RAY McCALL

Ray McCall was born the only son of John and Mary McCall of Haywood County on September 5, 1928. He accepted Christ at nine years of age in Cruso.

In 1947 he was blessed by God's gifts of marriage to Bobbie Parris. They have two children, Diane and Timothy and one grandson, Chad. They attended Balsam Baptist Church where he was ordained a deacon at the age of 21 and was called to preach at the age of 26.

Balsam Church demonstrated great confidence in their young preacher by calling him to be their pastor in 1955. He pastored there for four years. In 1959 Old Savannah extended the call to become their pastor. Brother McCall resigned his pastorate at Balsam and began his work in the Savannah Community.

After a prosperous four year ministry at Old Savannah, Webster Baptist Church extended the call to him. He resigned his pastorate at Old Savannah and moved to Webster where he pastored for the next 26 years.

Brother McCall served these churches as a bi-vocational minister. He had one call but two vocations. He provided for his family by working for Wellco Industries and later at Harold's supermarket in Sylva. His primary vocation was Pastor which required preparation for and preaching of the Word of God. Also, the vocation of Pastor required time for funerals, weddings, home and hospital visitation, leadership in the church and work in the Association and denomination.

With obvious demands on his time as husband, father, pastor and employee, Brother Mc-Call had to set priorities and use his time wisely. He gives great credit to his lovely wife Bobby for patience and understanding. "There were times when, because of the job and the pastoral work I didn't see much of her or the children. She kept us all together, though." Truly they labored together.

Brother McCall prepared himself for ministry by extensive home study through the Southern Baptist Seminary Extension program. He took numerous courses through Southern and Southeastern Seminary. Early in his ministry he bought the complete library of Broadas Wall, Pastor of First Baptist Church, Waynesville. To use his own words, "I got my education by the midnight oil." Brother McCall's leadership ability was recognized early on. He was elected Moderator of the Association and served in that position for three years from 1962-1964. He was elected Moderator again in 1982, demonstrating the continued confidence of the Association. It would not be feasible or practical to list every committee he has served on in his 35 years in this Association.

It is an accepted fact that in modern associational history when the name of Ray McCall is mentioned the words: stability, leadership and statesmanship come to mind.

These accomplishments are the result of a dedicated life to Jesus Christ and to pastoring his church in the Tuckaseigee Association. Brother McCall's love for people and his keen ability to relate to them is grounded in his own love for the Lord and his spiritual maturity. He has shared with us his vision of churches cooperating together and we have been challenged and blessed by his ministry.

It is with a grateful heart and a profound respect that the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association prayerfully dedicates the 1990 Annual Minutes in honor of the Reverend Ray McCall.

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In Memory



GEORGE KENNETH CRAWFORD 1920 - 1990

G. Kenneth Crawford was born August 9, 1920. He was one of five children of George and Margaret Crawford. Kenneth was saved at Ochre Hill Baptist Church as a teen-ager. His parents moved to Washington State where he lived and worked as a lumberman. In 1939 he married Ethel Middleton. They were married 51 years.

In 1964 as a deacon of First Baptist Church, Forks, Washington he responded to the call of God to preach the gospel and returned to the mountains of North Carolina to attend Fruitland Baptist Bible Institute. He graduated in 1966 and had a distinguished career as pastor and camp director. He was ordained at Wilkesdale Baptist Church by the Reverend C.H. Green and the Rev. Walter Middleton. He pastored the following churches in the Tuckaseigee Association: East Fork, Johns Creek, Long Branch and Ochre Hill. He served as interim pastor at Greens Creek, Jarrett Memorial and Lovedale. In Clay County, North Carolina he was pastor of Shiloh and Pine Log Baptist Churches. He pastored the Mt. Baker Baptist Church in Bellenham, Washington for five years. He also served as camp director of Mt. Baker Baptist Assembly, an associational Baptist camp. Later he was camp director of Truett Baptist Camp for eight years. Mrs. Crawford shared in the camp ministry as the camp cook.

Brother Crawford's ministry was for his love for preaching the Gospel, his love for the local church, and his keen interest in youth and children as a Director of Baptist camps on both the East and West coasts of the United States.

His impact for the Lord was great and he influenced a lot of lives in many places. With deep gratitude and profound love, the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association dedicates the 1990 Annual Minutes in memory of G. Kenneth Crawford.

Proceedings

161st ANNUAL SESSION Thursday Evening, October 18, 1990

1. The Ochre Hill Baptist Church was host for the first session of the 161st Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. A delicious meal was served at 5:00 p.m. for the 177 messengers and visitors representing 35 Associational churches.

This was the 100th anniversary year of the church.

2. The Moderator, Clyde Vance, convened the first session at 6:00 p.m.

3. Harry Vance, Associational Music Director, led the assembly in the singing of "Amazing Grace." The Rev. Tommy Lamb was the accompanist.

4. Special music was provided by the "Directors of Missions Quartet" composed of the Rev. Lester Evans, Director in Macon County; the Rev. J. Gilbert, Director in Swain and Cherokee Counties; the Rev. John Reid, Director in the Tuckaseigee Association, and the Rev. Chester Jones, Director in the Truett Association. Carrol Blanton substituted for Chester since he was unable to attend.

5. Tommy Lamb, pastor of Ochre Hill, presented a copy of the History of the Church which had been prepared for the Anniversary Celebration. The books are for sale at \$5.00 per copy.

6. The Rev. Tommy Lamb delivered the message for the evening. He used scripture from Luke 29:44-53 to develop his message entitled "Essentials of Evangelism."

7. The "Order of Business" as contained in the "Book of Reports" was adopted for the business session.

8. Three pastors having accepted churches during the year in the Association were introduced and welcomed. They were Cecil Frady, Tuckasegee; Wayne Sorrells, Buff Creek and Ricky Campbell, Balsam.

9. All visitors were asked to stand and be welcomed.

10. Roy Holder gave a brief report on the "Condition of Christianity in today's world. America, he said, was no longer considered a Christian nation. He challenged the Association to work toward the accomplishment of Opportunity 2000 by:

Starting NOW.

Become aware of the fact that 67 percent of the churches are either on a plateau of growth or are declining.

The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina stands ready to help any church in transition or declining in growth.

Urges people to become aware of and assist in multi-housing projects.

(The report was adopted as presented.)

11. John Reid, Director of Missions, gave the state of the Association in his report. His theme was "I know who holds tomorrow but I don't know what tomorrow will bring." He spoke of the mission projects that are being planned for 1990-1991. Some of these plans were: to continue the work on the Convention Center at Truett Baptist Camp; to assist in the building of a new building for the Locust Field Church; the continuation of the Brazil project plus other mission needs that might arise. He urged the churches to form prayer groups.

The report was adopted.

