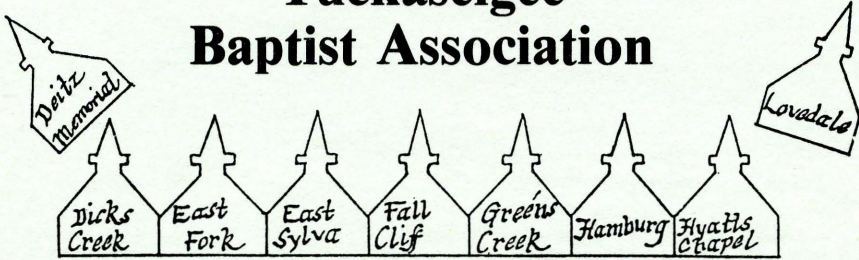
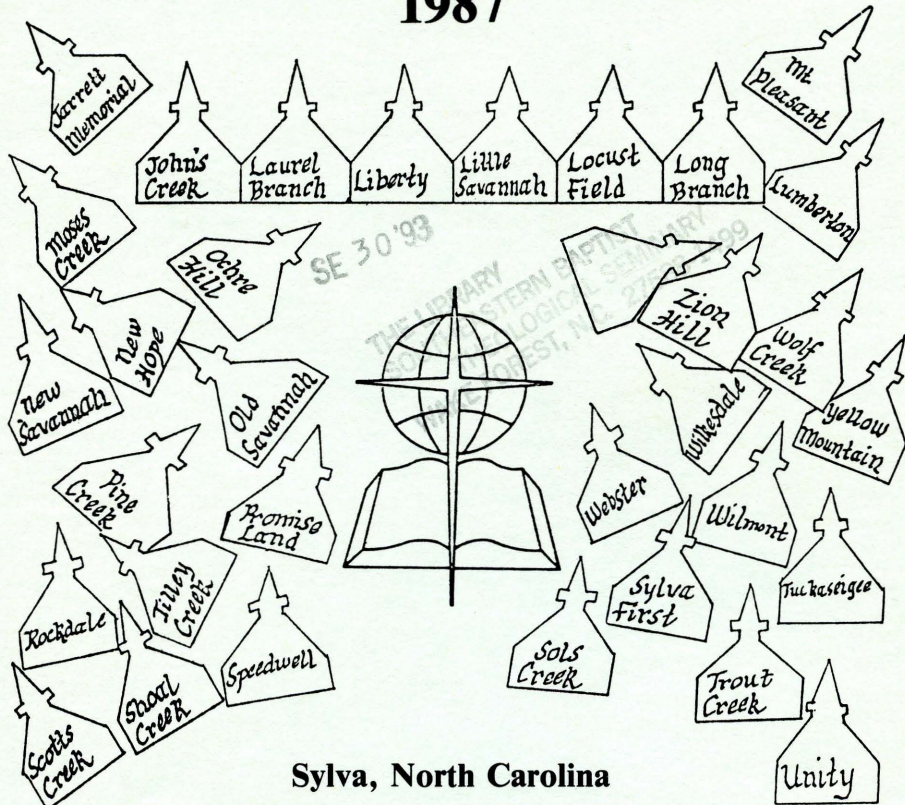

The Cover is designed to tell a story about the 50 churches composing the Tuckasegee Baptist Association. 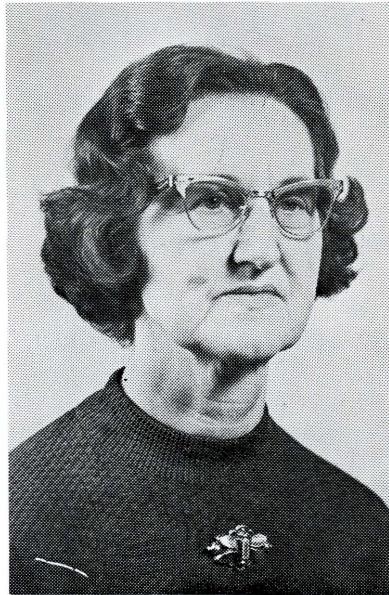

Some people and some families are intimately associated with certain churches. So it is with Mildred Cowan and Webster Baptist Church. Her grandfather assisted in building the structure. Her father built the pulpit within the church and the predecessor to the steeple that was recently struck by lightning above the church. She also built in the church; not with hammer and nails, but by personal effort and example. She taught, at different times Sunday School classes for Beginners, Juniors, Intermediates, Young People and Adult Ladies. She has been WMU Director, Training Union Director and G.A. Director. She worked in innumerable Vacation Bible Schools. She served on Pulpit Committees, and housed and entertained visiting pastors and workers in her home. The Sanctuary piano bears the impress of fifty years of her fingerprints. Her voice has often filled the sanctuary with joy and exultation at weddings and special events.

But Mildred Cowan's efforts and influence are not limited to Webster. She has been Training Union Director for the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association. For the past five years she has been WMU Director and a member of the Executive Board of the Association. Beyond the local association she has been a member of the Region 10 Committee for Truett Camp. She is currently a member of the General Board for the State Baptist Convention.

In conformity with Jesus' command that she serve Him by serving others, she had been active in volunteer work for senior citizens, and has been a hospital volunteer for many years.

# Proceedings

TUESDAY, OCTOBER 15, 1987

1. The Tuckasegee Baptist Association held the first session of the 158th Annual meeting at the Zion Hill Baptist Church on Thursday, October 15, 1967. The host church provided an excellent meal for the more than two hundred messengers and visitors at 5:30 p.m. The meeting convened at 6:30 p.m.

2. Mike Moore, moderator, called the meeting to order at 6:30 and expressed thanks and appreciation to the members of the host church for the meal and for the accommodations provided.

3. The Reverend Carl Smith, pastor of the church, gave the devotion.

4. Harry Vance, Associational Music Director, led in the singing of a hymn. Reverend Vance was in charge of all of the music throughout the meeting.

5. The "Book of Reports" and "Order of Business" were adopted for the purpose of information and direction.

6. The Moderator recognized the pastors new to the Association since 1986. These were: Bill Greene, pastor of Calvary Baptist Church, Lionnel Parris, pastor of Laurel Branch and Tommy Lamb, pastor of the Ochre Hill Church. Visitors recognized were Luther Osment, Bobby Stafford, Harry Sherwood, Calvin Knight and Ronnie Henderson.

7. The Director of Missions, John Reid, recognized and presented certificates or plaques to the following: Jimmy Childress and Staff, a plaque in recognition of thirty years of service, to the community and for the fine cooperation and support the Radio Station had provided for the Association: Mrs. Cecile Woodard, received a certificate for having served 27 years as church clerk at the Zion Hill Baptist Church; Lincoln Shuler, a certificate for 40 years service as Choir Director at the Buff Creek Church; and Mrs. Ina Turpin, a certificate for 41 years as Clerk at the Dicks Creek Baptist Church. The Reverend Hardin Nicholson and the Reverend Virgil Cook were recognized as having retired this past year from their pastorates. The Reverend Nicholson having served churches in the Tuckasegee Baptist Association for 31 years and the Reverend Cook for serving seven churches in the Association over a period of 37 years.

Vernon Cope of the Scotts Creek Baptist Church received a certificate for having been a member of the Church for 72 years and serving 60 of those years as a Sunday School teacher. Ode Cope of the Ochre Hill Church, received a certificate for 48 years of service in that Church.

The Reverend Mike Moore, pastor of the Hyatts Chapel Church and moderator of the Association for the past two years, was presented with a plaque for the outstanding job he had done as moderator.

8. John Reid, Director of Missions presented the Associational Report, which pointed out the purposes of the Annual meetings and called attention to several needs. He expressed gratitude for the apparent healing that was taking place over problems that existed in the Association.

9. Kenneth Pressley, Chairman of the Constitution Committee gave the report for that committee and presented copies of the Constitutional changes that would be voted on by the body at the Friday evening session of the meeting.

