The Eastern Association convened per appointment.

The Introductory Sermon was preached by Elder A. C. Dixon. of Chapel Hill, from Matt. xx, 7.

The Moderator announced that after an intermission of one

hour the Association would convene for business.

After dinner, the body was called to order by Moderator Stewart, who opened services by reading Psalm 127. The congregation sung a hymn and prayer was offered by Elder J. N. Stallings.

Resolved, That we endorse the effort which is now making to endow with \$20,000 the Chair to be named the "Pritchard" Chair, and that we pledge ourselves to work and contribute for its com-

pletion.

Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed to direct the prosecution of the work in our Association.

Laid on table till 3 o'clock this evening. Elder Kennedy presented the following resolution:

Resolved, That we approve the present plan to raise a sufficient and permanent endowment for the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and commend to the liberality of our brethren the effort to raise in this State the sum of \$25,000, as North Carolina's part of that endowment.

Laid aside for consideration this evening.

On motion, the regular order was suspended, and the above

resolutions were taken up for discussion.

Elder R. H. Griffith explained the condition of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary, and made an appeal in its behalf.

Further remarks made by Elders J. D. Hufham and C. E. Taylor, and, on motion, the resolutions were adopted.

The due order was suspended and the letters from 1st and 2d

Churches of Wilmington, and Canaan, were read.

On motion, a committee was appointed to name delegates to other Associations. Committee: J. W. Taylor, J. M. Wooten and George Highsmith.

The report of the Executive Committee was presented.

Pending its adoption, its consideration was set aside for other

Committee on Religious Exercises reported as follows: Elder J. D. Hufham to preach in the Methodist Church, at 3 o'clock this. evening; Elder J. W. Taylor in Academy, same hour.

On motion, adjourned till 1:30 o'clock this evening.

Evening Session.—Association called to order by Moderator, who read Psalm 23, and Elder R. C. Sandling offered prayer.

Leave of absence was granted for remainder of session to Brethren Stephen Wells and J. M. Wallace. Bro. William Glisson obtained leave of absence for remainder of session after to-day.

Elder Ivey's resolutions in reference to Wake Forest College were taken up. Remarks by Elders R. H. Griffith, C. E. Taylor, F. H. Ivey, J. D. Hufham and the Moderator.

On motion, the resolutions were adopted.

On motion, the Moderator was made Chairman of the Committee on Endowment Work. Committee: Elders J. L. Stewart, J. B. Taylor, F. H. Ivey, W. M. Kennedy and Bro. J. W. Lane.

Leave of absence was granted Bro. J. S. Bizzell remainder of

session.

Consideration of Executive Committee's report being in order, on motion, the rule was suspended and an opportunity was given Bro. Hobgood to present the cause of Raleigh Female Seminary. The claims of the School were briefly presented.

Report of the Executive Committee was briefly discussed by Bro. B. Oliver, Elders J. D. Hufham and W. M. Kennedy. Again

laid aside.

Committee on Religious Exercises reported as follows: Missionary Sermon in Baptist Church, to-night, by Elder R. H. Griffith; preaching in Methodist Church by Elder C. E. Taylor; prayer-meeting to-morrow morning, at 9:30 o'clock, in Baptist Church, conducted by Elder R. C. Sandling.

On motion, adjourned till appointed hour to-morrow. Prayer by Elder J. T. Albritton; benediction by Elder C. E. Taylor.

Wednesday night, Elder R. H. Griffith preached the Missionary Sermon from Acts xiii., 2.

Thursday Morning, October 5, 1876.

Prayer-meeting conducted by Elder R. C. Sandling.

The Association was called to order by the Moderator. Roll

called. Proceedings of yesterday read and approved.

An invitation was extended to visiting brethren. None reported. Elder Kennedy stated that Bro. W. B. Hocut was suddenly called home last night, on account of his family, and had gone; he therefore moved the Brother be excused. The request was granted. Elders J. W. Taylor and R. C. Sandling were granted leave of absence the remainder of the session.

Report of the Executive Committee again considered. It was

adopted.

#### REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive Committee of the Eastern Association beg leave to submit the

following report:

DEAR BRETHREN: -- We commenced operations at the beginning of the last Associational year with about \$175.00. We have collected, during the time, about \$510.00, and expended about \$700.00. We owe about \$20.00, which amount is due us, and will probably be collected at this session of the Association. We have had in our employment, as Missionaries, Elder W.B. Knight, for the whole of his time, and Elder J.R. Oliver, for one-fourth of his time. We have contributed to the support of Elder G. S. Best, at Trenton, and Elder W. M. Kennedy, at Beaufort, up to December last, and Elder R. C. Sandling since that time, at the latter named place; also, Elder J. B. Barlow, at Peru, in Onslow. Elder J. R. Oliver reports one addition and increased interest at Union, Lenoir county. Elder Best reports six additions and good congregations at Trenton, also fair attendance at Nethercutt's School House, where he has preached occasionally. Elder Sandling reports a great interest at Beaufort, during the year, with 37 additions. Elder Barlow reports 5 additions at Peru. Elder Knight has done very efficient work in his field, and reports very favorably of all his places. Churches have been constituted at White Oak and Rose Hill. Elder Knight reports 22 baptized at White Oak, 5 at Piny Grove, 29 at Enon and 6 at Rose Hill.

From the reading of the letters, you have already learned that several of those Churches have earnestly petitioned that he be again sent to them. He cannot supply all the points that are calling upon him for preaching. We think we have great reason to rejoice for what has already been done, and we are much encouraged to go forward in the further prosecution of this work. Less than twenty years ago there was not a Missionary Baptist Church in Onslow county. To-day there are six Churches, which are almost self-sustaining, besides three outposts calling for regular preaching; and the most of this work has been accomplished within the past five years. We feel that we have done all in our power with the means at our command, and would urge the Association to earnestly endeavor to do more in the missionary field. Two missionaries could supply all of the places that are calling for the "Bread of Life." While some of our Churches have not fully redeemed all of their pledges, yet we are convinced that this is the surest means of raising funds we have ever tried, and recommend the same course to be adopted at this ses-Respectfully submitted,

sion of the Association.

Committee on Education reported. Discussed by Elders Ivey and Griffith and Bro. Joseph W. Taylor. Report adopted.

Amount collected for Education Fund, \$57.85.

## REPORT ON EDUCATION.

The Committee on Education report, that inasmuch as considerable time and discussion have already been given to this subject during the present session of this body, they deem it unnecessary to do more than to urge upon the brethren a more cordial and general support of those moral and religious educators that have hitherto received their endorsement—such as the ministry of the Word, the Sabbath School, the "Biblical Recorder," "Kind Words," the High Schools and Colleges in the State that are carried on in the interest of our denomination, and the Theological Seminary at Greenville, S. C.

The wrecks of intellectual greatness stranded upon the shores of time and perdition, warn us against intellectual culture apart from moral and religious training. Thankful to God for so many facilities for the right education of our sons and daughters, let us strive to perpetuate them and augment their power. The impoverished condition of our people renders the general canvass of the claims of these approved educators an imperative duty and necessity. Wealth, one of the chief sources of power, is, at least with our people, a thing of the past. For this reason, we must rely not so much on the rich few as on the poor many, to keep our educational forces moving, so as to increase their Respectfully submitted.

#### REPORT ON OBITUARIES.

The Committee on Obituaries beg leave to report that, since our last meeting, death has removed from our midst some of the most faithful and earnest workers belonging to this body. Elder Alfred Guy died at his residence, in Duplin county, on the 26th of May last, aged 71 years. In his youth and earlier manhood, he was much given to the pleasures of the world, and enjoyed a sort of pre-eminence among his acquaintances for his utter disregard of the claims and restraints of religion. He was an open scoffer. It was not until he had reached his 40th year, that he became the subject of renewing grace. He immediately began to work for Jesus, but with many struggles and misgivings. The Executive Committee of this Association at once sent him forth as an Evangelist, in which work he continued several years with most gracious results. Advancing years and the demands of the Churches, drew him into the pastorate, in which relation he was also greatly blessed of the Lord. He was mighty in the Scriptures and in prayer. He was a man of great energy, quiet and unassuming in his deportment, and dignified in his bearing; but he was uniformly cheerful in spirit and always easy of access. It was in the pulpit that he appeared to the best advantage. As he warmed with his subject, the whole man was transformed, and the homely eloquence of his appeals to sinners seemed to be irresistible. His sufferings in his last sickness, though long and severe, were borne with that meckness and patience which characterized his whole Christian life. His last moments were calm and peaceful, and we hope he has gone beyond the reach of sorrow, to eternally praise his Redeemer, who died for him and rose again. Let us ever cherish his

memory, imitate his example and strive to meet him in the better world.

## CONSTITUTION OF THE EASTERN BAPTIST

ARTICLE 1. This Association shall be denominated and known as the Eastern Association.

ART. 2. The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's Kingdom among men; and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.

ART. 3. This Association shall be composed of delegates chosen by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to

three delegates, who shall be members of that church.

Art. 4. The delegates from each church shall bear a letter, certifying their appointment, and communicating information relative to the state of the church; Provided, however, That when any church has prepared a letter and through inadvertence the letter fails to be presented, her delegates may be received without its presentation.

