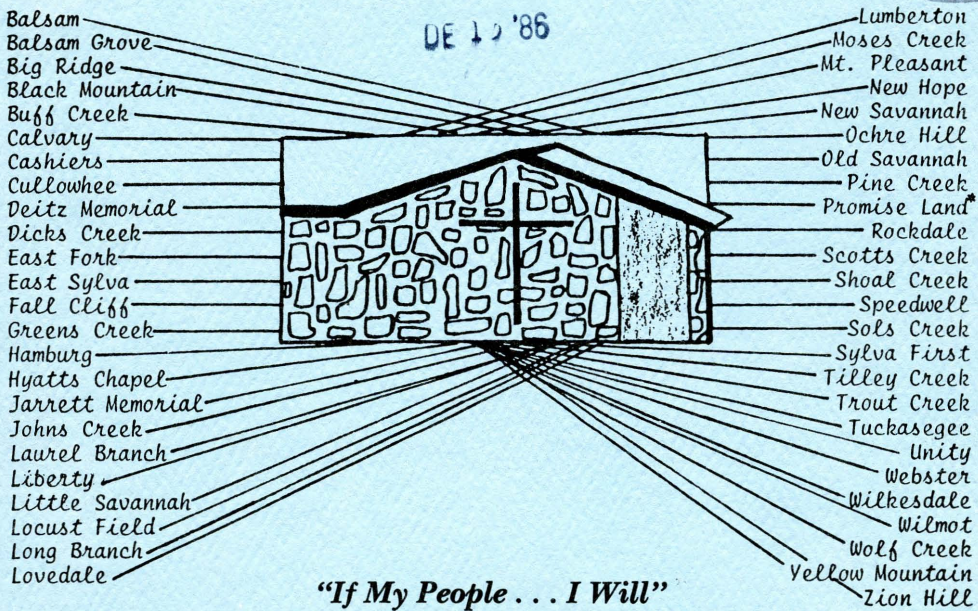

C.H. GREENE

The year 1912 marked the birth of C.H. Greene, who was destined to a long useful life in dedicated service to his Saviour. He was ordained in the Calvary Baptist Church in Canton, North Carolina. For 44 years he faithfully served churches in Haywood, Buncombe, Madison, Lincoln, Henderson and Jackson Counties. Each church he served prepared him for the next. After 44 years of dedicated service he retired from the Scotts Creek Baptist Church but continued to serve as interim pastor in other churches until his death in 1984.

He served with the Home Mission Board for 9 years during which time he organized 17 churches in the State of Washington. Wherever he served, C.H. Greene was original, bold and brilliant in his work.

He was truly God's servant. He was strongly dedicated to his work, kind, but determined and courageous. He was not afraid to venture into the unknown for he had a strong faith that the work he was doing was God called. The Holy Spirit endowed him with the gift of prophecy and he utilized that gift to the very best of his ability. He was an apostle in the sense that he was sent with a message to those who were unsaved. The saved he taught with patience, promoting their spiritual growth, thus enabling them to live a full life in God's will.

The Reverend Greene married Mabel Sutton. Their home was blessed with a son, Charles Greene of Gastonia, a daughter, Claudia Smith of Tampa, Florida, and three grandchildren. While C.H. has now gone beyond the "Hills of Time into the Sunset glow" he will be waiting there in God's eternal love while his friends go to meet him.

1. The Tuckasegee Baptist Church served as host for the first session of the 155th Annual meeting of the Tuckasegee Baptist Association. They served supper to the messengers and visitors at 5:30 p.m.

2. Moderator, Johnny Enloe, pastor of Scotts Creek Baptist Church, called the 155th Annual Session to order at 6:30 p.m. on August 16, 1984.

3. The Reverend Everett Wilson, pastor of the host church, brought a brief devotional and welcome to the members of the assembly.

4. Moderator Enloe thanked the church for the delicious meal that had been served to the messengers and visitors so efficiently.

5. Changes in the Order of Business were suggested by the Reverend Wayne Caldwell. He added the Report on Evangelism to be presented prior to the Vacation Bible School report.

6. Jack Hinson moved that a "Miscellaneous item" be added to follow the report of the Finance Committee. The motion carried.

7. Jack Robinson asked for the length of time to be given to the items on "Miscellaneous."

8. Jack Hinson moved that 10 minutes be allowed for the "Miscellaneous" business. the motion carried.

9. The Order of Business was adopted with the above mentioned changes.

10. New pastors and the churches they were serving were recognized: Jack Robinson, Buff Creek; James A. Breedlove, Promise Land; Ben Cabe, East Fork; Frank Brooks, Dicks Creek; Tommy Ashe, Fall Cliff; Dennis Burrell, Johns Creeks; Roy Cable, Lovedale; Tony McCall, Mount Pleasant; Davis Hooper, New Savannah; Wesley Hooper, Old Savannah; Johnny Ray Davis, Trout Creek; Morris Wilson, Yellow Mountain; David Mull, Big Ridge and Kenneth Pressley, Speedwell.

11. John Reid, Director of Missions gave a challenging report on the work in the association stressing the need for more unity and cooperation of the churches and the willingness to be able to disagree without being disagreeable.

12. The Moderator appointed Jack Robinson, Trenton Connelly and S.J. Waters to the Resolutions Committee.

13. Burdette Robinson spoke to the Sunday School report. He urged all Sunday School Directors to attend the Leadership Conference scheduled at Ridgecrest on September 14-15.

Sunday School enrollment has increased approximately 3 percent this year. Churches having made the most increase percentage-wise were awarded certificates.

14. Norman Parris spoke to the Church Training report. He announced the coming of Dr. Mark Corts as speaker for "M" Night in November.

15. Eddie Stillwell moved that all reports be adopted at the close of the reporting period. The motion was carried.

16. Mildred Cowan spoke to the W.M.U. report emphasizing the slogan "Come Grow With Us."

17. Jack Hinson reported on the Missions Committees work. He announced the World Mission Conference that would be held in September of 1985 and urged all churches to begin to prepare for it.

18. Eddie Stillwell moved that all reports given in the first session be adopted. The motion was carried.

19. The budget for the year 1984-85 was presented by Trenton Connelly.

20. Hardin Nicholson made a motion to amend the budget by adding \$200 to the secretary's salary and to delete the money for the radio program.

Tim Burleson made an amendment that each item of the budget be considered and voted on separately.

A vote on the procedural motion carried and each item was discussed separately.

21. The motion to delete the \$500 item for the radio program was defeated.

22. Each item in the budget was voted on and passed including the motion to raise the secretary's salary \$200.

23. The 1984-85 budget for the amount of \$33,327 total was passed.

24. Dean Coward gave the financial report for July 1, 1983 to June 30, 1984.

25. Robert Blanton presented a resolution (See copy). A motion to cut off the debate on the resolution was made. The motion was carried.

The resolution carried with 67 voting for and 50 against.

26. Joe David Fore made a motion that an apology be sent to the Reverend Sue Fitzgerald from the association.

The motion failed.

27. Ray McCall made a motion that the slate of officers as presented in the Book of Reports be adopted and that the names of Ina Turpin as Assistant Clerk and Camilla Sisti as Musician be added and that any vacancies appearing on the list be filled at a later date. The motion carried.

28. Robert Blanton moved that the Committee on Committees list as presented in the book of reports be accepted. The motion carried.

29. Robert Blanton called attention to the suggested changes to be made in the Constitution and urged the messengers to read these changes before the second session of the meeting.

