REPORT ON ORPHANAGE

The Orphanage is the one vital living department of our denominational work that keeps us in constant touch with the crying needs of our dependent children.

For 39 years this work has been growing until we are now caring for 550 children at Thomasville and the Kennedy Home; and 312 out in the state with their own mothers.

The current fund necesary to maintain the Orphanage is around \$175,000.00 per year, not including buildings and improvements. The contributions of one Sunday in each month from the Sunday Schools, and a great Thanksgiving offering equal to ONE DAY'S INCOME has become the main source of supply. The marvelous way in which the Lord has blessed this big home is a loud call for our continued loyalty. The denomination from mountain to sea has been wonderfully strengthened by the reflex influence of their generous giving to the Orphanage.

The helpless childhood of our state lays upon us the obligation to widen our work and to reach out the hands of help to those who are without a penny, a home, or a friend. And there are hundreds of children in North Carolina utterly destitute who are as worthy and as promising as those who are already enjoying the blessing and protection of the Orphanage. So the task ever widens and we are therefore asking the Sunday Schools and churches of this association to continue to make larger investments in the Orphanage.

Your committee would again recommend:

(1) A monthly contribution from every Sunday School in this Association.

(2) The plan of setting apart ONE DAY FOR THE ORPHAN-AGE at or near Thanksgiving by every man, woman or child in

(3) A club of Charity and Children in the well organized Sunday Schools with an individual copy to as many others as possible.

REPORT ON EDUCATION

The life of a nation depends upon its schools. The value of a school depends upon its ideals; the ideals of a school have their highest worth only as they are Christian. It is the duty of the church to make these ideals dominant in education.

During the past four years we as an association have given our moral support to Mountain View Junior College, and during that time some thirty or more of our boys and girls have received training there. Who can foretell how much this will mean to the churches of this Association? Who can estimate the value of such training which has come without cost to us?

Mountain View Junior College is controlled by Trustees appointed by the following Associations: Alleghany, Brier Creek, Brushy Mountain, Elkin, Stone Mountain, and the Yadkin.

The following faculty has been chosen for this year: J. C. Pow, President; J. S. Johnson, Bible; S. O. Brandon, English; L. B. Martin, Math and History; Mrs. J. C. Pow, Lady Principal; Mrs. De-Alva Rountree, Domestic Science; Miss Helen Craddock, English and History; Miss Ruby Blackburn, History and Science; Miss Eugenia Gray, Music; Mrs. J. McD. Wagoner, Matron.

There are two standard B. Y. P. U.'s and a Y. W. A. There are six ministerial students in school this year, and several volunteer students. The work of the institution is distinctly Christian, and we recommend that we continue to give it our moral support, and when possible our financial help.

REPORT ON GREATEST NEED OF COUNTRY CHURCH

Without any hesitancy your committee begs to submit that the greatest need of the country church today is a mighty coming back to our "first love," and lifting the cause of Christ from a secondary place in our thoughts and lives to the heights of prime importance. The call of the Master comes ringing to us today, "But seek ye first the kingdom of God and His righteousness and all these things shall be added unto you," (Matt. 6:33). Never, never will we do this until we recognize that we are not our own, (1 Cor. 6:19), and then consecrate and yield ourselves to the Lord as did the Macedonian churches spoken of in 2 Cor. 8:1-5.