12. The Rev. Jack Hinson, Chaplain at the C.J. Harris Hospital, stated in his report that the churches were at this time contributing more than 50 percent of the Chaplaincy Budget. The Chaplaincy is expanding its work and needs more money. He urged all churches to observe "Pastoral Care Day Sunday" October 28 and to take a special offering for the Chaplaincy Program.

The report was adopted.

13. Margie Messer was unable to attend the meeting. Her report on the *Biblical Recorder* is contained in the minutes.

14. Harry Griffin presented the Gideon report as recorded in these minutes. The report was approved.

15. Wayne Murphy presented the report on the work being done at the North Carolina Baptist Hospital. The report was adopted.

16. A report from the General Board of the Baptist State Convention was presented by the Rev. Lloyd Fish, pastor of the Scotts Creek Church and a member of the Board. He told of some of the many ministries and activities in which the State Convention is involved in trying to assist the churches.

At present the State Convention is active in the building of new churches, improvements in the North Carolina Homes for the Aging, the Fruitland Bible Institute which is now giving degree credit which is being accepted by the colleges and universities.

The report was adopted.

17. Harry Griffin presented the Gideon Report of the local chapter. The report was adopted.

18. Winston Hardman, Director of the Baptist Student Union on the Western Carolina University Campus, gave the report on student involvement in ministries in the Association and in the state. Students, he stated, were taking an active interest in and participating in many ministries. The Baptist Women organizations of the Tuckaseigee Association provide a supper for the students involved in mission activities every two weeks.

The report was adopted.

19. Richard Roberson, Director of Truett Baptist Camp, reported a good year for the camp with 28 young people being led to the Lord. The Convention Center building is under construction. Money is needed for the completion of the building project. The furniture for the building is alread on hand.

The report was adopted.

20. The proposed changes in some of the Constitution items were presented by Dr. Jerry Rice and John Reid. The suggested changes will be voted on at the next session. Messengers were given copies of the changes requested and were urged to study them and be prepared to vote at the second session.

21. Mary Ann Frye and Rachel Grogran gave an account of their recent mission trip to Brazil. The report was adopted.

22. Annie Hoyle, clerk, gave the report on the Digest of Letters. The report was adopted.

23. Lewis Smith, pastor of Cashiers Church, made a motion that the time set for the Executive Committee meeting be changed from 7:00 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.

The motion was seconded and carried.

The change in time will become effective for the January 1991 meeting.

24. John Reid announced the illness of Ed Bryson, former pastor in the Association.

25. Thanks and appreciation were expressed to the host church for its gracious hospitality.

26. The meeting was adjourned at 9:10 with a prayer led by the Rev. Ricky Campbell.

Friday Evening, October 19, 1990 (Second Session)

27. The second session of the 161st Annual meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association was held at the Webster Baptist Church with 107 messengers, 35 pastors and 24 visitors present. Thirty six of the Associational churches were represented. The host church served a delicious meal at 5:00 p.m.

28. The Moderator, Clyde Vance, called the meeting to order at 6:00 p.m.

29. T.C. Lewis, member and chairman of the Deacons, extended a warm welcome to the assembly. The Webster church is without a pastor at the present time.

30. The Rev. Wayne Sorrels, Buff Creek, led in a prayer.

31. The moderator thanked the host church for the good meal and for the excellent accommodations.

32. The moderator recognized the program committee and asked them to stand. He commended them for the good job they had done in preparing the program.

33. Harry Vance led in the singing of "Victory in Jesus."

34. Cecil Frady gave the report on the mission trip to South Carolina to assist in the rebuilding of the Friendship Baptist Church, which had been destroyed by the storm, Hugo. He spoke of the work being done on the Conference Center building at Truett Baptist Camp and named the persons from this association who had given time and labor on the construction. A video of the working men and the building was shown. He also called attention to a community that was planning a new church building and suggested that the association assist with the construction of this building when the church people were ready to start the project.

35. The Rev. Lloyd Fish gave the Financial report and the proposed budget for 1991. The 1991 proposed budget is based on the previous year's income. Changes made in the original proposed budget that is contained in the Book of Reports have been revised to include more in the items for the Director of Missions' car expense. Lloyd Fish moved that the revised proposed budget be adopted as the 1991 budget.

The motion was seconded and carried.

36. Jesse Flake, Treasurer, presented the September financial report. September is the last financial report for the year. This report replaces the preliminary report made earlier.

The report presented at the meeting was adopted.

37. The Moderator commended the Finance Committee and the Treasurer for the fine reports presented.

38. Ray Buchanan presented the Nominating Committee Report. His motion that the report be adopted was carried.

39. The Rev. Joe Yelton, Cullowhee Baptist, pastor, gave the report for the Committee on Committees. The motion for its adoption was carried.

40. The Time, Place and Preacher report was presented by Joe Yelton in the absence of the chairman, Jack Hinson.

The report was adopted.

41. The Rev. Glenn Blanton presented the Ordination report. The motion for this report carried.

42. Harry Vance led the assembly in the singing of a hymn.

43. In the absence of Irene Hooper, the Rev. Robert Blanton presented the report for the Missions Development Council. Certificates of appreciation were presented to the following churches and individuals for their assistance in the mission projects:

Robert Blanton made the motion that this Report be adopted. The motion carried.

44. The Rev. Robert Christopher, Hamburg Church, read the Resolutions (a copy of which is not available for the minutes). The report was adopted. (Thanks to Ochre Hill and Webster.)

45. Harry Vance led the singing of "Great Things He Has Done."

46. Lincoln Shuler presented the suggested Constitutional changes in the absence of Dr. Jerry Rice, Chairman of the Constitution Committee. Shuler requested that John Reid come to the platform to assist him. After explaining the change, Shuler made a motion that the change be made in the Constitutional Article XI. (New section to be added.) After the motion was made and seconded, the Rev. Ed Beddingfield amended the motion. The vote on the amendment was 54 FOR and 48 AGAINST. The amendment passed. The vote on the Motion was 51 FOR and 52 AGAINST. The motion required a two-thirds majority, therefore it failed.

47. Harry Vance moved that the secretary be paid full time salary. The motion failed.

48. Since the allotted time for the Constitution had "run" out, Harry Vance made a motion that the time for the consideration of the other suggested recommendations be extended. The motion was defeated.

49. The Rev. Barry Almand, New Savannah Church, presented the Sunday School Report. He presented certificates to Yellow Mountain for the largest number of new Sunday School members enrolled in 1990. Other churches showing increase in Sunday School enrollment were: Buff Creek, Webster, Mt. Pleasant.

The report was adopted.

50. Norman Parris presented the report on Discipleship Training. He explained the change in name from Church Training to Discipleship Training. Doctrinal studies will be resumed this year. He urged the churches to support "M" Night which will be coming up on November 26 at the Old Savannah Church.

The report was adopted.

51. Harry Vance led the group in a song.

52. Gearldine Jones presented the report on the Youth Work. The report is contained in the minutes.

The report was adopted.