30. Nancy Sherrill presented the report on the Vacation Bible Schools. The report was approved.

31. Tim Burleson presented awards to those churches having the most Baptisms during the year and to those having the lowest Baptismal ratio. The Johns Creek Baptist Church was awarded both of these certificates.

32. Tim Burleson announced that in April 1986 all churches would be involved in conducting revivals.

He moved that the churches in the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association participate in these revivals. Motion was carried.

33. The Moderator announced an attendance of 203 messengers with 39 churches represented.

34. The Mount Pleasant Church Youth Choir under the direction of Ted Anderson brought a message in song.

35. The Reverend Carl Smith, pastor of the Pine Creek Baptist Church brought the message using scripture from the book of Ephesians.

FRIDAY, AUGUST 17, 1984

36. The Moderator, Johnny Enloe called the second session of the 155th Annual Associational meeting to order at 9:00 a.m. in the Moses Creek Baptist Church.

37. Harry Vance led the messengers in singing "Amazing Grace."

38. Dillard Moore, pastor of the church, brought a devotional using II Corinthians 10 as scripture.

39. Robert Blanton reported on the work of the General Board calling attention to two important items that came up, namely: the budget for the Convention and a recommendation from the Search Committee for an Executive Secretary for the North Carolina Baptist State Convention.

40. Don Taylor brought the report for the Christian Action League. He spoke of the value of a uniform drinking age - 21 years. The Lottery bill being defeated by a very narrow majority. Pornography and the lack of action on this issue by the State; the need of getting a commitment from the legislature delegates, if we are to stop the use of State funds for the purpose of abortion. He said that all we needed to be defeated was to do nothing. He distributed copies of "Tomorrow."

41. Luther Osment brought a message on the Baptist Children's Homes, stressing particularly the proposed Moody Farm Ministry project. He closed his remarks with the quote "Inasmuch as you have done it unto the least of one of these, ye have done it unto me."

42. John Reid gave the report on Truett Camp. He recognized Trenton Connelly, Mildred Cowan, and Jack Robinson, who had served on the administrative staff of the camp this summer. Each gave a brief testimony of the work they did, the needs of the camp and the outcome of their work.

43. Roy Smith brought a timely message on missions, the work that was being done for the mission work in West Virginia and the Togo relationship. He urged more giving for missions and the urgent need in the mission fields.

44. Calvin Knight spoke on the Baptist Hospital and the new work that had been added. He spoke of the need for financial support on a stronger basis, pointing out how the Baptist Hospital received its portion of the money from the Cooperative Program. The counseling ministry is growing and requires more financial support. The benevolent fund needs increasing.

45. Gene Sauls told of the change in names for the "Homes for the Aging." This agency is now known as the North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc. There is an urgent need for expansion in this agency.

46. Jack Hinson spoke for the Hospital Chaplaincy program. The report is recorded in the Report section.

47. Charles Carnes gave the Time, Place and Preacher Report. See report in the Report Section of this publication.

He recommended that in 1985 the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association hold the Friday session on Friday evening rather than on Friday morning in order that more of the "working" people could attend. This was made in the form of a motion. The motion carried.

48. Robert Blanton presented the proposed changes in the Constitution. All changes were agreed upon except the new addition to ARTICLE XIV - Director of Missions job description which would have been SECTION 5 - Grievance Procedures. Each of the sections were discussed and voted on separately. All carried except the Grievance Procedure. When the motion was made by Robert Blanton that this section be added, the motion was seconded. Jack Hinson made an amendment to the motion that Matthew 18:15-17 be used in settling grievances. Amendment passed.

After some discussions of the original motion, Hardin Nicholson moved that the Section 5 Grievance Procedures be tabled. The motion carried.

49. John Reid presented a gift to Johnny Enloe for his faithfulness and efficiency in serving as Moderator for a period of two years.

50. Robert Blanton presented the following Resolutions:

Whereas Moses Creek Baptist Church exercising its legitimate rights as an autonomous Baptist Church took exception to the inclusion of Rev. Sue Fitzgerald on the Associational Program and as one who would speak on the Associational Program scheduled for their church . . .

And, whereas Moses Creek Baptist Church, as was their right, appraised the Tuckaseegee Baptist Associational Moderator of their decision to deny Rev. Sue Fitzgerald the opportunity of speaking in their church during this session of the Association . . .

And, whereas the Associational Program Committee acting in what they felt was the best interest of associational harmony requested that Rev. John Reid, Director of Missions, travel to Mars Hill, North Carolina and inform Rev. Sue Fitzgerald of the action of Moses Creek Baptist Church . . .

And, whereas Rev. Sue Fitzgerald has for the past several years spoken to the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association without any controversy; has for almost three decades served in one of our Baptist Colleges (Mars Hill) with great distinction; has provided for the small churches of Western North Carolina one of the finest curriculum libraries for church programming; and has been invited to speak to over 100 churches in Western North Carolina . . .

And, whereas the actions taken in the current situation have proven to be a public embarrassment to some of our Baptist people and contrary to the policies of some of our member churches . . .

I move that the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association present this motion as a formal statement to the Rev. Sue Fitzgerald indicating that the decision to deny her the privilege of speaking did

not and does not reflect the position of all of the churches of our association on the matter of the ordination of women, their role in the work of the local church and their right to follow the leading of the Holy Spirit in giving their lives in ministry.

The motion to present the resolution as a formal statement to the Rev. Fitzgerald did not carry.

It was suggested that individual churches might sign and send the Resolution to Sue Fitzgerald at their own discretion.

50. Johnny Enloe presented the gavel to Eddie Stillwell, the incoming Moderator.

52. Harry Vance led the group in a song.

53. S.J. Waters, pastor of the Shoal Creek Baptist Church, brought the message using Thessalonians 5 as his text.

54. The 155th Annual session of the Tuckasegee Baptist Association was adjourned to enjoy a delicious noon meal served by the host church - Moses Creek.

Director of Missions Report

1984

I am now well into my third year as Director of Missions. Let me take this opportunity to thank you for the support and encouragement that you as an association have given me. You have made me feel welcome as you have opened up your hearts and your lives and permitted me to share with you the things God has laid on my heart.

There are many roles I have to fulfill and activities that I must help plan, promote and facilitate. I consider myself first and foremost a preacher. The thrust of my preaching has been to encourage and to challenge the local church to be the church that is pleasing to God. I have preached in more than half of the churches since my last annual report. My most frustrating part of the work is my inability to get around to as many churches as quickly as I would like. I delight in every opportunity to visit churches and to teach Sunday School or to preach. Another part of my responsibility is that I am an administrator - coordinating the planning and implementation of associational programs and maintaining adequate communication for associational action, activities and working relationships. Each month Mrs. Hoyle and I prepare breakfast for the Pastors' Conference. Recently Mildred Cowan and the W.M.U. and Mrs. Hoyle and I planned a Pastor and wife luncheon to honor Pastors' and their wives. I have helped the Evangelism Committee plan for the Evangelism Conference. I planned the Stewardship Conference for the pastors this spring. I assisted Burdette Robinson in the Sunday School Enlargement Campaign. I helped with the planning and preparation of the float in the Sylva and Cashiers Christmas Parade. I helped plan for the annual Christmas party. I have received hundreds of phone calls and have sent hundreds of letters to church leaders, pastors, denominational workers, and others in communicating associational activities.

I have also served as a consultant with churches. I have worked with Pulpit Committees, have been called upon to be pastor to discouraged and frustrated pastors, to offer advice concerning buildings and decor, to help churches who struggle with internal problems, and answered questions about denominational programs and emphasis.

