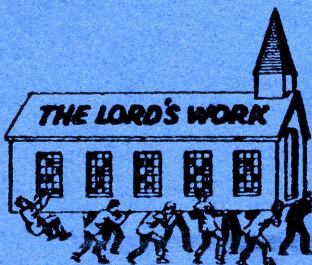

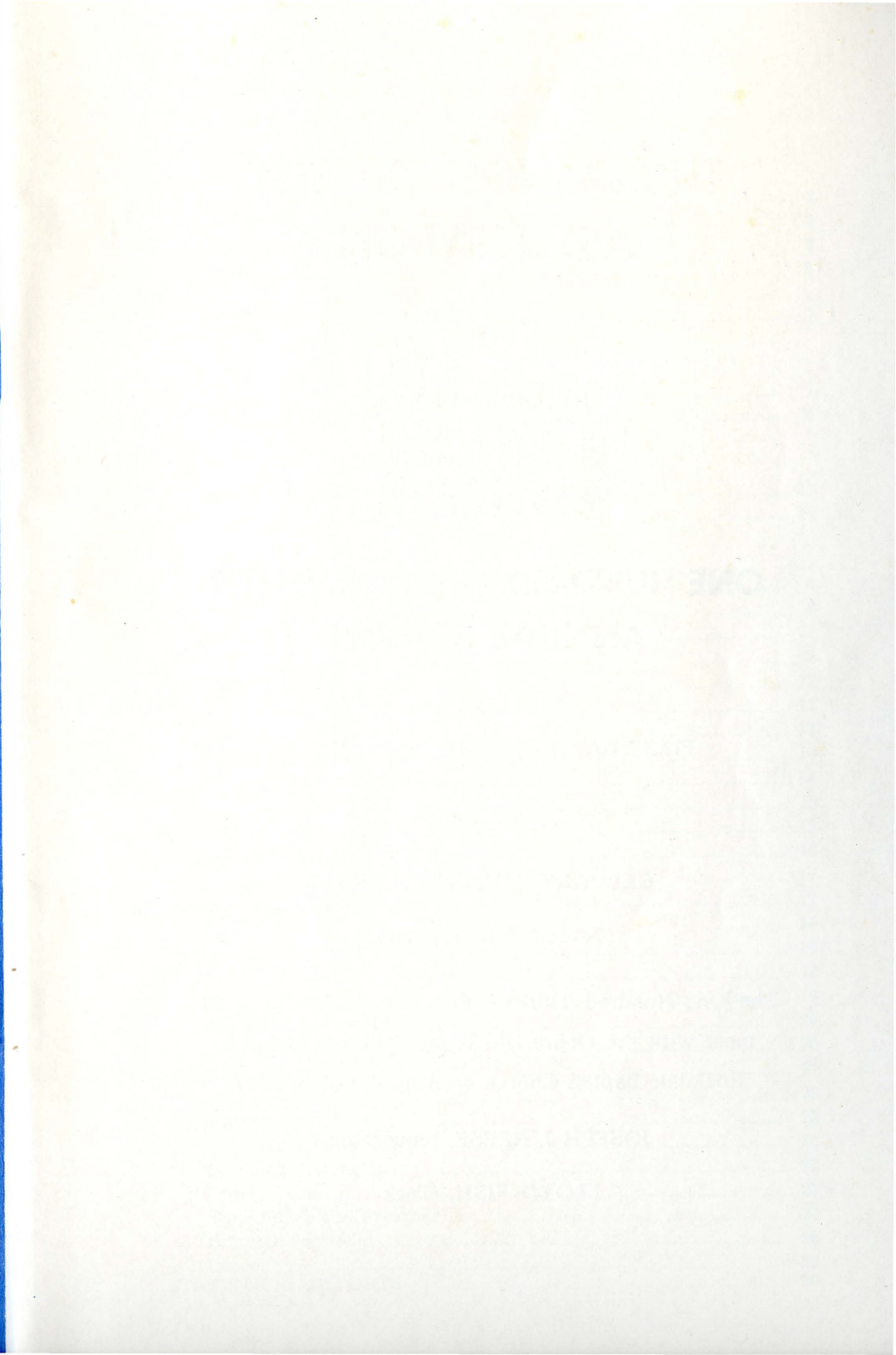

**TUCKASEGEE MISSIONARY BAPTIST ASSOCIATION
CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS
(Revised August 16, 1957)**

ARTICLE I. The name of this body shall be the Tuckasegee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II. The purpose of the Association shall be the extension of Christ's kingdom on earth, creation and promotion of harmony, intelligence and spiritual power of the churches.

