Accreditation

Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary is accredited by the Association of Theological Schools in the United States and Canada and by the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools.

Admission

Students applying for admission to degree programs who plan to begin studies in either term of summer school should follow the admission instructions as outlined in the Catalog, 1989-91, pp. 25f, and register on the designated days.

Currently enrolled students need only to register on the designated days.

Applications for admission to summer school on any other basis should be received in the Registrar's Office at least fifteen days prior to the registration date. For additional information, write: Registrar, Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, P. O. Box 1889, Wake Forest, North Carolina, 27588-1889.

Curriculum

The curriculum consists of courses for students continuing in the A.Div., M.Div., M.A.C.E., M.A.C.M., and D.Min. programs. Th.M. or D.Min. students may take advanced electives. Applications for admission to summer school are welcomed from alumni or others who want to pursue post-degree studies.

The maximum load permitted per term is two courses. Students who elect language study may take only that course.

Classes meet four days a week, Tuesday through Friday, unless otherwise noted. Except where otherwise cited, Catalog prerequisites for summer school courses are waived. Students are encouraged to consider carefully their level of proficiency when selecting electives in areas where no formal study has been done.

The seminary reserves the right to limit the size of classes in order to maintain a reasonable student-teacher ratio or to cancel a course if enrollment is not sufficient.

In addition to courses offered on campus, students may earn up to eight semester hours' credit for the completion of a basic unit of clinical pastoral education at an accredited training center as provided in the Catalog, 1989-91, pg. 108. In order to receive credit, the student must register with the Registrar prior to the beginning of the program and the supervisor must file a grade report at the conclusion of the course (M4360s-M4361s).

Registration

Special Summer courses require permission of the professor, registration, and payment of all fees at least 24 hours before the course begins. Special Summer courses are limited in enrollment, therefore, permission of the professor should be obtained well in advance.

June Term: On Monday, June 3, 1991, orientation activities and matriculation for all students will begin at 9:00 a.m. and end at 4:30 p.m. Classes begin on Tuesday, June 4. Enrollment in classes closes at 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, June 5.

July Term: On Monday, July 1, 1991, orientation activities and matriculation for all students will begin at 9:00 a.m. and end at 4:30 p.m. Classes begin on Tuesday, July 2. July 4 is a holiday. Enrollment closes at 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, July 3.

Fees

The matriculation fee for May term courses is \$75 per course (except for M4701s which is \$100).

The matriculation fee for the June/July term is \$100 per course.

These fees are not refundable after 4:30 p.m. on June 7 for the first term or after 4:30 p.m. on July 9 for the second term. The cost of books and supplies varies depending on courses taken.

In addition to matriculation fees, professors may also collect additional fees for supplies, travel expenses, etc. necessary to complete the Special Summer courses.

In addition to the matriculation fee, each summer school student will be charged a Summer School Student Services Fee of \$10.00. (See page 31 of 1989-91 Catalog.)

Withdrawal

Withdrawal from a course without penalty is permitted until 4:30 p.m., June 7 in the June term and until 4:30 p.m., July 9 in the July term. Students wishing to withdraw from a course or from enrollment should consult the Registrar for guidance.

Housing

Inquiries concerning housing accommodations for the summer terms should be directed to the Director of Housing. Dormitory rental rates for Johnson and Lolley Halls are \$110.00 for double occupancy and \$135.00 for private rooms. Duplex Apartments are \$205.00 a month for a one-bedroom apartment, \$220.00 a month for two bedrooms, and \$230.00 a month for three bedrooms. The Townhouse Apartments are \$265.00 a month for two bedrooms and \$275.00 a month for three bedrooms.

A study of structures, problems, and ministry challenges in contemporary urban settings, including an evaluation of efforts toward renewal of the churches. B 1628s Galatians Mr. Reid A study of the letter to the Galatians in its historical setting in the life of Paul, utilizing the English text. 2 semester hours. Prerequisite: B 1501.

H 2420s The Biblical Basis of Evangelism Mr. Miles An examination of the nature of evangelism based upon an investigation of selected biblical documents and interacting with case studies in contemporary evangelism. 2 semester hours.

T 3331s Alcohol and Drug Abuse Mr. Hewitt A study of the nature, causes, extent and possible treatment of problems related to the use of alcohol and other drugs in the light of biblical, theological and scientific perspectives. 2 semester hours.

