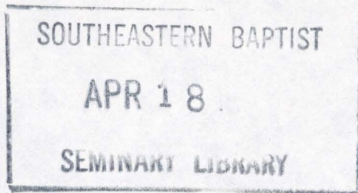

CONCERNING DECEMBER GRADUATION:

An announcement concerning December graduation, made by the President of the Student Council, in the recent issues of South-eastern Campus Bulletin (April 14-18) and the Enquiry (April 15), requires amplification in order to prevent misunderstanding about the Seminary's policy and practice. The Seminary's policy is, "that no December graduation be considered feasible until such time as a total number of students eligible for such a graduation shall exceed one hundred (100)." Students who will qualify for graduation by December 1980 are encouraged to fill out an information card in the Business Office at their earliest convenience. When as many as one hundred (100) students have indicated that they expect to qualify for graduation in December, the matter of a December graduation may be presented to the Faculty. Seminary policy is made and implemented through well-known established structures which include student participation.

- 3--Tentative Nuclear Energy: Peril or Promise?

A micro-computer for nuclear self-education will be available during the day. This project is a joint effort of the Student Government, the Library, and the class on The Christian Faith and Nuclear Arms.