ARTICLE III. (1) The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient. (2) It shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organizations, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline. (3) The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right to the local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV. The Association shall be composed of ministers and messengers selected by missionary Baptist churches which have been previously received into the association. (2) The pastor and four members from each one hundred members or fraction thereof shall compose the representation of each church. (3) The association shall be the sole judge of its members. (4) Any church applying to the association for membership by letter and messenger shall come under the watchcare of the association for one year for observation. At the expiration of that time, if it is still the will of the church, it may be voted in by majority vote of the association, provided they have an acceptable letter and at least one messenger present at the time.

ARTICLE V. The association shall hold its regular session on Thursday and Friday preceding the 3rd Sunday in August. (2) The moderator may call a mid-year session at his pleasure.

ARTICLE VI. (a) The officers of the association shall be a moderator, vice moderator, clerk, assistant clerk, treasurer, historian, Sunday School superintendent, Training Union Director, Woman's Missionary Union superintendent, Superintendent of Evangelism, president of Deacon's organization, Brotherhood President, Superintendent of Education, and a parliamentarian, and such other officers as the association may desire to elect. (b) The term of office for the general officers of the Association shall not exceed two years in succession, with the exception of the clerk and treasurer of the association, who may be re-elected to succeed themselves in office at the pleasure of the Association. The term of office for all members of committees of the Association shall be for not more than two years. No committee member may succeed himself until at least one year has elapsed after his official term has expired. No member of the Association may be permitted to hold membership in more than one committee during one year, except in the case of the members of the Executive Committee. (c) The term general officers shall apply to the moderator, vice moderator, clerk, assistant clerk and treasurer.

ARTICLE VII. (a) The moderator shall preside and maintain the order of business of all meetings unless he otherwise provides for the vice moderator. (b) He shall appoint the committee on committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the committee on committees in its regular report. (c) The vice moderator shall assist the moderator and in case of absence or incapacitation of the moderator, he shall act in his stead until another moderator is elected. (d) The clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; he shall prepare a book of reports to be distributed to messengers and pastors at the beginning of each day's session of the

annual meeting; and he shall cause to be printed a minute concerning the records made. (e) The clerk shall mail to the clerk of each church in the association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the state convention office. (f) The treasurer shall receive and disburse by the order of the executive committee or the association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report to the association at each session. (g) It shall be the duty of the historian to keep the records of the association up to date. (h) It shall be the duty of all other officers to execute the function of their office pertinent to a well directed association.

ARTICLE VIII. All officers shall be elected annually at the discretion of the body.

ARTICLE IX. The business of the association shall be conducted according to Roberts Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE X. The Promotion Committee shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Sunday School Superintendent, Superintendent of Evangelism, President of the Deacon's Organization, President of the Brotherhood, Superintendent of Education, Associational Missionary, Parliamentarian and the pastor and one member from each church in the association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational officer, shall be disqualified as a member of the Promotion Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE XI. It shall be the duty of the promotion committee to act for the association on matters arising when the association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the association.

ARTICLE XII. The associational quorum shall be the number present if the number satisfies the will of the moderator.

ARTICLE XIII. The association shall have the right to withdraw by a majority vote fellowship from any church which becomes unorthodox in doctrine, or disorderly in practice, or that fails to present itself either by messenger or letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body. Any church, at its pleasure, may withdraw from the association.

ARTICLE XIV. The association shall have such standing committees as may be considered necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst, the members of these committees are to be nominated annually by the committee on committees unless otherwise determined by the association.

ARTICLE XV. This constitution shall be amended by a majority vote, providing the amendment was read on the previous day of the association. Otherwise two-thirds majority of the votes cast must be in favor of the amendment.

