# EASTERN BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

SECOND DAY-MORNING SESSION.

WEDNESDAY, October 8th. 1884.

Prayer meeting conducted by Elder A. J. Hires. Moderator called the Association to order at 01/ 0'clock. Roll of delegates was called.

Proceedings of vesterday read and approved.

#### REPORT ON STATE AND HOME MISSIONS.

The committee on State and Home Missions would report: That there are many destitute fields in the State whose wants have not, and, in the nature of things, cannot be supplied by the limited resources of the district Associations. It is the province of the State Mission Board to provide such sections with the preaching of the gospel.

As in the State, so in the extended area of the Southern States, there are some neglected parts of the old States that need help, while there is an imperative demand made upon the now favored sections to send the Gospel to the newly settled States of the Southwest and also to the thousands of Indians who have been placed by a wise Providence in our country.

The Home Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, located in Atlanta, Ga., is laboring with wisdom and energy to meet the many demands of this great field.

This Board has also created a Church Building Department, which proposes

# REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON FOREIGN MISSIONS.

Your committee on Foreign Missions beg leave to report. This is the work which our Lord enjoined upon us by the great commission. There are still 900,000,000 of people to whom it is our solemn duty to send the gospel. Two brethren have been called of God from our midst to preach the gospel to them. Brethren Herring and Bryan are the voice of God arousing us to "go into all

the world and preach the gospel to every creature." Our Foreign Mission force has been greatly increased. The Board has now under appointment 45 foreign missionaries and 43 natives, making a working force of 88. Of these 10 are to sail this month for their respective fields. Certainly we should increase our contributions. The Board at Richmond calls on us to do so. More than \$80,000 was received by that Board last year, but they must have \$100,000 this year.

What have we done ! The contributions for Foreign Missions were from 34 churches and amount to \$277.15. This is an increase upon that received last year. But it is to be regretted that 22 churches have reported nothing, and some of these are our stronger ones ; therefore.

Resolved, 1st. That every church of this Association is urged to make at least one collection for Foreign Missions during the year.

2nd. That as the Foreign Mission Board has called upon North Carolina Baptists for \$8,000 this year, this Association will endeavor to raise its proportion of that amount,

#### REPORT ON TEMPERANCE.

Your committee respectfully report that the general discussion of this great moral question during the past several years by the press, the church and other organizations, has resulted in a better understanding on the part of our people of the Bible teachings on the subject, and of our duties and obligations with respect to it.

The time was that not only the moderate use of intoxicating liquors as a beverage, but also their manufacture and sale, were considered by many good people no breach of the divine law and no barrier to Christian fellowship. That. time, we are glad to say, has passed away; our people are better informed.

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The fearful and growing evils of intemperance that corrupt us throughout our land, and the agitation of the temperance question outside the church have led or driven Christians to a more thorough and conscientious study of those portions of God's word that bear upon the temperance question. Hence, the general Christian sentiment of to-day is that Bible temperance is the moderate use of what is lawful, and total abstinence from what is hurtful.

If it be asked, "Is the use of intoxicating liquors, as a beverage hurtful?" the Bible emphatically answers: 'Wine is a mocker, strong drink is raging: and whosoever is deceived thereby is not wise." Prov. 20: 1. "Who hath woe? Who hath sorrow? Who hath contentions? Who hath babbling? Who hath wounds without cause? Who hath redness of eyes? They that tarry long at the wine : they that go to seek mixed wine." Prov. 23: 29, 30. Or if it be asked, "Is it wrong to visit bar-rooms, or drink intoxicating liquors as a beverage?" the Bible gives an emphatic affirmative answer, "Be not among winebibbers." Prov. 23: 20. "Look not thou upon the wine when it is red, when it giveth its color in the cup, when it moveth itself aright. At the last it biteth like a serpent and stingeth like an adder." Prov. 23: 31, 32. The fearful growth and increasingly destructive power of the liquor traffic,

the welfare of the youth of our country, the purity and efficiency of the churches, all demand that we stand fairly and squarely upon the Bible platform of tem-Respectfully submitted,