53. Haven Ensley, chairman of the Deacons, Pastors, Spouses Fellowship, reported for that organization. The report was adopted.

54. In the absence of Kenneth Pressley, John Reid called attention to report as found in the Annual. The report was adopted.

55. Mike Moses was not present. No report was given. The report is contained in these minutes. It was adopted.

56. Janice Burnette, WMU Director, reported for the organization. The report may be found in the Annual. She announced the Dedication of the Mildred Cowan Prayer Garden for

Saturday, October 27, at 2:00 p.m. A picnic lunch will begin at 1:00 p.m. She moved the adoption of the report. The motion carried.

57. Tom Crowder gave the report on the Vacation Bible Schools. He reported an upward trend in Vacation Bible Schools and urged all schools to turn in reports of their work. A merit certificate was awarded to the Cullowhee Baptist Church for having an EXPLOSION SCHOOL.

Sylva First had an increased enrollment of 58 over the past year; Lovedale and Jarrett Memorial both had increases in their enrollments this year. Mr. Crowder moved the acceptance of this report. The report was adopted.

58. Kathleen Buchanan, chairperson, conducted an inspiring memorial service with the assistance of Tom Collins and Linda Fisher.

59. Jim Dean, area Missionary, gave a brief report on the work that was accomplished this year. There were special religious events held during the luminaire at Dillsboro. The Jarrett Memorial Church was the setting for these events. Heritage Day was also celebrated at Jarrett Memorial. Sylva First conducted services in 14 camp grounds during the summer months: Cullowhee provided a clogging team and Deitz Memorial conducted a Back Yard Bible Study, Lovedale helped with the summer missionaries. Many activities were conducted by the summer missionaries such as bon fire services, clowning, etc. He said that summer missionaries would not be funded after next September.

60. The Rev. Bob and Mrs. Clegg were given a special welcome.

61. The Rev. Tom Lolly spoke very briefly of the work as a regional missionary.

62. Joe Yelton, pastor of the Cullowhee Church, gave the sermon of the day following the singing of a hymn led by Harry Vance. Rev. Yelton's sermon was entitled "Why Does Evangelism Not Work." Scripture from Matthew 20:30-28 was used.

63. The 161st Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association ended on a high note at 9:15 p.m.

Program Reports

Director of Missions Report

"Now there were in the church that was at Antioch certain prophets and teachers:.. As they ministered to the Lord, and fasted, the Holy Ghost said, Separate me Barnabas and Saul for the work whereunto I have called them. And when they had fasted and prayed, and laid hands on them, they sent them away." Acts 13:1-3.

This has been a busy year of missions in which the Túckaseigee Baptist Association has sent missionaries from our local churches to Tennessee, South Carolina and to Brazil.

Heavy rains caused extensive flood damage in the Copper Basin area of Tennessee. A small group of men from this Association traveled over in a van one Saturday and worked in some homes cleaning up mud and debris. This was a group from the First Baptist, Sylva Church and the Ochre Hill Church. The people were grateful and deeply touched by those expressions of love. Clyde Vance presented their Director of Missions with a check for FIVE HUNDRED DOLLARS from the Association. Churches that contributed to this project are: Cullowhee Valley, Old Savannah, Scotts Creek, Sylva First and Tuckasegee.

Our next project was one that we thought we would never be able to begin due to so many delays. Through our Baptist Men's Department with our state convention, we learned about the Friendship Baptist Church in Sumter, South Carolina. It had been destroyed by Hurricane Hugo. In early February a large group of men and women from all over the county in the various churches came together to discuss plans to travel to Sumter to help rebuild this church. We are grateful to Kenneth Pressley, Pastor at Cullowhee Valley, and Roy Burnette, Pastor at Little Savannah, for making the initial survey trip and making a video of the needs. Plans were made, people asked for time off from work, but then the church was not ready for us to come. Other deadlines came and went. The building systems in South Carolina simply could not meet all of the demands of an entire state. Hurricane Hugo had brought such catastrophic damage to the state that it was unbelievable. Finally in May a group of people went down from the Buff Creek, Ochre Hill, Tuckasegee, and Webster Churches under the capable leadership of Rev. Cecil Frady, Pastor of Tuckasegee, to help rebuild the Friendship Baptist Church. Several churches helped financially on that project: East Fork, New Savannah, and Tuckasegee.

During the month of August five men and women, two from this Association, went to Sao Paulo, Brazil to do Sunday School and evangelistic work. Mary Ann Frye of First Baptist, and Rachel Program of the Cullowhee Church, experienced a blessed time in the Lord in their work there. Our Association has sent 14 people in the last two years to Brazil. I encourage each church to invite someone from our Association who has been to Brazil to come to your church and to let them share their testimony.

One major success we celebrate this past year is the paving of our parking lot. This has been a big help both in the appearance and the maintenance of the property. We do need to be reminded that our building fund owes our general fund \$853.76.

I enjoy my visits to the churches. I attend regular services on Sunday morning and evening and Wednesday Prayer services. I try to attend as many homecomings and revivals as possible. I enjoy attending singings. I am called upon to preach, teach, and help ordain preachers and deacons. I especially enjoy singing in the choirs. I do have a commitment to worship with my family at least once a month at Ochre Hill. I have also committed myself to helping churches without a pastor by serving them from four to six Sundays until they can make provisions. My scheduling is on the basis of need and invitation. My greatest frustration is my inability to get around to all the churches more often.

My primary role is to be a servant to the local church. I want to be a resource person upon whom you can call for any need. While it is impossible for me to be everything to everybody, I do want to be able to get someone to help you when I am unable to do this myself. My desire is to help each church realize its potential before God. To do this I am committed to cooperating with each pastor and the lay leadership in each church.

This year we resumed our Celebrate Christ Crusades with the youth in the Association. I was very pleased with the number that accepted Christ and with the other kinds of decisions that were made. This work continues to be of great significance in our county.

Each year there are certain meetings that I attend that have to do with our larger Baptist family. I attended the regional Vacation Bible School Clinic, Key Leadership Conference, our State Evangelism Conference, and our annual Baptist State Convention. I was asked to serve again this past year as chairman of the Preacher, Place and Program Committee. I am pleased that the 1991 Convention meeting site will be in Asheville. I am hoping that a lot of our churches can send messengers to this meeting. I have been asked to serve as a vice president for our state Director of Missions Conference for the coming year.

I attended an Appalachian Regional Baptist meeting in Johnson City, Tennessee and a five year Director of Missions update conference sponsored by the Sunday School Board in Nashville. I attended the Southern Baptist Convention meeting in New Orleans this year. There are other smaller one or two day meetings that I attend that relate to our work such as Camp Truett meetings or SWARM meetings.