BY-LAWS

1. All vacancies occurring among the elective officers and in the Promotion Committee shall be filled by the Promotion Committee.

2. The Promotion Committee shall meet at a time and place designated by the moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter. The Promotion Committee shall elect its own chairman.

3. Each church clerk shall mail to the clerk of the association a letter properly filled out on the blank furnished him at least two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

4. No church shall be received into the association who does not present a certificate of examination properly endorsed by the committee on organization and reception of new churches.

5. Duties of the committees of the association.

1. Order of Business Committee: This committee shall plan the annual program for the association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July meeting.
2. Committee on Committees: The duty of this committee is to bring to the annual associational meeting a nomination of the personnel of the standing committees.
3. Finance Committee. This committee shall devise plans for raising the funds for the associational budget and prepare for recommendations to the annual session of the association the budget for the disbursement of funds for the coming year.
4. Resolutions Committee: This committee is to report suitable resolutions at the annual associational meeting.
5. Credentials Committee: This committee serves in an advisory capacity only. This committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the Gospel Ministry and make recommendations as they feel led to the church of which one is a member about his being ordained and help plan and arrange the proper services of ordination when such assistance is needed. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee.
6. Nominating Committee: It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers of the Association and have this report ready for the annual associational meeting.
7. Committee on Organization and Reception of New Churches: This committee shall have the responsibility of advising with groups proposing the organization of new churches and offer such suggestions as are deemed advisable, and submit a written report of same to the association or Executive committee and grant to the proposed church a certificate of commendation which must be presented with the first letter of the church to the association. This committee shall be composed of the Baptist Pastors of the Churches of the Tuckaseegee Association. Seven members shall constitute a quorum. The chairman of the committee shall be named by the committee on committees.

6. The Clerk shall prepare a Book of Reports for distribution at the annual sessions containing the reports of those on the Committee on Reports. The Clerk shall notify each person to give a report, and these reports should be in the hands of the Clerk no later than two weeks before the Association meets.

REPORT ON ASSOCIATIONAL W. M. U.

The work of the Tuckaseegee Associational W. M. U. is trying to spread the knowledge of Christ in whatever way we can; by study, by giving, by praying. Let us work faithfully for this cause.

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONARY'S REPORT

The fact of God was the supreme fact in the thinking of the New Testament writers. They felt that God had spoken for time and eternity by sending Christ into the world. They related this experience of God to every situation of life and felt He filled the emptiness as He spoke to them through Jesus Christ, for God has always been the supreme need of every human life.

God is the answer for man's need in every situation. Men of all ages have found Jesus the most compelling and rewarding way of life known. The peak of God's revelation was made known through Him and by His Word.

Jesus said, "I am the way." How true! He is the fulfillment of everything the word means through faith, hope and love. The answer to man's needs may be found in these words: "And the Word was made flesh and dwelt among us." Whatever the answer, our denomination has made provision to help us understand and prepare ourselves that we may be used to "proclaim His Word" more effectively.

To mention some of the means that are at our disposal, we might consider:

1. The opportunity to meet in groups for Bible study, both pastors and layman, at the Seminary Extension Centers.
2. Another opportunity is the Five Year Spiritual Growth Program, which has as its object the reaching out into the community to win and enlist every one in cause of Christ.
3. Still another is the Life and Work Curriculum, a program of study which is planned to allow all organizations of the church to have their materials related to the same basic Bible and action themes.

We wish to express our deep appreciation to all of you that have been so loyal to Christ over the past year. By your faithfulness you have aided greatly in the proclamation of God's Word in this age.

STATE MISSIONS REPORT

The opportunity to share in the Christian program outside the local church is made possible in a very special way by remembering to pray for and give through the State Missions Offering in September of each year. In so doing you may share in a great manner in some of the most worthy mission causes that come our way. Baptist people have a right to express their special concern toward special objects that are close to their heart.

Our State Missions Offering helps in the purchase of lots for new churches that are being built in areas where there has not been a church before. By State missions reaching out in unchurched areas in this manner we feel that we are accomplishing God's will to reach the unreached. The assistance given in these instances many times means the difference in a church or mission moving out into an active part in the Kingdom work of our Lord or just counting time by being hampered for the need to expand in a greater way.