Pressley explained that some Constitutional changes proposed by the Balsam Baptist Church and a change being proposed by an individual would not be presented by the Constitution Committee since they were of a divisive nature and should be presented by the parties proposing them.

10. The Editor of the *Biblical Recorder*, Gene Puckett, could not attend the session and had requested that his report be presented by John Reid. The report is found in the *Book of Reports*.

11. The Reverend Luther Osment, Area Coordinator of the Baptist Children's Homes, presented the report on the work being done in the Children's Homes of North Carolina by the Baptist people and urged them to continue to help meet the needs and continue to support their institution through prayer and finance.

12. Bobby Stafford, North Carolina Baptist State Convention, presented the report on the work of the Convention. He also presented facts on the proposed Brazilian Partnership for North Carolina.

13. The Baptist Colleges Report was presented by Harry Sherrwood from Wingate College. He encouraged Baptist to encourage their sons and daughters to attend the Baptist Institutions.

14. Calvin Knight brought a good and encouraging report of the progress of the work being done in the Baptist Hospital.

15. Ronnie Henderson of the Gideon Camp gave a report for that organization. He pointed out some of the many good things the Gideons were doing to help spread the gospel to all people.

16. The North Carolina Baptist Homes, Incorporated report was presented giving information on the condition of the Homes at present, the urgent need for more space, and the new work underway in Winston-Salem for the new and expanded facility there.

17. The Reverend Ben Cabe, chairman of the Credentials Committee presented the following motion:

In accordance with our constitution, Article IV, Section 2, The Cullowhee Valley Baptist Church has met with the Credentials Committee pertaining to its application for membership into the Association.

The Credentials Committee recommended the church to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee on July 28, 1986 invited them to come under the watch care of the association.

They have participated in the missions programs of the Association and of the Southern Baptist Convention. They have contributed financially both to the Association and thru the Cooperative Program.

We have received a church letter from them.

They do have messengers present.

They have complied in every respect to be a member church of the Tuckasegee Baptist Association, and Brother Moderator, I so move that they be accepted into full fellowship of the Association.

Brother Moderator, I move that the Tuckasegee Baptist Association accept the Cullowhee Valley Baptist Church into full fellowship into the Association with all rights, privileges, and responsibilities of a member church.

The Motion was seconded and CARRIED.

18. Mrs. Kathleen Buchanan presented the following motion:

Whereas, we believe God has "Commanded us through Jesus and the Scripture" to be His Witness to the ends of the earth, and

Whereas, God had made us stewards of the enormous resources and means at a time when the people of the world, are responsive, and,

Whereas, our Biblical and denominational heritage affirms that prayer unleashes the power of God for resources to break through existing barriers to evangelize those around us, from our local communities to the uttermost parts of the earth and

Whereas, God spontaneously is moving His people throughout the world to initiate prayer covenants and to participate in extraordinary reasons of prayer for spiritual awakening, and

Whereas, we, the Tuckaseegee Baptist, clearly see the need for prayer in our Association and in our local Churches, and

Whereas, we, as Southern Baptist, having accepted the challenge of Bold Mission Thrust, must begin to minister in our County and support ministry that will touch the world,

Therefore, I move, we, the Tuckaseegee Baptist commit ourselves to PRAYER for Spiritual Awakening in our Association, establish a Prayer Ministry in the Association to be directed by a person named jointly by the Moderator and Director of Missions, and

Be it further resolved that we challenge every church to select in a manner of its own choosing, one lay person who will work along side the pastor to help the local church focus on and participate in extraordinary prayer for Spiritual Awakening and who will come together on a regular basis, to be determined by the group, to pray for Associational and Southern Baptist Concerns.

The Motion was seconded and CARRIED.

19. Harry Vance made a motion that a collection be taken for the Gideons.

The Motion was seconded and CARRIED.

An amount of \$241.47 was collected and turned over to the Gideons.

Tommy Lamb, pastor of the Ochre Hill Church accompanied the singing led by Harry Vance. The Reverend Lamb then sang a song accompanying himself.

20. Dr. Joe Smith, former, now retired pastor of the Liberty Baptist Church, brought the message based on scripture from Matthew 5:14-16. "Ye are the light of the world."

21. The first session of the Annual meeting was closed with a Benediction pronounced by the Reverend Ray McCall, pastor of the Webster Baptist Church.

#### FRIDAY, OCTOBER 16, 1987

22. The Lovedale Baptist served as host for the second session of the Annual meeting. The meal began at 5:00 p.m. and was enjoyed by approximately two hundred messengers and visitors.

23. Moderator, Mike Moore called the second session of the Annual meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. He expressed thanks to the Church for its accommodations and good meal.

24. The Reverend Alvin Loiry, interim pastor of the church, brought a timely devotion from Isaiah 12:10-11.

25. Norman Parris, Associational Director of Church Training, brought the report for that committee. He announced "M" Night for November 23 at the East Sylva Baptist Church. The Reverend Cleve Wilkie will bring the message at this meeting.

26. Mrs. Shirley Kool, Associational Director of the Woman's Missionary Union, presented the report for that group. She told of the new partnership being arranged with Brazil by the North Carolina Baptist State Convention and urged each W.M.U. organization to be supportive of the partnership. She presented a motion:

I move that the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association participate in a five year missions project between North Carolina Baptist and the Baptist Convention of Sao Paulo, Brazil.

The Motion was seconded and CARRIED.

Mrs. Kool challenged the W.M.U. organization to plan to assist in the financial support in the sending of two representatives to Sao Paulo in March of 1988. The purpose of this initial visit will be to work out details of the needs of the Brazilian project. This cost for them will be approximately \$1200 for each person. The January Executive Committee would make the decision as to who and how many would go on this trip.

27. The Brotherhood Report was given by Johnny Watson, Associational Director. This group was encouraged to become active in the proposed Sao Paulo Partnership.

28. Mike Moses, Director of the Crusaders program, presented John Reid, Director of Missions, with a R.A. jacket from the Crusaders in appreciation of the support given by Reverend Reid. He urged all churches to start Crusade organizations for their youth. He will be available to assist anyone desiring help.

29. Haven Ensley, chairman of the Deacons, Pastors, Spouses Fellowship gave the report for that organization. He announced that the October meeting is to be held at the Cullowhee Baptist Church, on Friday, October 23 at 6:00 p.m.

30. Dr. Terry Peele, Assistant Pastor of Sylva First Baptist, presented the VBS report and announced 36 conversions during the schools in session.

31. The Reverend Harry Vance moved that the collection to be taken be given for the Hunger Fund.

The Motion was seconded and CARRIED.

The collection was made as the congregation sang "Down At The Cross".

32. Reverend Kenneth Pressley, Chairman of the Finance Committee, presented the Proposed Associational Budget for 1988. In speaking to the Budget, he urged the churches to support if they accepted the challenging budget.

The Motion was seconded and CARRIED without comments from the floor.

33. The Reverend Charles Carnes presented the Time, Place and Preacher Report. The Annual session will be held on October 13, 1988 at the Little Savannah Baptist Church with the Reverend Glenn Blanton as the preacher and at the First Baptist Church in Sylva on October 14 with the Reverend Ray McCall as the preacher.

34. Kenneth Pressley, Chairman of the Constitution Committee presented the proposed Constitutional changes. These suggested changes had been distributed to the messenger on the previous evening. These changes as passed will be indicated in the CONSTITUTION in the minutes with an " \* ". Pressley made the motion that Article 6, Section 1 be amended to include the Director of the Singles program and the Director of the Senior Adult Program.

The Motion was CARRIED with a 2/3 vote in favor.

35. Amendment presented by the Reverend Steve Gunter, pastor of the Balsam Baptist Church, pertaining to Article 3, Authority reading "The Association shall have the power to elect and install the officers providing they believe and accept that the Bible is the infallible word of God and that any man that disbelieves this will not be eligible to hold office in the association.

The proposed amendment was DEFEATED in a ballot vote.

No other amendment changes were proposed.