I desire to serve more as a mission strategist helping churches individually and collectively identify mission goals and then develop plans to meet these goals. I've worked with W.M.U. groups, given programs, hosted tour groups desiring to see the Baptist Center, and conducted a weekly radio program. The thrust of the radio program is to teach the Sunday School lesson encouraging participation and study in Sunday School and to interview local, state, and Southern Baptist Convention agency leaders on items of importance and concern. The radio program has been a faith ministry. One church, Locust Field, has been very supportive in financing one program per month.

Also I have served as a teacher, equipping church leaders in practical skills and Biblical knowledge, interpreting Christian Doctrine in training sessions and group studies, and have been a study leader. I also enjoy teaching the Sunday School lesson in churches. I taught the January Bible Study for Pastors at the Baptist Center. I taught an equipping center in the Cashiers Church.

Significant conferences I attended were a symposium on the Small Church in Oxford, Mississippi; a Director of Missions Orientation to the Baptist Sunday School Board in Nashville, Tennessee; the Southern Baptist Convention in Kansas City, Missouri; and the General Board and Convention Director of Missions staff meetings each quarter.

Last year we adopted and met a challenging budget, the largest in the history of the association. It also was the largest single increase in one year. Most churches responded with increased giving. This year's budget increase is not as dramatic as last year's; however, it is a challenging budget and will require a serious financial commitment to associational work if it is met. We are trying to develop resources through program structures, equipment, and materials that will directly benefit each local church that will support the association as they have the vision of ministering to Jackson County through the association. I commend you for this vision.

Several churches have increased their level of financial support; however, we still have churches who are not giving any financial support or who have not increased their level of giving in several years. If Baptists in Jackson County are to be faithful to the Biblical requirements of ministering to the needs not only of the local community, but also to those outside our own local community we must have the financial support to do the things that are pleasing to God.

We must always keep before us the objectives of the Association. One of these objectives is to promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches. Another is to provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives. That which holds us together is the person of Jesus Christ, His love in us and His working through us to accomplish kingdom dreams in our world. Not always will we agree in method or approach, not always will we look alike or sound alike; but, that which causes us to work together is greater than our individual differences. May it ever be so!!

1984 Annuity Report

The Annuity Board is a story of people helping people. The motto is "Serving Those Who Serve The Lord." The Board provides relief assistance, insurance benefits and annuities to active, retired or disabled Southern Baptist Missionaries, Ministers, their widows and orphans. As the board has grown, a Memorial Fund and an Endowment Department have been added.

Flexibility and variety play key roles in getting good returns from retirement income account investments. The Annuity Board offers four investment funds to Southern Baptist retirement plan members with the option of investing in one or a combination of these funds.

The fixed fund is invested primarily in fixed income assets and they are arranged where the principal is guaranteed. In 1983 the Fixed Fund credited 11.3 percent. The Balanced Fund is invested in several asset categories, including but not limited to common stocks, bonds, and mortgage loans. The investment ratio will change as economic conditions warrant. The Balance Fund yielded an effective annual rate of 17.2 percent for 1983.

The Variable Fund is primarily invested in common stocks. Monthly contributions by units similar to shares in a mutual fund. The short term fund is invested in short-term money market instruments with maturities of 12 months or less. The yield from this fund closely relates to trends in short-term interest rates.

In 1983 we had two more churches adopt the Annuity plan to provide retirement benefits for their pastor: Yellow Mountain and Locust Field. We now have 18 churches involved in this plan.

Churches employ a pastor. They should adequately compensate him for his service. Part of each compensation plan should include a retirement and a protection section. Even though a pastor may not serve one church for all of his life, he will be serving other churches. Seventy percent of our churches are bivocational. It is very possible that a man could serve five or six or more churches in this association over a 20 or 30 year span of time, retire, and not draw any retirement because churches don't participate in the Annuity program. It is the responsibility of God's people through the local church to care for God's servant.

1984 Associational Deacons Report

The Deacons and Pastors with their wives met four times during the past year. The July meeting was held with the Sylva First Baptist Church. The speaker was J.W. Hutchen, from the Baptist State Convention. He talked on Evangelism. Our October meeting was hosted by the Old Savannah Baptist Church with 62 present. The Reverend Eddie Deitz brought the message. A special feature was the singing by the True Spirits quartet of Sylva.

The January meeting was hosted by the East Sylva Baptist Church with 126 present. The Scotts Creek Church quorted rendered the special music on this occasion. Brother Harry Vance received special recognition for his many years of faithful service in the Lord's work.

Our April meeting was hosted by the Ochre Hill Baptist Church with 105 present. The Lockridge Family Evangelistic team presented the program. It was a great blessing to all those present.

1984 Baptist Children's Homes

Often our mountains are called "The Land of Four Seasons." In relation to Baptist Children's Homes our area is soon to become the land of four residential services for needy boys and girls.

Our lead service will continue to be the ministry provided by Broyhill Baptist Children's Home at Clyde. The beautiful chalet style cottages clustered around the lake, nestled in our mountain cove, provide one of the loveliest settings to be found anywhere in the world. This year approximately seventy-five children have been served in this beautiful facility.

Our second program of residential care is the Maternity Home in Asheville. More than thirty girls will be served through this redemptive ministry this year.

As indication of the quality Christian care provided is the commitment of the caring staff. The regular houseparents are Frances and Alvoid Foxx of Brevard. In spite of their Maternity Home schedule the Foxxes still maintain such a close relationship with the Turkey Creek Baptist Church in Brevard that Alvoid continues to serve as an active deacon.

With all of our lovely facilities an even greater asset is our dedicated Christian staff.

Our third residential service is emergency care at Haywood Cottage on the Broyhill campus and Thermal Belt Baptist Youth Shelter in Forest City. At both of these facilities a child can come in at a moment's notice and be cared for while things stabilize at home or while a long-term placement is being arranged. The stresses of our day have made this ministry the most in demand of all of the services we offer.

Now our fourth residential service is on the horizon. This will be a ministry for children who have suffered unusual degrees of abuse and neglect making the intensity of life on a campus, with numbers of children, difficult. Moody Farm Ministries in Macon County is being developed especially for those boys and girls.

Currently we are at thee task of raising \$500,000 to complete the first stage of construction, and we project that by October 1985, we will have children in care.

In the "Land of Four Seasons" these four residential services are there for needy children because of our wonderful Christian friends who have been "instant in-season" meeting the needs.

1984 Baptist Foundation Report to Associations

In the midst of our attention to space exploration, adventures of science fiction personalities, and the real-life exploits of astronauts, the lovable character, "E.T." was born. He became the object of our sympathy and affection, as well as the source of revenue for his creators. For the North Carolina Baptist Foundation, the letters "E.T." have taken on another and especially significant meaning during the year 1983-84. The most exciting new idea was the creation of the Endowment Trust - Everybody's Trust. It is now possible for practically every adult in our churches to participate in sustained support of Baptist work through a perpetual trust. Each of us wishes we *could* continue our witness forever. We know that we *should* plan for such continuing witness. And now each of us *can* participate in permanent support of our particular Baptist interest.

The Endowment Trust you create may be started with as small a gift as \$25.00. You may add a tax deductible gift to it as often as you wish, in whatever amount you wish. When the principal attains a minimum which you predetermine, (usually \$1,000), then the income earned is distributed to the Baptist cause which you have also predetermined. The income will be paid every year, after year, after year - forever!

The potential?

If friends of just one-half the members of our churches who die each year should place their memorial gifts in Endowment Trusts to honor those persons, we could increase the support base of Baptist work by six million dollars each year!

