#### CHURCH COVENANT.

## PROCEEDINGS.

New Hope, N. C., October 4th, 1904.

The Eastern Association met this day in its sixty-first annual session, in the meeting house of the New Hope Baptist Church, Sampson county, N. C. The Introductory Sermon was preached by W. N. Johnson, Delway, N. C., text Est. 1:14, after which a recess was taken for one hour.

#### FIRST DAY-AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 1:45 P. M. the Association met. The Moderator read 127th Psalm. N. B. Cobb led in prayer. The Association was then called to order by J. L. Stewart. On motion of R. C. Sandling the Moderator appointed a Finance Committee consisting of Brethren W. J. Fryar, James Carlton and Maurey Ward. C. M. Beach and J. H. Booth reading Clerks.

Election of Officers being in order, by motion, the rules were suspended and W. N. Johnson was instructed to cast the vote of the Association for J. L. Stewart, Moderator; A. R. Herring, Clerk; C. E. Daniel, Treasurer. A. R. Herring tendered his resignation and A. F. Robinson was elected Clerk.

On motion of W. N. Johnson a committee was appointed on digest of church letters and that to be made second item in order of buisness.

On the call for petitionary letters a letter from Delway was presented, and referred to a committee consisiting of J. T. Albritton, N. B. Cobb and J. H. Booth. The committee reported and recommended the reception of the church, and on motion the Delway church was received in full fellowship of the Association and the right hand of welcome was extended by the Moderator.

On motion, the Association adjourned with benediction by J. T. Albritton.

#### SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION.

Devotional exercises were conducted by J. H. Booth at 9:30 A. M. At 10 o'clock the Moderator called the Association to order. The roll of delegates were called, and the minutes of yesterday were read and approved. Invitation was extended to visiting brethren. J. L. Shinn and Hight C. Moore reported themselves. Bro. Shinn who represents the N. C. Baptist and Bro. Moore, State Missions, and J. S. Farmer, of the Biblical Recorder, all of whom were welcomed by the Moderator and to seats with us.

Special order, reports of executive committee together with report on State Missions taken up. The report of the Executive Committee was submitted and read by C. E. Daniel, and State Missions was read by C. M. Rock.

## REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Missions is life, anti-missions or omissions is death. The last command of our Master was: "Go ye into all the world and preach the Gospel to every creature." At our last Association your committee called Bro. N. A. Shelly to serve the churches at Hallsville, Sharon, Cedar Fork, and Maple Hill. Faithfully did he present the message till the Master in His wisdom, called him to final reward, on July the 6th, 1904. Since that time Brother J. H. Booth has been serving the above named churches. He has preached

32 sermons, organized one Sunday School, baptized 2 with 3 awaiting baptism. Brethren J. M. Alderman, J. A. Smith, and J. W. Wheeler have aided him in meetings on the field. Finally brethren we ask that the salary of Bro. Shelly be continued up to the Association.

## REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

Your Committee are glad to report that the State Mission work under the management of our brother Livingston Johnson, our Corresponding Secretary of the Baptist State Convention, is moving grandly forward.

As his work was seen to be so urging the Convention decided to work on a thirty thousand dollar basis; and we hope this year to work on a still larger basis. This is a glorious work to give the gospel to our people, a worthy cause, and is in great need, and calls to us to make a sacrifice. Let us not take it all in talk, but may we go to work and do great things for our State Mission Board. About one hundred men or more are on our State Board working in destitute sections of our State and depending on our Board for help, and the Board has promised to help them. But how can the Board help the men on the field, unless we stand by the Board. Brother Livingston Johnson is a faithful worker, a noble Christian and a dutiful servant of God, and would gladly lead us to higher and better things for God. Therefore we heartily endorse his work and the Board, for which he is working so faithfully; and commend the great work to the hearts and pocket books of our people.

Pending motion to adopt the above reports the Association was addressed by J. H. Booth, J. T. Albritton, C. M. Rock and Hight C. Moore.

