


#### CONSTITUTION.

Article 1. This body shall be known as the VIRGINIA PORTS-MOUTH BAPTIST ASSOCIATION.

#### Membership.

Article 2. It shall be composed of white delegates, elected by the churches connected with this body, and all ordained ministers who are members of, or laboring in connection with said churches. Each church of one hundred members and under shall be entitled to two delegates, and for every additional one hundred members an additional delegate.

Objects.

Article 3. The objects shall be to devise and recommend measures for increasing the harmony, the intelligence and the spiritual power of the churches, and for developing and directing their energies, their resources and their gifts, in advancing the Redeemer's kingdom in the earth.

#### Powers and Prerogatives.

Article 4. The Association shall have no power to infringe upon the sovereignty or rights of the churches. It is neither an ecclesiastical legislature, nor council, nor court of appeals. It may advise the churches, and recommend measures of usefulness for their adoption, but cannot bind them in any way. Yet, in view of the combined wisdom, piety and intelligence of the body, it may justly claim for itself, for its objects, and for its recommendations the very highest consideration and regard.

Article 5. The Association may dissolve connection with any church that becomes heterdox in doctrine or disorderly in practice, or that fails to represent itself, either by delegate or letter, more than two successive sessions, without sufficient reasons or that treats with contempt its objects and requirements, or upon application of a church

for its dismission.

#### Rights of the Churches.

Article 6. Each individual church shall hold and exercise all the functions of an independent church of Jesus Christ. As constituent members of the Association, the churches have the right to advise when desired in a case of difficulty, and to suggest plans of usefulness to be adopted. If at any time the Association shall assume unwarranted powers over the churches, they shall have the right to dissolve their connection with the body.

#### Duties of the Churches.

Article 7. It shall be the duty of the churches to appoint as delegates, as far as practical, their most capable members, to insist upon their attendance, and to send by them a contribution to the Association Fund to pay for the printing of the Minutes and other necessary

expenses.

Article 8. It shall be the duty of each church to send annually a letter to the Association giving: 1. Location; 2. The names of the pastor and clerk and their respective postoffices; 3. The Sabbaths of regular service; 4. The church statistics, including the number baptized, received by letter, restored, dismissed, deceased, expelled, and aggretate membership, male and female; 5. Sabbath-school statistics; 6. Amount contributed to benevolent objects and the Association Fund; 7. Names of the Delegates and Alternates; 8. Any other information deemed of special importance.

#### Organization.

Article 9. The officers of the Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer; who shall be elected at each annual session, after the names of the delegates are enrolled, and shall continue in office until the next annual session. As soon as the officers have taken their seats, the body shall be declared organized and ready for business.

#### Duties of Officers.

Article 10. It shall be the duty of the Moderator to open the meeting punctually at the time appointed, to enforce the rules, to preserve order, and to exercise all the prerogatives of a presiding officer according to the principles of established parliamentary usage.

Article 11. It shall be the duty of the Vice-Moderator to discharge the duties of the Moderator in his absence.

Article 12. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to keep a faithful record of the proceedings of the body and superintend the printing and distribution of the same; and to keep on file the printed minutes and other important documents belonging to the body. He may appoint an assistant when necessary.

Article 13. It shall be the duty of the Treasurer to receive and disburse the money contributed to the Association Fund, as directed

by the body, and to make an annual report of same.

Article 14. This Constitution may be altered at any annual session of the body by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

#### RULES OF ORDER.

The Association shall convene annually at the time and place of its own selection.

2nd. During each annual session it shall meet and adjourn from

day to day at the hour fixed upon by the body.

3rd. All the meetings of the Association shall be opened and closed with religious exercises.

4th. A majority of the members present shall be a quorum for

the transaction of business.

5th. No person shall speak more than twice on the same subject nor longer than twenty minutes, without permission from the body.

6th. No member shall be allowed to stand up, talk, read or move about the house during the business, except to gain or impart information on the subject under discussion.