36. Pressley made the motion that Section 2 of Article 6 be extended to include "The Associational Financial year will begin at the close of the Annual Meeting".

This Motion was seconded and CARRIED.

37. John Reid, speaking for the Resolutions Committee commended the Zion Hill and the Lovedale Churches for the excellent manner in which both churches hosted the Annual Meeting. In each church the meal was delicious, beautifully served and the accommodations provided were more than adequate. The Association goes on record in appreciation of the work and effort put into the making of the one hundred fifty-eighth Annual Sessions such a wholesome and satisfying experience.

38. The Reverend Lewis Smith, pastor of the Cashiers Church, explained why the Evangelism Conference scheduled for the spring of 1987 was called off. The event would have followed problems that had arisen in the Association and the Committee felt that time was needed for healing to take place before entering into a Revival.

39. The Reverend Jack Hinson, Chaplain of the C.J. Harris Hospital, told of the good work and the progress being made in the Chaplaincy program and of those pastors who had prepared themselves as "on call assistant chaplains."

He distributed pamphlets which explained the work and some of the needs of the Chaplaincy program.



40. The Baptist Student Union on the Campus of Western Carolina College was represented by a student, Jeff Laws. He explained briefly the efforts being made by the students to become involved in mission work.

41. The Director of Truett Baptist Camp, the Reverend Richard Robertson, spoke of the increased enrollment and the use of the camp and of the work Baptist had done to improve the physical situation. The new dining room is now in operation and has added much comfort and convenience to camp life.

42. The Digest of Letters was presented by Annie Hoyle, Associational Clerk.

43. John Reid, in the absence of Mildred Cowan, gave the Memorial.

44. The Reverend Lewis Smith, pastor of the Cashiers Baptist Church, brought a strong message on love using as scripture selection from 1 Corinthians 13.

45. The Reverend John Bunn, pastor of the Sylva First Baptist Church, presented a point for information. He stated that the reports showed that seven churches in the Association were not giving to the Southern Baptist Convention and that 13 churches do not realize that they are in conflict with the Constitution when they do not give to the support of the Association. These churches should be informed concerning this conflict and instructed in their responsibilities and helped to understand their responsibilities.

46. The 158th Annual Meeting was closed with prayer.

## 1987 Director of Missions Report

First I want to thank the churches for the prayers, the support and the encouragement that you have given me as your Director of Missions. I continue to enjoy my visits to the churches. I am grateful for the opportunities to preach, to teach, and to serve in other ways in the life of the local church. First and foremost, as Director of Missions. I consider myself a servant to the local church. My desire is to be able to help each church realize its potential before God.

As your Associational Missionary my tasks are many and varied. This past year I found myself preaching, teaching, planning, strategizing, training, equipping, leading and sharing with other leaders, and coming and going to meetings among other activities.

One important area of work has been consulting with churches. I have worked with pulpit committees as they searched for a pastor, been asked advice concerning buildings and decor, helped churches in their struggle with internal problems, and answered questions about denominational programs, and emphasis. Also, I have been called upon on several occasions to help with the preaching while a church sought an interim pastor. I have given priority time to responding to churches who have needed assistance and asked for it.

Another task has been to attend meetings and functions of our larger Baptist work in the state. I attended the Baptist State Convention Annual meeting in Greensboro. I attended the National Doctrine of Prayer Seminar in Nashville, Tennessee along with two lay persons from our association. In February, I attended the Church Management Seminar offered by the Babcock School of Executive Management at Wake Forest University. In March, I attended the State Convention Staff/Director of Missions retreat in Caraway. In May, I attended the May Key Leadership meeting in Ridgecrest along with other associational leaders. In July, I attended the Annual meeting of the Director of Missions Conference here in North Carolina.

I am especially pleased with the development of the Senior Adult work done this past year. For the first time we had several Senior Adult dinners and activities here at the Baptist Center. Betty Fisher and a committee of ladies from various churches are to be thanked for their leadership and work.

I have worked with the Truett Camp Board of Directors and am pleased that the new dining hall addition has been completed and in use this summer. A special note of thanks must be expressed to the WMU of the Association for their work in helping make that

possible. Also, I commend the churches who responded to the challenges issued by the WMU. I also served on the Southeastern Area Resort Ministry Board that has seen much success through the ministry of Jim Dean who completed his work this past summer. A new US-2 worker will be coming to take his place.

Much time is spent during July, August and September preparing for the Annual meeting. This includes meeting with the various committees as they meet to do their work in preparation for the Book of Reports and the Annual meeting.

God continues to bless the Tuckasegee Baptist Half Hour radio program. I expend a great deal of time and effort each week to prepare and to produce the program. God is blessing this ministry and I believe it bears a positive witness to the county. I am grateful to the Locust Field Baptist Church for their help in financing the program on a continuing basis.

This year we entered both the Sylva and Cashiers Christmas parade with a float that bore witness to Baptist work in the county.

I commend Annie Hoyle for the fine work and for the many volunteer hours she contributes to the Association. She donated so many things on a regular basis to our Baptist Center it would be impossible to list them. We are especially blessed by her gift of hospitality as she prepares refreshments for all of our meetings large and small. Her ministry is a blessing to our ministry.

This was not a year of unrestrained progress. In times of controversy plans and programs do not always proceed on schedule. However, I have seen some healing and the Association is coming back together. With healing and reconciliation comes a visible demonstration of God in our midst that will bear great testimony to our county of the mighty power of God. As Christians we can seize the opportunity to be reconciled, to demonstrate forgiveness and love and to cooperate in the name of the Lord.

Our financial situation has been strong during this period of difficulty. The churches support about 80 percent of our total budget. With the decreased giving to the budget this year that figure will be less. In August we were at 91.6% of our budget year. We had received 90.13% of the money to meet the budget and from that amount 71% had been given by the churches.

This year's budget will be challenging. The finance committee is asking the churches of the Association to say that it is now time to move ahead. Baptist Churches of the Tuckasegee Association are called of the Lord to minister together in a cooperative way. May we succeed to His Glory!

"Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly in all wisdom, teaching and admonishing one another in psalm and hymns and spiritual songs, singing with grace in your hearts to the Lord" (Colossians 3:16)

"In the midst of the congregation I will sing praises to you. (Hebrews 2:12)

"Is anyone cheerful? Let him sing psalms." (James 5:13)

These are the verses pertaining to music for Christians as far as Jesus and the early church were concerned.

Let us be thankful that Christians in worship can all participate by singing from the heart. The meaningless, mechanical Old Testament ceremony and weary chores were taken away. Christians now give THEMSELVES in sacrifices, including the fruit of their lips.

Singing is symbolic of total service and giving of self, rather than mechanical service rendered by surrogates.

## Sunday School Report

This past year was not a good year in Associational Sunday School work. Sunday School enrollment was down from 1986 by 2.4% and Sunday School Average Attendance was down by 3.4%. The following tables are very revealing about the kind of work that we must do in the area of Sunday School.

Sunday School serves two major purposes in the church. First, it is to reach people. Lost people who attend Sunday School tend to make decisions for Christ much more readily than lost people who never attend Sunday School or even occasionally attend worship services. Secondly, Sunday School is the Bible teaching and fellowship arm of the Church. "Build a strong Sunday School and you will build a strong Church", is a true statement.

A growing Sunday School is no accident. It is the result of the pastor, the Sunday School Director, teachers, and class members sitting down and developing a plan to visit, to encourage attendance, and to strengthen Bible teaching skills. Sunday School (and Church) growth will come no other way.

The Southern Baptist Convention leaders have challenged us to enroll ten million people in Sunday School by 1990. In our association we have approximately 9,000 resident members this year. Our Sunday School enrollment for 1987 was 4,799. Our enrollment goal for 1988 is 5,279, for 1989 is 5,807, and for 1990 is 6,388 people. The population of Jackson County is expected to be over 30,000 in 1990. If these goals are to be reached every church will have to do its part.

