TITHING, ITS DOCTRINE AND PRACTICE

By referring to Gen. 14: 17-24 we find that tithing had its origin with Abraham, and that he was the first to tithe. This was paid to Melchisedec, King of Salem, priest of the most high God, and was a tenth of the spoils of battle. See Gen. 28:22. It was encouched in Jacob's vow at Bethel, "If God will be with me in this wayand all that thou shalt give me, I will surely give the tenth unto

Later, Lev. 27:30, it was given to the people as a statutory law. Its application was to the Jew, and under the law dispensation. It is not a New Testament command.

Luke 18:12-It was the proud boast of the Pharisee, "I give tithes of all that I possess." Matt. 23:23, "Woe unto you, scribes and Pharisees hypocrites! for ye pay tithe of mint and anise and cummin, and have omitted the weighter matters of the law, judgment, mercy, and faith: these ought ye to have done, and not to leave the other undone." The Jew that rejects Christ ought to tithe.

Christian giving may be thus summarized. It is a grace, a disposition created by the spirit. 2 Cor. 8:7. Law imposes giving as a divine requirement.

Christian giving is voluntary, and is a test of our sincerity and love. 2 Cor. 2:8-12.

It is a privilege to give according to ability. 2 Cor. 8:1-3; 12-15. The rewards of christian giving are joy, thanksgiving, and an increased ability to give.

The law and the prophets were until John the Baptist; since that time the Kingdom of God is preached. Jesus only, was left as a law giver. The commission given by the Master reads thus-"And Jesus came and spake unto them saying: All power is given unto me in heaven and on earth. Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost, teaching thef to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you and, lo, I am with you always even unto the end of the world." Matt. 28:18-20.

The world is under everlasting obligations to the Baptist for restoring the commission to its rightful place in the economy of gospel activities. It remained for William Carey, a Baptist, to begin the work of modern missions. Until Carey sailed for India, there had not been a foreign missionary for centuries. EVANGELIZATION OF YOUTH

"And God hath set some in the church, first apostles, secondarily prophets, thirdly teachers, after that miracles, then gifts of healing, helps, governments, diversities of tongues." 1 Cor. 12:28.

ORPHANAGE REPORT

The orphanage work rests heavily on the hearts of our people. There are 542 boys and girls growing up into useful manhood and womanhood under its benign influence. Its record is one to command our highest respect and appreciation.

We ought to feel more keenly each year our obligation to the orphaned children crying to us for help and friendship, and as this obligation is more clearly seen and felt, we will the more glady and generously meet it. Futhermore the pressure for admittance from the boys and girls on the outside grows stronger day by day. Hundreds of homeless and utterly helpless children clamor at the doors of the Orphanage every year. To give relief to this vast army of children, we must increase our contributions. The present income barely covers the expense of those there, and therefore gives no possibility for enlargement.

However, there are in the Orphanage many children who might be cared for by their mothers if a little help were given them from their own communities. We would give our hearty endorsement to this agency for help and blessing, and thus make more room in the Orphanage for those with neither father nor mother but who are wholly dependant upon the institution for help.

Your committee would recommend.

1. A service held in every church on Thanksgiving and an offering taken for the orphans.

2. A monthly contribution from every Sunday school in this Association.

3. Other efforts be made to put Charity and Children in the homes of our people.

REPORT ON CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Where there is no vision, the people perish, Prov. 29-18. The Baptist denomination has always stood for general education, and we congratulate the officers of our public schools, who have caught a vision, and have given us such a splendid system of public schools.

But since knowledge is power, and is apt to assert itself in social, civic, and industrial development, the expansion of our public school system calls for more attention on the part of our churches to Christian Education, lest our social development becomes lop-

Unless we have made up our minds that our venerated Chrissided. tian ideals shall be consigned to the scrap-heap of fogyism and be replaced by crasse materialism, and half-baked skepticism, we should cherish as our most valuable possessions our Christian

In the opinion of your committee, they and they alone ,can save the day for the Baptists of this section. Wholesome evangelization

and training for Christian service are alike dependent upon them. To bring and hold in the Baptist fold, where they belong by birth and environment, about ninty per cent, of the white population of western North Carolina, to furnish leadership to the numerous Baptist Churches in this section, such as the young men and young women of to-morrow will reasonably require, is a task well calculated to challenge the highest endeavors of all forward-looking Baptists in this section. To let them drift from us, would be denominational cowardice.

Mountain View Institute, situated almost exactly in the geographical center of Wilkes County, is our most indispensible denominational asset. If we will properly nourish it, it will in the end save the day for us. In the past ten years of its existence, it has given hope and inspiration, and it is just beginning to enter upon the career of usefulness planned for it. It is, and will be maintained as an accredited High school. The plant is worth \$75,000.00, and other substantial improvements will be made in the near future. The present faculty, we have every reason to believe, is exceptionally strong, and consecrated to this work,