7th. No committee shall be in session during the hours of busi-

ness without permission of the body.

8th. The business of the Association shall be as follows: 1. Read and enroll names of Delegates and of Ordained Ministers. 2. Organize. 3. Appoint Committees on Program, Religious Exercises and Finance. 4. Introductory sermon. 5. Invite Visiting Brethren and Corresponding Messengers to seats. 6. Call the names of those churches that failed to represent themselves at the previous session, and inquire their reason for such failure. 7. Reception of New Churches. 8. Reports of Standing Committees. 9. Appoint Committees on Time, Place, Preacher and Alternate for Introductory Sermon. also Preacher and Alternate for Doctrinal Sermon. 10. Time of Preaching the Doctrinal Sermon shall be appointed by the Association. 11. Receive reports of other committees. 12. Miscellaneous Business shall be provided for at the pleasure of the Association.

9th. All questions of order not herein provided for shall be decided by rules of Mells Parliamentary Practice.

Report of Ministers' Fund and Pastoral Support, prepared by James Elliott, was read by the clerk and adopted.

#### REPORT ON MINISTERIAL RELIEF AND ANNUITIES

The Relief and Annuity Board of the Southern Baptist Convention, through its relief fund and its annuity fund, is grappling with a great and growing problem of providing for ministers, their widows and dependent orphans in the best possible way. This Board is located in Dallas, Texas, and has made rapid progress in the work committed to it and there is a growing appreciation of its work on the part of the brotherhood throughout the South.

#### The Relief Fund.

The permanent relief fund is still under \$600,000.00 and the relief beneficiaries are receiving on an average less than \$150.00 per year. To provide properly for nearly 1200 beneficiaries of this fund,

the Board must have a very much larger income. Still the amount that we now distribute to aged and infirm ministers and to widows and dependent orphans of ministers is bringing peace of mind and a degree of comfort to these denominational wards that is justifiably gratifying.

The Annuity Fund.

Members of the annuity fund who have reached their sixty-eighth birthday or who have become permanently disabled, are receiving the maximum amount promised in the membership certificate, namely, \$500.00 per year.

Increased Provision Planned.

The action of the Southern Baptist Convention, which met in Houston, Texas in May last, in adopting the New Service Annuity Plan, as recommended by the special Laymen's Committee and by The Relief and Annuity Board itself, has been hailed with great satisfaction by thousands of our ministers and by the brotherhood generally. The provisions of this plan mark a distinct advance in the work of Ministerial Relief and the carrying out of these provisions will give to every participating minister, the widews and dependent orphans of participating ministers, within the bounds of the Southern Baptist Convention, a support worthy of our great denomination, when they shall come to require it by reason of age, physical disability or dependency.

#### Some of the Provisions of the New Service Plan.

Some of the outstanding features of the New Service Plan are as follows:

- 1. An age annuity available at sixty-five for every active minister. This plan builds to a retirement annuity of approximately 50% of the average salary on a basis of thirty-five years of service, i. e., on a basis of an average salary of \$2400.00 there will be eventually given an annuity of \$1200.00 and so on. There will be guaranteed to every active minister participating in this plan, a minimum of 50% of his average salary up to \$600.00. Three-fifths of the retirement annuity will be continued to the widow.
- 2. Total and permanent disability prior to the age of sixty-five will entitle the participant to an annuity amounting to 40% of his average annual salary, during the five years preceding disability.
- 3. There will be a death benefit to the widow, after the first year of membership, amounting to 75% of the current year's salary of the minister, but not to exceed \$1,000.00.
- 4. Minor children of disabled ministers will participate in this plan to receive \$100.00 a year each, up to age eighteen with certain educational allowances up to age of twenty-one.

There is much that can be accomplished by the Baptist Council in this Association, a few of the needy stations follow: Cradock is badly in need of a new church building and with a substantial loan from the Council this would be possible. Norview too is in hopes of building in the not too distant future. Missions are needed in many of our suburban districts, particularly Chesterfield Heights.

