### REPORTS

STATE MISSIONS Ever since the day the Baptist State Convention was organized, March 26, 1830, at Greenville, with 14 members, its avowed put pose has been to "give the convention was organized to the conv pose has been to "give the Gospel to N. C. and then to all the world." How successfully the founders of the Convention and their successors have proved the founders of the Convention and their

successors have wrought may be seen by the following comparisons:

In 1830 there would be seen by the following comparisons: In 1830 there were only 15,000 Baptists in N C., white and colored. There are now 375,767 white Baptists in N C., white and ly 240,000 pegro Bartists white Baptists alone, and approximate about ly 240,000 negro Baptists, making a total of around 600,000; about 48 church members out of 48 church members out of every 100 in N. C. are Baptists. There is not a county in the is not a county in the State and scarcely a town of any size without a Baptist church. Harrow and scarcely a town of any size without a Baptist church. However, in many places the Baptist cause greatly needs strengthening The first year the Convention met it reported \$700 for Missions and Education, the two objects to which it contributed. Last year contributions to all benevolent objects, including the Orphanage, amounted to \$737,317 32.

Not until 40 years ago when Columbus Durham became Cor. Sec. devoting all his time to the work, did the Baptist cause begin to gather momentum. For seven years, Dr. Durham threw himself into the work with the zeal of the early disciples. Then came John E. White for five years, followed by L. Johnson for 15 progressive years, when the cause went forward by leaps and bounds Then came Walter N: Johnson for 5 years, during which period the 75-Million Campaign was launched and new financial levels were reached, which we have not been able to attain since. For the past seven and a half years Charles E. Maddry has directed in a masterly way the affairs of the Board as its executive head, being now the General Secretary of the General Board. He has associated with him in the direction of the State Mission department A. C. Hamby Mars Hill, and Walter M. Gilmore, Raleigh.

Notwithstanding the appropriation for State Missions has been reduced each year for the past four, from \$146,000 to \$132,000, then to \$77,000 for this year, there is a debt of around \$60,000 on the running account of State Missions. Still more drastic cuts will be made next year unless there is a marked increase in the income of the Board. This would be suicidal to all the work; for it is only as we strengthen the stakes at home that we can hope to lengthen the cords to the ends of the earth.

The Board is helping to sustain this year 87 missionary pastors who are serving 147 churches The report at our last Convention showed 118 missionaries serving 200 churches, organizing 11 new churches, receiving by baptism 1,921 and 1,740 by letter and othewise

Department of W.M.U., Mrs. W. N. Jones, Pres., Mrs. Edna R. Harris, Raleigh, Cor. Sec. Number of W.M.U. organizations now in the State, 2,443 with a membership of 40,326. There are 5 general workers, including the office force, and 3 other special field workers. Over \$265,000 contributed to denominational objects last year by different W.M.U. organizations. There are 972 churches Out of the 2,325 in the State without any sort of missionary organization, and there are 133,073 women connected with our churches who are not affiliated with any missionary organization.

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in the State, with a membership of 323,777. B. Y. P. U. Department, - Perry Morgan, Raleigh, Sec., Winnie Ricket, Jr. Intermediate Sec., Marguerite Harrison, Goldsboro, and Mary Frances Biggers, Salisbury, field workers for the east and west, with 11 associational Sunday School and B.Y.P.U. field workers. There now 2,066 BYPU organizations in the State with approximately 60,000 members. Each of these BYPU's is a training camp for the future leaders of the denomination. 1,287 churches without any B. Y. P. U.

Evangelistic Department. - Only 2 evangelists now, J. C. Canipe, Roxboro, and J. H. Moore, Durham, who is working with the colored people. Some 75 churches are being aided this year by volunteer pastors.

Student Activities: The Board is cooperating in maintaining the following student workers: R. P. Downey, Wake Forest; L. H. Tapscot, Chapel Hill; Y. C. Elliott, N. C. State, Raleigh; Miss Cleo Mitchell, N. C. C. W., Greensboro.

Preachers' School: One of the most hopeful features of the work is this school at Meredith College in June. More than 250 preachers attended the last session.

Book Shop: of the Board is rendering invaluable service in Kingdom building. Miss Madge Alderman, Raleigh, is Manager.

