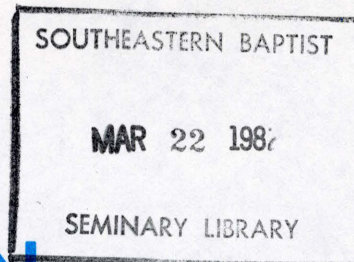

The 10 week internships (June 9-Aug. 17) begin with 10 days of orientation at the BFW headquarters in New York City. Field placements last eight weeks followed by debriefing at the NYC headquarters.
