EIGHTY-THIRD ANNUAL SESSION

Proceedings of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association Eighty-third Annual Session.

Greens Creek, N. C., August 15th, 1912.

The Tuckaseigee Baptist Association met in its eightythird annual session with Savannah Baptist Church, August 15th, 1912.

The introductory sermon was preached by Rev. J. M. Bennett, at 11 o'clock; his text being Ephesians IV:1.

Adjourned until 2 P. M.

AFTERNOON SESSION

Re-convened at 2 o'clock. Song by the body. Devotional exercises conducted by Rev. A. W. Davis; prayer by Rev. R. L. Cook.

Rev. J. M. Bennett was elected Moderator pro tem., J. C. Ingram was elected Clerk pro tem.

The roll of churches was called and the following reported: Hamburg, Cullowhee, New Savannah, Balsam,

Savannah, Ochre Hill, John's Creek, Sylva, Buff Creek, Webster, and Zion Hill.

The following reading clerks were appointed by the Moderator: R. L. Cook and R. N. Deitz.

Moved by R. L. Cook that the rules be suspended and election of officers be by acclamation.

Motion carried and Rev. A. W. Davis was elected Moderator and H. G. Mashburn, Clerk.

The report on Orphanage was read for the committee by Bro. Archibald Johnson, after which he made a most able and touching address on this Institution and the great work they are doing. The subject of Orphanage being further discussed by A. C. Bryson.

The report was adopted as follows:

Orphanage Report

"Twenty-seven years ago the Orphanage at Thomasville was established, and more than 1200 children have been committed to its care.

"There are now about 375 present, though the number will be increased to more than 400 this fall. The new west Chowan building being just completed.

"A great gift came to the Orphanage within the year.
Mr. and Mrs. W. L. Kennedy, of Lenoir County, made a
deed to the institution of 1200 acres of land to be used for
its benefit.

"The board of trustees accepted the gift and hope to begin erection of buildings on it this fall.

"The health of the children has been excellent. Not a single case of serious illness having occurred.

"The Supreme need at present is an increase in the current funds. The year ending July 1st shows a deficit of several thousand dollars. It requires about \$100.00 a year to support a child. This means that \$40,000.00 must be received by the Treasurer in order that we may pay the current bills of the year.

"We would urge all the churches to take a Thanksgiving collection, and every Sunday School to make a monthly offering to the Orphanage.

The report on State Missions was read for the Committee by Bro. Livington Johnson, who spoke on the subject in a most able and feeling manner.

The report adopted is as follows:

State Missions

Herewith are presented a few facts and figures about our state Mission work:

THE WORK OF LAST YEAR. - There were 152 missionaries, who preached at 351 points. They reported 1,921 baptisms and 1,427 received by letter, making total additions 3,348. Ten churches were organized, fifty church buildings were in course of construction and fourteen completed. These churches contributed as follows: To pastor's salary \$25,432.05, church building \$32,510.51, objects of the Convention \$11,021.96, other objects \$5,011.42, grand total \$73,975.74. The mission churches put back into the denominational treasury last year \$27,444.93 more than we put into State Missions.

THIS YEAR'S WORK. - We are operating on a basis of \$50,000. This does not include \$2,500 for Sunday School work. We have this year 153 missionaries. Several of the mission points that were aided last year came off the Board and we have opened up new fields.

CHURCH BUILDING FUND. - Three years ago \$5,000.00 of the amount contributed by the Woman's Missionary Societies was set aside as a church building fund, and each year since this amount has been appropriated to church building. During this time fifteen or

twenty churches have been aided, and at least \$40,000.00 added to the value of our denominational wealth in church property. The money spent in church building is one of the wisest investments the Board has ever made. A much larger sum could profitably be used in this way, if it were placed at the disposal of the Board.

THE WORK OF DEVELOPMENT. - Our Board has made a proposition to the Home Mission Board looking to a joint work to be conducted by the two Boards for the development of our churches along the line of benevolence. Two or three district missionaries are to be employed to aid the pastors in associational campaigns, by holding institutes and mission rallies at churches. The Home Board has agreed to enter into this co-operative work on a small scale, as an experiment.