If 1,000 of us with vision should honor retiring pastors or faithful church leaders, or recognize the birthdays of venerable members with Endowment Trusts, that would place one million dollars in trust for Baptist causes!

If those of us who shop and search for a meaningful gift for parent or other loved one should give them, instead, a trust in their name, we would instantly make available millions of dollars for mission outreach!

One example is worth a million descriptive words. Just a few months ago, a widow in Thomasville created an Endowment Trust in memory of her husband. Her initial gift was \$100. At Christmas, she and her children added to the Trust. As this report is being written, five checks totaling \$300 to be placed in the Trust have arrived from this family "in memory of him on Father's Day." Surely a more loving and significant gesture is difficult to find. Each of us has equal access to such joy!

The impact of the E.T. Trust, and the increasing awareness that we each have a responsibility for the eternal use of our material resources, has caused Baptists of North Carolina to give this past year through new trusts, designated additions to existing trusts - income which is all paid out to Baptist causes or annuitants - was over \$534,000 last year. A half-million dollars distributed, much of it in the name of persons no longer living here on earth!

Rapidly increasing, and very evident in this past year, is the service rendered as executor of estates and through exercising power of attorney. This is a service which the Foundation happily affords and which will soon be expanded when a staff person will be assigned this responsibility.

No author of science fiction generates more excitement than you who make commitment of self and substance for the Lord's work - forever! The Foundation exists to help you discover ways to demonstrate your own commitment through planned stewardship of those resources which you leave after life on earth ceases.

1984 Baptist Hospital

During the past year Baptist Hospital admitted 24,577 patients for a total of 218,735 days of patient care. There were 211,547 outpatient clinic visits and 31,930 visits to the emergency room. Surgical procedures totaled 11,816 including 700 open heart operations and 20 kidney transplants.

Several clinical advances during the past year serve as examples of the hospital's quality of care. (1) Neurosurgeons have developed a new procedure for treating head injuries which has resulted in our having the lowest mortality rate for patients with this type of injury of any major medical center in the world. (2) Improvements in perinatal care with special emphasis on prevention of preterm labor have resulted in a lower infant mortality rate and in a 15 percent reduction in the number of babies in Forsyth County needing to be admitted to the intensive care nursery. (3) A new treatment offers relief without surgery for many patients suffering from ruptured vertebral discs. (4) Many patients with kidney stones should benefit from the use of new equipment being acquired in the section on Urology. It uses ultrasound to break up stones of the urinary tract so that, in many instances, surgery is not necessary.

The School of Pastoral Care during the past year provided clinical pastoral education to 276 ministers through 47 clinical-pastors programs. Chaplains in the Department of Pastoral Care made more than 33,000 visits to patients, families of patients, and hospital staff. The department also provided more than 20,000 hours of pastoral counseling at its various centers in Winston-Salem, Fayetteville, Raleigh, Morganton, and Charlotte. This program was supported in part from gifts through the Cooperative Program which amounted to \$515,556 during the past year. Dr. J. Dewey Hobbs began his work on March 15 as the new director of the Department of Pastoral Care.

The hospital received \$351,801 through the North Carolina Missions Offering during the fiscal year. A total of 418 patients received financial assistance on their bills through this fund. These bills ranged in size from \$20 to \$21,000.

The trustees, staff and especially the patients at Baptist Hospital are deeply grateful to the Baptist churches for their continuing support.

The Biblical Recorder

History was made last year when the *Biblical Recorder*, fourth oldest of the 35 state Baptist papers in the Southern Baptist Convention, celebrated 150 years of Baptist papers in North Carolina. And history was made again in 1984 when for the first time in more than 72 years, the *Recorder* moved into its own building, becoming the fourth state paper to have its own building.

In February 1912, the *Recorder* moved into its own building in the heart of Raleigh. In July 1984, the paper moved into its own building in the middle of one of the fastest growing areas of the Capital City. Coming to Raleigh in 1838 from New Bern, the *Recorder* is the oldest business in Raleigh and exceeded in terms of operations in Raleigh only by Brown-Wynne Funeral Home which began in 1836.

The business of the *Biblical Recorder* is the Lord's business! Since it was founded by Thomas Meredith, the Baptist paper of North Carolina has been committed to the advancement of the Kingdom of God as Baptists coordinate their resources to spread the Gospel to the ends of the earth. The purpose of the *Recorder* is to inform, indoctrinate, enlist, inspire and provide a forum for unity in the fellowship as we fulfill the Great Commission.

For the third consecutive year, subscription rates will NOT be raised. In 1982, a gigantic increase in the cost of second-class postage (260 percent) necessitated the increase in subscription rates but now that the rates have moderated some (they are still 80 percent higher than 1981) and the new *Biblical Recorder* Building was entered debt-free, the paper will hold the line on subscription rates. We want to make it as easy as possible for churches to send the paper to every family.

Never has there been a greater time than now when Baptists needed to be well informed. There is so much misinformation, exploitation and manipulation in our time that Baptists need a source of news that can be trusted to present facts as they are available and apply them to the betterment, not the harm, of Baptists.

There are tensions in the Baptist family, partly produced by the world conditions in which we operate, and Baptists need a forum where differing views can be expressed. Many so-called Baptist papers provide only one point of view; they do not permit an exchange of ideas and perspectives. The *Biblical Recorder* does and must always serve all the Baptists of our fellowship.

"Every true Baptist believer a faithful *Recorder* reader" sounds like an impossible dream but we have set that as a goal for the ministry of the paper which from its beginning was designed to serve the cause of Christ by serving all of His people not just a limited few. We are grateful for the support we have received across the years and request your continued prayers, support and readership. We continue our march toward making the *Biblical Recorder* the best state paper in the Southern Baptist Convention. Tar Heel Baptists deserve no less!

Department of Christian Citizenship Education

The work of Christian Citizenship Education has centered on two types of activities: voter participation and legislative information. Voter registration and turnout remain low. In the May primaries, for example, only about a third of the North Carolinians of voting age went to the polls. This Department had encourages Baptists to register and to vote by making available a bulletin insert, used in more than 300 churches, which supplied necessary information and encouraged participation. The Legislative Information Network has continued to provide reports on the work of the General Assembly to about 800 contact persons in churches throughout the state. The legislature met briefly in early persons to redraw several of the state's legislative districts in ways the General Assembly convened for its regular short session, at which time the budget during the short session went for education, primarily as salary raises for teachers and other personnel. A Moral Concerns Rally in the South Roanoke Association helped alert Baptists to the growing menace of legalized gambling.

World hunger continued to be a matter of concern to many Baptists. Once again June was designated as World Hunger Month in North Carolina. The Council made available bulletin inserts, posters, hunger banks, placemats, giving guides, and pamphlets, in addition to world hunger offering envelopes. North Carolina Baptists' response to hunger took on two new forms this year. First, the NC/Togo Partnership channeled some of our financial contribution and the efforts of a host of volunteers into an exciting missions effort to help some who are hungry and thirsty in the small West African country of Togo. This Partnership will continue for another two and a half years. Second, the NC Hunger Fund began to give assistance to churches and associations combating hunger here at home. Already this money has been used in exciting and worthwhile ministries, helping for example, to provide hot meals for the elderly in Belhaven and to make food available to migrants in rural parts of Wake County. North Carolina Baptists, like those across the Southern Baptist Convention, continue to give increasingly large amounts to help the hungry, but so much remains to be done. While our giving in 1983 was the highest ever (and is running even higher thus far in 1984), the average Southern Baptist's gift was less than 75 cents for the entire year.

