

### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We are pleased to learn that the interest in Sunday Schools continues. As one of the great hindrances in carrying on Sunday Schools is the want of competent teachers, we would recommend that the members of all our churches organize themselves into classes for the weekly study of the Bible, and as an aid to this study, we suggest the use of helps published by our own societies. Let each church consider itself a missionary body, and go out into the high-ways and by-ways and gather together the children into the Sunday Schools. We also recommend the continuance of the Sunday School Board, and that a connection be formed with the Sunday School Board at Raleigh by ours, and this Association appoint delegates to the next Baptist State S. S. Convention which is to meet in

Your Committee to consider the propriety of striking out, or modify-

ing Art. 9 of the Constitution, submit the following:

WHEREAS, We have learned that the services of Rev. Dr. Hufham can be secured as general Missionary of this Association, provided we secure him a salary of eight hundred dollars; therefore

Resolved, That the Executive Committee be instructed to employ Dr.

Hufham, using the money now on hand for Associational Missions, for this or other necessary purposes at their discretion, and that the list of churches be called, and pledges secured, with the understanding that they be applied to his salary.

Resolved, That if from any cause Dr. Hufham's services cannot be obtained, that such article be amended to read as follows: The Association shall appoint an Executive Committee of seven members, which shall advise and co-operate with the State Mission Board, with reference to Associational Missions, colportage and Sunday Schools. They shall have power to take such steps for the advancement of these objects as they may deem advisable, and shall receive from the Treasurer of this Association, and during the intervals between the meeting of this body, all sums intended for said objects, and pay over to the Treasurer of the State Board, and shall make an annual report of their proceedings to the Association.

#### REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

Prophetic, or ministerial education was, under God, practiced by the ancient Jews, and taught in the schools of the Prophets. Our Saviour taught his disciples for about three years in his own school of Theology, and thus prepared them for the great work of preaching the gospel to the then unknown world. Sanctified education, like that of St. Paul, is necessary to the spreading of the grapel, and giving the good news of salvation to the nations of the centh.

The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary has about ninety students, and is doing a great and blessed work in fitting our young ministers for

and is doing a great and blessed work in fitting our young ministers for enlarged usefulness in gospel labors.

There are about thirty young ministers at Wake Forest College, about twenty of them are sustained by the Board of Education, with the funds contributed by the churches. No work of the denomination has paid better than the education of our rising ministry. In all parts of the State we find them occupying important posts, and preaching with acceptance the gospel of Christ. This large Association ought to sustain at Wake Forest several beneficiaries all the time, and by a united effort it can be done. Would it not be well for this Association to commence it can be done. Would it not be well for this Association to commence, or devise such means as shall insure the accomplishment of this important work, and do it now?

The Board of Education at Wake Forest College, is much in need of funds to meet the constant and increasing number of applications for aid. If the Board had the funds, it could soon have fifty beneficiaries under its care. The responsibility of this great matter rests upon the churches. If they withhold funds, the cause must langush, if they supply the manner it will responsible. ply the means it will prosper.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The work on our foreign fields was never before in the history of missions so prosperous and hopeful. In Italy, China, Africa, Mexico and Brazil, the missionaries of the cross have found free access to the people, and the gospel of Christ is preached tolthousands who for ages worshiped stocks and stones. In India, the word preached has had free course and been glorified in the salvation of thousands. During this year, a new mission to Mexico has been established, and the missions in Rome and China have been strengthened. Dr. Graves will return to his work in Canton next month. Dr. Yates has greatly improved in health and regularly preaches to his church in Shanghai, and has nearly completed a full translation of the Scripture in the language of that land. God has greatly blessed the labors of our missionaries, and the dawn of that promised and coming day when the heathen shall be given to Christ for an inheritance, and when a nation shall be born in a day, is breaking the horizon of our outposts in India, China and Africa. outposts in India, China and Africa.

The nations of the whole earth are now ready to welcome the mission-

aries of the cross, and are eagerly learning the customs and habits of civilized countries. They crowd our shores, send their children to our schools, while our commerce and enterprise occupy their marts with ships, and build railroads across their hitherto impenetrable continents. In all this, as well as in the success attending our labors, God is speaking to us, and bidding us go forward and preach the gospel to every creature. This is the work he has committed to his church.

Resolved, That our pastors be requested to bring the subject of Foreign Missions before their churches, and take up collections for this object during the coming associational year.

The report of the Trustees of Warsaw High School was presented, and after remarks by Elders Kennedy, Eason and Stallings, was adopted.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES OF WARSAW HIGH SCHOOL.

In our last report to this body, we stated that we had leased the building and premises for a term of years to the principal of the school, Elder J. N. Stallings. Various improvements have been made on or about the premises since taking charge thereof, and others will continue to be done as occasion and circumstances may require. Through the characteristic zeal of the principal, and commendable faithfulness of an efficient corps of teachers, the school is now better than it has been at any time hereto-fore. A finished education can be acquired at this school in the department of literature, music and the fine arts; the instructors all being fully equipped for their work, and exhibiting an untiring diligence and earnestness in their efforts to impart instruction to those committed to their care. A necessary course of discipline, firmly but affectionately administered, both in and out of the school, is another admirable feature in its therefore the discipline of the school character: and nothing now remains to be done to make all its most sanguine friends ever contemplated, but to give it the cordial and undivided support of all the churches within the limits of the Eastern Association. Indeed, it is the equal of any school in the State; is eminently worthy of the patronage of all our people. The last session numbered fifty-five students. The present one has about the same number, and we can double it by the next session of this body if we choose. Dear brethren, let us accomplish this object.

