

ANNIE KNOTTS HOYLE

Annie Knotts Hoyle was born in Wadesboro, North Carolina. She is one of 10 children born to Thomas Hendrix and Lois Smart Knotts. At age 16 she responded to an invitation to become a Christian with a group of other young people who had been permitted to leave school and attend revival services. As she later reflected upon her decision during her high school years, she committed herself to Christian service.

With sacrifice and personal discipline, she prepared herself for a career in education. She attended Appalachian State University, UNC-Greensboro, UNC-Chapel Hill and graduated from East Carolina with a degree in Elementary Education. Later she earned two master's degrees from George Peabody College, now Vanderbilt University. Her degrees are in Elementary Education and Supervision and Psychology. She has also done post-graduate study at the University of Vermont, University of Nevada, and San Diego State Teachers College in California.

Her teaching career spanned the state of North Carolina. She began in Anson County in a two-teacher school where she also served as Principal. She taught the first grade in Bladen County. She came to Jackson County in 1948 and taught at Camp Lab School. In 1950 she married the School Principal, Mr. C.A. Hoyle. Mr. Hoyle died in 1971.

She left the public school system at the invitation of Western Carolina University to teach in the Education School and the English Department. After leaving there, she founded the Child Development Department of what is now Southwestern Community College.

Through the years her Christian witness and influence upon children and teachers of children have been both profound and immeasurable. Many of her former students continue to keep in touch with her by mail, telephone, and personal visits.

When she moved to Cullowhee, she joined the Cullowhee Baptist Church. Her impact and contribution to that church is beyond measure. She has been Sunday School Director and teacher, WMU Director, Church Training Worker, Deaconess, Church Treasurer, and she has served on numerous committees through the years. She has given generously both in time and of resources to help the church fulfill its ministry.

Her contributions to the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association are widespread and significant. She has the vision of the Kingdom of God being greater than just her own local church. She has a burden to see churches work together and a willingness to help churches grow in their awareness of mission and ministry.

To that end, she has served the Association as Clerk for 17 years. She has served in leadership capacities in the Association's Mission work as both WMU Director and GA Director at different times. She has volunteered her time and talents in serving on the Sunday School ASSISTeam, VBS Team, and Church Training Team.

She has served as Secretary for two Directors of Missions, Walter Middleton and John Reid. For the past six years she has served as Secretary and Assistant on a part-time staff basis and volunteered on a part-time basis to provide the Association with a full-time person in the office five days a week. She also served on the Memorial Committee and for many years concluded each annual meeting with an inspiring tribute to deceased church members. Her courtesy, helpfulness, and integrity continue to contribute to the efficiency and effectiveness of the Associational office in serving the churches and the county. The Annie K. Hoyle workroom is a visible reminder and lasting tribute to her generosity and to her love for the Association.

Her ministry has extended beyond the local church and Association. For five years she was BSU Director on the campus of Western Carolina University before the new building was completed. She served on the Executive Committee of the WMU of North Carolina. She is a member of the I.G. Greer Society of the Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina.

Beyond her church work she has served as Brownie Troop Leader in Scouting and has done volunteer work in the infirmary at Western Carolina University.

She is a member of Pi Delta Kappa, and a Past President of Delta Kappa Gamma. She is Past President of both the Southeastern Region of Association for Student Teaching and Southeastern North Carolina Education Association.

All of these accomplishments are the result of a fruitful life that is committed to Jesus Christ. Simply stated, Annie Hoyle loves the Lord and lives for Him. She understands the spiritual principle that to serve God we must become each other's servant. Her availability and her capability have been recognized and appreciated and often have brought her to the forefront in leadership. She offers help and encouragement where it is needed and wanted. She is comfortable on either the back seat or the front seat. She lets the need determine her action. She has the spiritual gifts of giving and of helping. She has been faithful to exercise her gifts. She continues to be an example in her servanthood, her leadership, her giving, her commitment, and her love for the Lord.

Proceedings

Thursday, October 13, 1988

- 1. The first session of the 159th Annual Session of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association was held at the Jarrett Memorial Baptist Church with the Little Savannah Baptist Church serving as co-host. A delicious meal was served in the Jarrett Memorial Fellowship Hall, beginning at 5:00 p.m.
- 2. The Reverend Roy Burnette, Moderator, called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m. He extended a welcome to the messengers and visitors and thanked the host churches for the meal and accommodations.
- 3. The Moderator reminded the messengers that they were in session to do the Lord's business.
- 4. The Reverend Harry Vance directed the singing of "Amazing Grace," accompanied on the piano by the Reverend Tommy Land, pastor of the Ochre Hill Church.
- 5. The Reverend L. Pangle, father of the Reverend Hazen Pangle, sang a solo and made several apt remarks concerning the marvels and wonders of the Saviour, Jesus Christ.
- 6. The Reverend Glenn Blanton, serving as interim pastor of the Black Mountain Church, led in a prayer then delivered a strong message using as his text scripture from I Corinthians 2. The title of his sermon was "The Things We Have Left Undone in Our Lives."
 - 7. The Reverend Harry Vance led the singing of "Stand Up, Stand Up for Jesus."
- 8. A motion to accept the agenda as it appeared in the "Book of Reports" was voted on and carried.
- 9. The Moderator asked all visitors to stand and be recognized; two stood. A call for pastors new in the Association this past year revealed that there were none.
- 10. The Reverend John Reid, Director of Missions, thanked the churches for their meal and hospitality. He congratulated the Jarrett Memorial Church for its 100 years of service to the Association and to the community. He described the Baptist people as a people of faith, and in assisting in the taking of the gospel into all the world thus fulfilling the mandate given by Christ.
- 11. In his report, Reid reviewed some of the mission work being done at the present time by the churches in the Association: namely, the West Virginia project, the Brazil project, Physically Handicapped, Inc., and many other local missions. The churches, he said, are gathered together as a family of churches. He read from the 1987 Annual the resolution that was adopted by the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association at the '87 Annual Meeting, to organize an Associational-wide prayer plan to pray for Spiritual Awakening. The Reverend Dan Ward has been elected as the chairman of this project. Two Associational-wide prayer meetings have been held.
- 12. Winston Hardman, Baptist Student Director on the Campus of Western Carolina University, spoke of the mission work that was being carried out by the students involved in the BSU. He thanked the several WMU organizations that had provided meals for the students when they were meeting to plan mission work. Students are available to give programs at any church desiring them. Each Thursday night the students hold a prayer for Spiritual Awakening.
- 13. Bill Dockery, a house parent at Broyhill Home for Children, brought a report on the work and needs of the Baptist Children's Homes. A copy of the report is included in the 1988 Annual.
- 14. Barnett Harris brought the report for the Retirement Homes in North Carolina. Three additional homes are either under construction or on the planning board for Winston-Salem, Charlotte and Asheville. The influx of over 50,000 people into North Carolina to retire has increased the need for additional facilities.
 - 15. Harry Vance led the singing of "When the Roll is Called Up Yonder."
- 16. Bobby Stafford, Director of Associational Development, brought the report from the Baptist State Convention. He stressed the need for reaching out to people.

