

To the Messengers and Visitors who May Compose the

Opper Country Line Primitive Baptist Association, Dear Brethren:---

By request I shall endeavor to write a circular letter to be read in your hearing. If I have any subject at all to base what I shall write upon, it will be found in Komans, oth chapter and 28th verse, and we know that all things work together for good to them that love God; to them who are called according to his purpsoe. Now, we see the apostle in the beginning of this chapter, speaks plainly that there is therefore now no condemnation to them who are in Christ Jesus who walk not after the flesh but after the spirit. This address was according to my mind to the church showing plainly that his children will not be eternally condemned (we hear the same writer in speaking to the church at Rome that whom the Lord did foreknow He did predestinate to be conformed to the image of His Son, and those He did call we hear (John) saying what manner of love hath the Father bestowed upon us that we should be called the sons of God. In this we see the love of God manifest proving that they are one in Christ and they have no confidence in the flesh. Now we see all this is done according to His own purpose and grace which was given them in Christ before the world began, and they must be quickened into divine life. We as poor finite creatures have realized in our own personal experience that we knew nothing about God until we were quickened by His spirit. We were walking as aliens from Him and strangers to his grace, rolling sin as a sweet morsel under our tongue and trampling His mercy under our unhallowed feet, but God who is rich in mercy with His great love wherewith he hath loved us even when we were dead in trespasses and in sin has quickened us together and made us to sit together in heavenly in Christ. We notice the word "hath" has a particular meaning. Jesus says thine,, they were and thou gavest them me and I believe that His children were with Him in the beginning and he purposed to give them to his son that he might redeem them and we see that they are not redeemed with

corruptible things such as silver and gold, but by the precious blood of Christ, and Jesus had this glory with His Father even before the world was and the apostle could willingly say that all things work together for good to them that love God, etc.

I well remember the next morning after I was delivered of that heavy burden which bore me down about (4 years.) The text that I have mentioned in the outset came into my mind. I felt then that I did love God more than all the things on earth. These words also came in my mind: "Surely, goodness and mercy have followed me all the days of my life." This early one morning about the dawn of the rising sun it seemed that it should different from what it did before, everything seemed to be praising the Lord. Bretheren that was a time of rejoicing to me, may the Lord's blessings be with you all is my prayer.
