Citizenship Award

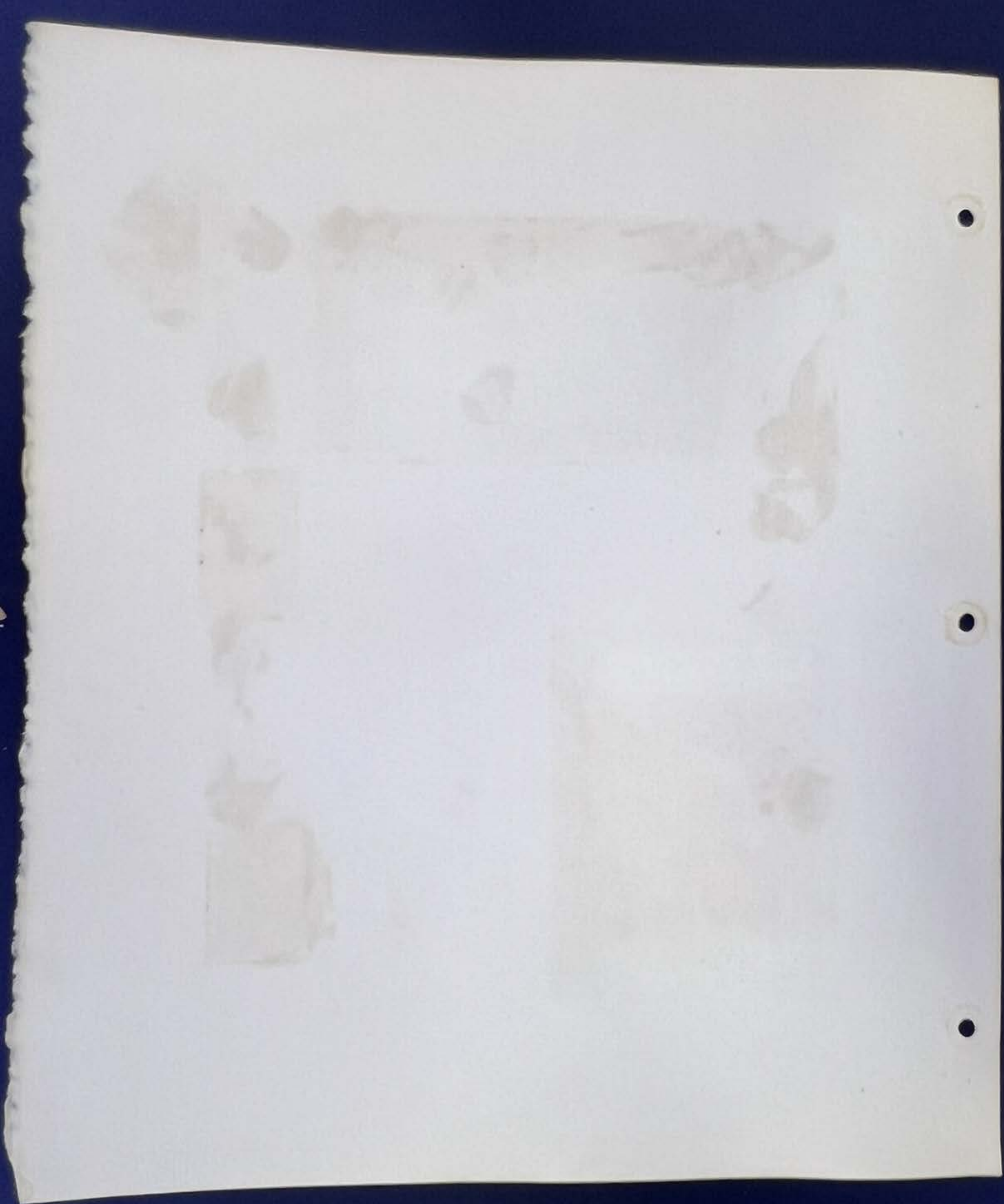
A STANDARD FOR THE CITIZENSHIP AWARD

1. This Award shall be called a "Citizenship Award" and shall be presented in the form of a medal.
2. This Citizenship Award shall be presented each year by the Youngsville Women's Club beginning in May 1958 and continuing until such Club deems it advisable to discontinue such presentation.
3. This Award shall be presented each year by the President of the Youngsville Women's Club, or someone appointed by her.
4. The recipient of this Award shall be decided by the faculty of the local high school in collaboration with a committee of the Youngsville Women's Club; such committee being appointed each year by the President of the Club.
5. The Women's Club Committee shall meet with the high school faculty at least one month before Commencement to select the recipient of this Award.
6. Qualified persons will be judged on the basis of their entire high school career, namely the four-year period.
7. The name of the recipient of this Award shall be kept in confidence by the committee and faculty until the night of presentation, namely at the Commencement exercises each year of the Youngsville High School.
8. The qualifications for this Award shall be as follows:
 1. A commendable scholastic record
 2. The ability to get along with faculty and students alike
 3. A good disciplinary record
 4. Participation in extra-curricula activities
 5. Personal qualities of integrity, leadership ability, excellent character, and superb reputation.

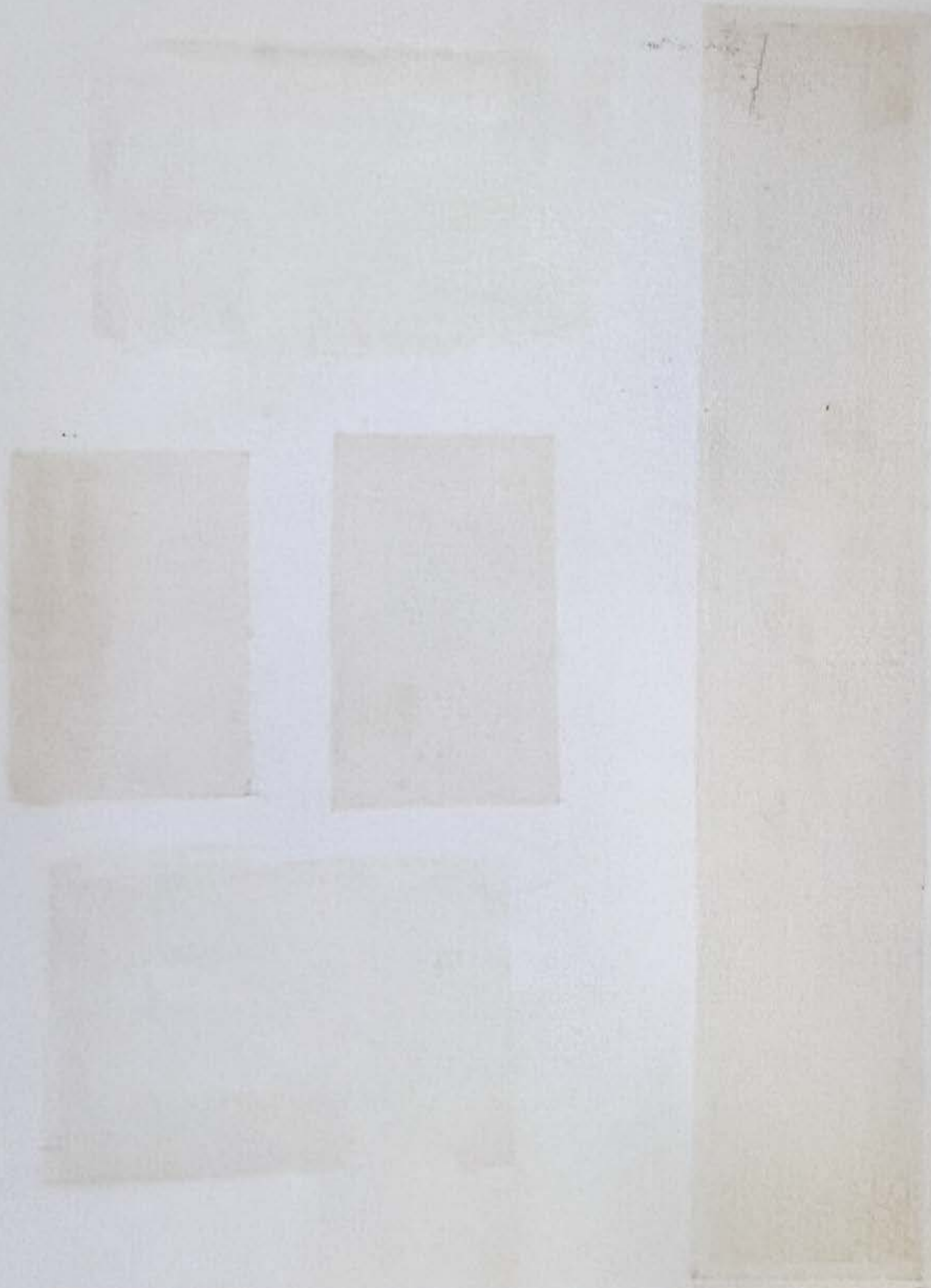
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Shown below: Greenfield Lake as it appears today, and at bottom as it appeared 30 years ago.