COUNTRY FIELDS. - The formation of our country churches into compact fields would be a distinct advantage; indeed this is one of our greatest needs. We believe the Mission Board could aid in this direction, by making an appropriation to a field on condition that the churches would co-operate in an effort to secure the services of an aggressive pastor and have him locate in their midst.

The rapid material development of our State makes it the more imperative that we prosecute State Missions with renewed vigor, as our religious progress depends largely upon the successful prosecution of our State Mission work.

Report on Home Missions read for the Committee by Dr. A. E. Brown.

After the reading the subject was first discussed by

Rev. P. T. McFee; then more fully and very ably discussed by Dr. A. E. Brown. The report adopted was as follows:

Home Mission Report

The Home Board supplied the Gospel last year to 2368 communities.

The Board employed 1,309 missionaries who lived and preached the Gospel in needy and difficult fields.

They baptized 26,899 happy converts into Mission churches, and added by letter 20,829, making a total of 47.728 additions through its missionary efforts.

There were 683 young people volunteered for the ministery and mission work in meetings held by the missionaries of the Board.

They organized 201 new churches or one for every two days. They aided in building 234 houses of worship.

We had last year 82 workers among the foreigners in our midst, 16 missionaries among the Indians.

The Mountain schools of the Board enrolled last year 4.636 splendid boys and girls.

Southern Baptists gave last year an average of about 15 cents per member for Home missions.

Some things to be done:

There are 20,000,000 people in the South, who make no profession of faith, these we must evangelize.

There are in the South 11,000 Baptist churches, who do not contribute one cent to the objects of benevolence, these must be enlisted.

The Southern Baptist Convention authorized the Board to plan its work on a basis of \$618,000.00, and in addition they are to inaugurate a movement for the securing of \$1,000,000.00 as a permanent church building fund.

What interest should this Association feel in this great work?

This Board has been our friend in that we could not have had our splendid school property at Sylva, had it not been for it. Nor could we maintain the splendid faculty

of Christian teachers, were it not for the annual assistance of the Home Board.

The Report on Periodicals was left off and the subject was discussed by the following brethen: Prof. S. E. Garner, Prof. J. C. Ingram, Revs. P. T. McFee, A. E. Brown, T. F. Deitz and J. M. Bennett. At the will of the body this subject was passed.

The Report on Temperance read for the Committee, read by Rev. T. F. Deitz, after which he gave a short talk on the needs of this country in behalf of temperance. The subject further discussed by Dr. A. E. Brown.

The report adopted was as follows:

Temperance Report

About four years ago an overwhelming majority of the voters of North Carolina drove the saloon out of the State. The prohibition law went into effect, and after this short period of time it has proven worthy of the high sentiment and strenous effort which placed it upon our Statute Books, and we urge every member of the Church and all citizens to stand by our prohibition law for the morality of our young and rising Generation of our country.

We insist that if the citizenship of our country will be bold and prosecute the sellers and drinkers, who violate the laws that much of the present whiskey business can be stopped; but as long as the sober law abiding people will permit it to go unpunished it will continue, and will steadily grow worse; hence we advise that it is the duty of every one that is a friend to prohibition to see to it, so far as is in his power, to surpress the handling and using of intoxicating liquors to the unhappiness of the law abiding people. Let us be men of back-bone and courage to

stand for the right and strive to save this country from the evil one.

Moved and sustained that Bro. T. F. Deitz prepare a resolution to be sent to our Representatives in the United States Congress in behalf of the Prohibition course.

Resolution as Follows:

RESOLVED, That we, the Messengers composing the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association a body composed of twenty-nine churches, with 2500 members, hereby enter our protest against laws that allow the shipping of intoxicating liquors into our State after we have voted by a majority of 44,000 against the manufacture and sale of such liquors.

We, therefore petition our representative in Congress, Hon. J. M. Gudger, to use all his influence for the passage of the Loeb bill, or any other measure covering the same provisions.

We, therefore, request Mr. Gudger to convey our protest, and petition to Senators Overman and Simmons and the other representatives in Congress from North Carolina.

Moved and sustained that the body adjourn till 9:30 o'clock a. m. Saturday.

Prayer of dismission by Rev. M. A. Norman.

