

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IN MEMORY REV. R. L. HUGHES 1908 - 1994



Rev. Hughes was a native of Old Fort, North Carolina. After being graduated from the Old Fort High School, he accepted work in the local tannery as Shipping Clerk. A little while later he began serving as both Leather Inspector and Shipping Clerk, and continued for four and a half years in this capacity. Mr. Hughes then secured a job with a grocery chain store enterprise. After five months training he was made manager of a store in Salisbury, North Carolina. At the end of four more years of managing such stores he decided to go into business for himself. It was while operating this business in Swannanca, North Carolina, that the surrender came to preach the Gospel. And so, after four years as an independent grocer, Mr. Hughes sold his business and entered Mars Hill College as a ministerial student.

Brother Hughes' training consists of two years at Mars Hill College, A.B. degree from Wake Forest College, and the Th.B. degree from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Texas. Before his surrender to preach, Mr. Hughes was able to serve his church in various ways. At the time of his call he was serving as Sunday School Superintendent, teacher of a men's Bible class, President of the Brotherhood, and on the deaconship.

While at Mars Hill College, Brother Hughes served as Pastor of the Bethlehem and Catawba Baptist Churches. While at Wake Forest he was Pastor of the Youngsville and Wakefield Baptist Churches. At the Seminary, he pastored a mission church of the Broadway Baptist Church, Fort Worth, Texas. Mr Hughes accepted the call of the Oakhurst Baptist Church, Asheboro, North Carolina. He stayed there until 1976, concluding thirty years of ministry at Oakhurst.

After his retirement, he was interim pastor of Mount Carmel Baptist Church, Troy, North Carolina and the First Baptist Church of Seagrove, North Carolina. He stayed at Seagrove First Baptist for nine years. The church grew in membership and ministry. When he concluded his ministry at Seagrove, the church built a Family Life Building and named it after Rev. and Mrs. Hughes.

During the later years of his life, he supplied in many of the area churches across Randolph Baptist Association and conducted several revivals. He was always active until his health would not permit him to continue. He was faithful until the end of his life.

Rev. Hughes served his denomination and community as a member of the General Board of the Baptist State Convention, Trustee of Chowan College, Moderator of the Randolph Baptist Association, President of the Associational Pastors' Conference, Associational Sunday School Superintendent, Associational Chairman of Evangelism, President of the Asheboro Ministerial Association, and Chairman of the Bible Teaching Committee of Asheboro.

Rev. Groce Robinson, former pastor to Rev. Hughes' parents, said of Rev. Hughes, "He was the most lovable man I had ever known. His entire ministry was dominated by love". That is what the people of Randolph County learned of Rev. Hughes during his near half a century of ministry here.

We will cherish the memories, continue to learn to love with the same love Jesus placed in Rev. Hughes' life, strive to build on the same Foundation he built on, and anticipate the reunion when we will be united once again in the presence of our Lord.

On Thursday morning, September 8, 1994, another giant of Christianity and the pastoral ministry took his "chariot ride" into the clouds, leaving behind a "mantle" for many of the ministers of the Randolph Baptist Association to wear with the same dignity and humility. Rev. Robert L. Hughes, 86, who had served churches in the vicinity for nearly 50 years, died after several months of declining health, which had robbed him of the ability to continue what he dearly loved: offering Hope to the people from the Word of Without doubt, there was not enough fanfare to honor God. adequately the imprint he had made upon so many lives. But his ministry was not one of fanfare and show. It was one of consistent pastoral compassion which won the hearts of so many people of the community. Literally thousands can say they were touched by the life of Rev. Hughes.

He had a way of encouraging his loyal supporters to love and support new ministers, to turn to them as they had looked to him. Few ministers are able to retire and remain in the same vicinity without creating conflict or jealousy. With him, the opposite was true. Whenever possible he assisted congregations and new pastors through the inevitable awkward transitions. Many people, both laity and clergy, especially within the Randolph Baptist Association, lost a friend and a mentor at his death. But if we believe the Word of Jesus Christ which Rev. Hughes preached so carefully, he has now received the "fruit of his labors," and is at rest with the Lord.

Constitution and By-Laws Randolph Baptist Association Revised: October, 1990

ARTICLE I - NAME

Section 1. The name of this body shall be known as the Randolph Baptist Association. It may hereafter be referred to as the Association.

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

Section 1. This Association is a self-determining Baptist body, created and sustained by the churches affiliated with her and responsible to them through their Messengers. Section 2. The purpose of the Randolph Baptist Association is to enable member churches, individually and together, as they endeavor to enlarge, strengthen, and enrich the fellowship of God's kingdom at home and around the world through evangelism and missions; and to foster cooperation in the programs and ministries of this Association, the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, and the Southern Baptist Convention, thereby fulfilling the Commission of Jesus Christ as stated in Matthew 28:19-20.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERSHIP

- Section 1. The Association shall be composed of cooperating Baptist churches within the area of the Association. A cooperating church shall be defined as one which sends an Annual Report to the Association, elects Messengers to attend the Associational Meetings, and contributes to the financial program of the Association.
- Section 2. The Association shall be sole judge of it's membership and may receive churches, according to the Constitution and By-laws. Member churches may withdraw from the Association as they desire.
- Section 3. Any church in the Association which fails to cooperate with the Association over a period of two years shall be contacted by the Credentials Committee of the Association to determine the intentions of the church regarding it's desire to remain in the Association. In the event the church does not respond to the efforts of the Credentials Committee, the church will be considered as having chosen to withdraw from the Association.
- Section 4. Any church that has departed from Baptist faith and practices and has failed to abide by the provision of the Constitution and By-laws of the Association, will be contacted by the Credentials Committee. Such church upon recommendation of the Credentials Committee and a vote of the Association shall be placed on probation until the conditions prompting such actions have been corrected. Messengers from any church on probation shall not be allowed to vote in the Meetings of the Association.
- Section 5 Churches desiring to affiliate with the Association shall make a written request to the Credentials Committee of the Association at least three months prior to the Fall Meeting (October),

for examination and recommendation to the Association. A church (or mission) is first received into the watch care of the Association. Upon completion of one year in watch care relationship, a church may be received into full membership of the Association by a recommendation of the Credentials Committee. There must be a vote of two-thirds majority of the messengers present at the Associational Meeting for petitioning church (or mission) to become a regularly affiliated member church of the Association.

Section 6. It is understood that each church in this Association is independent and sovereign in it's own affairs, and the Association has no authority over the churches, except in an advisory nature, and this by invitation only.

ARTICLE IV - MEETINGS

- Section 1. The Associational meetings shall be composed of Messengers elected by the affiliated churches according to the plan. Each church shall be entitled to three (3) Messengers, including the pastor, and one additional Messenger for each fifty (50) members or fraction thereof, above one hundred in its resident membership, but not to exceed ten (10) such Messengers. The Director of Missions and General Officers shall be Messengers in all Associational Meetings.
- Section 2. The Associational Meetings will be held as follows:
 - The Fall Meeting shall meet on two days, the week following the third Sunday in October.
- (2) The Winter Meeting shall meet in January. All Mission Performance Directors shall be presented by the Nominating Committee for vote by the Messengers at this meeting. In order for the Messengers to have adequate time to consider the nominees for Program Directors, the Nominating Committee will mail a copy to the Messengers two weeks before the January Meeting. They shall be Director-Elect until October 1 when their tenure of service begins.
- (3) The Spring Meeting shall meet in April. All General Officers, Committee members, and Program Council members shall be presented by the Nominating Committee for a vote by the Messengers at this April Meeting. This will give each person selected the privilege to plan and train for the upcoming year. In

order to give Messengers adequate time to consider the nominees, a copy will be mailed to them two weeks before the Spring Meeting. The Summer Meeting shall meet in late July or early August. The Associational Budget for the new year, beginning on October 1 and ending on September 30 of the following year, shall be presented by the Finance Committee for approval by the Messengers of the Association. In order to give the Messengers adequate time to study the budget, the Finance Committee shall mail copies to the Messengers two weeks before this Summer Meeting.

