THURSDAY AFTERNOON, AUGUST 10th

Agreeably to order, though there was no report, the Orphanage was discussed by Dr. E. B. Dillard.

Dr. E. E. Bomar offered the following resolution, which, after discussion by E. E. Bomar, Dr. Dillard and Walter Gilmore, was unanimously adopted:

"Resolved, That Carolina Baptist Association in its 47th session at Refuge Church, August 9th, 1923, respectfully request the Orphanage Board, cooperating with the State Board of Missions and any other related agency, to establish a branch of our Orphanage system some where west of the Blue Ridge Mountains. In making this request we reiterate our love for and loyalty to the Orphanage as now established, but such is the situation in the State that the need for an orphanage in our midst appears imperative. We also believe that our people will support an orphanage in the Mountain Section and that it will help all our cooperative work".

Bro. A. I. Justice submitted a separate resolution which was seconded by E. E. Bomar, and adopted unanimously, pledging our churches to loyal support of the Orphanage as it is now and urging all churches to make a collection for it once a month, either through the Sunday School or by the church congregation or in any way the churches may deem best. A committee was appointed to submit the Orphanage resolution to the Board at Thomasville and to other Associations, namely: E. E. Bomar, E. E. Lance, S. S. Rosier.

Brother Hugh Morrison was appointed to write B. Y. P. U. report for the night session.

The report on Education was submitted by W. B. Sinclair and discussed by W. B. Sinclair, J. J. Slattery, W. M. Wilson, Miss Martha Sullinger and

REPORT ON BAPTIST YOUNG PEOPLE'S UNION

The B. Y. P. U. is the Training Service of a Baptist Church and as such should be under church control, supported by the church financially and otherwise. The church should elect its officers, publicly install them and recognize them as church officers and call upon them for reports. The B. Y. P. U. is a church task and should be assumed seriously as such by the Church. Churches are weak because the members are weak. In the future our churches will be strong in just the proportion that we take and enlist our constituency in Kingdom service.

Today the B. Y. P. U. outlook is splendid in every way, though in our Association we are just beginning to take earnest hold on it.

REPORT OF WOMAN'S MISSIONARY UNION

The activities of the W. M. U. for Carolina Association embraces not only the regular educational and social work and the doing of women's part in the 75 Million Campaign, but also Personal Service (visiting the sick and strangers and providing for the needy), Mission Study, Stewardship and securing subscriptions for our denominational papers.

Total amount contributed by the Women's Societies in the few churches in Carolina Association which have societies for the year ending March 31, 1923, was \$1852.31. This is next to the largest payments since the beginning of the Campaign. The women are not, as a whole, behind with their pledges, but some individuals are.

In Mission Study, 51 Certificates were awarded Fruitland Institute Y. W. A. Fruitland Church one class also. Hendersonville First 20 Certificates and 17 Seals.

A special feature of W. M. U. Associational work was the raising of \$125 for Hospital Bed in the Baptist Hospital, Winston-Salem.

Subscriptions to "Home and Foreign Fields," 32; to "Biblical Record," 23; to "Royal Service," 42. There are only 39 tithers reported.

STATE MISSION REPORT

The North Carolina Baptist State Convention was organized ninety-three years ago. The purpose for the organization as set forth in the beginning was primarily to give the Gospel to North Carolina, and through North Carolina out to the ends of the earth. Our denominational growth in the State since the organization has been phenomenal.

The work of State Missions is divided into several departments:

1. Department of Missionary Pastoral Assistance.

One hundred seventy-five Missionaries have been employed this year. While we cannot give a detailed statement of their activities because the year has not closed, we give the following statement of activities for last year:

2. Department of Enlistment.

This is comparatively a new department, the purpose and object is to aid the pastors of our rural churches in the work of enlisting and developing the church membership along all the lines of our denominational activities. The results from this department of our work have been very satisfactory. Pastoral fields have been formed, and the work of pastoral support has gone forward in a great way among many of our country churches.

3. Department of Sunday Schools.

This is perhaps the oldest department of our work. Twenty-eight years of Sunday School activity has placed us in the front ranks in Sunday School work among Southern Baptists. We owe an everlasting debt of gratitude to Secretary E. L. Middleton for his faithful sacrificial and untiring efforts to bring North Carolina Baptist Sunday Schools to such a high degree.

5. Department of W. M. U.

The Woman's Missionary Union continues its noble mission of high

endeavor and sacrificial service among the churches. Wherever we have an organized and devoted band of women in the church the problem of missions and benevolence is already solved. We again urge our pastors to give the greatest encouragement to the efforts of the noble women of their church.

