# TUCKASEIGEE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION Proceedings of 192nd Annual Meetings

# **TUESDAY, OCTOBER 12, 2021**

- 1. Moses Creek Baptist Church hosted the first session of the 192<sup>nd</sup> Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. It began at 6:00 p.m. A total of 44 present: 38 Messengers and 6 visitors representing 12 churches.
- 2. Dennis Proffitt, Moderator, welcomed everyone.
- 3. Jason Watson of Moses Creek Baptist Church provided special music.
- 4. Rev. Mark Rogers, pastor of Lighthouse Baptist Church, preached the opening sermon from 2 Timothy 2:1-3. He emphasized that we are to do all to the glory of God and to be learning and teaching about God.
- 5. The 192<sup>nd</sup> Annual Meeting was called to order by Dennis Proffitt, Moderator.
- 6. The Order of Business was presented and approved with no changes.
- 7. New pastors and visitors were asked to stand and be recognized: Rev. Hunter Gosnell and his wife April from Ochre Hill Baptist Church were recognized.

## COMMITTEES

- 8. <u>Stewardship</u> Rev. Mike Moore presented the proposed 2021-2022 budget to be voted on Thursday. The budget is on page 6. He said the there was little change in the budget. Mostly an increase of 4% in the personnel costs and a new line item for Van expenses.
- 9. No further nominations were made and the Nominating Committee List was approved.
- 10. <u>Annual Meeting Committee</u> Laura Brown presented a thank you to the Moses Creek Baptist, Rev. Mark Rogers, Scotts Creek Baptist, Rev. Hunter Gosnell and officers and volunteers in the association for their work in the association this year.
- 11. <u>Place and Preacher</u>— Laura Brown presented the Place and Preacher recommendations for 2022. It was approved.
- 12. <u>Memorials</u> Laura Brown read the names of members from each church that had passed away during the past year.
- 13. <u>Miscellaneous Business</u> –Rev. Gerald Morris made a motion that the Association allow Gracella and Gerald to seek to purchase a new copier for a purchase price of not more than \$6,700. They will also negotiate a service contract. This motion was approved.

#### REPORTS

- 14. Director of Missions Rev. Gerald Morris presented his report on pages 3 and 4.
- 15. <u>WMU</u> Tracy Salter, Associational WMU Director, presented the report on page 5. She said one of the goals for the future was to have the NC Baptist Medical Van come to Jackson County.

# MISSION REPORTS

- 16. Lighthouse Baptist Ruthie Salter and Whitney Massengill reported that 9 from their church went with Deep Impact to Rosehill, NC. Ruthie and Whitney conducted a sports camp and gave a devotion each day. The others built 3 ramps. They love to be the hands and feet of Jesus. They encouraged people to get involved in missions through these prepackaged Deep Impact mission packages or work with their rebuild sites anytime of the year.
- 17. New Hope Baptist —Arthur Dillard said that New Hope has been building handicap ramps through the Council on Aging for the last 12 years. They get such a blessing to be able to do this.
- 18. **Jackson County Bible Club** Steve Alexander, the president of Bible Club spoke about the need of teachers and helpers. He spoke from Galatians 5:22.
- 19. HomeBase of WCU Jim Dean spoke about the outreach of Baptist Children's Homes of NC to help college students who have little to no family support. They have been at WCU for 5 years. They now have 5 apartments for emergency housing, a food/household supplies pantry, showers, laundry, host

5 weekly Bible studies, and provide a meal on Thursday night. Please pray for their ministry. Churches can help by providing gift cards for extra food, gas or other needs.

20. Rev. Hunter Gosnell led the benediction prayer.

# THURSDAY, OCTOBER 14, 2021

- 1. Scotts Creek Baptist Church hosted the second session of the 192<sup>nd</sup> Annual Meeting of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. It began at 6:00 p.m. A total of 48 present: 31 Messengers and 17 visitors representing 11 churches.
- 2. Dennis Proffitt, Moderator, welcomed everyone.
- 3. Joyce Dyer and the choir of Scotts Creek Baptist Church provided special music. Pastor J.D. Grant read scripture and prayed.
- 4. Stewardship Rob Sutton presented the Proposed Budget and it was approved.
- 5. Truett Camp Kenny Adcock presented a report about all the new activities being offered at the Truett Conference Center & Camp. They went from having 18 volunteers to 79 volunteers this year. Anyone interested in their annual report can request one from Gracella.
- 6. Life Challenge No one came to present a report.
- 7. Baptist Children's Homes of NC: Rev. Lewis Smith told about his "Bike for Hope" that included 600 miles and raised \$105,000. Then he showed a couple of videos. Written report was in the Book of Reports.
- 8. **Registration** Gracella Morris reported that for the 2 nights there were 47 messengers and 13 churches represented. There were approximately 26 visitors.
- 9. Ochre Hill Kim Fiskeaux said that they continue to operate the Lord's Closet. They have requests for clothes 10-15 times a month on top of their monthly scheduled opening on the 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday of the month. They provide a meal and pray with the people monthly. The church has also continued their partnership with NC Baptist on Mission to work in Burgaw, NC. This summer the crew worked in construction, sorting clothes and with the foodbank. She challenged everyone to ask themselves, What is God calling you to do?
- 10. Cashiers No one was able to come and present this year.
- 11. Congregational Song David Dalton led the congregation in singing "When We All Get to Heaven."
- 12. Rev. Hunter Gosnell, pastor of Ochre Hill Baptist Church, preached the closing sermon about Jesus Being the Good Shepherd from John 10:11-16.
- 13. Rev. Gerald Morris led the benediction prayer.