Each church is encouraged to set enrollment and attendance goals and then work towards them. We are to reach people, teach the Bible, witness to the lost, and develop the saints. Sunday School is our primary program to accomplish this as God's Holy Spirit empowers us.

## Associational Vacation Bible School Report

The Associational VBS Clinic was held in April at the East Sylva Baptist Church. Twelve Churches were represented by fifty people. Twenty-two churches have shared their reports with the Associational office to date. Enrollment ranged from twenty-two people to two hundred people. Several churches conducted classes for the Adults. Twenty-six conversions were reported from eleven churches. Fifteen churches contributed to the missions program through cooperative program giving.

Vacation Bible School is always a special time of year. The Bible is taught, children are led to Christ, and mission education is emphasized.

## Woman's Missionary Union

The sweet spirit of love and working together for a common goal has permeated the work of the Tuckaseegee Woman's Missionary Union this year. Our theme this year was "Gifted to Serve, Called to Act" from I Peter 4:10. All year we have been confronted with our many gifts and how we are using them for His service.

Quarterly meetings were held for inspiration, training and helping us to become aware of mission opportunities. These were led by Nancy Curtis from our state office who introduced our theme; an approved state trainer, Sandra James led a workshop of Mission Action and Personal Witnessing; volunteer missionaries Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Crawford, ordinary people who did extraordinary things, talked about their experiences in Brazil; Dot Calvin acquainted us with the North Carolina-West Virginia project and ended up going with some Jackson County youth on her fourth trip; and, as a part of our Leadership Workshop, Debra Wilfong from the Hawthorne Heights Children's Home shared needs of the home with us. World Day of Prayer was observed by the Association with Wanda Kidd leading us. Also, to help keep us informed of activities and mission opportunities, a page of "Mission Matters" has been written for the Association Newsletter.

Becoming aware of needs must lead to Mission Action. So as an association we accomplished together what each of our churches could not do alone. Two sewing machines were purchased for Broyhill Children's Home (\$600), 120 cafeteria trays and other kitchen utensils were purchased for Truett Camp's new kitchen (\$386), a lawnmower was donated to Hawthorne Heights Children's Home (\$260), and a piano at Skyland Rest Home was tuned.

As we become more active, we are also growing. There are 24 WMU organizations with 380 members although only 17 with 306 members have paid dues. One new WMU was organized and one was reorganized. There are 27 Baptist Women Organizations plus one new group and one reorganized. There is one Baptist Young Women's group organizing this Fall. There are 7 Action groups with 47 members plus two new groups organized this year. There are 12 Girls in Action groups with 98 members plus two newly organized groups. These groups have been active in Association-Wide Day Camps and GA Activity sessions with excellent participation. Mission Friends has 10 groups organized plus two newly organized this year.

Four major emphases occurred during this exciting year at the Children's Homes:

1. There was a reorganization of group care on the Mills Home Campus in order to more effectively deliver service to children and families.
2. Moody Home Ministries was opened for troubled girls.
3. Partnerships in cooperation with the WMU, Personal Evangelism, Baptist Men and the Department of Aging have been rewarding and exciting.
4. The process of Long-Range Planning extending up to five years was begun.

## 1987 North Carolina Baptist College Report

A recent survey sent to more than 24,000 lay persons and pastors in North Carolina, revealed strongly positive attitudes toward Baptist colleges.

The following summary of the survey's conclusions will interest our Baptist people in the churches and associations;

1. Almost 90 percent of those surveyed said Christian education should remain a high priority in North Carolina Baptist life.

2. More than 50 percent rated North Carolina Baptist colleges as outstanding or good. Ninety-five percent believe the quality of education is equal or superior to an education at a state school.

3. The three main strengths of Baptist Schools, according to the survey, are the quality of education offered, the Christian commitment of faculty and the spiritual emphasis on the campuses. The overwhelming weakness is the cost.

4. Most said they learned about the colleges through the *Biblical Recorder*. The opinion was strong, however (65%), that Baptist students do not receive sufficient information about Baptist colleges through the local church.

5. When asked about the percentage of Cooperative Program funds for Christian education, 45.5 percent answered that it is "About right" while 37.8 percent replied the percentage is "Not enough."

6. Respondents to the survey were 29 percent women and 40 percent lay persons. Eighty-four percent were from churches with memberships between 100 and 999.

Such positive attitudes encourage Baptist colleges to excel even more in service and cooperation with Baptist churches.

## 1987 North Carolina Baptist Hospital Report

During the past year, Baptist Hospital admitted 22,973 patients for a total of 186,321 days of patient care. More than 1,000 of those patients had heart surgery and 27 received kidney transplants. During this period, the hospital also performed its first heart transplant and, as of June 1, 1987, has performed four successful heart transplants.

Approximately 1,000 persons with kidney stones have been treated with the lithotripter. The lithotripter has also been used to break up gallstones. Baptist Hospital was the first hospital in the United States to achieve this success.

The Air Care Program, described as a "flying emergency room staffed with highly trained pilots and flight nurses," continues to save lives and to contribute to more rapid and complete recovery for many victims of trauma. For example, Air Care made it possible for a man whose arm was severed in a hay mowing accident to reach the hospital in time to have his arm reattached.

Baptist Hospital is one of less than a half dozen medical centers in the nation routinely transplanting living bone tissue. A woman underwent this rare procedure to correct an arthritic condition in her hip where her bone tissue had died. Bone tissue with its own blood supply was successfully transplanted from her lower legs to the upper end of the right femur.

In addition to those admitted to the hospital, 30,726 persons were seen in the outpatient clinics, 35,134 in the emergency department, and 196,556 in the Bowman Gray Department of Clinics. 2,747 patients had outpatient surgery.

During the past year, the Pastoral Care Department has continued to provide pastoral services for hospital patients, pastoral counseling, clinical pastoral education, and human enrichment events. In addition, the department, in cooperation with the Baptist State Convention, has offered the "Pastor's Sabbath" Program at Caraway Conference Center and has provided assistance to more than 100 pastors and their families through the Minister's Care Plan. Plans are being made to offer training in "Conflict Management," "Healing of Corporate Pain," and "Ministry to the Interim Church."

Due to the change in the method and timing of the special offering, Baptist Hospital received during its past fiscal year the largest offering from the churches in its history. The last North Carolina Missions Offering in September of 1985 and the first Homes and Hospital Offering in May of 1986, together with designated gifts, brought the hospital a total of \$474,662.00. Cooperative Program gifts to the hospital during the same fiscal year was \$608,389.00, making our total receipts from the churches \$1,083,051.00.

For these gifts and for all other continuing support and help from the Baptist churches, the hospital trustees, staff and patients are deeply grateful.

## Hospital Chaplaincy Report

How I thank God for you as I remember the tremendous opportunity for ministry here in our hospital. I am honored to be your chaplain because it is so satisfying to know that God's love is being channeled to hurting people with hope and encouragement and eternity.

Almost every day brings a challenge to test the waters of faith:

A person on the staff facing trouble at home;

A suicide attempt by a teenager;

A stillborn birth to a young mother, alone, frightened, and feeling full of guilt;

Death of a loved one without any warning;

An endless line of people who hurt, feel condemned, alienated, and in need of the Lord.

Many of them are visiting our mountains and come to an unfamiliar hospital. But they finally find that the skilled, caring staff of C. J. Harris is here to help.

Our 24-hour chaplaincy service is a welcome part of that staff. Serving along with me are twelve dedicated pastors known as Chaplain Associates. (Al Byers says I ought to rename them The Disciples.) They take on-call duty two times per month. Armed with a Bible and the spirit of the Lord, they are ready to pray with, listen to, and give encouragement to the patients of our hospital.

Please remember our Hospital Chaplaincy Ministry as you prepare your new church budgets. We are totally dependent upon the citizens of Jackson County for the support of the Hospital Chaplaincy Ministry. Two-thirds of our support comes from the Hennessee Foundation and one-third comes from the churches and other individuals who want to help.