Last year I reported that 1989 had been the best year financially for the Association in our history. This year has been even better. This year 91 percent of our budget came from our churches. We have received money from 35 of our churches so far with two months remaining. Some of our churches make an annual gift and we are anticipating that trend to continue and to hear from them before the year is over. Our agreement with the Baptist State Convention is to reduce their Associational support to our general fund over the next five years until they provide no general fund support. This means our churches will be called upon to make up the difference. Currently the state convention provides 14 percent of our budget. The State Convention goal is to move towards a partnership concept in which we do certain projects that both our Association and the State Convention will jointly fund. God continues to bless the Tuckaseigee Baptist Half Hour radio program. It takes a great deal of time and effort each week to prepare and produce the program. I am especially pleased to get the 9:00 a.m. Sunday morning time. Several men in particular have commented that they can now listen as they get ready to go to church. I am grateful to the Calvary and the Locust Field churches for their help in financing the program and to the many individuals who contribute to the program. I continue to need financial assistance. Since I have been on the air for the seven years, the program has never been completely self sufficient. I have always helped finance it out of my personal money. I am grateful to God that I have had the resources to do this and I am grateful for the partnership of all who help in this endeavor.

I am grateful to the WMU for their provision for the meal to celebrate the ministry of the pastor and his family during Pastor Appreciation Sunday. I am coordinating that event with Associational Emphasis Week with the hope that each church will recognize both their pastor and his importance as a key leader in the church and the Association.

I am grateful to Mrs. Annie Hoyle for her fine work that she does here at the office. She is generous beyond many people's knowledge to the Association. This year she donated Venetian blinds to the building and has loaned us a computer which significantly helps our work. Neither time nor space would permit me to tell you everything that she does to make the office a place in which our association can take great pride. Her refreshments for all our meetings, large and small, continue to be evidence of her gift of hospitality.

I am grateful to all the volunteer people, program leaders, officers, committee members and others who make the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association the positive witness it is in our county. May God continue to grant us His Blessings as we work together for His Glory.

Institutional Reports

Baptist Children's Homes

For 105 years Baptist Children's Homes of North Carolina have been giving children a chance at life. This year we formalized that phrase into our first state-wide and fund-raising campaign.

The "Give a child a chance!" Campaign seeks to raise \$11 million over three years to expand Cameron Boys Camp, boost general operating income and increase endowment.

We will also be able to begin a before and after school care program in Davidson County, to give security to children of working couples, who won't have to go home to empty houses any more.

Some of the new endowment earnings will increase training to help staff deal with ever changing needs among the 1,000 children and families they serve each year.

Baptist Men of North Carolina have agreed to build the new Tommy and Jeanie Eller Chuckwagon at Cameron, saving approximately \$75,000 in construction costs.

Children's hopes also were bolstered by the return of the Thanksgiving Offering voted by messengers to the 1989 state convention. While suffering through its 12-year absence, BCH lost more than \$1 million in revenue.

In the change from a Homes and Hospital offering to the Thanksgiving BCH will go 18 months without a special collection, a period that encompasses more than an entire fiscal year. For the past five years that special collection has meant \$400,000 to the ministry, a sum that will be difficult to make up in the 1990-91 budget. Some churches, aware of this difficulty, have promised to begin receiving the Thanksgiving offering in 1990.

The Cooperative Program continues to anchor our budget planning from the churches. We urge renewed commitment to cooperative giving among our North Carolina churches. It is essential, not only for us, but for the entire missions enterprise built painstakingly for a century and a half. Baptist Children's Homes receives \$1.5 million from the Cooperative Program receipts each year. That is the stackpole around which we build our other income planning. A decrease in Cooperative Program receipts would seriously jeopardize our ability to care for children.

In August, BCH signed an agreement with Gaston County Department of Social Services to operate two emergency care homes owned by the county. That raises to 11 the number of emergency care homes BCH operates. That service, in which a child at risk of abuse or neglect can receive shelter right away, is the service most in demand throughout the state. Children stay a maximum of 60 days while BCH works with the custodian to determine a long-term plan of care.

In 1991 BCH will celebrate the 20th anniversary of the founding of Broyhill Home, our westernmost campus, in Waynesville/Clyde. With the help of J.E. Broyhill and his family, the home opened in 1971 on 91 hilly acres. It has the capacity for 48 children in group care and for eight girls in emergency care.

Baptist Children's Homes has a 105 year history. But its history is just the knot that ties it to a boundless unbroken ribbon of promise that stretches beyond the future to wrap children and families with eternal blessings.

THE TRIPOD

Dr. S.L. Stanley, the late founding president of Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, once said, "The Tripod upon which Baptists have based more than 100 years of progress has been MISSIONS, EVANGELISM, and EDUCATION. North Carolina Baptist colleges are guided, as are the churches and the convention, by historic Baptist principles.

- 1- The authority of the Scriptures and the Lordship of Christ. Because we regard the Bible as sufficient authority, to be interpreted by the individual under the guidance of the Spirit of God, we do not need authoritative creeds or ecclesiastical organizations as a substitute for the authority of the Bible.
- 2- The competence of the individual and the priesthood of believers. Each individual has the right to approach God directly, and every individual is competent to deal directly with God in all matters pertaining to salvation and the Christian life.
- 3- The autonomy of the local church and cooperation in Christian service. Each church is congregational in organization, with every member having the right to vote.
- 4- Freedom of religion and a free church, in a free state. Cooperation, not coercion, is the basis of denominational unity.
- 5- Freedom of religion and a free church, in a free state. Religious liberty rather than religious toleration is a North Carolina Baptist distinctive.

The enduring ties and relationships between Baptist colleges, Baptist churches and the Baptist State Convention help to guarantee the tripod a balance and a healthy spirit of partnership in the Gospel.

A preacher once entitled his sermon, "If Christ is the answer, What is the question?" The sermon had three points. "How can I live with myself?" "How can I live with others?" "How can I live with God?"

Baptist Hospital Report

"The largest health-science building program ever in North Carolina has changed the landscape on Hawthorne Hill, and the changes continue in rapid succession.... One thing that hasn't changed is the institution's tradition for delivery of compassionate health care. That will never change." This statement, from Dr. Charles P. Nicholson, Jr., Baptist Hospital Trustee and Chairman of the Medical Center Board of Directors, is both a report and a commitment.

Another building in this \$190 million expansion program has recently been completed and occupied. The Clinical Sciences Building will house most of the Medical Center's ambulatory services, and has been termed a "medical supermarket," where patients may do "one-stop shopping." The building will also accommodate an Ambulatory Surgery Unit, Medical Center Administration Offices, and other functions. Nearing completion, is the Day Care Center for children of medical employees. Under construction, is an addition to the MRI (Magnetic Resonance Imaging) Building, and a significant addition to the Patient/Visitor Parking Deck. Construction on the Center on Aging Building is scheduled to begin in early 1991 with the completion date set for the spring of 1993.