Woman's Club To Meet

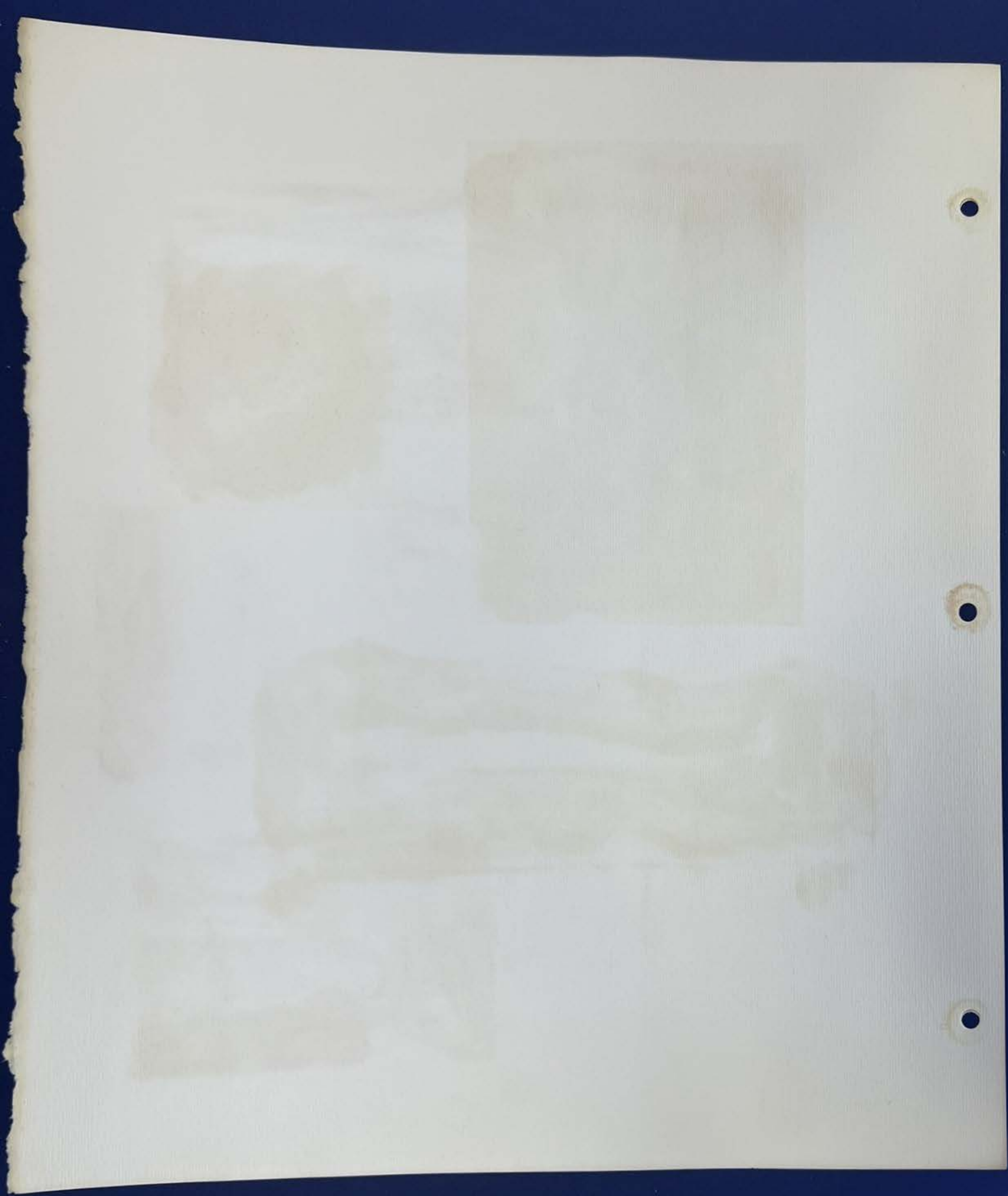

Federation of Women's Clubs Set For Asheville Meet

The 66th Annual Meeting of the General Federation of Women's Clubs will convene at the Municipal Auditorium in Asheville on June 4, with Mrs. R. I. C. Prout of Wakefield, Mich., presiding.

More than 3,000 delegates are expected to attend and probably 1,000 additional visitors will fill the Auditorium when sessions are open to the public. An international organization with 11 million members half of whom are in clubs and organizations abroad, the General Federation anticipates delegations from Egypt, Japan, Germany, South America, the Philippines, France, Korea, Hawaii and Norway.

Ten resolutions will be presented for consideration on Wednesday and Thursday mornings, June 5 and 6. Among these will be a resolution on Poultry Inspection, calling upon Congress to enact legisla-

tion requiring that poultry placed on sale and intended for human consumption be inspected by the U. S. Meat Inspection Division of the United States Department of Agriculture under the same conditions as now obtain in the case of meat and meat products.

Some of the other resolutions pertain to Maintenance of Strong United States Military Forces; giving recognition to the teaching profession by the establishment of a National Teachers' Day; Restrictive Action in Student Musical Activities; Prison Reform; Limitation of National Campaign Expenditures; naming of Dec. 7 as Preparedness Day; and a resolution concerning Free Television.

There will be a briefing on resolutions, parliamentary procedure, Community Achievement contest, Clubwoman magazine, finances and Headquarters of the Federation on Sunday afternoon, June 2, at 2:30 o'clock at the Municipal Auditorium.

A highlight of the convention events will be the announcement at the morning session June 6 of the winner of the "Oscars For Teachers" project under the direction of Mrs. John L. Whitehurst of Baltimore, Maryland, Chairman of the Education Department. The winning teacher will receive a trip to the Scandinavian countries.

The North Carolina banquet, open to all attending the convention will be held Monday evening, June 3, at the Municipal Auditorium. The program to follow is entitled: "A June Evening in North Carolina" with Miss Patricia Cowden, North Carolina Maid of Cotton, as the mistress of ceremonies.

Special music, dancing and folk songs will be featured during the evening. A reception honoring Mrs. Prout in the auditorium lobby will close the program.

Junior clubwomen will hold their business sessions on Sunday afternoon, June 2; and Monday morning, June 3. The Junior banquet is scheduled for Sunday evening, June 2, in the Gold room of the George Vanderbilt Hotel. Following a Vogue Fashion show there will be a reception for Junior Clubwomen.

Knowledge Is Power, the theme of the convention, will be the sub-

ject of the President's address when Mrs. Prout speaks to the convention on Tuesday morning, June 4.

The top spot on the program comes Wednesday evening, June 5, when Vice President Richard M. Nixon, addresses the convention. Igor Gorin, opera, radio and television star, will sing. That evening, as well as all evening sessions, will be open to visitors and to the citizens of Asheville.

Mrs. Fred M. Cross of Bad Axe, Mich., Tour Chairman, will attend the convention to give details and take reservations for the World Cooperation Tour to Europe July 25-August 16. Mrs. Prout will lead the Tour which is open to all clubwomen.

The convention will conclude on Friday evening, June 7. The next

morning there will be a Conservation Tour through Pisgah National Forest.

Thousands In Asheville For Club Meet

ASHEVILLE, June 3—With the formal opening of the 66th annual convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs not until tomorrow, the several thousand delegates here from all over the nation and foreign countries already have three full days of meetings behind them.

Today and Sunday were devoted to meetings of the Junior Clubs. And numerous pre-convention meetings of committees and boards have been held throughout the three days with all the atmosphere of behind-scenes political gatherings in smoke-filled rooms.

This mountain resort city is giving a festive welcome to the hatted, gloved and name-tagged delegates who drift from convention headquarters in the Municipal Auditorium and stroll throughout Asheville's shopping sections between sessions. All hotels are filled to capacity and the only disappointment registered by visitors is that the famed rhododendron of this area isn't yet in bloom.

Tar Heel Spotlight.

North Carolina Club women, who for months have been preparing for the occasion, were in the spotlight tonight with the State president, Mrs. Aubrey Mauney, and first vice president, Mrs. C. Gordon Maddrey, presiding at the North Carolina Federation Night Banquet. Long tables in the auditorium were covered with pale pink sheets and decorated with pots of cotton balls and pink dogwood.

Miss Patricia Cowden, last year's

Maid of Cotton from Raleigh, left her new modeling job in New York to be mistress of ceremonies for the program, "A June Evening in North Carolina." Raleigh's Betty Vaiden Williams sang a medley of Tar Heel folk songs and Diane Rousseau gave the lullaby scene from "The Lost Colony." There were other native songs and dances.

Capus Waynick welcomed the visitors to North Carolina and Mayor Earl W. Eller brought greetings from the hostess city. After the banquet, a reception was held honoring Mrs. R. I. C. Prout, General Federation president.

Cosmopolitan Flavor.

International delegates here for the week long gathering include Mrs. Garcia, wife of the ambassador from Argentina, and Mrs. George Melas, whose husband is ambassador from Greece. Frau Hanna Kiep, women's affairs attache of West Germany Embassy, is also here.

That the influence of the world's largest feminine organization is not underestimated is indicated by the fact that leading magazines, news services and newspapers from across the country have representa-

In Asheville

Club Women Are Much Alike No Matter Where They Live

ASHEVILLE, June 4—Club women are much the same the world over.

They all spend many hours working for things that make their own lives, those of their children and families, and their communities a little better.

International delegates here for the convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs from Canada to Cuba and from Greece to Formosa all report that their top projects center around day nurseries for children of working mothers, assisting the needy and stimulating the cultural interests of the more fortunate in their native lands.

And women working together have accomplished many things. Mrs. George Melas, the vivacious wife of the Ambassador from Greece, says that the 33 clubs in her homeland are primarily concerned with health and social welfare. She is president of the National Day Nursery Club (one of three in her country) which sponsors five day nurseries, improving the health and education of small children.

Clubs In Greece.

Women's clubs in Greece, she says, also work to increase home craft production and to better the life of women and children. She is particularly proud that a woman, Miss Lina Dsaldaris, was recently elected Minister for Health and Social Welfare, receiving more votes than all the male candidates for the high office.

One of four delegates from the Philippines, Mrs. Minerva G. Laudico of Manila, is particularly glad that the General Federation meeting is in North Carolina. North Carolina Clubwomen, she gratefully recalls, were the first to undertake as a state project, rehabilitation there following World War II.

"They sent us a filing cabinet and typewriters which we are still using," she smiles.

Here On Grant.

The Philippine delegation is here because of a grant which will also allow them to visit

clubs in Asia and Europe and attend a meeting of the International Council of Women in Montreal next week. Her clubs, says the Philippine Federation president and social worker, who was educated at the Catholic University of America in Washington, sponsor health centers, nursery classes, city beautification and the betterment of women in general.

Mrs. Carmen C. Nicholas, president of the Women's Civic Club in Puerto Rico, has recently received an award from the International American Academy for her work in building 20 houses for the underprivileged there which she says are "fire-proof, stormproof and moth-proof." Her 600-member club is 36 years old.

A touch of the Calypso is added to the gathering by the three Jamaica delegates, who are wearing embroidered straw skirts and hats and colorful tropical outfits. Recently celebrating their 21st anniversary, the Interracial Club headed by Mrs. J. W. Carazo, concentrates on cultural and social projects, aids a blind school, orphanage and home for aged women. A new project — polio rehabilitation — was brought on by the island's first epidemic of the disease three years ago.

Mrs. Ruth Delisser, also of Kingston, Jamaica, says she adopted the Navy stationed there and recently the Secretary of Navy presented her a medal in appreciation for her voluntary work with U. S. Armed Forces.

The Havana Woman's Club, reports the Cuban president, Mrs. Harry Woodside, is publishing a book with a dual text in Spanish and English describing the flowers of the island. A cosmopolitan organization whose membership boasts 32 nationalities, the club cares for three gardens in the city, has a lending library, offers two scholarships and sends a Boy Scout to camp in this country each summer.

Mrs. Pavla Osuka of Washington, D. C., is here representing the Czechoslovakia Council of Women in exile. A native of Prague, she is the wife of that country's former Ambassador to France and lived in Paris many years before her exile. The work of her group, which is mainly concentrated in New York and Chicago, is primarily morale-building among refugees in this country.