October 25, 1987, will be Hospital Chaplaincy Day in Jackson County. Please emphasize our Chaplaincy Ministry in any way you feel will be appropriate—

1) testimonies by patients, hospital staff or family members who are in your church as to what the Chaplaincy Ministry means to them;

2) prayer for the Chaplaincy ministry;

3) receive an offering;

4) give out brochures explaining our Hospital Chaplaincy Ministry.

PRAYER TIME is broadcast at 4:30 p.m. over closed-circuit television to the patients' rooms. This 15-minute devotional period is led by Chaplain Hinson and the Chaplain Associate staff. Patients and their loved ones find great reassurance in knowing that someone is praying for them every day on a regular basis.

Our Chaplain Associate Program is sponsoring a workshop for all pastors and their wives entitled "COPING WITH CRITICISM". It will be held at the hospital on October 26th from 9:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. Cost of \$20.00 per person or \$35.00 per couple. Churches are encouraged to pay the tuition for their pastor and his wife. Contact me for further information.

May God continue to be with us as we face the challenges of life knowing that each one is an opportunity for us to know Him better.

## North Carolina Baptist Retirement Homes

The year 1986-87 has been an exciting time in the life of the Baptist Retirement Homes of North Carolina, Inc. Charged with the task of providing quality living opportunities for older adults within a Christian context, the "Homes" have this year attempted to "move forward" in three broad directions.

### I. Advocacy for Older Adults

During 1986-87, the "Homes" have endeavored to become an advocate, a spokesman for a special segment of the state's population. . . the older adult. The "Homes" and staff have attempted to sensitize Baptists to the particular needs of older adults as well as the significant contribution they can make to the well-being of churches and associations of the Baptist State Convention.

### II. Quality Care

During the year 1986-87 the "Homes" have continued to develop creative ways to meet the needs of older adults. For example, a significant new relationship has been established between the "Homes" and the Geriatric Section of the Bowman Gray School of Medicine (Wake Forest University). Mary Lyles, an attending physician in the Department of Medicine, has been appointed the Homes Medical Director. The "Homes" will be able to offer "sub-acute" care as well as intermediate and skilled nursing to its residents and patients.

A respite or temporary care program has begun at the Albermarle Home for older adults who still reside in the local community setting. Quality care is still the Homes' main objective.

III. During 1986-87, "ground-breaking" for a new continuing care Retirement Community in Winston-Salem will take place in the fall. The Homes' long range plan includes the development of similar facilities in Asheville, Charlotte and the East. The "Good News of Jesus Christ" is the presupposition upon which the "Homes" operate. In reaching out in service to older adults, the "Homes" offers concrete expression to the love of Christ for all people. The support of North Carolina Baptists make this possible.

### Truett Baptist Camp

We are in the midst of our regular camping program at Truett Baptist Camp. We are off to our best start in three years since we have served the camp. Attendance is up in both girls and music weeks, and we are looking forward to a great two weeks of boys' camp.

It's good to be able to report that our dining hall is complete and is being enjoyed by everyone that has used it. It has been a difficult but joyous year at camp with all the remodeling and building that has gone on.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank every church and individual that has given support financially, prayerfully and manually.

Thus far there have been 22 professions of faith and a goodly number of rededications this year.

Truett Camp will be open all year long to any group or church that would like to take advantage of the facilities.

We want to thank this association again for its support and dedication in each endeavor concerning the camp activities. There are many more improvements needed at the camp.

### American Bible Society

Praise God for the continuing partnership of the Southern Baptist Convention in the worldwide Bible cause! Your faithful prayer and financial support make a vital contribution to the American Bible Society's global program of scripture translation and distribution.

With your help many of the opportunities the Lord has given us to share His Word with people throughout the world are being met. Through the United Bible Societies, the international cooperative network of national Bible Societies of which the American Bible Society is a leading member, 600,125,459 copies of Scripture were distributed worldwide during 1986 - an increase of 9.3 percent over 1985.

During 1985 the total number of languages in which at least one complete book of the Bible has been translated climbed to 1,848 with the registering of 19 Languages in which publication by the Bible Societies and other Christian organizations took place for the first time. In seven languages first-ever Bibles appeared. The American Bible Society is continuing to lend assistance to ongoing Scripture translation projects in 555 languages. In 348 of these, some part of the Bible is being translated for the first time.

A full account of all the ways and all the places where the Word has gone out during the past year is beyond the scope of this report. However, in every corner of the world, men, women and children are discovering "new life" through reading the Word of God. And in the United States, too, ABS Scripture programs continue to bring the life-renewing message of the Gospel within the reach of all people.

During 1986 the American Bible Society supplied 100,142,313 copies of Scripture to people in the USA in over 80 languages and in various customized formats. This number reflects a 4.07 percent increase over distribution figures for 1985.

The next two years will see the expansion of a special program entitled "Act Now - Go With the Word!" The aim is to motivate young people aged 13-18 to develop Scripture-

sharing programs of their own and to make Scripture-possible and to make Scripture-sharing a part of their everyday lives. A program packet is available to provide help in implementing this outreach, for which special Scriptures are being developed.

With the growth of evangelism programs across the country, there will be a continued emphasis on the development of Scripture resources that will support new and/or ongoing evangelism programs on the national, regional and local levels. There will be a new promotion of customized Scripture editions to national and regional church bodies.

Plans are being made for the development of a special Scripture Portion for use by the various branches of the armed forces.

### 1987 Baptist Foundation Report

You might call Frank Neville handicapped. He spends most of his time in a wheelchair. But he denies that he is handicapped, and instead has utilized his limited mobility as opportunity to witness. Each day he invites neighbors and acquaintances, one at a time, into his home for coffee. There he talks with them about Jesus, and Frank has been thrilled and amazed at their expressions of appreciation for his concern for their spiritual welfare.

Frank has determined that he will never stop witnessing, and his financial and estate plans have been so prepared as to insure that he will always be a part of winning the lost to Christ. He transferred valuable land into trust with the Baptist Foundation. Until his death, he will receive income earned by the trust. After that time, all income will be paid to Carolina Baptist Association to be used for Spanish mission ministries; scholarships for youngsters to attend summer camp, for students studying for Christian vocations, and for persons going on volunteer mission trips; for training and resources for associational leadership; and for camp development. Frank Neville, like others who are faithful stewards now, wishes to continue that commitment when he is no longer here.

The Foundation promotes endowment of Christian causes with an assurance drawn from its experience with donors that such planning for the future in no way minimizes "now witnessing and giving." Just the opposite has been the case; the faithful steward is faithful in every area. The statistics, dollars and facts of this report are truly about the people whose impassioned concern for mission and ministry has resulted in positive action.

In 1986, new trust agreements were prepared for 93 persons. Their gifts to initiate these trusts totaled \$1,181,288. Many of the agreements provide for and anticipate the addition of funds in the future; thus, it is difficult to assess the longterm benefit to Baptist work provided through the trusts. Assistance was given to dozens of persons in preparing their Wills, all of whom included trusts through their estates for nearly every cause supported by Southern Baptists.

One imaginative concept employed in several trusts and Wills has been "Give it Twice". A trustor provides that family members receive income earned by the trust until they have received an amount equal to the principal placed in trust. Then, after the family has received the full amount, the income thereafter is paid to Baptist causes selected by the trustor in the trust agreement. He has denied his family nothing! They have received it all. But the principal is still intact and the second time around the income will support Kingdom work.

Because of the 1986 tax reform legislation, certain types of trusts have taken on new significance. The Retirement Unitrust has become a vehicle for partially replacing the IRA. This trust is especially attractive for professional persons and others in middle years for supplementing other pension plans.