Section 3. Other meetings of the Association shall be held when called by the Moderator and/or the Director of Missions. Before calling a special meeting, a notice of at least two weeks shall be given to the Messengers, with a clear explanation as to the purpose of the meeting. No other business can be considered. A quorum of fifty (50) Messengers must be present to conduct a special meeting.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS AND THEIR DUTIES

(4)

- Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk-Treasurer, and three (3) trustees.
- Section 2. These officers shall be elected in the Spring Meeting in April by the Messengers of the Association. The Nominating Committee will present nominees to the Messengers with the privilege of other nominees from the body. Prior approval and consent to serve shall have been received from a prospective nominee before placing his name in nomination before the body.
- Section 3. The officers of this Association shall serve from October 1 through September 30 of the following year. Any officer may be re-elected with the exception of the Moderator, who shall serve no more than two years in succession.
- Section 4. Duties of the Officers:
 - The Moderator shall preside over all Meetings of the Association, and fulfill such duties as required upon the presiding officer of this Associational body.
 - (2) The Vice-Moderator shall perform the duties of the Moderator in the absence of, or at the request of the Moderator.

- (3) The Clerk-Treasurer shall fulfill the following duties: following duties:
- a. The Clerk shall record and preserve the a. The Clerk shall record and preserve the proceedings of all the Associational Meetings. The Clerk shall distribute the Uniform Church Letter forms to the clerks of the churches affiliated with the Association. The Clerk shall compile the reports and statistics of the churches and issue a book of minutes as soon as is practical after the Fall Meeting.
 b. The Treasurer shall preserve all money
- D. The Treasurer shall preserve all money paid into the treasury, pay the same to the order of the Association, and make a full and complete report of all receipts and disbursements at each Quarterly Meeting, plus a year end report at the Fall Meeting.
 (4) The trustees shall have the authority to transfer or hold title to any properties for the Association. All transactions of the b. The Treasurer shall preserve all money
 - the Association. All transactions of the elected trustees shall be authorized by the Association in it's meetings.
- (5) In the event the Office of the Moderator of the Association shall become vacant, the Vice-Moderator shall immediately become the Moderator for the unexpired term of office without any further action by the
- Association. (6) The vacancies occurring in the office of Vice-Moderator and other General Officers, except Moderator, will be nominated by the Nominating Committee at the next Association Meeting.

ARTICLE VI - MISSION PERFORMANCE ORGANIZATION

- The Association endorses the continued operation Section 1. of organizations among the churches for the promotion and training of the various phases of their work.
- The Directors of these organizations shall be: Section 2. Sunday School Director, Discipleship Training Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Music Director, Evangelism Director, Missions Development Director, Stewardship Director, Family Ministries Director, Christian Life Director, Pastoral Ministries Director and Seminary Extension Director.
- Section 3. These Organizational Directors shall be elected at the Winter Meeting, (January), or no later than the Spring Meeting (April), for a term of three

years. The Directors shall be contacted and nominated by the Nominating Committee.

Section 4. The Directors shall assume their duties on Oct.1, and serve through September 30, or until their successors are elected. They will be Directors-Elect in the Winter Meeting and will have the privilege of training, planning and enlistment of their Council members until October 1.

ARTICLE VII-ADMINISTRATIVE COMMITTEE

- Section 1. The Administrative Committee is composed of the Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk/Treasurer, Chairman of Finance, Chairman of Properties, Chairman of Communications, and the Director of Missions.
- Section 2. If there are major decisions to be made between the Quarterly Associational Meetings, the Administrative Committee will act in behalf of the Association, and will report the actions to the next Quarterly Meeting.
- Section 3. The Administrative Committee will meet as needs arise between the Quarterly Meetings.

ARTICLE VIII - ASSOCIATION COUNCIL

- Section 1. The Associational Council shall be composed of the General Directors of all Mission Performance Programs, the Associational Officers, the Associational Staff, and the Chairman of Finance, Strategy and Communication, and others deemed necessary to attend the Council in planning the work of the Association.
- Section 2. The Director of Missions will serve as the Chairman of the Council. Other officers will be elected in their meetings, such as Vice-Chairman and Secretary.
- Section 3. The Associational Council will conduct at least six meetings per year, at least once every other month. The time and place for the meetings will be set.
- Section 4. The purpose of the Council is to coordinate the overall program and calendar of the Association, and evaluate the progress toward fulfilling the plan. Also, the Council gives guidance to the work of the Director of Missions.

ARTICLE IX - COMMITTEES

- Section 2. Each Committee nominated by the Nominating Committee will begin serving on October 1, and will serve for three years with the terms rotating, so that only 1/3 of the members are elected each year.
- Section 3. Each Committee should have a fair representation of both ministers and lay-persons from every area of the Association.
- Section 4. Each Committee should meet once each quarter to fulfill its duties.

ARTICLE X - AMENDMENTS

The Constitution may be amended at the Fall Meeting of the Association, (October), by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers present, provided the proposed Amendment shall have been presented in written form on the first day of the Fall Meeting and voted upon on the second day, unless requested by two-thirds vote of the Messengers present. ARTICLE XI

The Constitution and By-Laws shall take effect immediately upon its adoption by a two-thirds majority of the Messengers present and shall supercede any and all Constitutions, By-laws and Amendments previously adopted.

BY-LAWS

BY-LAW I - PARLIAMENTARY RULES

<u>ROBERT'S RULES OF ORDER</u>, Latest, revised edition, shall be followed as the Association's rules for conducting the business and assemblies, except as the Association prescribes otherwise.

BY-LAW II - ASSOCIATIONAL YEAR

The Associational Year shall begin October 1, and close September 30.

BY-LAW III - NEW CHURCHES

- Section 1. Any church or mission seeking membership in the Association shall petition the Credentials Committee at least three months prior to the Fall Meeting (October) of the Association. The church shall be studied for it's Church Covenant, intentions, relations to other member churches of the Association, and it's willingness to abide by the Constitution and By-laws of the Association. The Credentials Committee shall report to the Association at the Fall Meeting it's findings and recommendations for Associational action.
 - Section 2. Each church or mission applying for membership in the Association, upon approval, shall be received under the watch care of the Association for a period of one year. Each church received under a watch care relationship, shall submit a Quarterly Report to the Credentials Committee of the Association, and also submit the Annual Associational Letter at the end of the year.

BY-LAW IV - ORDINATION OF NEW MINISTERS

- When a church desires to ordain a candidate for the Gospel Ministry, it may petition the Credentials Committee of the Association for an Section 1. examination and approval for ordination. The Credentials Committee shall work with the requesting church concerning date, time, and other persons forming the Examining Committee.
- Section 2. After the examination of the candidate has been conducted by the Examining Council, a report of it's findings shall be given the requesting church.
- Section 3. Guidelines for Ordination: (1) The Credentials Committee requests that it receive a copy of the minutes, signed by the clerk, of the church conference at which the requesting church voted to request examination of the candidate.
 - (2) The Committee requires that the candidate be called by a church for ministry before requesting examination.
- (3) The Committee requests that the candidate be examined at least two weeks prior to his ordination.

- (4) The Committee shall examine the candidate about his conversion, his call, his priorities, his doctrine, personal and family life. The Committee may also counsel the candidate.
 - (5) The candidate should feel free to seek advice from the Committee regarding any area of the Gospel Ministry.
- (6) In every instance, the Committee shall be guided by the Scripture, especially I Timothy 3:1-7, and Titus 1:5-9.
- Section 4. The Credentials Committee shall provide a written report of the examination of candidates to the Gospel Ministry to the Annual Meeting of the Association.

