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BRUCE B. ALEXANDER 1941-1977

On August 10, 1977 Bruce B. Alexander was buried in the Rock Hill Baptist Chruch Cemetery in South Carolina with many chapters of his life, as man sees them, unwritten. He died too young in the minds of those whom he left behind. However, in the Chapters of Life that he did write, he left an influence that will live on and on. He wrote little, spoke often and counseled untold numbers of men, women and children and stood as a symbol of moral and spiritual strength. His life represents a combination of reverence, frugality and toil. He belongs to the procession of hard working and God-loving servants of God. Bruce Alexander wrote his own funeral services in the kind of life he lived enthusiastically searching, sharing and caring. Although he is gone he is still with us. His interest and enthusiasm for the work in the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association and for the congregations in the churches he pastored will provide a foundation for those who follow. He loved people and had much concern for their welfare whether or not they were members of his "church flock."

Now in an effort to honor and to pay tribute to him to whom God has said: "Well Done," we dedicate these, the 1977 Annual Minutes of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. God loved him and we loved him, too.

Constitution

(Revisions: August 16, 1957: August 14, 1975)

ARTICLE I

The Name of this body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.

ARTICLE II

The purpose of the Association shall be the extension of

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Christ's kingdom on earth, creation and promotion of harmony, intelligence and spiritual power of the churches.

ARTICLE III

The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.
 It shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organizations, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline.
 The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right to the local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV

(1) The Association shall be composed of ministers and messengers selected by missionary Baptist churches which have been previously received into the association. (2) The pastor and four members from each one hundred members or fraction thereof shall compose the representation of each church. (3) The Association shall be the sole judge of its members: (4) Any church applying to the Association for membership by letter and messenger shall come under the watchcare of the Association for one year for observation. It is suggested that any church under watchcare shall make regular financial contributions for missions to the Association as an act of good faith, and that such financial contributions for missions shall continue after the church has been received into the fellowship of the Association. At the expiration of that time, if it is still the will of the church, it may be voted in by majority vote of the Association, provided they have an acceptable letter and at least one messenger present at the time.

ARTICLE V

(1) The Association shall hold its regular session on Thursday and Friday preceding the 3rd Sunday in August. (2) The Association year begins on July 1 and continues through June 30 of the proceeding year. The Associational reports and church letters will be within this period. (3) The Moderator may call a mid-year session at his pleasure. (4) The Association Budget approved in each Annual Meeting will begin October the first of that year and expire September thirty of the following year.

ARTICLE VI

(a) The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Director of Evangelism, Director of Deacons, Brotherhood Director, Director of Education, and a Parliamentarian, and such other officers as the Association may desire to elect.

(b) The term of office for the general officers of the Association shall not exceed two years in succession, with the exception of the Clerk and Treasurer of the Association, who may be re-elected to succeed themselves in office at the pleasure of the Association. The term of office for all members of committees of the Association shall be for not more than two years. No committee member may succeed himself until at least one year has elapsed after his official term has expired. No member of the Association may be permitted to hold membership in more than one committee during one year, except in the case of the members of the Executive Committee.

(c) The term general officers shall apply to the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk and Treasurer.

ARTICLE VII

(a) The Moderator shall preside and maintain the order of business of all meetings unless he otherwise provides for the Vice Moderator. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association.

(b) He shall appoint the committee on committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the committee on committees in its regular report.

(c) The Vice Moderator shall assist the Moderator and in case of absence or incapacitation of the Moderator, he shall act in his stead until another Moderator is elected.

(d) The Clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; he shall prepare a book of reports to be distributed to messengers and pastors at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and he shall cause to be printed a minute concerning the records made.

(e) The Clerk shall mail to the Clerk of each church in the Association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the state convention office.

(f) The Treasurer shall receive and disburse by the order of the Executive Committee or the Association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report to the Association at each session.

(g) It shall be the duty of the Historian to keep the records of the Association up to date.

(h) The Director of Missions shall be sought and recommended by the Executive Committee in a manner of its own choosing. Within 30 days after locating such a person the Executive Committee shall present the name of the Director nominee to a called meeting of the Association. If the Annual meeting of the Association is scheduled within 60 days, the presentation shall wait until that time.

His call shall be indefinite. His salary, allowances, etc., shall be as provided by the current budget or adjustments recommended in consultation with the Finance Committee.

Two-week vacation may be taken at his discretion.

Concerning termination of employment, his resignations shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least thirty days before it is to take effect. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving thirty days notice in advance. The Missions Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the Director of Missions in planning, promoting and financing his work.

The Director of Missions shall work closely with the Associational Committees and Associational Officers in such a way as to help each group determine its opportunities, and objectives based on the need in the churches and procedures, and means of fulfilling these.

Therefore, he shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association. It shall be his duty to administer the policies and instructions of the Executive Committee. He shall communicate with the State and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

ARTICLE VIII

All officers shall be elected annually at the discretion of the body. All officers and committee members will hold office until the next annual Association meeting.

ARTICLE IX

The business of the Association shall be conducted according to Roberts Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE X

The Executive Committee shall be composed of the Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Treasurer, Historian, Director of Sunday School, Director of Evangelism, Director of Deacons, Director of Brotherhood, Director of Education, Director of Missions, Parliamentarian and the pastor and one member from each church in the Association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational officer, shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE XI

It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the Association on matters arising when the Association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the Association.

ARTICLE XII

The Associational quorum shall be the number present if the number satisfies the will of the Moderator.

ARTICLE XIII

The Association shall have the right to withdraw by a majority vote fellowship from any church which becomes unorthodox in doctrine especially with reference to Baptism by Immersion by authority of the local church as a prerequisite to membership in that Association, or disorderly in practice, or that fails to present itself either by messenger of letter for two consecutive sessions without sufficient reason, or that ceases to be missionary in practice. The support of the causes fostered by the denomination at large and of this Association in particular shall be the test of each church as a missionary body. Any church, at its pleasure, may withdraw from the Association.