Forty to fifty churches and missions are aided each year by receiving aid to buy lots.

Associational Missions is aided by the State Missions Offering and each of the 72 Associations that have the services of an Associational Missionary recognize the strength that is received from the Baptist State Convention in many ways, and financial aid is given in many instances.

There are many special areas of mission concern in our State. Our State mission work reaches the Japanese people within our State, Military personnel, the deaf people across the State, the Cherokee Indian ministry and the Seminary Extension work in the western part of the State.

This is only a few of the things that our gifts to State missions in September will help them to accomplish. May each church respond to this opportunity to serve is to be greatly desired. Remember the words of the Master: "In as much as ye have done it for the least of these, my brethren."

REPORT OF HOME MISSIONS

The mission of the church is to present the gospel of Jesus Christ to all the people both at home and abroad with the purpose of leading them to personal faith in Christ and obedience to His will. It has been stated that where there is no mission there is no church and where there is neither church nor mission there is no faith.

The Home Mission Board seeks to aid the church and associations in so many ways that it would be impossible in such short report to consider them all; however, we will list some of the ways that Home Missions aids in making Christ known in our immediate area of North Carolina.

1. The Seminary Extension work which has been so helpful in our own Association under the leadership of Roy J. Smith as Director is sponsored by the Baptist State Convention and aided by the Home Mission Board.
2. The Cherokee Indian Ministry is a cooperative ministry of the Baptist State Convention and the Home Mission Board.
3. The Military Personnel Ministry is a joint endeavor of the Home Mission Board and the Baptist State Convention. It has two phases of work: One is working with Japanese people and the other is working with the military personnel in seeking to relate them to the churches.
4. The Home Mission Board Migrant Ministry is of great help to some of the associations and churches through which migrant

workers pass for only a brief period at different intervals of the year. Many of these people are reached for Christ in this manner.

This report only lists a few of the areas in which the Home Mission Board is aiding. May we continue to pray and contribute money that God has blessed each of us with that Christ may be known by as many as will receive Him.

At the close of 1965, the Southern Baptist Foreign Missions Board had a missionary staff of 2,070. This included 51 missionary associates, 6 special project nurses, and 46 missionary journeymen. Appointments during the year totaled 220 (213 were new appointees and 7 reappointed). Between January and May 1966, 48 more were added, including 2 reappointed and a special project nurse.

A new dimension in missionary service was initiated in the summer of 1965 with the missionary journeyman program. This includes single college graduates under 27 years of age who went to 27 countries for two-year terms in special assignments under the supervision of career missionaries.

Even with the additional appointments, less than 25 per cent of missionary personnel need was met. Preachers and medical people continue to be most urgently requested. There are also calls for those trained in teaching and other professions: business, radio, journalism, and student work. We can gather from these few requests that have been mentioned that the need is great for volunteers.

At the meeting of the Foreign Mission Board in May, Dr. Baker J. Cauthen, executive secretary, said: "Among those being appointed is a couple for Vietnam, together with a couple for Indonesia. It is reassuring that in the troubled areas of South East Asia, mission work continues to press forward and God's servants meet their responsibilities with faith and courage."

We can very well understand that these courageous missionaries need our prayers. Their dedication should inspire each church to respond in a worthy manner to the Cooperative Program which is the solid financial basis on which foreign mission advance is projected. Can His program of service to the world count on you?

Several associations in North Carolina have 100% of their churches giving through the Cooperative Program. According to available records our association gave a total of \$14,717.57 this past year through the Cooperative Program. 11 number of churches did not share in world missions through the Cooperative Program.

With enthusiasm let us be faithful in worshiping with tithes and offerings, and our church sharing regularly through the Cooperative Program for the benefit of a lost world.

HISTORICAL REPORT

In no era in the history of the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association has there been so much construction and improvement of church buildings as in the past five years, the early 1960's.