- 17. Kenneth Crawford was unable to be at the meeting to report on the *Biblical Recorder*. This report may be found in the 1988 Annual.
- 18. Richard Roberson gave the report on the work being done at the Truett Baptist Camp. Music week attendance was up this year but the boys' and girls' weeks were slightly down. There were 28 professions of faith.
- 19. The report on Higher Education was presented by Horace Barefoot from Campbell College. He said that all of the Cooperative Program monies received by the college are used for financial aid for those students needing help. The Law School is said to teach more law than any other school in North Carolina. He introduced Calvin Knight as an example of a product produced by Campbell College.
- 20. Bill Horton, representing the Christian Action League, presented a report pointing out some of the legislature that would be coming up that would need our thoughtful attention.
- 21. Calvin Knight reported for the Baptist Hospital and the great work that is being done there.
 - 22. The group sang "Leaning on the Everlasting Arms."
- 23. The Reverend Jack Hinson, Chaplain at the C.J. Harris Hospital, reported on the Chaplaincy program. The Reverend Joe Yelton announced a seminar that would begin soon on the "Clergy and Care of Cancer Patients." This seminar begins on October 30. Hinson spoke of the urgent need for pastors to be prepared to meet and deal with such a situation when it arises.
- 24. Kenneth Pressley, chairman of the Constitution Committee, passed out copies of the proposed changes in the Constitution. He requested that the messengers take them home and study them and be prepared to vote on them during the second session of the Annual Meeting.
- 25. The Moderator announced the appointment of Alex Passiti, Lois Farmer and Dennis Burrell to the Resolutions Committee.
- 26. John Reid announced the Deacons, Pastors, Wives Fellowship for Friday, October 28, at Ochre Hill Church, with a special program for the senior deacons, pastors and wives. Reservations should be made on or before Monday, October 24.
- 27. The Moderator reported the registration of 28 visitors, 145 messengers, and 28 pastors, making a total of 202 with 34 churches being represented.
- 28. The meeting adjourned at 9:00 p.m.

Friday, October 14, 1988

- 29. The First Baptist Church of Sylva served a delicious meal to 202 visitors, messengers and pastors, representing 34 churches on Friday, October 14, 1988, the second session of the Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. The meal began at 5:00 p.m.
- 30. The Moderator, Roy Burnette, called the session to order at 6:00 p.m. He welcomed the messengers and visitors and expressed appreciation to the host church for the meal and the accommodations provided.
- 31. Lee Thomas, a student from Western Carolina University, sang a solo accompanied at the piano by Nancy Lewis.
- 32. The Reverend Ray McCall, pastor of the Webster Baptist Church, brought the message on "The Call to Obedience."
- 33. Harry Vance, Associational Music Director, led the group in singing "Victory in Jesus." The Reverend Tommy Lamb accompanied on the piano.
- 34. Lyndon Allen, Assistant Sunday School Director, gave the report of the work done in the Sunday School.
- 35. When presenting the Church Training report, Norman Parris, Director, announced "M" Night for November 28th.
- 36. Johnny Watson, Associational Brotherhood Director, gave the report on the mission work being carried on by the Brotherhood organizations in the Association.

- 37. The Royal Ambassadors' work was reported on by Mike Moses, Associational Director. He encouraged churches that do not have an organization to consider starting one and offered to assist with the organization. Two churches having organized RA work the past year were given certificates: namely, Cullowhee Baptist, certificate accepted by the Rev. Joe Yelton; and Ochre Hill, certificate accepted by the Rev. Tommy Lamb.
- 38. The Deacons, Pastors and Wives Fellowship report was made by Haven Ensley. He announced the next meeting to be held on October 28, 1988, at the Ochre Hill Baptist Church at which time the program would be recognizing and honoring the senior deacons, pastors and their wives. This is to be a special occasion.
- 39. Geraldine Jones, Associational Director of Youth, announced a musical festival at the Sylva Park on October 30th. Her report included numerous activities with the Youth Crusade the highlight of the year with 11 professions of faith. The youth will be attending a Witnessing Seminar at Truett Baptist Camp on November 11 and 12.
- 40. The Reverend Harry Vance, Music Director for the Association, encouraged churches to participate in the singings that would be coming up in the spring. His report appears in the Annual.
- 41. The Reverend Dan Ward, Associational Prayer Chairman, encouraged all churches to become active in the prayer program "Spiritual Awakening."
- 42. Shirley Kool, Associational WMU Director, related accomplishments of the organization for the past year. See report for details.
 - 43. "To God Be the Glory" gave praises to God for the work done.
- 44. Kathleen Buchanan made a motion that the 1988 Minutes be dedicated to Annie K. Hoyle, Clerk. The motion was seconded and CARRIED.
- 45. The Memorial Service for the deceased members of the past year was led by Kathleen Buchanan.
- 46. John Reid and Shirley Kool gave a brief report on their visit to Brazil.
- 47. In the absence of the Evangelism chairman, John Reid presented that report.
- 48. Jesse Flake, Associational Treasurer, presented the financial report for the year. The Revised Budget was exceeded by \$475.55. A copy of this report may be found in the minutes.

Jesse made a motion that the report be accepted. The motion was seconded and CARRIED.

- 49. Reverend Kenneth Pressley, chairman of the Finance Committee, presented the Proposed Budget for 1988-89. He made a motion that the proposed budget be adopted. The motion was seconded but in the discussion following, Joe Yelton made an amendment to the proposed budget that the Director of Missions salary package be restored to the Revised Budget level (\$800). The amendment was seconded and CARRIED (74-71).
- 50. The amendment made to the amendment requesting that the Director of Missions salary be restored to the original budget for 1987-88 was ruled out of order.
- 51. The chairman of the Committee on Committees was absent. John Reid requested that the name of Dean Stephens be placed on the Properties Committee.
- 52. Reid moved that the committee report be approved with the added name. The motion was seconded and CARRIED.
- 53. The Reverend Tommy Lamb spoke to the Missions Committee report. He explained the change in the name of the committee to Associational Missions Development Council. See the Annual Minutes for details of the work accomplished by the committee.

Lamb moved that the report be accepted. The motion CARRIED.

- 54. The time for adjournment was extended by 15 minutes by vote of the messengers.
- 55. The Time, Place and Preacher report was incomplete at this time.

Information was that the 160th Annual Meeting would be held in the Scotts Creek Church one of the sessions. The preachers for the Annual Session were Dan Ward and Charles Dean, with Charles Sisti and Robert Blanton as substitutes.

- 56. The motion to adopt this information was CARRIED.
- 57. The Nominating Committee's report was incomplete. A motion was made to adopt the part submitted. The motion CARRIED.

- 58. Tom Crowder gave a report on the Vacation Bible School. Both enrollment and number of churches participating and turning in reports were up.
- 59. The Reverend Lloyd Fish made a motion that the work of the Constitution Committee be held over until the next Annual Session in 1989. The motion CARRIED.
- 60. The Clerk, Annie Houle, presented the Digest of Letters. It was noted that baptisms were up over last year. A few churches had not reported at the time of the meeting. See statistical table for final results.

Program Reports

1988 Director of Missions Report

First, I want to thank the people of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association for the welcome you give me in your churches. I appreciate the prayers, the support and the encouragement that you give me as your Director of Missions. I feel that my first task is to be a servant to the local church and help each church realize its potential before God.

The ministry of the local church has been enhanced this year in many significant ways. I am particularly excited about the Brazil Partnership effort. Twenty-three churches contributed approximately \$4,000 in 1988. Shirley Kool and I went to Sao Paulo, Brazil in March of this year. Our purpose was to meet the local Brazilian Baptists, establish rapport with them, assess their needs and consider future projects.

The Association with which we are paired is the North Baptist Association of the City of Sao Paulo. They are an Association of 23 churches with a population of one and a half million people.

While down there I did some street preaching and saw 18 people make public professions for Christ. During the week we were there I saw over 30 decisions for Christ. Three people from our Association are going to Sao Paulo in late October of 1988. We have a request to send 10 teams comprised of three people in May of 1989. These teams will lead in an evangelistic crusade. The Brazilians request a pastor to lead each team to preach the revival services there.

Another way that the Association has enhanced the ministry of the local church is through its support of the Balsam Lodge project for Physically Challenged, Inc. The Executive Committee voted to recommend to our churches to set aside the third Sunday in October, the 16th, to receive a special offering toward that project. Since then several men, women and youth from different churches have done volunteer work at the Lodge. The goal of the project is to join with others in the community to make a recreation and retreat center accessible to disabled persons on the old Mead Lake Property now owned by the National Forest Service. Helping people with special needs is a worthy ministry for every church.