It is gratifying to know that North Carolina Union leads the South in its Young People's Work so far as gifts are concerned. Both the Sunbeams and the Y. W. A. reported the largest contributions of any State in the Southern Baptist Convention.

6. Department of Evangelism.

Our Convention has only recently launched out in the Department of Evangelism. The reports that come from the workers in this department should fill us with profoundest gratitude. Thousands have been converted and baptized, and many have volunteered for Christian Service, and in many other ways that we have not space to mention. Blessings have come to the churches where these consecrated workers have been.

7. Department of Church Building.

This is a day of church building, and some years ago our State Convention realized the necessity of a special fund established the department of church building by means of the little aid which many of our struggling churches have received from this fund. They have been enabled to provide themselves with comfortable houses in which to worship.

In this era of church building, the calls have come from so many sources and the cry for help has been so great and yet the State Mission Board has been enabled to do comparatively little in this department for want of funds.

The work of the State Mission Board is growing by leaps and bounds. There are more demands for assistance today than ever before and our resources are wholly inadequate to meet the needs pressing in upon us from every side.

Your Committee would make an earnest appeal to the churches of the Carolina Association to do their full duty in coming to the relief of our State Mission Board in this time of trying need.

HOME MISSION REPORT

The Home Mission Board made a great report to the Southern Baptist Convention in Kansas City last May. When the Convention met in that city eighteen years ago, the Board's receipts for that year were \$169,988.92. This year they were \$1,002,193.07.

Then the Board reported 10,551 baptisms, this year 38,770. Then there were 20,570 additions to the churches, this year 59,597. In 1905 the Board had no special department of Evangelism. Shortly after that the department was organized and through it there have been 152,846 converts baptized, 208,643 additions to the churches and 23,260 volunteers for the ministry or definite mission work.

All the other departments of the Board's work have advanced in a similar way.

While Southern Baptists have made mighty progress there are greater needs and vaster opportunities at present than ever before in our history.

There are millions of lost souls whom we must reach and our people must be enlisted in all our denominational life and activities.

Our Home Mission Board is heavily in debt on account of the great enlargement of the work and the falling off in receipts due largely to the deflation in prices in general.

The last report of the Board states, that if we raise \$75,000,000 by the close of the 75 Million Campaign and the Home Board receives its due proportion, the Board's debt can be paid and the Board's work increased fifty per cent over its present operations.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS

Our Foreign Mission work grows. We have now 891 churches in sixteen foreign lands; 211 or practically one-fourth of these churches are self-supporting; 442 or one-half have their own houses of worship. In addition to the churches there are 2,896 out-stations which give us a total of practically 4,000 stations where the Word of God is preached regularly. Last year was the crowning year in baptisms, 12,611 were baptized, which is 4,720 more than reported the year before. We have passed the 100,000 mark in membership. We have 103,328 members. These gave \$4.23 per capita last year. We have 796 schools which were attended last year by 32,789 scholars. This is about equal to the number of students in our Baptist schools in the Southland. Of course all of our schools in foreign lands are not of equal grade to those in the South, but we have our students in these foreign lands under our tutelage quite as long as we have the students in our Southern schools.

There were 1447 Sunday Schools, which had an enrollment of 67,407.

We have now 501 foreign missionaries and 2,820 native missionaries. This is almost twice as many foreign missionaries and almost four times as many native missionaries as we had in 1919 at the beginning of the 75 Million Campaign.

The Board reported a debt of \$403,000 at the last Southern Baptist Convention. There has been no disposition to criticize the Board because everybody has realized that the Board has been very conservative in making appropriations. It has appropriated only a little above one-half of the amount that was proposed for it in the 75 Million Campaign. The Convention was very serious about the situation, and was anxious to do something to set this great Board forward in its wonderful work.

After hearing of the Board's financial condition and of the more than fifty young people who were ready to be sent out to the foreign fields this year, the Convention passed a most remarkable endorsement of the Board by raising through voluntary subscriptions from delegates present enough money to send out these new missionaries. That was a very practical endorsement. It took place in one of the most spiritual hours the Southern Baptist Convention ever experienced. The story of that Friday night's session of the Convention has carried inspiration not only to great numbers of churches in the homeland but has enheartened the missionaries on every foreign field.

In the spirit of what took place at the Southern Baptist Convention the Board at its June Meeting appointed forty-eight new missionaries who in the early fall of this year will go to their fields.

The practical suggestion for everybody to take to heart at this critical time when the Board is burdened with debt, overwhelmed by growth of the work, and appalled by vast unmet needs, is that every one should do his utmost to pay his 75 Million Campaign pledge in full this year. If these pledges are paid fully, the Board can pay its debts, support the missionaries

and provide for many, many more distressing needs. The simple solution of our present situation is the payment of our 75 Million Campaign pledges. This is the biggest need for Foreign Missions this year. Now is the time to go forward.

