MINUTES.

FIRST DAY-MORNING SESSION.

CONVENENT THREE FORKS ASSOCIATION OF BAPTIST convened in its forty-eighth session in Boone Church house, Boone, Watauga Co., N. C., Sept 11, 1888.

After an intermission of one hour and fifteen minutes, the Messengers were reassembled at the ringing of the bell and called to order by the Moderator.

On motion, the regular order of business was suspended and the report on State Missions was read by C. Durham. Report received and Bro. Durham made an able speech on same. Then adopted the report on

STATE MISSIONS.

Activity is life, stagnation is death. Missions is life, anti-missions or omissions is death. The Dead Sea is properly named—always receiving and never giving. He who having authority, gives a command, expects it to be obeyed. The Lord Jesus has commanded us to give the Gospel to every creature, and He expects it to be obeyed. Shall we meet or disappoint this expectation. Our faith is the limit of God's power to help us. Our God-given work is the test of our faith. We live in a wonderful age. Every new development makes it the more important that we should be fully alive to our opportunities. God guides. Shall we not follow? The people who are gone, and those who now live on these mountains and in these beautiful valleys have been given the Gospel by the toils and sacrifices of our fathers. Shall we not now give it to every town and county neighborhood in our State? The board of Missions and Sunday Schools of the Baptist State Convention is struggling hard to do this work. Since our Convention in Nov. last it has commissioned 87 Missionaries and 13 Colporteurs. These are located in the destitute sections, from Ashe and Alleghany to the Sea. They have this year done a good work, and have been greatly blessed of the Lord. The Board publishes "The Gospel Herald," a monthly Mission paper, which it thinks is worthy, and will be helpful to all the Pastors and churches, where it is taken. Can we not, in the strength of the Lord, arise and do more to give the Gospel to all of our people than ever before?

EDUCATION.

Education is receiving more attention than formerly, but we are satisfied our people generally have not risen to the great importance of this subject. It should be the aim of parents to give as far as practicable, a good thorough practical education to all their children. And the facilities for giving it were never better than now. All over our State there are now good academies and high schools and colleges, where our boys and our girls may be educated, and many of them under the control. of our own people. Wake Forest College has taken a high stand among the very foremost of the institutions of the South, and the Baptist have great reason to be proud of their College. The number of students last session received were 213; and it is hoped that the number will be equally large or larger this session. The opening is encouraging; 113 registered the first day of the session; 39 young ministers were received by the Board of Education last session and 32 have already been received for the present session. Others are asking for aid and it is to be hoped that the contributions from the brethren and from the churches will soon be sufficient to enable the Board to extend aid to all worthy young ministers who are in need and who may make applications for help. Brethren for Christ's sake let us help the young ministers in their effort to prepare themselves for the work to which the Lord has called I. W. THOMAS, them.

SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

We are glad to say the Sunday School work is increasing and improving in our bounds, yet there is great room for more improvement. We should use our influence to bring all the children in the Sunday School. If

we expect the prosperity of our churches in the future we must teach the children the word of God, the instrument used by the Spirit to show them the need of a Saviour and to lead them to a knowledge of the truth, that they may know the law of the Lord which in the 19th Psalm, is perfect, converting the soul; that they may be trained for stations of usefulness in the work of the Lord in general. We find by observation that children converted and trained while young, are much better qualified to fill important stations in life than those who have grown up in vice and immorality. Therefore it is the duty of every Church to maintain Sunday Schools, that all the children may have an opportunity to study the Bible.

Therefore it is the duty of our Baptist brethren to arise in the power of their might and stand for the right—working and fighting with a renewed energy and a double dilligence against the great enemy and destroyer of our people, praying the Lord to help in the warfare till the curse be removed from our land and country. With our present surroundings we advise our Churches to consider the necessity of strict Church discipline against the evil habit of dram drinking. In the face of so much evidence of the evils arising from this dangerous practice, if our members will not forsake it, that they at once be excluded.

The Bible teaches to be temperate in all things, thus

it is obligatory on us to warn the young against the evil, foolish and filthy practice of the use of tobacco.

HOME MISSIONS.

This department of Christian work is an effort on the part of the churches to give the Gospel to all the destitute sections in the Southern States, among the Indians and in Cuba. The work is done through the Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, located at Atlanta, Ga. The Board reported to the last convention 287 missionaries employed; 1,114 stations occupied; 33,868 sermons preached; 4,857 baptised, and a total amount expended in this work for the last year of \$178,953.32. The hand of the Lord has rested with wonderful favor on this work of his servants in their efforts to extend his Kingdom in the hearts of men. Wherever the Missionaries go, the people seem ready to hear the word. In fact the Holy Spirit seems to be always present, to open the hearts of the people and especially is this the case in the island of Cuba. So the observant servant of the Master who places himself in position to hear the tidings from the field can say at the close of most every day, "I have heard glorious tidings to-day." Then let us recognize the voice of the Master in these things, commanding us to go forward and as obedient servants rise and help.

We recommend the appointment of one brother in each church to superintend this work in his Church.

Money is indispensable, while wool, new cloth, and feathers for pillows, as well as bacon, cheese, butter, fruit and cabbage delivered to the Railroad agent at Lenoir, are always helpful. Those who three times a day sit down to loaded tables, should show their gratitude to the Giver of every good gift by sometimes dividing with those who suffer from hunger.