Christian Higher Education

Christian Higher Education is alive and doing well in the Baptist Colleges and Universities of North Carolina. We had 4,602 pupils enrolled in undergraduate studies with many more enrolled in the graduate programs. But even with the good number we now have enrolled, there are reasons for Baptist as well as all private schools to be continually aware of the enrollment situation.

Our churches are urged to promote a Baptist College Day either on February 19 or February 26, 1985 to make students and parents aware of the many benefits available on one of our campuses.

Life is never still with Baptist Colleges. This past year has seen feasibility studies at both Chowan and Wingate.

At Wingate a study has been underway for some time now to determine if they should put in a graduate program.

Chowan has just chosen to remain a Junior College since they are now recognized as one of the finest Junior Colleges in America.

This year Baptist Education will lose one of its finest friends to our employment when Miss Grace Yow, secretary to the Council on Higher Education retires on August 31, 1984. Miss Grace, as she is affectionally known, has served several years in her present position. She will be greatly missed.

There is one other interesting thing to note at this point. Mary Gowan, whose father was pastor at Lovedale, and whose mother served as Secretary in our associational office is now Dean of Women at Wingate College.

There is a piece of legislation before Congress at this time which is giving private schools a great deal of concern. The legislation is know as HR 5490 in the U.S. House of Representatives and as S 2568 in the U.S. Senate. This legislation could very well take away much of the independency Baptists have believed in.

If any of our Baptist folks wish to know more about this legislation, you may talk with your General Board member, Robert Blanton, for more details.

1984 Church Training

A key Leadership Conference was held at the Webster Baptist Church for Church Training on September 12, 1983. Seven Church Training Directors from the local churches attended.

"M" Night was held on November 21 at the Ochre Hill Baptist Church. 205 people attended representing 15 churches. A special singing from all the choirs of the Association was a special feature. The Reverend Johnny Enloe, pastor of the Scotts Creek Church, was the speaker. The Long Branch Church won the banner, with an attendance of 56 people.

Two banners will be given next year (1984-85); one for high attendance and one for the highest percentage of persons attending Church Training during the year.

I attended the Bold Growth Team Training Conference at Fruitland on January 20-21, 1984.

On February 13, 1984 The Doctrine of the Holy Spirit was taught by the Reverend Mark Corts at the First Baptist Church in Sylva. Seventy-eight attended the course.

I have visited with several churches during the year and hope to visit all of the churches during the coming year.

This past April we held an Associational Evangelism Conference. We invited Dr. Vance Havner to come and be our guest speaker. The service on the first evening will be an evangelistic rally, the invitation to be given by Dr. John Bisango, First Baptist Church, Houston, Texas. A goal of 8,000 professions of faith has been set for that one service. Make plans NOW to attend and to bring your lost people!

If your Evangelism Committee can help your church perform its evangelistic task, please let us know. We respect your autonomy and will come only upon YOUR REQUEST. Our purpose is to serve. Use us if you need us.

Historian's Report

The year 1983-84 was filled with programs and activities. Many of these were new, with a few being revitalized and some continuous. The key leadership was especially active in most of the programs. The Key Leadership Conference held September 12, 1983 at the Webster Baptist Church provided training and enthusiasm for the work and pointed out the duties of each leader. This conference was well attended. The enthusiasm and dedication of the leaders permeated the committee work throughout the year.

The Evangelism Committee under the leadership of Rev. Tim Burleson not only encouraged evangelism in the several churches but brought a highlight to the program in the form of a two day Evangelism Conference led by Dr. Vance Havner.

Burdette Robinson and his ASSIST team conducted a Sunday School Enlargement Program that was participated in fully by the Scotts Creek, Sylva First, Cashiers and Green Creek Churches. Several churches participated on a part time basis. As a result of this, Sunday School enrollment was increased as well as a new interest created in Sunday School work. The ASSIST presented leadership training in several churches.

Kathleen Buchanan had two interesting meetings relating to the North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc. Hugh Starnes brought three members from the Home in Asheville to a covered dish dinner. The visitors told of their life in the Home. Another event called "Harvest Day" was a planned trip to the Home in Asheville carrying canned goods, fruits and vegetables to the Home. These activities resulted in current knowledge of the Home and how it functioned and a closer relationship with the association.

Singings under the direction of Harry Vance drew large crowds, resulting in good fellowship and entertainment. The feature was so popular that requests were made for the singing to be repeated. The first singing was held in the East Sylva Baptist Church. After that initial one the association was divided into districts with singings scheduled for each district.

The Monday morning pastors' conferences were changed from 10:30 a.m. to eight a.m. with breakfast. These meetings were held at the Baptist Center.

"M" Night which has been an annual event for several years was held at the Ochre Hill Baptist Church. A large enthusiastic crowd attended. Instead of giving just one banner for the largest attendance on "M" Night, an additional banner for the best percentage of attendance at the training sessions in the churches throughout the year was added. Norman Parris is the chairman for Church Training.

A Christmas party for pastors and their families proved to be an outstanding first. Fun and fellowship prevailed throughout the evening.

For the first time an associational float was entered in the Christmas parades in Sylva and Cashiers. A committee did the decorating of the floats. Kenneth Crawford provided the "float body" and the tractor to pull it.

In February a doctrinal study "Send I You" was held at the Sylva First Church. This drew a large crowd not only from this association but from surrounding associations. Dr. Mark Corts taught the class.

In May a Pastors' Appreciation dinner was served at the Baptist Center to approximately 90 pastors and their families. In the fall the Director of Missions, John Reid, encourage each church to have an appreciation day for its pastor. Several churches did this with very gratifying results for both the pastors and their congregations.

During the early summer a supper meeting for the vocational pastors was held at the Baptist Center. The speakers for this occasion were Dale Holloway and Corbin Cooper. Enthusiasm and interest were so good that plans are now being made to reactivate the vocational pastors fellowship meeting.

The individual churches in the association experienced a period of growth in both physical plants and in spiritual knowledge. Balsam added a fellowship hall, a baptistry and classrooms, a pastor's study and organized a W.M.U. After the building additions were completed they held a dedication service. The church also ordained a man for the ministry, Charles Hesterly, and licensed Herman Conner.

Cullowhee Baptist Church granted a leave of absence for their pastor and wife, Jack and Sara Hinson, to become members of an archeology team digging in Israel. On their return they presented a program of their experience.

Jarrett Memorial started an outreach program with Vincent L. Sisti as leader. Kenneth Crawford was serving as interim pastor at that time.

Long Branch paid off its church debt and added new tile to the floors.

Lovedale enthusiastically went to work on their new sanctuary. They are planning to have this project completed for dedication on Homecoming Day on September 16, 1984. The Reverend Forest Blankenship served as interim after Joe Coker resigned. They called the Reverend Roy Cable as pastor in August.

Moses Creek held its 65th anniversary celebration. The congregation has added a fellowship hall and made many improvements in the church building. They have added new carpet, upholstered the pews, improved the lighting and air conditioned the building. Dillard Moore is the pastor.

New Hope added an addition to the building, added new carpet and bought adjoining land for expansion in the future. Both the building and acreage were dedicated at a special service. Earl Holden is the pastor.

Ochre Hill added a lower level to the fellowship hall. It is complete with a kitchen. J.D. Griffin is pastor.

Rockdale Church held a ground breaking for a fellowship hall. Mike Farmer is pastor.

The Tuckasegee Church purchased a new piano and organ for their sanctuary. Everett Wilson is pastor.

Scotts Creek repainted the trim on the church and Sunday School building. Johnny Enloe is pastor.