## **Executive Committee Report 2021**

### January 11, 2021 Cancelled

There was not a January Executive Committee Meeting due to the COVID-19 precautions and Gerald and Gracella Morris being sick. Gracella mailed or emailed a copy of the Financial Statement, DOM Report and the WMU report for October through December 2020 to the Executive Committee members on January 13, 2021.

# April 12, 2021 - 7:00 p.m.

The quarterly meeting, of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association was called to order by Dennis Proffitt, Moderator at the Baptist Center. There were 12 executive committee members and three visitors with eight churches represented. Dennis led the group in an opening prayer. Rev. Mark Rogers, Pastor of Lighthouse Baptist Church, lead the devotion. No changes were made to the agenda. Rev. Mark Rogers, pastor of Lighthouse Baptist, and Liliana Rameriz of El Centro Del Señor were recognized as new members.

The proceedings from the 2020 Annual Meeting and the October 2020 through March 31, 2021 financial statement were presented and approved. It was discussed at this time that some churches should be encouraged to give to the association and churches might need to hear again what the association does.

Associational WMU Director, Doris Melton, presented the following report. John 4:35 says "Say not ye, There are yet four months, and then cometh harvest? behold, I say unto you, Lift up your eyes, and look on the fields; for they are white already to harvest."

While it has been a challenging time, many churches are serving the Lord through the USDA's Farmers to Families Food Boxes Program. Faith, Calvary, Locust Field, Cullowhee Valley, Ochre Hill, Promise Land, Mt. Pleasant and Black Mountain Baptist Churches have distributed food boxes this quarter that contained vegetables, fruit, milk, yogurt, cheese, and meat. Locust Field Baptist prepared homemade Valentine's Cards with the residents at Skyland Care Center, Morningstar Assisted Living and The Hermitage. Little Savannah Baptist has been sending treat bags to the rest home on the dates they were originally scheduled to go sing and have a service with them, since COVID-19. Faith Baptist and Calvary Baptist Churches have provided Women's Bible Studies. Calvary Baptist is collecting diapers or money for diapers for the Smoky Mountain Pregnancy Care Center. Every church is encouraged to collect food, supplies and gift cards for Broyhill Children's Homes during the month of April. The WMU is planning their annual meeting. It was cancelled last year and officers continued to serve for another year. Hopefully they will be able to meet and elect new officers and make plans for the New Year. The WMU has been collecting for the Heck-Jones offering and the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering. The Red Box Ministry for the year was such a success last year that they are hoping to increase the number of women prisoners they serve from 1,700 to 2,800. The WMU will continue their mission to do service for His glory.

Rev. Gerald Morris presented his Director of Mission's Report as follows: Note: This report will include the months from the last two quarters (October 2020 to December 2020 and January 2021 to March 2021) because the January Executive Committee Meeting was canceled due to a surge in COVID infections in the community and because Gerald and Gracella were both sick from COVID at the time. This March marked a full year of strangeness. During the past year, the number of cases of COVID has waxed and waned causing much confusion in the churches and the Association as it has in society as a whole. This has made it difficult to plan church services and Associational events. Each church has prayerfully modified its schedules, sometimes on a weekly basis. Some churches never stopped meeting inside while others are still not meeting inside in person at the time when this report was written (April 7). Each church has done a wonderful job using Facebook, Youtube, radio transmitters, parking lot services when they deemed it unsafe to meet inside. Those churches that have been meeting inside have followed

