DR. SCOGGIN COMPLETES SWEEP FOR OLD TESTAMENT DEPARTMENT

THE ELECTION for the honor of "faculty member of the month" for February has resulted in a clean sweep for the present Old Testament department. One of the most popular professors at Southeastern, Dr. B. Elmo Scoggin, has been elected to this honor in a campus wide survey.

WELL KNOWN for friendliness to the student and his interesting classroom approach, Dr. Scoggin has been Professor of Old Testament at Southeastern since 1956. Formerly he was Guest Professor of Missions here in 1955-56.

THE STUDENTS in Dr. Scoggin's introductory Hebrew class were especially open in praise of their professor. One student said, "Dr. Scoggin is able to get his point across as well as any professor at Southeastern. He is an expert at teaching, and he is very friendly toward the students."

ANOTHER NOTICEABLE aspect of Dr. Scoggin's personality is his appreciation of good humor. This was reflected in the comments of another student who said, "His earthy humor adds enjoyment and spice to what could be otherwise a very dry and laboriously monotonous subject."

DR. SCOGGIN served as a pastor in Kentucky and Florida during the years from 1942 to 1949. In 1949 he accepted a six year appointment as missionary to Israel. Since coming to the Seminary, he has served in numerous interim pastorates.

OCTOBER 17, 1915 was the birthdate for Dr. Scoggin. He is married to the former Hannah Pearlman, and has one daughter and two grandchildren. Dr. Scoggin completed work for his A.B. degree at Furman University, and received his Th.M. and Th.D. degrees from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky.

AMONG HIS notable accomplishments is an outstanding record of 11 full seasons of excavation in Israel, that is to say,

"digging". In conjunction with this work, he has spent three years in residence at the Hebrew University in Jerusalem.

THIS POPULAR professor holds membership in three learned societies--the American Society of Biblical Literature and Exegesis, the National Geographic Society, and the Baptist Professors of Religion.

HE IS past president of the Wake Forest Rotary Club and has received a distinguished alumnus award from Gardner-Webb College (1959). He has written articles for the Commission, the Outlook, and several other denominational publications.

AT SOUTHEASTERN, nonetheless, Dr. Scoggin is perhaps best appreciated for his course in introductory Hebrew, which is widely regarded as one of the most popular courses on campus. His lively humor is thought to be an integral part of his effectiveness.

ONE STUDENT was asked to comment on Dr. Scoggin for this article, and could not phrase an appropriate quotation as such. But he did say that two traits were very obvious in Dr. Scoggin. These were, he said, a frank approach to life, and an honest attitude in all dealings.

THE ABOVE comments all add up to only one conclusion--Dr. Scoggin must be considered a very popular choice for the honor of "faculty member of the month" for the month of February.

TRUSTEES ELECT DR. BARRINGTON WHITE AS NEW PROFESSOR AT SOUTHEASTERN

DR. BARRINGTON R. WHITE, lecturer in Church History at Regent's Park College, Oxford University, England, has been elected Professor of Church History and Missions, with tenure, at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary.

A specialist in Baptist history, Dr. White is a graduate of both Cambridge (M.A.) and Oxford (D.Phil.) Universities. He has served as pastor of Baptist churches in England and has taught at Oxford since 1963.

He has contributed articles and reviews to learned journals and was the Carver Barnes Memorial lecturer at Southeastern in 1969. His book, The English Separatist Tradition, will be published by the Oxford University Press next year.

Also at the recent meeting of the seminary's Board of Trustees, tenure was granted to Dr. H. Eugene McLeod, Assistant Professor of Bibliography, and to Dr. Archie L. Nations, Associate Professor of New Testament.

Sabbatic leaves were granted to Dr. John E. Steely, Dr. Thomas A. Bland and to Dr. John T. Wayland.

The Board formally expressed appreciation to the Executive Committee of the Southern Baptist Convention for a recommended enlarged appropriation to theological education.

The highlight of the annual meeting of the Board of Trustees was their attendance at a Founders' Day Memorial Service for the late Dr. Sydnor L. Stealey, the Seminary's first President.

Twenty-five of the thirty elected members of the Board were present and re-elected Dr. Claud B. Bowen, pastor of the First Baptist Church in Greensboro, N.C., as president of the board, and James F. Heaton, pastor of the Tabernacle Baptist Church in Raleigh, N.C., as vice-president.

Dr. Nash Underwood, dentist in Wake Forest, N.C., was chosen as treasurer, and Mr. Henry L. Bridges, state auditor of North Carolina, was elected secretary.