Unity Church has done some work on their building, added new lights and dug a well. Steve Webb is pastor.

In the Baptist Center is displayed the photos of the Directors of Missions for the association up to the present. A file of annuals was enriched by a gift from Ina Turpin of old annuals. The office now has copies of most of the annuals from 1890-1983. Old annuals of any date are still appreciated and will be filed for use.

The Baptist Center also has a section of the entrance hall covered with a large map of the association with each church and its pastors' name pinpointed.

The Promise Land Baptist Church was constituted and has applied for admission to the Association. The church is now serving its watch care period of one year. Among the new pastors in the Association are David Mull, Jack Robinson, Tommy Ashe, Dennis Burrell, Roy Cable, Tony McCall, Davis Hooper, Kenneth Pressley, Johnny Ray Davis, Joe McDowell, J.D. Griffin, G.K. Crawford, Jerry Massey, Billy Stiles, John Jenkins and perhaps others whose names were not reported.

The associational year came to a close with the largest attendance and church representation over a one year period of time. The Tuckasegee and the Moses Creek churches served as hostesses. Certainly the Baptist people of the Tuckasegee Association are endeavoring to live within God's will.

Several problems have arisen within some of the churches. Where there is progress and growth there must be "growing pains." When the pain is such that it causes hurt, it is sad. There were some problems in some churches that related to the Resolution passed by the Southern Baptist Convention pertaining to the ordination of women. We still strive for unity and cooperation so that all Christians can work together as brothers.

1984 Hospital Chaplaincy Program

Twenty-seven churches, fourteen individuals and one community service group gave \$8,132.02 to the current expenses of the Chaplaincy Program. This is an increase of \$1,931.30 over the previous year - an all-time record high for the Chaplaincy Fund.

The Chaplaincy Foundation has grown from \$30,000 of last year to approximately \$60,000. Let it be remembered that only the interest from the Foundation can be used for current expenses. The Board of Trustees of the Hospital has the responsibility of investing the funds of the Foundation.

The Chapel Library continues to be used by the patients. From their remarks it is evident that the library is meeting a real need. "Volunteers" and others are helping in this service.

July 18, 1981, a worship service began by means of closed circuit television. The service is taken into every room on Sunday at 9 a.m. The Chaplain, in person or by videotape, seeks to bring a message of comfort and hope.

May 27, 1984, the Hospital Chapel was dedicated as the "Stella Hennessee Chapel." Mr. Hennessee has been most generous and influential in his support of the Chaplaincy Foundation.

Three thousand nine hundred seventy-one (3,971) patients passed through the hospital from July 1, 1983 through June 30, 1984. This is an average of 331 patients per month. What a privilege! What a challenge! What a stewardship - the churches of Jackson County will one day be called upon to give an account.

1984 Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina

Through this annual report, I want to share with you some of the events and activities that are blessing the lives of residents through the special people who are giving unselfishly of themselves to the ministry of the Baptist Retirement Homes. Heading the list of special people are you - North Carolina Baptists. From October 1983 - April 1984, you gave 26.3 percent of the Homes total income through your Cooperative Program, North Carolina Missions Offering and special gifts. This support covered 77 percent of the Homes' benevolent care ministry. Benevolent care projections for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1984 are running at about \$1,000,000. Mission gifts, it appears, will fall short of the need by some \$250,000. During the 1983 fiscal year, mission support was \$306,000 less than the need. Currently, approximately 40 percent of the residents in the five Homes are able to cover their full cost of care. As you can see, your mission gifts are vital to the benevolent care ministry of the Retirement Homes. The 1983 change in the Homes' Cooperative Program allocation greatly added to the support which you have given.

To operate effectively a \$2.2 million ministry takes a diverse group of individuals looking from many different perspectives at financing, planning, upkeep, development, etc. One special group of these individuals are the Trustees whom you have elected. These 20 individuals are your voice in the overall operations of the Homes' ministry. Numerous major

decisions have been made by the board in the last several months. These decisions have launched a Capital Funds Campaign - "A Call To Remember . . .", revised admission policies, secured consulting services to reevaluate the total operations of the Homes. Members of the Trustees are comprising a Search Committee to locate my successor upon my retirement in October, 1985. In an effort to more effectively depict the ministry which the Homes are rendering, the Trustees voted to change the Homes' name to the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina Inc. The name change was approved by the Convention during the 1983 session. I'm grateful for each of our Trustees.

Operating expenses for the Homes' ministry increased approximately 3 percent during the 1983 fiscal year. Currently expenses are running 3.6 percent ahead of the same period last year. The 220 Baptist Homes' employees are responsible for such a modest increase.

During the past months, another group of important people have come together for a special purpose and work in the life of the Retirement Homes. For the first time in the Homes' history, a state-wide Capital Funds Campaign has been undertaken. Fred Lovette, retired President and Chairman of the Holly Farms, had given unselfishly of his time to pull together key leaders across North Carolina to formulate an Advisory Team and leadership people to raise 2½ million dollars through the "A Call to Remember . . ." Campaign. Gifts to this fund will be used to renovate and update the Hayes Home facility. This includes a new kitchen facility, support facilities for the Nursing Care Unit, and improvements to the grounds of the Hayes Home Campus.

Long term care of older persons mean just that. Life expectancy figures indicate that the Homes can anticipate providing approximately 8 years of care for 80 year old residents. Also, the growing segment of our population is the 65 plus group.

The Homes' 33 year heritage has been marked by the deepest concern and the most genuine of Christian love for the older persons who have made their "homes" in the Baptist Retirement Homes. Our future is as bright as the promises of God Himself and the love and support that you give as North Carolina Baptists.

Sunday School

As we approach the final year of "8.5 by '85," the Southern Baptist emphasis to enroll 8.5 million persons in Sunday School by September 1985, many gains have been made in our convention, our state and our association.

The latest figures show the Southern Baptist Convention having an enrollment of 7,815,443 through the Sunday School. This is the highest in the history of our denomination. Figures from 1983 showed our association with a Sunday School enrollment of over 4,800, the highest in over ten years.

The theme for the 1984-1985 Sunday School year is to "Reach 5 in '85." While it can be used in setting church, age-group and class goals, it is to be a personal challenge to each member and leader of the Sunday School to enroll five new Sunday School members in the study of God's word during the year.

There have been a number of highlights in 1983-1984 associational Sunday School work led by a capable ASSISTeam (Associational Sunday School Improvement Support Team). The team:

- led the training for Sunday School Directors provided at the Associational Key Leadership Conference, September 12, 1983.
- led a Curriculum workshop for Cullowhee Baptist Church on December 1, 1983.
- attended training for ASSISTeams at the "Send I You" conference on January 30, 1984 and publicized attendance of local church leaders at the evening conference that same day.
- assisted in the study of the new "Understanding" Books at First Baptist, Sylva, April 29, 1984.

- held a Pastors-Sunday School Director Workshop on May 21, 1984.
- held meetings on August 20, November 12, January 7, March 5, and on June 9 for planning of 1984-1985 associational Sunday School work.

A highlight of the year was our Associational Sunday School Enrollment/Enlargement Campaign on October 15-23, 1983. Four churches participated the entire week (Scotts Creek, Greens Creek, Cashiers and Sylva First). Five churches held one-night rallies on improvement of the Sunday Schools in their churches (Lovedale, East Sylva, Shoal Creek, Cullowhee and Webster).