Clubwomen Go to Asheville; Fashion Show Is Presented

ASHEVILLE — A fashion wardrobe designed for the clubwomen of America was presented by Vogue Pattern Service last night as a highlight of the pre-opening of the General Federation of Women's Clubs in the Gold Room of the Hotel Battery Park. 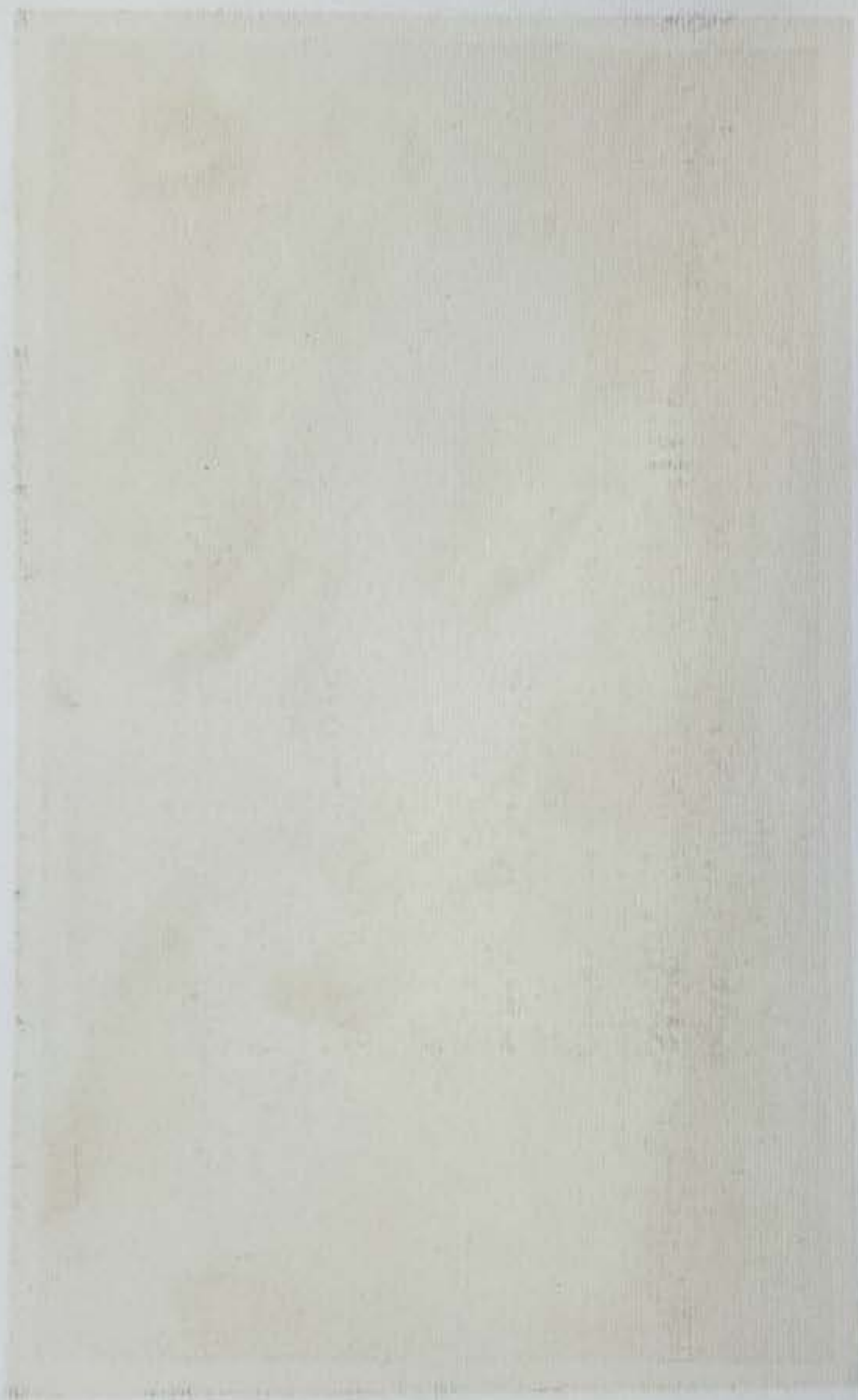
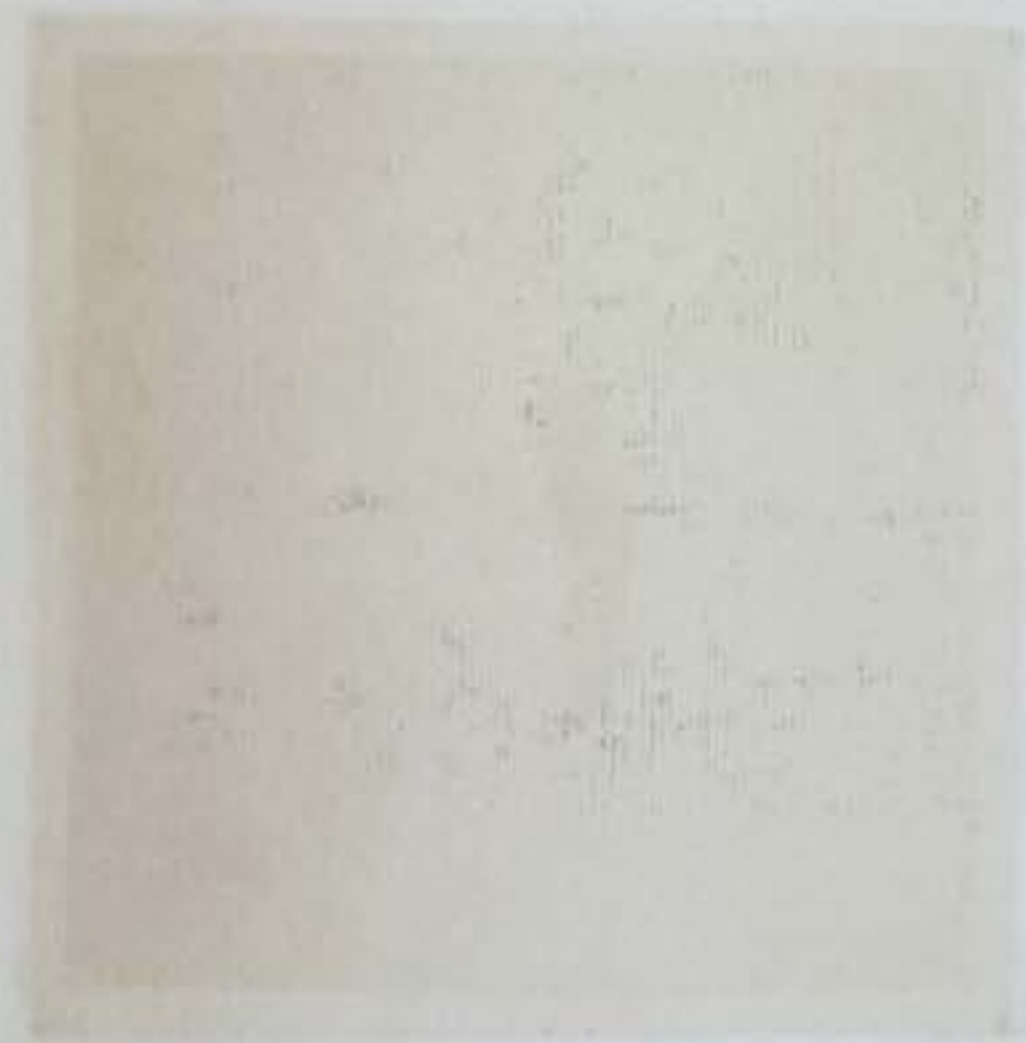

Convention Spotlight

Veep Speaks and Business Goes Ahead

ASHEVILLE, June 5—With secret service men swarming over town preparing for the arrival of Vice President Richard M. Nixon, who will address the convention tonight, members of the General Federation of Women's Clubs went about their business of the day with heated concern.

Highlight of the morning was a debate on a resolution favoring free television as opposed to subscription TV—a controversy which the delegates have heard from all sides since their arrival here during the weekend. Officials of CBS, favoring commercially-sponsored television as it now exists, and of Zenith Radio Corporation, who will sell mechanical gadgets for present television sets to allow them to receive paid broadcasts, have been presenting their views in between-sessions meetings.

The Resolution.

As passed, the resolution urges the Congress of the United States and/or governmental agencies, when evaluating and licensing any development in the use of television, to keep in the forefront of their thinking the necessity of assuring a freedom of choice in the selection of programs while at the same time insuring the maintenance of free television service as it now exists, and further improvement of such television service for all our people.

Mrs. Horace B. Ritchie of Georgia, chairman of the Federation's powerful policy committee, stated following the passage of the resolution after it was almost tabled and lost in points of parliamentary procedure, "If anybody had a victory in this argument, it was John Q. Public." She insists that is merely long-range statement of the Federation's policy "opposing anything that interferes with free television" and is not against any new developments that might come in the future.

Double Blush.

Only one other resolution was considered by the delegates this morning as time for the business session ran out—and that caused them a double blush.

In the call to the convention, a resolution to be considered asked the Congress to make "In God We Trust" the official motto of the United States of America. In reading it to the delegates, Mrs. Ritchie good-naturedly admitted that Congress had already adopted the motto. So the resolution was quickly changed to

"commend" Congress for its action.

She also confessed that the Federation's face was twice red.

They had discovered that their own motto, "Unity In Diversity," which has been in use since 1889, had never been officially adopted. That was quickly corrected, too.

Other resolutions will be considered at tomorrow's business session.

Earlier in the morning, the convention also heard a report from Miss Sally Butler, its legislative consultant. Although the organization does not support specific bills in Congress, it is busy on Capitol Hill backing such "principals" as statehood for Alaska, appropriations for health, education and welfare, library services for rural areas, humane slaughter of animals and compulsory postmortem and ante-mortem inspection of poultry, she said.

Indians and Highways.

Welfare of American Indians, safety and preservation of beauty of the highways are also concerns of the federation, Miss Butler reported. While no specific cuts in the budget are suggested, she said the GFWC strongly advocates economy in government.

Also speaking at the morning session was Richard W. Reuther, executive director of CARE, who has just returned from a trip to Poland. He said that beginning next month, CARE will start full operation there behind the Iron Curtain. "Poles now being returned from Russia are in as bad a situation as I've ever seen," he stated, "and I hope Americans will show them that they're interested in seeing that they have a better life."

More TV Talk.

Television came in for more discussion when John W. McPherrin of New York, former publisher of "The American Magazine" and consultant on edi-

torial policies of television programs, spoke on "Your New Public Responsibility." Because activities of clubwomen are being widely broadcast in communities, there is a greater interest in the national policies and purposes of the organization, he said.

Management policies of networks are becoming as important as the editorial policy of a newspaper or magazine, he said. But if good public service programs are broadcast, they must be backed by the public.

The convention took on a cosmopolitan air as the Council of International Clubs entertained at luncheon at Grove Park Inn where reports from foreign delegates were heard and guest speaker was Mrs. Hanna Kiep, Women's Affairs Secretary of the German Embassy in Washington.

