After leaving Vietnam, he went to Guam to aid in refugee efforts with Southeast Asian refugees and then to the Foreign Mission Board in Richmond, Va., where he served as research assistant to the director of the Overseas Division.

Served as Field Representative (now called Associate to the Area Director) for East Asia, stationed in Taipei, Taiwan, 1976-80. Resigned as a missionary on Oct. 31, 1980, to join the board's staff in Richmond, Va., as Director of the Mission ary Learning Department, Nov. 1, 1980-May 31, 1985, where he was responsible for the programs of orientation and training of missionaries, auxiliaries and volunteers and missionary development programs. He was responsible for designing the philosophy and concepts for development of the Missionary Learning Center at Rockville, Va., and worked with architects to design it. He became Area Director-elect, June 1, 1985-Dec. 31, 1985, and then Area Director, Jan. 1, 1986-June 30, 1992, for East Asia. He lived in Hong Kong and administered work of missionaries in East Asia. Returned to Richmond as Regional Vice President for Europe, the Middle East and North Africa, July 1,1992-Dec. 31, 1993, administering work of missionaries in the region.

Current assignment: Elected <u>Vice President for Creative Leadership Develop-</u> <u>ment</u>, effective Jan. 1, 1994, following a staff reorganization. Assigned to the office of the Senior Vice President for Overseas Operations, he leads in developing church growth strategies overseas, evaluating FMB training programs for overseas personnel, and evaluating board involvement in leadership training of national Christians overseas.
