#### PROCEEDINGS.

CLAYTON, N. C., November 10, 1904.

The second annual session of the Johnston County Baptist Association convened with Clayton Baptist Church this morning with devotional services conducted by Bro. A. A. Pippin who read Psalm 19.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Bro. J. W. Suttle from Jonah 3:1-3. Subject: Personal Responsibility. Prayer by Bro. G. W. Fisher, Pastor Clayton M. E. Church.

The Association was welcomed to Clayton by Pastor Blanchard, after which the body adjourned with benediction by Bro. Suttle.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

The Association opened at 2 o'clock with prayer by Bro. Worley Creech. After the body had been called to order by the Moderator, Bro. R. H. Gower, Bro. C. W. Blanchard made a motion that the reading of the Church letters be dispensed with and that a committee on credentials be appointed for the purpose of enrolling the delegates. #### REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

When we come to think, speak or write of the work of Home Missions of the Southern Baptist Convention we are overwhelmed with the magnitude of the work and the subject. The nation has just passed through a great Presidential election in which no little time, labor and money have been expended "to save our dear country." We do not minimize the value of public office, parties and platforms when we say that we more CONFIDENTLY look to our dear brother, the genial, consecrated B. D. Gray, and the great Baptist hosts with the eternal truth of God as their platform. This kind of work is patriotic, as well as Christian, and ought to appeal to every good citizen.

Some of the Indians are still among us and to them we undoubtedly owe something. The Negroes are very much among us and it is a great problem to decide what to do for them and do it. Foreigners from almost everywhere—nearly one million last year—are coming, bringing all sorts of ideas and religions—coming to be blessed or to be a curse. They must have the civilizing and saving influences of the Gospel. They, with the millions unsaved of our own native population, in the mines, in the mills,

in the mountains, on the frontier, in many of our largest cities, in so many places, must be reached, if reached at all, by our Home Mission work.

Last, but not least, Cuba lies down yonder with outstretched wounded arms; with open, bleeding mouth, crying to us for the bread of life. Will we deny her? She has had internal disorders, but they are rapidly healing now, and Bro. Daniel is pleading earnestly for help to secure lots and erect houses of worship while we can. Will we heed the call? The establishment of one Missionary church means not only a benediction to that locality, but its development means held "unto the uttermost part of the earth" in geometrical progression. If the Home field is neglected the Foreign field suffers too. Independent Baptist churches are dependent "to the ends of the earth."

The last report of Treasurer Dunson to the Convention shows \$136,540.68 as "total receipts," besides the boxes sent by noble women not a few. If you wish to see the wise expenditure and great profits, refer to the minutes of the Southern Baptist Convention. The work is spreading. Will you enlarge?

#### FRIDAY MORNING.

The Association met at 9:30. Devotional exercises were conducted by Bro. B. Townsend. Prayer by Bro. S. F. Conrad.

#### REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

We are glad to report a prosperous year of mission work. We engaged with Bro. J. D. Bowen to move to Four Oaks and preach there and at Oliver's Grove, Trinity, Sardis and Pine Level churches. He preached also at three new mission points. At Spilona School House and Johnson School House he had good congregations and we believe planted seed which will bear good fruit. At Massey's School House he organized a church of twentyone members. He began March 1st and left us November 1st to attend Louisville Seminary.

Bro. A. A. Pippin served as pastor at White Oak and Corinth churches. Several additions were made to each of these churches and he thinks they

will be self-suporting after one more year.

Bro. J. W. Suttle served as pastor at Pisgah, Blackman's Grove and Hood's Grove Churches. Satisfactory progress was made and prospects are

bright for the next year's work.

Bro. R. W. Horrell preached at Wilson's Mills, Thanksgiving, Carter's Chapel, Parish Memorial, Micro, Princeton, Woodard School House, Nobles' Chapel and at Mr. J. T. Revel's, a point near Kenly. Good work has been done at all the points, and new churches were organized at the point near Kenly and at Micro.