In December 1987, I went on a mission trip to Skygusty, West Virginia. Several Associational churches have been active in that area taking food, clothing, building materials, and people there to minister. I praise God for the difference we have made there.

In March of 1988, we had a Youth Revival that resulted in several decisions for Christ. Two or three churches baptized youth out of professions made at the "Crusade for Christ." This

event is planned again for next year and I hope to see more churches participate.

I am pleased with both the Senior Adult and the Single Adult work as it develops. These programs are now two years old. I hope that many of our smaller churches who do not have

programs for Singles and Senior Adults will take advantage of these programs.

I am grateful for the countywide support for the "Tuckaseigee Baptist Half-Hour." While this is not officially supported by the Association in our budget, I do believe it is an excellent means of Bible teaching and outreach. It keeps the activities of our churches and the Sunday School Program and lessons constantly in front of the county. Weekly, I encourage listeners to attend and to support their local church.

There is another way the Association has enhanced the local church. As your Director of Missions, I am called upon often to visit your churches, preach, teach, speak to WMU and Brotherhood groups, and consult with leaders. I have worked with pulpit committees, problem solving groups and been a resource to answer questions about church and community life in general. In respect to the autonomy of the local church, I have given priority time to churches who have needed assistance and asked for it.

Part of my task as Director of Missions is to attend meetings and functions of our Baptist work in the state. I attended our Evangelism Conference in February in Greensboro and the State Convention Staff/Director of Missions Retreat at Caraway in March. In May, I attended the Key Leadership Conference at Ridgecrest along with other Associational leaders. In July, I attended the Annual Meeting of the Directors of Missions Conference here in North Carolina. In August, I attended a skills meeting at Camp Caraway.

This fall, I have been invited to share my testimony of my street preaching in Brazil at the Baptist State Convention meeting in Fayetteville.

I commend Annie Hoyle for the fine work and for the many volunteer hours she contributes to the Association. She donates so many things on a regular basis at the Baptist Center that it is impossible to list them all. We are especially blessed by her gift of hospitality as she prepares refreshments for all of our meetings, large and small. Her ministry touches all of our lives.

I am thankful for the cooperation and financial support among the churches that enable us to do the Lord's work. Even with the corrective measures taken by our Executive Committee in May to reduce our budget, financial support from the churches has strengthened. You ARE to be commended for your increased giving.

We have conducted two Prayer for Spiritual Awakening Meetings here at the Center. I hope to see us grow in our prayer emphasis.

May God grant us His blessings as we work together for His Glory.

1988 Missions Committee Annual Report

It has been a significant year for the mission work of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. Mission work in our Association has expanded to new horizons in Home and Foreign missions.

Last fall, the Association voted to begin a five-year partnership with an association in the state of Sao Paulo, Brazil. This past spring, John Reid, our Director of Missions, and Mrs. Shirley Kool, WMU Director, went on a fact finding trip to Sao Paulo. They brought back a message of praise for the evangelistic efforts being accomplished in Sao Paulo, along with the need for people in our association to become part of this great outreach. One thing unique about this mission project is that there are no special abilities required to be part of the mission project. Any person who desires the opportunity, and accumulates the financial resources, may be part of this effort.

In July, the Executive Committee voted to participate in the work being done by Physically Challenged, Inc. in Jackson County. This project is an effort to make the old Meade Lodge and property on Bear Lake into a retreat and recreation center, accessible to those who are physically challenged. The Association voted to 1) recommend this project to the churches, and recruit volunteer labor, and 2) ask the churches to designate October 16th for a special offering to help pay for materials for this work.

It has also been a year that the Missions Committee took on a new look. Through the direction of the Home Mission Board and the State Convention, the mission efforts in the local Association have been restructured. The name has been changed to the Associational Missions Development Council. The duties of the AMDC are to lead the Associational Missions Development in the five mission performance tasks: (1) call churches to be on mission; (2) train, develop and encourage church and associational workers; (3) provide resources and services to churches and leaders; (4) provide opportunities for working together in missions, ministry, growth and evangelism; (5) establish and maintain appropriate communications and relationships with the community and the denomination.

1988 Woman's Missionary Union Report

THE WOMEN ARE TELLING THEIR AGE. The year 1988 was a year of celebrating their 100th birthday. The theme, "A Century to Celebrate, A Future to Fulfill," let us learn about our past while planning for mission education in our future. Did you know that the women's first organizational meeting was held in the basement of a Methodist church because the SBC men's agenda would not include them? Yet, in just two years the WMU raised enough money to support all women foreign missionaries and four years later gave the Foreign Mission Board \$500.00 and the next year gave \$5,397 to the Home Mission Board...the beginning of the two special offerings. Our watchword, Hebrews 13:7-8, "Remember your leaders..." is as important today as yesterday.

These "hundred year old women" have remained active this year in Jackson County. Our year included a Leadership Training Workshop led by Associational officers; an introduction to the state Brazilian project by George Shore, from our state office; World Day of Prayer observed; an Enlistment and Enlargement Workshop led by state approved worker, Alice Bates; several churches combined for both the Foreign and Home Missions studies, missionary from Brazil, Peggy Smith, was guest speaker for our Spring Annual Meeting; Bylaws were adopted at this Spring Meeting to help keep us informed of activities and opportunities to serve; and a page of "Mission Matters" has been written for the Associational Newsletter.

Mission Action projects encouraged our churches to work together to accomplish those things that would be difficult to do alone. Ladies of the Association contributed to the Baptist Student Union bake sale for earning funds for their spring mission trip to Florida. We hosted an open house at the BSU for international students attending Western Carolina University. Our Christmas gift was \$194 for the eight girls at Moody Farms Ministry. A total of \$395 has been donated for the Prayer Garden to be planted at Truett Baptist Camp in memory of Mildred Cowan and two antiques, belonging to Mildred, purchased for the Baptist Center also in her memory. A juice break was served for 500 North Carolina handicapped persons attending a conference at the Ramsey Center. We participated in the North Carolina Food Lion project, "Karts for Kids." Our summer project was to provide the luncheon for our pastors appreciation day.

Some growth was reported in organizations, but overall our number is down. Twenty-one (+4) organizations paid dues for 279 (-27) members. There are 30 (+3) Baptist Women organizations with 395 (+15) members; one (+1) Baptist Young Women groups with 10 members (+10) and another group just organized; there are six (-1) Acteen groups with 56 (+3) members, one new group starting this fall; there are 12 Girls in Action groups with 83 (-15) members including two newly organized groups; Mission Friends has 10 groups with 50 members.

The enthusiasm for Associational missions has grown this past year because, in part, the churches have given support to our goal of an association working together. The WMU Council provided leadership, support and dedication. Leaders for 1988-1989 are:

Institutional Reports

Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina Report

You took the time, you cared. You gave much when you didn't have to. On behalf of Dr. Blackwell, the children in care, our staff and trustees, thank you for your prayers, your caring and financial support. You are special to this child care ministry.

A major thrust beyond our quality child care this year was the completion of our Long-Range Plans. To continue being bold in child care, several challenges were accepted by our staff and trustees from the results of our five-year LRP. We plan to add two emergency care homes - another one on the Kennedy home campus and one where the need is greatest. The Cameron Boys Camp will be expanded to care for 50 boys. Two specialized small group homes will be opened by early 1989 - a teenage mother-baby home and a behavior change program for teenage girls in Lenoir.

Fifty percent of our children have had little or no spiritual training prior to their being in our care. We rejoice that 79 were baptized into the family of God. Our ministry is "Missions in Miniature."