#### **REPORT ON EDUCATION.**

Your committee on Education respectfully report that this subject is taking great hold upon the minds of our people, and our condition in this respect is more favorable than at any previous period in our history. The various institutions of learning are, so far as we can learn, well patronized, and we refer with great pleasure to the stand taken by Wake Forest College. We learn that there are quite a number of young ministers there seeking an education; and as by means of an education they are better prepared for the great work of our Master; as, too, the membership at large are advancing in intelligence, and the pulpit should be superior to the pew-we would earnestly urge upon the churches the great importance of sustaining these brethren in their efforts. With pleasure we note the success of Bro. Taylor in securing the first installment of one hundred thousand dollars of the Endowment.

As is Wake Forest to our young men, such is the Chowan Baptist Female Institute for our young ladies. The work done by this excellent school is sub-stantial and thorough. We confidently recommend it for the patronage of our people. We cheerfully indorse and recommend to our brethren our Associa-tional school at Warsaw.

Not only are finishing schools and colleges of high grade necessary-we must must have a substantial basis, which can be laid only in the preparatory and academic schools. Our schools are doing an essential work, and one that we cannot entrust to our Pedobaptist friends.

May the great source of all knowledge advance our people in wisdom and information.

#### REPORT OF BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF WARSAW HIGH SCHOOL.

We have a cheering report to make of the condition of our school at Warsaw. At the last session of the Association it was stated that our school building was sadly in need of repairs; but it affords us pleasure to report that under the skilful management of the efficient Principals, a neat new fence has been placed around the grounds, the main building repaired and repainted, which, with many other changes and improvements, give a decidedly attractive appearance.

During the past year the progress has been marked and gratifying.

The catalogue for the year shows an enrollment of 125 pupils from every sec-tion of Eastern Carolina. Three young men preparing themselves for the min-istry have received instruction at this school. The prospects of the school for the present year are truly encouraging. The Principals tell us that the buildings are not sufficient to meet the demands

of the patronage, and we would urge upon the Association the necessity of meeting the demands of our school. The corps of instructors remains the same as last year, and we note with pleasure that the teachers have given universal satisfaction in their work.

The rental has been applied to raising the indebtedness of the institution.

We, the Trustees, have given to the Principals an increase of lease for five years. And they now hold a lease for ten years.

Instruction is given in all the branches taught in a first class school; the charges are reasonable, and we take pleasure in recommending the school as

Your committee would further express the hope that, by a more general diffusion of an active missionary spirit among the churches, and the multiplication of female missionary societies, we may be able next year to raise the full support of a foreign missionary, when Bro. A motion was made that the pastors or some other brethren be requested to explain this Foreign Mission work to their respective churches immediately. Remarks by D. S. Kennedy, Elders J. T. Albritton and T. Whitfield. On motion, the report of the Executive Committee was taken from the table.

#### REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

DEAR BRETHREN : Through the mercy of God we are permitted to present this our annual report of our labors for the year now closing.

#### MISSIONARIES EMPLOYED.

We have had in our employment, for the whole or a part of their time, the following brethren, viz : W. B. Knight, T. J. Leary, C. S. Cashwell, W. T. Jones and R. T. Bryan.

#### THE WORK DONE.

Rev. W. B. Knight has labored at Snow Hill, Antioch and other points in Greene and Pitt counties. Sermons preached 80, visited many families and organized several Sabbath-schools, and done considerable work on meeting houses.

Rev. T. J. Leary has preached 113 sermons, baptized 24 and done a good work in the Sunday-school cause. He has reorganized one church and done something in the way of building new houses of worship. His labors have been greatly blessed.

Rev. C. S. Cashwell has preached 155 sermons, baptized 29, and several have been restored. He has done a good work and the Lord has greatly blessed his labors. He has collected on his field about \$450.

Rev. R. T. Bryan has labored four months at different points within the Association. He has preached 136 sermons, baptisms reported 180, collected on the field \$348.15. His labors have been greatly blessed in the conversion of souls and in the awakening of the churches to their duty in the cause of Foreign Missions. We earnestly recommend to this body to adopt Brother Bryan as its missionary to China.