safety protocols that the leaders and members felt would protect everyone involved - ie, marking off every other pew, requesting/requiring masks, halting fellowship time during service and even suspending fellowship meals. A few churches have even offered mask optional and mask required services to accommodate people with varying needs and comfort levels. Nearly all churches canceled Sunday School, Sunday evening and Wednesday evening on-site services to reduce exposure. A few churches have restarted some of these services with a very few restarting all of them. On Easter Sunday (April 4th), several churches were happy to see some of the older members of their congregation return for the first time since March 2020 because they were able to receive the COVID vaccination. I have heard reports of the joy that their return brought the returning elder and those in the congregation that welcomed them back. Many of the churches have not let the restrictions of this pandemic stop them from doing the ministry that God has called them to do in their "Jerusalem." Several churches in the Association have worked with NC Baptists on Mission to participate in the USDA's Farms to Family food distribution. This program provided food boxes to people in need that have been purchased from farmers needing help selling their products. Two ministries that are affiliated with the Association have had to be suspended during this past year are Rest Home Visitation and Bible Clubs in the public schools. For multiple decades, the churches in the Association, and several outside of the Association, have volunteered to visit the nursing/ rest homes during Sunday afternoon to hold a short worship service with singing and preaching. This ministry has been halted for the past year because the long-term residential facilities have been shut down to all visitors (even family members) since last March. Jackson County Bible Clubs is an independent non-denominational ministry that has sent volunteers into the public schools of Jackson County after school once a week for the last 20+ years to teach Bible lessons. Many of the Baptist Churches have been faithfully involved in this ministry. Unfortunately, the schools have been closed to all outside visitors and volunteers. Plans are being made and prayers are said in anticipation of the restart of these important ministries in the future. Each church has been very creative in following what the members and leaders felt were responsible, God-honoring measures throughout this tumultuous time. Each has traveled a different path with the same destination - a future where we can get back to "normal". Just like the churches, the Association has seen many changes this past year. The October 2020 Annual Meeting was held in an abbreviated manner. No non-Association ministries (Southern Baptist Convention, Baptist State Convention of NC or local ministries) were invited to share a verbal report. The number of messengers was limited to two per church instead of the normal numbers spelled out in the constitution (dependent on membership number of church and financial support of the Association). The agenda was shortened to one evening with only minimal reports and business conducted. On recommendation from medical authorities against congregational singing, the only music was provided by One Accord as they sang a few songs to begin the meeting. Also in accord with the restriction of congregational singing. The Fall and Spring Associational Singings were canceled. We are currently looking into possible future singings as soon as it is safe. For November and December, we have always curtailed the number of activities planned at the Associational level due to the very active church calendars during the holiday season. Because of the pandemic, even the churches' activities were severely limited. A few churches held traditional Christmas plays, even though some were held in a non-traditional setting. The most memorable one that I was able to visit was Little Savannah's play held in the parking lot. The angel sitting in a deer stand high up on the light pole must be a first for all Christmas plays. After a wonderful holiday season, the new year started off in an unexpected way. Gracella and I (along with our kids) became sick with COVID. Even though our sickness turned out to be mild, it necessitated the closure of the office the first week of January and the cancellation of the first Executive Meeting of 2021. After a brief surge in the number of COVID cases at the beginning of the year, the number of infections began to subside. With the turning of a new year, churches continued to work toward more in-person worship services (inside and out). This return to in-person worship afforded me more opportunities to

visit and preach at Association churches. Since the middle of January, I have had the honor of preaching nearly every Sunday morning at different churches. Since few churches started Sunday evening services until just recently, I have had the privilege of attending Ochre Hill Baptist with my family. In January, the Jackson Camp of Gideons International requested the use of the Baptist Center to hold their meetings since the place where they had been meeting was closed. We were glad to be able to provide this wonderful ministry a place when they needed it. The Spanish Fruitland classes continue to meet and are well attended. They have had to split the class into two groups because of social distancing needs, I am talking to Fruitland about the possibility of holding Bible classes in English here in the future. 2021 is shaping up to be a great year for missions emphasis. After about three years of work, I have been able to schedule the president of the International Mission Board to come and speak in our Association. Paul Chitwood will be speaking at Lovedale Baptist Church on the evening of May 16th. I have also been working on the Associational Missions Conference coming up this Fall. It will be different this year because we have three host churches that will be hosting missionaries Sunday morning through Wednesday evening and about seven churches that will be hosting a missionary for one service on Sunday, I have placed my request for missionary speakers and am currently waiting to see who God sends to us this year. Another future event that we are planning is the May Associational Emphasis and Special Offering. It has been a wonderful privilege to serve God by serving the churches for nearly 11 years (Gerald) and 19 years (Gracella). We hope to be able to continue serving your church for years to come but we need your help. Each year expenses continue to rise and many years the Association has ended the year with a deficit. Many churches have been very generous and have raised their giving in recent years, but some have not increased their giving for many years. Please check to see what your church is currently giving to the Association and see if it has been increased lately. If your church is financially able, please pray about increasing what your church contributes. We will also be taking up a special offering in the month of May. Please consider taking up a special offering one Sunday in May. This special offering can take two parts - set aside a special Sunday to pass the plate for an offering and also ask everyone to bring their old, unused keys. We will recycle them at the scrap dealer for cash. We are continuing this collection from last year because COVID interrupted the collection. Please be in prayer for the five churches (Dicks Creek, Long Branch, Pine Creek, Locust Field and Lovedale) that are currently searching for a pastor. Some have been looking for years with no success. Please pray that God will raise up young men willing to pastor bivocational churches. This is not only a problem here in Jackson County, but is very widespread. Please pray for the Association as we, like all of the churches, search for a "new normal" in which we honor God better than we have in the past. We are looking for new ways that we can help your church reach its Jerusalem to the Uttermost parts. Please share with us how we can help you through training, cooperation, mission opportunities, etc. as we reset from this strange year.

### There was No Old or New Business.

Announcements & prayer requests were taken. Ruthie Salter led the group in closing prayer.