To meet these challenges and continue the current ministry to children, our budget must move from seven million dollars (which it has been for five years) to 11 million by 1992-93. We hope that by 1993, the Baptists of North Carolina will be giving 50 per cent of our daily operating budget. Currently we receive 34 per cent. This can be achieved by increasing church receipts through the Cooperative Program, the Home and Hospital Offering and designated gifts from churches and individuals. The future of child care in North Carolina is in the hands of the Baptists of our great state. We believe they will meet the challenge.

UPDATE FOR THE WESTERN AREA

We here in the West continue to be blessed with mountain top experiences in caring for children. Moody Home in Franklin, Broyhill Home at Waynesville/Clyde, Thermal Belt Youth Shelter in Forest City and Haywood Emergency Care Cottage on the Broyhill Campus all continue to operate at near capacity levels.

While alternative options now open to unwed mothers have caused the demand for residential maternity care to somewhat decrease, the Baptist Maternity Home in Asheville continues to be one of our most blessed ministries.

The vast majority of the young people we serve come from the ranks of the hurt and the hurting. Sadly, very few have had spiritual training prior to their time with us. In order to help fill this vacuum, SONshine Week, a week of special Christian activities, has come to be a vital part of the Broyhill program.

One of the highlights of SONshine '88 was when Kristy, a high school junior, shared her personal testimony in a way that thrilled and amazed us all. Kristy shared how her life was now completely transformed because of Broyhill and because of Jesus Christ who now lives in her heart.

Equally thrilling to the testimony was the response of the troubled children who listened. As Kristy finished her testimony, the Broyhill children spontaneously gave Kristy a rousing, prolonged standing ovation.

Baptist Colleges Report Council on Christian Higher Education

WHAT IS A BAPTIST COLLEGE?

FIRST, Baptist colleges are colleges, places where teaching and learning take place. During 1987-1988 almost 18,000 students and more than 1,300 faculty members worked at the task of making your Baptist colleges good colleges. A college cannot be a church any more than a church can be a college. Christian education of church and community leaders is the task your colleges gladly undertake.

SECOND, the word "Baptist" tells what kind of colleges they are. Baptists began them all, provide financial support for them, and send their young people to them for a good education in a Christian environment. These colleges are special places where lives are changed and where life commitments come into focus for students.

THIRD, Baptist colleges are partners with the churches in missions. Each year there are many Baptist groups which are hosted and cared for by the seven Baptist colleges. Some of these who met at one or more of our colleges during 1987-1988 are these: January Bible Study preparation; summer ministries orientation for students working with churches; youth ministry retreats; youth choir festivals and children's choir camps; pastors' schools; Christian studies for pastors and their families; senior adult rallies; Directors of Missions summer meeting; church weekday education workshops; Special Olympics for the mentally retarded; Church Training doctrine seminars; pastor support conferences; church incorporation seminars; WMU-sponsored Acteens meetings; RA track meets; Pioneer RA Congress; Baptist Young Men's Congress; Crusader RA Congress; Baptist Student days; construction of Mars Hill College chapel by committees; March meeting of the General Board's Executive Committee; and more.

1988 North Carolina Baptist Hospital Report

Perhaps the word which best sums up the past year at Baptist Hospital is expansion - expansion of facilities and services.

The hospital, together with the Bowman Gray School of Medicine, is still in the midst of the largest health related expansion program ever in North Carolina. The \$140 million project has seen the completion of a four-story MRI building, the completion of a six-story addition to its research building, the completion of an addition to the power plant, completion of additional parking space, the near completion of a fifteen-story patient tower, and the beginning of a new clinical services building.

New programs in health care, initiated in recent months, include the Brenner Children's Hospital, the Sticht Center on Aging, a new hand center, ligament transplants, new methods

of treating certain types of cancer, new procedures for helping patients with heart problems, and the beginning of Air Care International.

During the past fiscal year, the total hospital revenue budget has been \$181 million. Total personnel is over 3,800. There were 22,085 patient admissions for a total of 196,554 patient care days. Some 13,680 surgical procedures were performed including 1,022 open heart operations and 32 kidney transplants. There were 282,907 radiological procedures, 4,401,552 clinical laboratory tests, 14,500 chemotherapy treatments, 833 lithotripsy treatments, and 480 Air Care missions.

The Department of Pastoral Care continues its ministries to: the patient in the hospital; the family and friends of patients; the medical staff who minister to the patient; the person requesting counseling in our centers in Winston-Salem, Fayetteville, Morganton, Charlotte, Rockingham, and North Wilkesboro; the ministers who seek our courses in clinical instruction, equipping them for specialized and pastoral ministries.

Added to these are our "Pastors' Sabbath" and "Interim Church" programs...as we work closely with the North Carolina Baptist State Convention in addressing the needs of pastors and churches.

The faithful delivery of pastoral care, beginning within our Medical Center and reaching around the world, is the ministry to which we make renewed commitment.

Like most hospitals throughout the nation, Baptist has been faced with a critical shortage of nurses and other health care personnel. A variety of programs are being implemented which are designed to attract and hold needed staff members. Among these are: a day care center for children of employees, wage and salary adjustments, weekend shift differential, weekend options program, case management concept, and a loan/scholarship program for students preparing for health care careers.

In January Dr. John Lynch, who had been president of the hospital for more than 17 years, submitted his resignation. The trustees have appointed a Search Committee which is seeking his successor. Mr. Len B. Preslar, Jr., who for many years has been vice-president for Financial Management, has been named chief executive officer.

During the past fiscal year, Baptist Hospital received \$659,062 through the Cooperative Program and \$290,585 through the Homes and Hospital Offering. The trustees, staff and patients are all extremely grateful for this financial support.

1988 Chaplaincy Hospital Report

Our Hospital Chaplaincy Committee continues to develop and expand our services in the name of the Lord.

The committee is in the process of writing a Strategic Development Plan. I am including our MISSION STATEMENT in this report.

The mission of the C.J. Harris Community Hospital Chaplaincy report is:

- to offer the presence of God to patients, staff and their families and friends,
- to assist congregations and clergy in ministering to the spiritual needs of the hospital patients, staff, and their friends and families,
- to offer training and support in the field of pastoral care to clergy, their families and staff,
- to increase community awareness of the Chaplaincy Program and to insure appropriate funding from congregations and other sources,
- so that religious resources and medical resources may be joined in the healing of the whole person.

 A workshop, THE CLERGY AND THE CARE OF CANCER PATIENTS AND THEIR FAMILIES, will be held at the hospital on October 20, 1988. Pastors and wives are urged to make reservations for the helpful and informative evening. A meal along with presentations by a physician, a psychologist, a nurse, and several cancer victims are planned for the program. Cost is \$3.00 per person and \$5.00 per couple.

Also, PREACHING AND PASTORAL CARE, an opportunity to meet with one of America's premier preachers, Dr. W.A. Jones, is scheduled for November 22.

We are grateful for the excellent volunteer work our Chaplain Associates do for the patients, the hospital, and the Kingdom.

Another training course is scheduled for February 1989. It will be expanded to cover current topics such as suicide, depression, alcoholism, time management and, of course, hospital visitation. More information will be ready in December about the Pastoral Care Course that will be sponsored by Southwestern Community College.

Please remember our financial needs. One-third of our budget is met from funds received from churches and individuals from Jackson County. The remaining two-thirds comes from the W.C. Hennessee Foundation.

Pastoral Care Sunday is October 23. Please inform your people about our Chaplaincy Ministry in any way you think will be appropriate such as:

1) prayer for the Chaplaincy Ministry,

2) receive an offering,

3) give out brochures,

4) testimonies by patients, staff or family members.

May God bless us all in the healing ministry.

North Carolina Baptist Retirement Homes Report

The Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc., began operation in 1951 with a charge to provide a Home for "Aged Saints" in the spirit of Christian care. The mission of the Homes continues to be that of providing quality residential opportunities for Older Adults within a Christian context.