ARTICLE XIV

The Association shall have such standing committees as may be considered necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The members of these committees are to be nominated annually by the Committee on Committees unless otherwise determined by the Association.

ARTICLE XV

The Constitution shall be amended through the recommendation of a standing Constitution Committee. Such Committee shall accept all suggested amendments, not later than thirty days prior to the annual session of the Association, which are presented to the Committee in writing. Such amendments shall be printed and then read at the first day of the Annual meeting, and voted on at the session on the second day. The Constitution shall be amended by a majority vote.

By-Laws

1. All vacancies occurring among the elective officers and in the Executive Committee shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

2. The Executive Committee shall meet at a time and place designated by the Moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter. The Executive Committee shall elect its own chairman.

3. Each church Clerk shall mail to the Clerk of the Association a letter properly filled out on the blank furnished him at least two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

4. No church shall be received into the Association who does not present a certificate of examination properly endorsed by the committee on organization and reception of new churches.

- 5. Duties of the committees of the Association.
- A. ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE: This committee shall plan the annual program for the Association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July Meeting.
- B. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES: The duty of this committee is to bring to the annual associational meeting a nomination of the personnel of the standing committee.

- C. FINANCE COMMITTEE: This committee shall devise plans for raising the funds for the association budget and prepare for recommendations to the annual session of the association the budget for the disbursement of funds for the coming year. It shall also be the duty of this committee to audit the finances and financial records of this Association twice annually and anytime that there is a change of Treasurer or Financial Secretary, or at the direction of this body or the Executive Committee, and to report all audits to the Annual Association Meeting
- D. RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE: This committee is to report suitable resolutions at the annual associational meeting.
- E. CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE: This committee serves in an advisory capacity only. This committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the Gospel Ministry and make recommendations as they feel led to the church of which one is a member about his being ordained and help plan and arrange the proper services of ordination when such assistance is needed. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee.
- F. NOMINATING COMMITTEE: It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers of the Association and have this report ready for the annual associational meeting.
- G. MISSIONS COMMITTEE: (1) This committee shall be composed of the following Association officers: Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Director of Woman's Missionary Union, Director of Brotherhood, Director of Evangelism, Director of Deacons, Treasurer, Moderator, Chairman of Executive Committee, and four members at large from member churches to be elected by the Association at its annual meeting for 1,2,3, and 4 years respectively on a rotating system. After the election one new member shall be elected each year to serve for a period of four years. (2) The Missions Committee shall advise and work with the Director of Missions in promoting the work in the Association, and also lead and assist in organizing new churches, and also shall be responsible for encouraging and guiding the churches in the Association to faithfully cooperate with the Association program emphases. (3) The committee shall meet once a quarter to receive a written report from the Associational Missionary and make helpful suggestions to him concerning his work. (4) If such advice is sought, it shall advise any group seeking to organize a new church, or seek to help any member Church desiring assistance in its problems. (5) The Missions Committee shall perform the duties prescribed in the By-Laws on New Churches, and the By-Laws prescribing the job Description on the Director of Missions.

JOB DESCRIPTION DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS TUCKASEIGEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

This Job Description is prepared for the information of the Director of Missions, with the objective of presenting the Director Committees' viewpoints on the major needs of the Association. The Job Description also stipulates the responsibilities of the Association to the Director of Missions.

- I. FUNCTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS. He is to be the chief administrative officer of the Association. He is to confine extra employment in a manner agreed upon with the Executive Committee.
- II. Relationship of the Director of Missions
 - He is employed by the Executive Committee of the Association. "Concerning termination of employment, his resignation shall be in writing and be presented to the Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to its effectiveness. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving thirty days notice in advance." (Tuckaseigee Association Constitution Article VII, paragraph h-5)
 - 2. General supervision of the personnel and program of the Association as they function through the Associational Office.
 - 3. Work primarily with Associational General Officers, Committees, and Organizations.
 - 4. Work closely with auxiliary organizations.
 - 5. Lead in maintaining relationships with State and SBC Agencies.
- III. Duties of the Director of Missions
 - 1. Administrative
 - a. Administer policies and instructions committed to him by the Association, its Executive Committee or Board.
 - b. Work closely with the Associational Officers, Committees, and Organizations to help each group determine (1) its opportunities and objectives based on needs in the churches, and (2) its procedures and programs for achieving these objectives.
 - c. Help the Association to develop annual and longrange objectives; set goals, and make plans for their attainment.
 - d. Correlate the work of all organizations and Committees in the Association, and publish a Calendar of Activities.
 - e. All staff to be responsible to the Director's selection and supervision under his responsibilities until informed otherwise by the Executive Committee.
 - f. Serve as ex officio member of all committees.
 - g. Have general oversight of purchasing equipment and supplies within the approved budget.
 - h. Inform State and Southern Convention agencies of needs, problems, and potentialities within the Association.
 - i. Interpret to the churches the program resources

and other assistance available from the State and Southern Baptist agencies.

