In addition to courses offered on campus, students may earn up to eight semester hours' credit for the completion during the summer of a basic unit of clinical pastoral education at an accredited training center as provided in the Catalog, 1987-89, p. 107. In order for credit to be received, the student must register with the Registrar prior to the beginning of the program and the supervisor must file a grade report form at the conclusion of the course (M 4360s-M 4361s).

ADMISSION

Currently enrolled students need only to register on the designated days.

Students applying for admission to degree programs who plan to begin studies in either term of summer school should follow the admission instructions as outlined in the Catalog, 1987-89, pp. 25f, and register on the designated days.

Applications for admission to the summer school on any other basis should be received in the Registrar's Office at least fifteen days prior to the registration date. For additional information, write: Registrar, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, North Carolina 27587.

SUMMER SCHOOL SESSION

The matriculation fee for summer school is \$70.00 per term. This fee is not refundable after 4:30 p.m. on June 9 for the first term or after 4:30 p.m. on July 11 for the second term. The cost of books and supplies varies depending on courses taken.

In addition to the matriculation fee, each summer school student will be charged a Summer School Student Services Fee of \$8.00. (See page 30 of 1987-89 Catalog.)

HOUSING

Inquiries concerning housing accommodations for the summer terms should be directed to the Director of Housing. Dormitory rental rates are \$95.00 for double occupancy for men, \$105.00 for women in the Lolley Dormitory, \$80.00 for women in Simmons. Duplex Apartments are \$198.00 a month for a one-bedroom apartment and \$209.00 a month for two bedrooms. The Townhouse Apartments are \$253.00 a month for two bedrooms and \$268.00 a month for three bedrooms.

ACCREDITATION

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is accredited by the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada and by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

CURRICULUM*

The curriculum consists of courses for students continuing in the A.Div., M.Div., M.A.C.E. and M.A.C.M. programs, or entering candidates for those degrees. Th.M. or D.Min. students may take advanced electives. Applications for admission to summer school are welcomed from alumni or others who want to pursue post-degree studies.

The maximum course load permitted per term is four semester hours, H 2324s, H 2456s, and M 4231s excepted. Students who elect language study may take only that course.

Classes meet four days a week, Tuesday through Friday, unless otherwise noted.

The seminary reserves the right to limit the size of classes in order to maintain a reasonable student-teacher ratio or to cancel a course if enrollment is not sufficient.

In addition to courses offered on campus, students may earn up to eight semester hours' credit for the completion during the summer of a basic unit of clinical pastoral education at an accredited training center as provided in the Catalog, 1987-89, p. 107. In order for credit to be received, the student must register with the Registrar prior to the beginning of the program and the supervisor must file a grade report form at the conclusion of the course (M 4360s-M 4361s).

WITHDRAWAL

Withdrawal from a course without penalty is permitted until 4:30 p.m., June 9 in the first term and until 4:30 p.m., July 11 in the second term. Students wishing to withdraw from a course or from enrollment should consult the Registrar for guidance. A student enrolled for only one course who withdraws from that course must complete the process for withdrawal from enrollment.

H 2324s Practicum in Home Missions

Mr. Braswell

A combination of academic study and field missionary experience conducted in selected settings under approved supervision, in cooperation with the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. 10 weeks summer practicum or one semester, open to middlers, seniors and graduate students. 8 semester hours. June 1-August 10, 1989. Permission of instructor required.

H 2350s Practicum in World Religions

Mr. Braswell

A combination of academic study and field experience conducted in selected settings among centers of world religionists in the Research Triangle Area and/or Washington, D.C. 2 semester hours. May 12-17, 1989. Prerequisites: H 2220 or H 2222 or by permission of the instructor.

H 2456s Practicum in Evangelism

Mr. Miles

A combination of academic study and field experience in the practice of evangelism conducted in selected settings under approved supervision, in cooperation with the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention and/or Baptist state conventions and local churches. Ten weeks summer practicum, 8 semester hours. Limited enrollment.

Prerequisite: permission of instructor required. June 1- August 10, 1989.

T 3323s The Church and Social Change

Mr. Hewitt

A study of selected ecumenical, denominational and church models for social change with special attention to the church's social strategy and the theological justification for programs of social reform. May require off-campus travel. 3 semester hours. Prerequisite: T 3300 and permission of instructor required. May 18-27, 1989.

M 4232s Workshop on Urban Studies


Mr. Bland

A workshop designed for Baptist church, associational and denominational leaders, treating Christian mission and ministries in urban settings, with special attention to the work of the association and mission strategy. New York City. 2 semester hours. Prerequisite: Special application required. May 20-26, 1989.

M 5156s Practicum in Music Ministry

Mr. Good

On-the-site examination of the music ministries of selected Southern Baptist churches of various sizes and locales. 2 semester hours. May 15-19, 1989.

An introduction to the fundamentals of classical Hebrew with primary emphasis on the strong verb and basic vocabulary. Credit will be given only if both B 1100 and B 1101 are satisfactorily completed. 3 semester hours.

M 4231s Seminar on Urban Studies **Mr. Bland**

A study of structures and problems of the secular city, including an evaluation of efforts toward renewal of the churches. 6 semester hours. Monday-Friday. Special application required.

B 1621s The Gospel of Mark **Mr. Cook**

A critical interpretation of the Gospel of Mark based on the English text. 2 semester hours.

AH 2434s Equipping Churches for Evangelism **Mr. Miles**

Intensive training in contemporary methods for equipping and leading small groups and individuals in a local church to engage in personal evangelism. Attention will be given to overcoming barriers to evangelization. 2 semester hours.

H 2142s Baptist History and Heritage **Mr. Halbrooks**

A course designed to give the student an understanding of what it has meant to live and work in a Baptist context. Included will be a study of Baptist origins and development, the major theological emphases of Baptists, their literature, their denominational structures, and the relation of all of these areas to current issues in Baptist life. 2 semester hours.

AT 3331s Alcohol and Drug Abuse **Mr. Hewitt**

A study of the nature, causes, extent and possible treatment of problems related to the use of alcohol and other drugs in the light of biblical, theological and scientific perspectives. 2 semester hours.

T 3052s The Atonement **Mr. Culpepper**

A biblical and historical study of the doctrine of the Atonement. 2 semester hours.

A study of the nature, causes, extent and possible treatment of problems related to the use of alcohol and other drugs in the light of biblical, theological and scientific perspectives. 2 semester hours.

A historical study of music in the structure of corporate worship. 2 semester hours.