ART. 5, The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be annually chosen from among its members by ballot, by a majority of the members voting, and con-

tinue in office until their successors are elected.

ART. 6. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to enforce an observance of the Constitution, preserve order, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion on any question under discussion after others have spoken, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

ART. 7. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record the proceedings of each annual session and superintend their printing and

distribution among the churches.

ART. 8. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches, or collected during the session of this body, and disburse the same as ordered by the Association. He shall also make to the Association an

annual report of the condition of the Treasury.

ART. 9. The Association shall appoint an Executive Committee of seven members, which committee shall have the superintendence of Associational Missions and Colportage. They shall have power to disburse all sums paid by the Treasurer of the Association for the objects under their charge, and during intervals between the meetings of this body to receive and disburse funds for those objects and to take such steps for their advancement as they shall deem advisable, and shall make an annual report to the Association of their doings.

ART. 10. The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of her

churches which neglect to preserve gospel order.

ART. 11. The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats, and extend to them all the privileges of the body except that of voting. ART. 12. The annual session of this Association shall commence on Tuesday after the first Lord's day in October, at such place as may be chosen.

ART. 13. By appointment of the Association, there shall be an Introductory Sermon of a denominational character, and a Missionary Sermon.

ART. 14. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

1. On the meeting of the Association, the Moderator of the preceding session shall preside until his successor is known. In case of his absence, a chairman pro tem. shall be elected.

2. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercises, to be conducted by whomsoever the presiding officer

3. At each daily session, and previous to proceeding to business, the names of the delegates shall be called, and the proseedings of the previous daily sessions read.

4. The members shall observe towards the officers and each

other that courtesy which becomes christians.

5. Any member wishing to speak shall arise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid personalities.

6. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without permission.

7. All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer before discussion

8. No motion shall be withdrawn after its discussion.

9. When a question is under discussion, no motion or proposition shall be received, except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, or postpone indefinitely, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they

10. After a motion is decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a reconsideration.

11. No member shall absent himself during the session of the Association without permission of the presiding officer, and no one shall take final leave of absence without the permission of the Association, and if any shall do so, their absence shall be noted in the minutes.

12. All questions, except such as relate to the Constitution, shall be decided by a majority of votes

13. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted to consideration.

14. The Rules of Order may be altered or amended at any session of the Association by a majority of votes.

Call for Petitionary Letters. 4. Appointment of Committees.

5. Appointment of Corresponding Delegates.

6. Reports of Standing Committees. 7. Reports of other Committees.

8. Report of Trustees of Ministers' Relief Society.

9. Report of Treasurer. 10. Miscellaneous Business.

11. Incidental and routine motions shall be in order at any time.

#### RULES OF DECORUM FOR THE CHURCHES.

1. We will hold at least four Conference meetings in the year for the transaction of business; also special meetings whenever requisite.

2. The names of the members shall be called at every regular meeting, and there shall be due notice taken of the absence of those who discover a disposition to absent themselves.

3. At every Conference, the pastor, in his right of office, shall

preside as Moderator; and in case of his absence, the Conference shall appoint a Moderator pro tem., who shall open Conference by

devotional exercises.

4. The Clerk shall keep a church book, in which all the proceedings of the Conference shall be faithfully transcribed, and at every regular meeting the minutes of the preceding meeting shall be read immediately after the names are called.

5. An invitation shall be given to brethren of our faith and order to sit with us in Conference, who shall enjoy all the privileges

of the meeting except that of voting.

6. Every subject for the consideration of the Conference shall be introduced by a motion, which, when seconded, shall be deba-

ted and acted upon, unless withdrawn by the mover.

7. Every speaker shall rise and address the Moderator by the appellation of brother, and shall confine his remarks to the subject under debate, and shall not be allowed to speak more than twice on one subject unless by permission of the Church.

8. No member shall withdraw from the Conference without the

permission of the Moderator.

9. It shall be required that in matters of difference between members, before complaint is made to the Church, the aggrieved party shall have duly attended to the instructions of the Lord, Matt. 18th chapter, 16th, 17th and 18th verses, and public offences or such as operate against the peace of the church, shall be the subject of discipline.

10. All questions submitted to the Conference shall be decided by a majority of votes, except receiving members to fellowship; and any question may be reconsidered upon the motion of any

who may vote in the affirmative.

11. The Moderator shall propound all questions for vote—shall keep the speakers to the subject under debate—may express his own views, after others are done speaking, and see that these rules are faithfully observed.

12. These Rules of Decorum may be altered or amended by a

vose of two-thirds of the whole Church.

Resolved, That this Association recommend the adoption of the foregoing rules to all the Churches that comprise this body.