It should be remembered that the Baptist Council office stands ready to assist Program Committees for Conventions, Training Schools and all other denominational meetings, as well as any work in connection with the carrying out of the Co-operative Program and supplying pulpits of pastorless churches.

#### Recommendation From Baptist Council.

At the quarterly meeting of the Baptist Council, held at Park View Church on September 23rd, the following recommendation was unanimously adopted:

"That it is the earnest desire that the churches of the Portsmouth Baptist Association give 15% of their Benevolences to our Baptist Council work, and if any church or churches cannot acquiesce in this desire we sincerely trust that they shall manifest their interest in the continuance of the work of the Baptist Council by making as liberal a contribution as possible."

The following report on Combined State Interests was read by T. E. Peters and adopted:

#### COMBINED REPORT OF STATE INTERESTS

The Baptist Churches of Virginia co-operating through the medium of the General Association are engaged in the following work: State Missions, Ministerial Education, six institutions of learning,

the Baptist Hospital, and the Baptist Orphanage.

The financial budget this year for the operation and development of these interests, as determined by the last session of the General Association, is \$500,000.00. In addition to this budget the Two Million Dollar Campaign for buildings and endowment for the University of Richmond was also launched by the General Association. The Woman's Missionary Union, as an auxiliary, participates in all these undertakings.

#### STATE MISSIONS

to which is allocated 48% of the budget, consists of several enterprises. In 1925 aid was given to 150 Missionary Pastors laboring in twenty-seven Associations; three hundred forty-two stations were occupied, and 2,797 persons were baptized. 358 Sunday Schools were maintained, and 31 new ones organized. Eleven churches were constituted and eight church buildings completed. At the beginning of the present year thirteen of these fields voluntarily came off the Board, thus making it possible to enter new fields of great opportunity. At the present time Cradock, Ocean View, and Westhaven in the Portsmouth Association are being aided; but at some time or other all the churches in this Association except six or seven have been kelped.

THREE STATE EVANGELISTS are now being supported. Last year 746 baptisms were reported by them and the offerings on their fields of labor largely support this department.

Four MISSION HIGH SCHOOLS are maintained; Buchanan Mission School (Buchanan County), Oak Hill Academy (Grayson County), Blue Ridge Mission School (Patrick County), and Piedmont Mission School (Nelson County). The enrollment in these schools is about 450. A majority of the students entering are not Christians but few leave without uniting with the churches. There is a great need now at Buchanan due to the burning last Christmas of the boys dormitory. The building is being replaced but for lack of room more than one hundred applicants have been refused entrance this session.

THE LAYMEN'S WORK under W. J. Kendrick, an employee of the Board, is yielding splendid results in a better informed and more truly enlisted brotherhood.

THE SUNDAY SCHOOL and B. Y. P. U. Department under Secretary, Dr. J. T. Watts, is within itself a great and fruitful undertaking. This work consists in stimulating, guiding, and training our churches in Bible School and Young People's work. The value of the Summer Assemblies, the Training Schools and Institute work in city and country churches can hardly be over-estimated. The Sunday School Board assists materially in this work.

THE BAPTIST BOOK STORE is now owned jointly by Virginia Baptists and the Sunday School Board of Nashville.

#### ORPHANAGE

The Orphanage at Salem not only appeals to the hearts of the people but is worthy of their liberal support. 283 children are under its care. Fourteen per cent. of our State budget is allocated to this institution and many Sunday Schools are sending special offerings.

#### VIRGINIA BAPTIST HOSPITAL

The Virginia Baptist Hospital at Lynchburg was opened July 15, 1924. It has a capacity of 108 beds. A gift of \$75,000.00 by Mrs. Mundy, and the nurses home by Pres. O. B. Barker bring the total property value to approximately \$500,000.00, with a debt of \$140,000.00.

#### THE EDUCATION BOARD

One hundred and thirty-five students for the ministry and special religious work were aided in 1925 by the Education Board. This work is allotted 6% of our State-wide budget, and last year dispensed \$23,211.40.