Report of Youth and Campus Ministries

Four Caswell Weeks, with the theme "Run in the Son," involved over 3,500 young people. Special conferences for youth ministers and the beginning of a coordinated convention youth calendar are other projects undertaken in 1983-84 by Rick Traylor. A drama conference, youth council retreats, resources for local ministers and specific consultation with several associations are other emphases within the total scope of Youth Ministries. Our job in this way is to help the churches do their work more effectively.

In Campus Ministry you as North Carolina Baptists expect us to minister on your behalf AND to serve as consultants with some of those who work with students from within the local church. Baptist Student Union can be found on campuses from Cullowhee to Murfreesboro, in residential settings like Appalachian or Duke or Gardner Webb and in commuter institutions such as Wilkes and Central Piedmont and Davidson Community College. These students raised more than \$40,000 for missions, learned and practised evangelism and personal witnessing, worshipped, studied the Bible, found ways of serving others in their spiritual, social and intellectual lives.

Joe Clontz is beginning in July, 1984 his work as coordinator of volunteer ministries on campuses in the Central area of North Carolina. Geneva Metzger will spend 1984-85 in Japan, learning to work more effectively with students from a local church perspective and to serve and understand internationals. Joe David Fore will sharpen his skills in Biblical studies, ministry with engaged couples and enabling of volunteers before he assumes the position of facilitator of ministry in the Western area in June of 1985. Sheree Smith and Wanda Kidd will serve as interim campus ministers at UNC-G and WCU respectively. Seminary interns at ECU, UNC-CH, and ASU will major in outreach and increase the depth of our ongoing programming. All these persons will need your prayer in a special way in the fall of 1984.

A Student Convention at Ridgecrest in late September will focus on our Christian family and emphasize missions. A special conference for International Students is scheduled for Charlotte in November. Hundreds of students from a score of campuses will go into churches for youth revivals or special church-wide programs. NC students will be part of a major Missions Conference in Nashville in late December. Perhaps the most important dimension of our work in Christ's name and on your behalf, however, are the day-to-day conversations and regular programs on a local level which emphasize prayer, churchmanship, ethical decision-making, world issues in Christian perspective, personal stewardship or commitment and life-planning.

Constitution

(Revisions: August 16, 1957; August 16, 1975; August 19, 1978; August 17, 1979; August 15, 1980; August 13, 1982; August 17, 1984)

ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of the body shall be the Tuckasegee Baptist Association.

ARTICEL II - OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the association are as follows:

1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.
2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.
3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.
4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.
5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

ARTICLE III - AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. The association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline.

SECTION 3. The association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

ARTICLE IV - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the New Testament.

SECTION 2. The association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watch care of the association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watch care the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the association except those of voting.

Applications for membership shall be presented to the Credentials Committee of the Association. The applications will consist of a letter from a Constituted Church stating their desire to affiliate with the Tuckasegee Baptist Association. The Credentials Committee as a part of the review process may invite the requesting church to a conference to discuss its history, its missions strategy, and any other information that may be pertinent to the application. The Credentials Committee may then approve the application and recommend them to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee may by a simple majority vote accept to the requesting church to come under the watch care of the association for one year. It is suggested that any church under watch care participate in the missions program of the association. At the end of the year the church may be voted in as a member of the association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the Annual Meeting of the association, provided that the church submits an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. Any church may withdraw from the association at its pleasure and should notify the association of this action in writing. Such action will be recognized by the association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the associational clerk, before each annual session, and annual letter, the forms provided by the associational clerk giving the information requested as its applicable to each church situation.

SECTION 5. The association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such vote is to be taken by written ballot.

ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The association should hold its annual sessions on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in August. Special meetings of the association may be called by the Executive Committee provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by four messengers. Churches with more than 100 resident members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for each additional 50 resident members as determined by the church or fraction thereof and not to exceed 10 messengers from any one church.

SECTION 3. Churches are requested to elect their messengers and alternates in conference to attend the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the question is decided as to which party is in union with the association. The decision is to be made by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS

SECTION 1. General officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, and Assistant Parliamentarian, Program Leaders shall be Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Chairman of Evangelism Committee, Seminary Extension Director, Chairman of Missions Committee, Director of Missions, Trustees, Pastor Conference President, Youth Director, Stewardship Director, Vacation Bible School Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Deacons Chairman, and such other officers as the Association may desire to elect.

Associational representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: (1) Truett Camp, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Baptist Hospital, (4) North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc. (Homes for Aging), (5) *Biblical Recorder*, (6) Christian Education, (7) Annuity Board and other representatives as may be deemed appropriate and elected by the association.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the director of associational missions and trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The moderator and vice moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of trustees the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service the trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session with the exception of the treasurer and clerk who will serve from October 1 through September 30 (the financial year).

SECTION 3. The director of associational missions shall be sought and recommended by the Executive Committee in a manner of its own choosing. Within 10 days after locating a nominee, the Executive Committee shall present the name of the director nominee to a called meeting of the association. If the annual meeting of the association is scheduled within 60 days, the presentation shall wait until that time.

The call shall be indefinite. The salary, allowance, vacation, etc. shall be as provided by the current budget or adjustments recommended by the Executive Committee in consultation with the Finance Committee.

Concerning termination of employment, the resignation shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least 30 days before it is to take place. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving 30 days notice in advance.

The Executive Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the work of the Director of Missions in planning, promoting and financing his work.

ARTICLE VII - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The Moderator shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the association.

He shall appoint the Committee on Committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the Committee on Committees in its regular report.

SECTION 2. The Vice Moderator shall assist the moderator and shall preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the moderator.

SECTION 3. The Clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; shall prepare a "Book of Reports" to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

The clerk shall mail to the clerk of each church in the association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the state convention. This form is to be returned to the clerk of the association not later than two week prior to the meeting of the body.

An Assistant Clerk shall work with the clerk in preparing "The Book of Reports."

SECTION 4. The Treasurer shall receive and dispense by the order of the Executive Committee of the association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report to the association at each session.

An Assistant Treasurer shall be elected to assist the treasurer by request and to serve in the event the Treasurer resigns or is ill or unable to function.

SECTION 5. The Historian shall keep the records of the association up-to-date.

SECTION 6. The Parliamentarian shall upon the request of the presiding officer of the body advise and assist the association with respect to all matter involving parliamentary procedure.

An Assistant Parliamentarian shall be elected. The Parliamentarian and Assistant should always communicate with each other to ensure that their office is filled at each associational annual or Executive Committee meeting.

SECTION 7. The Program Leaders and the Institutional Agency Representatives shall perform all duties customary to their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the association.

SECTION 8. The Director of Missions shall work closely with the associational committees, officers, and churches in such a way as to facilitate the meeting of the objectives of the association as set forth in Article II.

The director shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the association. The director shall communicate with the state and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

The duties of the director of missions shall be set forth in Article XIV.

SECTION 9. Trustees have no authority except by direction of association, and not personally bound by their signatures but, are to be the legal signees for the association.

Trustees represent the association in legal matters.

Trustees act on behalf of the association in acquisition and disposal of associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the association.

All persons dealing with the trustees, as associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the association moderator and clerk.

ARTICLE VIII - RULES OF ORDER

The business of the association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

ARTICLE IX - QUORUM

The annual associational quorum shall be not less than 25 percent of the member churches represented.

ARTICLE X - THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the general officers and program leaders elected by the association and the pastor and one member from each church in the association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an associational officer or program leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the association on matters arising when the association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the last Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the moderator with a one week notice to the churches.

SECTION 3. All vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

SECTION 4. In the event that a vacancy occurs with the trustees, the Executive Committee should fill such a vacancy for the remainder of the term.

ARTICLE XI - ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The term of office for all committee members shall be for one year except where specifically stated otherwise.