Rev. Gerald Morris, Director of Missions Dennis Proffitt, Moderator Gracella Morris, Clerk The quarterly meeting, of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association was called to order by Dennis Proffitt, Moderator at the Baptist Center. There were 17 executive committee members and five visitors with 14 churches represented. Dennis led the group in an opening prayer. David Dalton led the group in singing "Living by Faith". Rev. Jamie Ashe, Pastor of Dicks Creek Baptist Church, lead the devotion. The WMU Report was removed from the agenda because Doris Melton could not be there. Rev. Jamie Ashe, pastor of Dicks Creek Baptist, was recognized as a new member. Sergio Barranco of First Baptist Church Highlands/Spanish and Artemio Corona of Yellow Mountain First Spanish Church were recognized as guests.

The proceedings from the April 12th Executive Committee Meeting and the October 2020 through June 30, 2021 financial statement were presented and approved.

Rev. Gerald Morris presented his Director of Mission's Report. When it comes to the COVID pandemic, it seems that we can see the light at the end of the tunnel. This last quarter churches have been able to open their doors to worship with less restrictions. The masks have come off, the pews have been unblocked and in-house church services have begun to return. All of the churches in the Association have begun meeting for regular Sunday morning services, less than half have returned to Wednesday night and a few have returned to Sunday evening services and just a handful have begun Sunday School. With more churches opening more services I have been visiting and preaching more than I was able to in the past year. It is such a great feeling to be able to worship with people, some that I have not seen in over a year. I look forward to more church services opening up so I can visit more in the near future. During this transition time there have been some hiccups in the opening process. In May, we had looked forward to hosting Paul Chitwood, the president of the International Missions Board, but a brief rush on gasoline caused such a shortage that we had to postpone his visit. His visit has been rescheduled to March of 2022, this was the earliest he could fit us into his busy schedule. The April Food Roundup for the Baptist Children's Homes was a great success with a return to the large amounts of food and gift cards that we have seen in the past (last year's roundup was lower than usual). We appreciate the help of Scotts Creek Baptist's children and youth for sorting and packing the donations and several men from various churches that came to haul the food to Broyhill in Clyde. The Associational Prayer Emphasis and Special Offering was a success. We had several churches give special offerings, some increased their budgeted amounts and a few individuals gave directly to the Association also. For the past year we have been collecting old keys to sell as a special fundraiser. I have not had the time to sell them so it is not too late to bring in any keys you may have. A T-shirt fundraiser was also conducted and it was a success. We thank everyone that continues to support the work of the Association through your prayerful and financial offerings. The Association is dependent on the generosity of those it serves. This quarter saw a couple of examples of that. Will Morris came and spent a day volunteering to help with several jobs that needed to be done around the building. The Spanish Fruitland class that meets on Friday night has continued paying for the mowing of the Baptist Center grounds. They have done this for several years and it has saved the Association so much during that time. This quarter they also paid to have the flower beds mulched. All of this help is greatly appreciated. If you have some time to volunteer, I have a list of things that need to be done around the building to keep it looking nice. In May, I travelled to Winston-Salem to vote on a new Executive Director-Treasurer for the NC Baptist State Convention. Todd Unzicker, at the time worked for Summit Church in Durham, was the only candidate that was offered for a vote. After discussion one other candidate was nominated and a vote was taken and Todd was chosen. He has begun to enact changes in the Convention, the first being a "Fill the Tank" baptism emphasis. With this emphasis he is asking churches to hold a baptism service September 12. Let us pray that he can serve all of the churches throughout the state from one end to the other and from large to small. Looking to the future, the 2021

Missions Conference is shaping up to be wonderful this year. We have eleven churches hosting and six missionaries participating. The missionaries serve in South Asia, Southeast Asia, East Asia and Sub-Saharan Africa and are currently on furlough. Keep an eye on the Baptist Herald, the Association's newsletter, to see what churches are hosting so you can hear what God is doing through the International Missions Board. We have a mission opportunity available locally in September. The Association has reserved a space at Western Carolina University's annual Mountain Heritage Day to set up a tent to feature the churches of the Association. We need volunteers to work at the tent so we can tell passersby about the Gospel and our churches. We could use your help for as little or as much time as you can give. This is a great way for you to get out information about your church. We would also love for you to drop off information about your church (brochure, flyer, an information sheet, etc.) to the Baptist Center so we can have it in the booth to give away. I am currently working on restarting other missions and ministry opportunities for the future. After school starts and things settle down, I hope to hold a meeting with people that are interested in a mission trip next year, so I can determine where God would like for us to serve. We can see the light at the end of the tunnel and it is getting brighter every day. Maybe soon all of this disruption will be a memory and we can get back to serving God to our fullest.

There was no Old Business.

New Business: A motion was made to accept the gift of a van from Cashiers Baptist Church and to set up a group to prepare guidelines and answer questions before the van is sent out. It was approved.

Announcements and prayer requests were taken. Rev. Gerald Morris led the group in closing prayer.

# Director of Missions Annual Report, 2020-2021

This annual report will be an update of the last two reports that were presented at the last two Executive Committee meetings. These reports can be found in the minutes of the Executive Committee found in this Book of Reports.