#### EDUCATIONAL INSTITUTIONS

THE UNIVERSITY OF RICHMOND consists of Richmond College, Westhampton College, and The T. C. Williams School of Law. It has property to the value of about four and a half million dollars, of which just about half is invested in income-bearing endowment. The buildings are suitable to accommodate about 900 students, but for the last three years the enrollment has gone beyond a thousand.

The two million dollars sought in the present campaign will be about equally divided between buildings and equipment and endowment. Last year all student fees paid into the University treasury covered just 43% of the total operating expenses of the institution. If the number of students be greatly increased, the endowment must be increased to pay for teaching.

The University has no debt. It lives within its income, and all the funds realized from the present campaign will go into permanent buildings and endowment. Four per cent. of the budget is allocated to this institution.

INTERMONT COLLEGE and AVERETT COLLEGE are standard junior colleges for women. They owe no debts and the former has a nucleus of endowment. Both schools are doing good work and are well attended. Two per cent. to each of these schools is allocated from the budget.

BLUEFIELD COLLEGE is a standard junior college for men. The cost of its buildings and equipment has not yet been met. It has a great field for usefulness and deserves support in a financial way. Four per cent. of the budget is allocated to Bluefield.

FORK UNION MILITARY ACADEMY has a heavy debt of nearly a quarter of a million dollars incurred in rebuilding after it burned four years ago. But the work of the institution is splendid and the enrollment good. Eight per cent, of the budget goes to Fork Union.

HARGRAVE MILITARY ACADEMY has no debt and is doing a fine piece of work. Two per cent. of the budget is allocated to her.

Your committee recommends that the churches support the unified budget as far as possible as the best means of caring for all of these State interests.

Motion by I. D. S. Knight that we request the Sunday Schools of the Portsmouth Association to take up a collection one Sunday in each month and forward direct to the Orphanage was seconded and adopted. A stirring address on the Co-operative Program was delivered by J. T. Watts and a goal of \$77,000 for 1927 was adopted. Amounts to be apportioned to the churches by the officers of the Association.

#### CO-OPERATIVE PROGRAM

When the Baptist General Association of Virginia met in Roanoke last fall the recommendation of the Board of Missions and Education was adopted making the goal for Virginia in the Co-operative Program a minimum of one million dollars, and that body also instructed that the following percentages be used by the treasurer in allocating undesignated funds: State Missions, 24%; Home Missions, 11%; Foreign Missions, 30%; Southwide Education, 5%, Ministers Relief and Annuity, 3½%; Baptist Orphanage, 7%; Virginia Baptist Hospital, 3%; New Orleans Hospital, 5%; Ministerial Education, 3%; Virginia schools and colleges, 13%.

The Every Member Canvass was conducted December 6-13, some churches making the canvass earlier and some later, while four hundred churches, 11 of which are in this Association, either failed to do so or did not report results to headquarters. The total amount reported by 770 churches is \$726,481.36. Based upon last year's gifts, the non-reporting churches may be expected to contribute \$100,000 this year. Adding W. M. U. specials, designations and contributions there is a good outlook in Virginia, especially in view of the fact that many churches reported pledges considerably below their gifts for 1925.

By raising our goal of a million dollars, Virginia Baptists will be able to take care of their current work, reduce their indebtedness in a substantial way, and give their proper share of the money imperatively needed for Foreign Missions, Home Missions, Ministers Relief and Annuity and other causes fostered by the Southern Baptist

Convention.

The best way to provide for all our work is to pay in full the quotas proposed to and accepted by the district associations and by them suggested to the churches. With good harvests and reasonably satisfactory business conditions Virginia Baptists will be able to reach the goal set for themselves, and possibly go even beyond that goal. The co-operation of our entire brotherhood is needed if we are to come out with victory at the end of the calendar year.