Many local churches chose to use the Foundation as trustee for funds which they were holding for future needs. Investment of those funds with the Foundation can, in some cases, result in greater income for the church. Conversely, since the funds are pooled and since churches can recall the funds, if they are withdrawn during a depressed market, principal returned to the church could be reduced. It is important that churches recognize that the Foundation's first objective is to assist individuals in estate stewardship. The motivation for

using the Foundation must be the making of a gift to a Baptist cause. The Foundation does not operate as a bank or investment institution. However, one exciting realization for the church is that investment through the Foundation allows their funds to be a part of "family" and to be available for "family" use, if they desire.

In corporation with the state convention, the Foundation established in the last year a credit line of \$3,000,000 for church loans. The Board of Directors took action to implement recommendations of its study committee, resulting in addition to the staff of a director of administration to direct the church loan and student loan programs, as well as trust management. The Board also approved construction of office facilities for the Foundation near the Baptist Building, with plans to begin construction in September, 1987.

Assets of the Foundation have increased to more than \$13,000,000. These dollars are expressions of concern made by Baptist stewards. They are the very same persons who, like Frank Neville, witness and give daily, that the lost, the needy, the hurting people of the world might know Jesus.

## 1987 Christian Action League Report

The General Assembly adjourned its 1987 session on August 14th marking the first time in North Carolina's history for the legislature to last into August. Normally, the body concludes its work by the 4th of July.

One of the reasons for the session to last as long as it did was due to the "rash" of liquor bills along with gambling initiatives. Longtime legislative veterans stated that this session had more bills to liberalize our liquor law than ever. With the liquor lobbyists and gambling proponents working over-time, no wonder this session went on and on and on.

A major victory can be claimed by the defeat of the statewide lottery proposal. Due to Virginia's recent passage of such a bill, the heat from the gambling industry was evident. With opposition to the proposal coming from Governor James G. Martin, Lt. Governor Robert B. Jordan, and House Speaker Liston B. Ramsey, the bill died in a Senate Committee.

However, the gambling industry did not fold up its tent and go home. A pari-mutuel gambling bill, Senate Bill 732, is still alive. Its sponsor, Senator Kenneth Royall, was able to get the measure held over until the 1988 legislative session. This proposal will open the door for horse and dog gambling tracks.

Your association needs to pass a resolution opposing Senate Bill 732, the pari-mutuel gambling proposal. Send copies to Governor James G. Martin, Lt. Governor Robert B. Jordan, III, and to your State House and Senate members.

In the war against pornography, we have special reasons to be thankful. The North Carolina Supreme Court has recently upheld the constitutionality of our 1985 Comprehensive Obscenity and Child Protection Act. The "smut peddlers" have contested this statute in both the state and federal courts. Each time the courts have ruled in support of the measure. Prior to the enactment of this nationally acclaimed law, North Carolina was known as the nation's porn capital with more porno outlets per capita than any other state. We have gone from some 750 pornography outlets to less than 50. No longer do you find sexually oriented publications available and accessible to children in convenient stores, etc.

The porn industry hasn't thrown the towel in either. There will be more court cases. In the current session of the N.C. General Assembly, an effort was made to "gut" our obscenity statute. Rep. Ivan Mothershead of Mecklenburg County sought to insert into our law a provision to apply a state-wide standard rather than a community standard. Of course, that innocent sounding wording would have rendered our obscenity statute unconstitutional. The U.S. Supreme Court in its 1973 landmark case, *Miller vs. California*, set forth as a basic test in determining obscenity was the applying of a contemporary *community* standard rather than a *statewide* one. This reveals the importance of what one word could do to a good law. We are grateful that Rep. Mothershead was unsuccessful in his attempt.

Rep. Mothershead sought to repeal our newly enacted age 21 drinking law, but he was unsuccessful in that attempt. Of course, the beer industry was behind that effort, but the loss of federal highway funds for N.C. highway building projects was more than the legislators were willing to tackle. If Mothershead would have been successful, the state would have had to pass a considerable increase in motor fuel taxes. This might have been the reason behind his efforts to raise gasoline taxes.

The Christian Action League not only has been on the "firing line" during this legislative session. We have assisted in successful campaigns involving liquor, beer and wine referendums in places like Pasquotank County, Hudson, Lenoir, Banner Elk, Manteo, Franklin and King.

Thank you for standing with us in the ministry of applied Christianity. Through your prayer and financial support, you help us to be an effective applicator of "salt and light".

## The Christian Life Commission

During the past year the Christian Life Commission elected a new Executive Director, continued the fight against gambling and hunger and increased its initiatives on abortion, pronography, and other moral concerns related to families.

In January, Dr. N. Larry Baker was elected as the fourth Executive Director. He succeeds Foy Valentine who stepped down because of health problems.

The annual seminar of the Commission attracted 600 participants from throughout the Southern Baptist Convention. Nationally recognized speakers addressed a wide range of family issues including teenage suicide, aging, AIDS education, child abuse, and teaching moral values in the home and in the church. A conference for youth ministers addressed the theme "Moral Problems and Youth."

The problem of abortion received high priority as the issue became a major staff assignment. The Commission sponsored a national consultation on alternatives to abortion designed to chart new courses of action in the fight against abortion. Eight new abortion-related resources designed to help in the observance of Sanctity of Human Life Sunday were developed and distributed.

Four other special emphasis days on the Southern Baptist denominational calendar were designed and distributed to assist churches in the observation of Race Relations Sunday, Christian Citizenship Sunday, The Day of Prayer for World Peace, and World Hunger Day. The hunger emphasis continued to be aggressive as the annual Awareness/Action Guide was sent to all pastors and Directors of Missions.

Several Conferences were held in partnership with state conventions.

A videotape entitled "Combating Pornography" was produced with the aid of some of the staff members of the Commission. Conferences and pamphlets were produced and distributed on Anti-pornography.

Sales and distribution of Christian Ethics materials increased by more than 65 percent, netting an all-time high. The past year marked another record as the circulation of LIGHT increased to more than 19,000.



## Gideons

The Gideon organization, known as Gideons International, is composed of over 90,000 professional and business men in 127 countries. With the help of the local churches here and throughout all 137 countries, the Gideons are placing more than two million scriptures per month. Funding to purchase the scriptures comes from three main sources: 1. local church offerings; 2. the Faith Fund (Gideon donations by the individual members); and 3. the Memorial Bible contributions. ALL monies donated to the Gideons go toward the purchase of Bibles; the administrative costs of the organization are paid by the individual members.

The Jackson County Camp, one of 5,000 local camps, was founded in 1982. The present camp enrollment numbers sixteen members. It has been the camp's pleasure to share a Gideon presentation in more than forty churches during this past year. Members have also presented scriptures to the fifth grade students in both Jackson and Swain Counties, as well as distributing more than 1,000 Bibles at Western Carolina University and Southwestern Technical College. Gideons have also kept check to see that Bibles are in all hotel and motel rooms in the two counties. The Jackson County Camp has received approximately \$10,000 during 1986 to be used for the purchase of scriptures.

## Stewardship Committee

II Corinthians 9:7 says, "Every Man according as he purposeth in his heart, so let him give: not grudgingly, or of necessity; for God loveth a cheerful giver."

This scripture tells us several things. (1) Everyone is to give. No one is exempt. (2) Our giving or not giving reflects the condition of our heart. (3) Our giving is not to be coerced no more than our lack of giving is to serve as coercion. We give to honor God. (4) God is pleased when we give. How we break his heart when we fail to give!

This is true of Christians and it is equally true of the churches in our association. Every church should give. Their giving reflects the heart and vision of the church. Neither church nor association should coerce the other in the matter of giving. God is pleased with the generous church.

Here is our record of giving comparing August of 1986 with August 1987. (Year to date giving):

- (1) 38 Churches contributed to the budget in 1986.  
37 Churches contributed to the budget in 1987.
- (2) Seventeen (17) Churches increased their giving in 1987.  
Sixteen (16) Churches decreased their giving in 1987, by a significant amount.  
Four (4) Churches remained at the same level of giving.  
Thirteen (13) Churches gave financial support to the Association in 1987.  
Twelve (12) Churches gave no financial support to the Association in 1986.
- (3) Support from church giving is off approximately \$1,100 from last year.