ENTRY FEE DUE MAY 1 ON SEMINARY GOLF TOURNAMENT

LOUISVILLE, Ky. -- The Southern Baptist Theological Seminary here is sponsoring an Invitational Golf Tournament May 4 and 5.

The tournament will be held at the Midland Trail Golf Course in Middletown, Ky., a suburb of Louisville.

Open to representatives of the six sister seminaries owned and operated by the Southern Baptist Convention and the five partner-seminaries who belong to the Theological Education Association of Mid-America (TEAM), the tournament will feature four divisions of play for which trophies will be awarded.

The divisions are divided into "A", "B", "C", and "D". Division "A" will be for two-some teams composed of one professor and one student. Division "B" will be the handicap play and will be open to individual competition on handicap scoring. Both "A" and "B" will be held on May 5 and will be for 18-holes.

On May 4 and 5 Divisions "C" and "D" will work on 36-holes. "C" is the medal play and is for individual stroke competition. "D" is for seminary teams and the exact structure of the teams will be announced later.

DR. CAUTHEN WILL SPEAK
FOR MISSIONARY DAY

The final Missionary Day of the present school year will be conducted this Wednesday in the Chapel. The speaker is Dr. Baker James Cauthen, who is Executive Secretary of the Southern Baptist Foreign Mission Board.

Dr. Cauthen has served in the pastorate and also as a missionary in China.

The Missionary Day Speaker has also been Professor of Missions at Southwestern Seminary.

As this is the final Missionary Day for the year, the Chapel Committee encourages all to make a special effort to attend.

Entry fee for the 18-hole events is \$4.00; the fee for the 36-hole events is \$7.00. One fee for either number of holes will pay for both divisions within the hole number.

In addition to Southern Seminary, the five SBC-owned seminaries are Golden Gate Baptist Theological Seminary, San Francisco, Calif.; Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, Wake Forest, N.C.; Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, Fort Worth, Tex.; and New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary, New Orleans, La.

Those seminaries participating with Southern Seminary in the TEAM consortium are Presbyterian Theological Seminary, Louisville; St. Meinrad School of Theology, St. Meinrad, Ind.; Lexington Theological Seminary, Lexington, Ky.; and Asbury Theological Seminary, Wilmore, Ky.

ABOUT MISSIONS CONFERENCES ELSEWHERE.....

There has been much informal discussion about the way the Student Conference on Mission and Ministry at Southeastern was conducted. In light of this, we felt that many of our students would be interested in knowing how the format of the missions conference at some of the other Southern Baptist seminaries.

In this article we shall be concerned with the conferences at Southern Seminary in Louisville, Ky. and at Golden Gate Seminary, Mill Valley, California.

At Golden Gate the theme was "Odyssey: Journey Into Mission." According to the conference literature, "it is a journey into the very world in which we live with the love, hope and challenge of Jesus, the Christ. The 'Odyssey' is a journey into mission. The speakers and seminary leaders of the conference will prepare to help you learn more about the various possible avenues of service." The conference at Golden Gate was held January 30-February 2, 1970."

At Southern, the theme was "My Brother". Here too the purpose of the conference was expose students to the various vocational aspects of missions work. The conference was conducted February 27-March 1, 1970.

The major speakers at Golden Gate were: Bill Pinson, professor of Christian ethics at Southwestern, whose subject was "The Journey of Our Age"; W. Hazaiiah Williams director of the Center for Urban-Black Studies and special lecturer in religion and society at the Graduate Theological Union at Berkeley, California; and Ed Seabough, associate secretary, personnel department of the Home Mission Board will speak on "Journey for Reconciliation."

There were no three major speakers at Southern as such, but there were numerous speakers on the various aspects of

ministry.

The seminars at Golden Gate were divided into three major areas: "The Contemporary Church," "Our Contemporary Society," and "Missionary Opportunities." The first two of these divisions reflect an attempt to deal with the issues involved, while the latter explored specific areas of missionary opportunity.

There was a similar division of seminar topics into two major areas at Southern, which were "Dialogues on the Contemporary Scene" and "Dialogues on Vocational Response." However, in this case, there was a much greater emphasis on the practical side of ministry.

Several important observations can be made concerning a comparison between the missions conferences held at these two institutions, and the one promoted here at Southeastern Seminary. There was a Black speaker at Golden Gate just as there was at Southeastern. But in this case the man involved was not an advocate of any extremist racist views.

All three seminaries promoted an emphasis both in the issues and in the practical aspects of ministry. An analysis of the programs of each shows that the emphasis at Southern was on the practical side, at Southeastern on the issues, and at Golden Gate there was more of a balance between the two.