BY-LAW V - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

- Section 1. The Moderator will preside over the Quarterly and called meetings of the Association. As the presiding officer, the Moderator will open the Meetings punctually, at the appointed time, enforce the rules, preserve the order, and exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer, according the principles of established parliamentary usage. Robert's Rules of Order will be followed. The Moderator, if desired, appoints a parliamentarian to serve at any or all Meetings of the Association during his term of office. This person must be approved by the Messengersin-session. Detailed duties are outlined in the <u>Associational Handbook.</u>
- Section 2. It would be the duty of the <u>Vice-Moderator</u> to discharge the duties of the Moderator in the absence of, or at the request of the Moderator. Details are outlined in the <u>Associational</u> Handbook.
- Section 3. The <u>Clerk</u> will record and keep in permanent form all transactions of the Association and make this information available upon request. Detailed duties are outlined in the <u>Associational Handbook</u>. The Administrative Assistant of the Association will serve as <u>Clerk</u>.
- Section 4. The <u>Treasurer</u> will receive all the funds contributed to the Association and disburse them in accordance with the Budget of the Association, or for which the funds were contributed. Detailed duties are outlined in the <u>Associational Handbook</u>. The Administrative Assistant will serve as Treasurer of the Association.

BY-LAW VI - DUTIES OF COMMITTEES

Section 1. ASSOCIATIONAL MEETINGS COMMITTEE

- This Committee will be responsible for planning and conducting the regular and called Meetings of the Association. They will propose an order of business and enlist all program personnel, and publicize the program to the churches in advance of the Meetings. Detailed duties are outlined in the <u>Associational Handbook.</u>
 This Associational Meetings Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a
- consist of six members, each elected for a three-year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

Section 2. COMMUNICATIONS COMMITTEE

- This Committee will be responsible for communicating the programs, ministries, resolutions, and services of the Association to the churches and to the general public. Detailed duties are outlined in the <u>Associational Handbook.</u>
 The Communications Committee will consist of
- (2) The Communications Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

Section 3. <u>CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE</u>

- (1) This Committee will assist the Association in counselling churches who fail to cooperate with the Association, help churches to meet the qualifications for being properly accepted in the Associational fellowship, and assist in examination of the candidates for the Gospel Ministry upon the request of the member churches. Detailed duties are outlined in the <u>ASSOCIATIONAL HANDBOOK</u>. Procedure for ordination is located in BY-LAW IV.
 - (2) The Credentials Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three-year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. It is suggested that three pastors and three deacons serve on this committee.

Section 4. <u>EXTERNAL RELATIONS COMMITTEE</u>

(1) This Committee will be responsible for establishing and maintaining proper relationships with groups outside the

Association, such as the various agencies, boards, foundations, and other groups affiliated with the Baptist State Convention and the Southern Baptist Convention. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook. (2) The External Relations Committee will consist

of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only one member is elected each year.

(3) Membership will also include the Associational representatives of the various agencies, boards, foundations, and Baptist related groups. These would be eligible for re-election at the end of the three years for another term.

Section 5. FINANCE COMMITTEE

- (1) This Committee assists the Association in securing, administering and reporting its finances. They shall study the Association's financial needs for an adequate program, prepare and present a budget to the Association and report to the Ourterly Association and report to the Quarterly Associational Meetings and a final report to the Annual Fall Meeting. Detailed duties are outlined in the <u>Associational Handbook</u>. (2) The Budget will be prepared and copies mailed
- to the Messengers of the Association two weeks before the Summer Meeting. (July or August). The Messengers will vote on the proposed Budget during the Summer Meeting of the Association. The fiscal year of the Association will be from October 1 through September 30.
- (3) The Finance Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three year term, with terms rotating so that only two members are elected each year. The Treasurer serves as an ex officio member of the Committee.
- (4) The Finance Committee chairman will serve on the Associational Council.

Section 6. HISTORY COMMITTEE

- The History Committee will gather, preserve, and interpret historical records of the Association's life and work. The Committee will make a report at the Fall Meeting of the Association. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- The History Committee will consist of three (2) members, each elected for a three year term,

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with the terms rotating, so that only one member is elected each year.

Section 7. NOMINATING COMMITTEE

(1) The Nominating Committee leads in coordinating the selection of all Association-elected leaders except paid Association-elected leaders except paid personnel. They shall nominate a complete slate of General Officers, Mission Performance Directors, and Council members, and Committee persons. Equal representation should be given from all pastors, staff members, men and women. Detailed duties are

 members, men and women. Detailed duties are outlined in the <u>Associational Handbook.</u>
 (2) The first report of the nominations will be in the January Meeting of the Association in the January Meeting of the Association, in which Mission Performance Directors are elected for training, planning and enlistment of their council members.

- (3) The second report of nominations will be in the April Meeting of the Association which the General Officers, Program Council which the General Officers are elected. members and Committee members are elected.
 - (4) The Nominating Committee will consist of six members, representing all areas of the Association, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year.

Section 8. <u>PROPERTIES COMMITTEE</u>

- (1) The Properties Committee shall have general oversight over all property owned or leased by the Association. It will make recommendations to the Associational Meetings concerning upkeep and improvements of the property. Detailed duties are outlined in the <u>Associational</u> Handbook. the Associational Handbook.
- (2) The Properties Committee shall consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the term rotating so that only one Conversions Inter member is elected each year.
- (3) The Committee shall give a written report to the Fall Meeting of the Association.

Section 9. SEARCH COMMITTEE

(1) The Search Committee will serve only as needed to secure a Director of Missions.

(2) The Committee will consist of one pastor, one layman, one woman, all named by the Nominating Committee, plus the Moderator, and the Chairman of Finance Committee.

(3) The Committee will use the guidelines and duties found in the <u>Associational Handbook</u> for calling a Director of Missions.

Section 10. STRATEGY COMMITTEE

- (1) The Strategy Committee will assist the Association in determining its Strategic Objectives and in staying on course in achieving them. The Committee also shall be available to study change or revisions in the Constitution, and make recommendations as needed. Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.
- Associational Handbook.
 (2) This Committee will work very closely with the Associational Council. The Strategy Committee Chairman will be an active member of the Associational Council.
- (3) The Strategy Committee will consist of six members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only two members are elected each year. Also, two members from the Associational Council should serve with the Committee in determining Annual planning objectives.

Section 11. PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

- The Personnel Committee will consist of three members, each elected for a three year term, with the terms rotating, so that only one member is elected each year.
- (2) The Committee will prepare and update as necessary, position descriptions of all Associational staff personnel, except the Director of Missions, whose responsibilities are described in BY-LAW VIII, Section 1.
- (3) The Committee will survey the need for additional staff positions, recruit, interview, and recommend to the association new personnel with the guidance and approval of the Director of Missions; and when necessary, recommend to the Association the termination of employment of staff personnel.
 - (4) Annual review will be conducted by the Director of Missions to the employees, and employees' differences and grievances may be appealed to Personnel Committee by the individual.
 - (5) The Committee will review annually, salaries, benefits, and make recommendations to the Budget Committee.
 - (6) Detailed duties are outlined in the Associational Handbook.

BY-LAW VII - TRUSTEES

The Trustees will act as the legal agent of the Association. The duties will be to hold title to the property for the Association and to handle the legal matters of the Association, with the Association's foreknowledge and approval; and to comply with the Constitution and By-laws of the body, and with state laws as they affect the Association. Detailed duties are outlined in the <u>Associational Handbook</u>.