New places are asking for preaching and owing to the largeness of the work already started we shall be compelled to secure the services of one more man. This calls for increased contributions and we recommend that the Association raise at least nine hundred dollars for the coming year and ask the State Board for three hundred and fifty dollars additional.

#### REPORT ON STATE MISSIONS.

We greatly rejoice in the fruit our State Mission work has borne. If an our people but knew the wonderful things this work has accomplished, surely they would enthusiastically arise to meet every demand for enlarge-

ment which the present situation requires at our hand.

In 1860 there were but five self-supporting churches in the State. At this same date most of the towns along the railroads running through our State were without a single Baptist church and many of them without any Baptist preaching. Now there is scarcely one of these towns without a Baptist church, and in some of them you will find our very strongest and best churches. But this is only a small part of what has been done. The Messenger of the Cross, sustained by our Board of Missions, has pressed his way into the solitary place and destitute field far away from the centers of activity. The fact is State Missions has been, is, and must ever be the base of supply in all our denominational work. Wake Forest College, the Baptist University for Women, the Bapist Orphanage are the legitimate outcome of State Mission work.

Yet we are safe in saying, at least one-third of the adult population of our State are not Christians. The commission of our Lord makes it binding upon us to give these the Gospel. But this is not all. Heretofore the stream of foreign immigration has gone into the States north and west. But now the tide is turning southward. The vast resources of North Carolina and the rapid development of the same means that she will receive

her full share of the comers. For the sake of these people themselves, for our own sake, for the sake of Christ, we must give them the Gospel.

Again the Home Mission Board is saying to North Carolina, "Enlarge—give us \$12,000." The Foreign Mission Board is saying to North Carolina, "Enlarge—give us \$20,000." To do this we must enlarge our State work. Enlargement at home means enlargement all along the line. It is not a question as to whether we ought to enlarge our State Mission work, or as to wnether we are able to do it, but a question of willingness on our part. The responsibility is upon us. May God help us to meet it.

## REPORT ON THE ORPHANAGE. What the Orphanage Is.

It is a country home for helpless and homeless children. Its plant is worth \$150,000 which includes a bequest of \$100,000 from the late Dennis Simmons: It owns a farm of 300 acres and runs a printing office, a wood shop, and a shoe shop. There are eight families and an additional cottage is in process of erection. A good graded school, a live church and Sunday school supply the mental and moral wants of the children. The cost of maintaining a child is \$5.00 a month and this covers all the necessary expenses of the institution. At this time there is a distressing scourge of typhoid fever at the Orphanage. There have been upwards of 80 cases but only two have died.

#### What the Orphanage Does.

It gives our people a larger faith in God. Who can think of its twenty years of marvellous history and not see the hand of a loving Father gently guiding it through all the way?

It cails out our sympathy and tenderness and develops the noblest qualities of our nature. It has sweetened and toned all our denominational life.

It exhibits the very spirit of Christ and draws us close to Him.

It offers a glorious opportunity to develop our people in the grace of

We are glad that the time has come, when the work of our good women is reported in the minutes of our Associations. The Christian women of the early church were very numerous, and the names of a great many of them are honorably mentioned in the New Testament. Some of them are known simply by their heroic deeds of love and fidelity, which entitle them to an everlasting remembrance wherever the gospel is preached. We cannot forget the "Woman of Samaria," who led the way for "the missionary work among the Samaritans, as the herald of Christ the Messiah; and the woman who touched the hem of nis garment; and the exemplary Christian giver, the widow of the two mites; the Syrophoenician woman; the lamenting women on their way to Calvary, and the prayerful women of the upper chamber in Jerusalem. This incomplete list shows that the Christian woman exerted a powerful influence in the Church of the New Testament, and we have no account that she ever betrayed, denied, or doubted her Lord and Savior.