The foundation of the ministry is based in the Gospel of Jesus Christ, for in the Gospel is a message of healing and wholeness. The Homes believes this message offers Older Adults the meaning, purpose, and dignity needed to enrich their lives. The hallmark of the Homes' ministry is the quality of its care.

The Homes operates facilities in locations across the state: Asheville in the West, Hamilton in the East, Yanceyville in the North, and Albemarle in the Southern Piedmont. A multilevel care facility in Winston-Salem currently serves the needs of Older Adults from all over the state.

According to a January 1987 report of the Office of State Budget of the State of North Carolina, the number of North Carolina citizens age 65 and over will increase by 28.9 percent by 1995.

Statistics for the North Carolina Baptist Older Adult Population are even more dramatic. The percentage of increase for the 80-plus age group in Baptist Life (those individuals most likely to need residential care) is predicted to be more than 50 percent by the year 2000. Attempting to address this great challenge, the Baptist Retirement Homes has launched a bold new program of development and ministry that includes the following:

The development of regional continuing care retirement communities. A five-level continuing care retirement community (Brookridge) is now under construction in Winston-Salem. Land for that same purpose has been purchased in South Charlotte. Planning for the development of similar communities has begun in Asheville and in Eastern North Carolina.

The development of a home health care ministry is another need that is in the planning. In 1988, the Homes received a grant from the Mary Reynolds Babcock Foundation to study the feasibility of establishing a volunteer-based Home Health Care program that will enable frail Older Adults to continue to live independently in their homes with some assistance.

The Homes believes that the ability to remain in one's own home as long as possible can benefit Older Adults by enhancing both their quality of life and their life-span. Fixed incomes and meager resources mean that Older Adults are also benefited as they seek to use their funds prudently: There will be NO charge for the Home Health Care services.

A third need being planned for is the development of financial subsidies for retired ministers and ministers' spouses and other older adults with limited financial resources for retirement living.

As we move into 1989, opportunities for creative ministry with Older Adults abound. With the support of North Carolina Baptists, the Baptist Retirement Homes will endeavor to turn those opportunities into the kind of reality that will meaningfully service the needs of the Older Adults of our state.

Sunday School Board Report to the Association

With 17 programs of work assigned to the Sunday School Board by the Southern Baptist Convention, it would be easy to see the heart of the church programs and publishing board's work as programs. However, President Lloyd Elder told messengers in the 131st meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention in San Antonio, Texas, that people must always be the focus of all the Board does through its programs.

"Sunday School and Church Training curriculum must be planned, written and edited with a biblical base to help change the lives of people," said Elder. "Scriptures must be made available at the lowest possible cost for our Southern Baptist people to share with others who need to hear and respond to the Gospel message. And we must make it as easy as possible for people to obtain literature and other products."

Effective March 1, 1988, Southern Baptists can order virtually any product the Board produces or sells by calling 1-800-458-BSSB. The advantages of this process are toll-free ordering and reduced response time to the customer. Also, churches may order literature via computer with the EASY Church Order System. Churches using this system either with their own computer or those in Baptist Book Store may receive a five percent discount on their church literature orders.

To illustrate the scope of the work of the Sunday School Board, a total of 208,514 telephone and mail orders and inquiries were received during the first six months of 1987-88.

A major new product to meet the needs of people is the *Disciple's Study Bible* released in June 1988 by the Holman Division in cooperation with the Church Training Department. Study helps focus on 27 great doctrines of Southern Baptists.

Also, for the second consecutive year, the Board provided free to messengers attending the Southern Baptist Convention copies of New Testaments to use in witnessing to people they encountered in San Antonio.

Increasing the evangelistic focus of Southern Baptist Sunday Schools is a continuing focus of the Board's Sunday School Division. By October 1988, the plan of salvation will be included each quarter in all Sunday School lesson periodicals. Sunday School leadership and devotional magazines and Vacation Bible School materials.

Work has begun through the Church Music Department on production of a new Southern Baptist hymnal to be released in 1991.

A reorganization of the Church Administration Department was completed to give increased leadership and support for church growth.

Approximately 6,500 Southern Baptist single adults attended a national convention Memorial Day weekend in Nashville sponsored by the Family Ministry Department.

1988 Truett Baptist Camp Report

We are in the midst of our camping program at Truett Baptist Camp. We are off to a pretty good season thus far.

This has been another year of remodeling. We had to do quite a bit of work on the Staff Lodge and we also finished the basement in the dining hall.

We have just completed our third week of girls camp with a good attendance. This was a good spirit-filled camp with 16 souls claiming Christ as Lord of their lives and several rededications.

Music week is going to be big this year. We thank God for that.

Boys weeks' registrations are coming in well, therefore, we anticipate good attendance for this also.

We have had a few more churches to start contributing to the camp this year. This has made it possible to do some much needed maintenance work that has helped to beautify the camp.

Our total professions of faith last year was 42. This is what makes all the hard work of the camp worthwhile.

Agency Reports

1988 American Bible Society Report

The longstanding and fruitful partnership between the Southern Baptist Convention and the American Bible Society continued to open new ways to the Word for millions of people across the globe in 1987.

Your support has been of key importance in the success of the many projects undertaken in 1987 in the ongoing task of meeting the Scripture needs of the world - whether expanded distribution in areas where the availability of God's Word is critically low, or through innovative channels of Scripture production, or through new translations of the Scripture.

Scripture distribution: As part of the global network of the United Bible Societies, the American Bible Society has been involved in the distribution of the Scriptures in at least 665 different languages throughout the world. The total number of Scriptures distributed worldwide during 1987 was 624,053,932 copies. This represents an increase of 4.0 percent over 1986, and continues the upward trend of the past few years. Of this total, 116,155,119 copies were distributed in the United States, an increase of 15.6 percent over last year's total.

Scripture production: One of the major highlights of 1987 was the completion of the Amity Printing Press in Nanjing, the People's Republic of China. The first 20,000 copies of an initial order for 100,000 Chinese Bibles were off the press by November, with the balance to be completed by January. A ceremony marking the official opening of the plant was held on December 5. This is an answer to prayers of many years that a way would be found to share resources with Christians in China so they could meet their Scripture needs.

The reports from various countries around the world include those from Uganda, Peru, Haiti, Lebanon, Indonesia, as well as many countries in Eastern Europe.

In the United States, the American Bible Society has continued vigorously to pursue its aim of serving the many diverse Scripture needs of the churches in this country. Here are just a few of the ways the ABS has been reaching out with God's Word to people across the nation in 1987: Scripture for youth and children; scripture for evangelism; and scriptures in languages other than English.

Behind the successful completion of each Scripture translation and distribution project is the story of people reached with the Word of God. As new populations are reached, new demands are placed on the resources of the American Bible Society. Tragically, there are times when these resources are completely overtaxed. The Society's unswerving goal is to meet all the Scripture needs that are presented to it, but we cannot do that alone. That is why we must turn for help to our partners in mission, among whom the Southern Baptist Convention ranks above every other denomination in terms of the financial assistance it renders to the Society. In 1987, the churches of the Southern Baptist Convention contributed \$255,073 to the American Bible Society in support of the worldwide Bible cause.

It is truly encouraging to see your fine response to the urgent need for Scriptures that exists in so many countries at this time. Although much more is needed, your support has made a vital and invaluable contribution to the ongoing challenge of opening God's Word to all.

1988 Baptist Foundation Report

For several years, Montagress Mercer has provided an example of estate stewardship to which members of the Foundation staff have often related, but always without revealing her identity. It was her wish that "nobody know." Mrs. Mercer died this spring. We can now share her name as well as her testimony. It was her wish that "Lottie" should have her farm. To accomplish that, the farm was deeded to the Foundation but she retained all benefits from it for as long as she lived. As the plan for doing this was explained to her and the possibilities unfolded, she clasped her hands together and exclaimed, "I'm so happy!" Now her happiness has been justified. That which she desired is now a reality: the income from her trust will be paid forever to the Lottie Moon Offering. It is incidents like this which tell the story of Baptist Foundation. Facts, figures and statistics have their place, but the people behind them are the real story.