FOUR YEARS OF MINISTERIAL RELIEF AMONG SOUTHERN BAPTISTS

From the best estimate that we can get, Southern Baptists, in all the states put together, paid to their old preachers in the three years preceding the 75 Million Campaign, in round numbers, \$116,000.00. In the past three years, since the beginning of the Campaign, we have increased the yearly allowance paid to our beneficiaries over the estimated three years immediately preceding the Campaign, \$184,173.31, an average of more than \$61,000.00 per year. While this increase is gratifying, we are by no means doing what we should do. With the fixed income herein referred to, in addition to current receipts, we shall be enabled to increase the stipends of our beneficiaries at least 60 per cent, which will bring us to a point in our work where we shall have made great strides in solving our relief problem.

The Board has now a beneficiary list of between eight and nine hundred. Others are being added from month to month. Number of beneficiaries in North Carolina, 43 men and 35 widows, making a total of 78. While we have made great strides since the organization of the new Convention Board, in giving aid and comfort to the disabled and retired ministers, we are not beginning to do what we should do.

REPORT ON THE STATE OF THE CHURCHES

First, we rejoice to hear continually of blessed revival meetings in many of our churches. We wish that all churches would report the results of these meetings in letters to the Association. Not many more than half of the churches within our bounds send letters or have representatives in the Association. It would help us all greatly if the churches, even though they have no financial report to make, would make reports showing conversions and baptisms.

But there is no decided indication of a sweeping revival.

We note with pleasure that many churches through the Sunday Schools are making monthly contributions to the orphanage.

There are some indications of decided advance by our churches. For instance, Salem Church has bought a large lot in Fletcher and hopes to build a church on it soon. Saluda has gone to full time with M. C. Lunsford as pastor. So also Tryon with T. L. Justice as pastor. More and more our churches favor grouping so as to call one pastor for all his time. The work of several churches like the First Hendersonville, East Flat Rock, Mud Creek, Bat Cave, Jones Gap, and others, have been much blest.

With regard to payment of pledges on the 75 Million Campaign, some churches are up and some behind, but we believe that our people will pay in full by the end the Campaign.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

Since the New Testament is plain on the doctrine of Christian Stewardship; since there is a far-reaching revival of Stewardship sweeping the churches of America today; since the co-operating interests at home and abroad are in distressing need of financial relief at this time; since our people are well able to finance this program; and since our Southern Baptist Convention through its conservative commission has launched a South-wide Stewardship and Budget Campaign to function through the State organizations and the district associations;

Therefore, be it recommended:

1. That we ask our people in the churches to pray with one accord for an old-time revival of Spiritual Christianity, a revival of repentance and faith, a revival that will cause our people to turn from pleasure-loving self-indulgence to self-denial and Christian Stewardship; a revival shot through with the Spirit, the principles and the methods of New Testament Evangelism.

2. That this Association now assembled advise the churches co-operating in this body to teach the doctrines of Christian Stewardship of life as well as money, and that we advise them to budget their finances as early as possible.

3. That we advise that local current expenses within the churches and outside general interests supported by the churches be kept separate in all of the accounting and remitting by the churches.

4. That we suggest an every-member canvass be put on in each church as early as possible to provide funds in cash and pledges to finance the unified budget.

5. That we urge regular and systematic giving, including the tithe, together with all higher standards of Christian Stewardship be applied in the churches as far as possible.

6. That we request the churches to remit in a regular and systematic way through the established denominational channels all money given to outside co-operating interests.

7. That we request the churches to pay their pastors' and other current expenses in a regular and systematic way.

REPORT ON EDUCATION

We call especial attention to the interest in education, now becoming general, as is evidenced by a greatly increased attendance in all schools, Public, State, and Denominational. The great problem now is how to make room for many others desirous of entering. In the public schools this show of interest may be due, in part, to the legal requirements; but in high schools and colleges it is due to the awakening of our people to the need of training and preparation to meet the demands of a more complex civilization.

With this increasing interest in education there comes a growing demand for a deeper loyalty, too, and a better patronage of our Church Schools. Because our denominational institutions alone train our students in such a way that they can save the world from the doubt and despair that seem to be enveloping our whole civilization.

Our denominational institutions, Wake Forest, Meredith, The Seminary at Louisville, the Baptist Institute of New Orleans, and others are making valuable contributions to the great work of the Kingdom, and their ultimate aim is to fulfil, by these contributions, the Great Commission.

Our preparatory schools also deserve especial attention for the great work they are doing. These schools not only prepare our young people for college, but they give splendid preparation for those who may not be able to attend higher institutions. Also, it is through these schools only that we can hope to perpetuate our denominational work.