We would recommend that woman develop all her talents and assert her own individuality in her own gentle way. We appreciate the grand work of woman in the Home and Foreign Missions. We rejoice to see her self-sacrificing love and devotion in the various organizations of church services. Her living personality and influence is specially felt in the religious training of the young. Woman is always the queen of the home. In this little kingdom she reigns supreme; and in this sphere she can rule the world through her powerful influence over the children. Here she can by personal contact with them sow the seed of spiritual truths in their young hearts that will spring up into everlasting life; and the children soon respond to the charming influence of Christian women. If all the women of our churches would concentrate their energies, like Hannah, to train the young at home and in the sanctuary, how many more Samuels and less provigal sons there would be in the world. The Christian women of to-day are specially called of God to sympathize with their less fortunate sisters,

to reclaim the fallen, to strengthen and encourage the weak, to nurse the sick, to clothe the naked, and to bring them all into the kingdom. The best qualification for such service is a woman's heart filled with the love of Christ for the dying world. Let our Christian women employ all their talents, use to the full extent all her opportunities, looking always unto Jesus for strength, encouragement, and inspiration, who will reward each one according to her work.

#### REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Just at this time in our history the subject of Foreign Missions is securing the attention of the world as never before. Several things are conspiring to bring Foreign Missions prominently before the Christian world.

1. God is preparing the world to receive the gospel. The war with Cuba changed the map of the world. While that war was waged primarily to give Cuba its freedom it was very much more far reaching in its results than that. It broke the Iron grasp of Spain, the great standard of Romanism. Whatever may be our opinions about the wisdom of our government's policy in the Philippines, the Christian people must see in it the overruling power of God in opening a door to that dark corner of the earth.

We can but believe that God is guiding affairs in the far Fass for His glory and the advancement of His kingdom. Should Japan be victorious in the struggle with Russia, it will mean a religious freedom in the Orient never before enjoyed. These things mean the opening of doors of opportunity.

2. The churches at home are interested in Foreign Missions as perhaps they have never been before. The contributions are being enlarged, and earnest prayers are being offered for world wide evangelization. Found

men and women are asking to be sent as Missionaries. The last session of the Southern Baptist Convention was made notable by the discussion of Foreign Missions. At the close of the discussion scores of young men expressed a desire to go to the foreign field. A resolution was passed instructing the Board to send out fifty new missionaries this year. Twenty-three have already been sent and others have been approved by the Board. The Board expects to send out the full number by the next meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention.

3. The cause is making gratifying progress in foreign lands. Prejudice is giving way, and the Missionary is receiving a welcome never before accorded him. Our missionaries reported a larger number of conversions last year than in any previous year. Surely God is commanding us in thunder

tones to go forward.

#### REPORT ON EDUCATION.

Civilization is measured by intelligence; progress by improved educational facilities. No man can come into recognition of the possibilities of life who fails to equip himself with the very best mental, moral and physical development. This is an age of progress; it is an age of crises. There are specific demands for the best in man from God, State, and Nation.

Our public school system is a part of our civilization. By means of it only can the whole people be reached and uplifted. We recognize with pride that the recent educational awakening in North Carolina has resulted in a four months term of public school in all the districts, in better school buildings, in increased attendance, in a uniform system of better and cheaper books, and in the establishment of rural libraries. Many country districts have voted special tax to increase the term so that with rural mail deliveries these schools become quite the equal of the city graded schools.

We note with gratitude the growth of the high schools, academies and colleges of the State in all lines of educational life, and especially our denominational schools. The only true education is Christian education. It purifies the social life of the individual and the State. It holds the balances of our fast growing civilization at equipoise by higher spiritual life. With upwards of thirty denominational academies as preparatory and with Wake Forest for the higher training of the young men, and the Female University, and the female colleges, Oxford Female Seminary, Chowan Baptist Female Institute for the higher training of the young women the Baptist cause promises much for the future of North Carolina.

The fifty young men at Wake Forest preparing for the ministry should

be supported willingly and promptly by our denomination.

Your committee recommends the establishment of a denominational academy in Johnston county.

Charity and Children, our great Orphanage paper, ought to be in every

our Convention series, published at Nashville, Tenn.