- 2. As Counselor-Shepherd
 - To counsel with church leaders as requested with reference to (1) Programs and procedures in their churches; (2) Calling a pastor or other staff member; (3) Actual or threatened breach of fellowship; (4) Church objectives; (5) Church policies; (6) Assist pastorless churches; (7) Assist pastors and others in counseling those who are called into church-related vocations.
- 3. In the Churches, extending the local ministries: a. To visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders in the pastorless churches to provide assistance in the church program and ministry, such as: (1) Pulpit supply; (2) Study course; (3) Missionary address; (4) Deacons' Meetings; (5) Assembly programs; (6) Special day addresses; (7) Ordination services; (8) V.B.S. Planning and Promotion; (9) To interpret phases of Associational work; (10) Budget planning; (11) Building planning; (12) Revival meetings; (13) Stewardship emphasis; (14) Study objectives and long-range planning; (15) Studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, Constitution and By-Laws, etc.; (16) Church-Community Surveys, etc.; (17) Promoting a world missions concept; and (18) publishing of a regular news medium.
- 4. In the Associational Office
 - a. Personal correspondence, promotional mail, and telephoning pertinent to his work.
 - b. Office conferences, answer to inquiries, etc.
 - c. Assist Associational Officers, Committees, and heads of Organizations to get out promotional mail pertinent to their work.
- IV. The Schedule of Benefits provided by the Association for the Director.
 - 1. His salary shall be
 - 2. His fringe benefits shall include
 - 3. His schedule shall include:
 - a. One day each week, chosen at his discretion, shall be reserved for rest that excludes normal Associational activities.
 - b. A maximum of six weeks each year outside of the Association for special work with local churches or with State and SBC agencies.
 - c. An annual sick leave of 24 days maximum, with a with a maximum of 42 days to be accumulated. Sick leave may be advanced by the Association for one year, without Executive Committee action. Sick leave is to be recorded with the Financial Secretary of the Association.
 - 4. All honoraria from churches inside or outside the Association and all honoraria from other religious work shall be his personal fair, and shall not be submitted to the Association.
 - 5. New Churches in the Association: (1) Any church seeking admission to the membership of the Association

shall petition in writing the Executive Committee at least three months before the annual meeting of the Association, which petition shall be referred to the Missions Committee for its study on the petitioning church's covenant, articles of faith, history, practices, cooperative spirit, its relations to other churches of the Association and its willingness to abide by the Constitution and By-Laws of the Association. The Missions Committee shall then report to the Associational Meeting with a copy thereof submitted to the Associational Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association. The Missions Committee shall then report to the Associational Meeting with a copy thereof submitted to the Associational Executive Committee at least thirty days prior to the Annual Meeting of the Association, its findings and recommendations for Associational action at the next annual meeting. (2) shall give a written report to the Missions Committee and the Executive Committee each quarter of their work and giving toward associational program and state and southwide participation.

6. The Clerk shall prepare a Book of Reports for distribution at the annual sessions containing the reports of those on the Committee on Reports. The Clerk shall notify each person to give a report and these reports should be in the hands of the Clerk no later than two weeks before the Association meets.

Proceedings

Thursday, August 18, 1977 Shoal Creek Baptist Church

The one hundred forty-eight Annual Session of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association was called to order in the Shoal Creek Baptist Church by the Moderator, Wesley Hooper at 6:30 PM. The Reverend Alvin A. Loiry, Jr., Director of Missions, gave the Devotional using scripture from the Book of Matthew pertaining to missions and the Great Commission. Hooper welcomed the 145 messengers and the six visitors. The messengers represented 26 of the 49 churches in the Association. He then thanked the host church for its hospitality and the delicious meal served just prior to the opening session.

The following business was dispensed:

1. A motion made by John Hyatt that the BOOK OF REPORTS be adopted as presented was passed.

2. The Reverend Douglas McFadin spoke on the Sunday School work. He stressed the importance of teaching the Work of God. The report is contained in these minutes.

3. Doctor Robert Bruhl was introduced by Loiry. Bruhl was a representative of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina. He brought a report on State Mission work. He challenged the messengers to examine what they were doing for missions as missionary Baptists.

5. Sue Fitzgerald from Mars Hill College gave information concerning a display she had brought. She explained how the materials could be obtained and suggested some ways in which they might be used as "stretched materials" for workers to become better informed. The display contained materials for Seminary Extension, Deaconship and Pastoral Counseling, etc.

6. John Hyatt moved, seconded by Robert Blanton, that the Clerk, Annie Hoyle, be given an honorarium of one hundred dollars as compensation for her work as clerk. Motion passed.

7. The Reverend Clarence Vance who had served as Interim Director of Missions was thanked and recognized for the good work that he had done during his term of office.

8. Annie Hoyle recognized the clerks of the churches and commended them for the cooperation given in the preparation of the Association minutes.

9. The Director of Missions, Alvin Loiry, told of the twenty workers in the Association who would be contacting pastors for permission to go into their churches and explain the Bold Mission Thrust for State Missions. On Sunday, September 18, State Missions Day, churches are asked to call the Associational Office and report the amount received for this purpose. This date is to mark a special in-gathering but contributions will continue to be received after that date. Churches were urged to respond generously to the support of this special appeal.

10. The Reverend C. H. Greene moved that the Minutes of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association for the 148th Session be dedicated to the memory of the Reverend Bruce Alexander, Pastor of the Hamburg Church. Motion passed. Alexander was killed in a motorcycle accident on August 7th.

11. John Hyatt as Vice Moderator and Robert Blanton, as immediate past Moderator, were recognized and commended for their good work.

12. C. H. Greene spoke briefly on the work of the Christian Action League, explaining that it was now well organized and ready to go to work when called upon.

13. Attention was called to the flowers in front of the pulpit. These had been given by the Ministerial Association in memory of Bruce Alexander.

14. Mrs. Mary Bennett, accompanied by Mrs. Roy Burnett at the piano, led the congregation in singing a hymn. An offering amounting to \$87.68 was taken. 15. The sermon was brought by Douglas McFadin, Pastor of the Shoal Creek Church. He used scripture from Acts for his sermon topic entitled: "Who Art Thou Lord?"

16. The first session of the 148 Annual meeting was adjourned at the close of the sermon and a prayer led by Robert Blanton.

1. The second session was called to order by the Moderator, Wesley Hooper at 9:30 AM on Friday, August 19th in the Black Mountain Baptist Church.

11. Dr. Carven Williams, President of Gardner Webb College, spoke to the Report on Christian Education. He told of the beginning of Gardner Webb College in 1905 with a gift of two acres of land and the old church building. Thus Gardner Webb started with facts that have meaning and significance as the college grows. He said that the gift of the old church building had meaning and significance in that (1) we meet for religious services regularly, (2) we require some basic courses in religion, (3) we provide counseling and (4) we have rules and growing institution without the aid of government funds, which further strengthen our Baptist way of life in that we are self

12. Hugh Starnes gave the report on the Baptist Childrens Homes. He said that the greatest needs at present was for Foster Homes and Emergency Care Centers in this area. The nearest Emergency Care Center is at Forest City. Approximately 1/5 of the children enrolled at the Broyhill Home are from the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, he said. He urged the churches to give stronger support and extended an invitation to all to attend the Area Conference to be held at the Broyhill Home on Thursday, September 8.

