HOME MISSIONS

The work of our Home Board is confined mostly to the Southern States, Cuba, Isle of Pines, and the Canal Zone in Panama.

Its work is carried on under three different departments, viz:

- 1st. The giving of the gospel to those that have it not.
- 2nd. Aiding weak and isolated communities in building houses of worship.
- 3rd. Educating our people that we may have a stronger and more efficient membership, both of ministers and laity.

The Southern Baptist Convention has called for \$400,000 (four hundred thousand dollars) for this work for the present year, ending May 1912, and has asked North Carolina to raise \$25,000 as her part of the work.

Brethren, let us rally to the support of the Board and thereby hold our country against Catholicism and the various isms that are crowding our shores, and save our dear Southland for Christ.

PASTORAL SUPPORT

One of the most sacred duties of any church is the unstinted support of its pastor. The pastors of the churches of this Association, outside of Wadesboro, receive an average of less than \$500 per year, which means that the average amount paid by these churches for pastoral support is about \$100 per year. When the cost of living was half what it is today, these churches were paying about the same amount they pay today and this fact would indicate that they are not keeping abreast of the times. If the average church member paid the small sum of fifteen cents per month for the support of his pastor, the amount the country pastors are receiving would be almost doubled, and yet they would receive less than their rural letter carrier, and surely his work is not less important.

In addition to receiving sufficient support from the church he serves, a pastor should receive one-twelfth of this amount each month of the year. It is the only dignified method of doing business and is only paying him as his money is due. If this course was followed the pastor might often be saved the embarrassment of appearing to a disadvantage before the world about him, which expects that he shall take his place in the community as a dignified citizen. When, through no fault of his, he is unable to meet his obligations, his influence and, consequently, his usefulness is lessened. The church which gives prompt and sufficient support to its pastor can usually be depended upon to give him also its moral support, and will be a power in its community. Until it does this much, its usefulness, if indeed it has any, will be discounted by the world and its lack of influence will be easily understood.

I. F. Thomas read report on Temperance.

TEMPERANCE REPORT

We are happy to report that temperance is on the increase in our prohibition State from the following statistics. We find that in dry States there is one and one-third gallons of whiskey shipped in per capita, while on the other hand we find there is over eighteen gallons per capita consumed in liquor saloon States. In the light of these statistics we should not cease to teach temperance in our homes, in our churches, in the school-room, on the platform, through the press.

The liquor forces neither slumber nor sleep except they have done mischief. Let us stand for law enforcement and not allow our law to be violated nor despised; and in all this fight against wrong we must not forget the up-look to the God of battles, who will help us as we watch and work and wait for the final overthrow of the drink traffic and the dawning of that day of universal righteousness whose sun shall never set.

The following resolution was read by Rev. R. D. Redfearn and adopted:

RESOLUTION

Whereas, under Federal regulations inter-state shipments of intoxicating liquors are delivered to the consignee before the State can have jurisdiction of the same, and

Whereas, by this arrangement the State is seriously hampered in carrying out its policies relative to the traffic of intoxicating liquors, and

Whereas, we believe the State should have full control under its police powers over all liquors within its borders, whether domestic or inter-state, therefore

Be it resolved, That we hereby declare ourselves in favor of such action by the Congress of the United States, as will guarantee to the States the fullest jurisdiction over all intoxicants consigned to them from the time they enter the State, and to this end, we request the members of Congress, both in the Senate and House, from this State, to support such legislation as is contemplated by the Curtis-Shepperd bill (S. 1523 and H. R. 13242) now pending in Congress.

The following is last year's report on Ministerial Education:

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION

With the onward march and progress of the country at large and the upward move in the churches it seems that it becomes more needful for an educated ministry and we find a great majority of those wishing to enter the Lord's work are poor men who need help and which must be given by the Baptist denomination.

We recommend that each church take a collection for this object sometime during the Associational year.

REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS

It has been very truthfully said the Sunday School is the church at work—carrying out God's command—teaching all nations. The word Teach occurs more times in the Bible than the word Preach. We would recommend therefore that every church in our Association see to it that they have a good school for 12 months in every year.

2. As its from these schools we receive at least 75 per cent of our recruits, and ordinarily its from these taught and enlightened in the word of God, we must depend for the support of our churches, and the sending of the gospel to the ends of the earth.

FOREIGN MISSIONS

The Foreign Mission Board is in the glorious work of world evangelization. It is appointed by Southern Baptists for this stupendous task. Splendid opportunities are before us. China, with 440,000,000 of people, is passing through a marvelous transformation. Now is the time to give these millions the gospel. Japan is leading the Orient. Shall we lead Japan to Christ? Mohammedanism threatens to submerge Africa. Shall we turn back the tide by the power of the gospel? South America, Mexico and Italy are sick and tired of Romanism; they are ready to receive the message which we have to give. Vast open doors, which we have not yet been able to enter, lie before us.