This year has had as many ups and downs as any rollercoaster that I have seen. The churches of the Association began the year mostly closed down and many were broadcasting their services online. As the months progressed the number of COVID cases began to lower to the point that all of the churches were meeting inside Sunday morning with a few beginning Sunday and Wednesday evening services. By the time that I write this (9/29) COVID cases have increased and some churches have returned to outdoor services. The only constant in this year has been a constant change in circumstances that the leaders of the churches had to respond to.

Since all of the churches have been meeting regularly, I have once again become busy preaching and visiting. Most Sundays I have been busy preaching. I count it a great privilege to be able to help churches in the absence of their pastor be it because he is sick, on vacation or if they are in-between pastors. Since most churches have suspended evening church services, I have not been able to visit as I would like. I enjoy the time that I get to visit with each church and look forward to the day that I can begin visiting on a regular basis again.

The USDA Farms to Family food giveaway has ended, but some churches are continuing to minister to their community by giving away food and clothes just as they had done in years past.

After having to miss the last school year, Jackson County Bible Club is preparing to restart at the beginning of October. The administration has given them permission to reenter the schools under very carefully crafted procedures. Additional teachers and helpers are greatly needed. This ministry has reached thousands of Jackson County school children in the 20+ years that it has been running. Most of the children that the Bible Clubs reach are unchurched and lost.

After having to cancel the January Executive Committee meeting due to COVID, the April and July meetings were held with good attendance at both.

The Missions Conference was a great success this year with eleven churches in three counties participating. This year the Conference format was a hybrid of previous years. Three churches chose to host missionaries for five services Sunday morning through Wednesday evening. The rest of the churches hosted one missionary speaker for either Sunday morning or evening. The Association hosted six missionaries and was able to reimburse their expenses and give a very generous honorarium. During the Conference, Webster Baptist commissioned Renee Peoples to serve in Slovenia. She will be working with the Bells, IMB missionaries that she met during our 2019 Missions Conference.

Several of the missionaries that participated this year are living close to Jackson County while they are in the US. They all expressed their desire to speak at more of our churches. If you could not host a missionary or if you did host but would like to hear from more missionaries, please let me know. All the missionaries ask for is that the host church pay for their expenses. Through a generous grant from the Baptist State Convention of NC, the Association has some money that could help churches that would like to host, but do not have the financial ability to pay for a hotel and travel costs. With this grant money, the Association could supplement any love offering that you take up to cover all of the costs of hosting.

The outreach at Mountain Heritage Day, a one-day festival hosted by Western Carolina University, was a great success. The Association rented booth space and was able to share the Gospel and information about Associational churches with over 700 people. Volunteers from two churches passed out New Testaments, a "Dinner on the Grounds" cookbook, a child's coloring sheet and old-timey church fans. Each one of these gifts had the plan of salvation clearly presented. We were able to speak to people far and wide. There were WCU students and alumni, tourists from several states, and new and old residents of Jackson County. Please pray that the seed of God's Word will grow in the hearts of the lost and that more churches will become involved in the future.

I have had the pleasure of participating in two ordination services. I preached at New Savannah for the deacon ordination of Chase Slaven. This young man has great potential as a leader in the church. I sat in the ordination council and preached the charge to the candidate for Artemio Corona, the new pastor of Primera Iglesia Bautista de Yellow Mountain. It is great to see young men stepping up into leadership positions in the churches in Jackson County.

Cashiers Baptist donated their 15 passenger van to the Association. The van committee is currently working to get together a set of rules for its use. We hope to have it ready for the churches of the Association to use very soon.

In August, I traveled to Camp Caraway along with Associational Directors from all over the state to meet with Todd Unzicker, the new Executive Director-Treasurer for the Baptist State Convention of NC. He has big plans for the Convention and it will be interesting to see what the future holds.

Gracella and I traveled to Kentucky in August for their EQUIP training. This training provided multiple classes on a wide variety of subjects of interest to church leaders. The training was well worth the trip.

Just as I wrote at the beginning, this year has been another rollercoaster ride. The changes that have come to the churches and the Association have hit almost weekly. Pray for each church and its leadership so that God's will is done. Pray for Gracella and me as we strive to assist the churches in their God-given mission of sharing the Gospel with the entire world.

# WMU Associational Report, Doris Melton 2020/2021

Financial Report: \$734.00

The Covid Pandemic has made a personal mark on many individuals in our communities. It has impacted the ability of many WMU groups to meet collectively, but it has also highlighted the versatility and innovation of God's servants to work for His Glory to promote the Great Commission. Many (Faith, Ochre Hill, Calvary, Locust Field, Promise Land, and others) worked with Baptist on Missions to deliver food boxes to needy in our communities. Local WMU groups supported Broyhill Children's Homes, Baptist Children's Hospital, our local hospital staff, Emergency Rescue Services, Law Enforcement, United Christian Ministry, and feeding the homeless. While limited at times the Van Ministry continues with Ms. Lee Lillard at the helm. Individual groups had a Drive-thru Easter Eggstravanza, participated in take home Sunday School packets, created prayer chains, ministered to the Nursing and Assisted Living Facilities with Valentine Cards and Bingo Prizes. Individual supplies for "His and Her" were prepared for the downtown Sylva Homeless Pantry. In addition, money has been donated to the After-school Bible Club workers at Fairview to buy snacks with a hope of providing additional funds for all of the workers in this program. Ochre Hill sent a team to help with the continuing re-building from hurricane disasters in Eastern NC and Faith and Lighthouse worked with Deep Impact. Currently, WMU groups are working to provide 750 tubes of toothpaste for the Red Box Ministry. This project ministers to women in NC who are incarcerated with a Christmas gift containing personal items, candy, and an invitation to know Jesus as their personal Savior. A great way to let them know that they are loved.