13. J. D. Parker read a list of those churches that had increased their giving to the Baptist Hospital for this year. The Report on the Baptist Hospital was given by Calvin Knight. He gave illustrations to supplement the statements made in the Baptist Hospital Report contained in these minutes.

14. The Financial report was given by Robert Blanton. Annie Hoyle gave the Treasurer's Report.

15. At the conclusion of a congregational song "How Firm a Foundation" Glenn Blanton, introduced Alvin A. Loiry who, in the illness of Eddie Stillwell, brought the morning message. Loiry used scripture from 2 Peter and 2 Timothy. The sermon concluded the morning service.

16. A delicious luncheon was served by the members of the Black Mountain Church in their new Fellowship Hall.

17. John Hyatt, Vice Moderator, called the afternoon meeting to order at 1:00 PM.

18. The devotional was given by Max Smith, Pastor of Buff Creek Church. He likened the Tuckaseigee Association to the Bible in that they are "God's people with a great future." He said that if we could just get Jesus in the right place in our lives, then everything else would be right.

19. Hyatt expressed appreciation and thanks to the Black Mountain Church for its warm hospitality and for the good meal.

20. Ralph Cannon brought the report on the Homes for the Aging. He pointed out the dire need not only for the new home under construction in Asheville but for other homes not yet begun. He said that there were over 700,000 people 65 years of age in North Carolina with only seven Baptist Homes for the aging to care for those who needed help. These homes can accommodate only 207 residents. The need is great - here is an opportunity for the people to show their love and respect for aging members who need help.

21. Frank Anderson, Chaplain at the C.J. Harris Hospital, gave a report on his work in the hospital. The report is recorded in the minutes. Anderson requested Dr. John Bunn, Pastor of Sylva First Church, to relate a personal experience he had had recently in helping a patient in Texas receive Christ.

22. Hyatt expressed appreciation and thanks for the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association to Wesley Hooper for his year of leadership and good work as moderator.

23. Glenn Blanton, Chairman of the Time, Place and Preacher Committee gave the report for that committee. The report is recorded in the minutes.

24. Conrad Burrell, Chairman of the Nominating Committee, presented the slate of officers for the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association for the next year. He moved that the slate be adopted as read. Motion passed.

25. The Congregation, led by Harry Vance, sang "Victory for Jesus."

26. The second session was concluded with a memorial service presented by Annie Hoyle and assisted by Lucille Painter, Jerry Carringer, and Jane Beck.

27. The Vice Moderator declared the adjournment of the 148th Annual Session at 2:30 PM. The second session was attended

by 78 messengers and four visitors. Twenty-one of the fortynine churches were represented.

ANNUITY BOARD REPORT

In 1976, the Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention recommended a new retirement program which was approved by all the state Baptist Conventions. The new program called the Southern Baptist Retirement Program will go into effect January 1, 1978.

Detailed information will be presented to churches in the early fall with a ROUTE 10 promotional theme, according to Darold H. Morgan, president of the Board.

The Board paid \$17,138,343 in benefits to 11,925 widows, retired or disabled members in 1976. A 13th check amounting to one month's income was mailed for the eleventh time to annuitants. The combined amount of this extra benefit came to \$830,525.

Most members benefit from a decision to increase the interest rate for figuring retirement benefits. Annuitants began receiving larger checks as of January 1, 1977.

For almost 45,000 members, the Board held in trust funds totaling \$472,218,669 for retirement benefits for the year ending 1976.

The Annuity Board also administers life, medical and disability insurance programs, which reflected increases in membership.

In North Carolina as of March 31, 1977, 2787 staff members of 2196 churches and associations are participating in the Southern Baptist Retirement Program; 2491 in the Family Benefit Section; 1275 in the Age Security Section and 240 in the Variable Benefit section.

CHRISTIAN LIFE AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS

The Christian Life Council majored on two aspects in 1977, the family and legislative issues. W. Douglas Cole became director of the Christian Family Life Department January 1, 1977. Under his leadership, the Council sponsored marriage enrichment retreats, ministers-wife retreats, parenting workshops, conference for engaged couples, sex-education conference and promoted the National Single Adult Conference at Ridgecrest. In addition, many tracts on the family were printed and distributed among North Carolina Baptists.

Since the General Assembly was in session during 1977, the Council was involved in a number of issues. Some of the issues were assigned to the Council by the Convention. Other issues were suggested by the twenty persons who comprise the Council. Some of the legislative concerns were pornography, liquor-bythe drink, captial punishment, Equal Rights Amendment, chaplains for prisons, etc.

The Council also sponsored a state-wide workshop on death and dying, particularly as it related to euthanasia (easy death) or, as it is commonly called, "mercy killing."

Numerous calls from Baptist for help on social issues keep being received and responded to. The Council attempts to provide information on how to apply one's Christian faith to everyday life.

America suffers from a crisis in morality and integrity. Only as Christians live out their faith will a lost world be improved and changed. To that end the Christian Life Council is dedicated.

THE NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC.

The establishment of the North Carolina Baptist Foundation as an agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina was approved as an agency of the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina was approved in 1919 and chartered in 1020. The objectives of this agency of the Convention were clearly stated in its charter: "1. To promote the making of gifts..."2. To receive, own, hold, administer, and distribute gifts of any kind...."

The Foundation continues to strive toward fulfilling the objectives stated in its charter. In so doing it will serve more as a foundation, as foundations are presently defined. As trustee, the donor or benefactor makes decisions relative to specific or general recipients of trust income.