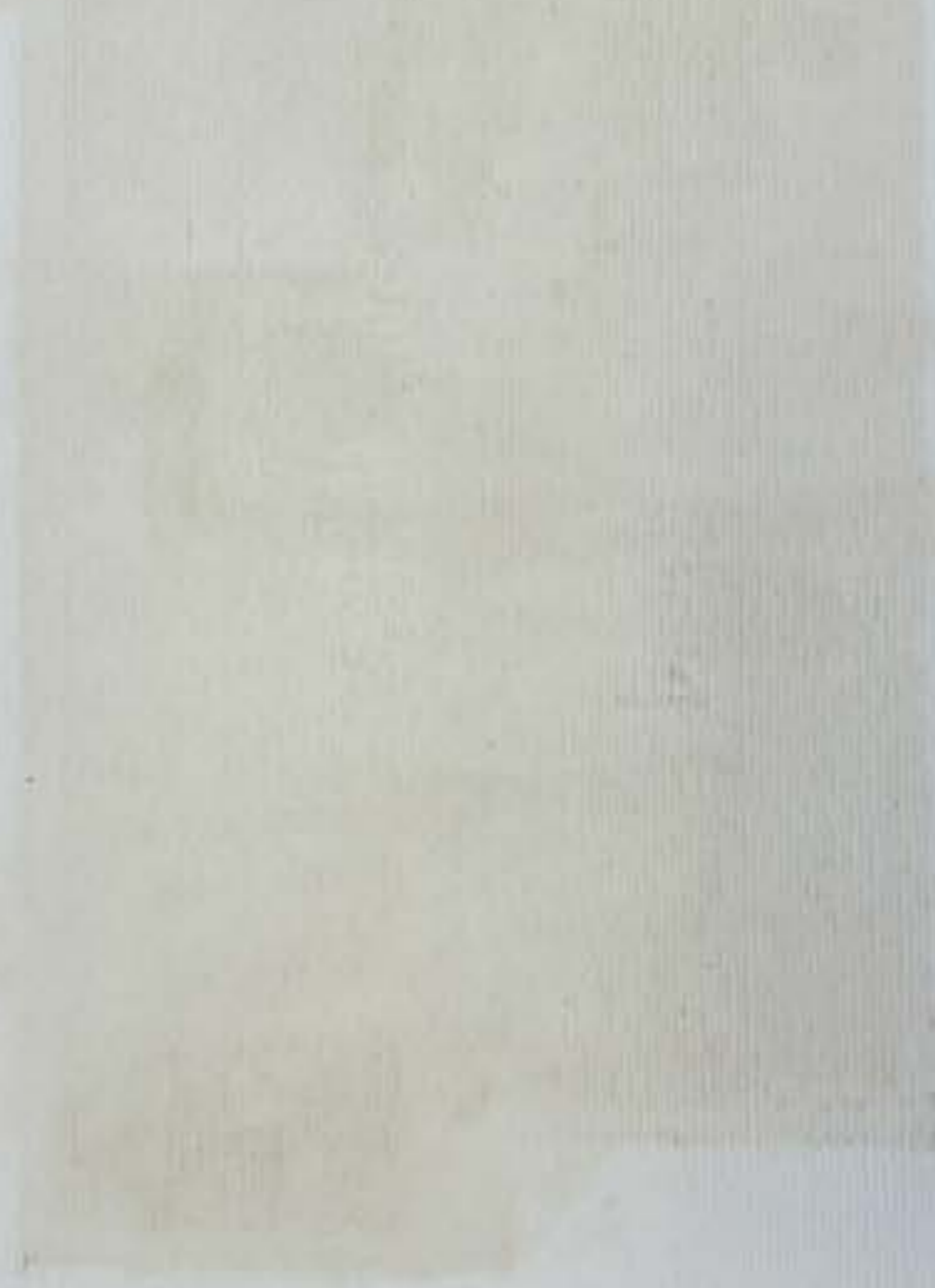
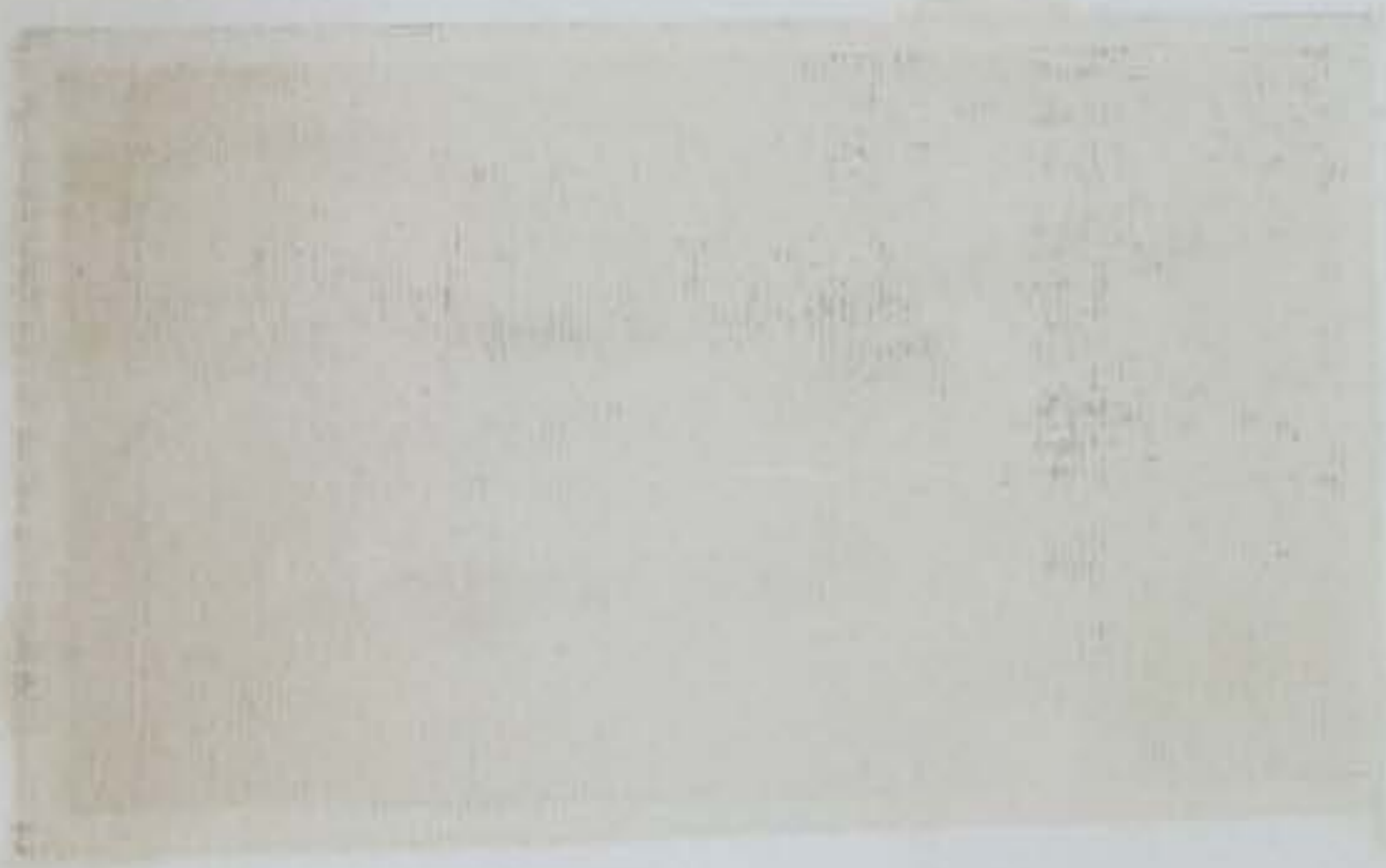
Important Contribution.

Mrs. Kiep said that German women are making an important contribution toward the future reunification of "their tragically divided country" by keeping in contact with their 17 million fellow-Germans living in the Soviet Zone. There are few women in West Germany with its 50 million people who do not send letters and gift parcels regularly into the Soviet-occupied Zone "just to keep in touch."

"In postwar years, women's organizations have played an important part in promoting citizenship education," Mrs. Kiep stated. "During the last federal elections in Germany, the women's organizations got together well before the elections and planned their non-partisan campaign. In foreign affairs, German women are working for an integrated Europe and the German people's feeling of sincere friendship for the United States is based on the humanitarian help the people of this great country extended to us during the difficult years after the war."

Convention Spotlight

Arguments Heated, Days Busy, Convention's Open

ASHEVILLE, June 4—A heated presentation of subscription versus free television, a talk on physical fitness and a tour of Biltmore House were sandwiched in between the official opening sessions and numerous group meetings of the General Federation of Women's Clubs here today.

And this evening, Dr. John Morley, foreign correspondent, lecturer and author, spoke on "How Peace Is Being Won." There was also a procession of state presidents followed by their reports, a concert by the Donaldson Air Force Base Band and a musical program by composer Irving Caesar with Edward Lisbona as accompanist, tonight following regional dinners.

The North Carolina delegation met at the Vanderbilt Hotel with other clubs of the area.

Free or Fee.

The first full day of the convention, which has attracted 3,000 delegates to this mountain city, got off to an early—and heated—start as key people were invited to a seven o'clock breakfast to hear argument on "Television—Free or Fee." A resolution will be presented to the full convention for action, either pro or con, tomorrow.

Ted Leitrell of Zenith Radio Corporation presented the case for subscription television, which he says will provide cultural and educational opportunities for more people as well as save the life of numerous small stations now on the verge of bankruptcy. Suggesting that it be a supplementary service to regular television with viewers paying for special programs, he declared, "It seems to me that those of you who love the fine and the beautiful are entitled to more than the cultural bones tossed to you by the networks."

Fill a Gap.

Claiming that networks don't sponsor programs that won't sell products, he said that the networks have fallen far short of supplying the nation's hunger for fine music and that subscription television would fill the gap.

Richard S. Salant, vice president of the Columbia Broadcasting System, was scheduled to present the case for free television as it now exists. But the pilot of the plane on which he was flying to Asheville yesterday had a brain hemorrhage over Charleston, W. Va. Although a mechanic landed the plane, he missed connections and didn't arrive for the breakfast.

Murray Martin, reading his address, declared, "It's not so much that we at CBS are against pay television. It's just that we are for free television." Both are not

possible, he said, because the free channels would be blacked out when subscription programs were being presented. Also, he pointed out, pay television would bid against free television for talent and programs and many of the same things supporters of subscription TV are advocating are now already on free television.

The Other Side.

"For those who seek it out, there are literally hours each week of culture and education on free television."

Pay television will necessarily decrease television viewing, Martin continued, because the people will only be given the choice of paying for a program or not seeing it.

Among reports given at the morning's opening session was that of North Carolina's Mrs. Ed M. Anderson, General Federation treasurer. She is a candidate for the office of second vice president in an election scheduled later in the week.