### THE TASK AHEAD

To evangelize 600,000 people in N. C. over 10 years of age who are not Christians; to enlist in all the work of the Kingdom the 250-000 members who are doing nothing; to train for effective leadership our young people; to bring about a great revival of Christian Stewardship. When this is done, the Kingdom of God will come in a day.

23 cents out of each doll r given to the Co operative Program will be devoted to the promotion of our State Mission work.

### J. A. McKaughan, H. S. Burleson, J. M. Whitaker, BAPTIST CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM

The General Board of the Baptist State Convention at its June meeting adopted \$600, 000 as the goal for North Carolina Baptists to raise in 1928 for all the objects included in the Co-operative Program except the Orphanange.

This objective is to be divided equally between State-wide and South-wide objects as follows:

In co-operation with the other associations in the State we recommend that this association adopt the above ratio of division of its funds and that it set as its goal for 1928 \$ ......, which is a little more than 1926; that this amount be apportioned upon as fair and equitable a basis as possible among all of the churches of the association by the Executive Committee of the association, or by a special committee; and that each church endeavor to raise its objective by making an every member canvass Dec. 4-11, the Southwide date set, or at such other time as may seem best, or to raise it by some other method adopted by the church.

In order that this Every-member Canvass be successful, we would recommend further that the most thorough and prayerful preparation be made, beginning several weeks in advance, giving information about the objects included in the Program, and thoroughly indoctrinating the people with the idea of stewardship.

We also recommend that a Mission Leader be elected to represent this association in its dealing with the general State organization, and that this Mission Leader, in co-operation with the Executive Committee of the association or a special Mission Committee to be appointed, communicate with each local church and try to effect a simple organization consisting of a Mission Leader and a Mission Committee of four others at least, and to co-operate with this committee mittee in every possible way in putting on and successfully carrying through the Co-operative program for 1928.

### STATE OF CHURCHES

Last year 20 churches reported a total membership of 2,258; this year 20 churches reported a total membership of 2,127.

Last year 20 churches paid pastors \$2,715.56, an average of \$137.57 per church; this year 20 churches paid pastors \$2,548.06, an average of \$127.40 per church.

Last year 20 churches reported financial expenses, including pustors' salaries, \$4,976.30; this year 20 churches reported total expenses, including pastors' salaries, \$6,577.98.

Last year 5 churches reported \$118.71 for Co-operative Program; this year 13 churches report \$417.25 for Co-operative Program.

Last year 10 churches gave Orphanage \$176.37; this year 10 churches gave Orphanage \$255.59.

Last year 20 churches reported Sunday schools with total enrollment of 1,826; this year 19 churches reported Sunday-schools with a total enrollment of 2,196.

Last year 2 churches reported W. M. U.'s; this year 3 churches reported W. M. U.'s.

Last year 4 churches reported B. Y. P. U.'s; this year 4 churches reported B. Y. P. U.'s.

This year 2 churches reported Sunbeams.

Last year 16 churches reported 156 baptisms; this year 17 churches reported 127 baptisms.

We find an increase in Sunday-schools and in Co-operative Program, and a decrease in pastors' salaries.

BAPTIST ORPHANAGE

Perhaps no institution under Baptist supervision lies so near the hearts of the people, as does the Baptist Orphanage at Thomasville, and the Kenedy Home at Kinston, North Carolina.

At present there are 500 children at Thomasville, and 114 at the Kenedy home, and 365 children are being cared for with their mothers in their own homes. It costs about \$600 per day to support

Among the 360,000 Baptists of the state, mostly poor people, a stream of appeals is coming in at the rate of 50 to 100 a month, most of them turned away for lack of room or funds. All home resources should be tapped and utilized for the care of unfortunate

children before the Orphanage is thought of as a place of refuge. Out of more than 2000 Sunday-schools only about one-third of them are contributing regularly to this object.

We would urge a once-a-month collection in all Sunday-schools, for the Orphanage. And we would recommend that one Brother or Sister in this Association be appointed to keep in touch with all

the Sunday-schools in the Association, and solicit more help for the G. W. McGuire, Orphanage. D. M. Wheeler, J. C. Storie,