The growth of assets held was slow in the early years and reflected directly the amount of time given to promotion by lay volunteers interested in the endowment of Christian ministries of the Convention. At no time in its history has the Foundation idea lacked respect of denominational leadership in that it was undergirding the financial support of all Baptist mission endeavors. The total assets held have grown from \$2,000. in 1920 to \$3,696.612. in 1977.

The Foundation is the only agency or institution receiving its total operating budget from the Cooperative Program. Its fifteen member Board of Directors is elected by the Convention, three each year selected for five year terms. The Directors through an Executive Committee has responsibility for reviewing budget needs and recommending its request to the General Board Budget Committee.

The staff consists of the following employees: the Executive Secretary, Edwin S. Coates; Director of Estate Planning, Sara Ann Hobbs; Staff Assistant, Dianne Babb; Treasurer, Leon Spencer; and the Legal Counsel, Tom Dimmock, a Raleigh attorney, who is retained for frequent consultation and for preparation of contracts, agreements and other matters related to the work of the Foundation.

The emphasis of the Foundation is Stewardship.

There are three prime methods now utilized through which gifts of possessions can be transferred to benefit Baptist endeavors. The most frequently used, and the source of most assets now held by the Foundation, is the testamentary gift. A gift in which the transfer from an estate to the charitable cause is done by statement in a will. The second method the charitable remainder trust has proved to be a valuable instrument to encourage life-time transfers of assets. The third method is through the living charitable trust. An outright gift of assets, where income or principal is immediately available for charitable causes, provides many benefits both to the donor and to the ministry being supported. In some instances, the residual estate to heirs can be increased through this method of giving.

"Through our investment in the Foundation that supports the Cooperative Program permanently, we now ARE the Cooperative Program."

EVANGELISM REPORT

"Bold in Creative Witness" was the theme of the 31st Statewide Evangelism Conference at the War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, during February 7-9, 1977. About 2,400 pastors and lay persons were present to hear the challenging messages of the evangelistic speakers.

Over 500 youth and adults came to the North Carolina Baptist Assembly for the Youth Ministry Week - June 13-17, and many different types of decisions for Christ were made public by youth. The emphasis was on youth evangelism, and vocational guidance.

About 12,000 youth, pastors, and adult leaders are planning to attend the 7th Statewide Youth Evangelism Night - August 19 - at the Greensboro Coliseum. Jim Wilson and Larry McFadden of Orlando, Florida are the guest preacher and soloist. All youth who make decisions are contacted by pastors and adults with regard to specific follow-up counseling.

Thirty-six churches across the state are having one week youth revivals and youth witness training under the direction of four Summer Youth Evangelism Teams.

Excellent reports have been received on Lay Renewal Weekends and Ministry Evangelism Weekends in various churches. The Division of Evangelism cooperates with the Brotherhood Department in this phase of the work.

Associations and churches are now involved in the Youth Evangelism Strategy which includes these four areas: Leadership Family, Touch Ministry; Discipleship Groups; and Joy Explosion. W.O.W.- Win Our World - Has to do with specific witness training for youth in the local churches.

Sixty-five associations have participated in one week Lay Evangelism Schools in recent years with over 14,400 youth and adults receiving lay witness training from 1,175 churches.

Several thousand persons have attended evangelism clinics and conferences held in associations across the state.

The 32nd Statewide Evangelism Conference will be held at War Memorial Auditorium, Greensboro, on February 6-8, 1978.

Several of the pastors from the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association attended the Evangelism Conference in Greensboro on February 7-9, 1977. They reported a great conference with challenging messages.

Due to a number of reasons the Ministers Revival was not held as scheduled. However, most of the churches did conduct very successful revivals within their own congregations with excellent results. Some very outstanding persons led some of these revivals. Several of the smaller churches joined hands in holding revivals, moving speakers and congregations from church to church each night throughout the time of revival. This movement resulted in new converts, re-dedications and warm Christian fellowship among the peoples of the several communities involved.

BIBLICAL RECORDER REPORT

What is perhaps the greatest challenge faced in all the history of Southern Baptist is before our people for the remaining 23 years of the 20th century. It has been called "Bold Missions Thrust," and the success of the venture is yet to be determined. There is no doubt concerning the importance or the motivation for the undertaking, but there is uncertainty as to whether the motivating message will be successfully communicated to some 13 million Southern Baptists, and to our more than 34,000 churches. Without adequate communication channels, the program cannot succeed.

The heart of the program is to evangelize and congregationalize the world's population, and the thrust is confronting all human beings everywhere with the gospel, and affording them the opportunity of knowing and trusting Christ as Saviour, and then leading them to understanding of His Lordship.

The program is so big, and the challenge so great, that every Baptist must be involved to make it successful. Not since Jesus presented His disciples the goal of going into all the world has such boldness been demonstrated.

The most difficult problems faced in our churches are related to communications. When people are uninformed, poorly informed, or misinformed, they get into trouble. When they know what is taking place in their local congregation and in the denomination, interest is generated and cooperation results. Openness is their fore important, and the purpose of the BIBLICAL RECORDER is to keep Baptist church members informed concerning involvement in their denomination, and in the Christian world.

In light of developments presently underway in our denomination, it is important that every Baptist church member in N.C. receive the BIBLICAL RECORDER weekly. Already more than 100 churches in our state are providing through their budgets for the RECORDER to go to all resident families. The Southern Baptist Convention has adopted a circulation goal of eight million for state papers by 1980. The SBC believes that every Baptist family ought to be receiving its state Baptist paper. RECORDER circulation approaches 120,000 but should be increased in the immediate future to 150,000.

If your church is not sending the RECORDER to resident families at the present time, arrangements should be made immediately to do so. Costing less than half the price of a postage stamp per issue, it is delivered by U.S. Mail directly to your home address.

The RECORDER doesn't cost; it pays! Your church will be a healthier congregation if you provide the RECORDER for your resident families. It is the most widely read piece of literature received by North Carolina Baptists. No investment pays greater dividends.

BAPTIST HOSPITAL REPORT

The beautiful stained glass window in the front of Davis Chapel at Baptist Hospital has three large panels, each depicts an aspect of Christ's ministry: Healing, teaching, and preaching. The window serves as a reminder to the staff that Baptist Hospital has also been commissioned to this threefold task.