Another unique expertise provided by the Foundation is in helping to analyze a person's total estate picture and assisting them in their complete plan of estate stewardship. Sometimes, a person only wishes to make a modest gift in trust for one specific cause and then is content. Often, however, the person realizes that both his family and Baptist causes he loves can derive a greater benefit from his estate, if his plan includes all of it. It may require more than one type of trust and nearly always a Will that capitalizes on the best possible planning. One couple, utilizing the Foundation's expertise for total estate planning, rather than making piece-meal plans and small bequests here and there, took full advantage of the tax laws available for them and provided fully for their son and the Baptist causes which they desired to support. Their satisfaction now comes from a coordinated estate plan. It is in total estate stewardship planning, not in "getting a gift" that the Foundation renders the greatest service.

The "unfunded" trust simplified planning for many persons in the past year and continues to provide a way to help meet the objectives of many stewards. The trust document is prepared to incorporate the provisions of the trustor's wishes. It will not take effect, however, until the individual is deceased. Then their WILL provides the funding, most often the residual estate being assigned to the trust, hence the term "unfunded." The individual has the joy of having a plan in place, all signed and legal.

Marjorie has updated her Will this year and created an "unfunded" trust. At her death, her entire estate will fund her trust. For a definite period of time thereafter, her family will receive income from the trust. At the end of those years, the income will support Baptist work forever. As she was discussing this with the staff, a new option became available to her. Her church established a Foundation trust whose income, when it is received by the church, will support local missions, the Lottie Moon offering, a church scholarship fund, and assist with capital improvement and maintenance of its historic beneficiary of her unfunded trust. To her, happiness is having an accountable plan in place for the accountable steward.

The Baptist Foundation added 62 new trust funds to its numbers in 1987. Gifts to trust increased its holdings to a record \$14,452,200. Trusts already in place provided \$578,697 in support of Baptist causes. As important as these statistics are, a significant aspect of the Baptist Foundation program is that it provides individuals, such as Mrs. Mercer, with an avenue for continuing their support of Christian causes beyond their lifetime.

Christian Action League of North Carolina, Inc. 1988 Annual Report to the Associations

The ministry of Applied Christianity needs committed Christians to "stand in the gap" for the cause of moral and civic righteousness.

GAMBLING—The greatest push ever for legalized gambling stands on the horizon. We have always had those who support a statewide lottery and pari-mutuel (horse and dog tracks) gambling. It is only in recent months that you have major candidates for statewide office in North Carolina that embrace such proposals.

We have seen neighboring states like Virginia (lottery), Tennessee (pari-mutuel gambling), etc. to approve gambling initiatives due to the silence of the church.

In the 1987-88 session of the North Carolina General Assembly, a lottery bill was defeated and a pari-mutuel gambling proposal died in committee.

The pro-gambling industry has hired lobbyists already on the scene garnering support for the 1989 legislative session. The fate of this issue will be decided on November 8, 1988, when voters go to the polls and elect their legislative leaders along with other key officials. Responsible Christian citizenship implies more than just voting but to be an informed voter. Billy Sunday put it this way: "The only thing worse than an empty voting booth is an empty head in a voting booth."

The Christian Action League will continue to keep you informed and working on the scene. It is difficult to be effective, though, when you elect legislators who are not committed to moral and ethical principles.

DRUNK DRIVING—Efforts will also continue in the area of alcohol, drunk driving, and other drugs. In the last session, several pieces of legislation that would have liberalized our liquor laws were defeated. Other measures dealing with drunk driving were virtually ignored or "sandbagged" by political maneuvers.

We are grateful for the passage of legislation creating a 0.04 blood alcohol level for drivers of commercial vehicles (trucks and buses). This becomes the strictest in the nation. Other vehicles have a 0.10 standard.

Drunk driving proposals, such as banning open beer-wine containers and increasing administrative revocation from 10 to 30 days for those having a 0.10 blood alcohol level or more, passed the House but got by-passed in the Senate. Who opposes such? The beer industry and certain trial lawyers who are more concerned about protecting drunk drivers than the safety of all citizens.

ABORTION—The issue of parental consent continues to be debated. The U.S. Supreme Court has upheld the rights of states to require parental consent before an abortion is performed on a minor. Attempts to pass such legislation in North Carolina have been met with legislative "footdragging." Such bills get channeled into hostile committees where they die. A school teacher cannot even give a student an aspirin without parental consent, but a minor can be taken to an abortion clinic without the parent's knowledge much less consent.

Furthermore, North Carolina remains the only state in the Southeast to use state funds to kill unborn babies. Legislation to limit state funding only to those cases involving the life of a mother, incest, or rape, has been rejected repeatedly.

TOPLESS DANCERS—There is one piece of legislation that got "derailed" that is unbelieveable. Since liquor-by-the-drink has been enacted in North Carolina, we have some bars and taverns near military installations that have been employing *minor* girls (as young as 15) as topless dancers. Legislation to correct this practice "sailed" through the House but was thrown into the "briar patch" in the Senate's Judiciary I Committee.

When legislation of this nature cannot pass our N.C. Senate, perhaps you can understand the dilemma facing our state. It is quite evident that we are electing legislators according to party label rather than on moral principles. Unless there is a turn-around, the future looks bleak for moral and ethical issues.

The cause of applied Christianity calls for our vigilance and commitment.

The Christian Action League stands with you in meeting the challenges of our times. Accept our gratitude for your prayers and financial support as we join with you in being "salt and light."

The Gideons International Report

Gideons have also kept check to see that Bibles are in all hotel and motel rooms, doctors' offices, and hospital rooms throughout the county. The Jackson County Camp has received approximately \$12,000 during 1988 to be used to purchase scriptures.

With the help of Christian friends like you in many different churches, Gideons have been able to supply more Scriptures for the world.

Stewardship Report

II Corinthians 9:7, "Every Man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity; for God loveth a cheerful giver."

This Scripture tells us several things. (1) Everyone is to give. No one is exempt. (2) Our giving or failure to give reflects the condition of our heart. (3) Our giving is not to be coerced no more than our lack of giving is to serve as coercion. We give to honor God. (4) God is pleased when we give.

This is true both in our local church and in our association. I believe that every member church can and should give. Giving reflects the heart and vision of the church. Neither church nor the association should coerce the other in the matter of giving. God is pleased with the generous church.

Sometimes it is helpful to compare with what has been done in the past to measure where we are now and where we are headed.

In 1982 we had 48 churches with a resident membership of 6,872 (four churches not reporting). The Budget was \$21,810. Each resident member's share was \$3.18. Thirty-three churches contributed 76 percent of the total budget.

In 1987 we had 50 churches with a resident membership of 6,571 (four churches not reporting). The Budget was \$32,285. Each resident member's share was \$4.91. Thirty-six churches contributed 79 percent of the total budget.

I am pleased with the overall improvement of the stewardship development in the Association. We are headed in the right direction. It takes time and information to the local church to educate as to the value of cooperation. We must always remember that missions is not an option, but the Biblical Mandate.

My challenge is to each church to intentionally develop stewardship responsibility in mission giving and to include the Association in its mission gifts.

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

Constitution

(Revisions: August 16, 1957; August 16, 1975; August 19, 1978; August 17, 1979; August 15, 1980; August 13, 1982; August 17, 1984; August 16, 1985 and August 22, 1986. The 1987 changes are indicated by an asterisk*.)

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II - OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the association are as follows:

- 1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches,
- 2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.
- 3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.
- To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.
- 5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III - AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. The association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline.