SECTION 2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the general meeting all standing committees as set forth under Article XI.

SECTION 3. THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members. To this group the directors of Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and Music Ministry will be added.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers, program leaders and institutional/agency representatives. These nominees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior to presenting of their names at the annual session.

SECTION 4. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE, composed of three members shall plan the annual program of the association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July meeting.

SECTION 5. The **CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE** shall be composed of three pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of churches seeking admission into the association in keeping with Article IV, and make recommendations to the association.

It shall counsel with churches that are out of harmony or fellowship with the association.

SECTION 6. The **PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE** shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

SECTION 7. The **RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE** shall be composed of three members appointed by the moderator at the first session of the annual session. It shall be the duty of the committee to present suitable resolutions at the annual associational meeting.

SECTION 8. The **MEMORIAL COMMITTEE** shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the annual meeting of those listed by the

member churches as deceased since the last annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in their memory.

SECTION 9. The **FINANCE COMMITTEE** shall be composed of six members including the treasurer of the association. This committee shall: (a) Present a budget to the association for the following year; (b) Devise plans for raising the funds for the association budget; (c) Audit the finances and financial records of the association twice annually and anytime there is a change of treasurer or at the direction of the association or the Executive Committee; (d) Report all audits to the annual association meeting.

SECTION 10. The **CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE** shall be composed of three members and shall perform all duties specified in Article XV.

SECTION 11. The **ORDINATION COMMITTEE** shall be composed of five designated pastors and all other pastors who desire to sit with the committee.

a. The committee serves in an advisory capacity only and serves at the request of the church from which one of the members is seeking ordination.

b. The committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the church as they feel led.

c. The committee should assist in arranging the proper service of ordination when such assistance is requested.

d. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee.

e. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee, and shall give two weeks notice in which the committee is to do its work.

SECTION 12. The **EVANGELISM COMMITTEE**. The duties of the committee shall be to direct and promote a perpetual program and spirit of evangelism in the association. It shall arrange and direct all associational wide evangelistic activities.

SECTION 13. The **MISSIONS COMMITTEE** shall be composed of six members, two named each year and each serving for a three-year term. Committee members are eligible to be re-elected for one additional term of office in succession. The associational Brotherhood Director and Woman's Missionary Union Director are to serve as ex officio members along with the Director of Missions and the Moderator.

The duties of the Missions Committee shall be to plan, conduct and evaluate the mission program of the association through: (a) Helping churches commit themselves to being ON MISSION in their setting; (b) Provide and interpret information on mission needs to the churches of the association; (c) To survey the mission needs to be found within the association; (d) Assist churches in doing mission work; (e) Conduct the kinds of mission work that individual churches cannot successfully conduct.

SECTION 14. The **BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE** shall be comprised of three members. The committee shall be responsible for and in charge of the upkeep and repairs of the associational building, grounds, and equipment.

ARTICLE XII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL

The **ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL** shall be composed of the Director of Missions, the Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the program leaders: Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, the Chairman of Deacons, the Chairman of Evangelism Committee, the chairman of the Missions Committee, the Chairman of the Finance Committee. The Director of Missions is to serve as chairman and a secretary shall be elected from the group.

The purpose of the council is to coordinate the planning of the various programs of the association, to develop an associational calendar, and to give mutual support to the various organization and program units in carrying out their assignments.

The council shall meet quarterly.

ARTICLE XIII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL PASTORS' CONFERENCE

The Associational Pastor' Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist ministers of the association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

ARTICLE XIV - DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS JOB DESCRIPTION

SECTION 1. FUNCTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS. He is to be the chief administrative officer of the association. He is to confirm extra employment in a manner agreed upon with the Executive Committee.

SECTION 2. RELATIONSHIP OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS.

1. He is employed by the Executive Committee of the association.
2. General supervision of the personnel and program of the association as they function through the association office.
3. Work primarily with (pastors), associational general officers, committees, and organizations.
4. Work closely with auxiliary organizations (such as W.M.U., Baptist Men, etc.).
5. Lead in maintaining relationships with state and S.B.C. agencies and promoting their programs.

SECTION 3. In the churches, extending the local ministries.

To visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders in the pastorless churches to provide assistance in the church program and ministry, such as (1) Pulpit supply; (2) Study courses; (3) Missionary address; (4) Deacon's meetings; (5) Assembly programs; (6) Special day addresses; (7) Ordination services; (8) V.B.S. planning and promotion; (9) To interpret phases of associational work; (10) Budget planning; (11) Building planning; (12) Revival meetings; (13) Stewardship emphasis; (14) Study objectives and long range planning; (15) Studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, constitution and bylaws, etc.; (16) Church-community surveys, etc.; (17) Promoting a world missions concept; and (18) Publishing of a regular news medium (such as a monthly newsletter); (19) Cooperate with the news media to promote Baptist work.

In the associational office:

- a. Personal correspondence, promotional mail, and telephoning pertinent to his work.
- b. Office conferences, answer to inquiries, etc.
- c. Assist associational officers, committees and heads of organizations to get out promotional mail pertinent to their work.

SECTION 4. Schedule of Benefits

1. His salary shall be
2. His fringe benefits shall include
3. His schedule shall include:
 - a. One day a week, chosen at his discretion, shall be reserved for rest that excuded normal associational activities.
 - b. A maximum of four weeks each year outside of the association for special work with local churches or with state and S.B.C. agencies.
 - c. An annual sick leave of 26 days maximum, with a maximum of 42 days to be accumulated. Sick leave may be advanced by the association for one year without Executive Committee action. Sick leave is to be recorded with the financial secretary of the association.
 - d. Two weeks annual vacation with pay.
 - e. Holidays: New Years' Day; Easter Monday; July 4; Labor Day; Thanksgiving Thursday and Friday; Christmas, December 25 and 26.
4. All honoraria from churches inside or outside the association and all honoraria from other religious work shall be his personal fair, and shall not be submitted to the association.
5. The Director of Missions is afforded the opportunity of an annual evaluation by the Moderator and Missions Committee.

ARTICLE XV - AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Constitutional Committee at least 10 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.

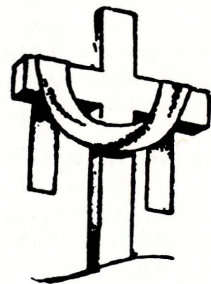

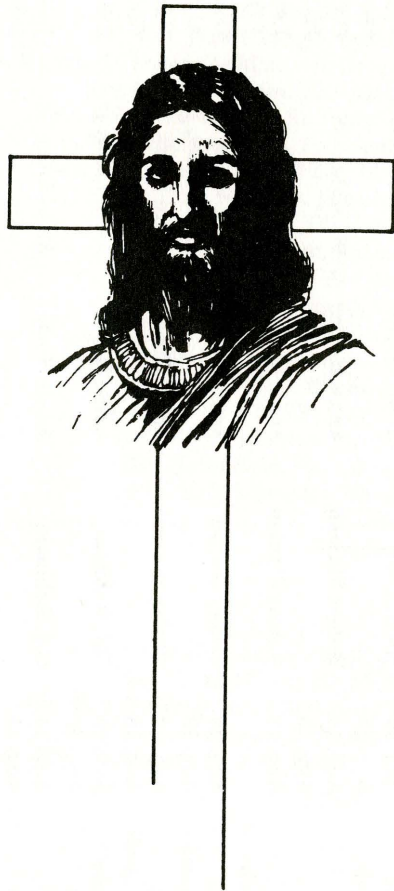