At this point special prayer was offered for the work of State and Associational Missions. A cash collection was taken to relieve Bro. J. H. Booth of a debt on Cedar Fork Church. Amount of collection, \$37.95. The report was adopted. Preaching was announced at the stand by J. L. Shinn. On motion the collection at the stand \$3.93, was given to State and Associational Missions.

#### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Home missions is missions to our own children in the new States and sections to which they have moved. This Board has helped many sections of our State and preserved from destruction many strategic points in the past, years before our people were gathering in towns and villages, and is still helping to educate our people in the mountain counties. They report 616 missionaries who baptized 7,526 last year. It richly deserves our constant patronage. The world has been coming to us more rapidly and in larger numbers than ever, and it behooves us to be up and stirring to give them the Gospel as they come.

Pending motion to adopt the report on Home Missions the Association was addressed by N. B. Cobb and Hight C. Moore. Report was adopted.

On motion the Association discountenances the sale or traffic of drinks or merchandise of any kind at or near the Association grounds.

On motion the Association adjourned for one hour with benediction by Hight C. Moore.

#### EVENING SESSION.

Was called to order by the Moderator. Announcement was made for preaching at the stand immediately by J. S. Farmer.

#### HISTORICAL.

Rev. J. T. Albritton who was appointed on history of the Eastern Association makes his report which reads as follows:

History of the organization of the (now called Eastern) Union Baptist Association. In the minutes of the last session of the Goshen Baptist Association, held with Beulah Baptist Church, Sampson county, N. C., September 29th to October 1st, 1843, is the following resolution: "Resolved, That in the opinion of this Association, the cause of Christ would be materially promoted in this section of the State, by uniting the churches between Wilmington and New Bern, extending as far North as the Neuse Association reaches, in one strong, well-arranged body. (Tar River was the Northern boundary.) The churches of the Neuse Association and the Baptist Advisory Council, as well as those of the Goshen Association, were within this territory.

The Neuse Association was organized at Bear Marsh, in 1794; The Advisory Council was organized in 1836, at Mewborne's Church, Green county; and the Goshen Association colony from the Cape Fear Association was organized at Beulah Church, Sampson county in 1827.

The first session of the Union Baptist Association was held with the Kenansville Baptist Church, Duplin county, October 4-7, 1844, with James Carroll Moderator, and N. McNabb, Clerk. I find in the list of churches 7 from Duplin, 8 from Sampson, 9 from New Hanover, 2 from Onslow, 2 from Pitt, 1 from Craven, 1 from Lenoir, 1 from Jones, and 1 from Wayne; making a total of 32 churches.

By comparing the Church list of the Goshen with that of the Union at its first session, it will be seen that there was a change of name with but little change of constituency, as 26 of the 32 churches belonging to the new Association were members of the Goshen. At the session of 1865, held with the Moore's Creek church the name was changed to, "The Eastern Association." Below I give the names of the churches, their attending delegates, their membership, and their pastors, as found in the minutes of the first session in 1844:

The total number of churches was 32 and total membership was 2,728. For want of space, much that I desire to say must be unsaid. I am moved to add a few notes, however, that may prove of interest to the body. Moores Creek reported the largest membership, 217; Wilmington comes next with 209 members, contributing about \$300.00 for Bible distribution, and Home and Foreign Missions.

Goldsboro Church was organized, according to the minutes, 12 months before the first meeting of the Association. She began with 5 members. Her first paster was Wm. Robinson, an Irish gentleman of culture, and for several years one of the leading educators and editors of the State.

The Church worshipped alternately in Goldsboro and Waynesboro, the two towns being about a mile apart. The oldest church in the new Association is Wells Chapel, constituted in 1756; the second oldest is Rowan, constituted in 1759; and third oldest is Bear Marsh, constituted in 1763, with ten members.