The hospital's primary task, obviously, is healing and it attempts to obtain and use the best personnel and equipment available for the healing task. The medical staff consists of competent, dedicated men and women in all the various specialties of medicine. Persons with rare and complicated medical problems are referred to Baptist Hospital by their family physicians for treatment. Last year 158,863 visits were made in the hospital's Out-patient Department and the Bowman Gray Department of Clinics. There were 22,365 admissions to the hospital for a total of 193,942 patient days. These patients came from 90 counties in North Carolina, from 29 other states and from 3 foreign countries.

Baptist Hospital is also involved in teaching. In cooperation with the Bowman Gray School of Medicine of Wake Forest University, it helped to train 1,188 students last year for careers in medicine and allied health fields. In addition, there were 87 graduate students in the basic sciences. The hospital also provided clinical facilities for 483 student nurses from 3 nearby schools of nursing and for 120 students in other allied schools. The School of Pastoral Care last year enrolled a total of 75 students in various levels of Clinical Pastoral Education.

The hospital also has a preaching ministry. There is preaching in the formal sense at least four times a week in the worship services held in Davis Chapel. In a less formal sense, the Christian Gospel is proclaimed daily by staff, students, patients and others who witness to their faith in word and deed.

In all of these ministries, Baptist Hospital is mindful of its Christian heritage and its strong tie with the Baptist State Convention. This tie is maintained and strengthened through the services of capable, dedicated trustees who are elected by and are responsible to the Convention. The tie is also strengthened through the financial support from the churches; last year \$294,324 was received through the Cooperative Program and \$405,947 through the Mother's Day Offering.

REPORT OF THE HOSPITAL CHAPLAIN 1977

The ministry of the Chaplaincy in the C.J. Harris Community Hospital is made possible by the voluntary cooperative effort upon the part of the majority of the Christian denominations in Jackson County. A standing committee of the Jackson County Minister's Association supervises the Chaplaincy Program.

The challenge to the program is seen in the 4,235 patients which passed through the hospital from July, 1976 to June 30, 1977. This is an average of 353 patients per month. Here were 4,235 opportunities to mediate the compassion of a loving heavenly Father.

During the past year 41 churches, 4 individuals, and 2 institutions gave \$4,115.08 for the Chaplaincy. This represents an increase of 17 churches over the preceding year. The increase in gifts was \$1,572.04.

Those who served on the VBS Faculty for this year are: Dan Ward, Director; C.O. Vance, General Conference; Paul Carden, Adults; Douglas McFadin, Missions, Mrs. Paul Carden, Youth; Miss Gail Lewis, Older Children; Mrs. Mary Bennett, Middle Children; Mrs. Annie Hoyle, Younger Children; Miss Louella Brown, Older Preschool; Mrs. Ray McCall, Younger Preschool.

Everyone who served on the faculty attended the State VBS Clinic at Ridgecrest. Our faculty was one of a very few that was 100% in attendance at the clinic.

The Association VBS Clinic was held at the Lovedale Baptist Church, May 16, 1977. The following churches with the number enrolled for each attended: Balsam 11; Buff Creek 8, Calvary 1, Jarrett Memorial 8, East Fork 3, East Sylva 2, Hamburg 3, Hyatts Chapel 1, Jarrett Memorial 8, Little Savannah 9, Locust Field 5, Lovedale 10, Moses Creek 5, New Hope 7, Ochre Hill 13, Old Savannah 3, Rockdale 3, Shoal Creek 1, Speedwell 6, Scotts Creek 6, Sylva First 5, Webster 3, Cullowhee 3. Of this enrollment, twelve were pastors. A number of church VBS had been held at the time of the writing of the report.

A summary report for VBS in North Carolina for 1976 indicates that there were 2919 Church Schools, 77 Mission Schools and 153 Backyard Bible Clubs. There was a total enrollment of 292,739. There were 3,275 professions of faith. A total of \$91,650. was given for missions through the schools. From these schools there were 8,282 prospects discovered who had no church affiliation.

BAPTIST CHILDREN'S HOMES

Dr. W. R. Wagoner, president of the North Carolina Baptist Children's Homes states in report for the year that the drastic changes in the life styles of our day are requiring multiple ministries in order to meet the needs of families and children. The American family today is in trouble, but its situation is not hopeless. Positive contributions can be made to strengthen the home as more effective ways are discovered, by this agency, to minister with pastors, churches, and other agencies which have a concern for the well-being of the family.

The purpose of this Agency is the care of dependent, neglected and homeless children, emotionally disturbed children; unwed mothers and their children; and the rendering of related services to their relatives. The Agency is also dedicated to working with other agencies, institutions and programs, in an effort to strengthen wholesome, Christian family life throughout the state.

In 1976 the lives of more than 4,300 people were affected in

a significant way by the services of the Children's Homes. The Homes provided care and related services for 1,683 children. Of this number 1,217 received continuing services while 466 received casework, counseling, and referral services. Applications for 70 children were in process of evaluation at the end of the year.

Through members of the staff, a close working relationship was maintained with 2,396 adults while working with the children. Consultant services were provided more than 300 other adults through Child Development and Family Education services.

The four centers of operation in the Piedmont Area providing the full range of services to families and children in need are: the Mills Home at Thomasville; the Emergency Home at Burlington, the Emergency Home and Social Work Center at Charlotte; Wall Home at Wallburg.

In the Eastern Area are located the Odum Home, the Emergency Care Home in Henderson and the Kennedy Home. In the Western Area the Broyhill Home has served to strengthen all phases of our work in Western North Carolina. A fifth cottage completed during the past year increases the Broyhill campus capacity to sixty children. The Thermal Belt Youth Shelter, opened last year in Forest City, serves a new and different need for children in crisis situations.

Many girls, facing the problem of the unwed mother, continue to be helped through the Maternity Home in Asheville. It is recognized for its quality of care and Christian concern.