SECTION 3. The association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the New Testament.

SECTION 2. The association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watch care of the association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watch care the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the association except those of voting.

Applications for membership shall be presented to the Credentials Committee of the Association. The applications will consist of a letter from a Constituted Church stating their desire to affiliate with the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. The Credentials Committee as a part of the review process may invite the requesting church to a conference to discuss its history, its missions strategy, and any other information that may be pertinent to the application. The Credentials Committee may then approve the application and recommend them to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee may by a simple majority vote accept the requesting church to come under the watch care of the association for one year. It is suggested that any church under watch care participate in the missions program of the association. At the end of the year the church may be voted in as a member of the association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the Annual Meeting of the association, provided that the church submits an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. Any church may withdraw from the association at its pleasure and should notify the association of this action in writing. Such action will be recognized by the association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the associational clerk, before each annual session, an annual letter, the forms provided by the associational clerk giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

SECTION 5. The association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such a vote is to be taken by written ballot.

ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The association shall hold its annual meeting on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in OCTOBER. Special meetings of the association may be called by the Executive Committee provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by four messengers. Churches with more than 100 resident members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for each additional 50 resident members as determined by the church or fraction thereof and not to exceed 10 messengers from any one church.

SECTION 3. Churches are requested to elect their messengers and alternates in conference to attend the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the question is decided as to which party is in union with the association. The decision is to be made by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS

SECTION 1. General officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, and Assistant Parliamentarian. Program Leaders shall be Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Chairman of Evangelism Committee, Seminary Extension Director, Chairman of Missions Committee, Director of Missions, Trustees, Pastor Conference President, Youth Director, Stewardship Director, Vacation Bible School Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Deacons Chairmen, Senior Adult Director, Singles Ministry Director, and such other officers as the Association may desire to elect.

Associational representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: (1) Truett Camp, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Baptist Hospital, (4) North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc. (Homes for Aging), (5) Biblical Recorder, (6) Christian Education, (7) Annuity Board and other representatives as may be deemed appropriate and elected by the association.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the director of associational missions and trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The moderator and vice moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of trustees the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service the trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session. The Associational Financial year will begin at the close of the Annual Meeting.

Concerning termination of employment, the resignation shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least 30 days before it is to take place. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving 30 days notice in advance.

The Executive Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the work of the Director of Missions in planning, promoting and financing his work.

ARTICLE VII - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The Moderator shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the association.

He shall appoint the Committee on Committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the Committee on Committees in its regular report.

SECTION 2. The Vice Moderator shall assist the moderator and shall preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the moderator.

SECTION 3. The Clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; shall prepare a "Book of Reports" to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

The clerk shall mail to the clerk of each church in the association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the state convention. This form is to be returned to the clerk of the association not later than two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

An Assistant Clerk shall work with the clerk in preparing "The Book of Reports."

SECTION 4. The Treasurer shall receive and dispense by the order of the Executive Committee of the association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report at the annual meeting and a current report at each Executive Committee meeting.

An Assistant Treasurer shall be elected to assist the treasurer by request and to serve in the event the Treasurer resigns or is ill or unable to function.

SECTION 5. The Historian shall keep the records of the association up-to-date.

SECTION 6. The Parliamentarian shall upon the request of the presiding officer of the body advise and assist the association with respect to all matters involving parliamentary procedure.

An Assistant Parliamentarian shall be elected. The Parliamentarian and Assistant should always communicate with each other to ensure that their office is filled at each associational annual or Executive Committee meeting.

SECTION 7. The Program Leaders and the Institutional Agency Representatives shall perform all duties customary to their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the association.

SECTION 8. The Director of Missions shall work closely with the associational committees, officers, and churches in such a way as to facilitate the meeting of the objectives of the association as set forth in Article II.

The director shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the association. The director shall communicate with the state and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

The duties of the Director of Missions shall be set forth in Article XIV.

SECTION 9. Trustees have no authority except by direction of the association, and are not personally bound by their signatures but, are to be the legal signees for the association.

Trustees represent the association in legal matters.

Trustees act on behalf of the association in acquisition and disposal of associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the association.

All persons dealing with the trustees, as associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the association moderator and clerk.

ARTICLE VIII - RULES OF ORDER

The business of the association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE IX - QUORUM

The annual associational quorum shall be not less than 25 percent of the member churches represented.

ARTICLE X - THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the general officers and program leaders elected by the association and the pastor and one member from each church in the association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an associational officer or program leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the association on matters arising when the association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the last Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the moderator with a one week notice to the churches.

SECTION 3. All vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 4. In the event that a vacancy occurs with the trustees, the Executive Committee should fill such a vacancy for the remainder of the term.

ARTICLE XI - ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The term of office for all committee members shall be for one year except where specifically stated otherwise.

SECTION 2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the general meeting all standing committees as set forth under Article XI.

SECTION 3. The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members. To this group the directors of Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and Music Ministry will be added.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers, program leaders and institutional/agency representatives. These nomineees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior to presenting of their names at the annual session.

SECTION 4. The ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE, composed of three members shall plan the annual program of the association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July meeting.

SECTION 5. The CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of churches seeking admission into the association in keeping with Article IV, and make recommendations to the association.

It shall counsel with churches that are out of harmony or fellowship with the association. SECTION 6. The PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. The RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members appointed by the moderator at the OCTOBER Executive Committee meeting. It shall be the duty of the committee to present suitable resolutions at the annual associational meeting.

SECTION 8. The MEMORIAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the annual meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in their memory.

SECTION 9. The FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members including the treasurer of the association. This committee shall: (a) present a budget to the association for the following year; (b) devise plans for raising the funds for the associational budget; (c) audit the finances and financial records of the association annually and anytime there is a change of treasurer or at the direction of the association or the Executive Committee; (d) report all audits to the annual association meeting.

SECTION 10. The CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three

members and shall perform all duties specified in Article XV.

SECTION 11. The ORDINATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five designated pastors and all other pastors who desire to sit with the committee.

a. The committee serves in an advisory capacity only and serves at the request of the church from which one of the members is seeking ordination.

b. The committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the church as they feel led.

c. The committee should assist in arranging the proper service of ordination when such assistance is requested.

d. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee.

e. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee, and shall give two weeks notice in which the committee is to do its work.

SECTION 12. The EVANGELISM COMMITTEE. The duties of the committee shall be to direct and promote a perpetual program and spirit of evangelism in the association. It shall arrange and direct all associational wide evangelistic activities.

SECTION 13. The MISSIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members, two named each year and each serving for a three-year term. Committee members are eligible to be re-elected for one additional term of office in succession. The associational Brotherhood Director and Woman's Missionary Union Director are to serve as ex officio members along with the Director of Missions and the Moderator.

The duties of the Missions Committee shall be to plan, conduct and evaluate the mission program of the association through: (a) Helping churches commit themselves to being ON MISSION in their setting; (b) Provide and interpret information on mission needs to the churches of the association; (c) To survey the mission needs to be found within the association; (d) Assist churches in doing mission work; (e) Conduct the kinds of mission work that individual churches cannot successfully conduct.

SECTION 14. The BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE shall be comprised of three members. The committee shall be responsible for and in charge of the upkeep and repairs of the associational building, grounds, and equipment.

ARTICLE XII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

*The ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Director of Missions, the Vice Moderator, the program leaders: Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union, the Brotherhood Director, the Chairmen of Deacons, the Chairman of the Missions Committee, the Chairman of Evangelism, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, the Vacation Bible School Director, the Youth Director, the Director of the Singles, the Director of the Senior Adults and the Music Director. The Director of Missions is to serve as Chairman and a secretary shall be elected from the group.

The purpose of the council is to coordinate the planning of the various programs of the association, to develop an associational calendar, and to give mutual support to the various organization and program units in carrying out their assignments.

