CHURCH COVENANT:

Having been led, as we believe, by the Spirit of God to receive the Lord Jesus Christ as our Saviour, and on the profession of our faith, having been baptized in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Ghost, we do now in the presence of God, Angels and this Assembly, most solemnly and joyfully enter into covenant with one another as one body in Christ. We engage, therefore, by the aid of the Holy Spirit, to walk together in Christian love, to strive for the advancement of this Church in knowledge, holiness and comfort; to promote its prosperity and spirituality; to sustain its worship, ordinances, discipline and doctrines; to contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the Church, the relief of the poor and the spread of the gospel through all nations. We also engage to maintain family and secret devotion, to religiously educate our children, to seek the salvation of our kindred and acquaintances; to walk circumspect ly in the world; to be just in our dealings, faithful in our engagements, and exemplary in our deportment; to avoid all tattling backbiting, and excessive anger; to abstain from the sale and use of intoxicating drink as a beverage, and to be zealous in our efforts to advance the kingdom of our Saviour.

We further engage to watch over one another in brotherly love, to remember each other in prayer, to aid each other in sickness or distress; to cultivate Christian sympathy in feeling and courtesy in speech; to be slow to take offense, but always ready for reconciliation, and mindful of those rules of our Saviour-to secure it without delay. We moreover engage that when we remove from this place, we will, as soon as possible, unite with some other church, where we can carry out the spirit of this covenant and principles of God's word.

CONSTITUTION.

- Article 1. This Association shall be denominated and known as the Eastern Association.
- Art. 2. The object of this Association shall be the promotion of Christ's kingdom among men, and the means of accomplishing this shall be in strict conformity to the New Testament.
- Art. 3. This Association shall be composed of all ordained ministers who are members or pastors of churches of this body, and three delegates from each church, chosen from the membership assembled in conference.
- Art. 4. The delegates from each church shall bear a letter certifying their appointment and communicating information relative to the state of the church; Provided, however, that when any church has prepared a letter, and through inadvertence the letter fails to be presented, her delegates may be received without its presentation.
- Art. 5. The officers of this Association shall be Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be chosen annually from among its members by ballot, by a majority of its members voting, and continue in office until their successors are elected.
- Art. 6. It shall be the business of the Moderator to enforce an observance of the Constitution, preserve order, appoint committees, decide all questions of order, give his opinion on all questions under discussion after others have spoken, and give the casting vote in case of a tie.
- Art. 7. It shall be the duty of the clerk to record the proceedings of each annual session, and superintend their printing and distribution among the churches.
- Art. 8. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive all funds sent up by the churches, or collected during the session of this body and distribute the same as ordered by the Association. He shall also make to the Association an annual report of the condition of the treasury.

- Art. 9. The Association shall appoint an Executive Committee of five members, who shall co-operate with the State Board so far as practicable in the mission work within our bounds, and during the interval between the sessions of this body, take such steps as they may deem advisable for the advancement of the same, making annual reports of their work to the Association, which report, together with that on State Missions, shall be the first business of the second day of the session. Further, that our missionaries shall report their work quarterly to the Executive Committee in order that said committee shall be prepared to make full report of their work to this body.
- Art. 10. The Association shall not maintain fellowship with any of the churches which neglect to observe Gospel order.
- Art. 11. The Association may invite visiting and corresponding brethren to seats and extend to them the privileges of the body, except that of voting.
- Art. 12. The annual session of this Association shall commence on Tuesday after the first Lord's day in October, at such place as may be chosen.
- Art. 13. By appointment of the Association there shall be an introductory sermon of a denominational character.
- Art. 14. This Constitution may be amendeded at any annual session by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

RULES OF ORDER.

- 1. On the meeting of the Association the Moderator of the preceding session shall preside until his successor is known. In case of his absence a chairman pro tem shall be elected.
- 2. Each session of the Association shall be opened with religious exercises, to be opened by whomsoever the presiding officer may name.
- 3. At each daily session, and previous to proceeding to business, the names of the delegates shall be called and the proceedings of the previous daily sessions read.
- 4. The members shall observe toward the officers and each other that courtesy which belongs to Christians.

5. Any member wishing to speak shall rise and address the presiding officer. He shall confine himself strictly to the question under consideration and avoid personalities.

6. No member shall speak more than twice on the

same question without permission.

- 7. All motions seconded shall be definitely stated by the presiding officer before discussion.
 - 8. No motion shall be withdrawn after discussion.
- 9. When a question is under discussion no motion or proposition shall be received except to adjourn, to lay on the table, to amend, to commit, to postpone to a definite time, which several motions shall have preference in the order in which they are stated.
- 10. After a motion has been decided, any member having voted in the majority may move a reconsideration.
- 11. No member shall absent himself during the session of the Association without permission of the presiding officer, and no one shall take final leave of absence without the permission of the Association, and if any shall do so their absence shall be noted in the minutes.
- 12. All questions except such as relate to the Constitution shall be decided by a majority of votes.
- 13. The Association shall have the right to decide what subjects shall be admitted to consideration.
- 14. The Rules of Order may be altered or amended at any session of the Association by a majority vote.

After the benediction by R. C. Sandlin the Association adjourned 'till 9:30 Wednesday.

SECOND DAY-Morning Session.

Devotional exercises were conducted by J. M. Alderman at 9:30 a.m. At 10 the Moderator called the Association to order. The roll of delegates was called and the minutes of the preceding day read and approved.

Visiting brethren were asked to report themselves. E.

J. Edwards, representing the Biblical Recorder and J. M. Page, the North Carolina Baptist, responded and were welcomed by the Moderator to seats with us.

REPORT OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Our efforts in this department of our Master's kingdom have not been in vain. God has promised to bless His Word when faithfully presented.