Speaking at the afternoon session, Bonnie Prudden, director of the Institute for Physical Fitness of White Plains, N. Y., told the convention, "You can have a young body even if you are old—but youth no longer guarantees a physically fit or attractive body."

No Activity.

She blamed mechanization, easy living and passive entertainment for taking "the activity out of our lives" and said the results are plainly evident in the poor posture, high rate of backache, tension and obesity of the people. She urged increased physical education during school years. "Varsity sports for the few and spectator status for the rest is not the answer," declared the attractive ski expert and the country's top-ranking woman rock climber.

Composer of "Tea for Two" and "Is It True What They Say About Dixie," Irving Caesar presented the "Pledge of Allegiance" To the Flag" for which he wrote the music, at tonight's session.

John Morley, who was here as a spectator at last night's banquet, sounded a hopeful note tonight when he said, "I observed greater prospects for peace and world normalcy in recent months and years than at any other time of my 26 years coverage of the world."

Optimism.

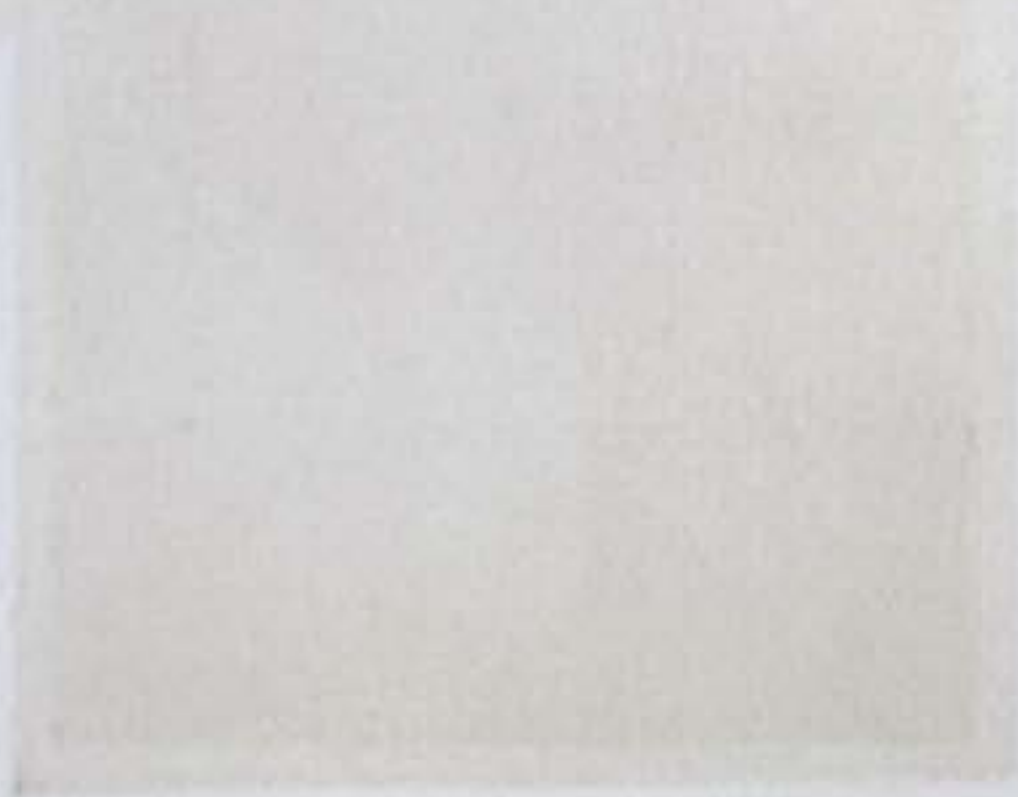
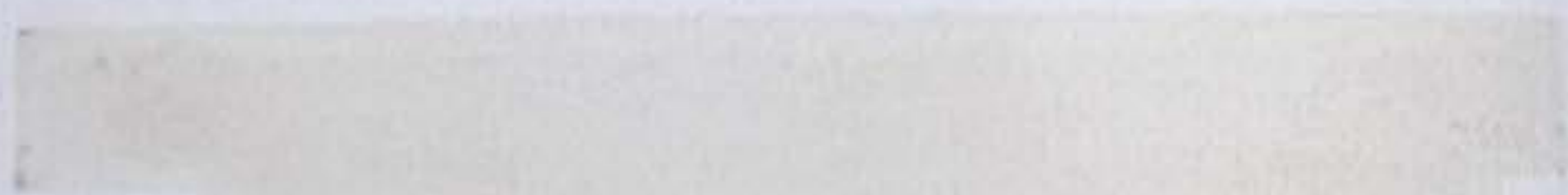
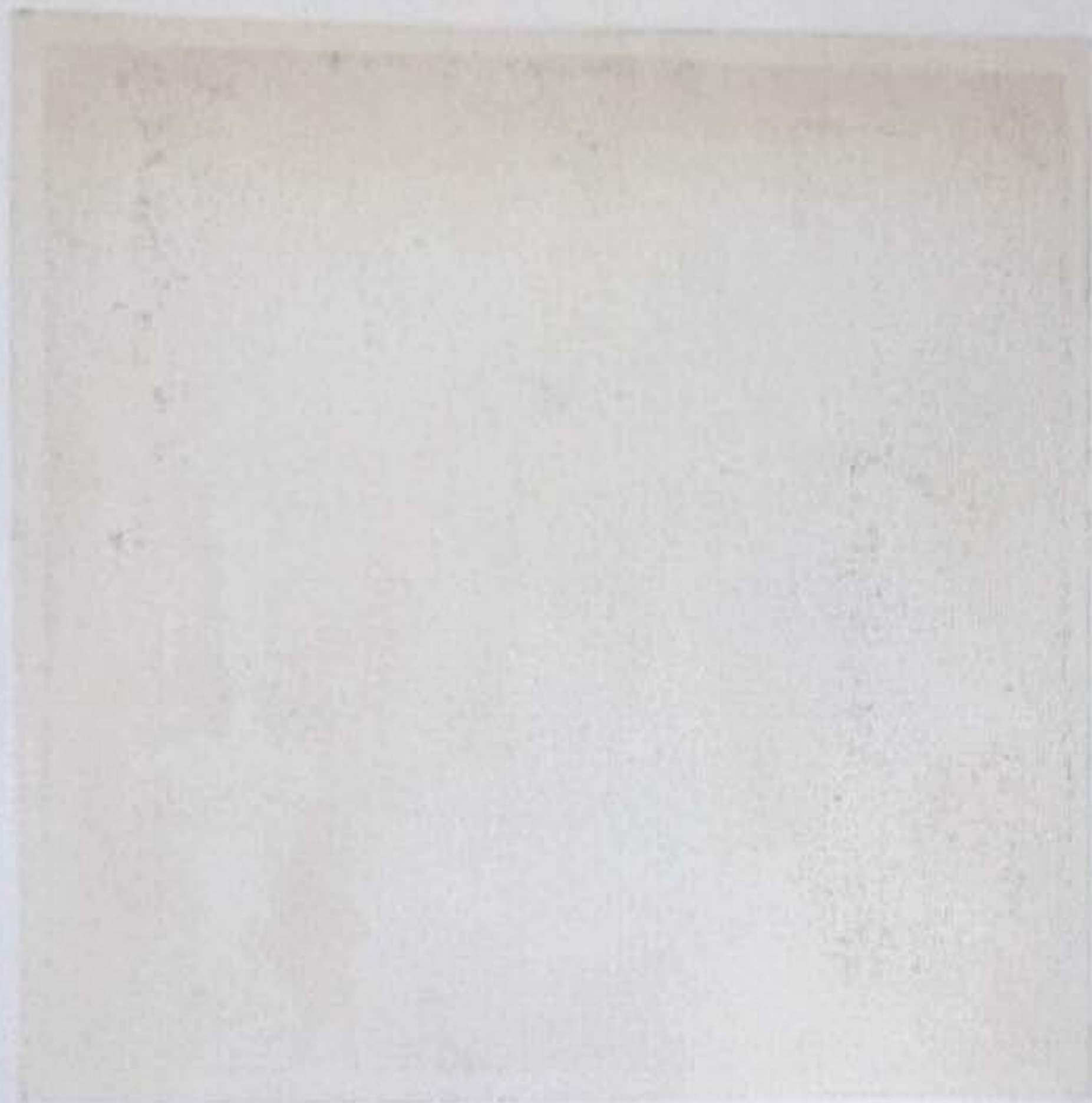
He cited as his reasons for this optimism the growth of religion behind the Iron Curtain since the death of Stalin; the split of the Communist party in Russia and the satellite world since Stalin's death; the fact that major uprisings behind the Iron Curtain were instigated by youth; the global emancipation of women in recent months and years; and the growth of education in the backward areas of the world which is increasing to international understanding.

'TAR HEEL GARDENER' IS GUEST SPEAKER

Dr. Hipps Speaks On Communism At Woman's Club

Dr. J. B. Hipps, Professor Emeritus, Southeastern Seminary, Wake Forest, was guest speaker at the meeting of the Woman's Club held on Tuesday, April 15. Dr. Hipps is a native of North Carolina. After his graduation from Wake Forest College and later the Seminary in Kentucky he was appointed as a missionary to China where he was associated with education work at the University of Shanghai for approximately thirty-four years. In 1949 he and his family were forced to leave by the encroachment of the communistic influences.

He related to the club members first hand information of Communist methods and of their infiltration of China which began as early as 1918. Dr. Hipps presented much enlightening information on their activities. For a further picture of the China situation Dr. Hipps recommended the reading of the book "Soviet Russia in China" by Chiany Kai-shek.

She has previously served as recording secretary and second vice-president of the State Federation. In her own home community of Spruce Pine she has served four years as president and has served as secretary and president of District II.

To get a more complete view of the personality of Mary Cross Dent, it is necessary to go back to her coming to Western North Carolina to live. After college days at St. Mary's in Raleigh and at the University of North Carolina, she was asked by Jason B. Deyton, superintendent of Mitchell County Schools, to come to Spruce Pine to teach. Her mother did not want her to come so far from her home, Gatesville, in the eastern part of the state without her roommate, so they both came.

Represents State

So the new president can well represent the state as she grew up in the east, went to school in the central and has since lived in the western part of the state.

Coming to Spruce Pine led to her meeting and later marrying Raymond T. Dent who had come from Pennsylvania to Spruce Pine to manage English Mica Company. Their daughter, Miss Elizabeth Dent, recently was graduated from the University of North Carolina and is now working there.

Mr. Dent was first warden and she has been organist and treasurer for seven years in addition to serving in many other capacities.

In other phases of community life she has served four years on the local school board, four years as Commander of Mitchell County Chapter of the American Cancer Society, vice-president of the Mitchell County Democratic Executive committee and has served on the State Democratic Executive Committee.