#### 1927 Program

At Houston, Texas, in May, the Southern Baptist Convention voted to undertake, in co-operation with the states, to raise a combined goal of \$9,000,000 and the Co-operative Program Commission was directed to continue its work of promotion. The Convention adopted percentages for the allocation of south-wide funds. According to the Convention's action, should Virginia adopt that basis, Virginia would give as follows: Foreign Missions, 25%; Home Missions, 11¼%; Ministers Relief and Annuity, 4½%; New Orleans Hospital, 1%, and South-wide Education, 8¼%.

The Board of Missions and Education at its annual meeting in

The Board of Missions and Education at its annual meeting in January instructed its Executive Committee to prepare recommendations to the Baptists of Virginia covering the 1927 Program. Subsequent to the meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention the Executive Committee of the Board decided to recommend that the Every Member Canvass be conducted December 5-12, inclusive, or as near

these dates as practicable, for a minimum of one million dollars and that the funds raised during 1927 for objects of the Convention be distributed on the following percentages:

Foreign Missions, 30%; Home Missions, 10%; Ministers Relief and Annuity, 4½%; New Orleans Hospital, 5%; South-wide Education, 5%.

The ratio is 50% to South-wide and 50% to State causes.

The percentages for State causes were left for further consideration and report to the Board at its session just prior to the meeting of the Generation Association at Danville, at which time final recommendations will be worked out both for South-wide and State work.

In suggesting percentages at variance with the action of the Convention the Executive Committee had in mind the action of the General Association last fall, at which time the percentages being used this year were adopted. The present recommendation giving Ministers Relief and Annuity 4½% instead of 3½% as at present was made in order to enable the treasurer to send to the Board at Dallas a sufficient sum to take care of the established allowances to Virginia beneficiaries. Only because of a modest unused fund in the hands of the Board at the beginning of this year have we been able to get along without reductions being made in our allowances.

It is recommended that each association adopt as its goal for 1927 the amounts suggested for 1926, the goal for this association being \$77,000.00 and that a committee be appointed to apportion that sum to the churches as their working basis unless it is considered wiser to have the church goals suggested by the Executive Board of the Association.

It is especially urged that the Every Member Canvass be conducted in each church with the purpose of receiving subscriptions from individuals aggregating as much or more than the suggested church goals.

The following resolution was unanimously adopted: "That it is the earnest hope that in every church of this Association a sermon be preached before November 1st for the purpose of creating a sense of duty toward the Co-operative Program and urging the people to rally and meet the situation."

# TUESDAY EVENING

Devotional exercises conducted by J. D. Brame, who read from the 5th chapter of Ephesians, after the singing of "Standing on the Promises" and selection by choir of Park View Church.

President F. W. Boatwright of the University of Richmond was recognized and spoke on the work of that institution and the campaign for much needed funds with which to carry on its great and ever-expanding work.

Following President Boatwright's address, the following resolutions were offered by J. Elwood Welsh and adopted:

In view of the near-century service of the University of Richmond to the Baptist denomination and humanity at large, and in view of the University's present campaign for two millions of dollars, already endorsed by the Baptist General Association at its last session, be it resolved.

First, That the Portsmouth Association in annual session assembled this 29th day of September, 1926, in the Park View Baptist Church, Portsmouth, does hereby heartily endorse the present campaign of the University of Richmond for much needed funds with which to carry on its great and ever expanding work.

Second, That the churches, pastors, laymen, and the good women co-operate in every way they may find practical and feasible to accomplish the success and ultimate victory of this worthy effort in behalf of our beloved institution.

The next in order was an address by W. Frank Robertson on "The Spiritual Life of Our Churches."

Adjourned with benediction by J. F. Love.

## WEDNESDAY MORNING

Session was called to order at 10:00 A. M. by Vice-Moderator Dr. A. M. Burfoot.

Devotional exercises conducted by S. A. Campbell.

Under the head of Church Management, Sam F. Templeman, of Elizabeth City, N. C., gave a most interesting address.

