ELLIS WING HOLLON



Ellis Hollon, 46, was Professor of Philosophy of Religion at Southeastern Seminary at the time of his death on April 8, 1979. He was a native of Little Rock, Arkansas, and a graduate of Ouachita University. He also held the B.D. and Th.M. degrees from Southeastern Seminary, the M.A. degree from Duke University and the Ph.D. degree from Emory University.

During his undergraduate studies, Ellis was a student pastor of churches in

Arkansas. While studying at Southeastern, he was pastor of the Rock Spring and Bethlehem Baptist Churches in Franklin County, N.C. From 1962 through 1967 he taught at Georgia State College, Mobile College, and Middle Tennessee State University. He came to Southeastern in 1967 as Associate Professor of Philosophy of Religion and was appointed to full professor in 1972.

Professor Hollon died during the spring semester, 1979, in an accident on U.S. 1 south of Wake Forest. He is survived by his wife, Gurtha DePriest Hollon, a daughter, Faye Ellen, 14, and his mother, Mrs. Grace Hall, DeValls Bluff, Arkansas. He was a member of the Wake Forest Baptist Church.

CHARLES WAYNE PURDUE



Wayne Purdue, rising Middler at Southeastern Seminary, was born August 12, 1953 in Atlanta, Georgia, to the late Orren L. and Mrs. Betty Jo Purdue. He was a graduate of Weaver Airline Personnel School in Kansas City, Missouri, and was awarded the A.B. degree by Mercer University, Macon, Georgia.

Wayne was a member of Eastland Heights Baptist Church, Marietta, Georgia, which church ordained him to the

gospel ministry on March 17, 1974. He was interested in the welfare of teen-age boys, and was preparing for a ministry in counseling. He died on June 19, 1979 while serving a summer internship at Piankatank Royal Ambassador Camp in Hartfield, Virginia. Death was caused by asphyxiation after suffering an apparent seizure in his sleep.