BY-LAW VIII - EMPLOYED PERSONNEL

Section 1. DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

- The Director of Missions shall be an officer of the Association. As an officer and general leader of the Association, the Director of Missions shall be an ex officio member of all Committees, Councils, and groups of the Association.
- (2) The Director of Missions shall be elected to this office upon a recommendation of the Search Committee, and by a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers present at a regular Meeting by the Moderator for that particular purpose. Letters of information concerning the prospective Director of Missions shall be sent out to all Messengers of the Association two weeks before the Meeting.
 - (3) The time of service shall continue until terminated by the request of the Director of Missions to the Association, or at the request of the Association, which would require a two-thirds majority vote of the Messengers to the Associational Meeting. Proper notice and explanation of termination shall be provided to or by the Director of Missions and/or the Association.
 (4) The Director of Missions shall promote the director of Missions and and a statement of the director of Missions and/or the Association.
 -) The Director of Missions shall promote the work and ministry of the Association and denomination, cooperating with the churches, their pastors and officers, and Associational Committees and organizations.
 - a. He shall be responsible for planning, promoting and executing the ministry of the Association in cooperation with the Associational Council.
- b. He shall serve as Chairman of the Associational Council, and make an annual report to the Association at the October Meeting.
 - c. He shall seek to visit each church in the Association in order to:

ESL classes are meeting and hopefully a Spanish pastor will be able to be employed by late summer. Eleven churches are giving on a monthly basis, but more money is needed. Blankets, linens, furniture, and household supplies are always needed.

-Dr. Crider made a motion that we receive and reports that were made by committees that we did not vote on previously and this motion carried.

-Dr. Crider read a statement saying that due to the fact that our Constitution states that an officer can only hold one position, Mrs. Retta Plunkett has resigned as WMU Director, effective immediately, and Mrs. Barbara Dawkins is taking this on an interim basis.

-Mrs. Andi Wilson was introduced and gave a word of testimony. Originally she felt that she was called into Foreign Missions service and feels that this CCM position is a step closer to this calling. <u>Sunday School Report</u> was given by Judson Rotan. The four major aspects of Sunday School are Bible Study, Outreach, Evangelism, and Ministries. Today's Sunday Schools are alive across our land. This past year our 43 churches had an enrollment of 76,181 with an average attendance of 4100 or 65%. About 10% of the people in our Sunday Schools do not know Christ. VBS is reaching more than any other organization in our churches. We had one associational VBS Clinic last Thursday night, April 14, and another one will be held May 12 at Liberty First.

Discipleship Training Report was given by Rev. Ron Hester. There are lots of options available in DT. An Associational Team is being put together to go out to your church or to help on an individual level. May 9-11 Gene Lackey will be in our association to share with churches about how to start DT. Six churches have already signed up and more are encouraged to do so soon.

WMU Report was given by Mrs. Barbara Dawkins. There are three upcoming events. On April 25 the WMU Annual Meeting will be held at Ramseur First with Debbie and Dennis Connell to speak. The Camp Mundo Vista Workday is still scheduled for April 30 and all are welcome to come and help out. May 21 is the Camp Mundo Vista 25th Anniversary Celebration. This is scheduled to begin at 10 AM with a Barbecue Lunch. Tickets are needed for this lunch and can be purchased by calling the State Office by May 1.

Brotherhood Report was given by Bobby Poole. The RA Racer event went very well. An Associational Track Meet is being planned for April 30 at SAMS. The State Track Meet will be held at Southwest Middle School May 13-14. An RA Campout is also being planned.

<u>Evangelism Report</u> was given by Mark Sink. The emphasis now is being put on preparation for Here's Hope Revivals which are scheduled for April of 1995. On April 26 at Church Steering Committee Training will be held for 6 representatives from each church. This is will be held at 7PM at Asheboro First. Prayer is needed as we all prepare for these revivals.

The Organizational Reports were approved as presented.

Life Way Counseling Center Report was given by Rev. Ron Chaney. A balance of \$268.49 is in the bank today. Prayer and behavioral response is necessary to bring up this balance. Perhaps churches could take another love offering for this. The original agreement is being redone to make things perfectly legal. In this agreement the center in Burlington is renting our facilities and paying 20% of our expenses per day. About \$350.00 will be sent to us to reimburse us for the expenses used so far. End tables, smaller display tables for literature, a tape player, and a small filing cabinet are still needed.

The Special Committee Report was presented by Dr. Reginald Dawkins. At the last Quarterly Meeting, a recommendation was approved to begin a Resource and Training Center Fund. People are being trained to assist in communication to the churches on what the Randolph Baptist Association is and does. All communications from the churches to this committee are hopefully to be completed and presented at our Annual Meeting in the Fall.

The Communications Committee was given by Rev. Roger Carlson. This committee looks at the newsletter, bulletin inserts, and Associational Emphasis Week (May 16-22) and how to promote it. 14 churches have selected representatives and all the other churches are encouraged to do this also, preferably not a pastor or staff person. 
A motion was made and approved to constitute the sixtieth annual session of the Randolph Baptist Association by Mrs. Retta Plunkett, Clerk.

The Associational Meetings report was made by Rev. Kenneth Tucker to accept the printed order on pages 1 and 26. This was approved as presented.

New Pastors and Staff were recognized by Rev. Judson Rotan, Director of Missions.

The Treasurer's Report was presented as printed on 21-25 in the Book of Reports by Mrs. Retta Plunkett, Treasurer. This was approved as presented.

The Budget Emphasis was given by Mrs. Beulah Tote, Chairperson of the Finance Committee. Our finances are looking much better this





year. Our churches are moving forward so our association should do the same. We need our churches to give 4 1/2 % of their undesignated offerings to the association. The Associational Building is in bad need of renovation. Volunteers are in the process of doing this, but more volunteers and finances are needed for this. A love offering was taken and the amount received was \$257.50.

<u>A motion was made</u> to dedicate the Annual Minutes for this year to Rev. R. L. Hughes because of his support and contribution for many years to our association. This motion passed.

The Clerk's Report was given by Mrs. Retta Plunkett and approved. The History Committee report was given by Mr. Wally Jarrell. He mentioned the 60th anniversary that was celebrated on October 17, 1994 and thanked everyone for their support. The History books are not in yet, but order forms are being circulated and the cost is \$7.00 each. This report was approved.

The Special Committee report was given by Dr. Reginald Dawkins, chairman. This report is printed on page 8 of the Book of Reports and was approved as presented. A committee for fund raising will be appointed by the Moderator in the near future.

Hymn "To the Work" was lead by Boyd Ammerman.

What is God doing through us now? Judson Rotan spoke about our past, our present, and our future. As we learn about experiencing God, we learn to trust Him to show us the doors of opportunity and open them for us. We have caught the vision and walked through these open doors recently.

Ron Chaney spoke on Life Way Counseling Center. Life Way opened it's doors on February 15, 1994 and 322 sessions have been completed from then until September 16, 1994. This report is on pages 14-19 in the Book of Reports.

Bonnie Davenport spoke on the Spanish Mission and that report is on pages 12-13. The Spanish Mission continues to grow and has moved to it's new location in the Activities Building of Balfour Baptist Church. Plans for 1995 include beginning Sunday School, WMU, and hopefully, securing a Spanish pastor. Regular gifts are received from 16 churches with special gifts received from other churches, individuals, mission groups, etc.

Andi Wilson spoke on our Church and Community Ministries program. She started the job on February 1 and has been busy with new avenues of ministry. Nine churches participated in Hope for Hurting Humanity. A mission group came from Oklahoma that included 10 youth and 8 adults. They worked with a Backyard Bible Club at Coleridge Apartments and 15 professions of faith were made. The Home Mission Board and the Baptist State Convention each gave \$750.00 to the Christians United Outreach Center for food. A Community Needs Assessment was recently held with 16 volunteers interviewing people at 20 agencies. An updated Mission Action Guide will be the product of these interviews. A Fall Festival Booth was manned by 40 volunteers giving cups of cold water to individuals. One thousand cups of water were distributed. An ESL teacher training is hopefully going to be held in April of 1995. Disaster Recovery was spotlighted by Dale Morgan, the coordinator. Cedar Grove Baptist Church gave money for the trailer and other money has come in to help with the tools and supplies needed to equip this trailer. This Unit is to be used not only for Disaster Recovery, but also for individual church projects. We need to get more people involved, including women.

Nelson Rowland gave a report on the New York Partnership. There is a financial upheaval in Hew York with leadership leaving, and hurting people there. Mission groups worked with VBS, Backyard Bible Clubs, and did work on the Long Island Baptist Associational Building. Electricians are still needed to finish up there. In May we hope to go Long Island with a team of at least 30 people to work with 10 of the churches there in the Here's Hope Revivals. The first Volunteers in Missions Award was given to Nelson Rowland

in honor of his years of missions involvement.