In July, 2021 WMU groups were invited to meet at Faith Baptist Church for discussion on an Annual Meeting, support for the Mission Conference, and to elect a new Director for the next two years per our constitution. The idea of an Annual Meeting had members still hesitant about holding such a meeting this year. Ms. Tracy Salter was elected to serve as our New Director for the Tuckaseigee Association WMU. The consensus was to provide a meal and host the Missionaries for the Mission Conference.

WMU groups also supported Heck-Jones, Lottie Moon, Annie Armstrong, and other WMU Mission programs. Individual missionaries to Uganda, Honduras, and the Philippine's were also supported.

EL CENTRO DEL SENOR: We have not resumed Sunday School due to COVID-19. Our worship service is recorded each Sunday on Facebook. Not sure how many are watching. Our church participated in the Food Round-Up for Broyhill Children's Home. They had their annual anniversary/and baptism celebration (modified for COVID-19). They had a Hearts on Fire Streaming Party with 49 in attendance. They had a summer outreach that included 3 picnics that included inviting visitors. They had a joint outreach with sister church in Haywood County. It included 2 events (Picnics/pool/services)

FAITH: We were able to have drive-in church, streamed on Facebook, and FM transmitted each Sunday and the Lord blessed us with good weather and we did not miss any Sunday Morning services until April. In April we returned to indoor worship services and then Sunday School in June. We continued our food box ministry until the end of April we served several hundreds during this time. October held a Truck 'r' Treat for community children. In November we were able to hold an outdoor youth conference Hearts on Fire for the County and had 50+ in attendance. Also in November we collected 150 Operation Christmas Child Boxes. At Christmas we supplied 50 families with a holiday meal. In January we held a free clothing drive and were able to take care of many needy families in the area. January: paid for multiple homeless families housing for 2 weeks in our homeless housing. In March we had a Zoom Women's Bible Study on Elijah. Held a drive through Easter Event with over 200 children's baggies given out. - 1. The name of the corporation is:

#### ARTICLE I. NAME

The name of the body shall be the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Incorporated.

# ARTICLE II. OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the Association is to be a fellowship of churches on mission in our setting. The specific objectives of the Association are as follows:

- 1. To promote harmony, understanding and spiritual power between the churches.
- 2. To afford and promote a larger fellowship of Christians in the work of Christ.
- 3. To provide such programs, projects and organizations as will strengthen the churches and assist them in achieving their goals and objectives.
- 4. To discover needs which cannot be met effectively by churches individually and to coordinate the use of resources in meeting these needs.
- 5. To encourage support by every church for the mission causes of the Association, the North Carolina Baptist Convention, and the Southern Baptist Convention.

#### ARTICLE III. AUTHORITY

SECTION 1. The Association shall have the power to elect and install its officers in whatever manner the body may deem expedient.

SECTION 2. The Association shall have power to recommend measures of usefulness and guidance to our churches in matters of organization, ordinations and questions of doctrines and discipline,

SECTION 3. The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the right of local churches as autonomous bodies.

#### ARTICLE IV. MEMBERSHIP

SECTION 1. The Association shall be composed of regularly constituted Baptist churches in cooperating fellowship with the Southern Baptist Convention and following the teachings of the Bible.

SECTION 2. The Association shall be the sole judge of its membership and may receive or reject churches applying for membership therein at its pleasure. Churches applying for membership shall agree to come under the watchcare of the Association for one year. It is understood that during this period of watchcare the church shall be entitled to all rights and privileges of the Association except those of voting.

Applications for membership shall be presented to the Doctrine Committee of the Association. The applications will consist of a letter from a constituted church stating their desire to affiliate with the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association. The Doctrine Committee as a part of the review process may invite the requesting church to a conference to discuss its history, its mission strategy, and any other information that may be pertinent to the application. The Doctrine Committee may then approve the application and recommend them to the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee may by a simple majority vote accept the requesting church to come under the watchcare of the Association for one year. Any church under watchcare is expected to participate in and financially support the Association. At the end of the year, the church may be voted in as a member of the Association with full privileges by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting of the Association, at the recommendation of the Doctrine and Executive Committees and at least one messenger be present at the meeting.

SECTION 3. Any church may withdraw from the Association at its pleasure and should notify the Association of this action in writing. Such action will be recognized by the Association at the next annual meeting.

SECTION 4. It shall be the duty of each church to furnish the Associational Clerk, before each annual session, a Church Profile, the forms provided by the Associational Clerk, giving the information requested as is applicable to each church situation.