The great work of his life seemed to be the fostering of associational missions; and in the interest of this great Christian euterprise, he gave much of his precious time; and of his means, purely for its promotion. He attended every session of the Association forty-eight years, and was a delegate every year of that period except one, when he was excursed at his sown request, owing to imfirmity of body, and was its chairman several years. The only civil position he ever held was that of magistrate. Having been reared under religious influences, his bilde was fixed as the grand storehold such positions in the church as would enable him to promote the holds o

cherished, fostered and ardently loved every christian work of theirs in all its phases, and so may Israel say, "Blessed are the dead who die in the Lord, for their works do follow them." May coming generations cherish the memory, and imitate the example of him whose boasting was

It is also our painful duty to announce the death of Elder Asa B. Alderman, cut down in his youthful prime; just as he had entered upon his Master's work. He united with Moore's Creek Church early in life, and he ever afterward exhibited the meek and lowly spirit. He was ordained to the ministry two years ago. Possessing the advantages of a liberal education at the Academy and Theological Seminary, the hope of a bright future, and the prospect of future usefulness in the vineyard of the Lord seemed surely to await him, but he has been taken away. He died in Onslow County. N. C., where he had been Missionary and Pastor, beloved by many christians, and honored by friends for his deep piety.

The Committee on Ministerial Support reported. Adopted. REPORT ON MINISTERIAL SUPPORT.

The commission to God's ministers is "Go preach the gospel." The apostle Paul says, "Even so hath the Lord ordained that they which preach the gospel should live of the gospel." Outside of the city churches, Goldsboro, Newbern and Wilmington, we do not know a single minister in this Association who is living of the gospel. Our pastors are farmers, mechanics, lawyers, doctors and teachers; and really obtain the greater part of their living from these sources, as well as devote the larger portion of their time to these callings. That there is glaring inconsistency here cannot be denied. This state of affairs is not only inconsistent, but is not conduc ive to their prosperity or devlopment; it is rather a great drawback. Our pastors can do little more than preach to their cengregations, and their pastoral duties, apart from preaching, must go neglected. A church will certainly decline, even under great preaching, if there be no pastoral work. It is written, "Thou shalt not muzzle the ox when he treadeth out the corn," and our Lord has written, "The laborer is worthy of his hire." Our churches with this light before their eyes, cannot fail to see that it lies with them whether they shall have an efficient ministry or not. If the churches withhold from pastors that support which is their due, and which the New Testament allows, the present condition of affairs must remain as it is. We therefore earnestly recommend that the churches loose the hands of their pastors, and enable them to devote their entire time to the Master's work. In conclusion, we would respectfully recommend to the Association to make a more vigororus effort to place a suitable brother in the field as a Sunday School Missionary, believing that great good would result from such an enterprise. 
On motion, petitionary letters were called up for the purpose of locating the next session of Association. The decision was in favor of Emma's Chapel Church, Onslow County.

## CONSTITUTION OF THE EASTERN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be denominated and known as the Eastern Association.

ART. 2. The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men; and the means of accomplishing this shall be in

ART 3. This Association shall be composed of delegates chosen by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates, who shall be members of that church.

ART. 4. The delegates from each church shall bear a letter, certifying their appointment, and communicating information relative to the state of the church; Provided however, That when any church has prepared a letter and through inadvertence the letter fails to be presented, her dele-

gates may be received without its presentation.

ART. 5. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be annually chosen from among its members by ballot, by a majority of the members voting, and continue in office

until their successors are elected.

ART. 6. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to enforce an observance of the Constitution, preserve order, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion on any question under discussion after others have spoken, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

ART. 7. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record the proceedings of

each annual session and superintend their printing and distribution

among the churches.

ART. 8. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches, or collected during the session of this body, and disburse the same as ordered by the Association. He shall also make to the Association an annual report of the condition of the Treasury.

ART. 9. The Association shall appoint an Executive Committee of seven members, which committee shall have the superintendence of Associational Missions and Colportage. They shall have power to disburse all sums paid by the Treasurer of the Association for the objects under their charge, and during intervals between the meetings of this body to receive and disburse funds for those objects and to take such steps for their advancement as they shall deem advisable, and shall make an annual report to the Association of their doings.

Art. 10. The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of her churches which perfect to preserve ground order.

her churches which neglect to preserve gospel order.

ART. 11. The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats, and extend to them all the privileges of the body except that

of voting.

ART. 12. The annual session of this Association shall commence on Tuesday after the first Lord's day in October, at such place as may be

ART. 13. By appointment of the Association, there shall be an Introductory Sermon of a denominational character, and a Missionary Sermon. ART. 14. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by

a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deporment; to avoid
and use of intoxicating and excessive anger; to abstain from the sale
efforts to advance the Kingdom of our Saviour.

We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to reto cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling, and courtesy in speech; to be
the rules of our Saviour, to secure it without delay.

We moreover, engage that when we remove from this place, we will,
as soon as possible, unite with some other church, where we can carry

as soon as possible, unite with some other church, where we can carry out the spirit of this Covenant, and the principles of God's word.

## Rules of Order.

1.—On the meeting of the Association, the Moderator of the preceding session shall preside until his successor is known. In case of his absence

session shan preside until his successor is known. In case of his absence a chairman pro tem shall be elected.

2.—Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercises, to be conducted by whomsoever the presiding officer may name. 3.—At each daily session, and previous to proceeding to business. the names of the delegates shall be called, and the proceedings of the pre-

4.—The members shall observe towards the officers and each other that courtesy which becomes Christians.


5,—Any member wishing to speak shall arise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid personalities.

6.—No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without permission.

7.—All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer before discussion.

8.—No motion shall be withdrawn after its discussion

9.—When a question is under discussion, no motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to amend, to commit, or postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order