The purpose of all these new facilities, according to hospital president, Len B. Preslar, Jr., is to "enable us to respond to patient needs better than ever before." In addition to continuation and improvement of many established procedures, several new diagnostic and treatment programs have been started recently. The Organ Transplant Program added a new dimension when it performed the first single-lung transplant in North Carolina. Bone marrow transplants are also being performed now in our Baptist Hospital. A Cranio-facial Clinic, to correct major deformities of the skull and upper face during the first year of life, opened recently. New laser technology provides an improved method for clearing out atheroaclerotic deposits in the carotid arteries of the neck. New surgical techniques make possible better treatment of complicated retinal detachment. Orthopedic Surgeons began use of the Ilizatov Technique for the repair and lengthening of broken bones. New approaches are being used effectively in the treatment of children with Cerebral Palsy. Bowman/Gray Baptist Hospital is the only medical center in the nation using and evaluating Clinodean, a non-narcotic pain killer which has proven effective in controlling pain following surgery and for cancer patients.

The Department of Pastoral Care continues to strengthen the reputation both as a service agency and as a teaching facility. Last year, the department provided more than 29,000 ministries to hospital patients, almost 19,000 services to families. The Minister's Care Plan, a joint program with the Baptist State Convention, had 1,446 sessions with more than 200 different clergy families last year. The new Missionary Counseling and Support Services Program saw 48 individuals in its first six months. The Division of Clinical Pastoral Education/Chaplaincy had 53 students enrolled.

During the fiscal year ending June 30, 1990, the hospital received \$692,946.24 through the Cooperative Program and \$271,361.24 through the Homes and Hospital Offering and direct gifts. Cooperative Program Funds are used for the Department of Pastoral Care, and other financially needy patients. The hospital staff and patients are most grateful for this continuing financial support.

Baptist Retirement Homes

Making life for Older Adults the Best of Times is the continuing goal of Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc., which operates four residential facilities for Older Adults around the state -- in Albemarle, Asheville, Hamilton and Winston-Salem.

In Asheville, our efforts include a move toward expanding the Western North Carolina Baptist Home. The Board of Trustees of Baptist Retirement Homes applied in July for permission to construct the 60 nursing care beds the state is allocating to Buncombe County in 1990. State approval of its plans will be the next step toward adding a health-care unit to the facilities, a unit offering skilled and intermediate nursing care. Currently the only nursing care provided by Baptist Retirement Homes is the 85-bed nursing-care unit at Brookridge Retirement Community in Winston-Salem, the newest facility operated by Baptist Retirement Homes.

Around the state, the other homes face a promising year.

In Winston-Salem, Brookridge Retirement Community celebrates its first birthday in 1990. It is the largest of the facilities, providing five levels of care -- independent living in garden homes, independent living in apartments, and assisted living, intermediate nursing care and skilled nursing care in its health-care unit -- to 350 Older Adults.

The facilities in Albemarle and Hamilton provide assisted living in a residential setting to 30 Older Adults each. Both programs are greatly enhanced by the strong support of the surrounding communities and its churches. The Brotherhood, WMU, and senior adult clubs at many nearby churches provide fellowship, entertainment, skills and physical labor, household needs -- whatever they see are needed by each home.

The Albemarle Baptist Home also offers respite care for those families who care for an Older Adult and need some time away from that responsibility. The cost of the care is paid by the family, and it provides overnight care for whatever length of time the family needs.

It, and other alternative forms of residential care for Older Adults, are additional ways being explored by the Homes to meet the growing needs of the Older Adult Baptist population in this state.

Agency Reports

American Bible Society

What do the churches of America see when they look at the American Bible Society? For those of us responsible for communicating the ABS story, we would like them to see us as an important partner of the churches to make a greater witness for Christ -- a partner on the frontier of world missions and evangelism, and a partner at the local level of day-to-day community outreach and service.

This is the way we see you, the churches. You are our partners, indispensable co-workers with us in the Bible cause! Our global program of Scripture translation, production and distribution is inherently the wise counsel and advice given by denominations and their local congregations. This undergirding is the primary enabler for the Society to develop exciting, relevant and powerful Scripture resources for Christians in our country and for all those around the globe we seek to reach with God's Word.

The Society is privileged to enjoy broad support among Christians in America. Many are ABS volunteers and Church Representatives, Bible-A-Month Club members and Good News for New Readers supporters. In fact, 90 percent of the denominations listed in the Yearbook of America are represented among those who are active in the ABS ministry. People sharing the Bible with other people is a ministry to which all Christians are called and one ABS is eager to help churches in fulfilling.

Representatives from 37 denominations and six church agencies attended the Society's 60th National Advisory Council at Bible House in December last year which met under the banner "Partners in Spreading the Good News."

Because we believe there is no better way of presenting the Bible cause, we have made this theme the central perspective of our report to you this year. We hope what you read here will underscore just how grateful we are to your denomination for being our partner, will reinforce why your continuing and expanding partnership with us is so vital, and will strengthen your confidence and participation in the work of the American Bible Society which you are so generously supporting.

Annuity Report for North Carolina

There are now 2,162 North Carolina churches and associations contributing to retirement plans. North Carolina has 1,972 signed Cooperative Agreements! More than any other state! The number of churches participating at the old Plan A level of \$33.34 has decreased to less than 100. The average annuitant in North Carolina receives \$276.39 per month. North Carolina has 3,436 members making contributions to Annuity Board retirement plans. There are 1,889 annuitants receiving benefits each month in North Carolina - \$522,109.84 each month. It is exciting to think about what has been done to help ministers retire with dignity. Strong efforts have been made to make all of our churches (and ministers) aware of the opportunities and the need to act on them. But there is still so much to be done!

Consider these facts: Only 64 percent of our churches are participating in our retirement plans - even after all these years of opportunity; of this 64 percent, many do not actually make contributions. The minister does this on his own. Small contributions make the annuitant's benefits small. In North Carolina 175 receive less than \$50; 288 receive less than \$300; 544 receive less than \$250; 288 receive less than \$300: We have 151 churches that have signed the Cooperative Agreement, but still make no contributions: We have 457 that are making contributions but have not signed the Cooperative Agreement. Suffice it to say that there is a great challenge still before us to help ministers to prepare for the future and to help churches be responsible employers.

The North Carolina Baptist Foundation

The historical records of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation will reveal 1989 and 1990 to be significant in its 70 year history. Organized following action taken at the 1919 Convention and chartered by the State of North Carolina in 1920 as a charitable corporation, the Trustee agency of the convention has only in recent years begun to have an impact on providing financial support for Baptist institutions and mission causes.

Charged with the responsibility of creating greater awareness among Baptists within North Carolina concerning estate stewardship as a viable and significant means of providing financial support of Christian endeavors fostered by our churches, the Baptist Foundation assists individuals in the establishment of endowment and trust funds. Through these funds financial support is provided the donor's chosen Christian cause or causes on a continuing basis for years to come, long after the donor's death.