SECTION 5. The Association may withdraw from any church which has become unscriptural in its doctrine or practices by a two-thirds majority vote of the messengers present and voting at the annual meeting. Such vote is to be taken by written ballot.

### ARTICLE V. MEETINGS

SECTION 1. The Association shall hold its annual meeting on Tuesday and Thursday following the second Sunday in October. Special meetings of the Association may be called by the Executive Committee provided two weeks written notice is given to the member churches.

SECTION 2. Each church shall be entitled to be represented at the annual meeting by the pastor and one additional messenger. Churches which give to the association more than .5% of their undesignated receipts shall be entitled to an additional 2 messengers for every .5% of giving up to a total of 10 messengers for churches which give 2% of their undesignated giving."

SECTION 3. Churches are requested to elect their messengers and alternatives in conference to attend the annual meeting. SECTION 4. In case of internal dissension in a church and two parties coming to the Association, each claiming to represent the church, neither party shall be seated until the Doctrine Committee determines which party is in union with the Association. The decision is to be affirmed by a majority of the messengers present and voting.

### ARTICLE VI. OFFICERS

SECTION 1. General officers of the Association shall be: Moderator, Vice Moderator, Clerk, Assistant Clerk, Treasurer, Assistant Treasurer, Parliamentarian, Assistant Parliamentarian, Director of Missions, Trustees and team leaders. Team leaders shall be chosen by the Nominating Committee as needed to serve the purposes of the Association (eg. Sunday School leader, Youth/Children leader). Team leaders will work with the Moderator and/or the Director of Missions to form a team to carry out assigned duties.

Associational representatives will be elected as may be deemed appropriate and elected in the Association. Associational representatives shall be a conduit of information between outside agencies and the Association. They may also represent the Association as the outside agency's policies specify.

SECTION 2. With the exception of the Director of Missions and Trustees, the terms of office for all officers of the Association shall be for one year with the privilege of continuing re-election. The Moderator and Vice Moderator shall not be eligible for re-election but one year in succession. (1) The number of Trustees shall be three. (2) The term of service should be for three years, with the term of only one expiring each year. In the first election of Trustees, the term of service for one should be three years, another two years, and the other one year. (3) Upon the expiration of term of service, the Trustee may or may not be re-elected for another term of three years.

Each term of office shall begin with the close of the annual session. The Associational financial year will run from October 1 through September 30.

#### ARTICLE VII. DUTIES OF OFFICERS

SECTION 1. The Moderator shall preside and maintain the order of all meetings of the Association and Executive Committee. He shall serve as ex officio member of all committees of the Association.

SECTION 2. The Vice Moderator shall assist the Moderator and preside in the absence of, or at the pleasure of the Moderator.

SECTION 3. The Clerk shall keep a complete and accurate record of all meetings; shall prepare a "Book of Reports" to be distributed to messengers at the beginning of the annual meeting; and prepare minutes of the annual meeting (Annual Minutes) to be distributed to each church.

The Clerk shall distribute to the clerk of each church in the Association a congregational church profile as soon as they are received from the State Convention. This form is to be returned to the Clerk of the Association as soon as possible or by the deadline set by the Clerk and Director of Missions. All program reports should be returned by the same date.

An Assistant Clerk shall work with the Clerk in preparing the "Book of Reports," the annual minutes and the registration of messengers at the annual meeting.

SECTION 4. The Treasurer shall oversee the receipts and disbursements, by order of the Executive Committee of the Association, of the money of the treasury and ensure that a complete report is presented at the Annual meeting and a current report at each Executive Committee meeting.

An Assistant Treasurer shall be elected to assist the Treasurer by request and to serve in the event the Treasurer resigns or is ill or unable to function.

SECTION 5. The Parliamentarian shall upon the request of the presiding officer of the body, advise and assist the Association with respect to all matters involving Parliamentary Procedure.

An Assistant Parliamentarian shall be elected. The Parliamentarian and Assistant should always communicate with each other to ensure that this office is filled at each Associational Annual or Executive Committee meeting.

SECTION 6. Trustees have no authority except by direction of the Association and are not personally bound by signatures but are to be the legal signees for the Association. Trustees represent the Association in legal matters. Trustees act on behalf of the Association in acquisition and disposal of Associational property.

They sign all deeds of conveyance, execute all notes, bonds or mortgages, intervene in all suits, by authority of the Association.

All persons dealing with the Trustees, as Associational officers, may rely upon any written resolution duly adopted by the Association or Executive Committee, directing and authorizing the Trustees to act in its behalf and certified by the Association Moderator and Clerk.

# ARTICLE VIII. RULES OF ORDER

The business meetings of the Association shall be conducted according to Robert's Parliamentary Practice or in a manner not contrary thereto.

### ARTICLE IX. QUORUM

The quorum for the Annual Associational meeting or any special called meeting of the Association shall not be less than 25 percent of the member churches.

