Theodore F. Adams

Baptist preacher, pastor, author, teacher, statesman, Theodore F. Adams came to Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1968 for a "one-year teaching appointment." He stayed ten, and with his wife Esther, brought an unparalleled warmth to this campus. He had

retired in 1968 as pastor of Richmond's First Baptist Church where he had served since 1936. He retired again in 1978 and served Southeastern as a Development Counselor until his death in 1980.

Ted Adams served his Lord with distinction and humility. To numerous colleges, universities, hospitals, and denominational agencies, he contributed rare insight and patience. God called him beyond the confines of his church and denomination to serve the needs of people around the world. His heart was open to persons of all races and nationalities, and from 1955 to 1960 he served as President of the Baptist World Alliance.

From his preaching, writing, lectures and conversations with persons of all persuasions have come women and men of higher vision and deeper dedication. Through these lectures and in countless other ways, his life continues to make an impact on all who knew and loved him.