Report on Home Missions was read by Sparks W. Melton and adopted after address by the same brother.

#### HOME MISSIONS

In presenting to the Association this annual report, we are profoundly grateful to God for his continued blessing upon this great department of Christian work.

There seems to be in the minds of many a grave misunderstanding as to the exact achievements of the Board during the past year. The word debt has been stressed, of necessity, but to think of this as the only achievement of the Board, is to mistake greatly concerning the real cause.

There has been severe reduction in the forces, and there has been drastic retrenchment in nearly every department, but this weakening of machinery and manpower has seemed to bring added assistance from on high, and likewise to stimulate the lessened force

to enlarged endeavors.

Thus this Board, which has ever been the constructive, cooperative agency of Southern Baptists, has a report revealing tremendous triumphs in its activities. Some things not to be evaluated in figures are matters of thanksgiving, as being assuredly in the direction of a forward-going kingdom building process.

We are happy in the spirit in which the work is prosecuted and especially so when we consider the notes both divisive and undermining which come to us from many quarters. Also we are happy in the real emphasis given to worship; in the fact that in outlying districts the house of God is open for more numerous and regular

Speaking of our debt, and we must speak of it, we are optimistic enough to yoke it with another phase, namely, future development. Knowing both the heart of our Father and the hearts of our brethren we are absolutely confident that our present burden is a passing and only a passing distress. God knows our situation and is not deaf to our continual prayers. It only remains for us to see the facts and save the day through an immediate service, if need be unto death.

There is no longer time for delay and no further room for retrenchment or reduction. The last trench has been occupied and the work has already been jeopardized too much, and too long. Ours is a weakened condition which must be strengthened at once. We have cut off here and lopped of there, until the glorious statue and strength we could once muster and utilize is sadly marred and mangled. It is breaking the hearts of those who for so long a time have tried to carry on and come smiling through. If thousands had not taken seriously the special days of prayer, and the presentation so splendidly advocated through the press, there would have been absolute breakdown. But our God who is mighty to save has lifted up the fallen hands and strengthened the palsied limbs. We now stand supported of him who is able, and place upon you the choice claims of our present situation.

We are asking each messenger to do some real thinking, not merely to give a pleasing excuse for your former routine beliefs. Not to rationalize, not to acuse or excuse—above all not to refuse—

but NOW "think on these things."

Is not every interest of every individual Baptist served or stimulated or safeguarded by the "Home Board?" Are not stewardship, evangelism, Foreign Missions all blessed and builded strong by our work? An Indian gave \$25,000 during our 75 Million Campaign; a Russian, saved and baptized here, returned to Russia to reach his brethren there; a negro woman in the southland is supporting her daughter, working in Africa as a missionary. In reaching that Indian, Russian and Negro, the Home Board touched all kingdom interests.

Are you interested in social service and Americanization pro-While it was able the Home Board in Good Will centres and settlement homes, did more than give a tooth brush and the bath-it gave also the gospel of goodwill, and in humanizing America it has done much towards Americanizing the foreigner. Teaching neighborliness and brotherhood in Christ, it has had the winsomeness of a winning work.

Is this the work which must beg for your support and agonize for your attention? It is better to be overcome of a big task, and to overcome a small one, and the present crisis is so big and blessed

that surely all will rejoice to get under and lift.

Virginia Baptists never last in any logical conclusion or liberal contribution; rally to our Board in its need, so that today with its trials may come a speedy tomorrow with its triumphs.

Report on Foreign Missions was read by I. D. S. Knight and after listening to a stirring address on this great subject by Dr. J. F. Love, the report was adopted.

#### FOREIGN MISSIONS

The Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention has closed the Eighty-first year of its great service as a clearing house of Southern Baptists for the dissemination of the gospel in the most destitute parts of the earth. These eighty-one years have been filled with perplexing problems, hard work, and often with discouragements. But there has been an almost unbroken progress in evangelistic achievements and expansion of the Kingdom of Christ. The last year was the best year in all the years of the Board's history and work.

