churches of the Association.

D. Pay and Benefits.

1. Salary, retirement, insurance and other financial benefits for the Director of Missions shall be proposed by the Budget and Finance Committee and established by the Association in the annual budget. The Budget and Finance Committee shall solicit recommendations concerning pay and benefits for the Director of Missions from the Personnel Committee, but shall not be bound to accept those recommendations.

2. Travel allowance for the Director of Missions shall be deemed by the Association to be a business expense and not a personal benefit for the Director of Missions.

3. The Director of Missions shall receive two weeks paid vacation annually. The period of two weeks shall incorporate ten working days, including two Sundays. Unused vacation shall not accrue to the following year.

4. The Director of Missions shall receive sick leave at the rate of one day per month, accruing on the first day of the month, not to exceed 120 working days. Additional sick leave may be credited against future months. If the Director of Missions is involuntarily terminated by the Association, any unused sick leave accrued shall be financially reimbursed to the Director of Missions in addition to the 60 days' pay and benefits required by the act of termination.

5. The Director of Missions shall be granted one day off each week in addition to Saturday.

6. The following holidays shall be observed: New Year's Day, Easter Monday, Memorial Day, July 4, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Thursday and Friday, and December 25 and 26 at Christmas.

7. The Association acknowledges the flexibility of schedule required by the Director of Missions. The Director of Missions' time shall be organized in a professional manner, with the work schedule devoted to activities that will benefit the work of the Association, whether in the office or on the field and whether during the normal work day or at night. The Director of Missions shall establish office hours for the office secretary and shall be available, either through personal office hours or some other established procedure, to any in the Association needing assistance.

8. The Director of Missions may attend denominational conventions and meetings, continuing education and professional development events, and other assemblies and conferences pertaining to the work of the office. The Association through its annual budget may reimburse the Director of Missions for expenses incurred while attending such meetings.

9. The Director of Missions may use up to three weeks of paid leave annually to lead or participate in revivals, world missions conferences, and similar meetings outside the Association, which result in an honorarium or other reimbursement above and beyond expenses. The Director of Missions may lead revivals and conferences within the Association as schedule permits, such activities being included in the job responsibility of minister to the churches of the Association.

10. The Director of Missions may serve as interim pastor of a church or churches in the Association. Such activity may not exceed three months in a given calendar year without prior approval of the Personnel Committee. The Director of Missions may engage in pulpit supply and similar activities as schedule permits, such activities being included in the job responsibility of minister to the churches of the Association.

11. The Director of Missions may lead or participate in mission trips, mission partnerships, disaster relief, and other direct mission opportunities outside the Association, such activities being included in the job responsibility of mission strategist for the Association. Such activities may not exceed three weeks in a given calendar year without prior approval of the Personnel Committee.

12. The Director of Missions shall keep a record of leave and time spent off the Associational field, including vacation, sick leave, conventions and conferences, continuing education events, revivals and similar meetings, and mission trips. The record shall be submitted to and maintained by the Treasurer of the Association.

13. The Director of Missions shall be free to use off duty time to engage in personal activities and pursuits. Such activities shall not interfere with the professional responsibilities or activities and meetings that require the presence of the Director of Missions. The Director of Missions shall be aware that all personal activities reflect on the office and the job responsibility of general leader of the Association.

14. No honorarium shall be expected or required for any service performed by the Director of Missions in conjunction with official duties. However, any individual, group or church is free to present an honorarium if they so desire, and such may be retained by the Director of Missions and not submitted to the Association.

SECTION 4. Adoption.

A. This job description supersedes, repeals and takes the place of any conflicting articles or statements in this Constitution or other documents of the Association.

B. The Personnel Committee shall be responsible to maintain, update and revise this job description as required, making recommendations to the Association for approval as they are needed.

ARTICLE XV. AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Constitutional Committee at least 10 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the Association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.

ARTICLE XVI. NON-PROFIT STATUS

The Tuckaseegee Baptist Association, Inc. is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, and educational purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

No part of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association, Inc. shall inure to the benefit of its' members, directors, officers, or other persons except that the organization shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the exempt purposes of the organization.

In the event of dissolution, the residual assets of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association, Inc. will be turned over to one or more organizations with similar purposes which are exempt as organizations described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.
