MINISTER'S RELIEF.

The Ministers' Relief Board is located in Durham, N. C. Rev. J. M. Arnette, of Durham is Corresponding Secretary. The object of this Board is to provide for the necessities of ministers who are too old to do active service. Dr. Chas. E. Brewer said "As long as these are men upon the firing line the ambulance corps shall be needed." The need of the board is shown because the salaries of pastors have not increased in proportion to the cost of things they have to buy, because there are larger demands on their income, and because more of them are giving all of their time to the ministry than ever before.

During the past year there were as many as 36 beneficiaries of the Board, among whom was distributed \$3,356.71, which was a little over \$93 for each one. This is doing a part of our duty to these Old Soldiers of the Cross. It is to be hoped that we will do better each year until our full obligations are met along this line.

Resolved that we ask all of our churches to give to this object, and to give a Christmas offering.

During all these years it has sought to be true to its name and mission in earnestly contending for the faith "once delivered to the saints" and giving the information needful in our work as well as unifying the brethren in all sections of our convention, thus bringing about a co-operation that has meant much in the growth of the Kingdom.

It enables us to look upon the field of opportunity and know our duty.

The Biblical Recorder has a peculiar claim upon our people because it is the only paper directly under the control of the Baptist State Convention and answerable to it in all things. We are morally under obligation to support and make it, under God, what it should be in the work of the Master at home and abroad.

Again, this is a reading age, and it behooves us to be on the alert and watchful of what our people read. "Blessed is he that readeth good literature." Our actions are largely the result of the reading we do, and if we read trash it will tell in lack of interest, and in the breeding of crime and lawlessness.

We earnestly ask the pastors in this Association to endeavor to place the Recorder in the homes of our people, for it can never serve the cause as it should until it is more widely read.

EDUCATION.

Education is a process by which an immature human being is made to apprehend and properly to fulfill every relation to his Creator and to all his fellow creatures. Only Christian education, in the truest sense, can accomplish this.

It has always been regarded as essential that the ministers of Christ be trained and equipped for their sacred work. To accomplish this two things are indispensable.

1. Christian people have to operate their own schools. 93 per cent of the ministers of all the protestant churches in this country have been educated in Christian schools. The secular schools furnish only 7 per cent of the ministers.

92 per cent of the home and foreign missionaries are trained in Christian schools and only 8 per cent in all other schools. To close our Christian schools would mean ultimately to close our churches and give up our home and foreign missions for lack of ministers.

2. We must plan to render some financial assistance of the young men called of God to preach the Gospel. He calls the poor in this world's goods, but rich in faith, into this glorious work. Those who assist these God called men in their preparation for work will share in the fruits and rewards of the work.

But our Christian Schools must train most of the laymen who, as teachers and Christian business and professional men, stand by and support the preachers. The ministers can be successful only when supported and seconded by such laymen.

Report on Ministerial Education.

HOME MISSIONS

Home Missions is the organized effort to make our country in truth God's country. Our Home Mission Board

is the agency through which Southern Baptists co-operate in the effort to evangelize and train our entire people. Our Home Board undertakes to lend a helping hand whenever needed. It helps in building churches; where its help is needed in the building and maintaining schools; in special evangelistic work where this help is most needed. We are helping in the work among the negroes, indians, foreigners, in Cuba and along the Panama Canal.

In this work we have employed, during the past year 15 men and women for whole or part of the time. For the maintainance of this work we paid last year \$387,508.72 or an average of \$245.04 for each worker. As a result of this work we have received into our churches, by baptism, 38,310, otherwise 25,660, with a total of 63,970 additions to our churches or an average of 41 members for each worker. The opportunities for work of this kind are limited only by the funds available for the support of this work. Let each of us share as largely as possible in this work by our gifts, prayers and efforts.

The last year was the most successful we have ever had on our foreign fields. During that one year 5252 converts from heathenism were baptized. This is nearly twice as many as the whole membership of all our churches on all our foreign fields in 1893 but in spite of this great blessing on our work abroad a large debt embarrassed our board. Shall we clear off this debt and say to our board: "Go forward with this glorious work," or shall we say to them call the Missionaries and let the work die."

Our prayers and contributions will answer the question.

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

The thirtieth annual report of the Baptist Orphanage submitted for the year ending June 15, 1915, contains the following paragraph:

"We have never had a more competent set of workers. For the first time in our history we have had suitable school rooms. The school has never done better work. Several of our teachers attended Columbia University last summer for a few weeks. The addition to the tenth grade has given tone and strength to the work. Some of the grades have added school gardens, which promises to be both helpful and interesting."

The permanent improvement; for the year, including the Dr. Little Memorial Auditorium, amount to at least \$90,000. Furthermore, the work of the institution was enlarged by the opening of the Kennedy Memorial Home.

Seven grades in the school then, ten grades now.

The splendid management of the institution should commend itself to the Baptists of the State. Here is a partial list of profits made, from Charity and Children, the organ of the institution, which has a circulation of 18,000, a net profit of \$5,522 was realized during the year ending June 15 1915. From the farm a profit of \$1,160 was realized; from the dairy, \$2,250; from the shoe shop \$2,153. The cost to the Baptists of the State for the maintaining for the year an average of 464 children is estimated at \$9.44 per capits.

In order to maintain this splendid institution at its present high standard and to enable it to grow in accordance with the pressing needs the churches and Sunday schools must contribute regularly to its support. With this end in view we make the following recommendations:

First, That one Sunday in each month be set apart by every Sunday School in this Association, on which to make a contribution to the Orphanage.

Second, That the churches make a special contribution to the Orphanage on or near Thanksgiving day.

Finally, we commend Charity and Children, the organ of the Orphanage, to the Baptist homes.

STATE MISSIONS

This has been a good year for our Missionaries. A large ingathering has marked the year so far and many new churches have been organized. But the churches have not responded to the call for funds to sustain this great work. We are facing a big debt. Every year we face this same danger, but at this time our debt is more threatening than ever.

Retrenchment in our State Mission work, at this time, would be disastrous indeed.

Our State Mission work for all the years have been the heart and core of our church work. The Baptist have been successful through the past half century for their intelligent and vigorous prosecution of our State Mission work, and for this very reason we are in the forefront among the donations of the State, with one sixth of the population in the whole State and one fourth in Western North Carolina belonging to a Baptist church. Its Missionaries have baptized 75000 people and planted churches in destitute sections that are now great and powerful bodies, and it has caused the religious complexion of many communities. It

is the greatest single organization for the evangelization of the people to be found in the State. Shall we then, in the full of the favor and blessing of God upon our State Mission work, take a step backward? This is the issue that confronts us. We must pay our missionaries or we must discharge them. They must have their meager salaries or they must leave the service of the board.

We urge our pastors to preach a stirring sermon on State Missions at once, and make every member canvass for this object and enlist every church in a heroic effort to set the board free and let it go on in its glorious work.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

The Sunday School work is steadily advancing. More efficient management and sound pedagogical teaching are being put into the work than ever before. Indeed our people are beginning to realize more than ever before the importance and necessity of trained teachers for the Sunday School work. However, there are yet many improvements in this department of our work, which are desirable. To this end, we recommend the following:

- 1 That we urge the institution of a Sunday School in every church in the bounds of our Association.
2. That we most earnestly recommend that each school be kept open the full year.

3. That we request each and every Sunday School to use the literature of our Sunday School Board at Nashville, Tenn.

4. That we co-operate with Secretary Middleton in his efforts to put the work on the highest possible basis.

5. That, finally we urge that only Christians be chosen as teachers in the Sunday Schools.