We take great pride in the record of our own Association school, Fruitland Institute. The work being done in this school is seldom equalled and its work has been its only advertisement in the past. Fruitland had a capacity attendance last year, and out of the nineteen graduates, sixteen were Henderson County boys and girls. This achievement among our own people should command even more loyalty and financial support in the county and in the Carolina Association than the school has yet received. Full attendance is expected this year and the equipment is better than it has been before. New seats will be put into the auditorium by the opening this year.

Let us rally behind our church schools and as the world complains of unrest we shall be able to supply the only sure antidote—Christian Education. And this means not only mental culture and material progress, but our duty to our country and our God.

REPORT ON THE ORGANIZATION AND WORK OF THE BROTHERHOOD AT MUD CREEK CHURCH

On January 11, 1923, there was a meeting at Mud Creek Church at which there were present Rev. W. M. Wilson, pastor; Dr. Tanner, and others from Spartanburg, and a number of members of Mud Creek Church. The object of this meeting was the organizing of what is known as the Mud Creek Brotherhood. After prayer and a discussion of what the Brotherhood consisted of, it was fully decided to organize a Brotherhood, with the following officers elected: R. S. Steadman, president; Clyde Campfield, vice-president. The following members were elected chairmen of the following committees: W. M. Blackwell, prayer-meeting; W. P. Anders, evangelistic; Smillie McCall, Young People's Work; Arnold Edney, Sunday Schools.

The following is a report of the activity of the Brotherhood at Mud Creek: Have held 91 meetings with an average attendance of 25; have had one conversion; eight restorations, and a large number have consecrated their life to God for actual service. In every meeting an invitation is given to those who are living inconsistent lives to come back and reconsecrate their lives for service. Invitations are also given to those who have never accepted Christ as their Saviour, to do so.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

Baptist Sunday School work in North Carolina has shown marvelous growth and development during the past year in numbers of schools, in membership, in efficiency of organization, in buildings and equipment, in teacher training. Under the leadership of Secretary E. L. Middleton and his co-workers these things have been stressed as a means to the end that the Word of God may be so taught as to lead people to a personal knowledge of Jesus Christ as Saviour from sin, to the acceptance and public profession of Him as Saviour and to growth in grace and knowledge of our Lord Jesus Christ.

Number

We stand first among the states in the South in the number of Sunday Schools to the number of churches, having 2,174 Baptist Sunday Schools in the State. New Sunday Schools are being organized every year but the aim is a Sunday School in every Baptist Church in the State.

Membership

In membership we rank second, with 265,496 enrolled in Sunday Schools. For every 100 church members there are nearly 82 people in Sunday School in North Carolina. But 45 of these are not church members and we are facing the humiliating fact that our Sunday School enrollment is far behind our church enrollment. There are at least 500,000 people who belong to our constituency and go to no Sunday School. If they are not in Sunday School, it is most probable that the Word is not being hid in their hearts. One of our big tasks is to enlist our church members in the Bible School. Another, is to reach and train the 250,000 children who belong to Baptist Sunday Schools.

Organization

The Standard of Excellence as erected by the Baptist Sunday School Board, Nashville, is being recognized more and more as a measure of efficiency and a well-rounded and worth-while program. We rank second in standard schools, twenty-seven having attained the standard to date. In addition, two Sunday Schools have reached the Advanced or AA-1 Standard. There are only four other such schools in the Southern Baptist Convention.

Buildings and Equipment

Buildings are being improved as never before in order to adequately care for improved Sunday Schools, with corresponding improvement in equipment. Over 100 new or remodeled church houses are being built. The Architectural Department of the Sunday School Board stands ready to furnish expert advice so that money invested in buildings may be wisely spent to meet modern needs.

Teacher Training

It is the very heart and life of all Sunday School work. Without trained teachers, inferior work is inevitable. With trained teachers, almost any ideal is possible. When churches realize the tremendous responsibility of so sacred a task as grafting the living truth of God's will into living souls for time and eternity, they will arouse to the absolute necessity of entrusting that task in the hands of only trained teachers.

Recommendations

The urgency of the Sunday School task calls to each church:

1. To adopt a definite program of persistent effort to reach the unreached and untaught and especially to enlist more of the church members for the Sunday Schools.

2. To provide better buildings and equipment to make a place to hold and really teach the increased number enlisted.

3. To plan for a worth while program of all-round efficiency as embodied in the Standard of Excellence.

4. To adopt a permanent Teacher Training policy looking toward enlisting every teacher and officer in the Normal Course and training prospective officers and teachers for the future.

The Sunday School Department of our State Mission Board stands ready to help any church in putting on these plans.