The growth of the Foundation in terms of assets managed, has been significant during the past few years. Since January 1, 1988, the assets placed under management of the Foundation has increased by over \$13 million through May 1990. This exceeds the asset growth goals set in 1988 for a five year period.

Gifts of appreciated assets, such as stock and real estate can be placed in trust to generate income for individuals and then pay income to Christian causes beyond their life time. As a result of this unique opportunity to give, older adults are realizing the joy of establishing life income trusts. This plan often provides a significant increase in personal income, bypass of capital gain taxes, creation of a charitable deduction for income tax and estate taxes, and assures an eventual gift to Christian endeavors.

A new home for the Baptist Foundation was built during 1989 and early 1990. The 6,000 square foot office building was constructed from gifts from individuals and is located on property provided by the Baptist State Convention next to the Baptist Building in Cary. The new facility was occupied in February 1990, and provides much needed space for the work of the staff as well as for conferences and meetings.

Baptist groups are invited to use the meeting rooms when in the Raleigh/Cary area. We extend an invitation to church groups to call and arrange a visit to the newest building used for the Lord's service by North Carolina Baptist.

The Foundation employs seven full time employees and operates under the direction of a 20 member Board of Directors elected by the Baptist State Convention.

Christian Action League

The last 12 months have been eventful ones in the ministry on applied Christianity.

LEGISLATIVE ISSUES

1. GAMBLING: The battle is still on concerning a state-wide lottery. Legislators are constantly barraged by one who says, "Let the people vote."

2. DRUNK DRIVING: Some Senate defense attorneys are determined to keep anything of real substance from passing.

The pending legislation calls for:

a. Lowering the breathalyzer blood alcohol level from .10 to .08;

b. Banning open containers of all alcoholic beverages in motor vehicles;

c. Increasing the civil revocation of drivers' licenses from 10 to 30 days (North Carolina is the only state in the nation that requires less than a 30-day loss of driving for registering a .10 or above on the breathalyzer);

d. Increasing the fines for being convicted of drunk driving.

3. ABORTION: The reduction of the money for abortions from \$400,000 to \$100,000 is now tied up in a conference committee.

Parental consent proposal appears to be defeated.

4. MISCELLANEOUS: Such other legislative proposals such as raising the tax on alcoholic beverages, requiring the teaching in public schools of sexual abstinence outside of marriage to combat teen-age pregnancy were considered but side-tracked by the Senate. The tax on beer has not been increased in North Carolina since 1969.

CHURCH AND COMMUNITY ASSISTANCE

The League has successfully assisted in alcoholic beverage campaigns in places such as Hertford County, Pamlico County, Concord, Lumberton, Manteo, Randleman, Waynesville, etc., in their efforts to defeat various referenda such as liquor-by-the-drink and beer-wine sale.

We have sought to keep the Christian community informed on moral and ethical issues through our publication *Tomorrow*, and through speaking in churches, pastor's conferences, and civic clubs. Thank you for your prayers and financial support in our ministry.

Gideons International

The Gideon organization, known as the Gideons International, is composed of over 102,000 Christian professional and business men in 246 countries. With the help of the local churches here and throughout the 246 countries, the Gideons are placing an average of one million Scriptures every 13 days. Funding comes from three main sources:

(1) Local church love offerings;

(2) the Faith Fund (donations by individual Gideon members); and

(3) the Memorial Bible contributions.

All monies donated to the Gideons go to purchase Scriptures; administration costs of the organization are paid by the individual members.

The Jackson County Camp, one of 5,000 local camps, was founded in 1982. The present membership numbers 28. It has been the camp's pleasure to share a Gideon presentation in

more than 40 churches during the past year. A total of 3,559 Scriptures were distributed by the Jackson County Camp. The Jackson County Camp received \$15,196 to be used for the purchase of Scriptures.

During this past year, Gideon Camps were established in six of the Eastern bloc countries. There are now five camps in Moscow! These camps have been invited to the campus of Moscow University this Fall to give testimonies and distribute Scriptures. There are 50,000 students at this University. They have also been invited to distribute Scriptures to the Red Army. Please pray for these and other Gideons in that area as they witness for Christ. Pray also that funds to buy the Scriptures needed in these areas will be provided.

Sunday School Board

A year-long celebration of the Sunday School Board's Centennial was launched in June 1990 at the Southern Baptist Convention in New Orleans, Louisiana.

Celebrating "Heritage and Hope" is the theme of the celebration of the Board's 100 years of serving Southern Baptist people and churches.

"It is with gratitude to God for a heritage rooted in Holy Scripture and committed to service among Southern Baptist people that we enter our second century," said President Lloyd Elder. "We move forward buoyed by a spirit of hope and guided by the light of God's truth."

The Board was established amid controversy at the 1891 Southern Baptist Convention meeting in Birmingham, Alabama, where a record 855 messengers registered. J.M. Frost, a 42-year-old Virginia pastor, was the leading proponent of a Southern Baptist publication board, while J.B. Gambrell, editor of the *Baptist Record*, State paper of Mississippi, opposed the idea.

The 13-member committee named to bring a proposal to the convention commissioned a two-man subcommittee, Frost and Gambrell, to prepare the report. Gambrell offered to let Frost write the report and name the Board's location, provided, that Gambrell could write the closing paragraph. Frost agreed, provided that he be allowed to write the closing sentence.

Gambrell recommended "that the fullest freedom of choice be accorded to everyone as to what literature he will use or support." Frost then urged "all brethren to give this Board a fair consideration."

Frost presented his report in a tension-filled room as messengers on both sides waited, speeches in hand. When Frost had finished, John A. Broadus, president of Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, made an impassioned appeal for peace. In silence, the report was then adopted with only 15 dissenting votes.

From its beginnings with one assignment, publishing Sunday School literature to the present with 17 Convention-assigned programs of work, the Sunday School Board has operated from the sale of literature and services. It has never received funds from the Cooperative Program. Instead, almost \$20 million has been contributed to the operating budget of the Southern Baptist Convention through the Cooperative Program. Also, more than \$55.2 million has been funneled to state conventions for the support of Sunday School Board-related programs.

Adjusting the annual contributions to 1990 dollars using the Consumer Price Index, the Board has given almost \$225 million to the work of the Southern Baptist Convention and the state conventions.

In 1991, as the Sunday School Board moves into its second century, its ministry will continue through three major projects.

The Baptist hymnal will be released during a four-day celebration in Nashville, March 11-14. The first volumes of The American Commentary will be released and available at the 1991 Southern Baptist Convention meeting in June. And improved Sunday School literature for all ages will be introduced in October. Elder said the Board begins its second century with a continuing commitment to the twin principles of autonomy and cooperation espoused in 1891 by Frost and Gambrell. "We appeal for the support and trust of our Southern Baptist people. Our goal is to serve all of the churches of this great denomination."

Stewardship Report

II Corinthians 9:7 says, "Every man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give; not grudgingly, or of necessity; for God loveth a cheerful giver."

