Avery Co., N. C., Aug. 29, 1911.

The Three Forks Baptist Association met this day in the 71st annual session in the house of worship of the Mt. Calvary Church.

Louis Shoemaker led the congregation in singing a number of ap-

propriate selections.

Geo. W. Trivett who was appointed by last association to preach the annual sermon, read from the 139th Psalm. After the reading prayer was offered by John Crisp leading. "Rock of Ages" was sung, after which Bro. Trivett announced as his text 1st John 5th c. 11 v.—"And this is the record that God hath given unto us eternal life, and this life is in his Son"—presenting his discourse in three divisions: 1st Life is a gift. 2d It is eternal. 3d It is in His Son.

#### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

The question of Temperance has long agitated the minds of our people. In fact the liquor traffic is the toughest problem of the age. There is no cause, it matters not how unworthy, but what can find supporters. Especially is this true of the liquor business.

By what authoaity do we fight the battles of temperance? Is it a fancy of the brain, or is it a delusion of the imagination, or is it a morbid desire to destroy property? Most assuredly it is none of these. Our authority is the Bible.

1 The Book teaches that drunkenness is a mockery. 2 Its consequences are poverty, strife, filthiness, destruction, and void of refined feelings. 3 It is forbidden to Kings, Princes. and Christians. 4 Its woes are averice, revelry, defiance, perversion, pride, dishonesty. To all soldiers who desire to fight our greatest foe-the liquor traffic-arm yourselves with the Word.

In the next place we desire to say that we have gained some ground within the last year. We have much to encourage us. The temperance legislation of our last General Assembly ought to be commended. Our forces have been reversed in a few instances, but while such is true; we have made progress.

Finally we would speak of our unfinished work. We recemmend to the constituency of this association the following: I That by the means of public meetings, the press, and the pulpit a vigorous and righteous public sentiment be maintained for temperance. 2 That our people write and petition Congress to pass a national anti-jug Law. 3 That we as citizens demand and assist the proper authorities to enforce the Prohibition Laws of North Carolina.

REPORT on BAPTIST ORPHANAGE. The Orphanage at Thomasville is doing a great work and well deserves the hearty support of every loyal Beptist in the State. he first child was received there in 1885. The Orphanage now has 300 children in its charge in ten families preparing them for usefulness in this life and for the life to come. Since the Orphanage was opened it has sheltered 1,102 children, and is now full to its eapacity and has 100 worthy applicants it cannot take for want of roon.

The expense bill averages about one hundred dollars a day and out of 1,700 churches only a-

bout 500 contribute regularly to its support.

Your Committee wishes to submit the humble opinion that no more worthy object that claims our attention. Think of one hundred helpless orphans knocking at our door for admittee and can't be admitted for wan of room! We suggest that all the churches of this association be requested to take at least one collec-

tion a month the coming year for the Orphanage.

STATE MISSIONS.

For convenience only, the great Mission work of the world has been divided into three departments: State, Home, and Foreign; not that anyone is of more importance than another.

The Mission work is nothing more nor less than an effort to carry

out the plain command of Jesus Christ to "preach the gospel to every creature" whether in the State, in the Nation, or in Foreign Countries. God makes no distinction as to the worth of a soul. Wherever a soul is found, or can be found, without the gospel, we are duty-bound to go with the message. State Missions is of the most tremendous importance, aside from its importance in common with the other departments of the Mission work, in that it enlages the base of supplies for all the other work.

The Baptists of the State, through the State Mission Board, in their effort to preach the gospel in the destitute sections of our State have had, during the last year, on these fields 148 Missionaries who have supplied 275 churches and 106 out stations, and have baptized 2,227 persons to which the churches have contributed \$41,428.46. All of

our churches ought to take a liberal part in this work.

#### HOME MISSIONS.

The importance of Home Missions is increasing every day, and as Eaptists we should awake to the stupendous task that awaits us.

Our obligations are greater than all others because we hold the truth as no other people hold it. Therefore our accountability to God is greater. Our work is increasing faster than our gifts.