THIRD DAY SESSION

Convened at 9:30 a.m. Devotional exercises conducted by Rev. J. M. Bennett. He reading Psalm 84, prayer by Bro. E. L. Middleton.

Moved and sustained that the minutes of the preceding day be adopted.

The following additional churches were represented

by letter: Wilmot, Dick's Creek, East Fork, Savannah and Scots Creek.

Report of Committee on Education read by Bro. J. C. Ingram, and the cause was discussed by him, especially emphasizing the Sylva Collegiate Institute.

The report adopted was as follows:

Some one has said: "Our Christian Schools are our training camps for Missions."

Pull down Wake Forest, Meredith and all our Baptist High Schools and you strike a blow, yea, almost a death blow, to every object for which we stand.

We, therefore, urge the Baptists of this Association and those who are not Baptist to be loyal to Wake Forest, Meredith and Sylva Collegiate Institute.

The report on Foreign Missions was read for the Committee by Rev. J. M. Bennett, after which he spoke of the needs of the missionaries in the foreign field and was also further and very ably discussed by Rev. T. F. Deitz.

The report adopted was as follows:

Foreign Mission Report

The greatest movement on earth to-day is the Kingdom of God operating through the medium of its Christian churches, and the greatest movement in the Kingdom is Foreign Missions.

Our Lord's command is: "Go into all the world and preach my Gospel to every creature." What are we doing to carry out this commission? and give the Gospel to the millions of souls in heathen darkness?

This question should be most carefully considered in the light of God's word.

There is greater evidence of God's blessings upon the Foreign Mission work and greater opportunity; and there-

fore greater responsibility resting upon God's people than ever before in the history of Missions.

The Southern Baptist Convention is making this the Judson centennial year, being 100 years since he entered the foreign field; the object is to raise a large sum of money to further the cause of Foreign Missions.

Our State Convention is asking North Carolina to raise \$50,000.00. Let us see to it that our Association goes forward and contributes more than ever in her past history.

The report on Sunday Schools was read for the committee by Bro. E. L. Middleton, after which he made a most able and interesting address on the Sunday School work.

The report was adopted as follows:

Sunday Schools.

The Sunday School work of the State is hopeful. There seems to be a steady, healthful growth. Since 1905 we have grown from 1,290 schools to 1,858 in 1911—a gain of 568 or 44 per cent in six years.

Since March, 1912, about seventy new schools have been organized. It is probable a few of the old ones have been discontinued.

During the same six years the membership has grown from 104,534 to 174,384—a gain of 69,750 or 67 per cent.

There now seem to be about 125 churches without schools. It seems it is practically impossible to secure schools in some of these.

The Normal Training is exceedingly hopeful. Nearly 2,000 were enrolled in North Carolina during the last Southern Baptist Convention year. Our people had only 686 diplomas May 1, 1911, but May 1, 1912, they hold 1,483 diplomas—a gain of 787 or 116 per cent in one year. This work will be pressed all the time. Our Association ought to emphasize the work during the next year.

Another matter of vital importance is Associational organization. A plan for this has been carefully worked out and tracts on the work will be furnished to all who wish it. These organizations will largely increase the efficiency of the work.

In this Association we ought to plan something definite for next year. We therefore recommend the following:

- 1. That we urge all churches to have a Sunday School and as far as possible keep it open the whole year.
- 2. That such branch or mission schools as shall be needed to reach all the people shall be organized.
- 3. That we urge all church members to give their influence by their presence and co-operation in our Sunday School work.
- 4. That we get such tracts and other literature as shall be necessary to use the best methods and plans in prosecuting our work. These may be secured free of cost from our Secretary, E. L. Middleton, Raleigh, N. C.
- 5. That we give to Sunday School Missions at least one collection each year for the advancement of Baptist Sunday School interests in North Carolina. These collections to be sent to Walters Durham, Raleigh, N. C.
 - 6. That we hold at least one Sunday School Conven-

tion during next year and that this Association appoint a committee of three to plan for this, and to cooperate with the State Sunday School Secretary.

- 7. That we urge all our schools to use adequate supplies of the periodicals published by our Baptist Sunday School Board at Nashville, Tenn.
- 8. That we strive deligently to make our schools great agencies for saving all the unsaved in our communities.