M 4020s Biblical Preaching Mr. McDill A study of the effective use of the Bible in preaching. Attention will be given to the interpretation of the Scriptures in the work of preaching with emphasis upon their relevance to the contemporary situation. 2 semester hours.

M 4873s Church Libraries/Media Centers Ms. Anderson A study of the role of church library materials, equipment, and services in Christian education, worship, ministries, and outreach with emphasis on the organization and administration of a media center in the local church. 2 semester hours.

B 1101s Biblical Hebrew Mr. Balentine A continuation of B 1100 with emphasis on the weak verb and readings from biblical text. 3 semester hours. Prerequisite: B 1100.

B 1646s The Book of Revelation Mr. Cook A study of Revelation in its historical setting with particular attention to the Christology of the book. The English text is used. 2 semester hours.

H 2345s Current Topics in International Missions
Mr. Becket

A study of current issues in missions in areas outside the United States. Topics will be announced. (May be taken more than once for credit.) 2 semester hours.

H 2142s Baptist History and Heritage Mr. Grissom A course designed to give the student an understanding of what it has meant to live and work in a Baptist context. Included will be a study of Baptist origins and development, the major theological emphases of Baptists, their literature, their denominational structures, and the relation of all of these areas to current issues in Baptist life. 2 semester hours.

T 3037s A History of Baptist Thought Mr. Richardson A historical review of the theological emphases of Baptists, with special reference to Baptists in the South. 2 semester hours.

M4930s Christian Education and the Renewal of the Church
Mr. Powers

A study of current educational movements and trends within the church with emphasis on their role in illustrating and clarifying contemporary religious issues and in shaping the educational ministry of the church as an agent of renewal. 2 semester hours. Prerequisite: M 4800, M 4802, or M 4820.

The course traces the history of American religion from the

M 4001s The Delivery of Sermons Mr. McDill A basic course in the study and practice of effective speaking and reading. 2 semester hours. Prerequisite: M 4000.

BHTM 0410s Colloquium: Theological Method for Ministry (First Colloquium)

Mr. Halbrooks

An interdisciplinary investigation of the theological bases, symbols, and essential objectives of Christian ministry in the context of the practice of ministry. Open only to D.Min. students. 4 semester hours.

BHTM 0411s Colloquium: Action-Research Approaches to Ministry (Second Colloquium)

Mr. Meiburg

An interdisciplinary investigation of several of the theological foundations and functions of ministry (e.g. preaching, pastoral care) with attention to the candidates' field experiences and projects in ministry. Open only to D.Min. students. 4 semester hours.

M 4701s Supervised Ministry II MAY 15-IULY 31

Mr. Pyle

An elective course offered the semester following the completion of Supervised Ministry (M 4700). The student who elects to take this course may not take either of the advanced courses "Concurrent Internship" or "Intern Year Away." The requirements for the course must be fulfilled in the same location and with the same supervisor approved for the preceding course. 2 semester hours. Times of class TBA. (Restricted to students currently taking M 4700 in the Spring Semester. Conference with Instructor required prior to registration.)

M 4232s Workshop on Urban Studies MAY 18-24

Mr. Bland

A workshop designed to observe and study, on site, Christian mission and ministry in a major metropolitan setting. Special attention is given to the work of the Baptist association and mission strategy. The 1991 Workshop will be held in New York City. 2 semester hours. Prerequisite: Special application required. Secure special application from Professor Bland, Stealey 311, or from Mrs. Evelyn Carter in the Faculty Secretaries Office. T 3323s The Church and Social Change MAY 16-25

Mr. Hewitt

A study of selected ecumenical, denominational and church models for social change with special attention to the church's social strategy and the theological justification for programs of social reform. Requires travel and work with Habitat for Humanity. 3 semester hours. Prerequisite: T 3300 and permission of professor.

M 5009s Workshop in Music Ministry MAY 13-17

Mr. Good

Concentrated study of Music Ministry in a workshop setting. This workshop will be held concurrently with the Conference on Music Ministry to be held on campus during the week immediately following the Spring semester, 1991. In addition to required participation in the conference events throughout the week, the class would meet in sessions prior to and following the conference to discuss research assignments in the area of Music Ministry. 2 semester hours. Prerequisite: M 5001, and permission of professor.