Out of 92 million population of the U.S. there are only 41 million native white born of American parents, and 24,500,000 are born of foreign p. rents; Therefore 41 million are of foreign parentage!

The ten million Negroes tip the beam of numerical strength in A-

merica by more than 10 per cent. against the native whites.

The foreigners came to our shores last year to the number of 1,041 coo. America then is the world's greatest mission field because of what it is, and what it is to be. If we do not christianize these people they will in turn Romanize and heathenize us. Not only do they exert such an influence upon us but about 33½ per cent. return to their native lands. If we could reach these through Home Missions what a power we could exert through them on their home people. To establish Christ in the hearts and homes of the foreigners is our religious duty and national hope. Not only have we the home-land, but we have Cuba and the Canal Zone both under the religious influence of the Roman Catholics. All these are looking to us for the Bread of Life. Brethren: considering the supreme importance of Home Missions and our ssrategical position as Southern Baptists, we should undertake greater things for God and expect greater things from God through Home Missions.

The Board of Home Missions spent last year more than \$333,000, yet it could not supply more than I man for more than I too needed.

# PASTORAL SUPPORT,

"That the laborer is worthy af his hire" is abundantly taught in the Bible there is no doubt on the part of Baptists. Luke 10:7, Mat. 10:10, and 1st Tim. 5:18, &c. That the Baptists of the Three Forks association are not living up to this faith in the matter of pastoral support is evidenced by the reports of the various churches; said reports showing, in 1905, an average for 31 churches that reported that year, of \$36.58. In 1907 38.30. In 1908 44.63. In 1910, 33 churches show an average of \$41.67. The average salary for above 4 years being \$41.05. The average membership is 97. The average amount paid for these four years per member 43 cts. per year. That these figures are hardly a creditable showing goes without saying.

We your committee therefore make these observations:

I That the Lord God is not calling our young men to the ministry only 3 or 4 having ceen called in the last decade.

2 That these few, for lack of sufficient support here, have been

compelled to seek other fields.

3 That the present ministers are rapidly declining in years, and, unless conditions change, there will be a pastoral famine before many Respectfully submitted, years.

G. P. Sherrill said all members of the church ought to lay something by all along in order that they may always be ready to help.

Pastors and that we may suffer for the same.

J. W. Farthing said that this is certainly a matter of the first importance, and that we would certainly prefer to see our own men call ed to preach rather than that pastors should have to be obtained from some other section. C. J. Cottrell said our Pastors are certainly the most poorly paid of any class of workers.

John Norris said go to the Bible for plain information as to duty to pastors. J. F. Eller said that we must get to a point of appreciation

where we can pay for laborers.

J. C. Chapel said the churches must adopt a system of paying the pastors, otherwise the churches will fall short.

Your Committee is exceedingly glad to report, that after making a careful survey of the churches of our association as we possibly can, that a very large percent. have been blessed with good revivals within the past year. A large addition to their membership is repor ted to this session of the association.

While we are most grateful for these gracious showers of grace, we feel confident that there are at least four things in which almost

all of our churches are seriously wanting:

1st Notwithstanding gracious revivals, in this day of commercialism when the world is in a run, it is very difficult to maintain that high standard of Spirituality which is so necessary to the growth & development of the church, and which is the base of all church life and work. Every pastor and every member ought to keep this one thing above all else prominently before him. If this one thing be lacking all else will fail. Religion must be intensely religious.

and We are of the opininion that Discipline is growing rather lax in many of our churches. There must be a distinction between the church and the the world, else the church cannot have power over the world. Our churches are evidently failing to do what they ought to do, and what they are easily able to do in a financial way. This we attribute to two causes. The first cause we give as the 3d thing in wiich our churches are lacking:

INFORMATION.

It is next to an impossibility to interest the membership of any church in the different departments and objects to which the church contributes, unless the individual is informed and this information must come very largely through reading. We feel that the work is suffering greatly from the lack of reading.

The second cause we assign as the 4th great lack:

Systematic Contributing.

We have tried many plans, schemes, and devices, but they are all more or less defective. Why not take the great Apostle's advice, just plain and simple, and be done with it? "Upon the first day of the week let every one of you lay by in store as God hath prospered him."-1st Cor. 16:2. Respectfully submitted.

