The following report on Education was read, and, after remarks by several of the brethren, adopted:

We are convinced that the great need of Western North Carolina is education, and we are happy to report that there is a great uplook in that direction. But the interest manifested is not yet as great as it should be. We recommend the school at Holly Springs, at Waynesville, and all the good schools within the bounds of this Association, and hope that they will have the hearty co-operation and support of the people in general; for we believe in general education.

Judson College at Hendersonville, N. C., cannot be too highly recommended. It is the greatest enterprise of the Baptists of this country,

and when it flourishes our cause will flourish. The building is large and commodious, and when finished will be one of the best college buildings in the State. The school so far has been a success under the management of Profs. Brown and Morris; the average attendance during last session being about ninety. There is a lack of three thousand dollars to finish the building and pay off the old indebtedness, and we do sincerely hope that our brethren will heartily lend a helping hand to that work. We are sorry that Dr. W. A. Nelson will no longer be connected with the faculty; but we are glad to say that Prof. W. C. McCarthey, former President of Weaverville College, and his wife, will be added to the faculty at the opening of the next session on the 30th day of August, 1880.

We must educate if we would prosper, for the time is coming and now is when the uneducated will labor under many and great disadvantages. We need an educated ministry more than all things else.

May God bless us in this work.

The following report on Sabbath Schools was adopted:

In 1879 our minutes show that we had 2,174 pupils and 170 teachers, making a total of 2,344 engaged at that time in Sabbath School work. Reports this year show 1,990 scholars and 157 teachers, making a total of 2,148; showing a decrease of 196. This is owing in part to the fact that four churches report schools and give no numbers, and five reporting no school at all. This we deeply regret, for the Sabbath school is the place to bring them up in the nurture and admonition of the Lord. Thankful for the blessings of our Heavenly Father on past efforts, we, with increased faith are looking for a brighter future in this noble work.