New buildings have been erected at Balsam, Cashiers, New Savannah, Ochre Hill, Sol's Creek, Sylva First, Zion Hill and Green's Creek. Scotts Creek — (replaced their building which was destroyed by fire). The East Fork Church has bricked veneered their building while Love-dale and Old Savannah are in the process of constructing new buildings. The following churches constructed new parsonages: Cullowhee; Shoal Creek; East Sylva; Tuckaseegee; Yellow Mt. and Green's Creek Church is engaged in construction at the present time.

Many churches have either added new additions to their buildings or have been engaged in improvements of some kind. Calvary has added new Sunday School rooms. Others have added new pews, carpeting, furniture, pianos and heating systems. Still others have remodeled the interior of their parsonages. Some have rebuilt church entrances and provided baptistries. Every church in the association has a part in this tremendous surge of church improvement.

CHRISTIAN HIGHER EDUCATION

The great need for providing better communication between the colleges and the churches in the convention was recognized in the year 1946 to the extent that a Council On Christian Higher Education was established. This was done as a means of correlating programs of the various colleges, developing uniform accounting procedures, and providing better communication on all levels.

The council does not exercise any direct authority over the Baptist colleges. These colleges are placed in the hands of competent trustees and administrators. However, there is a definite inter-relatedness of the aim and purpose of both. This causes an interest of common good among all rather than competition. Because of the good will between the Baptist colleges and Baptist churches, there is much progress to be reported.

Campbell College had a Million Dollar Campaign started in 1965. This was to bolster the college in its efforts to expand educational opportunity. Under the leadership of Mr. Henderson Belk of Charlotte, North Carolina and fifteen other Christian men, a state-wide campaign has already passed the half-way mark.

Chowan College's student body is made up of students from every county in North Carolina, several foreign countries, and about twenty states. Chowan's physical plant is continually growing as a result of North Carolina Baptists.

Gardner-Webb College has had many significant developments during the past school year. A total of 1994 applications were received.

The admissions committee turned away more students than they accepted.

Mars Hill College had a total enrollment of 1384 for one semester in 1965. Of this number 752 were men and 632 were women. They came from 83 counties in North Carolina, 21 other states, 2 foreign countries, and the Canal Zone. Out of the 21 denominations represented, 1,032 were Baptist students.

Meredith College is growing in student membership as well as in fine Christian training. The enrollment was 938 students as of October 1, 1965.

Wake Forest College has been growing very much. In the fall of 1965, the enrollment was 2,955 compared with 2,880 the year before. There were 693 freshmen selected from approximately 4,000 applicants. In the summer of 1965, the college had its first Summer Conference for Pastors. This will be continued in 1966.

Wingate College had an enrollment of 1,486 students for last school year. Students came from nineteen states and five foreign countries. All the college employees are aware of the relationship between the convention and the college. Each pledges every effort to promote an effective program of Christian Higher Education.

We have a great responsibility to our Baptist colleges. We must pray for the administration, faculty and student body. We must do all in our power to help and to encourage. May God help us to do so. May God bless our young people and make them into fine Christian leaders.

REPORT ON THE BAPTIST STUDENT UNION

LOVE IMPELS SACRIFICE TOWARD EVERY NEED. Durham . . . Cherokee . . . The names are not Enugu or Tong-Mong Ni. The names are not exotic and shrouded with mystery. The names are familiar and old shoeish; yet they designate two places in the world where people are. They are places where people need love, understanding and some special skills. The needs are as deep in Durham as in Enugu . . . as deep in Cherokee as in Tong-Mong Ni.

During the summer of 1966 the Baptist Student Union of North Carolina sent students with offerings of love and understanding along with special skills to minister to the inner city in Durham and to the Indian Reservation at Cherokee.

In Durham eight students and their director lived together in a bi-racial slum neighborhood while working in the Edgemont Community Center. Their activities included assisting with clubs and scouting groups, working in the pre-school program, tutoring in the evenings, counseling with school drop-outs, and acting as "Big Brothers" and "Big Sisters" to children who needed adult figures to emulate.

In Cherokee eight work-campers and their chaplain had the happy task of erecting an arts and crafts center for the Cherokee Community. The value of having such a building is inestimable since it will provide a place where crafts can be taught to those who have no livelihood. The students chosen for this project lived together in the community and were blessed in their involvement in the total life of the reservation.