#### EDUCATION.

We, your committee, beg to submit the following report:

1st That it is our firm conviction that the training and developing of the intellectual powers was purposed by the Creator himself to be a means of grace in the hands of his children for carrying Christ to the heart of the young and tender, and of subsequently fitting them for the most efficient work in the fields of Christian endeavor.

2d That the only type of education that is likely to be of lasting-

eternal value— is that directed by pure, Ch. istian influence.

3d That mere education dissevered from religion is not the kind designed by God when He gave man faculties susceptible of development.

4th That Baptists of this association should not be one whit behind other denominations in taking an active, definite stand in providing means for higher education of her young men and women, and that they should deem it an imperitive duty to see that Baptist influences should as far as possible direct the education of her own people.

Your committee is informed that there is now an effort being made to establish a school under Baptist auspices at Mast, N. C., and we are further informed that the department of Mountain Schools of the Home Mission Bd. of the southern Baptist Convention is considering the fostering of said work, and that such a school will be opened a-

bout the first of Sept.

We your com. would recommend that this association endorse said work and give it our patrolage; and we would further recommend that this association appoint a committee whose duty it shall be to confer with N. L. Mast and such others as are concerned and co-operate in such a way as may be necessary to establish a Baptist Institution of learning in our midst, and report at our next session.

# SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Sunday-school is no longer a question as to what it is. It is needless to argue before this body the importance of Sunday-schools or the duty of promoting their development, or increasing their efficiency in every leeitimate way. Dr. Basil said, while contending for the establishment of the S. S. B'd. that "Sunday School is a great missionary to the future," While other benevolent agencies relate primarially to the present, this goes to meet and bless the generations that is coming. To win them from ignorance and sin, to train future laborers when we are gone. The Sunday-schools tend to direct increasing attention to the Bible, to elevate the rising generations and fit them for every good work. With pleasure we note that every church in the association reports a S. S.; an end to which we have been striving.

We are also encouraged to hope that soon every church will report an evergreen school. About half the churches have thus reported.

We have an enrollment in the Sunday-schools of about 1994, and 2730 in the association in church membership which leaves 736 of church members somewhere doing something besides fostering the S.S. cause. Admitting that the entire enrollment were church members it presents a state of affairs that should not appear. And when we consider that possibly not more than 50 percent of the S.S. enrollment are professors it presents an alarming feature and weakness of the S. S. work. Now if the S S is what is claimed for it, and if indeed it be the church at work is there not something wrong? Notwithstanding this deficiency in the work of enlargement and develop ment we are pleased to note that there have been during the last year 87 baptisms from the S. S. We feel that too much could not be said in behalf of enlisting the entire membership of our church in this department our church work.

Dr. Basil said, while contending for the establishment of the S. S. B'd. that "Sunday School is a great missionary to the future," While other benevolent agencies relate primarially to the present, this goes to meet and bless the generations that is coming. To win them from ignorance and sin, to train future laborers when we are gone. The Sunday-schools tend to direct increasing attention to the Bible, to elevate the rising generations and fit them for every good work. With pleasure we note that every cnurch in the association reports a S. S.; an end to which we have been striving.

We are also encouraged to hope that soon every church will report an evergreen school. About half the churches have thus reported.

We have an enrollment in the Sunday-schools of about 1994, and 2730 in the association in church membership which leaves 736 of church members somewhere doing something besides fostering the S.S. cause. Admitting that the entire enrollment were church members it presents a state of affairs that should not appear. And when we consider that possibly not more than 50 percent of the S.S. enrollment are professors it presents an alarming feature and weakness of the S. S. work. Now if the S S is what is claimed for it, and if indeed it be the church at work is there not something wrong? Notwithstanding this deficiency in the work of enlargement and develop ment we are pleased to note that there have been during the last year 87 baptisms from the S. S. We feel that too much could not be said in behalf of enlisting the entire membership of our church in this department our church work.

And that one of the greatest needs of the SS work is the qualification and preparation of the supt. The matter of trained teachers
