Accreditation

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is accredited by the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada and is a candidate for accreditation by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Registration

First Term — Monday, June 6, 1977. Classes will meet four days each week, Tuesday through Friday, beginning Tuesday, June 7. Two courses may be taken. Four semester hours credit may be earned in four weeks. Matriculation closes June 8 and schedule changing closes June 10, 4:00 p.m.

Second Term — Monday, July 4, 1977. Classes will meet four days each week, Tuesday through Friday, beginning Tuesday, July 5. Two courses may be taken. Four semester hours credit may be earned in four weeks. Matriculation closes July 6 and schedule changing closes July 8, 4:00 p.m.

Costs

Fees, \$35.00 per term. Rooms, \$25.00 per term. Meals, approximately \$5.00 per day, may be secured in the cafeteria. The cost of books and supplies varies, depending upon the courses taken.

Facilities

Air-conditioned library and classrooms. Modern dormitory facilities are available for men and women. Married couples should write the Business Office concerning housing accommodations for the summer session.

Recreation

The town of Wake Forest operates a modern swimming pool. A nine-hole golf course within walking distance of the campus is available for a modest fee. The seminary gymnasium will be open. Tennis courts are also available.

Curriculum

A course in biblical Hebrew (B 115s-B 116s), designed for beginners in Hebrew will meet three hours each day throughout the two terms and will enable the student to earn six semester hours in Hebrew.

The student who does not take the course in Hebrew may enroll only in two courses and earn four semester hours each term.

The student who elects to take M 366s the second term may earn six semester hours. Classes for this course will begin on July 4 and end on July 29. The course will be taught in Washington, D.C.

In order to maintain a reasonable student-teacher ratio, the seminary reserves the right to control the size of classes offered in the summer sessions.

In addition to on-campus offerings during June and July terms, special off-campus learning opportunities are available.

H 319s Practicum in Home Missions

Mr. Braswell

A combination of academic study and field missionary experience conducted in selected settings under approved supervision, in cooperation with the Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. A twelve weeks summer practicum open to middlers, seniors, and graduate students. May 18-July 29. 8 semester hours. (Enrollment closed.)

BHTM 410s Colloquium in Ministry

Mr. Harris, Mr. Costello

An interdisciplinary investigation of the theological bases, symbols, and essential objectives of Christian ministry in the context of the practice of ministry. Open only to D. Min. students. 4 semester hours. 8:00-10:00. 10:50-12:50. Tuesday-Friday.

B 115s Biblical Hebrew

Mr. Scoggin

An introduction to the fundamentals of classical Hebrew with primary emphasis on the strong verb and basic vocabulary. 3 semester hours 8:00-10:00, 10:50-11:50 Tuesday-Friday.

B 244s Hebrews

Mr. Spencer

A critical interpretation of the book of Hebrews based on the English text. 2 semester hours 8:00-10:00 Tuesday-Friday.

H 310s Liberalism and Fundamentalism 1870-1920

Mr. Miller

The course examines the intense conflict in American Protestantism between the advocates of liberal ideas and their conservative counterparts. 2 semester hours 8:00-10:00 Tuesday-Friday.

T 204s Doctrine of the Church

Mr. Steely

The nature and function of the church as begun in the first century and developed in history. 2 semester hours. 10:50-12:50. Tuesday-Friday.

M 245s Christian Education with the High School Student

Mr. Poerschke

A study of the basic needs and problems of the high school student, with special attention to religious development. 2 semester hours. 10:50-12:50. Tuesday-Friday.

M 209s Post-Reformation Preaching

Mr. Carlton

A study of the life, message and method of outstanding Christian preachers in the European tradition from the Reformation to the present. 2 semester hours. 1:00-3:00. Tuesday-Friday.

M 381s Crisis Ministry in Pastoral Care

Mr. Cumbee

An intensive study of the pastoral care of persons experiencing marital conflict, mental illness, alcoholism, bereavement, divorce, aging, mental retardation, etc. 2 semester hours. 1:00-3:00. Tuesday-Friday.

B 244As Hebrews

Mr. Spencer

A critical interpretation of the book of Hebrews based on the English text. 2 semester hours. 1:00-3:00. Tuesday-Friday.

M 134As Evangelism

Mr. Crumpler, Mr. Miles

Studies in biblical, historical, and practical concepts of evangelism with special emphasis on personal and perennial evangelism in the church. 2 semester hours. 10:50-12:50. Tuesday-Friday.

SECOND TERM: July 4-July 29, 1977

B 116s Biblical Hebrew

Mr. Scoggin

A continuation of B 115s with emphasis on the weak verbs and readings from biblical text. 3 semester hours. 8:00-10:00, 11:00-12:00 Tuesday-Friday.

B 343s Pastoral Epistles

Mr. Allen

An exegetical and theological interpretation of the Pastoral Epistles. The English text is used. 2 semester hours. 10:50-12:50. Tuesday-Friday.

B 313s Old Testament Theology

Mr. Rogers

An examination of the Old Testament as to its theological content with special attention to its scope and unity. 2 semester hours (July 4-15 only) 1:00-5:00 Tuesday-Friday.

T 307s Contemporary American Theology

Mr. Johnson

A study of representative examples of recent and contemporary American theological literature. 2 semester hours. 10:50-12:50. Tuesday-Friday.

M 256s Introduction to Church Music

Ms. Humble

A survey course covering the use of music in worship, Christian hymnody, and church music administration, designed primarily for students interested in the pastoral ministry. 2 semester hours. 8:00-10:00. Tuesday-Friday.

M 337s Present Issues in Christian Education

Mr. Poerschke

A review and appraisal of some contemporary issues in Christian education in the world today, including theological, behavioral, denominational and cultural factors. 2 semester hours. 8:00-10:00. Tuesday-Friday.

M 384s Current Issues in Psychology and Religion

Mr. Thornton

Transpersonal Psychology and Spiritual Life. Classical understanding of prayer and other spiritual disciplines are examined in the light of contemporary transpersonal psychology. 2 semester hours. (July 19-29 only) 1:00-5:00 Tuesday-Friday.

M 366s Seminar on Urban Studies

Mr. Bland, Mr. Neely

A study of structures and problems of the secular city, including an evaluation of efforts toward renewal of the churches. This course will be taught in Washington, D.C. from July 4-29. Application for this course must be made no later than June 1 on a special form available from the Registrar. 6 semester hours. 8:30-1:00. Monday-Friday.