We have sent out 273 missionaries—thirty of them sent out last year—and they have gathered around them 531 native helpers, and are training hundreds of others. The Missionaries reported 3,618 baptisms last year, and will soon report tens of thousands of converts each year, if the present rapid growth continues. There are seven Woman's Training Schools with 140 students and nine Theological Training Schools with 212 students. There are fifteen medical missionaries treating many thousands of patients and opening the way to the hearts and homes of millions of people. We have seven hospitals and twelve dispensaries in which the missionaries assisted by five missionary nurses and many native helpers treated 40,716 patients. The printing plants are sending out the Bible and millions of pages of religious literature in the languages of the people.

The work has grown so rapidly that it cost last year far more than our people were willing to give. If we meet the actual necessities of the missions now, we must greatly enlarge our offerings. The total receipts for last year were \$510,008.97, a small gain over the year before. An accumulated debt of \$89,600 now rests upon the work. This should be paid off this year. To do so and maintain the work as it now is, will require at least \$600,000. Will the churches give it? It is a condition that calls for greatly enlarged giving but it is absolutely imperative unless our people are willing to let this great cause suffer. Let us raise this amount and even more that we may make an advance in the work.

We recommend: 1. That all our people help; by sympathy and prayer; by subscribing for and reading the Foreign Mission Journal; by distributing tracts which can be had for the asking; by self-denying sacrifice by all, and by liberal gifts from the wealthy; by sending in

their gifts now and not waiting for the season of pressure in March and April. 2. That we solemnly pledge ourselves to do all in our power to raise the amount of \$400.00, which has been asked of our Association this year.

The following report on State Missions was submitted by Rev. J. A. Summey :

STATE MISSIONS

The State Mission Board is operating this year on a basis of \$50,000, which is an advance of \$8,000 over last year. This amount was fixed by the Convention and not by the Board.

The conditions in North Carolina certainly justify this advancement. Our State is making marvelous progress industrially and educationally. Within the last ten years we have doubled our work in North Carolina. The State was never so prosperous as now. We have also made fine progress educationally. Our public schools are being better supported and patronized, and our colleges are better equipped and more largely attended than ever before.

But when it comes to our religious progress, we are forced to confess that the showing is far from gratifying. The figures show that our religious growth as a State is not keeping pace with our material development.

Through the work of State Missions, largely, our religious condition must be improved. In this strategic hour we must vigorously prosecute our State Mission work.

REPORT ON ORPHANAGE.

The Thomasville Orphanage had its beginning a little more than 26 years ago. This magnificent institution did not have its inception in the brain of any one man, as the cause had made its appeal to differ-

ent members of the denomination. There are a few men whose names are closest to the early struggles of the Orphanage and these are conspicuous in the Baptist history of our State. Though its beginning was attended with discouragement and disappointment, these passing years have been fraught with great blessings, for the Orphanage and its equipment have been wonderful. This tremendous growth in enrollment and equipment is the combined product of the friends of the Orphanage, and was made possible by their gifts, large and small. The great Baptist host of N. C. have heard the Macedonian call from the fatherless and helpless, and they are responding with their prayers and substance. No institution made possible and nourished by our gifts and munificence is quite so close to our hearts. The little boys and girls with their pennies and nickels become stockholders and only eternity can reveal what their dividends shall be. The work of the Orphanage is manifest. Talent that otherwise might go to waste and be used as a destructive agency in the Commonwealth is being developed. Children with no other opportunities are cared for at the Orphanage and become to be some of our most useful men and women. The Orphanage makes its own appeal. It is the pride of our denomination. It might well be termed the savings department of the church. Let this Association re-affirm its devotion to the noble work that is being done at Thomasville and in this convention pledge to the work our continual support.

REPORT ON BIBLICAL RECORDER.

We are in the midst of a busy, money-making age. Many men are risking their lives to reach out and grasp a fortune, but some are content to use the time-honored printing press as a means of their fortune-making. Today we have books by the millions, periodicals by the thousands, and a vast majority of these are being printed and thrust into the millions of homes without the slightest regard for morals or

evil influences, but wholly for the purposes of a money-making business. This class of literature may not have influenced your life, but let us remember that it is reaching and influencing that class of people that it is our duty to reach with the gospel.

A vast amount of this literature is antagonistic to Christianity. It is serving purposes of a missionary for the infidel, skeptic and catholicism. These characters you would not let come into your home, but when they have printed their doctrines in cheap newspapers you receive it in your home. We should beware of bad literature and cry aloud and spare not on this point.

There are over two hundred thousand Baptist in North Carolina and the Biblical Recorder should go in every home represented by this host. Then, no longer could it be said that our German Baptist brethren are more loyal to their denominational paper than we are.

The Biblical Recorder has stood the test. It has made good. For 77 years it has been edited by Godly, devoted men. During this time it has championed the cause of righteousness. It has been the faithful messenger of truth. It has been a strong power in unifying and strengthening the Baptist cause from the mountains to the sea. It has brought the brotherhood in touch with each other as nothing else could have done. It is the pastor's helper and the layman's instructor.