Founds Book Club

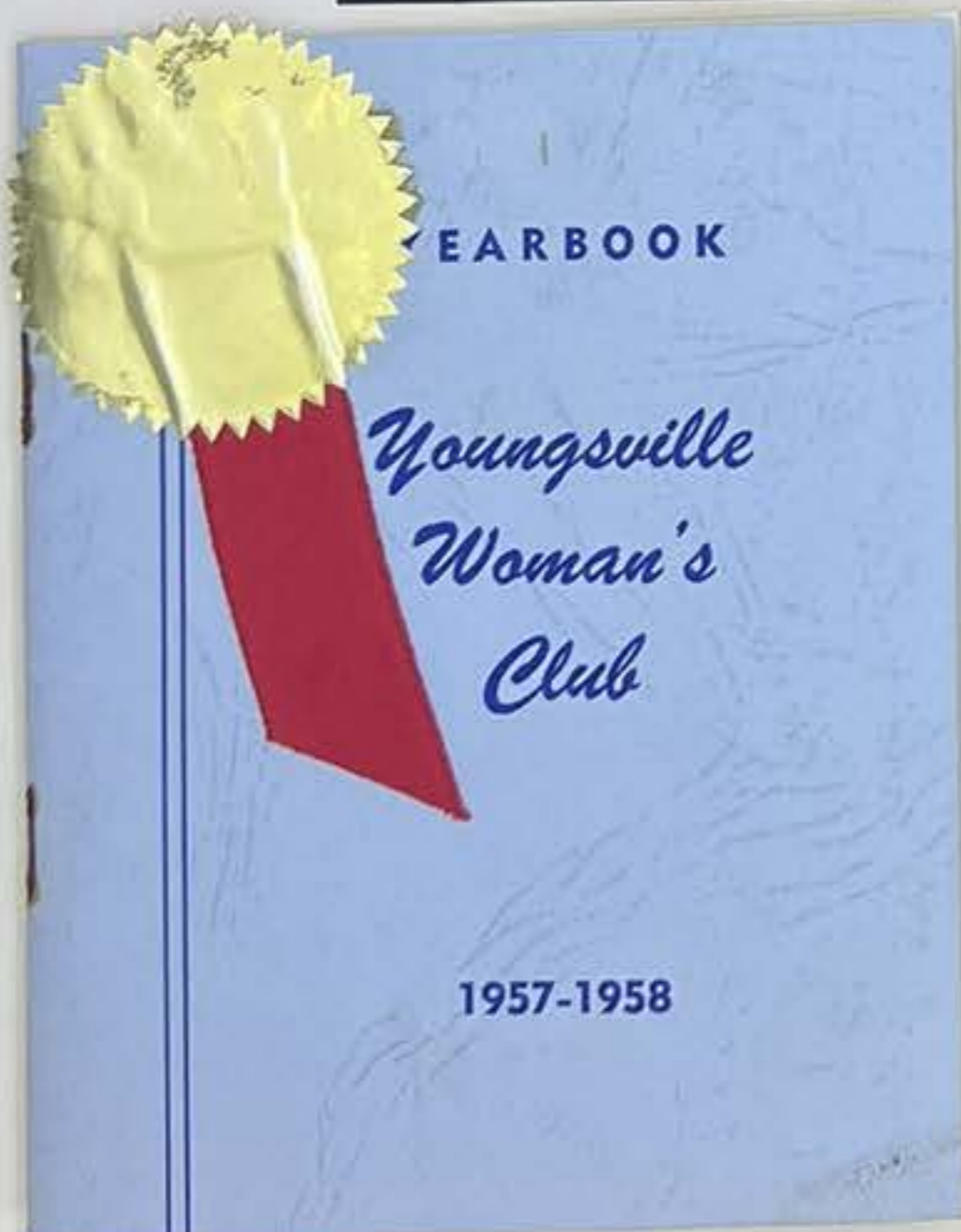

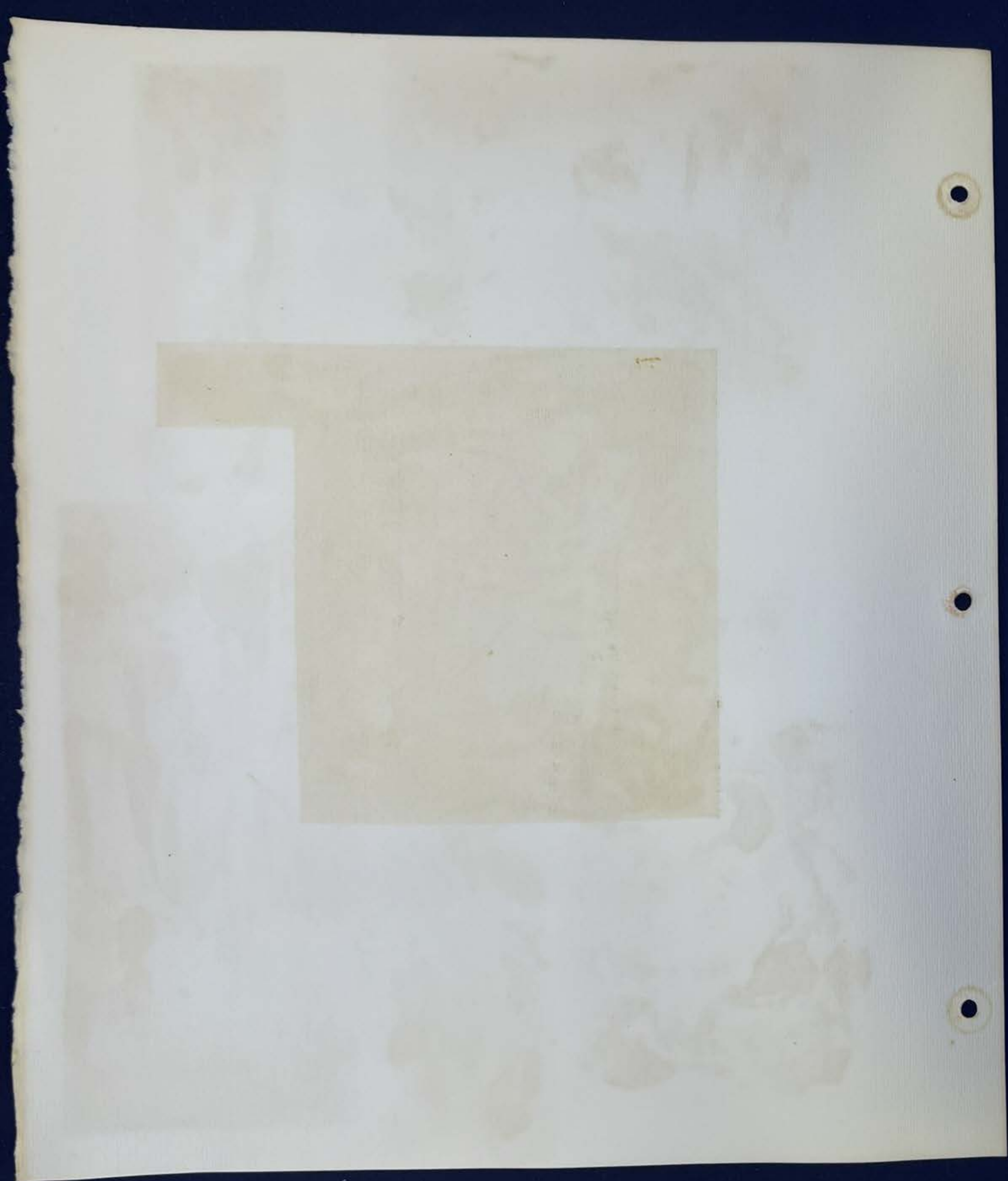
She is now a member of the Buncombe County Mental Hygiene Clinic and is serving her second year as chairman of the Mitchell County Heart Association.

At 7 p.m. tonight the annual banquet is scheduled to close the convention.