In prospectus plans are underway for a Baptist Student Union Work-Camp in Brazil during the summer of 1967.

REPORT ON BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES OF NORTH CAROLINA, INC.

Under the impact of the life, ministry and teachings of Christ and under the leadership of the Holy Spirit, North Carolina Baptists, eighty-one years ago launched a Christian ministry of child care. This has grown considerably and is widely recognized for its qualities of service and pioneering spirit. Sons and daughters of the Children's Homes are scattered throughout the world. They are actively engaged in all walks of life and are making a significant contribution to the uplift of mankind as a result of their early Christian training made possible by North Carolina Baptists and other friends.

As we continue to build upon foundations already laid, special attention is being given certain areas of child care. An already strong program of group care is being strengthened at Mills Home, Kennedy Home and Odum Home. A good degree of progress has been realized in working with emotionally disturbed children at Greer Home in Chapel Hill. The demonstration Child Development Program for pre-school children, conducted on the Mills Home campus, has had an excellent first year of operation. Churches throughout the state are studying the program and facilities preparatory to providing similar services. Prospects are encouraging for a home for children in the western part of the state more adequately to serve the needs of our people who live west of the Blue Ridge Mountains. Constant attention is being given to more effective ways of meeting the highly specialized needs of children coming out of broken and inadequate home situations.

We have a large number of good Christian homes for the care of foster children. More are needed in all sections of the state. Foster homes serve children of all ages and are of particular advantage for some who have special needs. Foster home parents may be of varying ages and circumstances in life. Couples with or without children of their own who have an abundance of love find this to be a challenging and rewarding opportunity of Christian service.

Sincere appreciation is expressed to all who have, in any way, helped to support our child care ministry. We are indeed grateful for increasing income through the Cooperative Program. Last year's Thanks-

giving Offering is approaching three hundred fifteen thousand dollars (\$315,000.00) and is the largest ever. Special gifts and designations such as the Once-a-month offering continue to provide a substantial part of our income. Through estate planning and the making of Christian wills an increasing number of individuals and families are investing in present and future generations of boys and girls who are in need of the services of the Baptist Children's Homes. Roger Williams, former pastor of the Mills Home Baptist Church, is devoting full time to working with our Baptist people in this area, and he or other members of our staff will count it a privilege to assist you in exploring this field of Christian stewardship.

We covenant with you to face the future as we have the past: to offer Christian nurture to distressed children in the Name of the Lord Jesus Christ.

For a period of at least six months, the RECORDER will run both lessons as a service to our churches.

In our state, changing conditions are raising serious questions about the fate of almost every institution we support. In the near future Baptists will have to decide our future course in higher education and in our Social Service institutions, especially in view of increased government participation in these areas. The RECORDER will present the issues and possible choices open to us.

In the Southern Baptist Convention, there is talk of a name change. The work of our Baptist colleges is being studied as never before. A great Crusade of the Americas is in the planning stages. All of us need to know about these developments.

In addition to issues within our own denomination, new and disturbing clouds are on the horizon elsewhere. Talk of a New Morality, the so-called Death of God Movement, and the drastic changes in young people's attitudes toward the church are being widely discussed. Christians need to be informed on these trends.

A drive is taking shape in North Carolina for liquor-by-the-drink. The 1967 General Assembly will consider such proposals and Baptists need a dependable source of information so they can act when necessary. The RECORDER will give on-the-spot coverage.

Instead of merely receiving this as a report, please take definite action to see that the RECORDER soon goes to every family in your church membership. All of us know that the RECORDER is just as important as other literature which our churches distribute, if not more so. No other publication can take the place of the BIBLICAL RECORDER. Under the Church Budget Plan, the RECORDER is available for \$2 a year — the same price it was more than 100 years ago.

During this past year we have ministered to 172 deserving older men and women. All of these have been blessed by the love gifts of North Carolina Baptists, through the Special Day offering, received on the third Sunday of February each year, and through our share in the Cooperative Program. The large majority, at least 85%, have benefitted directly from these gifts and have actually been sustained at the point of their financial need.

The Special Day offering for 1966 is at an all time high and looks as if it might be \$100,000.00 for the first time. This is very good, and we are profoundly grateful. We must not forget, however, that, even though there has been a 5% increase in the offering from last year, costs have advanced by 7%.