Boyd Ammerman led in the Hymn "Share His Love".

Boyd sang the solo "Jesus Saves". Ron Hester gave the Scripture from Zechariah 4 and then led in prayer, and gave the Annual Sermon. God simply expects our obedience. He doesn't expect the supernatural from us, but for us to simply be yielded to Him. We are to be the pipeline through which God's message is to flow. We often allow things in our lives to hinder that flow and dim the spiritual light. God is not looking for superstars, but surrendered servants. Kenneth McNeill gave our benediction.

HISTORY OF FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH FRANKLINVILLE, NORTH CAROLINA

The First Baptist Church of Franklinville was organized in October of 1887. Rev. J. B. Richardson was elected as moderator. Most of the members came from the Columbia Baptist Church of Ramseur.

The new church grew because of the faithful work of Pastor Rev. J. F. Moore. Rev. Moore began preaching in the town wherever he could secure a place for the congregation. There was considerable opposition to a new church in town. When they could find no place of worship, a determined band decided to build a place of worship. During the building time, they worshipped in the incomplete building.

The name selected for the first building was Moore's Chapel, built in 1887, honoring Rev. Moore. At this time, a membership of 25 was reached. After the work of other pastors, membership increased to 37 in 1893.

The church was united with the Piedmont Association in 1895. Under the leadership of Rev. Fred N. Day, a genuine revival came to the church and many souls were added. Sunday School rooms were built and growth continued.

In 1919, a new auditorium was built and the name of the church was changed to Franklinville Baptist Church.

In 1934, a meeting for organizing the Randolph Baptist Association was held and Franklinville Baptist, along with other neighboring churches, united, forming the association.

Joe Dan Hackney, an outstanding citizen of the town and member of the church, was very influential in the growth of the church. Mr. Hackney would appear down on the river bank where card playing and gambling were in progress, and witness to those involved.

Rev. Dan T. Hurley was ordained by this church. Rev. Hurley attended Campbell College, Wake Forest, and Southwestern Seminary. He went on to Bucharest, Romania, where after many years of labor he died.

Rev. W. A. Elam, who had served the church twice before he accepted the call, became full-time pastor in 1944. Under his leadership, the church adopted a five-point five-year program which focused on spiritual, numerical, and financial growth. In 1951, the first unit of the educational building was built, then a second unit in 1954, and a third in 1959.

In 1964, Rev. M. A. Pegram was called as pastor. During the years he served, a new parsonage and sanctuary were built. Rev. Dan Wood was called as pastor in 1981. Rev. Kenneth McNeill was called as pastor in 1994 and is presently serving.

First Baptist Church of Franklinville remains a strong Southern Baptist Church with deep roots and a growing desire to impact her local community with the gospel of Jesus Christ.

161 Total Attendance Registered for Both Days HISTORY OF FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH RAMSEUR, NORTH CAROLINA

According to earlier accounts of the history of Ramseur, the church was organized in 1850 by William C. Patterson, who served as pastor until 1853 and again in 1855. Services were first held in a brush arbor. The oldest known church house dates back to around 1855. The church records show that a building was started under the leadership of the Reverend Mr. Patterson during his second pastorate. He died before it was completed.

The church was at first interdenominational. It then joined the fellowship with the Missionary Baptists and became known as the Missionary Baptist Church of Columbia when the town was named Columbia Factory. The church functioned under that name until the name of the town was changed to Ramseur in 1889. The church's name was Ramseur Baptist Church until 1969, when it was changed to First Baptist Church of Ramseur.

The earliest known membership totaled 66. For many years, these members met to worship in a frame building located beside the present Christian Church on Church Street. The old frame building was sold in 1894, and the first section of the present brick building was constructed shortly thereafter.

In 1851, the church drew up a petition for admittance into the Sandy Creek Baptist Association. The church remained a member of this historic association until 1895 when it joined the Piedmont Association. In 1934, the churches of Randolph County organized the Randolph Baptist Association and the Ramseur Church joined along with 20 other churches.

The present congregation is still active in programs of study, missions, and evangelism, seeking to advance God's Kingdom on earth.

LIFE WAY COUNSELING CENTER

Life Way Counseling Center opened it's doors and our hearts to the hurting people of Randolph County on February 15, 1994. Larry C. Willett, Ph.D. (Counseling) started on February 15. Kathryn Kirkpatrick, Psy.D. started on February 21. Carson Sarvis, M.Ed. started on July 19. Life Way is presently open on Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday for appointments.

The agreement between Randolph Baptist Association and Life Way of Graham on the sharing of expenses had to be revised because of some legal requirements. The new agreement is that Life Way of Graham will pay 20% of the expenses of Life Way of Asheboro per day. A day consists of 6 clients. Life Way of Graham is now paying 60% of the expenses for Life Way of Asheboro as well as all of the Call Forwarding expenses on the telephone bills.

We are very pleased with our agreement and commitment with Life Way of Graham. One option that we considered would have cost the Randolph Baptist Association \$8,000.00 for 1 day per week for 52 weeks. That would be costing us now \$24,000.00 since Life Way is now operating 3 days!

There have been 322 sessions completed at Life Way from February 15 - September 16, 1994. Praise our Lord for such results! Our records will reflect more information (see attached sheet) in the future reports. Also included is a copy of our brochure.

Life Way Counseling Center has been blessed to have Kathy Hunt volunteer her services since April 1994. She has been faithful to work every Monday, Tuesday, and Thursday, except for days that she had to take Chemotherapy treatments or that she was not feeling well as a result of the treatments, which have been rare. She has worked regularly and at the hours any paid employee would have, and she has developed a wonderful relationship with the counselors. They admire Kathy very much and feel badly when she cannot be there. Kathy has done everything from answering the phone, greeting clients, typing, filing, and all other office procedures necessary, including vacuuming the office occasionally.

Kathy is a strong Christian and wants to do God's will. She feels that one way to do that is to help others. She is also a CONTACT volunteer and helps in her church activities. She is always looking for a way to reach out to others. She is starting a support group now for people who have cancer. Kathy radiates the love of Jesus and everyone who meets her notices that.

The information we gathered will be presented in the new <u>Mission</u> <u>Action Resource Guide</u> which, when completed, will be available to all churches and/or individuals.

FALL FESTIVAL BOOTH

On Saturday and Sunday, October 1-2, the Randolph Baptist Association had a booth at the annual Fall Festival. Our booth was located on N. Fayetteville St., between Salisbury and Sunset. We provided a place for festival goers to sit down and rest and get a cup of cold, refreshing water!!! We gave out almost 1000 cups of water! DISASTER RECOVERY UNIT

Thanks to you the Disaster Recovery Unit is now in the final stages of preparation, but is already in use, meeting the needs of people

affected by the tornadoes in Lexington, S.C. Seven people from the association left on August 21 where they worked for four days removing trees and other debris so that the people can begin repairs and rebuilding of their homes and lives.

Originally scheduled to go to Albany, Georgia, to assist with flood recovery efforts, we were asked to change at the last minute and go to Lexington. The team joined with others from Region Five (Rowan, Liberty, Central, Piedmont, Pilot Mountain, Dan Valley, and Randolph associations) to form the largest group of recovery workers there.

There was work done on properties of at least twelve individual homes plus a Mobile Home park. The work involved removing trees from homes and property, clearing debris from the lawns, putting plastic on roofs of damaged homes, making temporary repairs on mobile homes, roofing at least one home, etc.

The work was coordinated by the South Carolina Baptist Convention and the Lexington Baptist Association. The team was housed at Northside Baptist Church of West Columbia, and was fed by the Lexington Baptist Church.