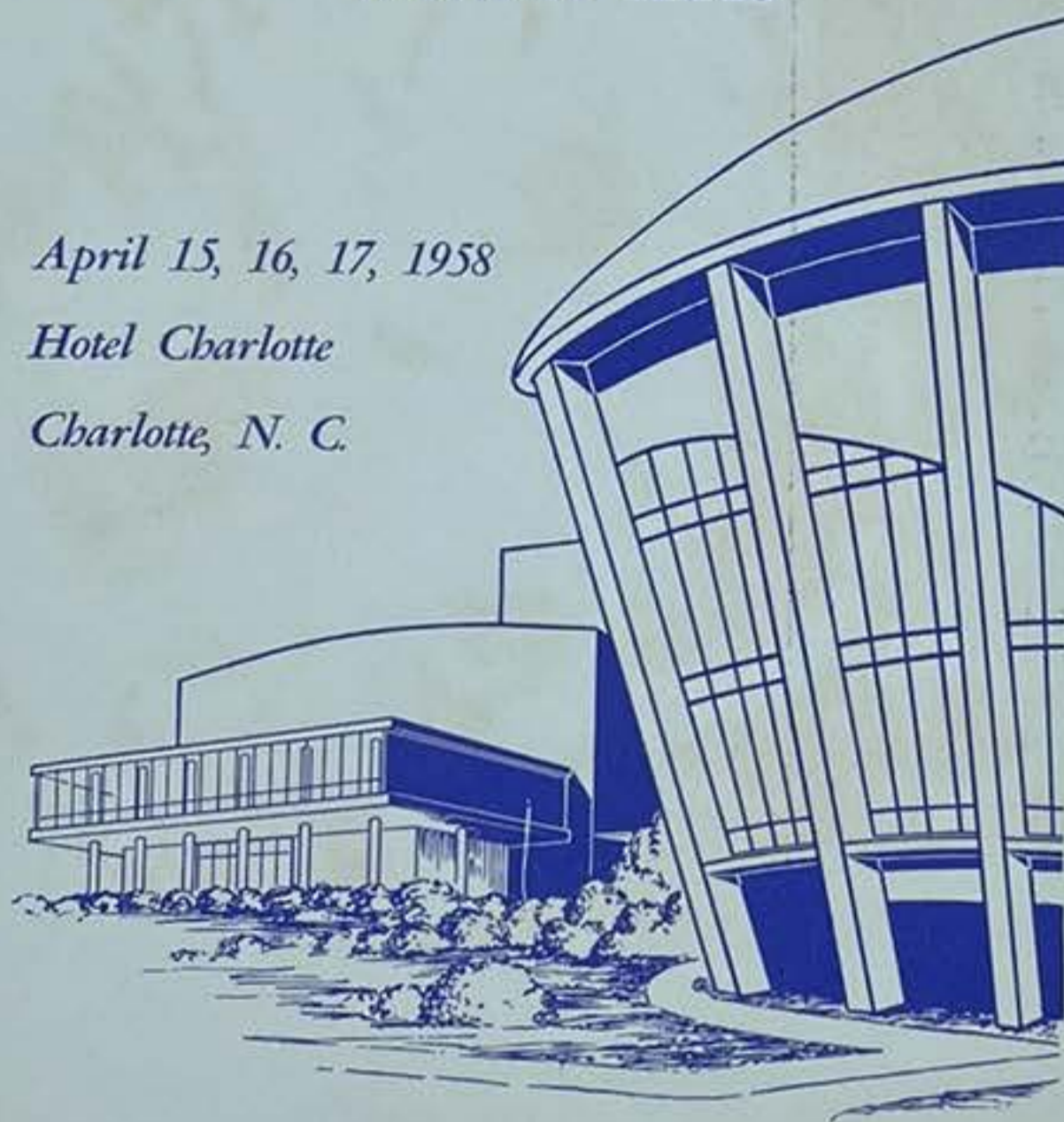


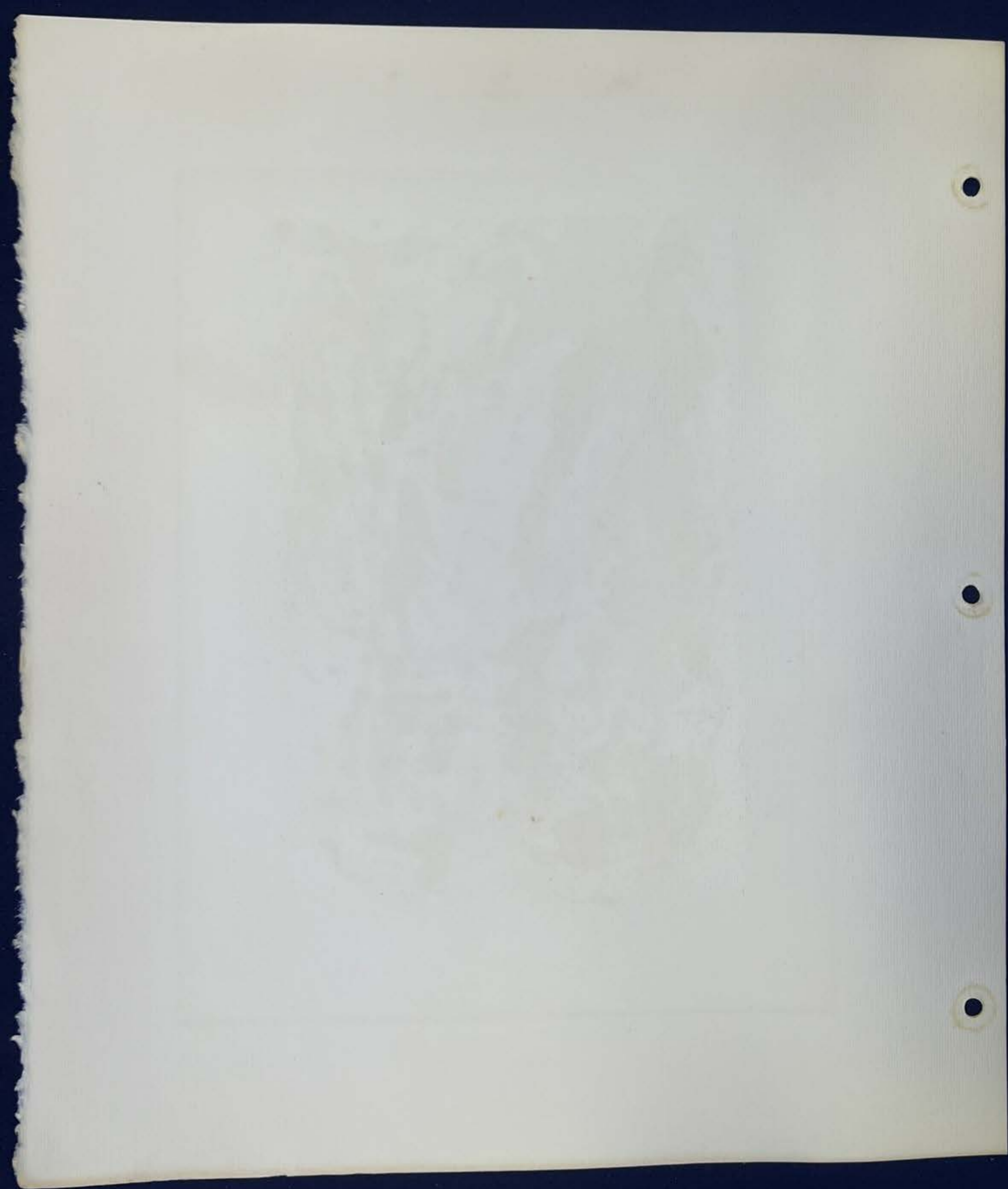

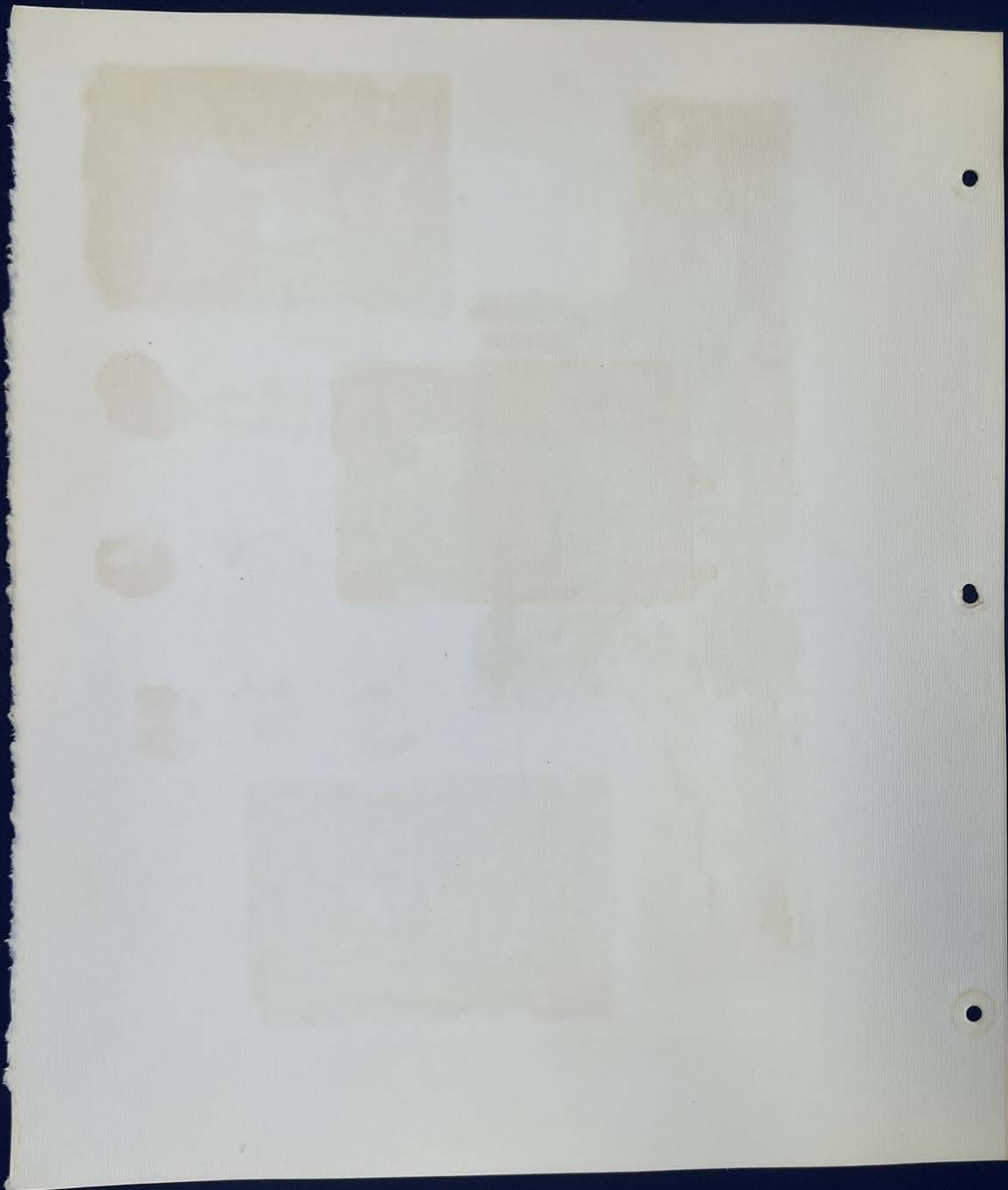

New Project For State Discussed

What was the North Carolina Federation Convention's new project at the 1958 convention became one of the chief topics of the mid-summer council meeting here yesterday.

The project is beautifying and improving of the Samarcond Manor grounds.

Mrs. Gordon Maddrey of Ahsokie introduced as new chairman of the new project, by state president, Mrs. Raymond T. Dent of Spruce Pine, took over the afternoon program.

"Our object now," pointed out Mrs. Maddrey is "the improvement and beautification of the school grounds."

Mrs. Maddrey's speaker, Blaine Madison, Commissioner of Correction, emphasized the need for beauty at the Samarcond.

"Beauty itself," he said is important therapy in correction. Beauty in the surroundings helps develop emotional stability."

"Correction, training" he went on, "is not cheap but it's much less expensive than crime. We accept students with behavior problems. And we have fewer than 10 per cent repeaters. Repeaters run around 68 per cent in the prisons."

"Students at Samarcond," continued Madison, "are not problem girls, they are girls with problems."

Interest Not New.

Tar Heel Woman's Club members interest in these girls with problems dates far back into the State history, according to Madison's speech yesterday.

According to him the bill that passed the 1917 legislature, providing funds for such a correctional school was spurred by Mrs. J. R. Chamberlin of Raleigh, then chairman of the State Federation's legislative Committee.

The need for such an institution, said Madison, had been discussed at nearly every state Federation convention since 1902.

"I want to thank the North Carolina Federation, for their never-failing interest in Samarcond," he concluded.