Every Stewardship message and report begins with God being the owner and giver of all we have. We are the managers or stewards. Two things are important: (1) our motives and (2) our records. No one can read motives nor should they assign motives. That is God's business. Only He can really see what is in our hearts and minds.

What about the record? Each of our churches individually is on record as well the entire Association. Here is our Associational record of giving comparing August of 1988, 1989 and 1990:

Thirteen (13) churches increased their giving from 1989-1990. Twelve (12) churches decreased their giving from 1989-1990. Twenty-five (25) churches were unchanged in their giving patterns to the Association. Of this number 11 to 12 churches historically do not contribute to the finances of the Association.

Hurricane Hugo donations were over \$2,100.00. Over \$500 was contributed to the victims of the Tennessee flood. Over \$900 was received for the successful Youth Rally. That is a total of \$3,500. Some churches contributed in these designated offerings that were not included in the above tables.

At 91.67 percent of the budget year we are a little ahead of the amount required to meet the budget for the year. We are grateful for the generosity of the churches in making this possible. Also, we have been careful not to spend more than we have received.

I am particularly grateful to Jesse Flake for the outstanding job he does as our Associational Treasurer. I am equally grateful to Rev. Lloyd Fish for his leadership on the finance committee this year.

At the writing of this report, churches have one month left to make their contribution to Associational work. Every church is challenged to intentionally develop their stewardship responsibility in mission giving and to include the Association in its mission gifts.

Ochre Hill Baptist Church

(A Brief History on its One Hundredth Anniversary)

On November 15, 1890, 14 members from the Mount Pleasant Baptist Church met to organize the Ochre Hill Baptist Church in the next community. The church adopted the Articles of Faith and Church Covenant which made them a church of the Missionary Baptist Faith and order. The new church elected the Reverend W.W. Reed as their first pastor.

The church met in the community schoolhouse until a one room church was built near the schoolhouse. Later other rooms were built and in 1956 the church was completely remodeled and four additional classrooms were added. In 1964 a brick building with 17 classrooms and a large sanctuary was built. The dedication service was held on April 4, 1965. In 1982 the church built a fellowship building and added additional classrooms.

During its history the Ochre Hill Baptist Church, Sylva, North Carolina has had 25 pastors, 36 deacons, 14 men have been licensed to preach the Gospel and several laymen have gone on mission trips to Honduras and Brazil.

It is the Mission of the Ochre Hill Baptist Church to win the lost and disciple Christians for the Glory of the Lord Jesus Christ.

Constitution

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II - OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the association are as follows:

1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.

2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.

- 3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.
- 4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.
- 5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III - AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. The association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline.

SECTION 3. The association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the New Testament.

SECTION 2. The association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watch care of the association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watch care the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the association except those of voting.

Applications for membership shall be presented to the Credentials Committee of the Association. The applications will consist of a letter from a Constituted Church stating their desire to affiliate with the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. The Credentials Committee as a part of the review process may invite the requesting church to a conference to discuss its history, its mission strategy, and any other information that may be pertinent to the application. The Credentials Committee may then approve the application and recommend them to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee may by a simple majority vote accept the requesting church to come under the watch care of the association for one year. It is suggested that any church under watch care participate in the missions program of the association. At the end of the year the church may be voted in as a member of the association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the Annual Meeting of the association, provided that the church submits an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. Any church may withdraw from the association at its pleasure and should notify the association of this action in writing. Such action will be recognized by the association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the associational clerk, before each annual session, an annual letter, the forms provided by the associational clerk giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

SECTION 5. The association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such a vote is to be taken by written ballot.

ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The association shall hold its annual meeting on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in OCTOBER. Special meetings of the association may be called by the Executive Committee provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by four messengers. Churches with more than 100 resident members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for each additional 50 resident members as determined by the church or fraction thereof and not to exceed 10 messengers from any one church.

SECTION 3. Churches are requested to elect their messengers and alternates in conference to attend the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the question is decided as to which party is in union with the association. The decision is to be made by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS

SECTION 1. General officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, and Assistant Parliamentarian. Program Leaders shall be Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Chairman of Evangelism Committee, Seminary Extension Director, Chairman of Missions Committee, Director of Missions, Trustees, Pastor Conference President, Youth Director, Stewardship Director, Vacation Bible School Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Deacons Chairmen, Senior Adult Director, Singles Ministry Director, and such other officers as the Association may desire to elect.

Associational representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: (1) Truett Camp, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Baptist Hospital, (4) North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc. (Homes for Aging), (5) *Biblical Recorder*, (6) Christian Education, (7) Annuity Board and other representatives as may be deemed appropriate and elected in the association.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the director of associational missions and trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The moderator and vice moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of trustees the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service the trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session. The Associational Financial year will begin at the close of the Annual Meeting.

Concerning termination of employment, the resignation shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least 30 days before it is to take place. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving 30 days notice in advance.

The Executive Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the work of the Director of Missions in planning, promoting and financing his work.

ARTICLE VII - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The Moderator shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the association.

He shall appoint the Committee on Committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the Committee on Committees in its regular report.

SECTION 2. The Vice Moderator shall assist the moderator and shall provide in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the moderator.

SECTION 3. The Clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; shall prepare a "Book of Reports" to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

*The clerk shall distribute to the clerk of each church in the association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the state convention. This form is to be returned to the clerk of the association not later than two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

An Assistant Clerk shall work with the clerk in preparing the "Book of Reports."

SECTION 4. The Treasurer shall receive and dispense by the order of the Executive Committee of the association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report at the annual meeting and a current report at each Executive Committee meeting.

An Assistant Treasurer shall be elected to assist the treasurer by request and to serve in the event the Treasurer resigns or is ill or unable to function.

SECTION 5. The Historian shall keep the records of the association up-to-date.

SECTION 6. The Parliamentarian shall upon the request of the presiding officer of the body advise and assist the association with respect to all matters involving parliamentary procedure.

An Assistant Parliamentarian shall be elected. The Parliamentarian and Assistant should always communicate with each other to ensure that this office is filled at each associational annual or Executive Committee meeting.

SECTION 7. The Program Leaders and the Institutional Agency Representatives shall perform all duties customary to their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the association.

SECTION 8. The Director of Missions shall work closely with the associational committees, officers, and churches in such a way as to facilitate the meeting of the objectives of the association as set forth in Article II.

The director shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the association. The director shall communicate with the state and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

The duties of the Director of Missions shall be set forth in Article XIV.

SECTION 9. Trustees have no authority except by direction of the association, and are not personally bound by their signatures but, are to be the legal signees for the association.

Trustees represent the association in legal matters.

Trustees act on behalf of the association in acquisition and disposal of associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the association.

All persons dealing with the trustees, as associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the association moderator and clerk.

ARTICLE VIII - RULES OF ORDER

The business of the association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE IX - QUORUM

The annual associational quorum shall be not less than 25 percent of the member churches represented.

