

MINUTES

the Fourteenth Annual Session of the Ohoopie Primitive Baptist Association, held with the Church of Providence, Johnson county, Ga., October the 10th, 11th, and 12th, 1879.

1st. The introductory sermon was preached by Rev. Henry Meeks from the 3rd chapter and 26th verse of Gallations. For ye are all the children of God by faith in Christ Jesus.

2nd. After an intermission of thirty minutes the delegation from the several churches convened in the house, and the Association was opened by singing and prayer.

3rd. Received and read letters from ten churches and minuted

4th. Proceeded to organize this body by electing Elder Spencer Meeks Moderator and A. J. Braddy Clerk.

5th. We invited ministering brethren of the same faith and order

to seats with us, to help us in our deliberations.

6th. Called for petitionary letters and received two: one from Hamilton Hill, Montgomery county, Ga., by the hands of John Graham and James I. Founten, who were cordially received by the Association, the Moderator extending the right hand of fellowship to said delegates. Also one from Mount Olive, Johnson county, Gambe hands of J. J. Jackson, and James Wilson, who were core received by the Association, the Moderator extending the right hand of fellowship to said delegates.

7th. Appointed committee on preaching as follows:

A. W. ATKINSON, HENRY MEEKS, JAS. I. WIGGINS, JOSEPH N. SMITH, D. L. WARNACK.

Saturday morning, 10 o'clock .- Jordan Norris to preach, followed by James Townsen. Thirty minutes intermission. T. W. Dean closed by C. T. Smith.

8th. Appointed business committee, and adjourned until Satur-

day morning, 10 o'clock.

SATURDAY MORNING, 10 o'clock.

1st. The Association met and was opened by singing and prayer.

2d. Called the roll, read the decorum, and proceeded to business.

3d. We, your committee, beg leave to make this our report to your honor. After hearing the letter read from our several churches, we are made to rejoice to know that God, has so blessed our Association; that not one of our ministers has been taken away from us by death, and only three deaths in our association. We also glad to find that our association has been strengthened by two new churches. We are sorry to hear of so much coldness in the We also ask your honorable body to give us a general meeting during the next Association year, to come off on some 5th Sunday, Friday and Saturday before, with delegates from all of our churches, to visit the same; and also if you give us the meeting, that you will take steps to the appointment of some one to preach the opening sermon at the meeting. As we find no other business that claims our attention, we close this, our report, by saying that we hope that the God of all grace may sustain the association, together with all of its members.

5th. Appointed a general meeting to convene with the church at Silver Leaf, Laurens county, Ga., commencing on Friday before the 5th Sunday in 1880, to be represented by letter and delegation.

6th. Appointed the Rev. C. T. Smith to preach the opening

sermon at the said general meeting.

7th. Appointed our next association to be held with the church at Reedy Springs, Johnson county, Ga., commencing on Friday before the second Sunday in October, 1880.

8th. Appointed the Rev T W Dean to preach the next in-

troductory sermon, and C T Smith his alternate.

9th. Appointed the Rev C T Smith to write the next circular letter, and John G Smith his alternate.

Sunday Morning.

10th Order of preaching Sunday morning 10 o'clock, the Rev C T Smith to preach, followed by Elder S Meeks. Thirty minutes intermission. J W Clements, 'closed by John Thomas.

11th. On motion for adjournment, the Minutes of the Association was read, received and assigned.

copy This x ARTICLES OF FAITH.

1. We believe in only one true and living God, and that there are three in the Godhead, viz: The Father, Son and Holy Ghost.

2. We believe that the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments are the word of God, and the only rule of faith and practice.

3. We believe in the fall of Adam and the imputation of his sin, to his posterity; in the corruption of human nature, and the impotency of man to recover himself by his own free will and ability.

4. We believe in the everlasting love of Christ to his people, and the eternal election of a definite number of the human race to grace and glory, and that there was a covenant of grace, or redemption made between the Father and Son before the world began, in which their salvation is secure, and that they in particular are redeemed.

5. We believe sinners are justified in the sight of God, only

by the right-ousness of Christ imputed to them.

6. We believe that all those who were chosen in Christ will be effectually called, regenerated, converted, sanctified and supported by the spirit and power of God, so that they shall persevere in grace, and not one of them be finally lost.