The Child Development Center enlarged its services to offer a day care program for school aged children during the summer and a group of two year old children for year-round participation.

A staff of twenty-two social workers live and work out of eleven centers located across the state. Social work services are available upon request to families any place in the state needing our assistance.

More than forty-two percent of the basic, dependable support of the Homes continues to come from Baptist churches through the Cooperative Program, special gifts, and the Thanksgiving offering. Special gifts from individuals, families, businesses, and industries increased during the past year for fortyfour percent.

Interest in our estate planning services is growing. Annuties and charitable trusts are increasing.

Attendance at area conferences and special promotional meetings has been the largest ever.

Tom Clayton of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association continues to serve on the Board of Trustees as representative from the Western Area. Several churches and mission groups in the Tuckaseigee Association have visited the Broyhill Home and have for special occasions - birthdays, Christmas, etc- adopted children for special attention. The large attendance in September 1976 at the Area Conference at Broyhill testifies to the interest of the people of the Tuckaseigee Association in the work being done at Broyhill.

The year 1976-77 found the women of the W M U organization busily involved with missions on all levels. The fall leadership conference was held with the Webster Church with our own directors leading. The regional meeting in Andrews was led by the state workers. Attendance was good at all of these meetings.

At the Annual meeting Sue Fitzgerald brought a beautiful display of all WMU materials which added greatly to our "Grow-A-Know-Body" idea.

The WMU Council composed of the Directors of the age level groups, held quarterly meetings for planning and projection. These meets have resulted in a collection of various materialsmaps, film strips, flags of countries having missionaries and a Carousel for the use of the churches in the promotion of mission work and in their own programs.

"Go-Tell" our WMU communications newsletter has gone out at least quarterly plus a few additional issues. So far this means of communicating has been mailed to the directors and officers only in the various organizations on a regular basis. Perhaps in the future this information can be sent to each WMU member.

The Moses Creek women formed our newest organization. This group was given special recognition at the annual meeting. We now have 23 active WMU organizations in the Association.

The Executive Dinner at Christmas was sponsored by the WMU and served at the Cullowhee Church.

Again most of the organizations went over their goals in the Lottie Moon offering for Foreign Missions. The Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home missions also received whole hearted support.

Age level directors have been active in their leadership capacities. A Day Camp for Mission Friends and GA's was held at Camp Truett. The B W and B Y W have encouraged prayer retreats in the individual churches. They also guided the programs in connection with the weeks of prayer for special events.

But all of this in now proloque. While it depicts activity and interest and achievement a great challenge lies before us. The Bold Mission Thrust is indeed a challenge and opens many avenues for WMU work. Indeed! "The Field is White Unto the Harvest."

The leadership for 1977-78 on the Associational level is composed of the following: BW: Mildred Cowan, BYW: Alma Pullium, Acteens: Sharon Proctor, G.A.: Virginia Pangle and Mission Friends . We shall be hearing from these dynamic leaders. Let's back them in God's work.

TRUETT BAPTIST CAMP REPORT

We are happy to report that the interest in the Truett Camp from our Association and the region has continued to grow during this past year. There have been 15 churches from this Association participated in some form, and to date 700 boys and girls from the region have attended. Brother Crawford, the Director, reports that they have had 84 conversions. So it has indeed been a great blessing to the lives of young people in our area. This certainly indicates that our dollars and interest to the support of Truett Camp are indeed well spent.

There have been several physical improvements made as new tables, chairs, and mattresses have been added, an outdoor grill, and a very pretty new sign has been erected. The dormitories have been refloored and painted. This past cold winter did considerable damage to the pool, but this has also been repaired in good order. We still have several projects that are badly needed. Two pressing ones are the staff cottage and an outdoor worship center.

The Association expresses its gratitude to Reverend Crawford for the fine job he is doing and to Reverend Douglas McFadin of our Association who is now chairman of the regional Truett Camp Committee.

May we continue to support the Truett Camp with our means, our children, and our prayers.

ASSOCIATIONAL MISSIONS '

With the resignation of Walter Middleton, Director of Missions, in April 1976, the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association was left without a leader for a period of approximately eight months. The 1976 year's work was completed under the capable leadership of Robert Blanton, Moderator. Annie Hoyle carried on the office work. The Annual Session was planned and carried out in a most effective and satisfactory manner. Following the Annual Session Wesley Hooper took the lead as moderator. In his quiet, effective way he visited churches, presided at meetings and took care of business. In his visits to the churches he informed the people of their obligations and responsibilities to their Association. As a result financial contributions were made by some churches that had contributed very little or nothing previously. A new interest was felt.

The Finance Committee, under the leadership of Jack Hinson, Chairman, held a meeting to discuss the possible potentials and the directions to be taken financially. A monthly financial report became a part of the newsletter. Churches were urged to give regularly on a monthly basis and several responded. The Baptist State Convention increased its contribution to the maximum for associational support. Luther Osment's "know how" and enthusiasm played a major part in this. The appropriation which was stopped with the resignation of Walter Middleton was reinstated in December after the coming of Clarence Vance.

As usual there was some changes made in pulpits. Several of the pastors resigned - some leaving the Association, some taking other churches in the Association while some did not take another pastorate. STATE MISSIONS

1976 HAS BEEN A YEAR OF COOPERATION. The celebration of the American Bicentennial emphasized the cooperative spirit of this nation. What Americans share in common outweighs their diversity. We are a United States because we are cooperative states.

Cooperation and diversity are cherished principles among Baptists. One hundred forty years before the nation's beginning a Baptist leader, Roger Williams, opposed coercion in matters of religion. The broad principles of religious liberty, later guaranteed to all Americans, led to the founding of Rhode Island. Three years later, in 1639, the First Baptist Church in America was established there.

Cooperation and diversity are also basic to the Baptist mission program. We are a state convention of 3,458 autonomous churches coming together"... to promote missions, evangelism, education, social services." The Convention was founded for missions. It is held together because of missions. And its future growth depends upon a commitment to missions.