ARTICLE X - THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the general officers and program leaders elected by the association and the pastor and one member from each church in the association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an associational officer or program leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

*SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the association on matters arising when the association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the second Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the moderator with a one week notice to the churches.

SECTION 3. All vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 4. In the event that a vacancy occurs with the trustees, the Executive Committee should fill such a vacancy for the remainder of the term.

ARTICLE XI - ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The terms of office for all committee members shall be for one year except where specifically stated otherwise.

SECTION 2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the general meeting all standing committees as set forth under Article XI.

SECTION 3. The NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members. To this group the directors of Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and Music Ministry will be added.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers, program leaders and institutional agency representatives. These nominees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior to presenting of their names at the annual session.

SECTION 4. The ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE, composed of three members, shall plan the annual program of the association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July meeting.

SECTION 5. The CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE shall be composed of pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of churches seeking admission into the association in keeping with Article IV, and make recommendations to the association.

It shall counsel with churches that are out of harmony of fellowship with the association.

SECTION 6. The PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. The RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members appointed by the moderator at the OCTOBER Executive Committee meeting. It shall be the duty of the committee to present suitable resolutions at the annual associational meeting.

SECTION 8. The MÉMORIAL COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the annual meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in their memory.

SECTION 9. The FINANCE COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members including the treasurer of the association. This committee shall: (a) present a budget to the association for the following year; (b) devise plans for raising the funds for the associational budget; (c) audit the finances and financial records of the association annually and anytime there is a change of treasurer or at the direction of the association or the Executive Committee; (d) report all audits to the annual association meeting.

SECTION 10. The CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE shall be composed of three members and shall perform all duties specified in Article XV.

SECTION 11. The ORDINATION COMMITTEE shall be composed of five designated pastors and all other pastors who desire to sit with the committee.

- a. The committee serves in an advisory capacity only and serves at the request of the church from which one of the members is seeking ordination.
- b. The committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the church as they feel led.
- c. The committee should assist in arranging the proper service of ordination when such assistance is requested.
- d. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee.
- e. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee, and shall give two weeks notice in which the committee is to do its work.

SECTION 12. The EVANGELISM COMMITTEE. The duties of the committee shall be to direct and propose a perpetual program and spirit of evangelism in the association. It shall arrange and direct all associational wide evangelistic activities.

*SECTION 13. The ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS DEVELOPMENT COUNCIL shall be composed of eight (8) members, nominated by the Associational Committee on Committees; and elected by the Association at the annual meeting. The committee shall be: Missions Development Director, Promotion Director, Survey Director, Associational WMU Mission Action Director, Associational Brotherhood Director, Sunday School Outreach Director, Discipleship Training Director, and Associational Deacons President. The Missions Development Director, Promotion Director, and Survey Director shall be elected for a three-year term, with one member named each year. The other five positions shall be filled by the person who is elected to fill those five Associational Offices.

The duties of the AMDC are to lead the Associational Missions Development in the five mission performance tasks: (1) call churches to be on missions; (2) train, develop and encourage church and associational workers; (3) provide resources and services to churches and leaders; (4) provide opportunities for working together in missions, ministry and growth; (5) establish and maintain appropriate communications and relationships with the community and the denomination.

SECTION 14. The BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE shall be comprised of three members. The committee shall be responsible for and in charge of the upkeep and repairs of the associational building, grounds, and equipment.

ARTICLE XII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

*The ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL shall be composed of the Director of Missions, the Vice Moderator, the program leaders: Sunday School, Discipleship Training, Woman's Missionary Union, the Brotherhood Director, the Chairmen of Deacons, the Chairman of the Missions Committee, the Chairman of Evangelism, the Chairman of the Finance Committee, the Vacation Bible School Director, the Youth Director, the Director of the Singles, the Director of the Senior Adults and the Music Director. The Director of Missions is to serve as Chairman and a secretary shall be elected from the group.

The purpose of the council is to coordinate the planning of the various programs of the association, to develop an associational calendar, and to give mutual support to the various organization and program units in carrying out their assignments.

The council shall meet quarterly.

ARTICLE XIII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL PASTORS' CONFERENCE

The Associational Pastors' Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist ministers of the association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

ARTICLE XIV - DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS JOB DESCRIPTION

SECTION 1. FUNCTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS. He is to be the chief administrative officer of the association. He is to confirm extra employment in a manner agreed upon with the Executive Committee.

SECTION 2. RELATIONSHIP OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS.

1. He is employed by the Executive Committee of the association.

2. General supervision of the personnel and program of the association as they function through the association office.

3. Work primarily with (pastors), associational general officers, committees, and organizations.

4. Work closely with auxiliary organizations (such as W.M.U., Baptist Men, etc.).

5. Lead in maintaining relationships with state and S.B.C. agencies and promoting their programs.

SECTION 3. In the churches, extending the local ministries.

To visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders, in the pastorless churches to provide assistance in the church program and ministry, such as (1) Pulpit supply; (2) Study courses; (3) Missionary address; (4) Deacons' meetings; (5) Assembly programs; (6) Special day addresses; (7) Ordination services; (8) V.B.S. planning and promotion; (9) To interpret phases of associational work; (10) Budget planning; (11) Building planning; (12) Revival meetings; (13) Stewardship emphasis; (14) Study objectives and long range planning; (15) Studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, constitution and bylaws, etc.; (16) Church-community surveys, etc.; (17) Promoting a world missions concept; and (18) Publishing of a regular news medium (such as a monthly newsletter); (19) Cooperate with the news media to promote Baptist work.

In the associational office:

- a. Personal correspondence, promotional mail, and telephoning pertinent to his work.
- b. Office conferences, answer to inquiries, etc.
- c. Assist associational officers, committees and heads of organizations to get out promotional mail pertinent to their work.
- **SECTION 4. Schedule of Benefits**
- 1. His salary shall be
- 2. His fringe benefits shall include

3. His schedule shall include

- a. One day a week, chosen at his discretion, shall be reserved for rest that excluded normal associational activities.
- b. A maximum of four weeks each year outside of the association for special work with local churches or with state and S.B.C. agencies.
- c. An annual sick leave of 26 days maximum, with a maximum of 42 days to be accumulated. Sick leave may be advanced by the association for one year without Executive Committee action. Sick leave is to be recorded with the financial secretary of the association.
- d. Two weeks annual vacation with pay.
- e. Holidays: New Year's Day; Easter Monday; July 4; Labor Day; Thanksgiving, Thursday and Friday; Christmas, December 25 and 26.
- 4. All honorarium from churches inside or outside the association and all honorarium from other religious work shall be his personal fair, and shall not be submitted to the association.
- 5. The Director of Missions is afforded the opportunity of an annual evaluation by the Moderator and Missions Committee.

ARTICLE XV - AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Constitutional Committee at least 10 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.