# ARTICLE X. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

SECTION 1. The Executive Committee shall be composed of the General Officers and Team Leaders elected by the Association and the Pastor and one member from each church in the Association. No Pastor, by virtue of his being an Associational Officer or Program Leader shall be disqualified as a member of the Executive Committee, from representing the church or churches he may be serving in the Association. Twelve of these members shall constitute a quorum.

SECTION 2. It shall be the duty of the Executive Committee to act for the Association on matters arising when the Association is not in session and to make a report of all work to the next session of the Association. This body shall meet at a time and place designated by the Moderator on Monday following the second Sunday of each quarter except for the October quarter which shall be replaced by the Annual Meeting. Special meetings of the Executive Committee may be called by the Moderator with a one week notice to the churches.

SECTION 3. All vacancies occurring on committees or among elected officers shall be filled by the Executive Committee.

## ARTICLE XI. ASSOCIATIONAL STANDING COMMITTEES

SECTION 1. The Association shall have such standing committees as may be deemed necessary to promote efficiently the work of the Master in our midst. The terms of office for all committee members shall be for three years except where specifically stated otherwise.

SECTION 3. THE NOMINATING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate the Officers, Committees members, Team Leaders (as needed) and Institutional Agency Representatives. These nominees shall be notified prior to presenting of their names at annual session.

SECTION 4. THE STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE shall be composed of six members including the Treasurer of the Association. This committee shall: (a) present a Budget to the Association for the following year; (b) devise plans for raising the funds for the Associational Budget; (c) audit the finances and financial records of the Association annually and anytime there is a change of Treasurer or at the direction of the Association or the Executive Committee; (d) report all audits to the Annual Association Meeting.

SECTION 5. THE BUILDING AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE shall be comprised of three members. The committee shall be responsible for and in charge of the upkeep and repairs of the Associational building, grounds, and equipment. SECTION 6. THE PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

- A. The Committee shall be composed of 7 members of which 3 are pastors.
- B. They shall recommend policies and procedures for the selection, supervision and termination of Associational staff personnel. Those policies and procedures shall be approved by the Association.
  - C. Prepare and maintain an organizational manual relation to the Association's staff personnel.
  - D. Develop and recommend to the association policies and procedures for paid and volunteer staff personnel.
- E. When a staff vacancy occurs, other than the DOM, they shall serve as the search committee. When a DOM vacancy occurs, they shall nominate a search committee and present it to the Executive Committee.
  - F. The Personnel Committee shall handle grievances as outlined in the grievance policy.

SECTION 7 THE ANNUAL MEETING COMMITTEE shall be composed of seven members. The duties of this committee shall be to

- A. recommend the church(es) to host the annual meeting and the preacher(s) and alternate preacher(s) to deliver the annual sermon for the following year,
- B. present suitable resolutions at the annual Associational meeting,

- C. bring a report to the annual meeting of those listed by the member churches as deceased since the last annual meeting,
- D. keep the historical records of the Association up-to-date,
- E. plan the program for the Annual Meeting(s) and present it to the Executive Committee at its October meeting,
- F. shall be responsible for registering messengers at the Annual Meeting(s),
- G. and shall perform all duties specified in Article XIII (amendments to by-laws).

## SECTION 7 THE DOCTRINE COMMITTEE shall be composed of five pastors and two laymen.

- A. It shall examine applications of churches seeking admission into the Association in keeping with Article IV and make recommendation to the Association. It shall counsel with churches that are out of harmony of fellowship with the Association.
- B. It shall also advise churches about candidates for ordination with the following guidelines: it serves on an advisory capacity only, serves at the request of the church from which the member is seeking ordination, is to examine such candidates as to their call and fitness for the gospel ministry and make such recommendations to the church as they feel led. It should regularly inform the Executive Committee of its work.

### ARTICLE XII. JOB DESCRIPTION, DIRECTOR OF MISSIONS

# SECTION 1. Title and Functions.

- A. Position Title. This position shall be known as the Director of Missions for the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association.
- B. Basic Functions. The Director of Missions shall serve as a minister to the church leaders of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, as mission strategist, as chief administrative officer, and as a general leader of the Association.
- C. The Personnel Committee shall be responsible to maintain, update and revise a job description as required, making recommendations to the Association for approval as they are needed.

#### ARTICLE XIII. AMENDMENTS

The constitution may be amended at any annual meeting of the Association by a two-thirds majority of the messengers present and voting, provided the amendment has been presented to the Annual Meeting Committee at least 10 days prior to the annual meeting and presented to the Association in printed form on the first day of the annual meeting to be voted on the second day.

## ARTICLE XIV. NON-PROFIT STATUS

The Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Inc. is organized exclusively for charitable, religious, and educational purposes, including, for such purposes, the making of distributions to organizations that qualify as exempt organizations under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.

No part of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Inc. shall inure to the benefit of its' members, directs, officers, or other persons except that the organization shall be authorized and empowered to pay reasonable compensation for services rendered and to make payments and distributions in furtherance of the exempt purposes of the organization.

In the event of dissolution, the residual assets of the Tuckaseigee Baptist Association, Inc. will be turned over to one or more organizations with similar purposes which are exempt as organizations described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986.