Greenville Church will go down in Baptist history as the place where was organized the Baptist State Convention in 1830. In this Church your humble scribe received his first Sunday school instruction, made palatable by the teachers liberal use of toothsome confectioneries about sixty-five years ago. Mark Bennett, one of the most able and Godly theologians I have ever known, was once pastor of this church.

Hancock's Church (or the Missionary portion of it rather), many years ago, moved to Antioch, and thence at a later date to the thriving town of

Winterville, a few miles from Greenville.

The several reports on Education, Religious Literature and Home and Foreign Missions are well prepared and indicate a broad and progressive Spirit among the brethren. The report on Associational Missions, presented by Benjamin Oliver, the chairman, recommended about the same plan of operation as that by which this part of our work is carried on to-day.

Among the ministers to the new Association were Hiram Stallings, W. J. Finch, J. J. Finch, Wm. P. Biddle, Robert McNabb, J. Elwell, George Fennell, David Wells, A. P. Repiton, G. W. Hupham, L. F. Williams, I. W. West and

Wm. Robinson.

What a joy to tell of those brethren and the delegates, many of whom I personally knew, and all of whom Nehemiah Faison excepted—have gone to their reward! But alas: this short history of our beginning as an Associational body is already too long.

## REPORT ON BAPTIST ORPHANAGE.

The Baptist Orphanage at Thomasville has been wonderfully blessed of the Lord; and our people have had this work on their hearts from the beginning. Our hearts have been made sad of late because of the scourge of fever which is now upon the children. There has been above 40 cases of fever, 20 have been discharged from the infirmary, and there are 20 odd, still sick; two have died. The sickness has greatly increased the expenses of the Orphanage. We learn from Charity and Children, and also from Bro. C. G. Wells that the trustees think we should put in a sewerage system for the protection of the children's health.

Your committee would recommend that a collection be taken upon the adoption of this report, for the Orphanage to relieve the present need, and that every Church and Sunday school in the Eastern Association be requested

to take regular collections for the Orphanage.

Pending motion to adopt the Association was addressed by C. G. Wells. A special cash collection was taken up at this point for the Orphanage amounting to \$14.43. By motion N. B. Cobb was requested to write a letter accompanying the contribution to Brother and Sister Boon expressing our sympathy in their sad trials. By motion, Bro. Hight C. Moore led the Association in special prayer for the Orphanage. The churches at Warsaw, Clinton, Piney Grove, Johnsons, Ivanhoe, Corinth, Mount Olive, Mount Gilead, New Hope, Island Creek and Siloam, pledged themselves to make effort to raise \$5.00 each at their next regular church service for the Orphanage. On motion the report was adopted.

On motion the Association appointed a committee consisting of brethren C. M. Rock, B. A. Summerlin, D. L. Carlton, H. G. Owen and L. Middleton,

to arrange and run excurison to Thomasville during the coming year for the benefit of our people who want to visit the Orphanage.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Forward is the word on the tongue, and in the hearts of our people, as we consider the hard work. It has been suggested by our worthy Secretary of our Foreign Mission Board there are three distinct lines of advance. One on the Foreign field, one on the part of men and women going out from home to the forces at the front. The other on the part of churches at home in furnishing the funds and more earnestly praying to God. The advance in the first case has been and is glorious. The last report of the Board gives us two thousand baptisms, where a few years ago we reported seven hundred; our missionaries are going forward, preaching and teaching. And organizing churches and establishing schools, providing hospitals, setting up printing houses and otherwise pushing forward the Master's Kingdom. In the second regard, we are seeing progress also. In five years the number of our missionaries has gone from seventy-three to a hundred and twentysix (126) with thirty-six others now under appointment for the foreign work. Now as to the third point; we need to make an advance in our churches at home. We are gratified to state that the receipts of the Board has increased from a hundred and twenty-four thousand dollars in 1898 to two hundred and eighteen thousand and five hundred dollars in 1903. May we continue to increase our contributions to the work as the Lord has prospered us, and the need of the work demands.

#### REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

The Sunday school is the Church engaged in the study and teaching of the Scriptures. It has not only its basis upon, but its authority in the word of God. Its influence and power in the upbuilding of the churches, and the advancement of the cause of Christ cannot be overestimated. It is one of the mightiest agencies for the promulgation of the truth, and is worthy of every energy and all the heart we can put into it.

In North Carolina we Baptist have set our hands afresh to this work. Our Field Secretary in the office and field is receiving every encouragement in his efforts to improve our Sunday School condition. Though we have 1.792 churches with a membership of more than 182,000 members, we have only 1.300 Sunday schools with an enrollment of 96,000 members. So the need is great for more and larger and better Sunday schools. Your committee would suggest and urge:

1. That each of our churches put new life and power into the Sunday School work; utilizing only earnest Christians as officers and teachers.

2. That as a body we seek to establish and maintain and improve the Sunday schools in our borders.

3. That the Association set apart the Spring fifth Sunday meeting for the consideration of Sunday school topics and the unifying of Sunday school

4. That a committee of three be appointed to advocate the Sunday school interest in our Association. And to co-operate with our State Secretary in the work.

5. That all our Sunday schools be requested to make one offering during the year for our Baptist Sunday school work.

#### CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This Association shall be known and denominated as the Eastern Association.

Art. 2. The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's kingdom among men, and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.

Art. 3. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers who are members or Pastors of churches of this body, and three delegates from each church, chosen from the membership assembled in Conference.

Art. 4. The delegates from each Church shall bear a letter certifying their appointment and communicating information relative to the state of the Church; Provided, however, that when any Church has prepared a letter, and through inadvertance the letter fails to be presented, her delegates may be received without its presentation.

Art. 5. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen annually from among its members by ballot, by a majority of its members voting and continue in office until their successors are elected.

Art. 6. It shall be the business of the Moderator to enforce an observance of the Constitution, preserve order, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion on all questions under discussion after others have spoken, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

Art. 7. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record the proceedings of each annual session and superintend their printing and distribution among the churches

Art. 8. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches, or collected during the Session of this body and distribute the same as ordered by the Association. He shall also make to the Association an annual report of the condition of the treasury.

Art. 9. The Association shall appoint an Executive Committee of five members, who shall co-operate with the State Board so far as practicable in the mission work within our bounds, and during the interval between the sessions of this body, take such steps as they may deem advisable for the advancement of the same, making annual reports of their work to the Association, which report, together with that on State Missions, shall be the first business of the Second Day of the Session. Further, that our Missionaries shall report their work quarterly to the Executive Committee in order that said committee shall be prepared to make full report of their work to this body.

Art. 10. The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of the churches which neglect to observe gospel order.

Art. 11. The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats and extend to them the privileges of the body except that of voting.

Art. 12. The Annual Session of this Association shall commence on Tuesday after the first Lord's day in October, at such place as may be chosen. Art. 13. By appointment of the Association there shall be an Introductory

Sermon of a denominational character.

Art. 14. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

#### RULES OF ORDER.

1. At the meeting of the Association the Moderator of the preceding session shall preside until his successor is known. In case of his absence a chairman pro-tem shall be elected

2. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious evergises

to be opened by whomsoever the presiding officer may name

3. At each daily session, and previous to proceeding to business, the names of the delegates shall be called and the proceedings of the previous daily Sessions read.

4. The members shall observe toward the officers and each other that courtesy which belongs to Christians

5. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the presiding officer; he shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration and avoid personalities

6. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without permission.

7. All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer before discussion

8. No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion.

9. When a question is under discussion no motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they are stated.

10. After a motion has been decided, any member having voted in the

majority may move a reconsideration

11. No member shall absent himself during the session of the Association without permission of the presiding officer, and no one shall take final leave of absence without permission of Association, and if any shall do so their absence shall be noted in the minutes.

12. All questions except such as relate to the Constitution shall be decided by a majority of votes.

13. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted to consideration.

14. The Rules of Order may be altered or amended at any session of the Association by a majority vote.
