

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OBITUARY OF NEVERSON WRIGHT STRICKLAND.

N. W Strickland was born April 18th, 1837 and reared in Nash County, N. C., and died the 29th day of July, 1901, of inflamation of the bowels; age 64 years, 3 months and 11 days. He was married to Miss Margia A. Ferrell by whom he had seven children, an all survive him except two of his younger children that died several years ago. The former life of Brocher Strickland was very romantic, but it pleased God to open his blind eyes and show him how vile and helpless he was, his conviction and suffering on account of sin were of a very pungent nature, until he received a bright and glorious nanifestation of his deliverance from sin and hell as he expressed it, and the revelation of Jesus Christ to him as his Almighty Saviour, and a few years thereafter he went before the church at Sandy Grove at the June meeting in 1880 and was received into the fellowship of the church, and was on the fourth Sunday in July of the same year baptized by Elder Russell Tucker; and at the following December meeting the church gave him license to exercise bis gift. He was firm and well established in the faith and doctrine of God our Saviour, and did not shun to declare the whole counsel of God. He was tender hearted and forbearing and ready to forgive the erring, and showed much sympathy for the poor and distressed. He bore his afflictions with becoming Christian fortitude and patience. The writer visited him in his sickness, and heard him say he was not afraid to die, but dreaded the sting; but his faith in Jesus was strong, believing He would take his departing spirit to Himself; and a very little before he expired he asked that a name be given him, and he was told that Jesus was the only name that could do dying sinners good, and he nodded his assent, being too weak to speak, and he soon fell asleep, steadfast in that faith for which he earnestly contended.
