MISSIONS.

It was just before he took his final leave of this world that our Lord commanded his churches to "Go," "Teach," or make disciples, of all nations, baptize them, teach them to observe all things, with the promise that he would be with them to the end of the world. This has been appropriately called our marching orders till Jesus comes again. They were to begin at Jerusalem and go to the uttermost parts of the earth Mat. 28: 18, 19. Acts 1:8. Luke 24: 46, 48.

This obligation is as binding on the churches now as it was upon the Jerusalem church. The disciples carried the gospel to the then civilized world in about 30 years. Gal. 1:23. The question that confronts us now is, why are we not as intensely missionary as were the early churches? When we consider the fact that God has thrown open the doors of the world to us and the obligation is as binding on us to go as when just given to the early churches, we ask, why, oh why are we so slow to go?

We note with pleasure that several of the churches continue to contribute to the support of Bro. D. W. Herring of China. The letters reported about \$77.50. We hope more than this was given to him. 3. The pastor's duties are: (a) To devote himself to his calling. Our

(c) To refute error, reprove errorists and transgressors. This is taught in Isaih 58:1, II Tim. 4;2 and I Sam. 13:12.