Basic to that commitment is a strong program of State Missions. The state of State Missions strongly affects the state of Home and Foreign missions. Mission programs in distant areas depend upon the strength of the "sending churches" back home. Overseas and national missions look to the churches for prayer, concern, missionaries, and money. To be weak on the "home front" is to be even weaker in distant lands.

During the past several years State Missions has emphasized programs to strengthen church and association ministries. Two important emphases are Bible study and leadership training. A strong Christian education program is the backbone of mission support. The Church Program departments--Sunday School, Church Ministries and Training, Church Music, WMU, and Brotherhood---are wholly committed to these tasks.

A second major program of State Missions are the "direct mission" ministries. These programs lengthen the churches' concern across the state, representing you in areas where your church does not serve. The ministries include Deaf Missions, Resort Missions, Student Missions, Chaplaincy and Language Ministries, Christian Social Ministries, and Inter-racial Ministries.

Cooperation in Baptist missions is also evident in the way the programs are conducted. Resort Missions, for example, is usually a joint project of area churches, Associational Missions, State Mission projects in North Carolina re-financed 64 percent by State Missions.

State Missions is supported by the Cooperative Program and the annual State Missions Offering, September 19. The special offering is similar to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering (Foreign Missions) and the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering (Home Missions).

The 1976 State Missions Offering goal is \$400,000. The offering distribution, approved by the 1975 Baptist State Convention, is as follows.

- \$175,000 Basic State Mission Budget
- 43,000 Fruitland Classroom Building
- 72,000 Caraway Conference Center
- 10,000 Special Mission Projects
- 100,000 Baptist Assembly (Caswell)

A look at this goal and we realize that this is indeed a Bold Thrust. But we CAN do it if we put our "shoulder to the wheel and push." The Tuckaseigee Baptist Association has a very definite part in this bold outreach. The goal for the Association has been set at \$15,000. In comparison to the total goal this seems a small amount but when we take a look at the amount the Association gave to designated State Missions in 1976 - \$1,654-- we can see our task. In the very near future a representative will be sent to each church in the association explaining the program and perhaps making suggestions as to how our goal can be attained. We do have a CHALLENGE!

On the local level some progress was made in Camp and trailer parks ministries this year. Several of the churches took active part in this with some encouraging results. Most of the work on this level is done by the individual churches. Then, too, much of the work that is done is not reported for the Associational minutes. While we do not have figures to substantiate much of our mission work we know that it is going on and that what is done is a vital part of our mission work.

FOREIGN MISSIONS REPORT

"...for, behold, I bring you good tidings of great joy, which shall be to all people." Luke 2:10b

Sixty percent of the ordained ministers in the world are inside the United States, while ninety-five percent of the world's population are outside the United States. One way the Southern Baptist attempt to balance this scale is with a vigorous foreign missions program. More than 2700 Southern Baptist Foreign Missionaries are now under appointment to 84 countries and territories. Their efforts to proclaim "Good News of Great Joy" are reinforced by Baptist leaders on the mission fields and by our prayers and mission support at home.

Missionary appointments during 1976 exceeded all previous records. In the midst of prevailing tensions in disturbed areas they have continued their work.

Almost half of the financial support for Southern Baptist foreign missions comes from the Lottie Moon Christmas offering and the Cooperative Program. Last year the Cooperative Program showed a 12.52 percent increase in giving and the Lottie Moon Christmas offering increased by 11.35 percent.

In the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association plans were begun for an Associational Missions school to be held Oct. 15-22, 1978. This school will bring both Home and Foreign Missionaries to our churches. These missionaries will share how our mission dollars are used to reach souls for Christ around the states and the world.

All of our churches are urged to participate. Call the Association office for how your church can be a part.

Our association sponsored a meeting with Dale Hooper, a furloughing missionary from Kenya, which proved to be informative and inspirational. Mr. Hooper is originally from this area.

Also, this year, our association hosted a Mission Support hearing with Dr. Cecil Ray and others of our state convention in attendance. The meeting was reasonably attended by representatives of Region 10 counties. Better ways of teaching, promoting, and supporting all of our missionary efforts were discussed. It was a very helpful meeting for all who attended.

PROPOSED BUDGET FOR 1977-1978

Last year we adopted the largest budget ever proposed for the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. Since we did not have a full time Director of Missions until June 1, we did not have the opportunity to test this budget to determine whether it would meet our needs. Now that we do have a Director he will be serving under this budget for only four months - June, July, August and September. The Finance Committee is proposing the same budget with a decrease of \$400 in the Director's Salary and an increase of \$400 in the Housing item. The total remains \$19,125. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina pays \$2,712 (\$226 monthly) of the total budget.

During the past financial year - 1975-76 - thirty-five

churches gave \$12,745.08 including the \$1,554 contributed by the State Convention. Seven of the thirty-five churches gave on a regular monthly basis. This year - 1976-77 - thirty-two churches have given a total of \$9,639.21 in a nine months period. Thus far twelve churches and the Baptist State Convention have contributed on a regular monthly basis.

While the average giving per month thus far is not as much as that of the previous year some of the churches usually give more during or immediately after the Annual Session. The next four months should show a substantial increase in the amount given for this year. We feel that with a full time Director contributions from all of the churches will increase. We greatly appreciate those churches that give regularly as this helps greatly in keeping our budget operating smoothly. We strongly urge all churches to include a plan for monthly giving in their budgets for the coming year.

STATEMENT OF CONDITION

The fiscal year of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association begins on October 1 and ends on September 30. This means that the financial statement included in THE BOOK OF REPORTS represents only nine months. As of June 30, 1977 there is a balance of \$4,318.75. Of this amount \$3,680.84 was brought forward from September 1976.

A total of 32 churches have contributed \$7,676.02 to Associational missions with 12 of these churches giving on a regular monthly basis. This represents an increase of five churches giving monthly.

In order to meet our budget needs for 1977-78 we will need a monthly income of approximately \$1370 monthly.