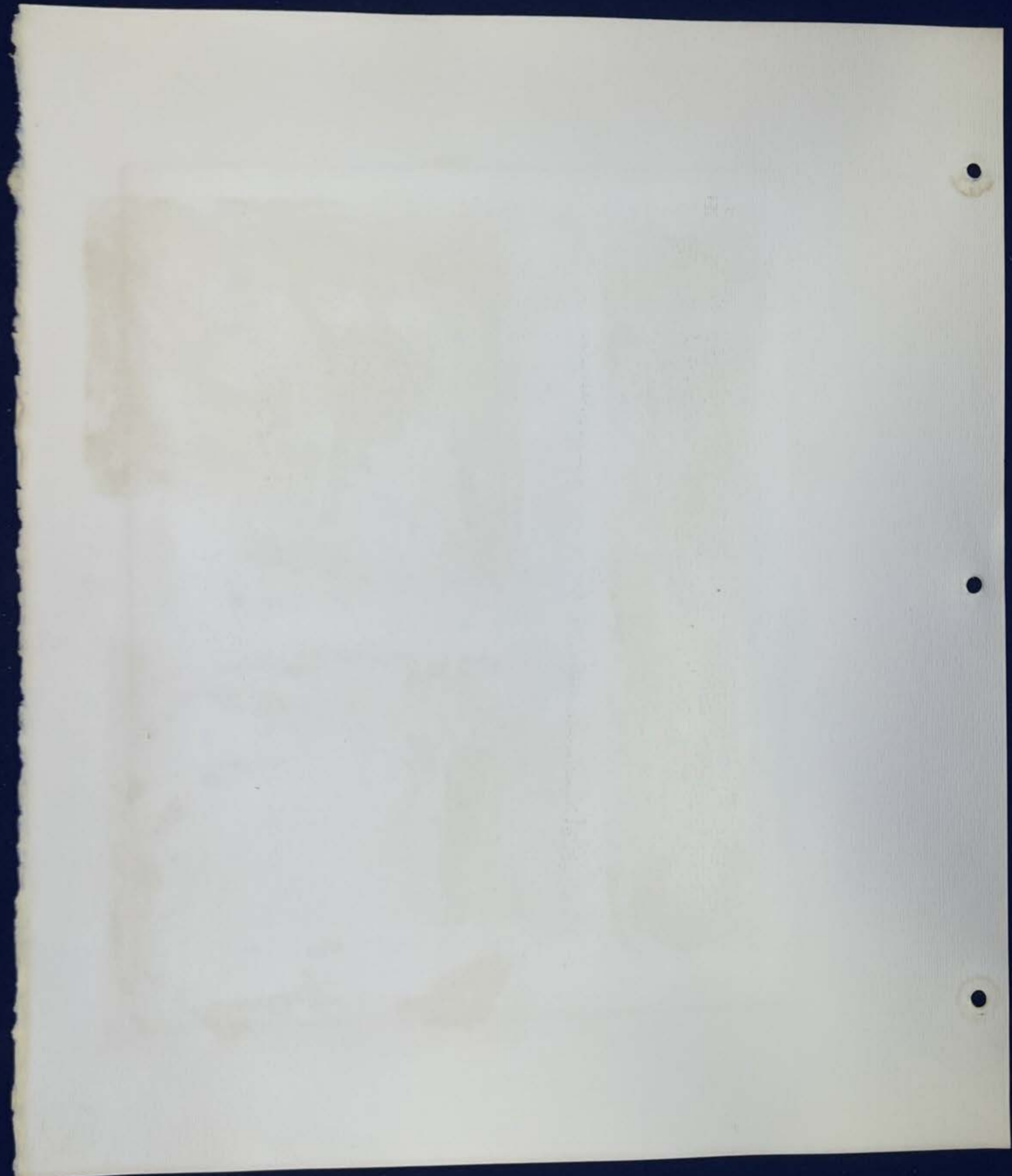

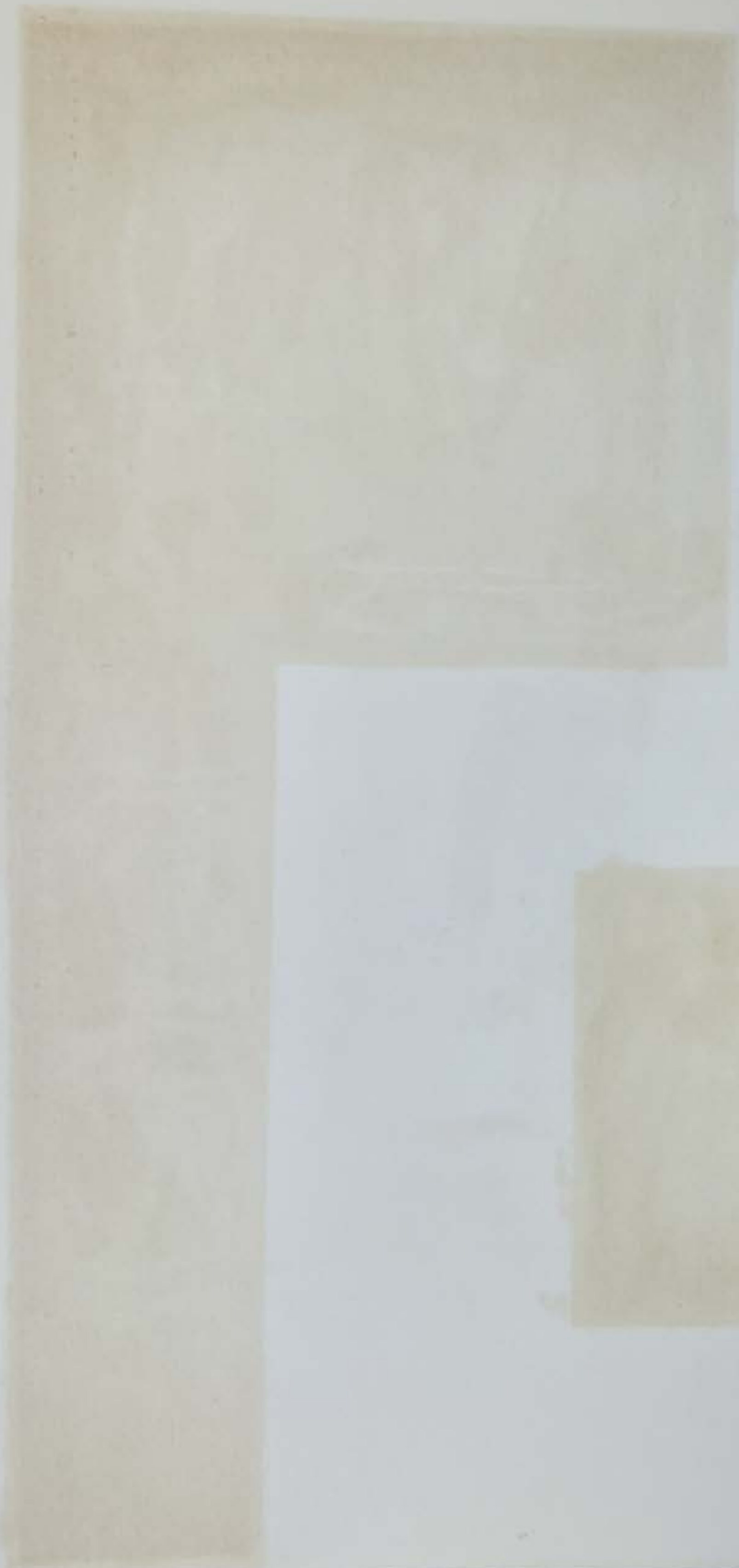

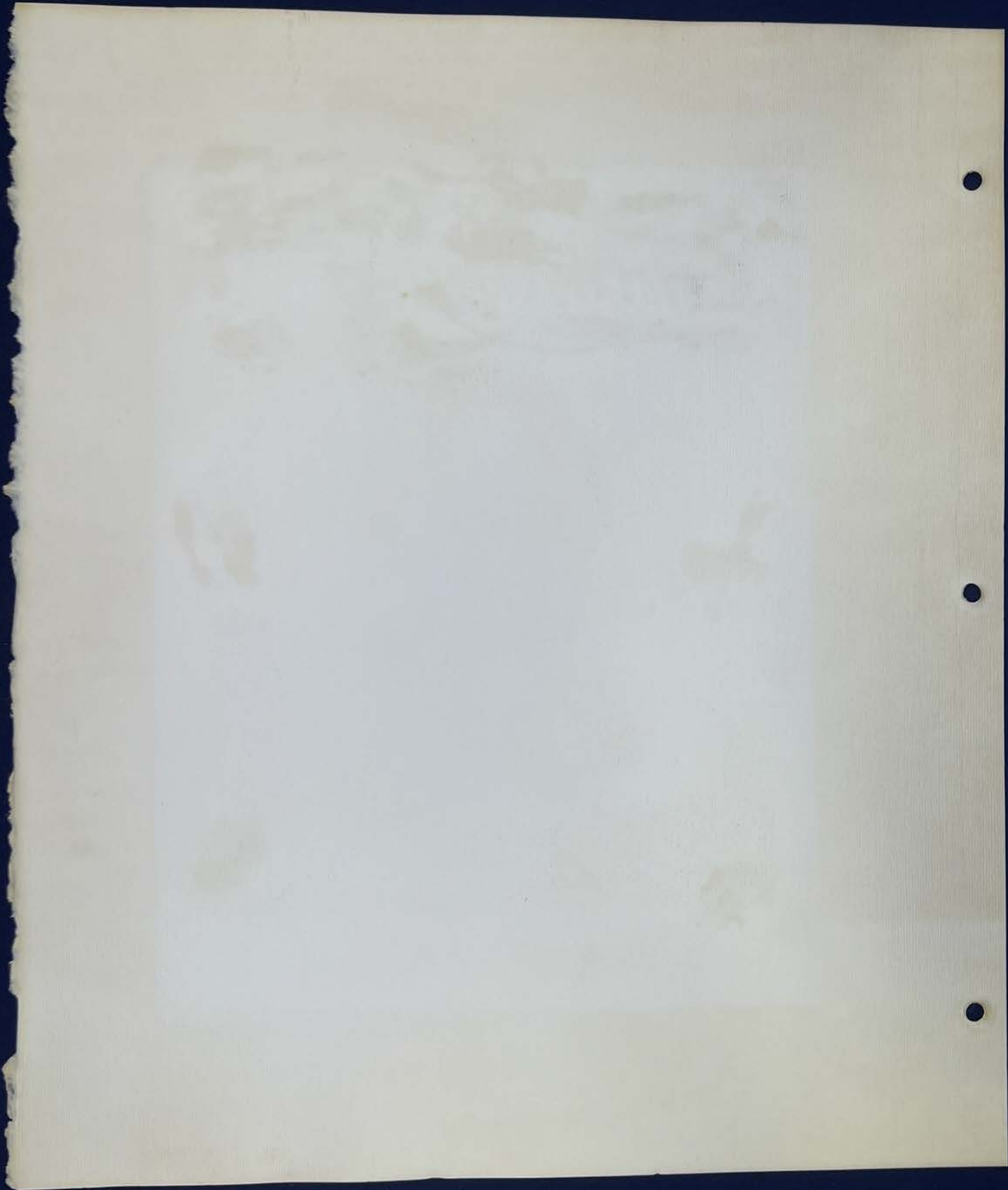
The decorations were beautiful and the sandwiches and cookies the prettiest and most delicious we've ever seen. We will remember the occasion for a long, long time.