This work has given us the opportunity to better evaluate our needs in tools and personnel. We can use people of all walks of life. People with health problems, but are able to do things such as rake yards, move wheelbarrows with light loads, and move small limbs can be extremely useful. We had several women who were extremely useful. We learned that not everyone needs to be able to run chainsaws, or use axes. Volunteers can establish their own pace and rest as needed. So plan to volunteer on the next call and be a part of ministering first-hand to people in need for the reward of a lifetime.

We want to thank every individual and church that has given to this ministry. Two individuals have given of their time and expertise without charge. Louis Brady did the logo and Nelson Rowland has done the interior cabinet and storage bins.

In September of 1992, two Spanish speaking young men approached Stephen and Bonnie Davenport, retired Southern Baptist missionaries who had served 24 years in Argentina, about the possibility of starting a Spanish mission in Asheboro. They were traveling each Sunday to Sanford or Pittsboro in order to attend Spanish services. After much planning, and in consultation with Rev. Judson Rotan, we were finally able to begin services in Spanish. These were held in a building in downtown Asheboro which is owned by Mr. David Stedman, who let us use the facilities rent free.

Balfour Baptist Church was asked to be the sponsoring church. The Mission was able to get financial support from the Language Ministries Department of the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and the MAP program of the Randolph Baptist Association. Fourteen churches of the association are also giving monthly financial support. Services began on Saturday evening, January 2, 1993 with twelve Spanish people present. The work continued to grow with many new people attending each service. Over 182 people have attended at least one time. By December of 1993 the

Many churches have contributed other gifts of money, clothing, furniture, food, paper products, coffee, etc. A doctor and his wife recently donated an automobile. A church near Siler City sent

a gift of \$1000.00 to help the Mission get a new pulpit and two platform chairs. Donations were received to purchase an overhead projector, hymn books, television set, a VCR, 112 new steel folding chairs, as well as a mission van and a piano. God has been good to provide through you and we appreciate all that the churches have done so far to assist in the development of the Mission. The Mission has English as a Second Language classes (ESL) and

these have averaged 20 persons during 1993-94. There are several ladies from several churches in our association who have received training in this ministry and are working as teachers of these

The greatest need that the Mission has now is for a Spanish pastor, one who can better understand their culture and can better relate to these people in their own language, lead in Bible studies and evangelistic efforts. We are hoping that a pastor can be called about December of this year. We will need more financial support from our churches. There are more than 2000 Hispanics in the city There are more than 2000 Hispanics in the city of Asheboro. God has laid the responsibility of ministering to these people, for whom Christ has also died, upon the hearts of

The Mission held it's first services in our new location at 1712 N.Fayetteville St. on September 3, 1994. This is an activities building of Balfour Baptist Church. There were 66 present and 59 of these were Hispanics. God's blessings continue to flow!

SPECIAL COMMITTEE REPORT

In compliance with the guidelines established by the Association and listed below, the Special Committee submits the following:

 Search for possible relocation sites
 It was determined by the Special Committee based on
 the projected size of the associational building
 (3,000 - 3,600 square feet one story) that the land should be three to five acres. Research of land should be three to five acres. several newly constructed associational buildings of similar size confirmed this need. There are those properties of desired size within a three to four mile radius of Asheboro that are available. A sampling of these properties revealed

a cost of \$16,500.00 to \$39,500.00 per acre with several prime locations valued in excess of \$1,000,000.00.

The committee followed the guidelines of the Feasibility Committee which was approved by the association in seeking to find properties that were easily accessible, visible, and adequate for the projected size of the associational building.

2. Examine building designs

As stated, several newly constructed associational designs (one-story) were viewed along with recommendations from the associational staff, organizational leaders, and other persons of the association.

From this investigation and inquiry, it was determined that there would be a need for a 3,000 to 3,600 square foot structure. This committee only examined existing designs which appeared suitable to this association's needs, and did not attempt to draw or have drawn a specific architectural design. The approach of this committee centered upon square footage (one-story) and the property size suggested for such a structure, including adequate parking.

3. Projected land and building costs

As stated, land acreage within a three to four mile radius of Asheboro ranges from \$16,500.00 to \$39,500.00 with several prime locations exceeding \$1,000,000.00.

The present day cost of constructing a 3,000 to 3,600 square foot building varies depending upon the type of structure and materials used. Estimated costs range from \$50.00 - \$80.00 per square foot, with one estimate from \$90.00 - \$100.00 per square foot. There is no way of determining costs a year, two years, or five years in the future.

4. Explore monetary methods of addressing the projected costs The Special Committee, based upon it's research, recommends that in addressing relocation and building construction, a Fund-Raising Committee be appointed to pursue methods of securing funds to purchase property. At the present time there are no funds available to be used even if properties of lesser cost become available. One fund raising method recommended by a member of the Special Committee is as follows:

As of the year ending September 30, 1993 there were reported 8,998 resident members in the association. If

each of these members sacrificed, that is, gave the average price of a "coke", 50 cents per week, it would amount to the following: Per Week 50 cents times 8,998 = \$4,499.00 Per Year \$4,499 times 52 = \$233,984.00 In two years there would be monies available to cover the entire costs of land, building, and furnishings. If only half of the resident members responded it would amount to: Per Week - \$2,249.50 Per Year - \$116,974.00 In approximately 3 1/2 years there would be sufficient funds. Just think! The price of a "coke", 50 cents per week by each resident member or half of the resident members giving, in 2 to 3 1/2 years a new facility which be adequate, accessible, and visible.

The Special Committee believes that a greater understanding of the association as a Training and Resource Center instead of an "Associational Office" is needed. Perhaps, through this awareness, the churches and leadership would catch a glimpse of an even greater positive witness to our faith and ministry to all peoples through a center which is adequate, accessible, and visible.

DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS REPORT 1993-94

As I look back upon this associational year, I am expressing my gratitude to God for His wonderful blessings. We began this associational year in October 1993 with a low spirit across the association and our financial situation was critical. We had to cut programs and events from our calendar. But since January 1994, God's hand has guided and blessed us. The spirit of the association began to rise, finances increased until at mid-year we were about \$4000.00 over the budget needs.

Overall, the year has been good and busy. It is uplifting to remind myself that the wonderful thing about the association is that it is a fellowship of churches working together on mission in our area of the State. Thank God, He has united us as a local body of believers to accomplish His great task in church development, evangelism, and missions. From my perspective, this has been the year where we as Randolph Baptists have witnessed to our communities and world that we want to be on the cutting edge of ministry. God has opened to us several doors of opportunity for continuous witness.

1. The Life Way Counseling Center, a shared ministry of our association and the Life Way Mental Health Associates of Graham, has become a success in just a few months. We started out with one day of counseling and now we are having three and a half days of counseling per week. Since February, when the Center opened, several hundreds of clients have been through the Center. It is a God sent ministry to our area. We are privileged to sponsor this ministry and pray for an even greater witness and success in the future.

2. Our two staff persons began their work in February. Mrs. Retta Plunkett was employed to be our Administrative Assistant, working six hours daily for five days a week. Retta was our interim secretary for seven months until the Personnel Committee was able to re-evaluate the position.

Mrs. Andi Wilson became our Church and Community Ministries Director on a part time employment of twenty hours per week. She has been an added blessing to us as she has moved us into Hope for Hurting Humanity Projects for the summer months. Several churches adopted big projects for the summer. There were many involved in the local mission project that gave a strong witness for Christ. We are ministering to hurting humanity with love and care. There are some exciting days for us as we meet needs in Christ's name. We desire to be on the cutting edge of ministry.

3. The Disaster Recovery Unit is one of the most exciting projects this year. This developed over night, it seems. Several men expressed a concern so we gathered Baptist Men together and shared the concern, and they responded. Today a ten by eight foot trailer is equipped for Disaster Recovery. It has already been used in Lexington, S.C. The Baptist Men and churches gave over five thousand dollars to purchase the trailer and equip it. Again we are ready to be on the cutting edge of ministry.