Rev. W. T. Jones has labored at Beaufort and Morehead City. Sermons preached 72, baptisms 46; Sunday-schools at both points in good condition. He has done some work at other points with marked success.

Dear Brethren : In the language of our annual report for last year, "we lay before you a report of our year's labors in the hope that it may meet your approval. We may have made mistakes, but we have done the best we could under the circumstances."

#### **REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON OBITUARIES.**

Deacon Lewis Highsmith, a member of the church at Well's Chapel, Sampson county, died at his residence on the 27th of May, 1884, in the 81st year of his age. Very few men with similar advantages for education and early training have been honored more in the various callings of men in a long and eventful life than was the subject of this notice. By dint of industry, energy and perseverance, he prepared himself to be one of the most useful members of society. both in civil and religious matters. He was, in the common acceptation of the phrase, a self-made man. He was for a long time a member of the Executive Board of our Association, which office he honored and dignified by his efficient services, holding it till his health failed. He was a firm pillar and a strong stake among the Baptists at home and abroad. Having had very poor educa-tional advantages, he could sympathize with all such, and, therefore, he contributed of his means liberally to our educational enterprises.

It is to be hoped that the father's mantle has been bestowed by Divine Providence upon his only son, who is now a member of the same Board. May he in proportion to the better means which he has enjoyed become still more serviceable to the church and the world. We trust Brother Highsmith has left a name worthy to be remembered and a life which should be imitated by us all. We hope our Heavenly Father has called him to a rich reward in heaven. He left three surviving children, one son and two daughters, and an aged widow, the stepmother of his children. May the rich blessings of our God be meted out to them in their lives and in their deaths.

Brother Bennett Brewer, a member of Piny Grove church, Sampson county, died at his residence on the 8th of January, 1884, aged about 45 or 50. We have lost by his death one of our most exemplary members, a good Christian worker, and one whose heart seemed to be thoroughly imbued with the spirit of Christianity. The characteristics of the good man were as fully developed in him as we have ever seen them in the life of any one with whom we have been acquainted. He was a kind and affectionate husband, a fond and indulgent father and a most obliging neighbor. He left a very interesting family—a widow and seven children,—his only daughter, sick at his death, survived him but a few weeks. We feel that our loss is his eternal gain. May the Lord bless his family and be unto them a father to the fatherless and a husband to the widow.

Deacon John Vann, a member of Mt. Gilead church, died at his home in Sampson county in last June, in the 83rd or 84th year of his age. His usefulness was confined mostly to the church in his community. Perhaps his greatest work has been the education and religious training of a large family of children, all of whom have attached themselves to the Baptist churches and are among the most useful in the churches. May the Lord be very gracious to his aged widow, being a husband to her and a father to his children.

Deacon John Carlton, a member of the church at Johnson's, died at his residence in Duplin county, in June last, about 65 years of age. Brother Carlton was a man of modest and unaffected deportment. Industrious, energetic and persevering he succeeded in accumulating a considerable fortune, with which he was enabled to do much good for the cause of education and religion. His life has been blessed, as we believe, by his having brought up his children in the fear and admonition of the Lord, his sons and daughters both being among the most active and efficient workers in the church and Sunday-school. May the Lord comfort and console his widow, the stepmother of his children, and prepare her for the events in His providence.

## REPORT ON SUNDAY SCHOOLS.

Your committee on Sunday Schools are gratified to report an increased in-terest among the churches in Sunday school work. From the church letters we gather that of the fifty-seven churches reporting at this session of the Associa-tion, forty-one reports Sunday schools with three hundred and forty-four officers and teachers and thirty-three hundred and sixty-seven scholars, an increase of nine schools, sixty-nine officers and teachers and four hundred and fifty-one scholars. Of the Sunday schools about half report being kept open the whole year. We regret to see that many of our largest churches and churches of influence

in towns and communities have no Sunday school. This is to be regretted. Your committee is satisfied that a well conducted Sabbath school is an auxil-

iary to church work and the extension of the gospel that should not be neglected. We would urge upon all the churches that have no Sunday school, the neces-

sity of organizing one immediately. We know of no better means of dissemina-

ting Baptist doctrine, than in a well conducted Baptist Sunday school using the Baptist Bible lessons as published by the American Baptist Publication Society. We would deprecate the use in Baptist Sunday schools of non-Baptist books. One of the great needs of Sunday schools is an increase of interest among the older church members. Let our older members take hold of this work as teacher and scholars, and we will find a still greater increase in the work.