The following facts should be carefully stored up by pastors and messengers to this association, and taken back to the whole member-

ship of their churches:

#### 1. Things Accomplished Last Year.

13,269 persons were baptized on our foreign mission fields during the last Southern Baptist Convention year, a gain of 1,135 over the previous year. The total membership is now 140,488. This membership is organized into 1,215 churches, 557 of which are self-supporting. These churches contributed last year \$444,258, or nearly \$4.00 per

member.

We have on these fields 1,818 Sunday Schools with 76,991 scholars, and 568 women societies with 13,649 members. There are also 574 young people's societies with a membership of 13,868. Of schools of all grades, including kindergarten up to theological seminaries, we have 920 with a total student body of 36,893 before the Board's finances made it necessary to discontinue many of these schools. It is found that more than 50% of the baptisms reported for the year was among these students in our Christian schools on the foreign fields.

The medical work of the Board for the year consisted of 214,910 treatments administered to 69,583 patients, of which 5,498 were inpatients. 934 of the operations performed by the Board's medical

staff were major operations.

# 2. A Second Fact To Be Remembered Is The Financial Condition Of The Board.

The Board started the year 1925-26, with a heavy debt and loud calls from its missionaries for reenforcement and relief. During the year the Board received from the Co-operative Program \$1,071,834.16; in designated gifts \$240,613.05; and in total gifts to the Christmas Love Offering \$811,344.11. The debt was substantially reduced, but

there was left an indebtedness of \$727,000.

The Board has for more than three years denied the missionaries all equipment, such as residences, church buildings, school and hospital buildings, etc., and has now for some time discontinued appointment of missionaries, although there has been sad depletion of the missionary staff by death and resignations. The distress and disaster of these denials of missionary needs is voiced in numerous letters received from our missionaries.

The world which the Foreign Mission Board is facing is a world in desperate need, but a world ready for Christ, its only hope. Will

the Baptists of this Association suffer their beloved missionaries and their Foreign Mission Board to appeal in vain to them? Will they ignore the cries of a lost and ruined world for which Christ died and for which we have a sure and only remedy? The world needs the gospel, hundreds of young people are ready to carry it, and our people have the money to send them, if they would only give it.

We heartily commend the action of the women of our W. M. U. for their decision at the last Southern Baptist Convention to aid in the liquidation of the Foreign Board debt. It was decided by our W. M. U. that the Lotti Moon offering for this year be given for the missionary debt. They have placed \$300,000 as their goal. This amount to be raised by them from November 28 to December 5.

#### WOMAN'S WORK

Never before in the history of the Portsmouth Association has the Woman's Work been as well organized as at the present time.

With this, the close of another successful year, marks one of wonderful achievements, but sad to state we have lost precious opportunities that will never come to us again. It is with pleasure that with this report I bring to your attention some of the things accomplished by the women of the Portsmouth Association.

This Association has a total of forty-two active churches and we are proud to say that we have enlisted in our various groups of Woman's work thirty-nine of these forty-two churches. Of this number we have thirty-six wideawake Woman's Missionary Societies, and while we feel encouraged of the work thus far done we feel there is much yet to be accomplished in lining up the remaining churches and strengthening and putting new life in the weaker ones.

We have a total of one hundred and sixteen organizations, eighty of which are Young People's Societies. While the work among the young people is very gratifying we feel guilty of falling short of our duty when we realize that we should have at least four of these Junior Societies in each of our churches, fostered by our W. M. S.

Another phase of our work, from which we reap great joy, is the study of Missions. There were 156 classes held, with the awarding of 459 seals, which was very encouraging. Central wins the banner for the past year for having the largest number of classes, South Norfolk for the largest number of Seals and Larchmont falls in line for the greatest number of Official Seals.

There has been a total contribution of \$14,899.40 from the Women and Young People for the past Associational year.

During the past year we have increased in the Educational line as we are now supporting four students in our own Buchanan Mountain School.