4. The New York-Long Island Partnership continues to be a blessing. Four teams from our churches ministered in Long Island this past year. The associational building there was completed. Our final project in our partnership next year is the "Here's Hope" Revivals in May of 1995. We will be conducting their "Here's Hope" Revivals with an Evangelist, Song Leader, and a witnessing team of three persons for ten of their churches. This is a place to be on the cutting edge of evangelism and missions.

As to my personal accounting to the association, I have been involved in the following:

1. Served a month each in two of our churches as Interim Pastor. It gave me an opportunity to work with their Pastor Search Committees. 2. I have preached or visited in 23 of our churches.

3. I have conducted one revival and spoken at two homecomings. 4. I have travelled over 12,000 miles across this association for events and activities with pastors, committees, and church meetings.

5. I have participated in 56 committee meetings and continue to teach in Sunday School Workshops, Mission Studies, and Deacon training in churches.

6. Some of the activities outside the association were;

- -Attended Baptist State Convention, Winston-Salem
- -Attended Southern Baptist Convention, Orlando, Fla.
- -Attended the Baptist Sunday School Board Update Conference in April
- -Attended Jericho Mission Week at Ridgecrest
- -Attended and lead a conference during Home Missions Week at Ridgecrest for Directors of Missions. While at Ridgecrest, received the Award for Town and Country DOM of the East -"for significant contribution">
- -Presided over the State DOM Conference at Wingate College as President.

One of the most significant times in our association this summer was the Baptist State Convention General Staff Listening Team coming to our association during the last week in August. Eight persons came and spent three days sharing with us. There was a dinner on Monday night for Pastors and Wives with Dr. Roy Smith as speaker. The team had twenty six interviews with pastors and three area town meetings with church leadership. Also, a luncheon for Church Staff was conducted. They listened and shared with us their findings. We are beginning the process of evaluating what was said and heard. In the next several months we will be working with the Associational Council and the State Listening Team to implement the priorities of concern and needs. It was one of the best things we have done for building relationships and direction for our work together as Baptist State Convention Staff and association.

Our main emphasis for 1994-95 is the "Here's Hope, Share Jesus Now" Revivals in April of 1995. Our prayer is that all of our churches will join together for a week of simultaneous revivals April 2-9, 1995. This great event will need all of our preparation and prayers. The Steering Committee for Here's Hope will emphasize Local Church Witnessing Training, 60 Days of Witnessing, Prayer Retreats, and promotion and preparation for the revival efforts. Please join me in prayer daily for a great spiritual renewal in our churches and County.

The joy of serving you continues to bless my soul. I am grateful to the wonderful people in our churches and to the faithful pastors who make up this association. I am indebted to the prayers, support, and cooperation that has been given to me over these seventeen years. I still believe that some of our greatest days are ahead of us as a family of churches working and ministering together to our County. Let us encourage one another and support one another as we seek God's purpose throughout Randolph County.



NORTH CAROLINA BAPTIST FOUNDATION, INC. ANNUAL REPORT TO BAPTIST ASSOCIATIONS OF NORTH CAROLINA June, 1994



With the 75th anniversary of the chartering of the N. C. Baptist Foundation approaching, it is exciting to reflect on the fulfillment of dreams of the founding fathers. The prayerful deliberation that led to the vote in the 1919 Baptist State Convention meeting for the beginning of "a trust agency" envisioned a viable entity which would promote and manage funds given by individuals for perpetual support of several struggling institutions and the mission programs at the heart of this missionary minded denomination.

As of December 31, 1993, the Foundation held \$45,878,748 under management. In 1993, \$1,243,217 was distributed to Baptist work and \$1,196,748 was distributed to individuals for a total income distribution of \$2,439,965.

The income distributions for the entire 74 year history of the N. C. Baptist Foundation totals: \$7,009,154 income paid to individuals and \$10,011,893 to Baptist churches, institutions and mission causes for a grand historical total of \$17,021,047.

In 1993, the staff of the Foundation consisted of seven full time employees and two persons who provided part-time service in accounting and legal services. In May of 1994, Rev. Coy H. Jeans, Jr. was employed by the Foundation Board as Western Area Manager of Trust and Endowment Development. Rev. Jeans will serve individuals in western North Carolina through estate stewardship planning to better provide for families and Christian endeavors. He will also work very closely with Associations and churches in We encourage western North Carolina the area. Baptists to contact Rev. Jeans at his office in Marion at 704-652-9548. Founded in 1922, Baptist Hospital is a missionary enterprise of the Baptist churches of North Carolina. The essence of our purpose is to carry out a ministry of healing as taught by Jesus Christ. We remain as fully committed to this mission as were our founding fathers. In the midst of changing health-care norms, we have not, nor will we, deviate from this mission. The following paragraphs report, not only basic facts, but various results of how we have sought in the last year to remain true to our heritage while providing quality health care at affordable prices.

PROVIDERS AND RECIPIENTS OF HEALING

Our Hospital healing team now consists of 5,777 employees. The Medical Center (North Carolina Baptist Hospital and Bowman Gray School of Medicine) personnel total employment is fast approaching 9,000 people making us the second largest employer in Forsyth County. In our 806-bed facility, we had 23,545 inpatient admissions during our fiscal year 1993-94. Our Outpatient Department, physicians' clinics, and other related departments received 523,672 patient visits.

DEPARTMENT OF PASTORAL CARE

Our chaplaincy division joins with our health-care professionals to provide spiritual and emotional healing. With 15 to 35 chaplains present at various times, 58,747 ministries were provided to patients, families, staff and groups. Mission dollars from the Cooperative Program enabled this ministry to be carried out.

The Center for Congregational Health, in its second year of ministry as a part of our Department of Pastoral Care, continues to expand and strengthen. To date thru 1993, 40 ministers have completed intentional interim training and 29 are in training. The number of churches calling intentional interim pastors continues to increase. The training of consultants for conflicted churches and leadership training for young ministers were both begun.

The Pastoral Counseling Division now operates 12 counseling centers across the state. These centers provided 26,716 hours, a five percent increase over the previous year.

In December 1994, Dr. Dewey Hobbs will retire as Director of the Department of Pastoral Care. His eleven years of leadership and ministry have brought quality and expansion in every facet of the department.

BAPTIST BENEVOLENT CARE FUND

Last year Baptists across our state gave \$425,734 to our annual Mother's Day Offering. All of these monies went toward relieving the financial burden of scores of former patients who have little or no health-care insurance and no financial means to pay their hospital bills. The churches and individuals help make this ministry possible and we are grateful.

EXCELLENT FINANCIAL STEWARDSHIP

In the midst of escalating health-care costs, we have a proven record of superb stewardship.

- (1) The latest report of the North Carolina Database Commission comparing the average of other state academic medical center charges vs. Baptist Hospital for our most frequent diagnoses reveals our charges are 21% lower.
- (2) We are one of only 17 hospitals nationally with a "AA" bond credit rating.
- (3) Averaging the last two years and the projection for 1994, the Consumer Price Index will average 2.8% and the Medical CPI for hospitals will average 8.9%. Baptist Hospital rate increases for the same period will average 1.8%, under both the above-mentioned indexes.

MEETING THE CHALLENGES OF THE FUTURE

The health care environment is and will continued to be changing. Baptist Hospital is proactively facing these changes on a daily basis. Below are listed several visions which have recently been or will soon be realized.

Nursing Center at Oak Summit

Opened in July 1993 this 170-bed facility offers four levels of care. It is also one of only a few nursing centers in North Carolina that provides care for ventilator-dependent patients.

Emergency Department/Dietary Building

Progressing toward a late 1995 opening, this facility will expand our ED capacity to 70,000 visits annually. It will also house three floors of patient private rooms, our Pharmacy Department, a new kitchen and 900-seat cafeteria, and a 35-bed Day Hospital.

J. Paul Sticht Center on Aging and Rehabilitation

This building will usher in a new era in rehabilitation at our Medical Center. Housing a total of 128 beds, it will contain a geriatric day hospital which will aid the transition from hospital to home, inpatient rehabilitation nursing units, a psychiatric floor, geriatric research and education. Completion is targeted for 1996.