We now stand at a crossroads in the Association. To move ahead in developing and implementing programs that will strengthen the work of the association in the local church, we must receive adequate support from the local church. To fail to do this is to fail in our stewardship responsibility to God. The way we spend our financial resources clearly reflects our values. If the Lord's work is important to us, then our giving will demonstrate that importance.

We challenge each church to intentionally develop the stewardship responsibility in mission giving and to include the Association in its mission gifts.

# Constitution

(Revisions: August 16, 1957; August 16, 1975; August 19, 1978; August 17, 1979; August 15, 1980; August 13, 1982; August 17, 1984; August 16, 1985 and August 22, 1986. The 1986 changes are indicated by an asterisk\*.)

## ARTICLE I — NAME

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association.

## ARTICLE II - OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the association are as follows:

1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.
2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.
3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.
4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.
5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

## ARTICLE III - AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. The association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline.

3. SECTION 3. The association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as sovereign and independent bodies.

## ARTICLE IV - MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the New Testament.

SECTION 2. The association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watch care of the association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watch care the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the association except those of voting.

Applications for membership shall be presented to the Credentials Committee of the Association. The applications will consist of a letter from a Constituted Church stating their desire to affiliate with the Tuckaseegee Baptist Association. The Credentials Committee as a part of the review process may invite the requesting church to a conference to discuss its history, its missions strategy, and any other information that may be pertinent to the application. The Credentials Committee may then approve the application and recommend them to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee may by a simple majority vote accept the requesting church to come under the watch care of the association for one year. It is suggested that any church under watch care participate in the missions program of the association. At the end of the year the church may be voted in as a member of the association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the Annual Meeting of the association, provided that the church submits an acceptable letter and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. Any church may withdraw from the association at its pleasure and should notify the association of this action in writing. Such action will be recognized by the association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the associational clerk, before each annual session, and annual letter, the forms provided by the associational clerk giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

SECTION 5. The association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such a vote is to be taken by written ballot.

## ARTICLE V - MEETINGS

\*SECTION 1. The association shall hold its annual meeting on Thursday and Friday preceding the third Sunday in OCTOBER. Special meetings of the association may be called by the Executive Committee provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by four messengers. Churches with more than 100 resident members shall be entitled to an additional messenger for each additional 50 resident members as determined by the church or fraction thereof and not to exceed 10 messengers from any one church.

SECTION 3. Churches are requested to elect their messengers and alternates in conference to attend the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the question is decided as to which party is in union with the association. The decision is to be made by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

## ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS

\*SECTION 1. General officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Historian, Parliamentarian, and Assistant Parliamentarian. Program Leaders shall be Sunday School Director, Church Training Director, Music Director, Chairman of Evangelism Committee, Seminary Extension Director, Chairman of Missions Committee, Director of Missions, Trustees, Pastor Conference President, Youth Director, Stewardship Director, Vacation Bible School Director, Woman's Missionary Union Director, Brotherhood Director, Deacons Chairman, Senior Adult Director, Singles Ministry Director, and such other officers as the Association may desire to elect.

Associational representatives will be elected for the following institutions and agencies: (1) Truett Camp, (2) Baptist Children's Homes, (3) Baptist Hospital, (4) North Carolina Baptist Homes, Inc. (Homes for Aging), (5) *Biblical Recorder*, (6) Christian Education, (7) Annuity Board and other representatives as may be deemed appropriate and elected by the association.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the director of associational missions and trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The moderator and vice moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of trustees the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service the trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term or three years.

\*Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session. The Associational Financial year will begin at the close of the Annual Meeting.

Concerning termination of employment, the resignation shall be in writing and presented to the Executive Committee at least 30 days before it is to take place. The Executive Committee may terminate employment by giving 30 days notice in advance.

The Executive Committee shall give full supervision and guidance to the work of the Director of Missions in planning, promoting and financing his work.

## ARTICLE VII - DUTIES OF OFFICERS

**SECTION 1.** The Moderator shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the association.

He shall appoint the Committee on Committees and all other committees pertinent to the operation of the body not named by the Committee on Committees in its regular report.

**SECTION 2.** The Vice Moderator shall assist the moderator and shall preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the moderator.

**SECTION 3.** The Clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all transactions; shall prepare a "Book of Reports" to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of each day's session of the annual meeting; and shall cause to be printed minutes concerning the records made.

The clerk shall mail to the clerk of each church in the association, blanks for the preparation of the church letter as soon as they are received from the state convention. This form is to be returned to the clerk of the association not later than two weeks prior to the meeting of the body.

An Assistant Clerk shall work with the clerk in preparing "The Book of Reports."

**\*SECTION 4.** The Treasurer shall receive and dispense by the order of the Executive Committee of the association while in session, the money of the treasury and make a complete report at the annual meeting and a current report at each Executive Committee meeting.

An Assistant Treasurer shall be elected to assist the treasurer by request and to serve in the event the Treasurer resigns or is ill or unable to function.

**SECTION 5.** The Historian shall keep the records of the association up-to-date.

**SECTION 6.** The Parliamentarian shall upon the request of the presiding officer of the body advise and assist the association with respect to all matter involving parliamentary procedure.

An Assistant Parliamentarian shall be elected. The Parliamentarian and Assistant should always communicate with each other to ensure that their office is filled at each associational annual or Executive Committee meeting.

**SECTION 7.** The Program Leaders and the Institutional Agency Representatives shall perform all duties customary to their titles and shall make a written report to the annual session of the association.

**SECTION 8.** The Director of Missions shall work closely with the associational committees, officers, and churches in such a way as to facilitate the meeting of the objectives of the association as set forth in Article II.

The director shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the association. The director shall communicate with the state and Southern Convention such information as shall be mutually helpful and needful.

The duties of the Director of Missions shall be set forth in Article XIV.

**\*SECTION 9.** Trustees have no authority except by direction of the association, and are not personally bound by their signatures but, are to be the legal signees for the association.

Trustees represent the association in legal matters.

Trustees act on behalf of the association in acquisition and disposal of associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the association.

All persons dealing with the trustees, as associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the association moderator and clerk.

## ARTICLE VIII - RULES OF ORDER

The business of the association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

## ARTICLE IX - QUORUM

The annual associational quorum shall be not less than 25 percent of the member churches represented.

## ARTICLE X - THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

**SECTION 1.** The Executive Committee shall be composed of the general officers and program leaders elected by the association and the pastor and one member from each church in the association. No pastor, by virtue of his being an associational officer or program leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

**SECTION 2.** It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the association on matters arising when the association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the moderator on Monday following the first Sunday of each quarter except for the July quarter which shall meet on the last Monday of the month of July. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the moderator with a one week notice to the churches.

**SECTION 3.** All vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

**SECTION 4.** In the event that a vacancy occurs with the trustees, the Executive Committee should fill such a vacancy for the remainder of the term.

## ARTICLE XI - ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

**\*SECTION 1.** The association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The term of office for all committee members shall be for one year except where specifically stated otherwise.

**SECTION 2. COMMITTEE ON COMMITTEES.** It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate at the general meeting all standing committees as set forth under Article XI.

**SECTION 3. THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE** shall be composed of seven members. To this group the directors of Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood and Music Ministry will be added.

It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the officers, program leaders and institutional/agency representatives. These nominees shall be notified in writing not less than one month prior to presenting of their names at the annual session.

**SECTION 4. THE ORDER OF BUSINESS COMMITTEE**, composed of three members shall plan the annual program of the association and present it to the Executive Committee at its July meeting.

**SECTION 5. THE CREDENTIALS COMMITTEE** shall be composed of three pastors and two laymen. It shall examine applications of churches seeking admission into the association in keeping with Article IV, and make recommendations to the association.

It shall counsel with churches that are out of harmony or fellowship with the association.

**SECTION 6. THE PLACE AND PREACHER COMMITTEE** shall be composed of three members. The duties of this committee shall be to recommend the place or places for the following annual meeting and to recommend the preacher and alternate to deliver the annual sermon for the following year.