It is anticipated that construction will begin on our fifth Home at Yanceyville during the coming year, and when it is completed, we will be able to minister in all of our Homes to 200 older men and women and relieve, in measure, the terrific pressure of a long waiting list of 170 people.

This ministry of love, in Christ's name, is dependent upon the concern, the love, the prayers, and the increased financial support of North Carolina Baptists. We are, therefore, going to count heavily on you and believe that you will not disappoint the aging people who are looking to you urgently for help.

CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Credentials Committee was called into session five times for the purpose of examining six Licensed Ministers for Ordination to the Gospel Ministry.

1. The committee met July 17, 1965 at the Buff Creek Church to examine Brother Glen Nations, who had received a call to become pastor of Red Bank Church in the Haywood Association. After each of the Committee had heard Brother Nations conversion experience and his call into the ministry had been given opportunity to question him concerning doctrinal views and heard his answers, the Committee recommend Brother Nations to the Buff Creek Church for ordination at their convenience.
2. The same committee on the same date at Buff Creek church questioned Brother Ronnie Waldroup, a member of Jarrett Memorial Church, who had received a call from the Calvary Church to be Pastor. After each member of the Committee had ample opportunity for questioning Brother Waldroup concerning Faith and Doctrine, this Committee found Brother Waldroup to be sound and recommended him to the Jarrett Memorial Church for ordination.
3. The Committee met at Rockdale church February 6 for the pur-

pose of questioning Brother James Price, one of their members to who they had extended a call to become pastor. After the Committee had examined Brother Price concerning Faith and Doctrine, the Committee recommended that Brother Price ordained to the Gospel Ministry.

4. The Committee was called to meet at the Tuckaseegee Church to examine Brother J. C. Robinson, June 12, 1966. The examination was requested by the Hamburg Church, of which he was a member. Brother Robinson had received a call to become pastor of the Big Ridge Church. Upon examination of Brother Robinson, the Committee, finding him worthy, voted to recommend Brother Robinson to the Hamburg Church for ordination.
5. The Committee was called to the Webster Church on June 13, 1966 to examine Brother Lewis Ensley at the request of the Balsam church, of which he was a member. Brother Ensley had received a call to pastor the Speedwell Church. After full and lengthy examination of Brother Ensley concerning Faith and Doctrine, Brother Ensley was found sound in this manner and was recommended for ordination to the Balsam Church at their convenience.
6. The Committee was called to the Webster Church at another date for the purpose of examining Brother B. F. Pressley. The request was made by the Speedwell Church of which he was a member. Brother Pressley had received a call to be pastor of the Little Savannah Church. After Brother Pressley had been examined by each of the Committee and found sound in the Faith and Doctrine, the Committee recommended Brother Pressley to the Speedwell Church for ordination at their convenience.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

Our Baptist Hospital and Medical School are a center of healing for body, mind and spirit, a center of training of medical personnel and Christian workers, and a center of scientific research for the advancement of medical care.

Without a vast amount of medical research, there would be no heart surgery today by which lives are saved in our Baptist Hospital almost every week; and the same would be true of almost every new method of treating us when we are sick. Without schools for the training of doctors, nurses, technicians and others, there soon would be no skilled persons in our hospitals or in our communities to care for us when illness comes. Without a staff of highly trained and experienced specialists and a vast amount of expensive specialized equipment, our Baptist Hospital could not offer the highly skilled medical care which is available to us when serious illness strikes and a fine medical center is needed. Another very important fact is that the skilled medical care of our Hospital is made available to people who need it and cannot pay for it. These important services are the work of our Medical Center in Winston-Salem.

The kind of medical care provided by our Hospital is very expensive, and the Hospital has no choice but to ask full payment of all who can pay. The Hospital has been spending in free care for our people far more than it receives from our Mother's Day Offerings, the Cooperative Program, and all welfare agencies combined. This has caused the Hospital to run into debt the past two years and the same has been happening this year. Of course, the Hospital simply cannot continue to operate this way. Medicare is not going to change the situation greatly.