8. We believe that there will be a resumment on of the dead

8. We believe that there will be a resurrection of the dead, and a general judgment, and that the happiness of the right-

eous and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

9. We believe that the visible church is a congregation of faithful persons, who have gained christian fellowship with each other and have given themselves up to the Lord and to one another and have agreed to keep up a godly discipiline agreeable to the rules of the Gospel.

10. We believe that water baptism, the Lord's supper and the washing of the saints feet are ordinances of the Lord and

are to be continued till his second coming.

11. We believe that true believers in Jesus Christ are the on-

ly subjects of baptism and that dipping is the mode.

12. We believe that none but regular baptized church mems bers have a right to communion at the Lord's table.

Decorum of the Ohoopie Association.

1. The Association shall open and close with prayer.

2. Those members who are regular chosen by the churches in our union, shall compose the Ohoopie primitive Baptist Association. The members thus chosen shall produce letters from their respective churches certifying their appointment together with their number in fellowship, with those received by baptism, by letter, by faith dismissed, excommunicated, restored and died since last Association.

3. This Association shall have a Moderator and Clerk, who shall be chosen by the members of the present and shall hold

their office until the next election.

4. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to preserve order, explain and put questions, and he may have the same right of speech as another member, provided the chair be filled, but shall not vote except the body be equally divided.

5. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a fair record of all the proceedings of this Association, and the minute taken shall be read and amended if necessary and signed by the

Clerk and Moderator.

6. Any church applying by letter and Delegates for admittance, which upon examination is found otherdox and orders ly, shall be received by the Association and manifested by the Moderator giving the right hand of fellowship to its Delegates.

7. Each church shall have the right to send two delegates

to the Association and no more.

8. Every query presented to the Association shall be from church authority.

9. Every motion seconded shall claim the action of the Association, unless withdrawn by the person who made it, and with consent of the Association.

10. Every person who speaks in debate shall rise from his seat, and address the Moderator, and shall not be interrupted while speaking, unless he depart from the subject.

11. No person shall speak more than three times on the

same subject without leave of the Association

12. There shall be no talking of whispering in time of a public speech, nor reflections cast upon the speaker.

13. Whenever a case is decided by vote their shall be no

more debating on the subject.

14. No member shall absent himself from the Association

without permission from the Moderator.

- 15. It is the duty of this Association to provide for the general union of sister churches, give her best advice in difficult matters, and if the union be broken between any of the churches to inquire into the cause. If the breach cannot be healed to withdraw from any church or churches, that they be deemed unsound in faith or immoral in practice, until they be reclaimed.
- 16. This Association recommends the churches of her body to receive members from Missionary churches by faith, but if any member wishes to be baptized, to grant them their request.

17. If any church of our union and order wishes to withdraw she can do so by making application, and she shall have a

letter of dismmission.

18. To keep up a correspondence with other Associations of the same Faith and Order that a chain of connection may be preserved among the churches.

19. To invite Ministers of our Faith and Order to seats with us

20. If any member break these rules he shall be immediately reproved by the Moderator.

These rules shall be read at every Association previous to entering on business. 🌽 🔉

CONSTITUTION OF THE OHOOPIE ASSOCIATION

1. This Association shall, if they think proper, meet annual-

ly as an advisory council.

2. This Association shall be composed of messengers from the several churches, so that each church may have two Messengers, if they choose, and no more, and the messenger's names shall be inserted in their lettes.

3. This Association shall have power to make its own rules to govern itself, but none of the rules to be binding on the churches, for they are free and of right and ought to be.

4. It shall be the duty of this Association to give her best advice in cases of difficulty, and endeavor to keep up a union among the churches composing the body.

5. This Association shall admit into its body any church which they shall find sound in faith and moral practice. Also if any church in order wisnes to withdraw from this body, she may, at her discretion on application, have a letter of dismission

6. As the love of money is the root of all evil, and has produced so much distress among Christians, we wishing to live in peace, therefore this Association shall not engage in, nor in any way encourage any raigious speculation called missionary or by any other name, under pretense of supporting the Gospel.

7. We, the churches composing this Association, believing the books of the Old and New Testaments to be the Word of God; declare we take the New Testament for the rule of our faith and practice, for we are not under the Law but under Grace.