At home health care

Our Home Health Solutions provides our local region with parenteral nutrition and intravenous antibiotic therapy, chemotherapy and pain management. Home Health Specialists provides nursing care, personal care and physical and occupational therapy.

Center for Research on Human Nutrition and Chronic Disease Prevention

Our continued partnership with Bowman Gray School of Medicine enables our Medical Center to provide the highest quality of research, education, and patient care. Quoting Dean Richard Janeway, "We are trying to prevent the major killers such as cancer, strokes, and heart attacks. With this facility we'll be able to transfer the information straight to the patient's bedside."

COMMUNITY HOSPITAL ASSISTANCE

Developing relationships with community hospitals such as Stokes Reynolds in Danbury and Hoots Hospital in Yadkinville enables us to assist them in lowering costs as well as providing quality hospital and outpatient care. We anticipate expanding this endeavor to include other smaller, outlying hospitals. We also have significant affiliate relationships with hospitals in Wilkesboro, Lexington, and Mt. Airy and are in the process of developing other affiliate relationships.

QUALCHOICE OF NORTH CAROLINA

Joining with BGSM and Wake Forest University, Baptist Hospital has developed a managed care plan. Our design is one which offers affordable quality health care while providing the insured freedom of choice. This plan will be opened for public enrollment beginning January 1, 1995.

A CLOSING WORD

We continue to esteem our heritage, celebrate our current capabilities, and strive to position ourselves for the future. Your partnership, prayers, and utilization of our services inspires our dedication to our mission. We are grateful to God and to the North Carolina Baptist family.

As a result of the wonderful support given by North Carolina Baptists, 1994 will be remembered as one of the finest years in the 43 year history of Baptist Retirement Homes. The following are some highlights from the year:

> In recognition of its commitment to the spiritual well-being of the residents that it serves, Baptist Retirement Homes hired W. Paul Riggs to serve as Chaplain to the residents of the Prince Nursing Care Center in Winston-Salem and the Rickman Nursing Care Center in Asheville.

Reaffirming its commitment to the idea that retirement should be a "step-up" for Older Adults, the renovation of the Taylor House in Albemarle was completed and renovation of the Hamilton Baptist Home in Martin County was begun. When the renovation of the Hamilton Baptist Home is completed in mid-1995, all of the facilities operated by the Baptist Retirement Homes will be "State-ofthe-Art."

In recognition of the changing profile of institutionalized Older Adults (47% of the "oldest old" in North Carolina suffer from some form of dementia), a special small group approach to the care for institutionalized Older Adults suffering from dementia was instituted at the Prince Nursing Care Center in Winston-Salem. Through the implementation of this program, Baptist Retirement Homes once again demonstrated its commitment to the principle that everyone has the right to age with dignity and to enjoy a certain quality of life throughout the aging process.

In an effort to provide Older Adults with affordable care, a sub-acute unit was developed at the Prince Nursing Care Center in Winston-Salem . . . a unit where frail Older Adults can receive such treatments as IV therapy, infusion, wound care, and stroke and bone fracture rehabilitation outside of a hospital setting.

In response to the need to provide quality long-term care services to the ever growing number of frail Baptist Older Adults, Baptist Retirement Homes expanded its nursing services in 1994 to include an additional 100 Older Adults (80% of that group being classified as the poor elderly... men and women who lack sufficient financial resources to pay for the institutional services they receive).

The liquor forces did not win any of these referendums.

The 1994 Session of the General Assembly has adjourned, and all House and Senate members have gone home. Most of all, we are grateful that the 12 highly paid and influential lobbyists of the \$300 billion gambling industry have left the capital city also, and they left town "empty-handed" with all gambling bills "dead".

Senate Bill 11, The State Lottery Act, which had passed the Senate by a vote of 27 - 23, "died" in the House Committee on Constitutional Amendments and Referenda.

Two pari-mutuel gambling bills (Senate Bill 116 and House Bill 42) also failed to pass. These legislative proposals would have opened the door for horse/dog racing with off-track betting parlors. When the state-lottery bill was unsuccessful in securing passage, pro-gambling forces "threw in the towel" on these efforts.





One year and 338 days after Pearl Harbor, the Council on Christian Higher Education was created: November 17, 1943. The first Council meeting occurred January 17, 1944, four months and 20 days before D-Day. Reports to the Baptist State Convention in those years contained many references to World War II and its effects upon churches, communities, the colleges and Baptist work in general. It was a time of weakness and confusion. War was raging in Europe and the Pacific, and the outcome was still in doubt.

In such a time there were visionary Baptists who by faith could see beyond the clouds of war to the needs of peacetime. A Convention committee of 64 members labored almost two years before recommending that the Council be established. Chowan College was closed in 1944, Gardner-Webb College was not yet funded by the Convention, and Wingate College received only \$5,000. The clear aim was to strengthen the colleges, increase their moral and financial support among Baptists, place Christian Higher Education high on the Baptist agenda, and to organize such efforts on a continuing basis.

In 1994, the Council on Christian Higher Education's 50th year of operation, let us give thanks for those pioneer Baptists whose foresight, insight and good works caused North Carolina Baptists to become leaders in the field of Christian Higher Education.

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HOME MISSION BOARD, SBC Christ for Our Nation

1993 ANNUAL REPORT SUMMARY/HIGHLIGHTS

The Home Mission Board (HMB) is a missionary-sending agency of the Southern Baptist Convention (SBC). Headquartered in Atlanta, Ga., the HMB's purpose is to serve Southern Baptists by assisting churches to proclaim the gospel of Jesus Christ, start and grow New Testament congregations, and minister to people in the name of Christ.

At the end of last year, 4,882 missions personnel were serving in the United States, the Caribbean, Guam, American Samoa, and Canada. The HMB also had endorsed more than 2,300 chaplains who were serving in healthcare agencies, institutions, businesses, the military, and pastoral-care roles. More than 1,700 Mission Service Corps volunteers were serving on home mission fields. During the year there were 1,500 church starts (more than four per day) and 349,073 baptisms.

Approximately half of the HMB's support comes from individual SBC churches through the annual Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for Home Missions. In 1993, gifts to the offering totaled \$36.31 million, about 3 percent less than the 1992 total. One hundred percent of the offering goes to support the work of home missionaries in the field. The 1994 Annie Armstrong Easter Offering goal is \$40 million. About 36 percent of the HMB's income comes from the denomination's Cooperative Program.

The following is a summary of program/support ministry highlights from 1993:

Chaplaincy Ministries-The 2,325 Southern Baptists now serving as chaplains and pastoral counselors reported more than 24,000 professions of faith and 4,500 baptisms.

Church Loans-Approximately 1,056 churches had active loans totaling \$131.1 million. The Church Loans Division closed 120 church loans totaling \$32 million, including \$3.8 million of refinancing.

Language Missions-Home missionaries and pastors in the Language Church Extension Division serve among 102 ethnic groups using 98 languages and dialects.

Evangelism-During Crossover Houston, the Mass Evangelism Department coordinated 35 street evangelism events, 25 block parties, nine evangelistic rallies, and 68 special Harvest Revivals and events. These activities resulted in 1,253 conversions. The Personal Evangelism Department produced and shipped materials for "Here's Hope. Share Jesus Now." This emphasis will include 60 Days of Soul-Winning, January 9-March 9, 1995.

Volunteers-More than 74,860 Southern Baptist adults, college students, and youth group members volunteered for long- and short-term projects. In addition, several thousand more were involved in disaster relief efforts in the Midwest.

Church Evangelism Development-Over 1 million teens participated in "See You At The Pole," gathering at their flagpoles to pray for the schools of our nation.

Administration--The Home Mission Board broke ground for a new national office building which will be completed in 1995. Customer Services received more than 51,000 calls and shipped almost 5 million pieces of HMB material.