**\*SECTION 7. THE RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE** shall be composed of three members appointed by the moderator at the OCTOBER Executive Committee meeting. It shall be the duty of the committee to present suitable resolutions at the annual associational meeting.

**SECTION 8.** The **MEMORIAL COMMITTEE** shall be composed of three members. It shall be the duty of this committee to bring a report to the annual meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last annual meeting and shall lead in a memorial service in their memory.

**\*SECTION 9.** The **FINANCE COMMITTEE** shall be composed of six members including the treasurer of the association. This committee shall: (a) present a budget to the association for the following year; (b) devise plans for raising the funds for the associational budget; (c) audit the finances and financial records of the association annually and anytime there is a change of treasurer or at the direction of the association or the Executive Committee; (d) report all audits to the annual association meeting.

**SECTION 10.** The **CONSTITUTION COMMITTEE** shall be composed of three members and shall perform all duties specified in Article XV.

**SECTION 11.** The **ORDINATION COMMITTEE** shall be composed of five designated pastors and all other pastors who desire to sit with the committee.

- a. The committee serves in an advisory capacity only and serves at the request of the church from which one of the members is seeking ordination.
- b. The committee should examine such candidates for the ministry as come before it as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the church as they feel led.
- c. The committee should assist in arranging the proper service of ordination when such assistance is requested.
- d. The Executive Committee should be informed regularly of the work of the committee.
- e. Each church desiring to ordain a candidate is urged to consult with the committee, and shall give two weeks notice in which the committee is to do its work.

**SECTION 12.** The **EVANGELISM COMMITTEE.** The duties of the committee shall be to direct and promote a perpetual program and spirit of evangelism in the association. It shall arrange and direct all associational wide evangelistic activities.

**SECTION 13.** The **MISSIONS COMMITTEE** shall be composed of six members, two named each year and each serving for a three-year term. Committee members are eligible to be re-elected for one additional term of office in succession. The associational Brotherhood Director and Woman's Missionary Union Director are to serve as ex officio members along with the Director of Missions and the Moderator.

The duties of the Missions Committee shall be to plan, conduct and evaluate the mission program of the association through: (a) Helping churches commit themselves to being **ON MISSION** in their setting; (b) Provide and interpret information on mission needs to the churches of the association; (c) To survey the mission needs to be found within the association; (d) Assist churches in doing mission work; (e) Conduct the kinds of mission work that individual churches cannot successfully conduct.

**SECTION 14.** The **BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE** shall be comprised of three members. The committee shall be responsible for and in charge of the upkeep and repairs of the associational building, grounds, and equipment.

## **ARTICLE XII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL**

The **ASSOCIATIONAL COUNCIL** shall be composed of the Director of Missions, the Moderator, the Vice Moderator, the program leaders: Sunday School, Church Training, Woman's Missionary Union, Brotherhood, the Chairmen of Deacons, the Chairman of Evangelism Committee, the chairman of the Missions Committee, the Chairman of the Finance Committee. The Director of Missions is to serve as Chairman and a secretary shall be elected from the group.

The purpose of the council is to coordinate the planning of the various programs of the association, to develop an associational calendar, and to give mutual support to the various organization and program units in carrying out their assignments.

The council shall meet quarterly.

## **ARTICLE XIII - THE ASSOCIATIONAL PASTORS' CONFERENCE**

The Associational Pastors' Conference provides regular meetings for the Baptist ministers of the association. The purpose of the conference is for fellowship and mutual support, for doctrinal and professional discussion and for promotion of church, associational and other denominational programs. The conference is not an administrative or executive body.

## **ARTICLE XIV - DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS JOB DESCRIPTION**

**SECTION 1. FUNCTION OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS.** He is to be the chief administrative officer of the association. He is to confirm extra employment in a manner agreed upon with the Executive Committee.

**SECTION 2. RELATIONSHIP OF THE DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS.**

1. He is employed by the Executive Committee of the association.
2. General supervision of the personnel and program of the association as they function through the association office.
3. Work primarily with (pastors), associational general officers, committees, and organizations.
4. Work closely with auxiliary organizations (such as W.M.U., Baptist Men, etc.).
5. Lead in maintaining relationships with state and S.B.C. agencies and promoting their programs.

**SECTION 3.** In the churches, extending the local ministries.

To visit churches by invitation of the pastor or other church leaders in the pastorless churches to provide assistance in the church program and ministry, such as (1) Pulpit supply; (2) Study courses; (3) Missionary address; (4) Deacon's meetings; (5) Assembly programs; (6) Special day addresses; (7) Ordination services; (8) V.B.S. planning and promotion; (9) To interpret phases of associational work; (10) Budget planning; (11) Building planning; (12) Revival meetings; (13) Stewardship emphasis; (14) Study objectives and long range planning; (15) Studying and evaluating procedures, curriculum, constitution and bylaws, etc.; (16) Church-community surveys, etc.; (17) Promoting a world missions concept; and (18) Publishing of a regular news medium (such as a monthly newsletter); (19) Cooperate with the news media to promote Baptist work.

In the associational office:

- a. Personal correspondence, promotional mail, and telephoning pertinent to his work.
- b. Office conferences, answer to inquiries, etc.
- c. Assist associational officers, committees and heads of organizations to get out promotional mail pertinent to their work.

**SECTION 4. Schedule of Benefits**

1. His salary shall be
2. His fringe benefits shall include
3. His schedule shall include:
  - a. One day a week, chosen at his discretion, shall be reserved for rest that excluded normal associational activities.
  - b. A maximum of four weeks each year outside of the association for special work with local churches or with state and S.B.C. agencies.
  - c. An annual sick leave of 26 days maximum, with a maximum of 42 days to be accumulated. Sick leave may be advanced by the association for one year without Executive Committee action. Sick leave is to be recorded with the financial secretary of the association.
  - d. Two weeks annual vacation with pay.
  - e. Holidays: New Year's Day; Easter Monday; July 4; Labor Day; Thanksgiving, Thursday and Friday; Christmas, December 25 and 26.
4. All honorarium from churches inside or outside the association and all honorarium from other religious work shall be his personal fair, and shall not be submitted to the association.

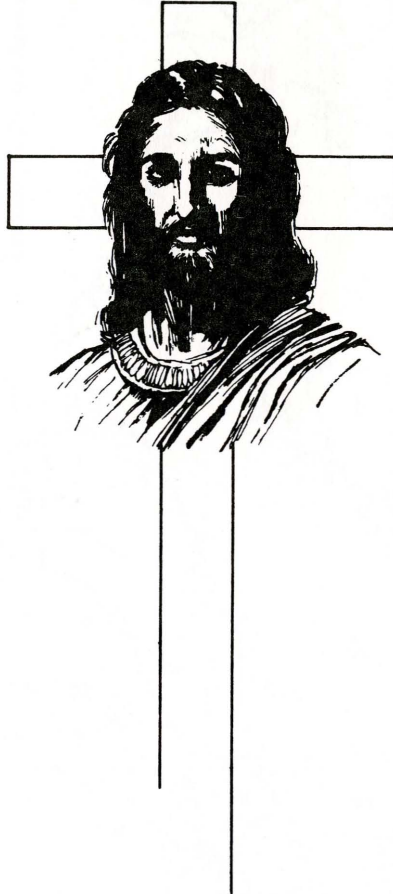

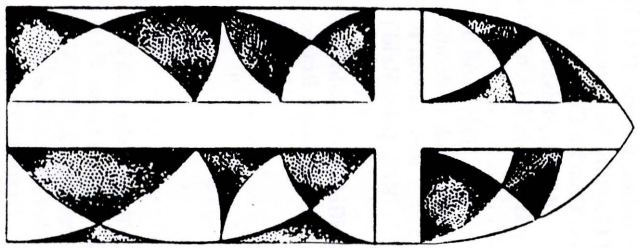