One church of the Portsmouth Group is receiving the greatest joy since its organization in the most pleasant task of supporting an orphan in our own Orphanage at Salem. There has been 5 schools of Missions since our last report, which we recommend as a most excellent way of bringing our membership closer to duty once we get them interested.

The Goodwill Center, under direction of Miss Ruby Sharpley and an Advisory Board of the Portsmouth Group, with assistance from the Baptist Council, had a most successful year, with an average enrollment of 80 scholars. The Center is located 407 Middle Street. Portsmouth. One of the most gratifying features of this work was the Mother's Club, which was small in numbers but this was overbalanced by interest. It was remarkable to note how eager these mothers are to learn to read and write and to know more about the Bible stories that had been told them by the children of the Center.

The sum of \$2,693.44 was raised for our special Lottie Moon offering.

As we meet from time to time to study Missions we learn the crying need of sending the Gospel to the lost and the great number that are eager to hear about Jesus and his power to save, our souls are stirred.

We are convinced that if the men of our churches would have Mission Study Classes and learn more about the critical need that is facing our great denomination their hearts would be so thrilled that contributions to this work would be greatly increased.

#### REPORT ON OBITUARIES

Your committee regrets to have to report the deaths of two of our most useful and faithful pastors, and four consecrated laymen since our last annual meeting.

Rev. Alonzo Robert Love former pastor of the Fourth Street Baptist Church, died on November 30th, at his home in Portsmouth. He was born in the city of Raleigh, N. C., fifty-six years ago and was a member of the Tabernacle Baptist Church of that city.

Brother Love had been the successful pastor of eight different churches, and had served them faithfully and well.

Perhaps his greatest work was done in the Hendersonville, Petersburg, and Portsmouth Churches, where he served eight, thirteen and five years respectively.

He served as moderator of this association for one year.

He was a strong, vigorous, forceful preacher and a faithful pastor, winning to an unusual degree the love and affection of his people and his brethren in the denomination.

Dr. Henry A. Griesemer, late pastor of the Park View Baptist Church of this city, died in the city of Baltimore on September 10th. He was seventy years of age at the time of his death.

Dr. Griesemer had been the successful pastor of many churches

during his long and useful life.

He served the Park View Church for nearly three years and was largely instrumental in the building of the beautiful building that was dedicated only a few months before his death.

Dr. Griesemer resigned as pastor of the Park View Church last March to return to Baltimore to greet his daughter who was returning after a long stay as a missionary in India.

His was a long and useful life and he has gone to receive the crown that awaited him in his Father's House.

Owen Lee Williams, who was a deacon in the Court Street Baptist Church, died at his home in Portsmouth April 8th, at the age of sixty-three years.

He was born in Pasquotank County, N. C., but came to Ports-

mouth when a very young man.

He had been a member of Court Street Church for more than forty years.

He was among its most faithful and loyal supporters.

He was a regular attendant upon the sessions of the Portsmouth Association, the Baptist General Association of Virginia and the Southern Baptist Convention.

Brother Williams had been greatly prospered and had accumulated quite an estate, but he had always contributed largely to all of the causes of our denomination and to numerous organizations outside of the church.

He not only gave of his means but also gave largely of his valuable time to the work of the kingdom. He is greatly missed by his church and his brethren; his place will be difficult to fill.

Dr. Burnley Lankford, beloved physician and Christian gentleman, met his death by drowning August 4th, at Virginia Beach.

Dr. Lankford was a consecrated and useful member of the Free-

mason Street Baptist Church, Norfolk.

He was one of the most useful and best beloved of the physicians

in the city of Norfolk, as was his father before him.

His life was devoted to his profession but he was never too busy but that he had the time to attend the services of his church on Sunday, with his entire family.

As a physician of the highest type, he had won the affection of those he served, and in death they paid him tribute such as few

receive.

His life was not only a blessing to his family, but to his church

and the community.

May his life which was just beginning here be a rich legacy to his family and church and a worthy example to follow.