Our people need to understand this and to recognize that we are going to have to provide much greater support if the Hospital is to continue to provide free service in the same measure for those who cannot pay for it.

While some of our churches support the Hospital well indeed, most of them could do far more than they have been doing. We want to bring this to your attention, asking you to go back to your church and give this information to your people and help to lead them to give serious consideration to the Hospital's vital ministry and its urgent need.

REPORT ON THE ANNUITY BOARD

Benefits Paid

In 1965, almost \$4 million was paid in age retirement, disability or widow benefits to annuitants through the Annuity Board's protection program. The annuitants' checks vary in amounts, depending on the length of time each was a member and the amount of dues he paid.

Since the beginning of the Annuity Board in 1918, almost \$51 million has been paid out in benefits which annuitants have termed "manna from heaven."

There are seven states with 70 per cent or more of the churches in the Program. At present, North Carolina has 48 per cent of the churches in the Protection Program for ministers.

Rev. Guy Cain promotes the Protection Program in North Carolina. He is jointly employed by the Annuity Board and North Carolina Baptist Convention. "Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging; whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise," so says Proverbs 20:1. We believe in helping rehabilitate alcoholics. We believe in doing everything we can to keep people from becoming alcoholics. We can leave off alcoholic drinks ourselves, and use our influence against its use by others. If we are good citizens, we will vote against it.

Some argue that our government needs the revenue from the sale of whiskey, but statistics show that in North Carolina in 1964, we spent \$18.64 to make one dollar in whiskey revenue. The crime, accidents, and tragedies on the highways, and loss of work and health due to liquor is heartbreaking as well as expensive.

We are responsible citizens and take a firm stand against those who would make easy money by pandering the weakness of their fellow man. One of the most tragic things about the liquor traffic is that many of our teen-agers have become involved. Let us begin now to educate them to the dangers of alcohol. Also, we know that parents have a great responsibility in this and sometimes it may call for screening of the company of their children. But nothing should be left undone to guard against this evil. Just to disapprove is sometimes not enough. We must act.

12. The Rev. C. W. Bazemore spoke concerning the **Biblical Recorder**. This report was approved in the next day's session.

13. The representative of the Baptist State Convention, the Rev. Robert Bruhn, brought a message on the needs of a changing world and our need to be architects of change.

14. A period for miscellaneous business began with the presentation of a proposed constitutional change to be presented for voting on the next day. This matter was presented by the Rev. Lloyd Fish. This proposed change is as follows:

ARTICLE VII

1. Under (a) add: He (the moderator) shall serve as an **ex officio** member of all committees of the Association.

2. Delete (h) as it now stands, and insert the following:

The Associational Missionary shall be sought and recommended by the Promotions Committee in a manner of its own choosing.

His call shall be indefinite. His salary, allowances, etc., shall be as provided by the current budget or adjustments recommended in consultation with the Finance Committee.

Two week vacation may be taken at his discretion.

Concerning termination of employment, his resignation shall be in writing and presented to the Promotion Committee at least thirty days before it is to take effect. The Promotion Committee may terminate employment by giving thirty days notice in advance.

The Promotions Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the Missionary in planning, promoting, and financing his work.

The Missionary shall work closely with the associational com-

mittees and associational officers in such a way as to help each group determine its opportunities and objectives based on need in the churches and procedures, and means of fulfilling these.

Therefore, he shall serve as *ex officio* member of all committees of the Association. It shall be his duty to administer the policies and instructions of the Promotions Committee. He shall communicate with the State and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

Visitors were presented to the Association from Georgia, Florida, Texas, as well as other visitors from North Carolina.

Recognition of three young people: Miss Edwina Bishop, appointed missionary journeyman from this Association; Miss Delois Ashe and Mr. Eddie Deitz, Vacation Bible School workers in the Association this summer.

New pastors presented were: Lewis Ensley, Speedwell; George Langley, Hamburg; Delos Hoyle, Unity; Lonas Murdock, New Savannah.

Mrs. Hattie Hilda Allison moved the Association stand in recognition of the service rendered by the Rev. Roy Smith and the Rev. James Lambert, who are moving from the Association.

15. A hymn, "Now Thank We All Our God" was sung.