Our Missionary, Brother N. A. Shelly, has served seven churches and mission points, viz.: Hallsville, Sharon, Alum Springs, Cedar Fork, Maple Hill, Beulahville and Burton School House. He preached 110 sermons, baptized 8, four awaiting baptism and organized one Sunday school.

Let us encourage our hard-worked brother Johnson by increasing our contributions for the support of our own missionaries at home, and the one hundred or more missionaries in the employ of the State Mission Board.

REPORT ON FOREIGN MISSION.

God is the author of missions. He started this work because He loved the world. He gave His Son, and afterwards His Spirit. He calls all who loves Him to the work of giving the Gospel in all the world, to every creature. The difficulties being very great, Christ promised His power and presence, and this like God's covenant with Noah, He has ever kept. As the result of the labors of our missionaries fully testify. The Foreign Mission Board composed of twenty-one faithful and consecrated brethren who live in Richmond, Va., is simply a committee appointed every year by the churches through their representatives in the Southern Baptist Convention. It makes an annual report to the Convention, besides keeping in touch with the brethren through the religious papers and the Foreign Mission Journal. The object is to look after the Lord's work. Its one business is the business of the Lord Jesus. It has no authority or power except that confered upon it by his churches, and it goes forward or stands still according to their interest and direction. We have missionaries in China, Africa, Japan, Mexico, Italy, and Brazil. The number has grown so that on June 1st, 1903, we see 129 with 3 more under appointment, who expect to go soon to their fields of labor. Glorious reports have come from our mission fields. Our people at home seem interested, and are praying, talking, giving; so that we hope to report at our next Convention in Nashville, Tenn., in May, the very best year in all our history. Let us make it the best for the glory of God.

REPORT ON PERIODICALS.

With the multiplicity of papers now published by our Baptist brethren in North Carolina, at various prices from 25 cents to \$1.50 each, no Baptist family need be without a religious newspaper. The Biblical Recorder which has been the organ of the Baptist State Convention, has a present subscription list of over 7,000, and hopes to obtain at least 10,000 per annum. The North Carolina Baptist printed at \$1.00 a year has also a wide circulation. Charity and Children published at \$1.00 a year is the organ of the Baptist Orphanage, at Thomasville, and has attained a very wide circulation among the churches and Sunday schools. There are other smaller monthly publications in various sections representing schools and associations which have a local patron-

age of their own. We would specially commend the organs of our general denominational work including the publications of the three boards of the Southern Baptist Convention.

REPORT ON HOME MISSIONS.

Home missions claims our attention to-day as never before, because of the great advancement in manufacturing in our midst. The Home Mission work appeals to us because our kinsmen are moving into the undeveloped portions of the Southern States, and are building new communities and towns. Our Home Board is working in nearly all the Southern and Western States and territories. The increase of money and men this year, only calls for more men and money for another year.

REPORT ON MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

At Wake Eorest College is located the Board of Ministerial Education of the Baptist State Convention of North Carlina. Prof. W. R. Cullom is the Secretary of the Board. About forty young men are now at Wake Forest preparing for efficient work, supported in part by its Board. This Board is supported entirely by voluntary contributions from the Baptists of North Carolina. We urge enlarged contributions.

The Student's Aid Fund of our Theological minary, at Louisville, Ky., should also receive our hearty co-operation and support. Believing that it is always better, when possible, that our ministers attend the Seminary, we commend enlarged interest and contributions for this object of our work. Respectfully,

REPORT ON DENOMINATIONAL INSTITUTIONS.

Our subject is a great and important one; and great because it takes in our schools and colleges, Orphanage and churches as well. Important, because not only the destiny of our churches, but our government also depends upon it. We cannot hope in this short report to give anything more than a few suggestions, but we trust that the Association will thoroughly discuss this great subject. The State is, and should be, in the ascendency in Primary Education. and the religious denominations should do their part in controlling and supporting the High Schools and colleges. As Missionary Baptists, we should not only love and support Wake Forest College and the Baptist Female University, at Raleigh, N. C., and the Seminary at Louisville, Ky., but we should be more interested in preparatory High Schools, for the individuals life is not only influenced, but shaped in a large degree by the preparatory schools. We therefore take pleasure in pointing to the High School at Warsaw, N. C., the property of this Association, which is now progressing fairly well under the able management of Prof. Ernest Gore, and most earnestly suggest that this Association liberally support this school with their patronage, and make this school fulfill the mission for which it was established. And we further recommend that this Association not only keep this school property, but suggest that we make such needed repairs as are needed for the success of said school. We earnestly urge this Association to put more effort and money into the High School work, and the general education of our people. We regret we are forced to admit the lack of effort and interest of our denomination in supporting and maintaining our Associational schools.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES WARSAW HIGH SCHOOL.

Your Trustees beg leave to report that the Fall term of said school has opened under very favorable conditions. We have a precious Father in Heaven, and the Orphanage is an expression of the desire of God's people to become father to the fatherless. It seems that the Lord is putting it into the heart of the more wealthy brethren to prepare buildings for our unfortunate children, and now the sweet task of feeding and clothing them is falling more heavily each year upon the rank and file of our people. We urge that as many churches and Sunday schools as possible take upon themselves the support of one or more children at Thomasville.

pastors in this work. Your committee would recommend, therefore, that the pastors would give this support, and undertake to lead these efficient workers for the greatest usefulness and strength of our churches.

by the Association to gather the material and write a history of the chnrches and the Association. It was so ordered.

On motion by J. N. Tolar, W. N. Johnson was appointed to represent the Association on the State Board of Missions. The business of this session having been completed the Association adjourned to meet with the New Hope Baptist church on Tuesday after the first Sunday in October, 1904.