The council shall meet quarterly.

ARTICLE XIII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL PASTORS' CONFERENCE

The Associational Pastors' Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist ministers of the association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

ARTICLE XIV - DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS JOB DESCRIPTION

SECTION 1. FUNCTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS. He is to be the chief administrative officer of the association. He is to confirm extra employment in a manner agreed upon with the Executive Committee.

SECTION 2. RELATIONSHIP OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS.

1. He is employed by the Executive Committee of the association.

2. General supervision of the personnel and program of the association as they function through the association office.

3. Work primarily with (pastors), associational general officers, committees, and organizations.

4. Work closely with auxiliary organizations (such as W.M.U., Baptist Men, etc.).

5. Lead in maintaining relationships with state and S.B.C. agencies and promoting their programs.

SECTION 3. In the churches, extending the local ministries.

To visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders, in the pastorless churches to provide assistance in the church program and ministry, such as (1) Pulpit supply; (2) Study courses; (3) Missionary address; (4) Deacons' meetings; (5) Assembly programs; (6) Special day addresses; (7) Ordination services; (8) V.B.S. planning and promotion; (9) To interpret phases of associational work; (10) Budget planning; (11) Building planning; (12) Revival meetings; (13) Stewardship emphasis; (14) Study objectives and long range planning; (15) Studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, constitution and bylaws, etc.; (16) Church-community surveys, etc.; (17) Promoting a world missions concept; and (18) Publishing of a regular news medium (such as a monthly newsletter); (19) Cooperate with the news media to promote Baptist work.

In the associational office:

- a. Personal correspondence, promotional mail, and telephoning pertinent to his work.
- b. Office conferences, answer to inquiries, etc.
- c. Assist associational officers, committees and heads of organizations to get out promotional mail pertinent to their work.


SECTION 4. Schedule of Benefits

- 1. His salary shall be
- 2. His fringe benefits shall include
- 3. His schedule shall include:
 - a. One day a week, chosen at his discretion, shall be reserved for rest that excluded normal associational activities.
 - b. A maximum of four weeks each year outside of the association for special work with local churches or with state and S.B.C. agencies.
 - c. An annual sick leave of 26 days maximum, with a maximum of 42 days to be accumulated. Sick leave may be advanced by the association for one year without Executive Committee action. Sick leave is to be recorded with the financial secretary of the association.
 - d. Two weeks annual vacation with pay.
 - e. Holidays: New Year's Day; Easter Monday; July 4; Labor Day; Thanksgiving, Thursday and Friday; Christmas, December 25 and 26.
- 4. All honorarium from churches inside or outside the association and all honorarium from other religious work shall be his personal fair, and shall not be submitted to the association.

5. The Director of Missions is afforded the opportunity of an annual evaluation by the Moderator and Missions Committee.

ARTICLE XV - AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the association by a twothirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Constitutional Committee at least 10 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.



SYLVA FIRST: We have been celebrating our 100th Anniversary the entire year of 1988. We had Founders Day on March 13th, Homecoming will be October 9th and SCI Celebration, October 2nd.

WEBSTER: Built ramps, improved walks, steps and entrance.

Brief Historical Notes Sylva First Baptist Church

CENTENNIAL

In the fall of 1887, the spiritual climate among the people in Sylva evidently was at the right point for organizing a Baptist church. Elder F.M. Jordan, a church planter and revivalist, mentioned Sylva in a diary of his life and work. A native of Montgomery County, North Carolina (near Mt. Gilead), Elder Jordan made a note of his move to Hayesville (Clay County). He traveled by horse and buggy, and his diary entry for October 27, 1887, stated, "I stop at Sylva and preach five nights—good meeting."

Information recorded in the church's first record book, entitled "Sylva Church Book," provides statements on the Church Government, Officers, Duties, and Articles of Faith. These are recorded under the date of November 26, 1887. Page five begins with the same date and gives the organization as follows:

Elds. W.A. Nelson, A.H. Sims, and J.R. Ammons were called upon to act as presbytery. Called Elder W.A. Nelson to act as Moderator and J.R. Ammons to act as Secretary.

Six members presented themselves asking to be constituted into a Baptist Church. The members presented letters of dismission from Scotts Creek and Webster Churches. Read the articles of faith as copied (sic.) from the Church Book at old Scotts Creek Church to the members. All endorsed it. Read Constitution and Bylaws adopted. Read Church Covenant adopted.

Presbytery gave to the members the hand of fellowship and recognized them as a Church of Jesus Christ. Elder Nelson and Ammons both giving a charge to the Church.

Signed J.R. Ammons, Secretary

In the back of the Sylva Church Book a list of members shows the following "Constitutional Members" or founding members: A.M. Parker, D.J. Allen, C.W. Allen, Kelly Allen, Charles B. Allen, and Sarah Allen (wife of D.J. Allen). During the year additional members joined the fellowship. When the Sylva Baptist Church (the name used until July 1965) was welcomed into the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association on August 16, 1888, there were 13 charter members: D.J. Allen and wife, Sarah Allen, and four of their sons, J.K. Allen, L.P. Allen, Charles Allen, and Lenoir Allen; also Mrs. Rhoda Watson; Alfred Parker; Mrs. Tobitha Dillard; a Mrs. Patterson and two daughters, Mary Patterson and Paralee Patterson; and Miss Alice Reed (who married L.P. Allen).

The Sylva Church Book apparently was lost for more than 60 years. In 1928 when the church celebrated its 40th anniversary, March 1888 had been determined to be the organizing date and that date has been used in subsequent years as the beginning of the church.

The Sunday School was organized on Sunday, January 12, 1890, with the following officers: "A.M. Parker, Supt.; W.C. Allen, Asst. Supt.; F.A. Luck, Secretary. Classes: No. 1—L.C. Hall, Teacher; No. 2—Lela Potts, Teacher; No. 3—Pollie Davis, Teacher; Infants—John Sutton, Teacher." The collection for the pastor totaled \$1.70.

An item in the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association minutes for 1906 reveals that the Sylva Baptist Church "organized the first Woman's Missionary Society on January 13, 1906." Mrs. Etta Walters Allison was President. The time of meeting was stated as Tuesday after the second Sunday of each month. "Dues 10 cents. Number of members, 26. Object: For God, For Home, and Every Land."

Other notations from the Association minutes included the following:

- 1889—60th Annual Session, August 15-18 at Shoal Creek. Delegates: A.M. Parker, W.C. Allen, and Kelly Allen.
- 1890—Offerings were: Home Missions, \$16.00; Foreign Missions, \$2.00; Minutes, \$1.50.

 Notation from the Sunday School Report: "The Sabbath School means work and no grumbling; and we note that workers never grumble and grumblers never work."
- 1893—Sylva Baptist Church gave \$3.00 for Ministerial Education to Wake Forest College.
- 1898—C.B. Allen replaced A.M. Parker as Church Clerk, Mr. Parker having served for 10 years. There were 11 additions by baptism and five by letter, making a total membership of 50.
- 1907—Sunbeam organized on June 21 with nine members, meeting every Sunday afternoon.
- 1921—Membership: 49 males and 91 females, for a total of 140.
- 1958—Total membership: 443.

First Baptist Church has had women serving on its Diaconate since 1957, and women have been extremely active in a variety of leadership roles for many years.

Since its organization, First Baptist Church has had a total of 28 different pastors and seven known interim pastors. Early pastors usually were elected annually for a one-year term. Many of them served two or more churches at the same time, with worship services being conducted monthly on Saturday and the following Sunday. Beginning in the 1920s, longer tenures became more the norm.

A significant era in the life of the church began in the early 1950s and continued for approximately 20 years. During that time the church embarked on a building program which included purchasing a new site, constructing a new church plant, and purchasing a parsonage, for a grand total of \$400,000. All indebtedness was retired in 1973.