## CHURCH COVENANT.

Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God, to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith, having been baptized in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost, we do now, in the presence of God, angels, and this assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into covenant with one another, as one body in Christ.

We engage, therefore, by the aid of the Holy Ghost, to walk together in Christian love; to strive for the advancement of this church in knowledge, holiness and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the church, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the Gospel through all nations.

We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion; to religiously educate our children; to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspectly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling, backbiting and excessive anger; to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drinks as a beverage; and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the Kingdom of our Saviour.

We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love; to remember each other in prayer; to aid each other in sickness and distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offense, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of the rules of our Saviour, to secure it without delay.

We moreover engage, that when we remove from this place we will as soon as possible unite with some other church, where we can carry out the spirit of this Covenant, and the principles of God's word.

#### RULES OF ORDER.

I. On the meeting of the Association, the Moderator of the preceding session shall preside until his successor is known. In case of his absence a chairman *pro tem.* shall be elected.

2. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercises. to be conducted by whomsoever the presiding officer may name.

3. At each daily session, and previous to proceeding to business, the names of the delegates shall be called, and the proceedings of the previous daily session read.

4. The members shall observe toward the officers and each other that courtesy which becomes Christians.

5. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration, and avoid personalities.

6. No member shall speak more than twice on the same question without permission.

7. All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer before discussion.

8. No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion.

9. When a question is under discussion, no motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to amend, to commit, or postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they are stated.

10. After a motion has been decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a reconsideration. 11. No member shall absent himself during the session of the Association without permission of the presiding officer, and no one shall take final leave of absence without the permission of the Association; and if any shall do so, their absence shall be noted in the minutes.

12. All questions, except such as relate to the Constitution, shall be decided by a majority of votes.

13. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted to consideration.

14. The Rules of Order may be altered or amended at any session of the Association by a majority of votes.

### CONSTITUTION OF THE EASTERN ASSOCIATION.

ARTICLE. 1. This Association shall be denominated and known as the Eastern Association.

ART. 2. The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's kingdom among men; and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.

ART. 3. This Association shall be composed of delegates chosen by the churches connected with it, each church being entitled to three delegates, who shall be members of that church.

ART. 4. The delegates from each church shall bear a letter certifying their appointment and communicating information relative to the state of the church; *Provided, however*, That when any church has prepared a letter and through inadvertence the letter fails to be presented, her delegates may be received without its presentation.

ART. 5. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen annually from among its members by ballot, by a majority of the members voting, and continue in office until their successors are elected.

ART, 6. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to enforce an observance of the Constitution, preserve order, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion on any question under discussion after others have spoken, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.

ART. 7. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to record the proceedings of each annual session and superintend their printing and distribution among the churches.

ART. 8. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches, or collected during the session of this body, and disburse the same as ordered by the Association. He shall also make to the Association an annual report of the condition of the Treasury.

ART. 9. The Association shall appoint an Executive Committee of seven members, which committee shall have the superintendence of Associational Missions and Colportage. They shall have power to disburse all sums paid by the Treasurer of the Association for the objects under their charge, and during intervals between the meetings of this body to receive and disburse funds for those objects, and to take such steps for their advancement as they shall deem advisable, and shall make an annual report to the Association of their doings.

ART. 10. The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of the churches which neglect to preserve gospel order.

ART. 11. The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats, and extend to them all the privileges of the body except that of voting.

ART. 12. The annual session of this Association shall commence on Tuesday after the first Lord's day in October, at such place as may be chosen.

ART. 13. By appointment of the Association there shall be an Introductory Sermon of a denominational character, and a Missionary Sermon. ART. 14. This Constitution may be amended at any annual session by a vote

of two-thirds of the members present.
